Shiloh Eagles Entertaining Spring Spectators

Eagles are no strangers to the Pickwick Lake/Tennessee River region, but in recent years, a pair of American bald eagles that live in Shiloh National Military Park have attracted quite a following.

Instead of along the river that provides much of their food, the two adult eagles built their nest along one of the busiest roadways in the Shiloh National Military Park, where more than 100 Civil War soldiers are buried, and where thousands of tourists visit each year.

They have successfully raised four eaglets since they

were first observed in 2007 by the wife of the park ranger. They were dubbed "Hiram" and "Julia," after General Hiram Ulysses Grant and his wife.

Bald eagles mate for life, and each year the size of the eagles' nest increases, making it difficult to observe nest activity from below, but the Park has installed a "nest cam," allowing for the followers of Hiram and Julia to more easily follow their ongoing saga. They have successfully raised four eaglets on the battlefield.

Peggy Lowrey, of Iuka, is one of many photographers that spend their days "eagle watch-

ing" and getting incredible photographs of the two huge birds. She has some breathtaking images of the majestic birds, that have a six-foot wingspan, on her Facebook page, and recently scooped up prizes for her wildlife photographs in the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum's photo contest.

"They don't seem to mind us a bit, and almost put on a show for us sometimes," said Lowrey recently. She said the nest is occupied nearly year-round, and is easily visible from the road, providing a rare opportunity to observe the majestic birds in the wild. In recent days, she and

other observers have noticed one "bobble-head" baby that has hatched from two eggs laid in early February. Each year the photographers watch the progress of the babies closely, and in recent years, when some have fallen from the nest, they have taken extraordinary measures to help - calling 911 and wildlife professionals to come to the aid of the eaglets.

"As the national bird, they are protected, so we can't get near them, and have to stay outside the fence," said Lowrey. But the park superintendent is very accommodating of the eagles'

considerable fans, even providing a porta-potty for the crowd that comes out to see the birds.

The eagles themselves are quite accommodating - providing swooping fly-overs and screeching to each other during their daily activities of nest building, food gathering, and interaction of all sorts. Julia is a few years older than her young mate, Hiram, and blogs by observers, and even Shiloh Park, have described their antics to the point of being able to really know this pair of devoted eagle parents.

Tishomingo County Fourth Highest in State

County's Retail Sales Up 30 Percent Since 2008 According to Report

Tishomingo County's economy is improving, and we lead the state in some areas, according to a recently released state economic report.

A research study by the Mississippi Public Universities Research Center reveals that between 2008 and 2012 Tishomingo County saw an increase in retail sales when most other

counties of similar population saw a decrease.

According to Mississippi Business, a publication of the University Research Center, Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning, our county saw an increase in retail sales of 30 percent, which is the fourth highest in the state, exceeded only by Claiborne and Kemper Coun-

ties, where power plants were under construction, and by Yazoo County, that saw a 31 percent increase.

Overall the state added 18,900 jobs, and 220 of those were in Tishomingo County, according to the report.

Additionally, the total personal income for Tishomingo County citizens was

\$494,195,000.

"Although we have a lot of work to do, these numbers document that efforts to increase retail sales are successful and that Tishomingo County's retailers are working hard to meet the needs of their customers," said a statement from the Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF).

