When sophomore forward Caleb McCalmon on the floor it was to see how he has proved through the season, and he made the first three dunks in the first half, to rally the crowd and the Braves. Overall McCalmon scored 11.

School Administration Working Proactively to Shape Up Budget

The county's school district is not in financial trouble, but administration officials are being proactive to ensure that the future needs of the system are met, considering all the current variables.

In an interview with Tishomingo County School Superintendent Christie Holly on Tuesday, she explained the juggling act of managing not only the sole source of public education for Tishomingo County's children, but also the county's largest employer. Throw in a constantly fluctuating set of educational standards, and an ever-changing, and occasionally at-risk amount of financial support, and you have a considerable challenge.

This month, Holly has been meeting with faculty and principals at each school in preparation for state testing, but also to ascertain if there are any possible cuts to be made to an already tight budget. There has been talk of potential layoffs, but Holly says the administration is trying to make that a last resort.

"We are looking at how to get the most 'bang for our buck,'" Holly said. "We are looking at class size numbers, covering classes and duties with current staff instead of replacing retiring teachers... We are operating at a deficit, meaning we are spending more than we take in, and that can not

continue."

With an annual budget of \$29.6 million, the district educates 3,160 students and employs 477 regular employees; a lot of families in the county depend on the school system in one way or another. Seventy-seven percent of the district's expenditures - nearly \$23 million annually - goes toward salaries and benefits for the faculty and staff.

"We still have a good reserve fund - projected to be in excess of \$4 million - well within the 7 percent of annual operations costs that the state requires us to maintain," said the first-year superintendent.

In recent years, the district, through shrewd fund management, had as much as \$10 million in a reserve fund, and many locals still think that the district "is sitting on \$10 million."

But Holly says that is not true any more. In recent years, much of that reserve has gone to provide some one-time capital improvements to buildings. Also, the Learning Center Program, a remedial catch-up system for students falling behind, was established (including three teachers and an administrator for it); teaching assistants received raises; and coaching supplements were increased to make them more com-

petitive with other districts. Teacher raises were already implemented by the district when the Legislature passed a local raise for teachers.

"That was unfortunate timing, that we had committed to raises and then the state mandated additional raises," admitted Holly. But the state doesn't send funds for all the accompanying costs of higher salaries - insurance and other fringe benefits. Holly has said, "It essentially costs us money to give the raises they sent money for."

Leaders of the Mississippi State Legislature announced Tuesday that the state's schools would be funded at the highest amount ever - \$2.52 billion which is \$110 million more than last year for K-8 schools for the upcoming fiscal year. However, there is still no plan for fully funding the Mississippi Adequate Education Program (MAEP).

Last year MAEP was shorted \$260 million, and over the last six years \$1.5 billion.

When asked what would make "everything better" for the Tishomingo County schools, Holly quickly replied, "fully fund MAEP."

According to The American College of Radiology (ACR) a mammography machine must pass a series of tests and evaluations to ensure quality imaging standards. Additionally the radiologists who reads the mammography images must also pass ACR established guidelines. And finally the mammography technician must pass certification requirements and maintain continuing education in order to show competency in mammographic imaging.

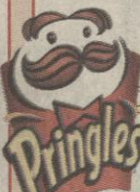

If the TCSD would have had full MAEP funding just last year, "we would be on budget," said Holly. Over the past four years, the District would have had \$9 million more to meet their financial needs, had MAEP been funded each year.

"They provided for raises, and they say they are allocating more funds, but so much of it is earmarked for salaries - a recurring expense - and they don't always provide for the recurring expenses the next year," explained Holly of the Legislature's

actions.

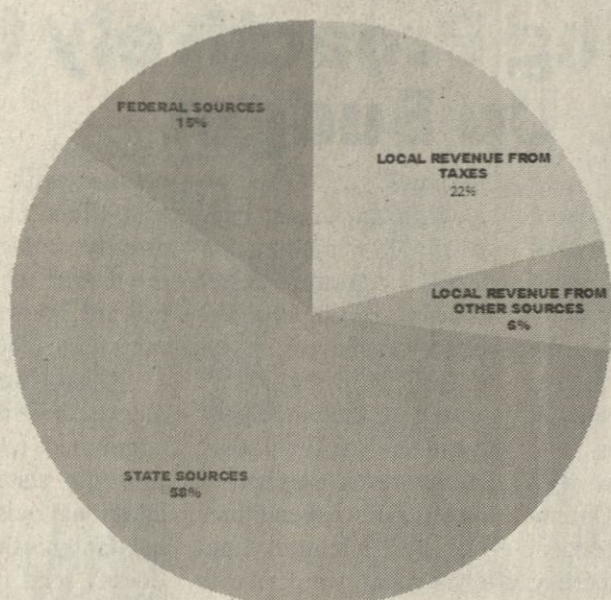
Holly is polling staff county wide to see if there are retirements to be anticipated, and the district plans to use existing staff to cover any holes left by retirements, instead of hiring new personnel. In April, the school board is

presented with the administrations recommended faculty re-hires. In March, administration recommendations for principals are presented to the board.

