

Byrom Case Coming to County After Supreme Court Refuses to Say Why They Are Overturning Trial Decision

Tishomingo County is a little closer to becoming home again for convicted murderer Michelle Byrom after the state supreme court last week refused to say why they are granting her a new trial in the county for the 1999 death of her husband Edward Byrom, Sr.

After 14 years on death row, and a flurry of media publicity about the admittedly odd trial that convicted her in a "murder-for-hire" scheme the Mississippi State Supreme Court ordered a new trial for Byrom March 31st.

Prosecutors scrambling to prepare for a new trial for her in Tishomingo County are reviewing evidence and statements from the 2000 murder trial. But the Court's *en banc* order, signed by Justice Josiah Coleman, stipulated only that a new judge be assigned to the case, and didn't identify why they were calling for a new trial. The attorney general's office asked weeks ago for the court to provide some direction for the new prosecution effort by saying why it threw out the verdict that it twice previously upheld. Last week, the State court said... no.

The State Supreme Court has denied the attorney general's demand for an opinion explaining reasons why the Byrom case has been remanded for trial, explained Assistant District Attorney Richard Bowen, who has been interviewing witnesses and participants from the 2000

Tishomingo County trial.

"With four judges and seven counties with limited court times, I expect no court date until next year," said Bowen.

Circuit Court Judge Thomas Gardner has responded to the supreme court's order by transferring the case to Judge Paul Funderburk, who is expected to set a hearing date to determine Byrom's defense attorney status.

So now, the Mississippi Department of Corrections is awaiting a mandate, or directive, to move Michelle Byrom from the Rankin County facility where she has been on death row, to Tishomingo County for housing while she awaits trial. Tishomingo County will be footing the bill for a trial that has attracted national attention. The jail will have to house and support an inmate who is reportedly on medication for a variety of ailments. Costs for a trial of this consequence could be a significant impact on a county with a budget the size of Tishomingo County's.

Why Now?

Following the February Supreme Court decision denying an appeal, Mississippi State Attorney General Jim Hood requested the state court to set an execution date, and attorneys acting for Byrom started filing motions regarding the execution drugs, and publicizing the more odd aspects of her murder trial back in 2000.

In the weeks leading up to

the proposed execution date, Byrom and her attorneys launched a press campaign claiming evidence exists that Byrom, Jr. confessed to committing the murder to a forensic psychologist, and that the testimony of that psychologist was not heard by jury at her trial. Media outlets from the Jackson Free Press to CNN have been carrying stories telling of the trial and pending death sentence.

In the 2000 trial, her attorneys, trying their first capital case, did not call the psychologist to testify, believing that testimony would be more useful during an appeal. They also apparently had Michelle Byrom waive her right to have a jury decide her sentence, leaving the decision to just Tishomingo County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Gardner. Presented with a murder-for-hire scheme described by the prosecution, and with little else to go on, Gardner imposed the death sentence.

In a second appeal to the Mississippi State Supreme Court in 2006 where the court denied her a new trial in a 5-3 decision, the dissenting opinion of Justice Jess H. Dickinson stated, "I have imagined to conjure up in my imagination a more egregious case of ineffective assistance of counsel during the sentencing phase of a capital case, and I cannot."

Also mentioned in the recent media campaign are letters written by Byrom, Jr. in which he

indicated his participation in the crime. Junior testified against his mother during the trial as part of a plea bargain. He later pled guilty to several charges in the murder-for-hire scheme, in-

cluding conspiracy to commit murder. Gardner sentenced him to 50 years in prison, with 20 years suspended. He's out now, and living in Tupelo.

Discovery Channel Show Depicts Byrom Case in Fantasy Version of Iuka

(Editor's Note: the writer doesn't have television, specifically to avoid this kind of programming.)

Last Summer, a crew from Investigation Discovery channel show "Blood Relatives" came to Iuka, presumably to interview and shoot footage for their show on the Edward Byrom, Sr. murder in 1999, but according to everyone local who has seen it, it's a laughable depiction of the facts, and folks are wondering where they filmed the shots of "Iuka."

