New Precincts

Some precincts have been consolidated and old precincts have been closed. The West Burnsville Precinct formerly located in the old Burnsville Volunteer Fire Department Building has been closed. This precinct has been consolidated with the Burnsville Precinct. Voters in the Burnsville Precinct will vote at the Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce Building located at 322 Hwy 72, Burnsville.

The West Iuka Precinct formerly located in the basement of the Tishomingo County Courthouse has been closed. This precinct has been

consolidated with the East Iuka Precinct. Voters in the East Iuka Precinct will vote at the National Guard Armory located at 901 East Quitman St., Iuka.

The Tishomingo Precinct formerly located next door to the BancorpSouth Bank in Tishomingo and the West Tishomingo Precinct formerly located in the Tishomingo City Hall have been consolidated and both of these old precincts have been closed. The new Tishomingo Precinct will be located at the new Tishomingo Community Center located at 1267 Main Street, Tishomingo.

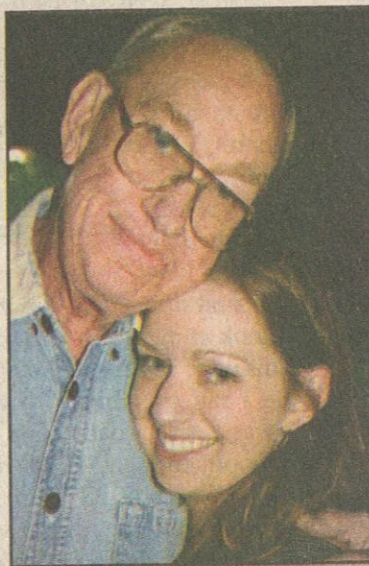

Former Iuka Businessman Danny McBride Dead after Short Illness

Granville (Danny) Ray McBride passed away May 23, 2014, after a short, but brave fight with cancer, at the age of 64. He is survived by his "better half" of nearly 42 years, Bennie Holtsford McBride; his "pride and joy" Lily McBride Osborn, and his "more than a son-in-law" Josh Osborn. He is also survived by his sisters, "Those McBride Girls," Sandra McBride and Lynn West of Iuka, as well as numerous nieces and nephews, two wiener dogs and two grand dogs. He is preceded in death by his parents, "Mr. Mac" and "Miss Grace" McBride; and his sister, Naomi Dale Flurry.

Danny was a hard worker who enjoyed working with the public and making his community a little more beautiful at McBride's Grocery and Bait Shop, McBride's Garden Center, and most recently at the Cherokee Piggy Wiggly/Ace Hardware. Throughout his years he reared many young men and women in his employ, passing on wisdom, life lessons and maybe a few pranks over the years. He enjoyed keeping up with them after they moved on and was so proud of all their accomplishments. Danny loved to get out and see all that nature had to offer when it burst into color in the Spring, Summer, and Fall. But not the winter, he hated the cold with a passion. Danny was a joyful storyteller and always had one on hand to share with whomever he was talking to. Be it a current news story, an anecdote from his life, or a joke, he often had to stop to wipe tears of laughter before finishing his tale. He always said he was named Granville for his daddy, and called Danny for his Uncle Bob. In other words, he was a character who will be greatly missed.

A Celebration of Danny's life for his family and friends will be held Thursday, May 29, 2014, beginning at 4 pm at Jaybird Park, in downtown Iuka. 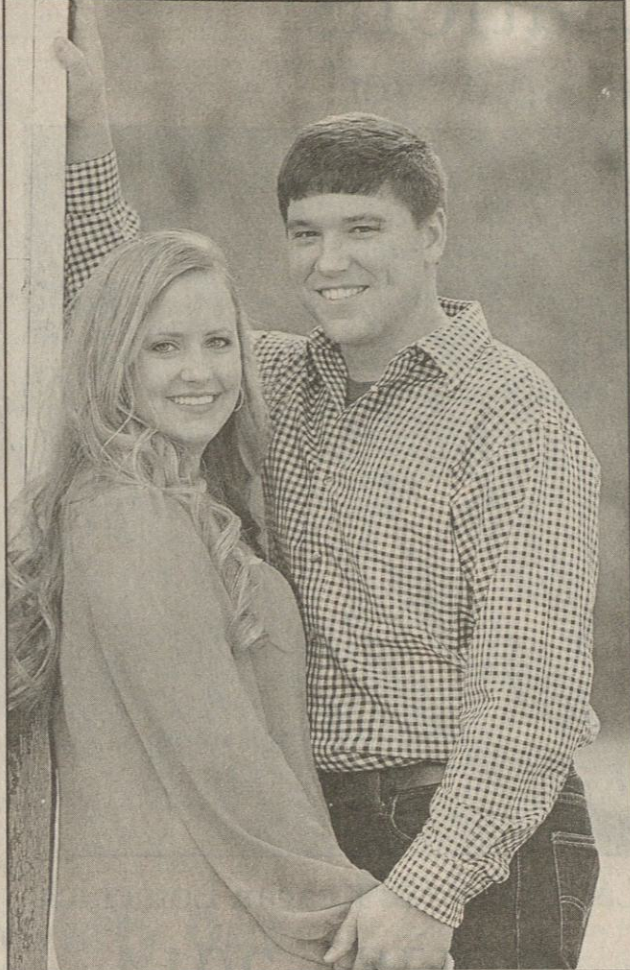

