Local Reps Stick to Party Line to Support their Own Educational Amendment

Local legislators voted to support a house resolution for a citizen-sponsored initiative that many say will confuse voters and, thus, prevent the passage of a citizen-sponsored initiative that would require the Legislature to fully fund education, in accordance with a law they passed in 1997 (MAEP (Mississippi Adequate Education Program)).

The Mississippi House on Tuesday approved by a vote of 57 HCR 9, a competing alternative proposal to the citizen-sponsored education funding initiative 42 on the November ballot.

The provision passed after about two hours of intense debate. This is the first time the Legislature has ever attempted to place on the ballot an alternative to compete with a citizen-sponsored initiative.

Initiative 42 would protect each child's fundamental right to educational opportunity through the eighth grade by extending Section 201 of the Mississippi Constitution to require that the State must provide and fund an adequate and efficient system of free public schools. This initiative would authorize the chancery courts of this State to enforce this section with appropriate injunctive relief.

The vote was nearly along party lines with all the House Democrats, joined by two Republicans, - including Rep. Margaret Rogers, R-New Albany - voting against the proposal. Local legislators representing Tishomingo County and surrounding areas voted for the alternative amendment, including Republicans Lester "Bubba" Carpenter (District 1), Randy Boyd (Dist. 19), and Williamacy Arnold (District 3). District 2's Nick Bain (Democrat) voted against the amendment.

District 1's Carpenter stated: "Today, I did not vote against Initiative 42. I supported an alternative for the voters who are concerned with how this initiative will affect their taxes, and possibly increase the millage rates in Tishomingo and Alcorn counties. My biggest concern, and the concern of many others, is that the fate of our educational system will lie in the hands of a Hinds County judge, and not with someone you have elected."

House Pro Tem Greg Rowden, R-Meridian, the author of the alternative, said if his proposal is approved by voters nothing will change in terms of the way education is funded by the Legislature. Apparently, the change seems to be needed since local school districts throughout the state have been underfunded more than \$1.5 billion since 2008.

Tishomingo County Superintendent Christie Holly stated

that the toll of underfunding by the Legislature is finally at a tipping point financially in the Tishomingo County Schools.

"The MAEP formula was the Legislature's recipe to determine how the state would fund its educational program. The last time our district was fully funded was 2008," said Holly. "Through sound fiscal management over the years, our Board and former superintendents have found ways to provide an excellent education for Tishomingo County's children. However, we can no longer sustain the financial needs of having small class sizes, structurally sound buildings, nice athletic facilities, extracurricular offerings for students, transportation costs, etc. without putting school operations in financial risk over the next two years."

County schools are feeling the pinch, as most of their budget is taken up for teachers and personnel that have daily interaction with the students, and the next step is letting go of personnel, and increasing class sizes.

"Last year alone, we were shorted \$1.6 million under the formula and have been shorted over \$9 million since 2010," said Holly. "I have expressed these concerns to our Legislators and felt that Initiative 42, if passed, might be public education's chance to receive what it's due by law. Unfortunately, the vote taken Tuesday to offer an alternate measure on the ballot shows the resistance we face for full funding and the resistance we face for public education, even in a great school district like Tishomingo County."

The move is viewed by some as an attempt by the GOP legislative leadership to kill the 2015 ballot initiative 42 by the Better Schools, Better Jobs group, which is pushing for voters to change the state Constitution and force lawmakers to "follow their own law" and fully fund the MAEP formula for K-12 public education.

But opponents of the alternative say the result will be the defeat of both the alternative and citizen-sponsored proposal by voters in November because of the threshold it will require to pass either one.

Join Tishomingo officials and other citizens to share your appreciation with Ms. Rushing during this time of celebration.

People would have to cast a vote, saying they wanted to vote for the alternative or the initiative. And then the person would have to vote for one of the two. And to pass, the proposal would have to receive not only a majority vote, but 40 percent of the total votes cast in the election. Obtaining that threshold would be much more difficult with an alternative on the ballot, according to Better Schools/Better Jobs.

Opponents of that initiative say it would improperly wrest spending power from the Legislature and put it in the hands of a Hinds County Chancery judge, and that it could force drastic cuts to other budgets or tax increases if lawmakers are forced to fully fund public education per their own funding formula.

One fact stands out in all the posturing and responding: if the Legislature provided adequate education funding per the law, presumably no public initiative would be necessary - and who knows what good funding would do for the state's perennium.