The show is set to air again this Thursday night, June 19th on the ID channel, and the "investigation" the show producers did was shortly before Michelle Byrom and her lawyers stirred up a storm of publicity in response to the state attorney general requesting an execution date be set for the convicted murderer who had been on death row for 14 years. Possibly as a result of the maelstrom of publicity about the admittedly odd conviction, Byrom was granted a new trial by the Mississippi State Supreme Court, who provided very little reason for their decision.

On the internet, the ID listing for "Blood Relatives" describes its Kiss Kiss Bang Bang

episode as follows:

The Byrom family of Iuka, Mississippi, seem to have it all: love, success, and plenty of Southern charm. But they also have some very dark secrets. And soon, a penchant for sordid sex and a passion for poison will result in murder.

The episode reportedly depicted a two story, tile-roofed home where Eddie Byrom, Sr. spent time in a "sex-dungeon/man cave." The style of the home in the show indicated something from California or Florida, since the producers presumably couldn't find something suitably dramatic in actual Iuka, Mississippi. It also said that the home remains unoccupied after its reportedly sordid history.

In fact, the home was reportedly purchased by the current owners more than six years ago, and they have remodeled it into a well-landscaped, inviting home instead of the party house people remember from the late 1990s, when Michelle Byrom permitted some reportedly notorious parties for young people who were peers

TCHGS Wins Preservation Awards

Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society (TCHGS) was among 40 individuals, organizations, and state and local governmental agencies which were honored at the Mississippi Heritage Trust annual meeting in Tupelo.

The "Listen Up MS" preservation conference got underway Monday, June 9th at the Lyric Theater and Goodlett Manor in Tupelo. The conference featured speakers with a passion for preservation who engaged the participants in a lively discussion about Mississippi's rich architectural legacy and strategies to preserve it. After a full day of learning and debate, the group kicked off at the J. J. Rogers Building at the first ever Pecha Kucha event.

After convening on Tuesday, June 10th to discuss the results of the Make It Work case study, amazing preservation victories that are happening around the state were celebrated at the Heritage Award Luncheon.

Tishomingo County was

honored with awards in two separate categories.

The Stewardship of Historic Sites award was for the Society's outstanding achievements in preserving and overseeing the county-owned Old Tishomingo County Courthouse, and school-owned Midway School Museum, and Burnsville One-Room School Museum.

The 2014 Heritage Award for Distinguished Service was given for TCHGS President Cindy Nelson's personal contributions in preservation, management and interpretation of these historic sites.

The Work of the TCHGS

Many people know that TCHGS is located at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse located at 203 East Quitman Street in Iuka but may not be aware of its history. Founded in 1996, TCHGS has published several books including Tishomingo County, Mississippi Cemeteries; Tishomingo County, Mississippi Histories & Families; Tishomingo County, Mis-

issippi Pictorial History (all of which are now out of print); and Images of America: Tishomingo County. They have reprinted one county history book, Old Tishomingo County Territory and the reprint of a second book, A Place Called Belmont is planned for 2015. A book titled, The Diaries of Henry Little, who was killed in the Battle of Iuka, was created by Society members, Fielding Tyler and RaNae Vaughn.

Three county buildings, the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse, Midway School Museum, Burnsville One-Room Colored School Museum have been saved from destruction. A Civil War Confederate Monument has also been restored. A new Iuka historical home brochure was created and OnCell audio tour stops were placed in all parts of Tishomingo County. Several Mississippi historical markers have been planned for areas throughout the county when appropriate funds become available.

Cochran & McDaniel Face Off in Republican Senate Runoff Next Tuesday, June 24th

Circuit Clerk's Office to be Open Saturday for Absentee Voting

Tishomingo County Republicans will vote in a run-off primary election for U.S. Senate next Tuesday between incumbent Thad Cochran, and state senator Chris McDaniel.

Anyone who voted in the June 3rd REPUBLICAN primary can vote, as well as anyone who DID NOT VOTE on June 3rd. The only people who can't vote Tuesday are the approximately 522 persons who voted in the Democratic primary on June 3rd.

Donna Henry Dill, Circuit Clerk, announces that the circuit clerk's office will be open on Saturday, June 21st, 8 a.m. to

12 noon for absentee voting for anyone who will be unable to go to the polls on June 24th to vote in the Republican Primary Run-Off Election. This will be the last date to vote by absentee ballot in the clerk's office. All mailed absentee ballots must be received by 5 p.m. on Monday, June 23, in order to be eligible to be counted for the June 24 Election.