pursuing her Doctor of Pharmacy Degree.

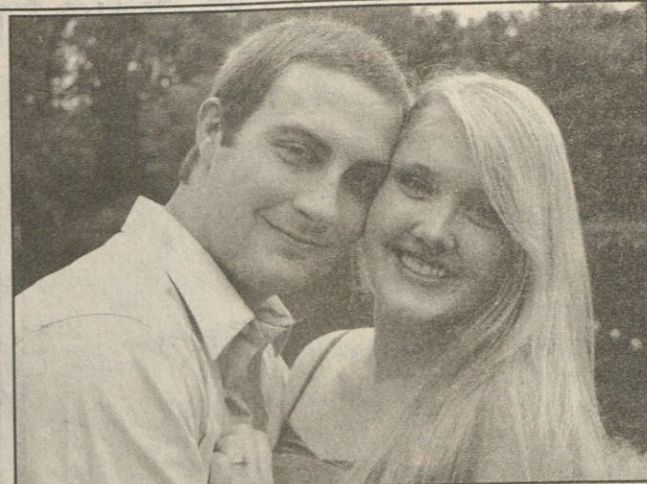

The Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society is randomly honoring individuals who helped build or sustain one of Tishomingo County's beautiful and treasured historic places by providing readable information near their final resting place. Take a walk through one of our local cemeteries and reflect on the life and work of these and other individuals:

Michael D. Lambert was the owner/manager and president of J. C. Lambert Hardware and Building Supply Co., Inc. in Burnsville.

He was a former mayor of Burnsville, serving from 1973-1977, and was currently serving on the Board of Aldermen when he died in 1990. Mr. Lambert was a member of the Burnsville District Development Association and the Burnsville Volunteer Fire Department. He was chairman of the Environmental Protection Agency of Tishomingo County. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a charter member of the Burnsville Lions Club and a past member of the Burnsville Jaycees. Lambert is buried in the Antioch Cemetery.

Dot Marlar, died in 1990 at the age of 93. She was the widow of John A. Marlar, a member of the Burnsville Methodist Church, a charter member of the Burnsville Eastern Star and a former Burnsville Alderman for 16 years. Marlar is buried in the Antioch Cemetery.

J. Paul Ford, aged 45 years, died at his home on Highway No. 72 near Burnsville, Monday, October 7, 1940, after an illness extending over many years. Hundreds of people packed the

auditorium of the Burnsville Methodist Church Tuesday afternoon, October 8th, 1940, to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of J. Paul Ford. He died on October 7, 1940. People from Alcorn, Tippah, Colbert, and Tishomingo Counties were in attendance to the last rites of a man who was loved by all who came in contact with him. Although a perfect invalid for many years, he worked with a smile for everyone. He worked on many claims for World War veterans and hardly ever failed on any of them. He was at one time Chancery Court Clerk of Tishomingo County. Ford is buried in the Chapel Hill Cemetery.

Howard William McLeskey, 77, died Wednesday, December 19, 1990, at the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth. He was a member of the Burnsville Baptist Church. He was a retired rural mail carrier with 34 years of service, and a member of the NARFE and the National Letter Carrier's Association. He was a disabled World War II Vet-

eran and a member of the American Legion. He was a former employee of TVA. Burial was in the Little Flock Cemetery.

