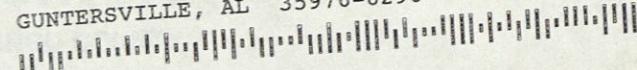

Iuka Woman Hit by Car on Hwy. 25, Dies

An Iuka woman died after she was struck by a car last Thursday evening on Highway 25 just south of Iuka.

According to Tishomingo County Coronor Mack Wilemon, Debra Wilbanks, 51, had pulled off on the northbound side of Highway 25, near Sid's Trading Post, leaving her flashers on, and the car still running. As she crossed the road, she was struck by a southbound Ford Fu-

sion and sustained injuries that caused her death. The name of the driver was not released, but they did stop and spoke to officials at the scene.

The collision is still under investigation, said Tishomingo County Chief Deputy Mike Kemp, but all indications are that Wilbanks was accidentally hit.

Ms. Wilbanks was known by many - she worked at Handy Sandy.

Battle Organizers Announce Plans for 2014 Battle of Iuka

For the 2014 version of the Battle of Iuka, organizers will be joining forces with nearby Farmington to make a larger reenactment, and will be alternating hosting duties yearly. They also announced that the Battle observance would move further into the fall, with a September 19-21st date.

The merger, of sorts, was announced by Battle of Iuka Committee Chairperson Harold Lomenick at a holiday get-together last week at the newly re-opened Café Memories. More than thirty committee members, local officials and sponsors attended the event, and heard Lomenick and Farmington Mayor Dale Fortenberry, explain the choice to combine the Battle of Iuka, with the larger Farmington reenactment.

Combining Iuka and Farmington will allow reenactors to come to a bigger single event instead of two events that were within two weeks of each other and in the same part of the state, explained Lomenick.

"For these folks, these reenactment weekends cost a lot in both time and money, and we want to be the best event we can for them, and we want to make it easy for them to come," explained Lomenick.

The plan is to alternate using Iuka and Farmington each year - Iuka gets even numbered years and Farmington the odd numbered. So the Battle will be in Iuka again, but, thankfully, it will be a few weeks later, September 19-21st, which should make a significant difference in the weather. In 2013, the Iuka event suffered through 95+ degree days, and there are significant health concerns for spectators and participants when it's that hot, and half the participants are wearing wool uniforms.

Dale Fortenberry, key organizer of the Battle of Farmington, has been a behind-the-scenes advisor for the Battle of Iuka committee since the planning stages of the 150th anniversary in 2012, guiding Lomenick and the committee with suggestions, references, and sharing what he has learned in eight years of reenactments.

After a small start, Farmington now draws about 350-400 reenactors to fight the Battle of Farmington each October on land that includes the original battlefield where the April

1862 Battle of Farmington was fought. The successful Farmington event includes two days of battle action, an education day for 1,500 students, a sutler's row, and evening social events. They have cavalry units, and more artillery (cannon) that will support the combined event.

The joined forces of the Farmington Heritage Committee and the Battle of Iuka organizers will also spread out some of the preparation labor, and

help to not burden the sponsors who have faithfully supported the Battle.

Dr. Curt Fields, who most Iukans recognize as U.S. General

Ulysses S. Grant for his portrayals the past two years, was a special guest at the meeting and he encouraged the organizers to continue producing a quality reenactment event. He said that Virginia makes \$7 billion annually from Civil War tourism, and said what many development professionals say when discussing Tishomingo County - tourism is an industry that won't go to Mexico or China, and we have a golden opportunity to welcome people into our towns to spend a couple nights, eat at our restaurants, shop at our stores, and then return home.

"Regardless of the uniform I wear, I'm a Southerner through and through," Fields joked, referring to his Grant uniform. "We have a tremendous history to share with people who will pay money to come to our towns and battlefields, to learn more, and enjoy that history with us!"

Additionally, the 150th anniversary commemorations of the War Between the States are winding down some. Some places that had 150th anniversary reenactments won't continue to have them, and the Iuka/Farmington event will likely be the only one in Mississippi. The significant Iuka, Farmington and Corinth battles were all fought for control of the key railroad crossroads in Corinth, and the South's losses there were the beginning of the end for the Confederate forces.

Three in Custody After Theft and Chase Sunday Afternoon

County authorities apprehended three suspects Sunday afternoon shortly after they stole a trailer, and two side-by-side utility vehicles.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock, three suspects are in custody facing larceny charges. Authorities did not release names of the suspects, who were all currently living in Alcorn County, as they are thought to be involved in, or responsible for other thefts in the area which are still under investigation.