In a Primary Run-Off Election by state law, you are required to vote in the same party election that you voted in on June 3. There is no crossover voting for primary elections.

Any registered voter that did not vote in the June 3 Election will be eligible to vote provided you were registered on or before May 3, 2014.

Thad's Top Accomplishments in Tishomingo County Manufacturing Excellence:
Thad has supported Tishomingo County's

economic development. In 2012, Iuka was named one of the "ten southern markets that are manufacturing location no-brainers" by the Southern Business & Development. The magazine ranked Tishomingo County #5 in the nation for a successful track record for economic development projects through Carolina Carports, Contract Fabricators, Dennen Steel, Dynetics, Ershigs, G&G Steel, JAMCO, KX Technologies, Max Home, Roll Form Group, Skyline Steel, and Tiffin Motorhomes. Mississippi's Children Put At Risk By McDaniel's Plan

I am deeply concerned by media reports of U.S. senatorial candidate Chris McDaniel's support for abolishing the U.S. Department of Education and eliminating nearly \$800 million in federal funding from our Mississippi schools. I would rather not become a part of any political battle between candidates for office. However, the serious nature of these statements by state Sen. McDaniel leaves me no reasonable choice but to speak up on behalf of the students in our public schools.

As a former school district superintendent, I have been a lifelong proponent

of public education. I believe it offers the greatest opportunity for students to succeed in and as a result, improve the state's economy and our quality of life.

The nearly \$800 million federal funds Mississippi receives accounts for 10 percent of the state's overall education budget. From these funds, the state received more than \$117 million in Fiscal Year 2014 and is expected to receive \$122 million in Fiscal Year 2015 for special education services in school districts. Additionally, millions of dollars are used for all Title programs, School Improvement Funds, Professional Development, Child Nutrition and Career and Technical Education programs.

Can you imagine how devastating this would be for the children of state to not receive the money they need? In 2009, the state has short-changed MAEP more than \$1 billion, possible loss of nearly \$800 million would be a catastrophic impact on public education.

Federal law requires to provide the necessary services for students with special needs. The federal funds would be the state to generate the needed dollars to maintain the same level of services resulting in massive chaos in the state for the boys and girls in our public schools. I feel it is my duty to join me in standing for public education.