Pleas Heard in Circuit Court

On January 7, 2015, the following pleas were heard in Tishomingo County Circuit Court by Judge James L. Roberts, Jr.:

John Richard Clingan, age 31, of Booneville, pled guilty to grand larceny and was sentenced to 5 years supervised probation, and pay all costs, fines, assessments, and restitution.

Anthony Vescio, age 50, Iuka, Mississippi pled guilty to three counts of False Representation of a Controlled Substance and was sentenced to 5 years in custody of MDOC, with credit for time served and balance of sentence suspended, followed by 4 years post release supervision,

and must pay all costs, fines, assessments, and restitution.

Pamela Jane Johnson, age 43, of Iuka, pled guilty to three counts of False Pretense. She was sentenced to 10 years in custody of MDOC. For two of the counts she was sentenced to ten years with MDOC for each count, all suspended, pending defendant's future good behavior and that she violate no city, county, state, or federal laws. She will be placed in the Intensive Supervision Program/House Arrest Program. If she successfully completes the Intensive Supervision Program,

she shall be placed on post release supervision for a period of 5 years. She must additionally pay costs, fines, assessments, and restitution.

Daryl Rokasky, age 31, of Greenwood, Mississippi pled guilty to possession of Contraband in Correctional Facility. He was sentenced to 10 years in MDOC, with credit for time served, and the balance of time suspended followed by 5 years post release supervision. He

2015 County Chess Tournament Held at Tishomingo Middle School

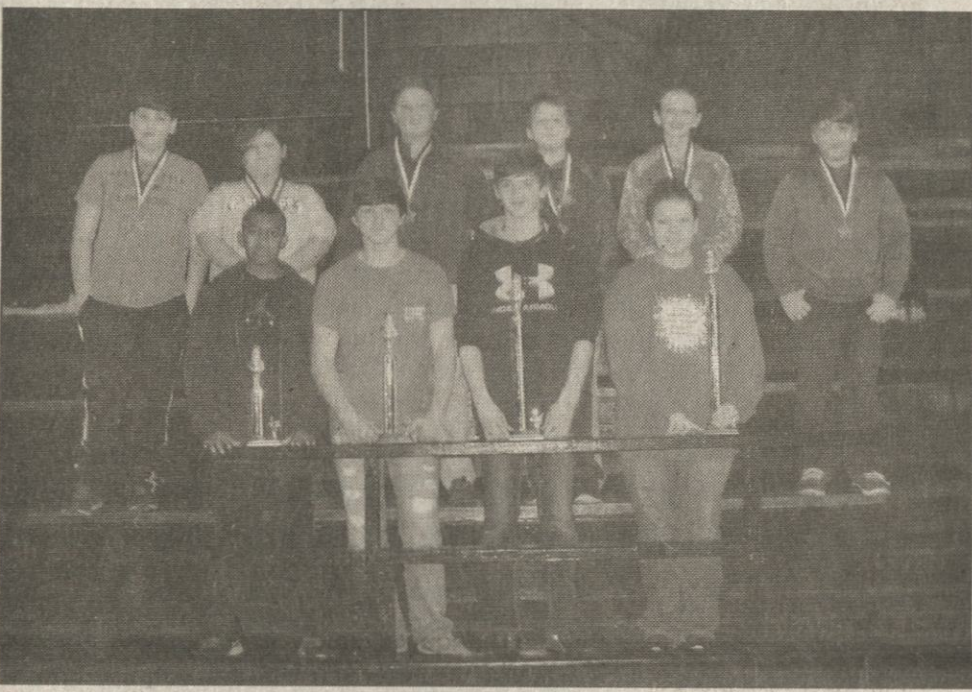

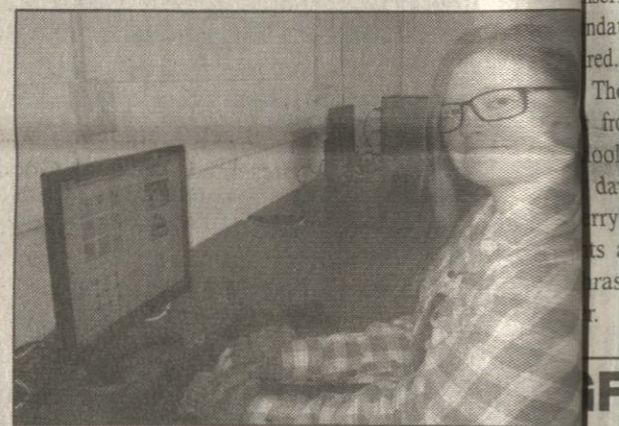

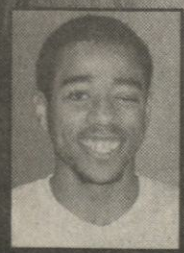

Tiger Alum, MSU President Mark Keenum to Speak at NE First Pitch Banquet

Northeast Mississippi Community College is adding a touch of maroon and white to help celebrate the start of a new and promising season on the diamond.