Was sorry to hear of the death of Uncle George Marlar, one of the oldest citizens in the county. He was buried at Mulberry graveyard, 3 1/2 miles north of Burnsville, by the Masonic Fraternity. Source: The Iuka Vidette (Iuka, Miss.), February 4, 1909. "IN MEMORY OF G. W. MARLAR" Whereas it has pleased the Supreme Grand Master to call our worthy brother from labor to eternal refreshment. Resolved that in the death of Bro. Marlar the lodge has lost a faithful member, the county a good and law-abiding citizen, the community a good neighbor, the children a kind, and loving father. Bro. Marlar came to Tishomingo Co., in the year of 1817, being then about eight years old. He served the county 12 years as bailiff and 12 years as member of the board of police. He joined the Masonic order in 1849 and lived as a faithful

member until his death. He was 96 years old as near as can be ascertained.

Buster Tucker was just plain "Buster" to most, an ageless, unscrubbed, slope-shouldered man who sat for hours on the fertilizer sacks outside Fred's or wandered about town swinging his crutches, a fly swatter in his back pocket. He was a fixture, as much a part of the tranquil Iuka Scene as the World Famous Mineral Springs Park, or the Baptist Church, or the sky above. Few in town knew his real name was Floyd, or that he was age 73 when he died. He is buried in the Camp Ground Cemetery.

Farlar Belue was born on March 9, 1873, in Tishomingo County. He farmed and saw milled most of his life. Many Iuka residents remember Mr. Belue caring for the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse. Although Mr. Belue did not begin his duties there until retirement age, he continued there until an injury required his final retirement. Mr. Belue had three children. Alver Belue,

his middle child, served as mayor from 1961. Mr. Belue died at the age of 105, and was Tishomingo County's oldest county resident, on Tuesday, September 27, 1988.

Sam W. Ford, 82, died Monday evening, September 1937, at 6:15 p.m. He had been in failing health some time. He was buried in Shady Grove Cemetery east of Iuka, Monday, noon at 3:00. He was the oldest and best citizens of the town. August 26th, 1867. He was respected by white and alike. He had worked for Vidette for about 40 years and was always a good and trustworthy employee. He was well known to every woman and man in the county. Old Man Sam was familiarly known by many ways on the right side of the question, politically and otherwise, and was capable of willing as far as he was able to do his part at any time.

A Slice of Life

The year 2014 has brought many unexpected occurrences. My husband had been scheduled for what we believed would be a routine repair to his heart valve. It would be a simple matter for the super surgeon to conduct the necessary correction. This doctor had performed miracles in our past so we went about life as if we expected to be in and out of the hospital in a matter of a few days. We took a trip to Nashville making a party of 10 in late December. The mini-vacation was a tremendous success. We returned home elated that we had enjoyed every minute of our holiday season. The story should end here. The operation was performed on January 6th only the expected happy ending did not occur. My husband died January 16, 2014. He lives in my heart.

Either on January 16, or early January 17, I was taken from home by ambulance to NMMC. I do not remember this or a lot of other things that happened during the next few days. I had pneumonia and was dehydrated. I had spent 10 days in Memphis worrying about my husband, not eating or taking in fluids as I should have. On January 16, I drove home from Memphis stopping several times along the way to roll down the windows because I thought I was falling asleep. I don't remember getting home. In fact, I don't recall anything until I awoke in NMMC, Iuka. I gathered what happened from relatives.

I spent 22 days in the Iuka hospital. When I was released, I walked with a walker and seemed to be on the road to recovery having completed the swing-bed rehabilitation successful. I was delighted to be home. I came home on Friday, on Tuesday I was back, by ambulance, at the NMMC, Iuka. That same day, I was transferred by ambulance to NMMC, Tupelo, so I could be evaluated by a Neurosurgeon. This doctor had previously implanted a metal apparatus in my back successfully eliminating pain from my feet and legs to my great surprise. I trusted his opinion. Dye was pumped through my veins, then photos were taken to see what might be causing the excruciating pain and total inability to move my right leg. A brain scan was performed. Mega doses of antibiotics were administered. After eight days of probing for a cause of this unlikely event, I was transferred to Tishomingo Community Living Center Rehabilitation Center where I would spend 58 long days.