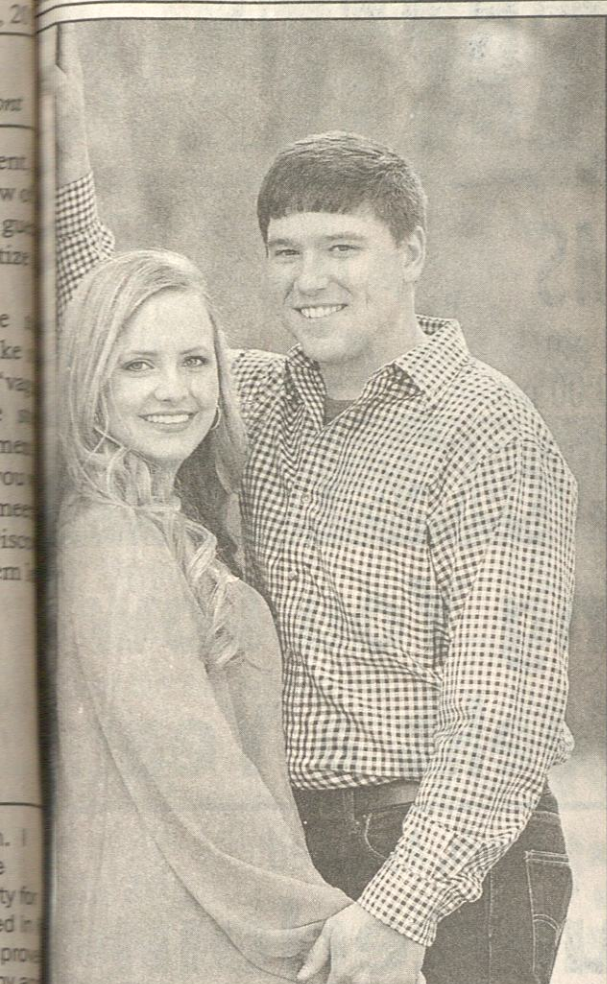

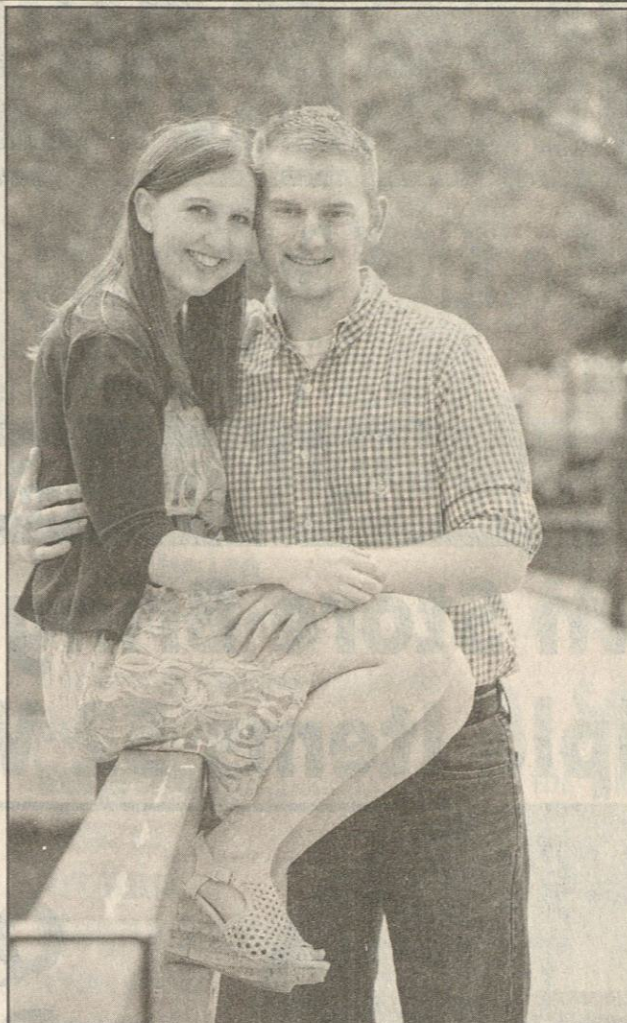
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Leyde-Osborn To Wed July 18th, 2014

Local Citizens Retire Old Glory with Honors

Just a simple piece of colored cloth, sewn together in a red, white, and blue design. A piece of cloth that of itself does nothing more than hang and blow in the wind. But to many thousands of people throughout our nation's glorious history, it has stood tall, standing as a monument of freedom, for all Americans. Men and women have given their lives for it, fought for it, cried for it, and revered it as a symbol for the greatest country on earth. Books, songs, and poems have been written for it, and our National Anthem was inspired by it. Each day our children are encouraged to pledge their allegiance to it, and whenever it is raised or passes over our hearts or salute it. We all share and the pride and patriotism we feel for our country.

But when the flag has served its usefulness and no longer is suitable to represent our country it must be retired and replaced. The United States Code simply states: "Soiled flags may be renovated by either washing or dry cleaning. Worn out flags should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably

by burning." The importance of this act, and the pride and emotions that it evokes make it a very powerful event that can serve as a reminder of our national pride and help instill the values brought forth in developing good citizenship in our youth. With this in mind, the retirement of our nation's flag then becomes a heavy responsibility that must be addressed with the proper respect and dignity it deserves.

Community leaders, volunteers, and local citizens gathered at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse on Saturday, June 14th at 11:00 a.m. to properly retire faded and torn flags with honor. Conducting the ceremony were LTC Christopher Davis, SSG Richard Taylor, Lori Davis, Ruben Grissom, Brandon Grissom, Jerry Charbausk, Dwight Wadkins, Braxton Davis, McKinley Davis, Kaylee Nash, Matthew Ward, Janice Switcher, and Helah Wilson, representing the U.S. Army Reserves, the Iuka Fire Department, Iuka National Guard, Boy Scout Troup 26, and the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society. Other local citizens from Boon-

eville, Mississippi; Nashville, Tennessee; Southern Mississippi; and Corinth, Mississippi were on hand to witness the historic event.

