The numbers indicate that Tishomingo County mucipalities have not experienced any significant increase sales tax income since last year this time, and numrs for the most recent month are generally down comred to last year.

According to data from the Mississippi Department Revenue website, aside from a 12-month peak in Iuka July, potentially from when legalized alcohol sales rted, levels of sales tax returned to the cities from the te have remained mostly the same throughout the rs are he frame me st 12 months.

operation Mississippi sales tax is 7 percent, which goes to the te. The municipalities receive back 18.5 percent of t 7 percent, or about a penny for every dollar of sales

> May of 2014 combined municipality sales tax for the cities in the county was down \$928, from May 2013 and in Iuka it was down \$1,103 for the same onth.

unty Gets No Sales Tax

Sales tax on merchandise sold in the county (outside limits) goes directly to the State General Fund. Sales in county retail and service outlets (outside of city nits) was up \$8,021 for May 2014 as compared to last r the same month, according to state Dept. of Reve reports. However, unless there is a special local and

from the state, explained Tishomingo County Chancery Clerk Peyton Cummings.

Instead, county revenue is from ad valorem taxes collected on land and personal property, and in lieu funds from payments TVA makes to the state, of which Tishomingo County receives 12.5 percent, according to Cummings. The TVA money makes up about 60 percent of what Tishomingo County gets from the state.


"County revenue is based on how many people in the county buy new cars, improve property, build homes, etc., explained Cummings, and housing starts have been down since 2009. They may be moving up this year,

private tax assigned, the county gets back no sales tax slowly, but they have a way to go before we return to 2007 levels," said Cummings.

TVA in lieu payments are down \$374,699.94 from last year, according to Cummings. In June of 2013, the county received \$1,359,406.14 and this June only \$984,706.20, stated Cummings. The total amount TVA paid to Tishomingo County in 2013 was \$2,819,343.

Last year the state received \$27,230,283 for the year from TVA, and this year, TVA is projecting to send the state \$19,741,941. One known reason is that TVA is making direct payments to Benton, Lowndes, and Desoto Counties for purchasing some power generating plants there, said Cummings.





This Weekend is luka's **19th Black Community** Homecoming

This weekend hundreds of Iuka natives and descendants will return to strengthen their ties or learn about family history in Iuka during the 2014 Iuka Black Homecoming planned for July 18-20 at the Johnson-Ford-Mitchell Community Center.

Each biannual event has a theme, and this year's theme is "Back Down Memory Lane."

A team comprised of six members of an organizing committee - Mary Britten, Natoria "Sha" Dilworth, Bridgette Houston, Lena Mitchell, Sabrina Mitchell and Cathy Pritchard has been working for months to assure everyone who attends has a fun experience. "I think having it every two years is a great idea because people have something to look forward to, seeing people they haven't seen in a while," Britten said. "Everybody doesn't come every time, but if they miss one they know they can come again. It's a good way for families and friends from Iuka to stay in touch." In addition to the central committee members, however, dozens of other people in the community work to bring all facets of the weekend together, and committee members receive lots of feedback from their extended family and friends as the date approaches. "Everybody is getting excited about it and looking very forward to it," Pritchard said. "They think it's going to be a good time and can't wait for it to get here." Iuka began celebrating the homecomings in 1976 in response to the U.S. Congress' call for communities around the nation to plan their own local celebrations of the nation's bicentennial.

Sabrina Mitchell reflects on her earliest memories of the homecomings: "When I was a little girl I enjoyed the idea of everybody coming home and enjoying the crowd. As I have gotten older and I have been working on the committee, I see what all it takes to make it happen and appreciate it more, to make sure that when everybody comes home that they enjoy themselves."

Anywhere from 300 to 600 people have participated in homecoming weekends through 38 years and 18 homecomings to date. The 1996 homecoming, and each homecoming since 2006, has been memorialized in a souvenir program book featuring messages and photos from families and businesses documenting their history in Iuka. "Homecoming has 'come back to life' over the last eight years and more people are cherishing their roots," Houston said. "I hope that it remains a successful and historical experience for many years to come."

Jones Signs with Northeast Basketball

Northeast Mississippi Community College has turned to an exceptional athlete from a local high school powerhouse to bolster its 2014-15 women's basketball recruiting class.

Natasha Jones became the newest member of the Lady Tiger hoops team when she signed her National Letter of Intent (NLI) with the ten-time Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges (MACJC) state championship program.

"We're very excited to add her into the fold," said Northeast head coach Brian Alexander. "It starts with character and Natasha is one of the best kids out there. We're happy to get her here because she already knows how to do a lot of the things that we're going to be teaching.


"I think she's able to take coaching and I think she's able to defend. From that, she's a good offensive player. She can handle it, shoot it, pass and she's a good team player. Most importantly, when things might go bad she handles adversity very well."

Jones hopes to follow in the footsteps of multiple Belmont products that found success as a Lady Tiger, including 1987 National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) All-American Sherry Slayton, 2013 MACJC All-State selection Angelia Allen and Anna Brooke Page, who was a 2014 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) All-American at Blue Mountain College.