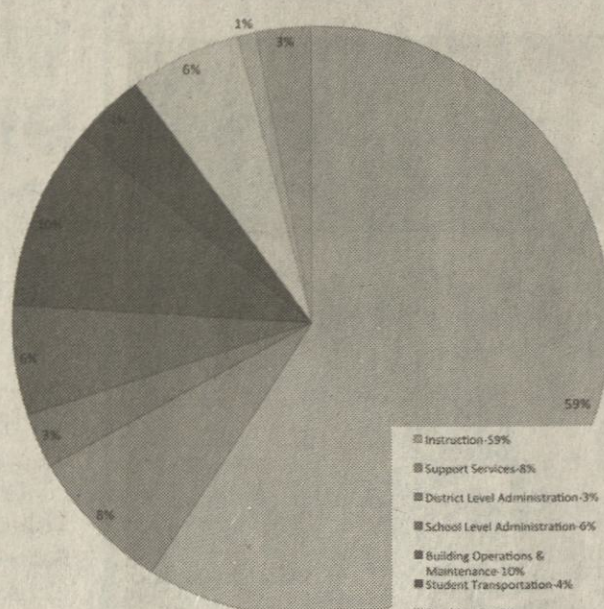
Along with all school staff, from curriculum managers to individual teachers, Holly is having

to guess what to plan for in regards to state education standards. Last week, the Legislature proposed removing "common core" from all the standards, but the standards are the same so far - but there are proposals on the table to establish yet different

education standards. Mississippi students would mean that millions spent on Core training for and money spent on textbooks for garden through 8 could be a waste.

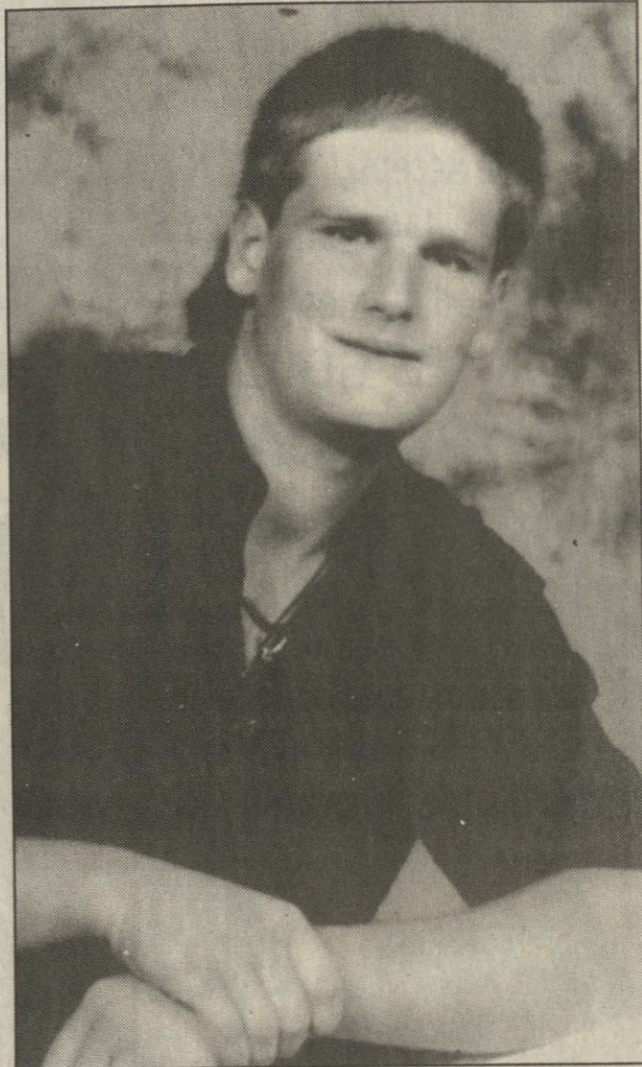

Conservation Corner

Food Plots

Whether you are a photographer, a hunter or like viewing wildlife on a sunny afternoon, anyone who has spent time looking at a food plot will have a deep appreciation for wildlife plantings.

Food plots are very attractive to wildlife enthusiasts because they can supplement daily nutritional needs at a low cost. These plots can be designed to serve as a source of food cover. Well-managed food plots have the potential to not only increase wildlife population but also increase our opportunities for wildlife

viewing.

To aid landowners who would like to plant wildlife food plots, Wildlife Mississippi is continuing its popular Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. Through this program, Wildlife Mississippi will make seed available at a minimal cost.