Sure we all have problems in this life. Many so severe that they leave us reeling. I tried to keep in mind this bible verse, "A righteous man may have many troubles, but the

LORD delivers him from them all." Psalm 34:19. I hoped this applied to me.

I learned many things I had never even taken into account while I was confined for those 88 days. I related some of my new insights to my sister, telling her what I had learned by having these setbacks. I now know how very hard those employed in the medical facilities work. Often their shifts are extended. They hit the ground running and it never lets up for their entire shift. Many of the better nurses and staff members go way beyond what could ever be in a job description. There are also more people in the background than I ever realized.

The rehabilitation workers, small in number but huge in results, were amazing. They are dedicated and do get results. At the Rehab Center I could not move my right leg or lift my foot off the floor among a myriad of other problems. Some days I hated all these experts because the treatments hurt. I especially didn't like when someone would say, "No pain. No gain." But they were adamant. Now, I am on my way to being whole again. Perhaps not as good as new but certainly, with the continued cooperation of Home Health professionals, on my way to being functional. I'm so pleased to have had the opportunity to know all of these wonderful people.

Also, I am gratified to have friends and family who took care of my needs and then home front. People visited, others sent cards. Some brought gifts. A few visited that I did not know well but they showed concern and offered assistance. The pastor came and prayed several times. Other patients visited as I got stronger. Other people put me on prayer lists. So many were helpful that it is difficult to recall everyone.

I continue to pay for those who continue to help me at home. Maybe someday Medicare will pay for this type of assistance. If it is available now, I am not aware

of it. I do not need hospice, but someone to do some chores. I'm paying for this now but it is not something I can continue. The people who help are people I've known for years.

As is written in the Bible, Isaiah 41:10, "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." I often feared, was scared and dismayed but always, he was there with me.

The Bible In Miniature (Part VII)

Have you ever heard someone say, "My occupation is Christian ministry?" Actually, I have made that my occupation for over 52 years, but there is a bit of a misnomer in that term, for God has given every Christian a place in "the ministry". No, that does not mean that all are to be pulpit preachers, but it does mean that all of God's people do have a place to fit, so that they can carry out their God-given role in the ministry. II Corinthians 5:17-18 will state what I mean here: "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold all things are become new. And all things are of God, Who hath reconciled us to Himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation." All who are in Christ have had the ministry of reconciliation given to them! In one sense, the church might be looked upon as a big puzzle: each piece has its particular place to fit; it cannot be forced into someone else's place, and the picture is not complete, until every piece is in its proper place! It is not really much wonder that the world is not "getting the picture", because so many Christians are not "fitting into their proper places" in the picture puzzle! Sometimes we may want places that we could never fill, even if we were "forced" into those positions.

Romans 12:6-8 says, "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith; Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering: or he that teacheth, on teaching; or he that exhorteth on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity; he that ruleth, with diligence; he that sheweth mercy, with cheerfulness." Some of what is covered in these verses cannot be covered in this article, but I will begin. First, we see that we have gifts that differ one from another. Although there may be thousands of Christians who have the same gifts, not all of us have the same ones as all others. It seems likely that in a local assembly God will give the gifts needed to carry on the ministry of that local body. If someone gets "out of joint" by trying to exercise someone else's gift, things become jumbled up and people get hurt. There are always people who suppose that they have gifts that they really do not have, and there are those who may think they do not have a certain gift, when others see that they do have it. I believe that God will help us to recognize our gifts, if we submit to Him in sincerity. Nobody, and I do mean nobody, has any reason to be proud of himself because of the gift God has given him. We are to minister in the place God has given us in humility and reverence to God Who has given us the tools we need to serve Him!

