he county has approved a and light wine ordinance will allow legal beer and wine sales throughout the y as early as July 1st.

Tishomingo 21st, narrowly voters ed the legalization of beer and light wine in the Prohibition.

Until the county and municipalities adopt ordinances governing local sale, distribution, possession receipt and transfer of alcoholic beverages, the state regulations govern those issues, and the county's quickly issued ordinance is aimed at heading

Information on whether any person or company have applied for beer or liquor sales permits has not been available from the Department of Revenue, but Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors Attorney Philip Whitehead confirmed that no applications have been made for the county privilege liscence.

All permit applications go through the State Department of Revenue, and then permitted establishments must pay the privelige liscence fee to the County Tax Collector.

#### **Cities Move Fast on Ordinances** by Pamela McRae

Several municipalities have approved their ordinances for the sale of liquor, and beer, as well. Complete publication of the municipal ordinances will be available in the next week, according to reports.

Sale of liquor is only allowed in municipalities, so cities will have a separate liquor ordinance, as well as a beer ordinance.

### Aldridge Charged with Phone Harrassment

Local petition organizer Aldridge Charles "Tubby" was charged with telephone harassment last week in connection with repeated phone calls he made to a local pastor.

According to the docket at the Tishomingo County Jail, Aldridge was charged May 31st with telephone harassment. He reported to the jail himself, he said, and was released on cash bond shortly afterward.

In statements made Monday, Aldridge said he called Bro. Tony Curtis, pastor at Fifth Street Baptist Church and one of the leaders of the "Coalition for a Dry County," about "10-15 times," leaving voicemails for him each time. Curtis did not return the calls, nor answer, said Aldridge.

Aldridge said he was calling Bro. Curtis to ask about information included in advertisements the Coalition published and aired in the weeks prior to the May 21st election. Aldridge claimed that information in the ads was false, and that "no one in the State offices in Jackson" knew anything about the statements being true. When asked, identify Aldridge couldn't any particular statement or information, claiming he "can't read or write."

"Since I was the leader of the petition drive, and he showed himself to be the leader of the other side, he should have to answer my questions," said Aldridge, who, in the days since the narrowly successful election to bring Tishomingo County out from under the dry laws, has been taking advantage of the public spotlight to announce himself as a candidate for county sheriff - three years from now. According to the Mississippi state elections code, Aldridge's felony DUI conviction, for which he has stated he served time in the state penitentiary, will preclude him from being a viable candidate for public office, unless the governor pardons him between now and then.

Aldridge said he must report to justice court July 2<sup>nd</sup> for the misdemeanor charge of telephone harassment.

Bro. Curtis declined any specific comment the recent regarding harassment telephone charges, but said he felt he had to take action out of concern for his family.







I Remember You I Remember You

You were with General Morgan and his militia in the Carolinas. Things were not going well in the War for Independence. Tarleton and his redcoat regulars had chased you up against the Broad River. They thought they had you trapped but you turned on the British with a vengeance at the Cowpens and whipped them good. We buried you at the Cowpens but not before your actions helped win the War for Independence and free America forever. I Remember You

You were with Captain Lawrence on the USS Chesapeake. The year was 1813 and the British were once again fighting the colonies. Lawrence cried Dont Give up the Ship as the battle progressed poorly. You and Lawrence died together on the Chesapeake that day. Your deaths and words, however, served as inspiration to the colonies to once again throw off the yoke of British Imperialism. I Remember You You were with the Irish Brigade at Antietam. Lee had invaded the North and the Union was in peril. You and 540 of the Brigade fell that day in the Bloody Lane but not before you turned the Rebels back to Richmond. You saved the Union and made slavery disappear from the face of America forever. I Remember You You were with Blackjack Pershing in France in 1918. Ten million had already died in those miserable trenches and it had to stop. You made the big push into the Meuse-Argonne and you pushed and pushed until the German Army collapsed. You rest now in grave 1232 in Argonne Cemetery but you made the world safe again for democracy.

