Resolution Headed to Legislature for 2-Cent Beer Tax

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors has passed a resolution to request a local-and-private bill of the Mississippi Legislature that would allow for the collection of a 2-cent tax on beer and light wine sales in the county.

Hounded by Charles "Stubby" Aldridge to make a request in recent meetings, including one where he referred to the "people running the county" as "idiots," the Board passed the resolution that would potentially result in funds being collected to be used "for the betterment" of the county.

The resolution calls for an advisory board to be formed to review and approve expenditure of any funds collected, and that the board be made up of one representative from each of the five supervisor districts in the county. It will meet quarterly to receive proposals and applications on how any funds are expended. It also calls for equal spending of funds across the five districts, and that funds are "specifically designated for the use, enjoyment, education and welfare of the youth of Tishomingo County and that the same be allowed to be expended or allocated to non-profits, not

for profits, and other groups who may provide services for the youth of Tishomingo County."

The resolution will go to the Legislature, where there is no guarantee it will pass in its current form. A few years ago, a similar request for a local-and-private tax at restaurants for the purpose of tourism promotion was reduced to only one cent by the Legislature, and then it didn't pass by the required three-fifths vote by county voters.

This tax proposal will also have to pass by a three-fifths vote of county voters, according to the resolution.

Manager Appeals Order to Vacate City-Condemned Former Sunset Lodge Hotel

The manager at the former Sunset Lodge appealed the city's recent order to vacate by last Friday at 5 p.m., so the few residents left at "the hotel" have a few more days to find new housing.

According to Fire Chief Brian Grissom, of the City of Iuka, Jackie Bunns, manager of the "hotel" that has evolved into a non-regulated homeless/low-income shelter, has appealed last week's order to vacate the 57-room facility on Heritage Drive in Iuka. City officials issued the order after an October 3rd inspection brought to full light a variety of life-threatening code and fire violations. There was also garbage and filth in many rooms that was apparently proving beyond the ability of management to keep clean. A court date is in November for violations of the innkeeper statute, that requires that persons running such an establishment abide by certain rules to house humans.

According to Grissom, an appeals board appointed by the city board of aldermen will hear the appeal next Tuesday evening

in a hearing at Iuka City Hall.

According to reports, only two families are still residing in the "hotel;" all the other residents have found a place to live. Some families have been sponsored by others or family members, with their rent paid at other locations for a month while they try to find a job and get a more permanent situation.

There has reportedly been a clean-up effort going on this week at the hotel, but no building permit has been issued to fix the major issues like moldy walls and non-functioning plumbing fixtures. A permit won't be issued until after the appeal and subsequent inspections, say officials.

Over the last couple years, what began as an effort to help people who had "no where else to go," has turned into a number of people taking up residence and not abiding by any rules or standards of cleanliness, and taking advantage of the management. Several families paid \$400 - \$600 rent monthly, say city officials.

cials – more than required at local subsidized housing units, but also without the rules and regulations required by government housing.

Many families were referred to the “hotel” by people in Corinth or Hardin County, Tennessee, say supporters of the effort to help. Current management has been in a process

of the facility becoming an official “homeless shelter” with rules of limited temporary residence, requirements to take parenting or hygiene classes, and mandatory drug testing, according to reports. A board of directors was to be in place to help Ms. Bunns run the facility.

Ms. Bunns had no comment for this story except,

“Tell all the people who read this that I’m praying for them.”

There have been two deaths by overdose at the “hotel,” in the past nine years, according to the Tishomingo County Coroner, and Iuka Police claim they are there several times a week on disturbance or drug calls. A few dozen children were

living at the “hotel” before last week’s actions, and a reportedly abandoned four-year-old girl was recently taken into Department of Human Services custody and placed with family members. Reportedly, other residents “just watched out for her,” and she wandered the facility at will with little supervision.

