Iuka Passes Smoke-free Ordinance

The City of Iuka has enacted a smoke-free ordinance, joining more than 40 communities across the state.

The ordinance will become effective the first week of January and prohibits smoking in enclosed public space or place of employment. Smoking is also prohibited within 15 feet outside of entranceways of public buildings, stores, and establishments, in outdoor seating areas of restaurants, at playgrounds and ball parks, and in common areas of apartment buildings, condominiums, nursing homes and other multiple residential facilities. The ordinance also applies to so-called "e-cigarettes."

"I think it's a good thing for the City and a positive move for the community," said Mayor Tom Castleberry of the December 2nd decision by the board to pass the measure.

He said the only kick-back the city has received about the ordinance has been from the bingo facilities, which also fall under the city's jurisdiction for enforcement of the ordinance.

Monday night, owner/operators of Riverhills Bingo Bob

and Sylvia Ferguson met with the board of aldermen in hopes of getting an exemption for their bingo hall on the smoking prohibition. Riverhills funds the Tri-State Education Foundation, through which thousands of dollars of scholarship money are awarded to county and regional students each year.

The Fergusons argued that about 80 percent of their bingo clients smoke, and the nature of the game does not allow for them to leave the game to go outdoors to a designated area to smoke. It could be detrimental to the amount of dollars the Foundation can contribute to its scholarship efforts.

Though sympathetic to the Fergusons' concerns that they could lose customers, the board of aldermen said that the public health concerns prevail in this case and they agreed to keep the ordinance as originally passed. They said that, as in other communities that have successfully implemented smoking bans, the customer base will hopefully transition to non-smokers.

Water District Customers Seek Relief or Action on Increased Rates

Last week, some customers of the Tishomingo County Water District met with Public Service Commissioner Brandon Presley asking for his input on the issue of increased water rates for the 1,000-customer system that includes the Snowdown and Eastport communities around Pickwick Lake.

Though local lawmakers and supervisors at the meeting reacted with suggestions of changing laws to change the management of the district, and considered changing out appointed board members, Presley urged the customers to make themselves be heard by going to the board meeting and addressing the people who could actually do something about their concerns - the county-appointed five-member board.

They did just that -- about a dozen of them attended the board meeting in downtown

Iuka Tuesday night.

Though significant leakage (up to 60 percent water loss; normal is 25 percent loss on a rural system) on the aging system has long been a problem the board has been addressing, the customer rate increase caused by an increase from the supplier made the rates jump this year, causing many to look at their bills more critically.

The district buys its

water from Iuka, and the city recently doubled its rates from \$1 per 1,000 gallons to \$2 per 1,000 gallons, and then \$7.50 per each additional 1,000 gallons. They have passed the increase on to district water customers who now pay \$20 minimum bills for 2,000 gallons of water, and \$7.75 for each additional 1,000 gallons.

Many of the water customers are lake residences, where usage is nearly al-

ways within the minimum usage for vacation homes. Local people, including many on fixed incomes, are the ones who pay the higher bills, explained a board member.

The board heard comments from those attending the meeting Tuesday night, and identified areas to address to fix problems within the system:

- Find the source of water leaks and fix them to drastically reduce water

loss. A consultant has been hired to help find existing leaks and is supposed to start next week.

- Obtain help to secure grants or loans to finance drilling wells for the system.
- Evaluate after six months the financial shape of the system to see whether base water bill amounts should be adjusted to balance rates for all customers.

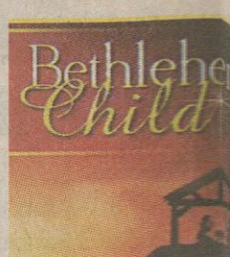


The jolly old man in red will make a visit to

Cancer-Drug Delivery Patent Could Lead to Shorter Chemotherapy Treatments

JACKSON, Miss. — Two University of Mississippi Medical Center researchers were awarded a patent that could revolutionize how cancer drugs are delivered. The new approach is one that could cut down on the number of chemotherapy treatments required, a measure that could save patients from some of the side effects that come with the aggressive treatment.

Additionally, the change in delivering the drugs could allow treatment for certain cancers that currently aren't vi-

able for chemotherapy.