I Remember You You were in the first wave at Tarawa. We needed that tiny island for bombing raids on Japan and we sent you first to start the fight. Your body drifted slowly out to sea as the second and third waves came in to win the battle. As the battle went, so did the war and the evil empires of Japan and Germany were gone forever.

I Remember You

You were at Frozen and surrounded by the Chinese. It was time to advance to the sea and get out of that bloody trap. Your buddies strapped your dying body to a tank and kept the motor running to keep you from freezing in the 30 below cold. You didnt survive but your actions helped South Korea survive as a free nation. I Remember You

You were in the fighter planes giving support to our bombers over North Vietnam. They shot you down and locked you up in the Hanoi Hilton. For months they broke your bones trying to get you to betray your comrades. They broke your bones but not your spirit and your secrets died with you in that lonely cell far from the shores of America. I Remember You You were always there for us. In wars from Lexington to Bagdad and Afghanistan, in Desert Storm and on 9-11, in Mexico and Cuba and in countless other spots around the globe, you stepped forward and gave your life so that others may live free. You never had a chance to live your life and to fulfill your dreams because you were too busy sacrificing them so that we might have ours. In some quarters its now fashionable to forget what you have done for us, but I Remember You

Alligators can be found in abundance across the state of Mississippi. Most prevalent south of Highway 82, alligators will typically avoid any interaction with humans. However, juvenile alligators will often disperse into new territories in the late spring and early summer months. During this time, they occasionally find themselves in unusual locations such as ditches, parking lots, swimming pools, farm ponds and even buildings. Even though they are oftentimes intruding on private property, it is

illegal and very dangerous to try to capture, remove or kill an alligator without a special permit from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks (MDWFP).

It is because of these intrusions and over populations that the first public water alligator hunting season was initiated in September of 2005. With 50 permits available to a 13-mile stretch of the Pearl River north of Ross Barnett Reservoir, 30 alligators were harvested that year. The first private land alligator hunting season

was initiated in 2007 and was available to three open counties with a set number of permits available in each county. Since that time, alligator hunting opportunities have expanded each year.

Hunting season will begin at 12:00 noon on August 30 and continue until 12:00 noon on September 9, 2013. There are seven geographical public water alligator hunting zones. Each zone will have 150 permits available to applicants, except the Pearl River/Ross Barnett Zone which will have 70 permits and the Northwest Zone which will have 100 available permits. A total of 920 alligator harvest permits will be available for the 2013 hunting season. Each permit will carry a two alligator bag limit. Each alligator must be 4 feet long or longer, and only one may exceed 7 feet in length. Harvest reporting is mandatory.

This year, alligator hunting applications will be accepted from June 3 to 17 for persons interested in hunting during the 2013 alligator season on public waterways. Applicants must be residents of Mississippi and at least 16 years of age and a valid e-mail address is required. The MDWFP also requires that all persons selected for alligator hunting permits attend an alligator hunting training course to participate in the hunt. These training courses will be held at Jones Junior College on August 3, Roosevelt State Park on August 10 and Delta State University on August 17.

### **Pilot Club of luka Underground Railroad Quilt** \$2 per chance or 3 chances for \$5 Winner will be drawn at Heritage Day – August 31, 2013

Allow us to give you some background on the quilt. It is called Underground Railroad. The quilt is made in reproduction fabrics to reflect what a quilt would look like if made in the 1860s -- muted greens and browns. It is a teaching quilt that tells the story of the Underground Railroad where quilts were used to guide slaves to freedom. It is based on a nonfiction book based on the oral history of Ozella McDaniel Williams. Her family shared the secrets of how quilts were guides to freedom for slaves unable to read or write but knew quilt patterns and what blocks were named. The quilt has fifteen blocks (one repeated to make a perfect square).