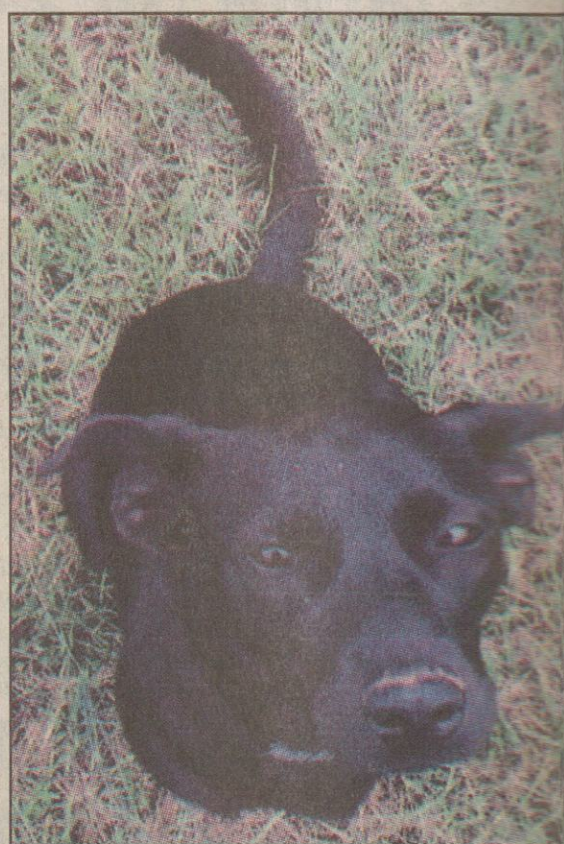

Law Enforcement Officers Honored by Iuka Rotary Club



All law enforcement officers, paramedics, 911 officials and first responders of Iuka and Tishomingo County were honored Monday night, October 13th, with a hamburger supper in the fellowship hall of Iuka Baptist Church. A planned outdoor cookout had to be canceled due to tornadoes and heavy rain. In addition to the general recognition, six special individuals with exceptional service were honored with letters of appreciation and plaques. These included Captain Brandon DeVore of the Iuka Fire Department, Deputy Sheriff Albert Duckett, Mr. Talmadge Powers of the Iuka Med Center Ambulance Service, Officer Darrell Bullard of the Tishomingo County Campus Police, Mrs. Jean Atkins of the Iuka Police Department, and Sergeant Randy Box of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Randy Box
Sgt. Randy is a 15 year veteran of the Mississippi Highway Patrol, currently working under Captain Moore. He is originally from Pontotoc, Mississippi, and has three children, Sidney and Stephanie. He is currently on "Motorcycle Team" and is an extremely hard worker for the people of northeast Mississippi. He works a lot of wrecks and issues citations as needed. As a measure of work that this outstanding patrolman has done, he has issued 88 citations this year alone removing the intoxicated individuals from our roads protecting our families and friends. He has been a member of the DUI-100 for the past 7 years. Randy Box is one that does not seek recognition. He is in the Force or out of the Force need someone to help them. Randy is always ready to assist. Recently, when a fellow State trooper's house burned in Iuka, Sgt. Randy was one of the first to help in to help by raising money. He and Capt. Moore brought the check to Iuka and now the fellow trooper has a new home. Randy has many deeds like his and his exemplary work and behavior that motivated his superior and the Rotary Club to select him for this honor.

Officer Darrell Bullard
Darrell is campus police officer who is stationed at the Tishomingo County High School Campus, who, among other things is to help protect adolescent students from terrorism and other dangers. Darrell lives in the northern part of the county and always goes above and beyond what is required of him. He has

excellent relations with the teachers and students and his supervisor says that he is always on time to do his work, doesn't complain, doesn't grip, and is very helpful to others, especially the teachers and students who need a helping hand. He always demonstrates a good attitude, the school kids all love him and the principal of the school said that he couldn't do without him. It is because of this history of exceptional performance and admirable attitude that Officer Bullard was selected by his superior and Iuka Rotary Club for this well deserved recognition.

Captain Brandon DeVore
Captain DeVore is a 10 year valuable employee of the Iuka Fire Department, having been employed full time since August 2004. Prior to this, Brandon did forestry work and helped fight and extinguish wild land forest fires in various states. He is married to Terina and has two children. According to Iuka Fire Chief Brian Grissom, Brandon has been an exceptional fireman, always ready to lend a helping hand and go above and beyond the call of duty when the situation demanded it. Even in the last few years when Brandon's immediate family had an almost insurmountable medical ordeal, Captain Brandon DeVore held strong and remained firm in his commitment to his family as well as the operation of the Iuka Fire Department. Just as he had been trained as a fireman to act under the extremes of a building ablaze, he was able to weather the unexpected trauma and he remained true and strong in his family duties as well as his service to his department

and the Town of Iuka. Because of his exceptional service, on behalf of the Iuka Rotary Club and Chief Grissom, Captain DeVore was awarded the honor of being declared an outstanding safety officer of Iuka and Tishomingo County.

