Iuka Hears Feedback from Stennis Institute's First Impressions Visit

First impressions matter, and Mississippi State University's Stennis Institute showed Iuka city officials and community activists how the city looks to first-time visitors, and offered ideas for "selling" Iuka to visitors, businesses, and its own citizens.

Last Wednesday, Dr. Joe Fratesi presented the results of the First Impressions visit, which is part of the Mississippi Community Action Project (MCAP). Iuka is one of about a dozen communities in the Stennis Institute's MCAP program, which allows them to participate in several community planning activities throughout the year.

"Your community can't look like it's going out of business," explained Dr. Fratesi, quoting a friend of his, Mayor Knox of Pelahatchie.

Former MDA (Mississippi Development Authority) head Leland Speed was known to say, "Pretty sells, and ugly don't," noted Fratesi. Cities should be trying to sell themselves to visitors, to residents, to current and potential businesses.

First Impressions

Initial impressions of Iuka were favorable, and we really have some attractive entrance-ways to the city, said Fratesi, citing the attractive "Iuka" city signs on Highway 72, and north of town on Hwy 25.

"These beautiful woodlands

and rolling hills that you drive through to get to Iuka, you just don't have those anywhere else in the state," he said.

He also said the initial "electronic front door," the Iuka city website, had good search engine results and interesting, pertinent information, though it needs updating and some more user-friendly links on the index/front page.

Iuka has development that, typical for many towns and cities, revolves around cars, with large parking lots in front of stores and businesses set far back off the road, noted Fratesi. Though typical, a long, curb-free stretch like that on Battleground Drive allows for cars to pull in from, or off of Battleground at random places, making it not as safe as a more controlled situation with designated entries into shopping areas.

The team praised some newer developments in Iuka: the Town and Country Furniture building, the new Dollar General, and the Homestead shopping center, which all have controlled entrance/access and landscaping that are not only safer but also more attractive. He also said the team noticed Brooks' grocery store, with the relatively new facade, and the many Brooks signs out toward the lake and Coleman State Park, directing people back into Iuka to shop.

"This is great, because Iuka really needs to find more ways to bring the seasonal visitors and

lake people into town to spend money," he explained.

The visitors were pleasantly surprised at the amount of commercial buildings, and the lack of empty ones.

Signage and visual clutter are better in Iuka than other towns, explained Fratesi, but sign regulations are an easy way to reduce potentially cluttered streets. Moving toward ground-level, monument-style signs makes for a more attractive appearance, and also levels the playing field - a mom-and-pop business can have just as nice a sign as a chain store that would otherwise put in a 50-foot tall pole for drivers to have to look up to see.

The visiting group did point out some sign issues that are not so obvious to those of us who travel Iuka's streets daily - like there are no signs pointing to downtown from outside the immediate downtown area, and that if you are stopped at our only stop light in the county, you can't actually read any of the dozen or so highway direction signs - you can only see the backs!

Moving Downtown, the group noticed a surprising lack of sidewalks in the historic residential areas. Good sidewalks promote more foot traffic, and would be a great way to connect the downtown to the Mineral Springs Park area.

Fratesi said the downtown is one of the more attractive ones that he has seen, and the buildings are in relatively good shape, which is a huge asset. He said that it could be made more attractive with some landscaping "bump-outs" with small green spaces in the "no-man's-land" areas at the corners of buildings where no cars can park anyway. Updating crosswalks, and re-striping downtown parking areas were some easy fixes he also suggested to make the downtown easier to navigate.

Fratesi said that Iuka, like most cities has limited resources, and he encouraged government to join forces with private initiatives like the IDEA group.

"There are limited resources, so it's important to use different strategies to foster community engagement, involvement and pride," he said. "You want to find a common vision."

Former Supervisor Price Dies in Collision

Last Thursday, former county supervisor Dale Price was fatally injured in a head-on collision on Highway 25 during a heavy downpour.

According to the Mississippi Highway Patrol, Perry Dale Price, 71, of Iuka, was southbound on Mississippi Highway 25 when he met a northbound 1994 Dodge pickup truck driven by James Borden, 55, of Corinth and the two vehicles apparently collided head-on.