Top Story of 2013 for County Was Campaigns, Vote and Eventual Legalization of Alcohol

The top story of 2013 for Tishomingo County has been the controversial campaign to legalize sale of alcohol and beer in the county, and the eventual vote that allows it for the first time.

After three years, and an endless campaign by Charles "Tubby" Aldridge to get enough signatures to bring the issue to a vote, the potential vote became a reality when Aldridge presented the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors with a completed petition in April, and they set an election for May 21st.

The "Coalition for a Dry County" began an extensive campaign of advertising, 135

people registered to vote, and it was undoubtedly the 2013 issue that managed to have the whole county discussing it, in person, from pulpits, on Facebook, and in letters to the editor.

John Nunley, who lives on County Road 247 east of Iuka, saw a vehicle driving off with his trailer and called it in to the sheriff's department, who issued a BOLO (be-on-the-lookout) for it. The suspects apparently went to Sid's Trading Post and loaded up, by hand, two side-by-side utility vehicles, and took off.

An off-duty officer saw the vehicle and trailer, and notified other deputies who finally apprehended three suspects, on County Road 150, near the

MDOT shed, after they dumped the trailer and utility vehicles in the middle of a road, and tried to escape in just the vehicle explained Whitlock.

One suspect had to be airlifted from the scene, due to injuries he received when he jumped out of the getaway vehicle as it was moving. Another ran off into the woods but was found and brought in by deputies. One was taken into custody at the vehicle.

The stolen vehicles were all recovered and returned.

side convenience stores, many of which installed special refrigerated areas to handle the new products. One liquor store opened in Burnsville, and another in Iuka in December.

Economically, the sales have seemed to increase business for the stores that carry beer and light wine products. Iuka Mayor John Castleberry said preliminary figures did not show a significant increase in sales tax receipts, but one distributing company has indicated their willingness to be a useful part of the community by donating nearly \$10,000 to local events and institutions in recent months.

CONSERVATION CORNER

Recycle Your Christmas Trees

Let Christmas continue for months. If you recycle your live Christmas trees, you will be giving a gift to the environment. Your beautiful tree can be converted into several things - mulch, wildlife and fish habitats and lake and river stabilization. And the way technology is moving in the area of cellulosic ethanol, in the near future, you may be trading in your Christmas tree for a gallon or two of synthetic gasoline.

The mulch from the trees will provide a protective barrier for the roots of other plants while preventing weeds from growing. When the mulch decomposes, it will provide the nutrients plants need to thrive.

According to the National Christmas Tree Association, pine-needle mulch helps the winter soil to retain heat. The warm soil will encourage early seeding and faster growth come spring. The mulch will then act as a stabilizer for the temperature and moisture while preventing sunlight from germinating weed seeds that compete with what you are trying to grow.

To improve fish habitat, many trees can be satunk in farm ponds and lakes to create habitat for small fish and encourage the larger fish to scale on the outskirts. This helps create favorite fishing spots for our young anglers. Christmas trees have created some of my favorite places to fish in some

of the gravel pits along the Tombigbee River in Northeast Mississippi and in the oxbow lakes of the Delta.

In Jefferson Parish, Louisiana, a conservation project was started in the late 1980s to help rebuild the coastline. Trees are placed into pre-constructed shoreline fences. Project Coordinator Jason Smith stated, "A monitoring study by Louisiana State University found that these tree fences dramatically reduce the rate of shoreline retreat and, by effectively trapping sediments, result in higher accretion rates in nearby marshes. Sediments carried over and through the fences by wave action are slowly accumulating and building land between the shoreline and the fences."

The state of Georgia is well-known for its

recycling efforts, and Christmas tree recycling program is another of its many successes. Cleverly titled "Bring On for the Chipper," the program is organized by Keep Georgia Beautiful in cooperation with private sponsors. The Chipper program involves hundreds of Georgia communities and thousands of volunteers. Communities have the option of coordinating a pick-up program relying on designated drop sites; the trees are then turned into mulch that is used for playground beautification projects in individual yards.

Before you turn your tree over to the environment, be sure to remove everything including ornaments, wire, hooks, lights, tinsel, garland, nails, screws and things that stand.