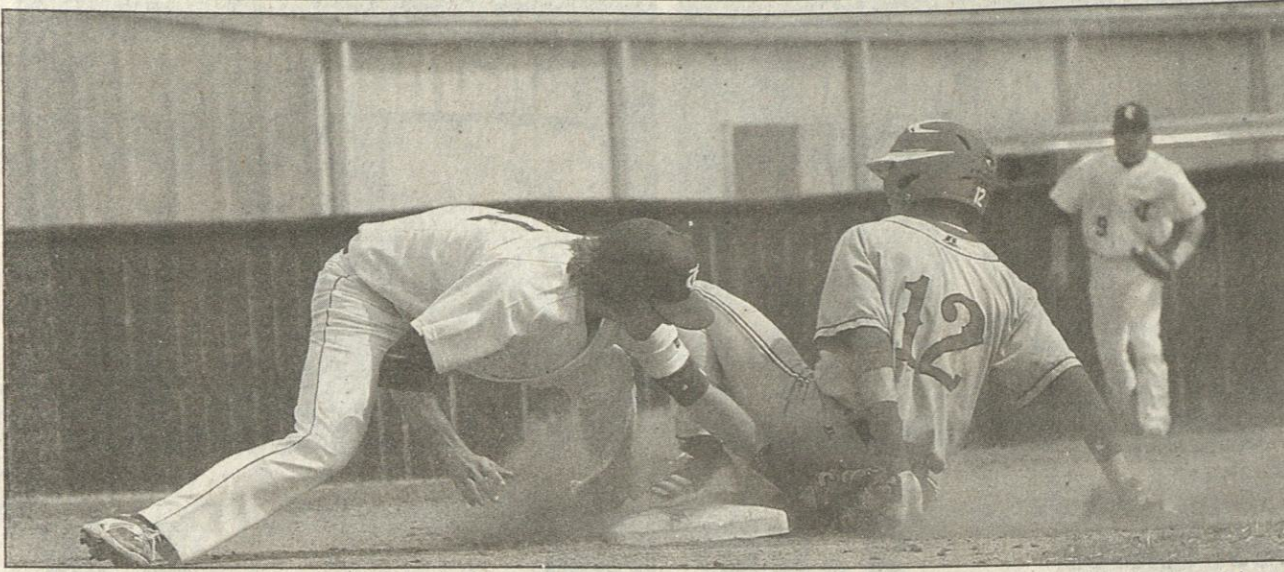

cliff-hanging episodes for the next five weeks on social media sites and YouTube, as well as these-

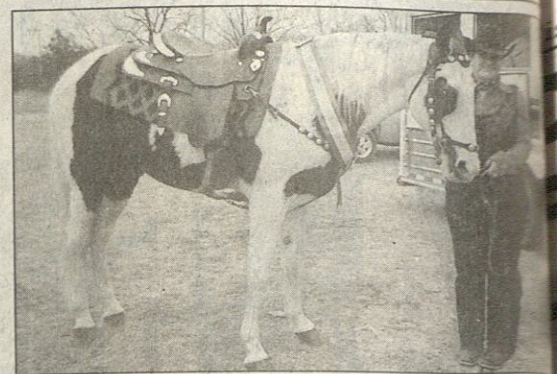

Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids.

"Kick Butts Day is an opportunity for participating youth to speak out and tell others they are not going to be influenced by pressure to use tobacco products. While Kick Butts Day is officially held on one day each year, our hope is that every day will be Kick Butts Day in the fight against tobacco," said Melissa Nash, Project Director of the MS Tobacco Free Coalition of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties.

Downtown Savannah Plans Memorable Night in Honor of Sergeant York

Gary Cooper, Pick- Landing State Park Ranger Crystal York Rich, Savannah Main Street coming together for a memorable night in downtown Savannah.

A Reluctant Hero: Celebrating Alvin C. York, hosted by Savannah Main Street, is a unique event dedicated to World War I hero, Medal of Honor recipient, and Tennessee Sgt. Alvin York. The event will be held on Friday, March 22, at 7 p.m. in the historic Savannah Theater and the Tennessee River Museum.

"Alvin C. York is a Tennessean, a great American, and I believe, Tina York's idea of a being a war hero. I hope everyone understands what privilege it is to have the right to knit here in Savannah, years ago, and to be Coach to hear from a living hero about how Mr. York wanted to be remembered. The Main Street children this Saturday with a speaker, film, exhibit, and food will be some of the greatest every patriot can have," said Main Street Director C. Seth Sumner.

The event will begin at the Savannah Theater with Crystal York Rich, Pick- Landing State Park great-great-granddaughter of Sgt. York, telling stories of how York lived to be remembered. The exhibit will give ticket holders a unique glimpse into the private life of a world war hero and what his

life was like beyond the military.

"His main focus was, of course, on religion, but he also focused on the improvement of education, especially in rural areas," said Rich of her great-great-uncle.

Savannah Main Street will then show a special screening of the 1941 classic film "Sergeant York" starring Gary Cooper as the title character. Cooper won his only Academy Award in this Howard Hawks directed portrayal of the famous Tennessean. In 2008, the film was selected for preservation in the National Film Registry by the Library of Congress for being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."

Following the movie, ticket holders are invited to view the exhibit, titled In the Footsteps of Sergeant York, currently on display at the Tennessee River Museum where heavy hors d'oeuvres will be served. The exhibit details the excavation of artifacts from the site in the Argonne Forest in France where Sgt. York earned his Medal of Honor. Using artifacts and empirical data collected during the project, the exhibit reintroduces audiences to not only the experience of York, but those who fought by his side, as well as the men who never returned.

"The exhibit is a comprehensive look at the expeditions we made

to France," said David Currey, the exhibit's designer and a public historian from Nashville who documented the project in France as a member of the American team. "The amount of information that was gathered and the artifacts that were uncovered certainly was evidence we were in the right place," said Currey.

Established in 2012 world cerebral palsy day is an international day of awareness about cerebral palsy. Cerebral Palsy is a group of chronic disorders impairing control of movement that can occur at birth or in the first few years of life. These disorders are caused by damage to the parts of the brain that control muscles and movement. Sometimes the reason for the impairment is never identified. Some people with Cerebral Palsy are also affected by other medical disorders, such as seizures or intellectual ability.