The collision happened during the sudden rainstorm about 10 a.m. April 11th, just south of the Tenn-Tom Waterway bridge.

Price was transported by ambulance in critical condition from Magnolia Regional Health Center in Corinth, to the Med in Memphis where he was later pronounced dead.

James Borden was transported with minor injuries by ambulance to North Mississippi Medical Center in Iuka.

The accident remains under investigation by the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Price served Tishomingo County for sixteen years as Supervisor for the First District.

He is the third member of the previous board who has died since leaving office in 2008. Leon Cook, of Belmont, died from illness, and David Sanders, of Tishomingo, was killed in a collision.

Dale Price, 71, of Iuka, died Thursday, April 11th, 2013, at the Regional Medical Center in Memphis, as the result of an automobile accident. Mr. Price attended New Salem Baptist Church and was self-employed. He was a U. S. Army veteran of the Vietnam War, and a member of the Burns-ville Lodge #233 F&AM. He also served as the Tishomingo County First District Supervisor for sixteen years. Mr. Price enjoyed gardening and spending time with his grandchildren.

Services were held at 2 p.m. on Sunday, April 14th, at New Salem Baptist Church with Bro. Ron Norvell officiating. Burial was in Patrick Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home of Iuka was in charge of the arrangements.

Pallbearers were Jimmy Robertson, Perry White, Pejoe Arnold, Drew Hardwick, Shane Price, Robert Price, Greg Royal, and Sam South.



He was preceded in death by his parents, Melvin and Bernice Scruggs Price; and two brothers, Harold Price and Wayne Price.

Correcting Misinformation

This letter was sent directly to Charles Aldridge, and he submitted to the News.

First I'd like to congratulate you on doing a great job with finally getting the wet vs. dry issue on the ballot. Last week, there was an ad that ran in the paper against the county going wet. I am certain that you saw it. That ad contained many inaccurate statements and I believe it was intentionally untruthful. I did my own research regarding the claims made in that ad, and I am now giving my findings to you. You may use it in any way that you like. If you decide to use it, please include the entire thing because it will be worthless if it does not include the references listed. Those listed references prove everything that is stated.

Unfortunately, I cannot tell you who I am. I don't want to become the target of some of these crazy folks and have people calling my house or harassing me at work. Correcting of Misinformation

An earlier ad against voting the county wet on May 21st contained copious amounts of misinformation that need to be addressed. Furthermore, the author of the ad did not provide any sources to back up these assertions. I will provide truthful, accurate information, followed by reputable sources that verify my statements.

Alcohol is not the number one killer among youth. The leading cause of death for those between the ages of 15 and 20 is motor vehicle crashes. More than 60% of those crashes did not involve alcohol. A report by the National Safety Council goes on to say that "[exceeding the posted speed limit or driving at an unsafe speed limit or driving

at an unsafe speed is the most common error in fatal accidents." (2009)

The claim of a tripled divorce rate has been exaggerated and misrepresented. That referenced statistic is an estimate from a Norwegian study and is based on the husband drinking lightly and the wife drinking heavily. It does not refer to light, responsible alcohol consumption. The available information indicates that heavy and uneven alcohol use - patterns that denote alcoholism - can cause an increase in divorce (Torvik, 2013).

Mere access to alcohol does not cause familial disorder. The author of the previous ad seems to have trouble distinguishing the difference between moderate, responsible alcohol consumption and alcohol abuse.

In regards to the child and spousal abuse statistic, the author of the previous ad does not explain the circumstances of this vague allegation. In reality spousal and child abuse are complex issues with many contributing factors independent of alcohol abuse. Larry W. Bennett (as cited in Minnesota Advocates for Human Rights, 2003) found that alcohol can sometimes be relied upon as an excuse for a batterer and that there is no conclusive evidence that abusers are automatically predisposed to violence because he/she has used a substance such as alcohol or drugs. In other words the alcohol consumed by some abusers is not the direct cause of violence.