As a video plays depicting how Dr. Drazen Raucher and Dr. Lee Bidwell's latest patent may destroy malignant tumors, Raucher offers a deeper explanation.

The UMMC biochemistry professor watches the arrow-like depiction that demonstrates how a peptide (arrow head) linked to a polypeptide shaft can deliver a different peptide (arrow fletching or vane) to cancer cells.

The pair's patent is for this platform for delivering anti-cancer

therapies only to tumors. If it proves safe and works in humans, it could reduce the amount of chemotherapy cancer patients need and therefore eliminate or reduce many side effects from it.

"Right now, you can't give it at certain levels because it harms the patient. With this they (physicians) can selectively target the tumor," Raucher said.

Heat makes it work.

Raucher said the blend is injected while the tumor is heated using MRI directed high

intensity focused ultrasound. "The heat makes it aggregate, get stuck in the tumor and kill it," he said.

Since it doesn't work without heat, any part of the injection that lingers near healthy cells never reacts and instead breaks down in the body, reducing the side effects.

Using these peptides, small pieces of protein that interfere with the interactions of cancer-causing proteins, is a more specific way to destroy cancer cells, said Bidwell, an assis-

tant professor of neurology.

"They're really specific for their target, the cancer cells. They don't bind with healthy cells," Bidwell said. The drawback is that the peptides break down in the body. The platform they've developed is a way to stabilize them until they reach the tumor.

Among the major advantages of the process is how peptides can be designed to seek certain cancer cells, making it possible this method could fight cancers for which there are cur-

rently no good therapies, said Bidwell.

Dr. Srinivas Jayakumar, of UMMC's Institute director, advances such will make cancer treatment easier on and more efficient term. "We love Cancer Institute members coming up new ways to treat cancer that are better for the patient and pate Dr. Raucher Dr. Bidwell's work succeed in accomplishing this goal."

Great Truths In Small Packages (part X)

I gave III John verses 3-4 in the last article, but I need to give them again, since I did not have space to comment on them: "For I rejoiced greatly, when the brethren came and testified of the truth that is in thee, even as thou walkest in the truth. I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth." Do you ever wonder what makes some people joyful? Actually, we often confuse the word happiness with the word joy, but there is a world of difference between these two words. John has great joy, because he has had a report on Gaius from some fellow believers. It is a great day when fellow Christians have enough confidence in us to give a good report to a third party, which is what happened concerning Gaius. It is the truth within Gaius that makes him a stalwart Christian! This point needs great emphasis in our day, for truth is almost thought to be a "necessary evil" in some church services. Some people are so busy shouting and clapping their hands that they have forgotten why they are doing so! I am certainly not against either of these two means of expression, but I am against the playing down of truth. The Bible is filled with admonitions concerning the importance of truth, so much that Jesus said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). If Jesus is the embodiment of truth, then we cannot really worship Him apart from truth!

Not only did Gaius have the truth of God within his heart, but he also walked in that truth. This means that his life-style matched what he professed with his lips and what he believed in his heart! We could do with a bit more of this kind of "Christianity" in our day! I have walked as an exercise for more than 40 years, so I have an idea what it means to walk; it means that you just keep on taking one step after another! It is the same with the spiritual walk; we just keep making steps according to the truth of the Word of God! The good Apostle John had no joy that excelled above the joy of hearing that his children were walking in truth. Although Gaius may not have been a direct convert of John, he was likely converted, directly or indirectly, by what John had preached. The good news that a convert is "walking on" is what thrills the hearts of those who are preaching, teaching or witnessing to win others to Christ! To walk in truth is more important than the empty boasting of some concerning what gifts and abilities they suppose God has given them. To walk in truth will shout a louder message to others than anything else a believer can do, for those who speak loudly and walk a crooked path are not likely to be heard in any big circle!

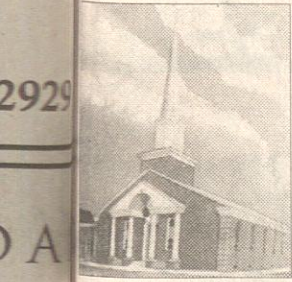

CITY OF IUKA SMOKE FREE AIR ORDINANCE OF 2014

Sec. 1000. Title

This Article shall be known as the City of Iuka Smoke free Air Ordinance of 2014.