"Northeast and Belmont, in my opinion, go hand-in-hand," Alexander said. "We want to make sure that line stays open and that we bring those fans back. We want all of Belmont to come over and support Natasha."

Jones was a three-year varsity letter winner for coach Chris Higginbottom and helped the Lady Cardinals claim the 2012 Mississippi High School Activities Association (MHSAA) Class 3A state title.

The 5-6 guard saw action in 30 games as a sophomore and scored in 24 matchups. Jones and her teammates celebrated at center court inside Missis-



sippi Coliseum after defeating league rival Ripley High School by one point in the championship tilt.

Two seasons later, Jones led Belmont back to Jackson with three victories in as many days against Louisville High School, Cleveland East Side High School and Booneville High School in the MHSAA Class 3A North Half Tournament.

Jones displayed her amazing potential in the 2014 MHSAA Class 3A State Tournament opener versus Hazlehurst High School by shooting 44 percent from the floor with 19 points, three rebounds, two assists and a pair of three-pointers.

She compiled solid statistics of seven points, five steals and four boards in the title matchup on March 14, but Jones and the Lady Cardinals fell to Booneville 56-51 and finished as the MHSAA Class 3A state runner-up.

Jones averaged 11 points, 2.7 rebounds, 2.4 assists and two steals per contest during a senior campaign in which Belmont totaled an outstanding 22-11 overall record.

"Northeast just seemed like the best choice," said Jones. "I've lived around here and watched the Lady Tigers play. The coaches

the prep level. She was named to the All-Division 1-3A, the All-Class 3A North Half Tournament and the All-Class 3A State Tournament teams.

In addition, Jones received Belmont's Best Defensive Player, Best Free Throw Percentage and Most Three-Pointers awards. She also claimed the 2014 Lady Cardinal Award for demonstrating the desired qualities and characteristics of an elite student-athlete.

"My first goal of course is to win a state championship," Jones said. "For my next goal, I want to increase my threepoint and free throw percentages."

In 96 career games at Belmont, Jones tallied 781 points and shot 38 percent from the field. She was 73 percent from the charity stripe with a 65 of 83 mark during her senior season.

Jones scored a careerhigh 28 points in her inaugural varsity outing as a freshman against Saltillo High School. She notched a personal best seven steals in a triumph over Bruce High School in February 2013

The annual Sales Tax Holiday begins 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 25, 2014, and ends at midnight Saturday. July 26, 2014.

The items exempt from sales tax during the Sales Tax Holiday are identical to those items exempt in prior years. Clothing and footwear items, meant to be worn next to the body and cost less than \$100 per item, are exempt from sales tax during this period. Accessories such as jewelry, handbags, wallets, watches, backpacks, and similar items do not qualify for the Sales Tax Holiday. Cleats and items worn in conjunction with an athletic or recreational activity are other sample items not eligible. School supplies and computers are not included.

University of North Alabama Alumni Association to Host Firekid for Handy Fest 2014



The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District will hold a public hearing on its proposed school district budget for fiscal year 2014-2015 on July 21, 2014, 5:00 p.m., at the Superintendent's office. At this meeting, a proposed ad valorem tax effort shall be considered.

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is now operating with projected total budget revenue of \$26,873,439. 21% or \$5,697,474, of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$28,152,427. Of that amount 22% or \$6,083,064, is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy.

For the next fiscal year, the proposed increase in ad valorem tax effort by Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District may result in an increase in the ad valorem tax millage rate. Ad valorem taxes are paid on homes, automobile tags, business fixtures and equipment, and rental real property.

Class of 1944 Honored at 66th Tishomingo Reunion

Seventy years ago, in 1940, thirty-nine "green freshmen" (as we were called) entered the halls of Tishomingo High School. We knew what was coming. The Belt Line - an initiation for the freshmen boys. The girls, if they got "too smart" had to wear an onion around their neck. I don't recall any of my classmates being subjected to this ordeal. We must have been a good group of girls.

The upperclassmen formed two lines with belts ready to warm the pants of the runners and run they did. The line extended from the southeast side of the gym, about the distance of the south end of the gym, over the coal pile. I remember my brother, George Robert Page, Jr., only got a few "light" taps. After the boys learned him, he got several "talleys".

Before we graduated, the "Belt Line" was outlawed. I suppose by the school board. Why? Belt buckles were used by a few (there's one in every crowd) and young boys

carried home deep bruises. Also, one year they were forced to run over or jump the coal pile. This ended the initiation.

Remembering about years gone by is always so refreshing. We, after seventy years, can still have the mind to remember back when and that's a God-given blessing. So many can't when they reach our age. If one of us messes up? The other two can patch it up. That way, we can still keep our tales straight.

In the spring of 1940, our Superintendent's son, Billy Nettles, Jr., received his diploma. The reason I'm getting personal about Billy? He had registered to be at the Alumni Banquet. In fact, the certificate for the oldest alumni present had been made. I watched the door for his appearance. He never showed up.