There are many types of Cerebral Palsy and no two persons have the same symptoms. Each has their own set of difficulties. Cerebral Palsy generally is a long-lasting (chronic) condition. Cerebral Palsy symptoms can change over time. The North Mississippi Regional Center offers these comprehensive programs and supports to almost 1,000 individuals in north Mississippi. NMRC provides licensed residential care and services on its main campus in Oxford, and at licensed community programs across the northern 23 counties of the state. Assistance is also offered through a continuum of community based options including supervised living homes, supported living apartments, employment and pre-vocational programs, early intervention and assistive technology programs, adult day services, and the support coordination/IDD waiver program.

A national observance of IDD Awareness Month brings increased understanding of the supports necessary for individuals with disabilities to live more independently in their home communities. Today the public has greater awareness of intellectual disabilities as a natural occurrence, with an understanding that persons with disabilities can contribute greatly in the community and workplace.

Conservation Corner Time to Scout for Deer

By the time hunting season ends, the last word many of us want to hear is "deer." Yet, before the season starts it is the only thing on our minds. No one questions the importance of scouting in September for an October bow hunt or a November gun hunt for whitetails, or even for a photography outing. But we seldom think about scouting in March—a time when Mississippi's largest land mammal is leaving a clear sign saying, "Yes, I was here."

That sign is in the form of shed antlers. Antlers are made of fast growing bone and are shed every year (except in rare cases). Horns, on the other hand, are slow growing and permanent and are usually grown by both sexes.

Antlers fascinated me so much that when I was a senior in high school, my science project was on antler growth and abnormalities. Dr. Harry Jacobson formerly of Mississippi State University's College of Forest Resources and one of the world's premier whitetail deer researchers, who was a great influence on me entering the field of fish and wildlife management, was my source of information.

By the end of the deer hunting season, or late January, the whitetail deer is undergoing tremendous physiological changes. In December, the days are short and the temperatures are dropping. This phenomenon triggers a reduction in activity in the pituitary gland which, in turn, stops production of testosterone. To make a long story short, the resulting effect is the weakening of the bond between the antler and the pedicle on the skull. This causes the deer to shed his antlers—that is with a slight jar. The shedding time for each antler can be from minutes to several hours of each other.

Because the antlers are jarred loose, if you are doing some late-season scouting, check around fence crossings and the entrances into thickets. Bedding areas are great areas to scout as well since many deer spend much time there in late winter conserving energy. And that has especially been so this year with the cold weather Mississippi has been experiencing.

If you are lucky enough to find one antler shed, look in the area for its mate. It shouldn't be too far away.

Finally, there are great personal rewards in finding a set of sheds in your post-season scouting trips and then taking the deer during the next deer season. If you compare the intact antlers with the sheds that were found the previous year and they are similar, there is a good chance that the sheds were his. Pre-season scouting can't give one that extreme satisfaction that can last a lifetime.

Does Election Disregard The Will Of Man?

This particular part of election has been a bone of contention for centuries. It has caused much paper and ink to be used on both sides of the argument. Some people have been so bold as to say that if anyone were born to go to hell, then he has to go there, or if he were born to go to heaven, then he has to go there. I doubt that God has made mankind so robotic that he has absolutely no choice in the matter of salvation. I have given John 5:40 in another article on our subject, but it bears repeating here: "And ye will not come to Me, that ye might have life." This verse teaches, at least, that man can refuse to come to Jesus for salvation. It seems strange to me that men could refuse to come to Christ, if they cannot also choose to come to Him. After all, if there is no possibility of men coming to Christ through an act of their wills, then it is really no choice at all, for there have to be two possibilities for any choice to be involved! Now let's take a look at God's will concerning election from II Peter 3:9: "The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." I realize that some people think that this verse is saying that God is being longsuffering toward the elect; that He is not willing that any of the elect should perish, but that all of the elect should come to repentance. This idea does not seem to fit, however, with Acts 17:30: "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." This verse clearly states that God commands every person in every place to repent.

I understand that nobody would ever repent, apart from the drawing of the Holy Spirit. I also understand the command Jesus gave directly to the eleven apostles in Luke 24:47: "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." Why would Jesus want repentance and forgiveness of sins to be preached in every nation, if some cannot possibly repent and believe?

I Timothy 2:3-4 is interesting concerning our subject: "For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour; Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth." If God's will is that all men be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth, then it seems to me that the only thing holding some men back from being saved is their own human wills! I Timothy 4:10 says, "For therefore we both labor and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, Who is the Savior of all men, specially of those that believe." This seems to me to be saying that God is "potentially" the Savior of all men, but "practically" only those who believe really are saved. Since God has forever known everything, why could it not be true that He elected those who would choose to know Him? I know some preachers say that this would be a "work" on the part of man, and we are not saved by works, but faith is not counted as a work in Romans 4:5: "But to him that worketh not, but believeth on Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness." So, God Himself does not call the exercise of our faith a "work"!