Sec. 1001. Findings and Intent The Board of Aldermen does hereby find that:

The 2010 United States Surgeon General's Report, How Tobacco Cause Disease concluded: (1) Low levels of secondhand smoke exposure lead to a rapid and sharp increase in dysfunction and inflammation of the lining of the blood vessels, which are implicated in heart attack and stroke; (2) When inhaling secondhand cigarette smoke, individuals breathe in more than seven thousand (7,000) chemicals, hundreds of which are hazardous and known to cause cancer. These chemicals are rapidly absorbed by cells in the body and produce disease-causing cellular change. (3) There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

The 2006 United States Surgeon General's Report, The Health and Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke, concluded: (1) Secondhand smoke exposure causes disease and premature death in children and adults who do not smoke; (2) Children exposed to secondhand smoke are at an increased risk for sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), acute respiratory problems, ear infections, and asthma attacks; (3) Exposure of adults to secondhand smoke has immediate adverse effects on the cardiovascular system and causes coronary heart disease and lung cancer; (4) Establishing smoke-free air workplaces fully protects employees and the public from exposure to secondhand smoke in those places. Separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air, and ventilating buildings cannot eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke; (5) Evidence from peer-reviewed studies shows that smoke-free policies and laws do not have an adverse economic impact on the hospitality industry. Business owners have no legal or constitutional right to expose their employees to the toxic chemicals and carcinogens in secondhand smoke. On the contrary, employers have a common-law duty to provide their workers with a workplace that is not unreasonably dangerous.

Accordingly, the Board of Aldermen finds and declares that the purposes of this ordinance are (1) to protect the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking in public places and places of employment; and (2) to guarantee the right of nonsmokers to breathe smoke free air, and to recognize that the need to breathe smoke free air shall have priority over the desire to smoke.

Sec. 1002. Definitions

The following words and phrases, whenever used in this Article, shall be construed as defined in this Section:

A. "Bar" means an establishment that is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of those beverages, including but not limited to, taverns, nightclubs, cocktail lounges, and cabarets.

B. "Business" means a sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other business entity, either for-profit or not-for-profit, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold; professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered; and private clubs.

C. "E-cigarette" means any electronic oral device, such as one composed of a heating element, battery, and/or electronic circuit, which provides a vapor of nicotine or any other substances, and the use or inhalation of which simulates smoking. The term shall include any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, or under any other product name or descriptor.

D. "Employee" means a person who is employed by an employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and a person who volunteers his or her services for a non-profit entity.

E. "Employer" means a person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including a municipal corporation, trust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or more individual persons.

F. "Enclosed Area" means all space between a floor and a ceiling that is bounded on all sides by walls, doorways, or windows, whether open or closed. A wall includes any retractable divider, garage door, or other physical barrier, whether temporary or permanent.

G. "Health Care Facility" means an office or institution providing care or treatment of diseases, whether physical, mental, or emotional, or other medical, physiological, or psychological conditions, including but not limited to, hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals or other clinics, including weight control clinics, nursing homes, long-term care facilities, homes for the aging or chronically ill, laboratories, and offices of surgeons, chiropractors, physical therapists, physicians, psychiatrists, dentists, and all specialists within these professions. This definition shall include all waiting rooms, hallways, private rooms, semiprivate rooms, and wards within health care facilities.

H. "Place of Employment"

means an enclosed area under the control of a public or private employer, including, but not limited to, work areas, private offices, employee lounges, restrooms, conference rooms, meeting rooms, classrooms, employee cafeterias, hallways, and vehicles. A private residence is not a "place of employment" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility.

I. "Playground" means any park or recreational area designed in part to be used by children that has play or sports equipment installed or that has been designated or landscaped for play or sports activities, or any similar facility located on public or private school grounds or on [City or County] grounds.