MP Commanding Officer of the TFCF, LTC Christopher C. Davis presented the Tishomingo County Archives & History Museum with a new flag to be placed on display in the Museum. The donated flag which was flown over the Theater Field Confinement Facility of Camp Arifjan, Kuwait on January 13, 2014 was presented to the Museum in Recognition of Outstanding Patriotism and Support. The Theater Field Confinement Facility is the only confinement facility serving the combat zones of Afghanistan, Iraq and Kuwait. The mission of the Theater Field Confinement Facility (TFCF) is to provide pre-trial confinement and post-trial incarceration for U.S. Military Prisoners and DOD Civilians sentenced up to 30 days of confinement. The other critical part of this mission involves safely escorting inmates with long-term prison sentences to the U.S. based facilities, such as Fort Leavenworth.

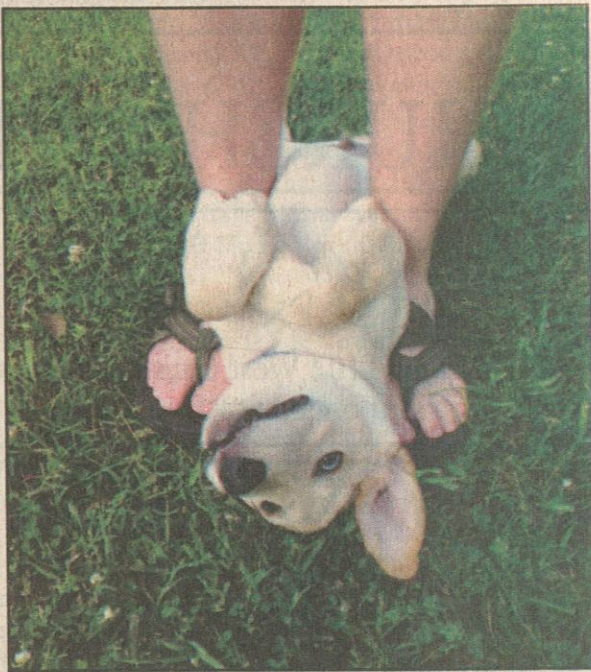


Iuka 20th Century Club Spring Social at The Place

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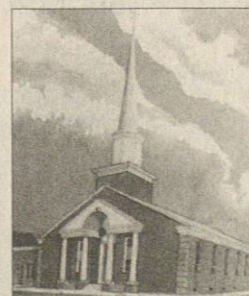

Mississippi Arts Commission's Whole Schools Summer Institute "Picturing Yourself in the Art of Common Core"

Jackson, Miss.—The Mississippi Arts Commission's 16th Annual Whole Schools Initiative Summer Institute will offer educators new and innovative ideas for classroom arts integration. This year's Institute will be held at the MSU Riley Center in Meridian, July 14 – 17, 2014, and will focus on "Picturing Yourself in the Art of Common Core."

Approximately 300 teachers, parents, artists, administrators and pre-service educators from more than 40 schools will gather in Meridian to learn about arts integration, which is a teaching strategy that allows students to create a deeper understanding of a subject while they are learning about an art form. The Institute's highly professional training will give educators from all backgrounds the inspiration, knowledge and art skills to lead students toward the goal of reaching their full academic potential.

"The Mississippi Whole Schools Initiative is striving to provide the very best in professional development for 21st century educators," stated Dr. Tom Pearson, Executive Director of the Mississippi Arts Commission. "We want participants to come away with a clear understanding of how to integrate the arts across the curriculum in their classrooms."

The Institute will begin on Monday, July 14th with a keynote presentation by Bruce D. Taylor on the arts in Common Core State Standards, as well as arts integration presentations by Kennedy Center teaching artists, Sean Layne and Melanie Layne. Parents will join in the fun on Tuesday, July 15th, for a day of introduction to the arts and arts integration. They will be given instruction on the vital role the arts play in continuing student learning outside the classroom. Parents from all over the state will join teachers, administrators and artists to engage in arts experiences, create arts integrated lesson plans, and network with artists from their

communities. The Institute provides a unique opportunity to learn how to teach critical thinking and problem solving through visual art, dance/movement, music and theatre/drama. Other special guest presenters include Kennedy Center teaching artists, Marcia Daft, Randy Barron, Stuart Stotts; Julie White, Sean Glazebrook, Limeul Eubanks from the Mississippi Department of Education, teaching artist, Althea Jerome, as well as board certified Mississippi teachers.