- Jacobs Ladder shows directions using light and dark fabrics. Also known as Underground Railroad, this block pointed the way to a conductor, such as Harriet Tubman, who guided many slaves to freedom.
- Monkey Wrench was the first quilt displayed to signal time for escape and they would need tools to build shelter and to collect food.
- Wagon Wheel the second quilt was primary means of escape. Wagon was built with hidden compartments.
- Carpenters Wheel was to point the way to west-northwest. This was used around the Appalachian Mountains to escape to Ohio and freedom.
- Bear's Paw was used to direct runaways to follow animal footprints like a road map through the mountains and would lead to water and food.
- Basket was used as a symbol of provisions needed for the long journey north. Laundry basket was often used to disguise food and clothing carried to safe houses.
- Crossroads was used for escaping slaves in the Appalachian Mountains to get to a crossroads or terminal. The main crossroads was Cleveland Ohio. Crossroads also referred to midnight. The Monkey wrench turned the wagon wheel towards Canada trail to the crossroads.
- Log Cabin was used to direct a runaway to a safe house. Log cabin quilts always have a red block to symbolize the fireplace. If a quilt had a single black block in the center it was a safe house.
- Shoo-Fly this represented and actual person who helped a slave escape to a place to hide often a graveyard or safe house.
- Bow-tie -slaves escaping in tattered clothes were easily identified, this quilt identified that clothing was hidden for them so they could blend in. Turned sideways this quilt show and hourglass symbolizing they were among friends.
- Drunkard's Path this quilt was used to remind slaves to double back retrace steps and never go in a straight line to avoid detection.
- Sail Boats this was the quilt of safe passage. Black sailors or ship owners help many slaves escape.
- North Star this was an important navigation tool that helped slaves escape to Canada

The business privilege license imposed by Tishomingo County, Mississippi to engage in the sale and distribution of beer and light wine shall be equal to fifty percent (50%) of the tax imposed by the State of Mississippi pursuant to Section 27-71-303 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as annotated and amended, which shall be renewed annually with the Tishomingo County Tax Collector.

Section 1-4. Restrictions on sale of beer and light wine.

(a) Cold beer sales allowed. It shall be lawful for refrigerated beer or light wine to be sold within the boundaries of the county for off-premises and on-premises consumption except as restricted below

(b) On-premises kitchen facilities required. No beer or light wine shall be sold for on-premises consumption unless the seller has suitable kitchen facilities on the licensed premises to provide for the preparation, cooking and serving of food so that food sales generate twenty-five (25) percent of gross revenue. The service of foods not prepared on the premises shall not be deemed in compliance with the requirements of this section. Restaurants must contain seating for a minimum of forty persons (40) with suitable facilities for the consumption of food for its patrons and the kitchen facilities must remain open for business so long as beer or light wine is being sold. The on-premises facility must pass the State of Mississippi Serv-Safe requirement for food service facilities and shall exhibit in plain sight the certificate evidencing the same. No facility or establishment licensed to sell beer or light wine for onpremises consumption may also sell or distribute light wine or beer by the package for consumption on or off premises.

(c) (Sunday sales). It shall be unlawful to sell beer and light wine on Sunday. The Board of Supervisors shall reserve the right to review this provision anytime after expiration of ninety days (90) after the date of the adoption of this order.

(d) Hours of sale for all days except Sunday. Beer or light wine may be sold for on-premises or off-premises consumption between the hours of 7 a.m. and 12:00 midnight Monday through Saturday.

(e) Drive-in sales prohibited. It shall be unlawful to sell beer or light wine through a drive-in window sales facility or a drive-thru "beer barn" within the county boundaries of the city.