The assertion that half of all crimes are alcohol related is false. The Bureau of Justice Statistics found that "between 19% and 37 % of violent crimes from 1997-2008" involved alcohol. The study also found that the rate of alcohol-related violence had decreased during the past decade. (Bureau of Justice Statistics, 2010)

The financial cost of alcohol abuse (lost wages, loss of productivity, healthcare, etc.) does fluctuate in the billions. However, compare that number with the estimated \$190 billion spent by the U.S. on healthcare for the obese (Harvard School of Public Health, 2013).

The author of the previous ad states that a person dies "every 30 minutes" from an "alcohol related incident." According to the Centers for Disease Control, alcohol-related motor vehicle crashes kill one person every 48 minutes - less than what was cited in the aforementioned ad (2012).

Hope that this has clarified the previous ad's several unsubstantiated claims and allegations. Many of that ad's points

assume that the mere presence or use of alcohol equates alcoholism, which is simply not true. Many adults enjoy beer, wine, and spirits in moderation and govern themselves in a socially and morally responsible manner.

The best decision can only be reached when one is presented with unbiased information that is backed by credible sources, which I have endeavored to supply. Intentional and unintentional misinformation is detrimental to an accurate understanding of any issue, and voters should have access to honest and accurate facts and statistics that are free from any individual or institutional slant, bias, misrepresentation (intentional or otherwise), or agenda.

The Truth Behind Tubby's Life

Thelma and Hank Haynes Celebrate 69 Loving Years of Marriage

This is the love story of Thelma Sigler and Clarence Henry Haynes, better known as Hank, which began in 1943 in Kansas City, MO. This loving at heart couple will celebrate 69 years of marriage on Thursday, April 18, 2013. Hank worked for two years in Colorado and recently returned to KS, MO to work at the Civilian Conservation Group, earning \$1 per day. Thelma had caught Hank's eyes several days before they actually met; he had seen her walking to the Methodist Church, his apartment was across the street from the church. Another teenage girl brought Hank to a friend's birthday party, at which 16 year old Thelma was present. However, once Thelma and Hank met, and 5 days later, Hank and Thelma were married with one another. He asked her to marry him in November 1943. Before a wedding date could be set, he was drafted by the Army in early 1944. He came home for a 5 day leave before shipping out to the South Pacific, and his wedding was quickly postponed. They drove across the state line to Kansas City, KS to be married by a Justice of Peace on a rainy day with his Dad and a friend as witnesses.

but in 1945 there was no emotional therapy for soldiers returning from war.

Hank arrived home in October 1945. Thelma's brother, Jim, took her to the train station to meet Hank. Needless to say, this was a happy, although short reunion. She went home to her parents' house. Hank was to get back on the train and continue with all the other soldiers for out processing from the Army. Instead, he and two buddies grabbed a cab. He went to Thelma, but the next day, he and the buddies did continue to the Army Fort to finish the discharge process.

They lived in Kansas City, MO with her parents; with their names on a long waiting list for an apartment. Finally an apartment became available; while living there, their two children were born, Laura and Jim. Hank attended watch repair, engraving and jewelry repair schools. He also worked for MOP Railroad. Hank took a job on the Buick-Olds-Pontiac assembly line, which was owned by General Motors

In 1952, they moved to Denver, CO, where Hank had a job with Mountain Bell Telephone Company. Thelma also worked in sales for Mountain Bell Telephone Company. Hank was transferred by Mountain Bell to Pueblo, CO in 1954. However, he quickly landed a job with Strategic Communication Command for the US Government, retiring in 1984. Thelma went to work for the CF & I Steel Mill, retiring after 30 years in 1986.

In the fall of 2000, they moved to Iuka to be near Thelma's sister, Ellen; niece, Phyllis; and nephew, Phillip. Thelma has lost her sister and nephew since their move to Iuka. Tyler's grandparents have been devoted to him, showering him with love. They are very happy they moved to Iuka to raise Tyler and have enjoyed their laid back lifestyle here in the hills of MS. Early on, Tyler demonstrated a musical talent which his great-grandparents have encouraged. He plays guitar, clarinet, saxophone and piano. Upon graduation from Tishomingo County High School, he chose to attend NECC in Booneville, majoring in music. Tyler was honored when he received the "Jay Darwin Scholarship" in 2012 from Jay's parents, who lost their son at an early age.