Mississippi State University president and former Tiger football standout Mark Keenum will be the keynote speaker for the ninth annual Northeast First Pitch Banquet on Tuesday, February 3 at 6:30 p.m. in the Claude Wright Room of the Haney Union.

Tickets are now on sale through any member of the Tiger baseball squad for \$20. Admission is also available at the door for \$25 on the night of this special event.

"We're very excited about having Dr. Keenum and his family here for our banquet," said Northeast head coach Kent Farris. "The things that have been going on at Mississippi State, with the prominent rise of the football program and the baseball program going to Omaha, starts at the top and he's the man in Starkville."

Keenum was named the 19th leader of Mississippi State in January 2009 and has subsequently guided his institution to new heights with record student attendance, new facilities and major fundraising efforts, and incredible scholastic growth.

Keenum also plays a crucial role for the MSU Promise Program, which produces scholarships for pupils inside the Magnolia State whose families have limited financial resources.

He frequently partners with the G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery Center for America's Veterans to assist the organization in accomplishing its goal of providing comprehensive support for those who have served in the United States Armed Forces through a university-based resource site.

Athletics have flourished with Keenum in charge at Mississippi State. The Bulldogs recently wrapped up one of their most memorable campaigns on the gridiron with a trip to the Capital One Orange Bowl. The men's basketball squad qualified for the first round of the NCAA Tournament during Keenum's inaugural year on campus while the women are presently ranked No. 14 by the Associated Press (AP). Mississippi State's baseball team

ran the tables to the NCAA College World Series at TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha, Neb., during the 2013 season. The Bulldogs defeated national seed Oregon State University and Indiana University before finishing as the runner-up to the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA).

Mississippi State's sports facilities have also improved tremendously thanks in the part to the vision of Keenum. A major expansion of Davis Wade Stadium was completed in August and an overhaul of legendary Dudy Noble Field is being planned for the near future.

He approved the additions of multiple athletic support buildings as well, including the Leo W. Seal, Jr., Football Complex and the Mize Pavilion basketball practice facility.

Keenum earned his Associate's degree from Northeast while playing for the Tigers and National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Hall of Fame coach W.B. "Bill" Ward.

The center was part of the most successful two-year period in program history. Northeast won 15 games from 1979-80 with Keenum on the offensive line and qualified for the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges (MACJC) State Playoffs twice.

Keenum led the Tigers to their inaugural MACJC North Division championship with a 9-1 regular season mark in 1980.

Keenum is the third representative from Mississippi State to speak at the Northeast First Pitch Banquet. He joins current Bulldogs coach John Cohen (2011) plus legendary head coach and the "Father of SEC Baseball" Ron Polk (2008).

Former Northeast sports information director Matt Wyatt returns to serve as the emcee for the evening. Wyatt is the color analyst for Mississippi State's football radio broadcasts and a co-host for Head to Head Radio, which airs on SuperTalk Mississippi and is the only statewide sports talk show.

I will give Jude verse 3 again, because I have more to say about it: "Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith that was once delivered to the saints." After having been a preacher of the gospel for 53 years, I know what it is like for God to change one's mind about what should be

preached or taught at a certain time and place; Jude knew this also. Jude would have loved to write about the salvation that all believers have in common, but the need of the hour dictated something different! Dear preachers and teachers, please be flexible enough to change your subject, should God so direct you! Notice that Jude saw a need to encourage (exhort) these believers along a certain line. There was a need

to contend for the faith once delivered to the saints. The word "contend" (epagonizomai) comes from two Greek words (epi and agonizomai), which together mean to struggle with an opponent. The word "epi" means: "a direction toward, upon etc." The word "agonizomai" means to struggle with, or contend, with an opponent, as in a wrestling match or another sporting event, as well as to struggle with an adversary. We get our word "agonize" from "agonizomai". We are to agonize with God in prayer, but we are to struggle against wrong teaching, which is what Jude is about to say in our next verses.