J. "Private Club" means an organization, whether incorporated or not, which is the owner, lessee, or occupant of a building or portion thereof used exclusively for club purposes at all times, which is operated solely for a recreational, fraternal, social, patriotic, political, benevolent, or athletic purpose, but not for pecuniary gain, and which only sells alcoholic beverages incidental to its operation. The affairs and management of the organization are conducted by a board of directors, executive committee, or similar body chosen by the members at an annual meeting. The organization has established bylaws and/or a constitution to govern its activities. The organization has been granted an exemption from the payment of federal income tax as a club under 26 U.S.C. Section 501.

K. "Public Place" means an enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, banks, bars, educational facilities, gaming facilities, health care facilities, hotels and motels, laundromats, public transportation vehicles and facilities, reception areas, restaurants, retail food production and marketing establishments, retail service establishments, retail stores, shopping malls, sports arenas, theaters, and waiting rooms. A private residence is not a "public place" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility.

L. "Restaurant" means an eating establishment, including but not limited to, coffee shops, cafeterias, sandwich stands, and private and public school cafeterias, which gives or offers for sale food to the public, guests, or employees, as well as kitchens and catering facilities in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere. The term "restaurant" shall include a bar area within the restaurant.

M. "Service Line" means an indoor or outdoor line in which one (1) or more persons are waiting for or receiving service of any kind, whether or not the service involves the exchange of money, including but not limited to, ATM lines, concert lines, food vendor lines, movie ticket lines, and sporting event lines.

N. "Shopping Mall" means an enclosed public walkway or hall area that serves to connect retail or professional establishments.

O. "Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, or pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation, in any manner or in any form. "Smoking" also includes the use of an e-cigarette which creates a vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking in this Article.

P. "Sports Arena" means a place where people assemble to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or witness sports or other events, including sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and ice rinks, and bowling alleys.

Sec. 1003. Application of Article to City Facilities

All enclosed areas, including buildings, and vehicles owned, leased, or operated by the City of Iuka, shall be subject to the provisions of this Article.

Sec. 1004. Prohibition of Smoking in Enclosed Public Places Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed public places within the City of Iuka, including but not limited to, the following places:

A. Libraries and museums.

B. Areas available to the general public in businesses and non-profit entities patronized by the public, including but not limited to, banks, laundromats, professional offices, and retail service establishments.

C. Bars.

D. Bingo facilities.

E. Child care and adult day care facilities.

F. Convention facilities.

G. Educational facilities, both public and private.

H. Elevators.

I. Gaming facilities.

J. Health care facilities.

K. Hotels and motels.

L. Lobbies, hallways, and other common areas in apartment buildings, condominiums, trailer parks, retirement facilities, nursing homes, and other multiple-unit residential facilities.

M. Polling places.

N. Public transportation vehicles, including buses and taxicabs, under the authority of the City, and ticket, boarding, and waiting areas of public transportation facilities, including bus, train, and airport facilities.

O. Restaurants.

P. Restrooms, lobbies, reception areas, hallways, and other common-use areas.

Q. Retail stores.

R. Rooms, chambers, places of meeting or public assembly, including school buildings, under the control of an agency, board, commission, committee or council of the City or a political subdivision of the State, to the extent the place is subject to the jurisdiction of the City.

S. Service lines.

T. Shopping malls.

U. Sports arenas, including enclosed places in outdoor arenas.

V. Theaters and other facilities primarily used for exhibiting motion pictures, stage dramas, lectures, musical recitals, or other similar performances.

Sec. 1005. Prohibition of Smoking in Enclosed Places of Employment

A. Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed areas of places of employment without exception. This includes common work areas, auditoriums, classrooms, conference and meeting rooms, private offices, elevators, hallways, medical facilities, cafeterias, employee lounges, stairs, restrooms, vehicles, and all other enclosed facilities.

B. This prohibition on smoking shall be communicated to all existing employees by the effective date of this Article and to all prospective employees upon their application for employment.

Sec. 1006. Prohibition of Smoking in Private Clubs

Smoking shall be prohibited in all private clubs.