Ms. Jean Atkins
Ms. Jean Atkins is the coveted dispatcher/secretary for the Iuka Police Department where she has worked for several years. Jean lives in Iuka and is the mother of Stephen and Mandy Adkins. Jean is the TAC officer for the department and coordinates with state and federal governmental officials to ensure all guidelines are followed. As one might imagine, at times this becomes an especially grueling and tedious task, having to deal with a myriad of governmental officials. In addition, Jean does all of the yearly reporting to the FBI on crime statistics and records and handles all case files including misdemeanors, felonies, accidents, warrants and arrest reports while at the same time answering the telephone, dispatching calls and maintaining the call log. Jean has other responsibilities also. She coordinates training for the dispatchers as well as the police officers, making sure that

they are maintaining their continuing education and is responsible for writing and securing several grants over the last few years for updating radio equipment. This year alone, Jean has acquired over \$25,000 in grants for radios for the Iuka Police department. But it is not just for this exceptional service that Chief Stringer and the Iuka Rotary Club selected Jean for the honor of being declared an outstanding safety officer of her community. It is also because she comes to work each day with a cheerful smile on her face and joy in her heart which she shares with each and everyone she meets.

Deputy Albert Duckett
Albert Duckett is an excellent family man and a great deputy sheriff. He was born and reared in Iuka, graduated from Tishomingo County High School and has worked in law enforcement for the past eight years, most of

which have been with the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department. Deputy Duckett started as a jailer, then became a reserve deputy, then a part time deputy, then a full time certified deputy, graduating from North Mississippi's Law Enforcement Training Center in Tupelo with high marks. He currently is a full time "patrol deputy." Sheriff Whitlock explained why Deputy Duckett was selected above all of the other deputies in the department. There are many deputies in the department who perform their jobs in a professional and efficient manner and provide excellent service in the field of law enforcement for Tishomingo County. "So what made Deputy Duckett stand out," he was asked. "In all his years and various jobs," Sheriff Whitlock explained, "he has received countless letters of commendations from the public for his professionalism, level head, and caring concern. He has shown a desire to help people out with any problem they may encounter. Compassion and understanding have been the hallmarks of his career." "Elaborate on that further," Sheriff Whitlock was urged as the reporter had never heard of a law enforcement official receiving so many spontaneous endorsements. "He stands out," the sheriff quickly replied. "He does a good job. He takes a strong interest in youth and their welfare, and he goes above and beyond the call of duty. Because of these reasons and the heartfelt endorsements of Sheriff Whitlock and others, Iuka Rotary Club recognized, commended, and honored Deputy Albert Duckett as an outstanding law enforcement officer of

Tishomingo County.

Talmadge Powers
Talmadge Powers began employment at Iuka Hospital in January, 1983 as an orderly. He was a large young man and strong enough to handle any of the patients. In addition, he had a cheerful, helpful attitude that endeared him to the doctors and nurses as well as the patients that needed his assistance. In 1995, Talmadge transferred to housekeeping where he also did a great job. But, being a "people person" it was not long before he was assisting the ambulance as a driver. In 2001 he was offered a full-time job in the ambulance service. Talmadge has been a tremendous asset to the Iuka Medical Center's Ambulance service. He is not a slackard, he shows up for every shift and does what is required of him, paying particular attention to the needs of his patients. It is not just his patients that he is concerned about but he also cares for other elderly people in his community. According to Jerry Cummings, who is the head of the ambulance service for Iuka Medical Center, the only time that Talmadge has ever gotten into trouble was when he checked in an hour early so that he could wash and clean the ambulances before they were used that shift. Now that is an enviable record that not many workers can claim! Because of his enviable work record and value to the community, Talmadge was selected by Mr. Cummings and the Iuka Rotary Club to be recognized as an outstanding safety officer.