Perhaps some would wonder why I am laboring this point, even why I would give the Greek words. I certainly am not a Greek scholar, although I studied it formally for two years, but I do believe that the words I used above will mean more to us if we know at least that they were used in the word "contend" and that they have a meaning that indicates a struggle for something worthwhile! A part of my reason for going a bit further on this point is the fact that so many individuals and churches have about "ditched" the idea of teaching doctrine from the pulpit or in the classrooms, and that is directly against

what Jude taught here, or what is taught in the rest of the Bible and by Jesus Himself! The term "the faith" goes beyond the idea of being saved by faith to the matter of keeping certain basic truths before the body of Christ. So, "the faith" refers to a body of teaching that was commonly taught in the early churches. Jude saw a need to exhort the believers to whom he wrote that they should struggle, as in a wrestling match or a military battle, to keep right teaching in the local church. Some people say, "We just love people, so we do not want to teach anything that might be divisive." My friends, right doc-

trine does not divide; unites; heresy divides. If we love people, we will want to deliver them what God delivered to us in the Book that is called the Bible!"

ally low-ranking schools, since full funding has only happened twice.

The MAEP formula is a law adopted by the Legislature in 1997, when Ronnie Musgrove was lieutenant governor. It is supposed to set K-12 education spending, with a goal of providing equity between affluent and poor school districts with state funding. But it's only been fully funded twice, with lawmakers usually saying the state can't afford the spending it requires.

The Better Schools initiative gathered the signatures of more than 107,000 registered voters -- nearly 200,000 people in all signed -- to put "Initiative 42" on the ballot in November 2015. It would mandate that lawmakers provide an "adequate and efficient" public education and, fund the MAEP formula, which was shorted about \$260 million this year and \$1.5 billion over the last six years.

The alternative amendment passed by committee Monday says the Legislature shall provide "an effective system of free public schools."

State law allows the Legislature to pass an alternative that will appear

on the same ballot as a citizen-sponsored measure. The measure with the most votes would win in November, provided it received at least 40 percent of the total vote cast in the election.

Patsy Brumfield, with the Better Schools, Better Jobs group, said the move by the House GOP leadership on Monday "was not unexpected." She said the move is an attempt to make the 2015 ballot confusing with two initiatives "so that neither will pass." She said the alternative ballot measure would be "a terrible fraud on the people of Mississippi."

"It's a legal trick to confuse the voters and kill the amendment," Brumfield said.

In a separate push, former Democratic Gov. Ronnie Musgrove is pushing litigation against the state on behalf of 21 school districts that want the state to pay them \$230 million they say they were shorted per the MAEP formula, and to force full funding of MAEP going forward. A hearing is scheduled for Wednesday in Hinds County Chancery Court.

Beshear to Lead Waterway Development Authority

Columbus, Mississippi -The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority has elected Governor Steven Beshear of Kentucky as its chairman for 2015. This is the second time Governor Beshear has chaired the waterway group and his involvement with the agency dates back to the mid 1980's when he was a member during his term as the Commonwealth's Lt. Governor.

The authority is a four-state interstate compact comprised of the States of Alabama, Kentucky, Mississippi, and Tennessee, and ratified by the U.S. Congress in 1958 to promote the development of the Tenn-Tom Waterway and its economic and trade potential. Members include the four governors and five appointees by each governor or a total of 24 members. Chairmanship rotates annually among the four governors.

The waterway compact will also be led in 2015 by Brian Roy of Benton, KY as its vice-chairman, and T.L. "Bud" Phillips of Columbus, MS, who was reelected as its treasurer. Roy is deputy director of the Kentucky Association of Counties and has been a member of the waterway compact since 1993. Phillips, a businessman, is the longest serving member of the authority, having first

been appointed in 1988

The authority's sister organization, the Tenn-Tom Waterway Development Council, will be led this year by Lucian Lott of Mobile as its chairman. Lott is Sales Manager with Cooper T Smith Stevedoring, Inc. Other officers include Stephen Surles of Nashville, TN as vice-chairman; Terry Freeze of Columbus, Ms, treasurer; Josh Tubbs of Benton, KY, secretary; and, Ken Canter of Paducah as the organization's past chairman. The council currently has nearly 200 members from 13 states, who are stakeholders in the waterway and its purposes, including commercial navigation, recreation, tourism and economic development.

The Tenn-Tom, opened to commerce in 1985, has proven to be a vital transportation route for shipping bulk materials and other raw products between mid-America and the Southeast. It's cost effective and energy efficient barge service has attracted billions of dollars of new and expanded industrial development to the waterway region. An extensive development of marinas, campgrounds, and other related facilities has made the waterway corridor a Mecca for recreationists and nature lovers.