Master Gardener Training Begins in February

Would you like to be a Master Gardener? Applications are being accepted in Tishomingo County for anyone who wants to sharpen their horticultural skills and share that knowledge with others. Mississippi State University's Extension Service will be conducting the Master Gardener training program on Thursdays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00 to 3:00 p.m. with a lunch break at noon, beginning February 3rd and ending February 24th. All sessions will be taught by Extension Service professionals or current Master Gardeners at the Extension Office in Iuka. Enrollment will be limited to 30 participants, who, following training, will commit to donating 40 service hours to the County

Extension Office. Training begins with instructions on the Master Gardener program concept, basic botany, and soils. Other training sessions include vegetables, ornamental plants, home fruit and production, invasive plants, diseases, insects, weed control and lawn care. Plus we will have hands-on demonstrations and a field trip look at different operations in the county. A one-time fee of \$85.00 covers materials, refreshments and a 1-year membership in the Mississippi Master Gardener Association. Deadline for application is January 15th. Pick up an application in our office at 238 Kaki St. or call and we will mail it to you. For more details, contact the Extension office at 423-7016.

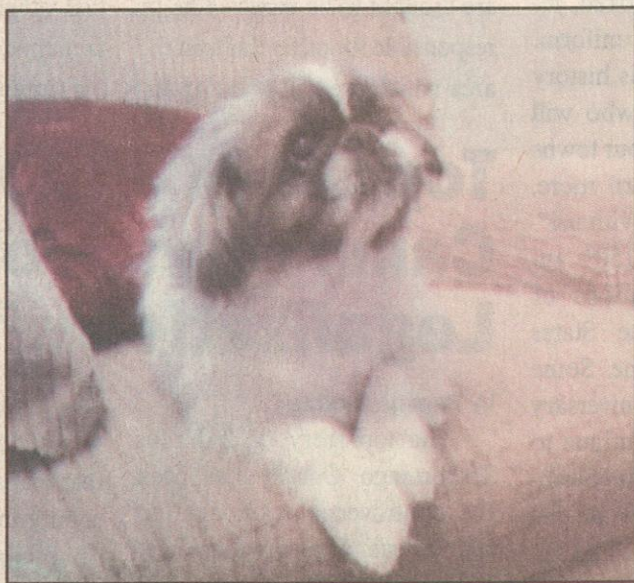

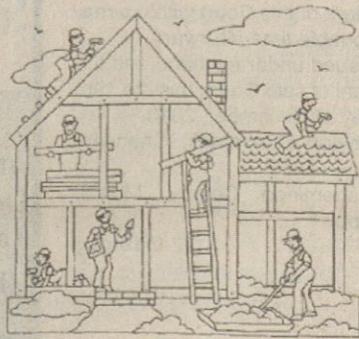

New Year Resolutions

Regular Exercise Boosts Brain Power

Regular exercise can benefit the body in many ways, helping men and women maintain healthier weights and lower their risks for developing potentially deadly diseases. Though many people are quick to associate exercise with its physical benefits, those hours spent on the treadmill also can boost brain power.

According to Dr. Barry Gordon, professor of neurology and cognitive science at Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions and coauthor of "Intelligent Memory: Improve the Memory That Makes You Smarter," exercise has a direct impact on the brain. That's because exercise works directly on brain tissue, improving the connections between nerve cells, creating new synapses, growing new neurons and blood vessels,

and improving cell energy efficiency. So while many people may begin an exercise regimen with a goal of trimming their waistlines or toning their bodies, they might be happy to know that those physical benefits are accompanied by several cognitive benefits as well.

As the American Psychological Association acknowledges, the connection between exercise and mental health is hard to ignore, and the APA notes that the following are just a few of the mental benefits men and women might reap from regular exercise.

Improved mood
Many people feel great after exercising, especially if that exercise comes at the end of a particularly stressful day. However, those extra laps on the track or those hours spent on the treadmill don't just

pay short-term dividends. In a controlled trial overseen by Duke University researcher and clinical psychologist James Blumenthal, sedentary adults with major depressive disorder were assigned into one of four groups: supervised exercise, home-based exercise, antidepressant therapy, or a placebo pill. Those in the exercise and antidepressant groups had higher rates of remission than those in the placebo group, and Blumenthal concluded that exercise was generally comparable to antidepressants for men and women with major depressive disorder. In addition, in following up with patients a year later, Blumenthal found that those who continued to exercise had lower depression scores than those participants who were less active.

Blumenthal's study was not the only one to conclude that exercise can have a positive impact on mood. In a review of 11 studies that examined the effects of exercise on mental health, Boston University professor of psychology Michael Otto and his colleagues found that exercise could be a powerful tool when treating clinical depression, and even recommended clinicians include exercise as part of their treatment plans for depressed patients.