Sec. 1007. Prohibition of Smoking in Enclosed Residential Facilities

Smoking shall be prohibited in the following enclosed residential facilities:

A. All private and semi-private rooms in nursing homes.

B. At least 90% of hotel and motel rooms that are rented to guests.

Sec. 1008. Prohibition of Smoking in Outdoor Areas

Smoking shall be prohibited in the following outdoor places:

A. Within a reasonable distance of 15 feet outside entrances, operable windows, and ventilation systems of enclosed areas where smoking is prohibited, so as to prevent tobacco smoke from entering those areas.

B. In, and within 15 feet of, outdoor seating or serving areas of restaurants and bars.

C. In all outdoor arenas, stadiums, and amphitheaters.

Smoking shall also be prohibited in, and within 15 feet of, bleachers and grandstands for use by spectators at sporting and other public events.

D. In, and within 15 feet of, all outdoor public transportation stations, platforms, and shelters under the authority of the City.

E. In all outdoor service lines.

F. In outdoor common areas of apartment buildings, condominiums, trailer parks, retirement facilities, nursing homes, and other multiple-unit residential facilities, except in designated smoking areas, not to exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the total outdoor common area, which must be located at least 15 feet outside entrances, operable windows, and ventilation systems of enclosed areas where smoking is prohibited.

G. In, and within 15 feet of, outdoor playgrounds.

Sec. 1009. Where Smoking Not Regulated

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article to the contrary, the following areas shall be exempt from the provisions of Sections 1004 and 1005:

A. Private residences, unless used as a childcare, adult day care, or health care facility, and except as provided in Section 1007.

B. Not more than ten percent (10%) of hotel and motel rooms rented to guests and designated as smoking rooms.

All smoking rooms on the same floor must be contiguous and smoke from these rooms must not infiltrate into areas where smoking is prohibited under the provisions of this Article.

The status of rooms as smoking or nonsmoking may not be changed, except to add additional nonsmoking rooms.

C. Outdoor areas of places of employment except those covered by the provisions of Section 1008.

D. Private automobiles or private enclosed vehicles; or public roadways or public walkways that do not fall under any enunciated prohibited area.

Sec. 1010. Declaration of Establishment as Nonsmoking

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article, an owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of an establishment, facility, or outdoor area may declare that entire establishment, facility, or outdoor area as a nonsmoking facility.

Sec. 1011. Removal of Ashtrays

The owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of a public place or place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this Article shall:

A. Remove all ashtrays from any area where smoking is prohibited by this Article, except for ashtrays displayed for sale and not for immediate use.

Sec. 1012. Nonretaliation; Non-waiver of Rights

A. No person or employer shall discharge, refuse to hire, or in any manner retaliate against an employee, applicant for employment, customer, or resident of a multiple-unit residential facility because that employee, applicant, customer, or resident exercises any rights afforded by this Article or reports or attempts to prosecute a violation of this Article. Notwithstanding Section 1014, violation of this Subsection shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000 for each violation.

B. An employee who works in

a setting where an employer allows smoking does not waive or otherwise surrender any legal rights the employee may have against the employer or any other party.

Sec. 1013. Enforcement

A. This Article shall be enforced by the City of Iuka Police Department or an authorized designee.

B. All applicants for a business license in the City of Iuka are considered on notice of the provisions of this ordinance.

C. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this Article may initiate enforcement with the City of Iuka Police Department.

D. The Health Department, Fire Department, or their designees shall, while an establishment is undergoing otherwise mandated inspections, inspect for compliance with this Article.

E. An owner, manager, operator, or employee of an establishment regulated by this Article shall direct a person who is smoking in violation of this Article to extinguish the product being smoked. If the person does not stop smoking, the owner, manager, operator, or employee shall refuse service and shall immediately ask the person to leave the premises. If the person in violation refuses to leave the premises, the owner, manager, operator, or employee shall contact a law enforcement agency.

F. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article, an employee or private citizen may bring legal action to enforce this Article.

G. In addition to the remedies provided by the provisions of this Section, the City of Iuka Police Department or any person aggrieved by the failure of the owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of a public place or place of employment to comply with the provisions of this Article may apply for injunctive relief to enforce those provisions in any court of competent jurisdiction.