The sun is her worst enemy. It burns her eyes and her skin will burn very easy. They told us to dress her in long sleeves and pants all the time. Her vision is 20/400 to 20/800. All of these things together make her legally blind. She will never get better but can get worse. Dr. Hoehn said she would be doing good to see the E on top of an eye chart if that.

We are raising money to get her to the National Institute of Health (NIH) in Bethesda, Maryland to see Dr. Adams. No one in Mississippi has answers about Madison. Dr. Adams works with kids and adults like Madison everyday. He will conduct many tests and answer a lot of unanswered questions about Madison's OA. The money raised is for our trip there. It is a 13 hour drive one way. This will be a two day trip because Madison can't sit in a car seat very long because of her sensitive skin. So the money is for gas, food, and a room for the night. When we get to NIH testing, food, and room is free to us, but we have to get there first. We will be there 3 to 4 days for studies and testing. Then we will have to come home the same way in a 2 day trip.



will need to bring their own bikes, water, and sunscreen. All riders under 16 years of age are required by Tennessee State Law to wear a helmet.

Tuesday, April 23 – National Parks in Your Backyard. Join a ranger and learn about all the national parks in Tennessee. This program will discuss the creation of the National Park Service and the history of national parks in Tennessee. The interpretive program will begin at 2:00 pm and meet in front of the visitor center.

Wednesday, April 24 – Young Guns of Shiloh: Car Caravan Tour. Join Ranger Charlie Spearman for a car caravan tour which explores the experiences of many young officers seeing combat for the first time at Shiloh. Some

ABSENTEE BALLOTS FOR MAY 21, 2013 SPECIAL ELECTION REGARDING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND BEER

Donna Henry Dill, Circuit Clerk, announces that absentee ballots will be available for the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, May 21, 2013, beginning Friday, April 12, 2013. You may come to the Circuit Clerk's Office to vote by absentee Monday – Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The clerk's office will also be open on Saturday, April 20, 2013, 8 a.m. to 12 noon for voter registration and absentee voting, on Saturday, May 11, 2013, 8 a.m. to 12 noon, for absentee voting, and on Saturday, May 18, 2013, 8 a.m. to 12 noon for absentee voting.

We encourage those who need to vote by mail to call our office as soon as possible so they will have ample time to go through the absentee process. When an absentee ballot is requested, an application for an absentee ballot will first be mailed to the voter. This application shall be completed by the absentee voter and mailed back to the Circuit Clerk's Office. When the application is received, the ballot will be mailed to the voter. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered to anyone.

Any registered voter is eligible to vote by absentee in the clerk's office, but only five groups are allowed to vote absentee by mail. These five groups are:

1. A registered voter who is 65 years of age or older;
2. A registered voter who is temporarily residing outside the county;
3. A registered voter who is temporarily or permanently physically disabled; and/or
4. A registered voter who is the parent, spouse or dependent of a temporarily or permanently physically disabled person who is hospitalized outside the county or more than 50 miles away from his/her residence and will be with that person on Election Day.

5. All voters who are members of the Armed Services, Their Spouses, Dependents, and Overseas Citizens who fall under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA).

All absentee applications and ballot envelopes must be notarized except for a registered voter who is physically disabled, either permanently or temporarily. The disabled voter's application and ballot envelope must be witnessed and signed by a person 18 years of age or older. This witness does not have to be a registered voter.

All absentee ballots requested by mail must be sent by mail to the voter and they must be returned by mail to the clerk's office. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered.

April 20, 2013, will be the last day to register to vote in the May 21 Special Election.

May 18, 2013, will be the last day to vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office for the May 21, 2013 Special Election.

All mailed absentee ballots must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Monday,

May 20, 2013 in order to be eligible to be counted for the May 21, 2013 Special Election.