This summer, self-contained special education teachers and arts specialists will receive professional training in a track that will provide a hands-on opportunity to learn how to properly integrate the arts into the classroom to reach standards in both the student's goals and arts standards. Teaching artist and music therapist, Amy Hourigan will introduce assessment and documentation ideas based on Universal Design for Learning (UDL) that provide multiple approaches for gaining understanding of student growth. This program is provided through a partnership with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Early childhood care providers who work with four year olds and kindergartners will be treated to a two-day experience that connects early childhood curriculum with the arts. In this two-day session participants first explore rhythm and movement activities that establish one-to-one correspondence, counting, and cardinality. Next, educators learn drama-based activities that teach comparing, contrasting, and grouping by attribute. Then, participants will discover how to integrate creative movement with teaching spatial relationships and positional language. This experience is funded by the Mississippi Department of Education.

Since 1991, the Mississippi Arts Commission has provided grant funds, technical assistance and professional development opportunities to Missis-

issippi schools. It is the goal of the Commission to assist schools in the development and implementation of arts-based, interdisciplinary curriculum. The Institute was created years ago to offer comprehensive professional development opportunities for educators need to deliver effective arts-integrated instruction. In addition to the Institute training, participating Whole Schools receive up to \$5,000 a year in services which include professional development at on-site and off-site locations by state and national experts in arts integration. Schools that are new to the program are given opportunities to visit model schools; they are assigned a teacher advisor, and receive workshops in all four art disciplines. The longer schools participate in the program, the more professional development opportunities they will receive that meet the school's academic goals.

The Whole Schools Initiative program is open to pre-kindergarten through 8th grade students, and strives to engage everyone from principals to parents by helping them work toward integrating the arts into existing school curriculum in order to further prove the powerful role the arts play in engaged learning. 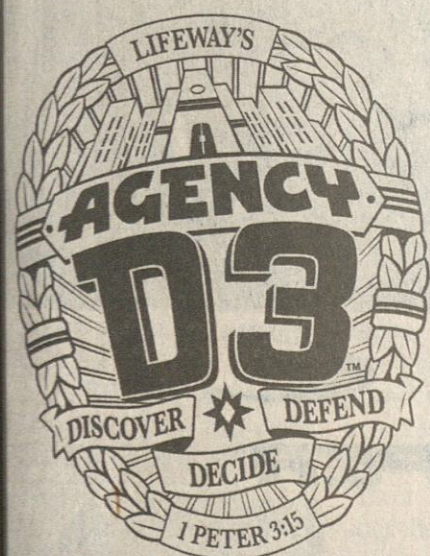

Wallace Accepted Into Rural Physicians Scholarship Program

JACKSON, Miss. - Katelin Wallace, a junior at the University of Mississippi and Iuka native, was recently selected to participate in the undergraduate portion of the Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship Program (MRPSP). Katelin is the daughter of Michael and Kathy Wallace of Tishomingo, MS.

Created in 2007, MRPSP identifies up to 20 college sophomores who demonstrate the necessary commitment and academic achievement to become competent, well-trained rural primary care physicians in our state. The program offers two years of undergraduate academic enrichment including MCAT (Medical College Admission Test) preparation and a clinical experience in a rural setting. Upon completion of all medical school admissions requirements, the student will be admitted to the University of Missis-

issippi School of Medicine through Direct Entry.

During medical school, each MRPSP scholar may receive \$30,000 per year based on available funding. Consistent legislative support of MRPSP translates to 50 medical students receiving a total of \$1,500,000 to support their education this fall. Additional benefits include personalized mentoring from practicing rural physicians and academic support.

Upon completion of medical training, MRPSP Scholars must enter a residency program in one of five primary care specialties: family medicine, general internal medicine, medicine-pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology or pediatrics. The MRPSP Scholar must provide four years of service in a clinic-based practice in an approved Mississippi community of 20,000 or fewer population located more

than 20 miles from a medically served area.