CONSERVATION CORNER

Records Key to Successful Outing

by James L. Cummins

During the past several weeks, we have witnessed the warmer temperatures of summer change to fall-like temperatures. Since fall is in full swing, wildlife enthusiasts throughout Mississippi will be engaged in new activities...hiking, fall fishing and squirrel and deer hunting!

Mississippi's hikers, anglers and hunters are spending many hours in the woods and on the water this time of year. If you are one of them, you may want to consider keeping a logbook of your time spent outdoors. Some of the most productive anglers and hunters I know keep accurate and detailed records of their trips. I firmly believe that this record keeping is a big part of what makes them so successful.

Logbooks can be extremely helpful to you in the coming years. You will be able to look back through your book to examine successful trips to find out what made them so successful.

When beginning your logbook, enter as much data as possible about each outing. Many years from now, you may not be able to remember a certain hike or certain hunting or fishing trip, but if you have taken the time to record detailed information about that trip as it took place, you will have everything you need in black and white.

When compiling data from an outing, you will need to record all pertinent information about that outing. Things such as date, time, weather conditions, river stages,

areas where you saw wildlife and/or caught fish, areas where you did not see wildlife and/or catch fish, depths which were productive, baits and lures that were productive (including sizes, types and colors), species of fish which were caught and who you were fishing or hunting with. All of this information will be valuable in the future.

You should develop your own system of recording this data. A system that is personally tailored will serve you best. After all, if you cannot interpret what you have written, your records will be virtually useless to you.

Keep in mind that logbooks can be used for all sorts of outdoor activities. Squirrel and deer hunters would be well served by keeping a detailed log.

We have all hunted certain areas that, during certain times of the season, are more productive than others. Some of these areas you may have hunted for the first time and you want to make sure you will be able to find the area again in the future. Keep a record of it and you will!

Keeping a logbook of all your outdoor activities will enable you to be a more successful hunter, angler or wildlife viewer whether you are in the field or on the water.

Great Truths In Small Packages (part III)

Do you ever try to figure out what makes some people rejoice, or why some people rejoice, while others do not? The thing that made the Apostle John rejoice was that he found (verse 4) the children of the elect lady walking in truth, as God the Father has commanded us. The act of walking is a very interesting thing to me, since I have walked physically on a daily basis for many years. There are some things that walking physically has in common with walking spiritually. For the first thing, walking is far more than "taking a step in the right direction", which I hear people say quite often. Yes, it is good to take a step in the right direction, but there needs to be a continuity of steps, which constitutes "walking in truth". So, we have established that we need to "go on unto perfection", as is admonished in Hebrews 6:1. No, this does not mean that we will be sinless, or perfect in that sense, in this life, but it does mean that we can come to a more mature walk with God. Hebrews 6:1 actually says we should leave the principles of the doctrine of Christ and go on to perfection. This certainly does not mean that we abandon the fundamental principles of the doctrine of Christ, no more than it means one should tear down the foundation under his house, once the house is built! It means that we should not linger on foundational truths to the point of never learning anything else, which many people seem prone to do!

One of the things that I love about walking on the streets and byways of my town, as well as in other towns and country sides, is that I learn things as I walk; I observe my surroundings. This is also true of walking in the truth of God, for we are to continually learn more about God, His Word, His work and His people. If I may borrow a verse from III John (verse 4), we will learn about John's joy: "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth." John evidently is alluding to those whom he has won to Christ, which would include Gaius in III John, and perhaps the "elect lady and her children". The greatest heartbreak of the man of God is that many of his "children" do not walk in truth! It seems to me that perhaps most people who attend church fail to understand that the major purpose of the church preaching and teaching is to encourage church members to walk in truth. This is a far cry from the "entertainment platform" that many churches are following in our day. My dear Christian friends, if we do not get back to the doctrinal teachings of God's Book, we are going to have a generation of spiritual dwarfs leading the churches in a few years, if Jesus does not come back before their time of "leadership" comes! It amazes me that we can look at hundreds of years of history that are covered in Scripture which show how God's people are to make "truth" their main reason for public gatherings, and yet come to think, in only about half a century, that we know more about how to conduct a worship service than all of those people did through hundreds and hundreds of years of worship!