Antidote to anxiety

Some researchers, Otto included, have begun to examine the effects of exercise on treating and possibly preventing anxiety. The body's nervous system responds quickly when people feel frightened or threatened, often causing the body's heart rate to increase and sweat-

ing and dizziness to occur. Those people who are especially sensitive to anxiety respond to these feelings with fear, and that makes them more likely to develop panic disorders. But Otto and fellow researcher Jasper Smits of the Anxiety Research and Treatment Program at Southern Methodist University studied the effects that regular workouts might have on people prone to anxiety. Since exercise produces many of the same physical reactions, such as sweating and an elevated heart rate, the body produces when responding to fear or threats, Otto and Smits wanted to determine if exercise might help people prone to anxiety become less likely to panic when experiencing fear or threats. In studying 60 participants with heightened

sensitivity to anxiety, Otto and Smits found that the subjects who participated in a two-week exercise program exhibited marked improvements in anxiety sensitivity compared to those participants who did not take part in the exercise program. Otto and Smits concluded that this improvement was a result of the exercise group participants learning to associate the symptoms common to both fear and exercise, such as sweating and an elevated heart rate, with something positive (exercise) instead of something negative (anxiety).

Regular exercise benefits the human body in numerous ways, not the least of which is its impact on the brain. More information on the link between exercise and improved mental health is available at www.apa.org.

Wicker Champions National Security Priorities in Defense Bill

For the past 52 years, Congress has passed a National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) outlining the country's military priorities for the next fiscal year. Funding for our troops and the equipment they need is essential to

ensuring they can fulfill their missions at home and abroad. This year's legislation authorizes \$625.1 billion for national defense.

Meeting Diverse Defense Needs

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I was suc-

cessful in including several provisions in NDAA to strengthen America's national security and defense. One seeks to make sure the Navy has a robust and ready fleet by requiring the Commandant of the Marine Corps to report to Congress on the number of ships the Corps needs. Other provisions support the continued use of light utility helicopters and unmanned aerial vehicle aircrafts.

Given today's budget challenges, it is important to nurture cost-effective, cutting-edge solutions for equipping U.S. soldiers with the best resources available. Mississippians play a major role in meeting America's defense needs, with military communities and bases across the state working to prepare troops for diverse challenges. Earlier this year, I had the opportunity to participate in a summit hosted by Mississippi Military Communities Council on how to protect our state from potential Base Realignments and Closures (BRAC). At my request, NDAA prohibits the implementation of a BRAC for one year.

Policies concerning equipment and bases, however, are only part of NDAA's scope. A provision I offered with Sen. Joe Donnelly (D-Ind.) would also support our service members' health and well-being. Specifically, the provision directs a pilot program to screen for mental health problems and then facilitate much-needed access to behavioral health specialists. Given the rates of suicide and mental health issues among our returning heroes, it is critical that our men and women in uniform get the care they need.

Protecting U.S. Interests

Real and dangerous threats remind us that "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." Last month, news reports revealed Russia's plans to put satellite ground monitoring stations on U.S. soil, prompting legitimate concerns that they could be used for gathering intelligence. The Obama Administration's efforts to negotiate with Russia fail to recognize the potentially damaging access that the Kremlin could

have. To ensure our national security is not put at risk, I authored an amendment to NDAA requiring the Secretary of Defense and Director of National Intelligence to certify that any U.S.-based GPS stations are not capable of collecting intelligence or improving foreign weapons systems.

Securing America's Defense Future

Like many of my colleagues, I had hoped NDAA would have been passed months ago, following the Armed Services Committee's approval in June. With more time for debate and an open amendment process, Sen-

ate Republicans who are not members of the Armed Services Committee could have offered additional improvements. Instead, legislative tactics by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) hindered what is typically a big bipartisan win.

Our country's major defense policy should be a crowning achievement — not a vehicle for more gridlock. Passage of the 2014 NDAA continues a tradition that has endured for more than half a century. Its success each year is critical to the safety and security of all Americans.

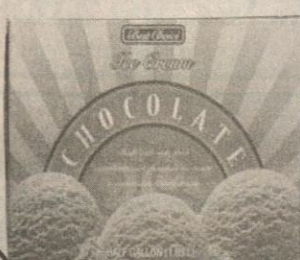

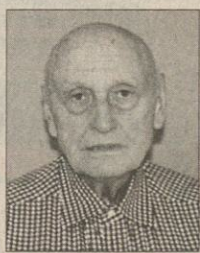

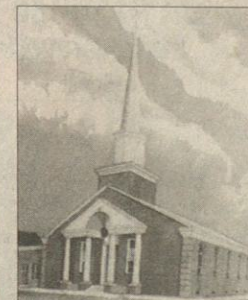