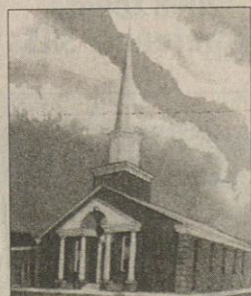

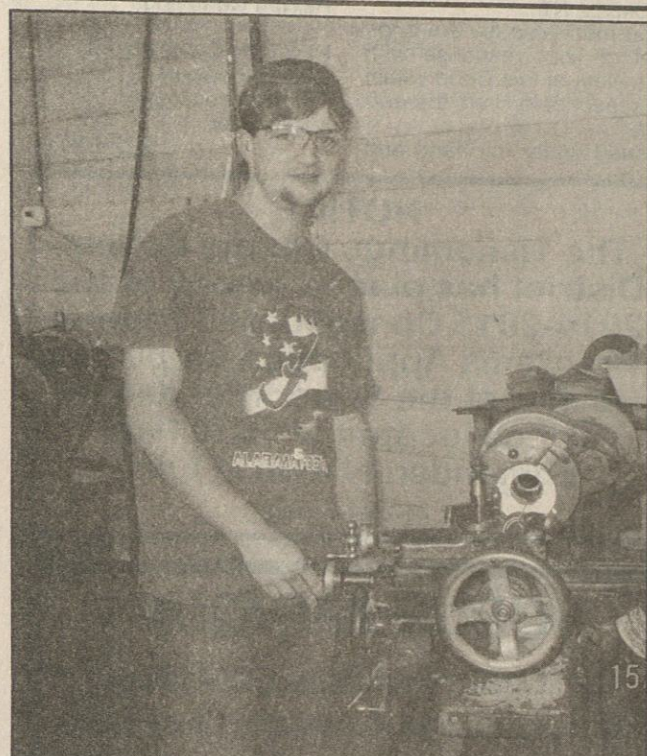

Conservation Corner

The Largemouth Bass by James L. Cummins

The largemouth bass is one of the most sought-after game fish in Mississippi. Each year thousands of anglers take to the water with hopes of catching that once-in-a-lifetime bass.

The largemouth bass is the largest of the basses, known as black bass. Black bass are members of the sunfish family but differ from other sunfish because of their longer, more streamlined body. Other black bass which are native to Mississippi's waters include smallmouth bass and spotted bass. Largemouth bass get their name from their large mouth in which the upper jaw reaches far beyond the rear margins of the eye.

Adult largemouth average 10 to 20 inches in length and weigh between 0.50 and 4.50 pounds. Bass in excess of 8.0 pounds are not uncommon. Bass in deep Southern waters may live to be 10 years of age and therefore have the ability to gain more weight.

Largemouth bass are a dark-greenish color along their back and across the upper side of their body. The mid-side has a broad, blackish strip and below the lateral line the color is gradually lighter and turns to white along the belly and underside. The tail fin in young bass exhibits a bicolor arrangement with the rear part of the fin being much darker than the basal part.

The largemouth is tolerant to various conditions, but is more commonly suited to waters with no current. Studies show that largemouth prefer a temperature range of 77 to 86 degrees F.

Largemouth bass are commonly found around underwater structure (logs, brush piles and artificial structures). They are predators and use this underwater structure as cover which enables them to move quickly on prey. Largemouth can be found cruising in the shallows and feeding during low light. Major food sources for adult largemouth bass are crayfish, large insects, frogs and shad. Young bass feed on small insects.

Bass begin spawning when the water temperature reaches the mid 60s. Males will choose nest

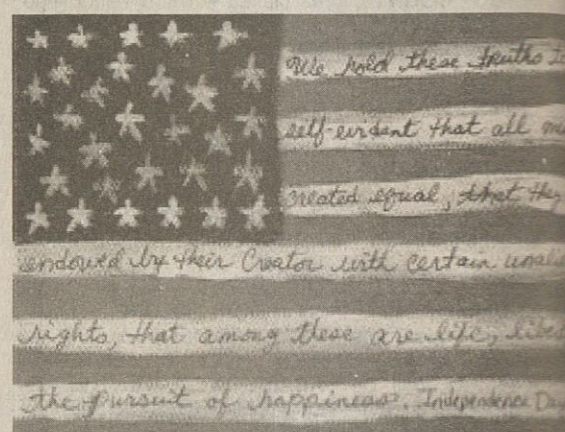
sites in 1 to 4 feet of water. The female will lay her eggs in one or several nest sites. A female will generally drop between 2,000 and 7,000 eggs. Exhausted from laying eggs, the female will retreat to deeper water to recover for a period of 2 to 3 weeks while the male stays behind to guard the nest. The male will attack any intruder and will constantly fan the nest keeping the eggs free of silt and debris. The eggs generally hatch within 3 to 5 days depending on the water temperature.

Hatchlings, called fry, will quickly form schools and move to the nearest cover available to search for food and hide from predators. Of the 2,000 to 7,000 eggs laid, only 5 to 10 of these fish will survive to reach a length of 10 inches.