Go Mississippi! Forget the Rivalry this Week and Celebrate Being at the Top of a List

Let's forget the rivalry for at least this week. Forget "The School Up North." Forget "Cow College."

Forget, even, the Egg Bowl. Heaven knows, we will get there soon enough.

Let's enjoy this. Let's savor it. Inhale it. Revel in it.

This is for all "Our State."

Let's enjoy that Mississippi State ranks No. 1 in the nation. Let's enjoy that the University of Mississippi, Ole Miss if you prefer, ranks No. 3, inexcusably-considering-the-merits, two points behind No. 2 Florida State. Let's enjoy that ESPN has become MSPN this fall.

Let's enjoy that West Walls is going into the College Football Hall of Fame, and that Ray Guy just went in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Brett Favre will join him in Canton, Ohio, two years from now, as soon as he is eligible. We've got more Pro Football Hall of Famers per capita, than any state in the union. We are the state of Jerry Rice and Walter Payton. Of Archie Manning and Lance Alworth. Of Kent Hull and Jackie Slater and Charlie Connerly and Steve McHair, and so many more. When it comes to football, we can flat-out play.

Still, as good as this state has been at football,

this season is unprecedented, off the charts, really. Two of the top three teams in college football are ours. Not California's. Not Texas'. Not Florida's. They are from Mississippi. Yes, po' ol' whooped-down Mississippi.

Mississippi State is No. 1 — and deserves it. You beat three Top 10 teams in succession, decisively, you deserve it.

Ole Miss is No. 3 and you can make a strong case the Rebels should be No. 2. They beat Alabama and Texas A&M, back-to-back. Florida State has not done anything close to that. Not that it matters, really. Who's No. 1 — or 2 through 25 — in mid-October gets you nothing in January. Nothing.

That will all play out. Soon enough.

So will the Egg Bowl. No doubt, many Ole Miss fans believe they are the best team in the state and the nation. After all, the Rebels slayed mighty Alabama. They dominated A&M, a desperate team that had to win to remain relevant, before the largest crowd in Texas football history, 110,000-plus.

No doubt, many Mississippi State fans hate sharing the spotlight with their arch-rival.

Put all that aside for now.

Let's look at this way: Florida played LSU last Saturday, and Arkansas

played Alabama, and Georgia played Missouri, and that was all on what amounted to the SEC's undercard. The main events featured State drowning Auburn and Ole Miss bludgeoning Texas A&M.

How many times has it been the other way around? How many times have the Mississippi teams played the early game as the hors d'oeuvre to someone else's main course?

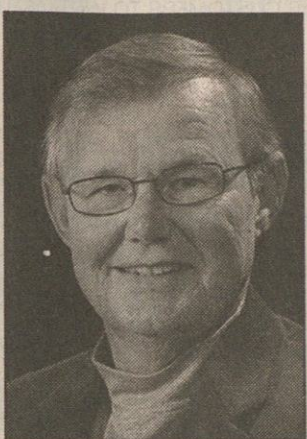
Always, it has seemed.

For whatever reason — and mostly, I suppose, because I am old and have seen a lot of Mississippi football — sports writers and sportscasters around the country keep calling and asking me what to make of this situation. They want me to give them a historical perspective of what all this means in Mississippi.

At first, I tried to be funny. When someone asked me what it looked like for State and Ole Miss to be tied at No. 3 in the nation, I said, simply: "It's like college football on LSD."

But LSD would mean flashbacks. This is unprecedented.

My first job at *The Clarion-Ledger* was covering Emory Ballard's first season at Mississippi State. Those Bulldogs went 3-8 and played to crowds of fewer than 30,000 in Starkville. A couple years later, I

switched over to Ole Miss and covered Steve Sloan's last two seasons at Ole Miss. The Rebels won 8, lost 13 and tied one.

I've covered little thick — and mostly thin — since. I've covered a lot of Egg Bowls when the only reward for the winner was a spot in the Independence Bowl.

This year, it will be for more, a whole lot more.

That will be Nov. 29. We'll get there, and getting there should be fun.

But now, for once, let's enjoy this remarkably extraordinary situation.

Halfway through the 2014 season, the two most accomplished football teams in the USA are from Mississippi.