(f) Advertising. Advertisements for the sale of light wine and been are limited to the interior of the building or structure where the beer or light wine is sold and limited to the exterior of the structure where the beer or light wine is sold. There shall be no billboards or other advertisements regarding beer or light wine products

The sales clerk of sumption. each premises selling package beer or light wine for off-premises consumption must first place the same in an opaque bag or sack before delivering same to the purchaser unless the same is in case form too large for the normal grocery store or convenience store bag. Draft beer drawn from a tap may be sold for off premises consumption provided the same is sold in sealed containers and bagged as packaged beer. No on premises consumption of draft beer may occur where package beer or light wine is sold.

(n) It shall be unlawful for anyone who works for a person, partnership group or business entity who engages in the sale of beer or light wine to be under the influence of alcohol or to consume alcohol while working in the establishment holding the permit to offer the same for sale.

(o) It shall be unlawful to sell, give or furnish in any manner any beer or light wine at any time or place to a person under the age of twenty-one (21) years of age, or to knowingly sell, furnish or give the same to any person for delivery to such minors unless authorized pursuant to Section 67-3-54 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as annotated and amended.

(p) It shall be unlawful to sell, distribute or transfer beer or light wine in any establishment where firearms, ammunition, gun powder, explosive devices, dynamite or any other explosive or incendiary devices or compounds are sold

(q) It shall be unlawful to sell, give or furnish in any manner any beer or light wine at any time or place to any person who is known to be insane, lack mental capacity, who is mentally incapacitated or who is visibly intoxicated or to knowingly to sell, give or furnish the same for sale to any person for the delivery to such persons.

(r) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow or permit gambling at any location where beer or light wine is sold upon licensed premises

(s) No holder of a State of Mississippi permit to offer for sale or distribution light wine or beer shall allow any lewd, immoral or improper entertainment, conduct or practices to take place on the premises where said business is conducted or allow said practice to occur in conjunction where said light wine and beer is sold. Sec. 1-7. Compliance with state law requirements

No Business Privilege License as required by this article shall issue to any person unless satisfactory evidence is furnished to the tax collector that such person has complied with the requirements of state law, and if the permit required by state law is at any time revoked, said revocation shall operate as a cancellation and forfeiture of the rights of the person holding a permit or license from the County

Section 1-8. Penalty for violation of article; misdemeanor.

Any violation of this article which does not specifically designate the penalty for a violation shall constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars or imprisonment for not more than six (6) months or both

Section 1-9. There shall be no sales of beer or light wine on Christmas Day or other holidays restricted by the regulations of the Mississippi Department of Revenue-Alcohol Beverage Control Division, or as restricted by the Mississippi Code of 1972, as annotated and amended.

Section 1-10. No holder of a license to sell beer or light wine shall have any person under the age of eighteen years of age in his employ sell, dispense, handle or stock light wine or beer beverages. However, in no case shall any person be employed under the age of twentyone years as a bartender in a facility licensed for on premises consumption in a facility as defined in Section 1-4(b) herein

Section 1-11. Violations, penalties and revocation of license.

Any holder of a business privilege license to sell, distribute or transfer, for on premises or off premises consumption, who violates the provisions of this article shall be subject to the penalties as follows:

(a) A beer or light wine privilege licensee who violates the provisions of this order may have such license suspended for up to thirty days (30) and a fine of not more than \$500.00 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than thirty days (30) or both.

(b) A beer or light wine privilege licensee who violates the provisions of this order within three hundred sixty five (365) calendar days of the first offense may have its license suspended for up to one hundred eighty (180) days, up to one thousand dollar (\$1,000.00) fine and imprison-

Section 1-13. The sale of beer or light wine, distribution and transfer shall be lawful beginning on July 1. 2013.

The sections of this article may be referred to collectively as the Tishomingo County Beer Ordinance'



This distance shall be measured from the nearest point of the building housing the church, school or funeral home to the nearest point of the premises which consists of the floor planned area to be licensed by the Mississippi Department of Revenue Alcohol Beverage Control Division. This distance shall be measured in a straight line, such as airline distance, rather than the usual route of pedestrian travel. 