Sec. 1014. Violations and Penalties

A. A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

B. Except as otherwise provided in Section 1012(A), a person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment and who fails to comply with the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:

1. A fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.

2. A fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation within one (1) year.

3. A fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for each additional violation within one (1) year.

C. In addition to the fines established by this Section, violation of this Article by a person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment may result in the suspension or revocation of any permit or license issued to the person for the premises on which the violation occurred.

D. Violation of this Article is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, which may be abated by the City of Iuka Police Department by restraining order, preliminary and permanent injunction, or other means provided for by law, and the City may take action to recover the costs of the nuisance abatement.

E. Each day on which a violation of this Article occurs shall be considered a separate and distinct violation.

Sec. 1015. Public Education The City of Iuka Police Department shall endeavor to explain and clarify the purposes and requirements of this Article to citizens affected by it, and to guide owners, operators, and managers in their compliance with it for a reasonable time.

Sec. 1016. Other Applicable Laws

This Article shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws or regulations.

Sec. 1017. Liberal Construction This Article shall be liberally construed so as to further its purposes.

Sec. 1018. Severability If any provision, clause, sentence, or paragraph of this Article or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Article which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Article are declared to be severable.

Sec. 1019. Effective Date This Article shall be effective thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption.

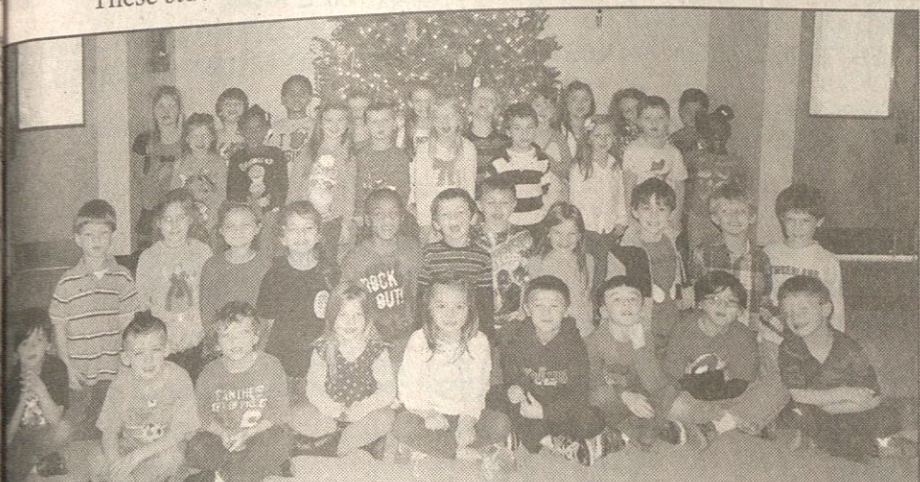

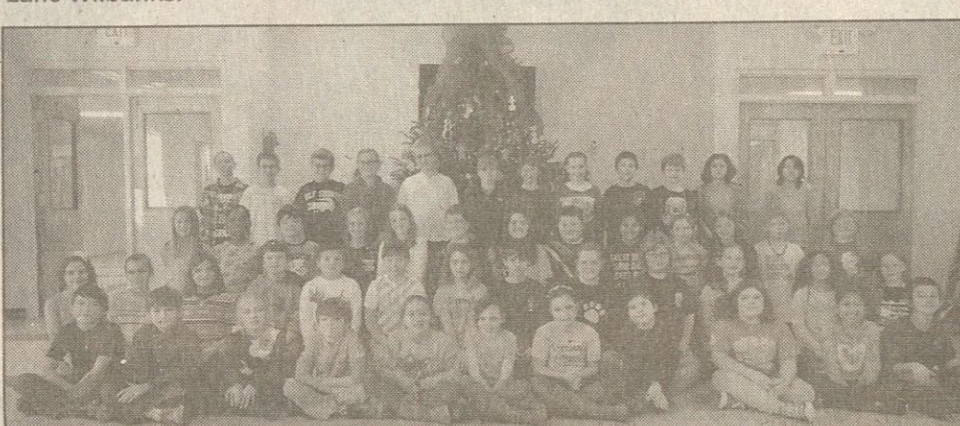