MRPSP provides a means for rural Mississippi students to earn a seat in medical school, receive MCAT preparation valued at \$2,000, earn a \$120,000 medical school scholarship in return for four years of service and learn the art of healing from practicing rural physicians.

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Leon Linton Delivers Commencement Address at Lawrence Technology University

Leon Linton, founder of Southern Systems Inc. (SSI) with facilities in Memphis and Ft. Smith, Ark., was honored to deliver the commencement address at his Alma Mater, Lawrence Technology University in Southfield (Detroit) Michigan recently. This was a great honor for the Tishomingo County native, who will follow such honorees as the Governor of Michigan, the inventor of the Bar Code, a Federal Judge, a Michigan Senator, and Lee Iacocca in addressing the LTU commencement classes.

Mr. Linton said, "The chairman of the board of trustees, Lloyd Reuss, past president of General Motors put the hood on me with Dr. Moudigil, LTU president helping and that in itself was a real thrill for me. It is very much of an honor to have your school give you their highest possible honor that a university can bestow on a person and of course I am so very proud of the Honorary Doctor of Engineering Degree awarded me, especially when my school has so many famous people they could have honored, instead of me."

Mr. Linton was born on a farmhouse on the Tennessee River, the son of Julius A. Linton and Levelah Laxon Linton. He was 12 when he moved with his family to Michigan in the late 1940's. At an early age he decided he wanted to be an engineer and build things, even

though he had no idea how he would pay for a college education. No one in his family had ever attended college.

During the summer between his junior and senior year of high school, Mr. Linton started a millwright craftsman trade apprenticeship and then during his senior year in high school, he worked nights at the Lincoln Mercury Assembly Plant in Wayne. He then worked in the millwright trade in construction and installation of conveyor systems, machinery, and automation equipment while attending evening classes at Lawrence Tech.

While still a student, in the six year evening division program at Lawrence Tech to earn a bachelor of science degree, he joined the engineering department at Mechanical Handling Systems and later, Jervis B. Webb Company, where he worked full time. At MHS and Webb he learned to make drawings; performed geometry and basic mathematical calculations; laying out conveyor header and support steel, a valuable talent he had honed from field installation experience; and assisting project engineers with installation issues.

His evening courses at LTU paid dividends quickly. His abilities expanded to more complex calculations and physics problems. Other courses were teaching him about different materials used in vari-

ous design applications. In this pre-computer era, all drawings were done by hand, and engineering problems were solved with a slide rule.

Mr. Linton praises his instructors. "These teachers took a real interest in helping me, and others, 'get through school.' Some professors would stay, even at the end of a late night class, to help me and others understand a particular problem. This dedication was especially meaningful to young, would-be engineers, as we all needed encouragement."

After completing his degree, he opened a one-man office for Webb in Memphis, where he did engineering sales in the region and continued to serve other Webb offices and facilities nation-wide.

A. Leon Linton founded Southern Systems, Inc. (SSI) in 1968 to design, manufacture, and install conveyor systems, automation equipment, and electrical controls on a turnkey basis. SSI has completed major projects from New York to California, quickly developing a niche market for heavy duty conveyor systems utilized by a diverse customer base that includes the manufacture and production of heavy trucks, construction equipment, military tanks, oil field pipe, aircraft, furniture, and appliances.

from small system modifications to multimillion-dollar green-field programs. SSI conveyors are used in the manufacture and processing of small products, weighing only several ounces, to unit loads of over 100,000 pounds, and almost every shape and size in between.

As manufacturing has shifted overseas, SSI, with two facilities in Memphis, Tennessee, and a branch in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, is moving into new areas of opportunity. It is now a general contractor in states from California to Florida and is one of only a few companies in the na-

tion capable of slipform continuous pour concrete construction of massive silos and related equipment associated with ethanol production, cement manufacturing, pet food processing, and coal handling and storage.

Mr. Linton is one of Lawrence Tech's most generous supporters. In 2008, the University's Department of Mechanical Engineering was named in his honor, reflecting his outstanding professional contributions and support. He is a member of LTU's Capital Campaign Steering Committee.