Margaret Underwood came to me and said, "Ruth, I believe you are the oldest alumni here". Surprised? No. That's why I had been watching the door. I always felt a sigh of relief when Billy and Ruby showed up. He

loved to talk of his life at THS as a Superintendent's son, and I loved for him to be the honoree as the oldest alumni present. Not that coming ninety bothers me. I have too much living to worry about that, but four score and ten? Kindley big.

We four members of the class of 1944, Christine, Jim, Carolyn, and I had a good visit on Friday evening as always at Christine's home. We didn't go over to the Homestead's in Iuka for dinner but enjoyed our meal at Christine's.

Reckon why? You guessed it. Those numbers have just kept piling up and we were completely satisfied to stay "put". Years have a way of telling tales we really don't want to admit. But we did this year.

During a war-torn world, we, the class of 1944 did survive. A few of our class members were injured, but no loss of life. Of the thirty-nine we still have seven living members: Lyman Hellums, Betsy Ross Deaton Tanner, Peggy Deaton Hoover, Stella Starkey Warhurst, Jim Vanos, Christine Deaton Morgan, and Ruth Page Dawson.

The honored class of 1944 received at the banquet certificates for the highest percentage present of the living members: Jim Vanos, Dublin, OH the certificate for longest miles traveled; Ruth, the certificate of being the "Youngest at Heart" present; and Bobby Walden a certificate for being the youngest graduate.

Tishomingo County businesses and friends always share great door prizes and this year was no exception. We always love for our name to be called. Yours truly received a rodand-reel. A great gift for a girl who loves to fish. I'll be sending Wal-Mart a 'thank you' for their generosity. I will put it to good use and enjoy the time. "Time". It's important to all, young and old. Enjoy it and use it wisely. See you in 2015, at the 67th Tishomingo Alumni Banquet on July 4th, 2015.







Bible Proofs Of Salvation (part II)

It has seemed to me for years that it would be a tormenting thing to live on earth without the knowledge of salvation through Jesus Christ. Please keep in mind that the Bible allows no substitutes for Jesus Christ as the only Savior. Without seeking to be offensive to anyone, I am compelled to say that salvation comes through no other source or person, except Jesus Christ (John 14:6; Acts 4;12). God made the way to heaven straight and narrow, but He also marked it clearly as being Jesus Christ Himself. I John 5:13, which I gave in the last article, says clearly that we can know that we have eternal life. II Peter 1:4 says, "Where-



by are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust." We do not become little Gods when we are saved, but we do become the children of God, for we receive the Holy Spirit, by Whose work of regeneration we become partakers of the divine nature, thus we become sons of God

A problem arises for the world of unbelievers, as they look at those who say they belong to God, because the world often cannot see any difference in professing believers than they see in the unsaved of the world. I John shows us several proofs that will

person looking at us, that we have distinguishing marks of salvation! The first Bible proof, or mark, of salvation is the proof of fellowship. sus Christ". Sharing with the Father and the Son by the presence of the Holy Spirit is one proof that we are saved. Those who say they are saved, yet have no desire to fellowship with God, are either still lost or terribly backslidden! It is the normal thing for saved people to desire fellowship with their Father and with their Older Brother, Jesus Christ (Hebrews 2:11-12)! Those who have never had this desire need to stop deceiving themselves into thinking that they belong to God, for they do not! A second fellowship is mentioned in I John 1:7, which shows that we also have fellowship with other believers, when we walk in the light. So, the two prongs of fellowship, with God and with other believers, is a proof of salvation! Absence of these two prongs of fellowship is a sign that something is not right in one's relation-



Southern Cornerstones A Brief History of Tishomingo State Park

The following brief history of Tishomingo State Park in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, was written by Patty Hester, a 9th grader at Belmont High School, in 1971 for a school project.

The history of Mississippi is filled with many legends of colorful pageantry and heroic deeds of the Chickasaw Nation. Visitors to the park get a glimpse of its exciting past as they stroll the landscape of massive rock formations and rock-filled crevices.

Saddleback Ridge, where legends say the great Chief Tishomingo rode his pony, rises between Haynes Lake and Bear Creek. Hikers enjoy the swinging bridge constructed by workers of the Works Project Administration; the bridge spans the creek while fishermen delight in the cool green waters below which have provided great sport for many centuries. The spirit of living and the delight in natural beauty that was first enjoyed by Chief Tishomingo and the Chickasaw Nation remain for everyone to enjoy who visits Tishomingo State Park. The Loochopola Lodge stands in the highest mountain-like peak in the 1,541-acre park and overlooks a bend in Bear Creek Wild plum thickets and lavender flowers lend colors to the stone steps which wind down from the back veranda to the distant road. The lodge accommodates up to 150 for dances and 125 for banquets. The park has six stone cottages and several rustic cabins that furnish an ideal chance for getting away from the rush and hurry of modern day life. All of the cabins contain spacious fireplaces to further enhance the spirit of relaxation.