The Wildlife Habitat Seed Program is designed to provide an incentive for landowners to establish and maintain food plots that will yield a variety of benefits to the landowner as well as to the species of wildlife he or she is managing.

Corn, soybean and grain sorghum will be available through Wildlife Mississippi's Spring 2015

Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. All seed is treated and has good germination rates. Wildlife Mississippi will also be taking pre-orders for winter wheat which will be distributed in the fall.

If planted properly, the various types of seed will be utilized by a variety of species of wildlife. White-tailed deer, turkeys, bobwhite quail, mourning doves, waterfowl and many species of songbirds will benefit from the plantings of the seed that is offered.

The guidelines regarding this program are simple and easy to follow. Anyone interested in obtaining seed should send a self-addressed, stamped envelope to Wildlife Mississippi with a request for an order form and planting recommendations for the seed. Wildlife Mississippi will be taking orders until March 6, 2015. This will allow Wildlife Mississippi to place the orders in a timely manner to ensure that they will be filled in time for the planting season.

Shipping and handling charges incurred by Wildlife Mississippi are included in the price of the seed. The costs will be \$18.00 per 50 lb. bag for corn, \$12.00 per 50 lb. bag for sorghum, \$14.00 per 50 lb. bag for Roundup Ready® soybeans and \$9.00 per 50 lb. bag of winter wheat. Pick up locations will be Amory, Greenville, Hattiesburg and Madison.

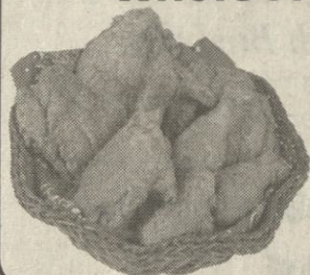

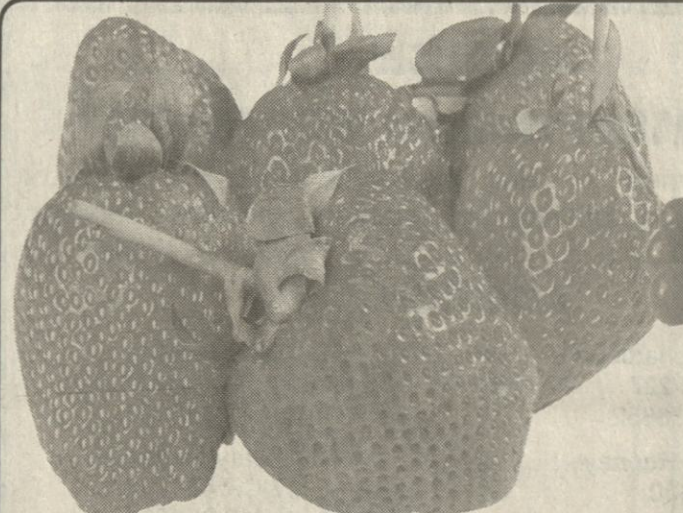

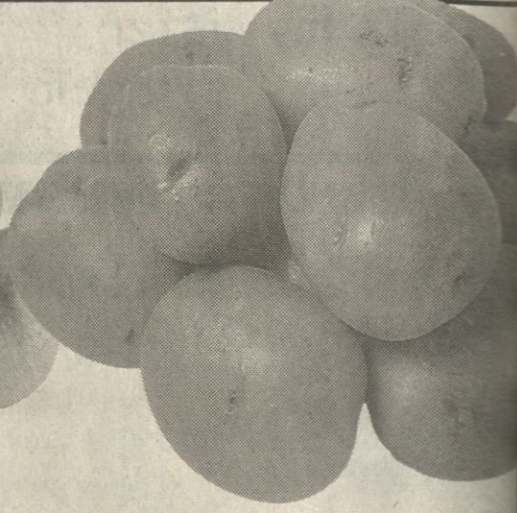

Mr. Alvia Blakney was our class favorite perhaps he was a new teacher when we were Freshmen and not much older than students.

I could not afford to college after graduation from Burnsville. I went to work in Memphis living at the YWCA working first at the body Hotel before a real job for Southern Telephone Company. In 1961 I moved to Chicago suburbs where I would remain for 46 years. I raised three daughters there, graduated from Wright College where I took over several years. My youngest daughter graduated from the garden, I graduated Elmhurst College. I had managed a degree. I made the List there even though I did need a tutor for So my Tishomingo education was a force.

Once my brother and his wife left Mississippi he could find work there three children moved into an apartment and the children went to local schools in the city. Before they moved to attend the given placement. Each passed the placement exactly they were here in Mississippi. Again, a Tishomingo County education.

Could schools have proved? There is room for improvement. I hear of young people purchasing school supplies with their own money. I am glad they raise. Was it a good teacher is a good teacher. 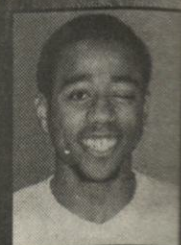

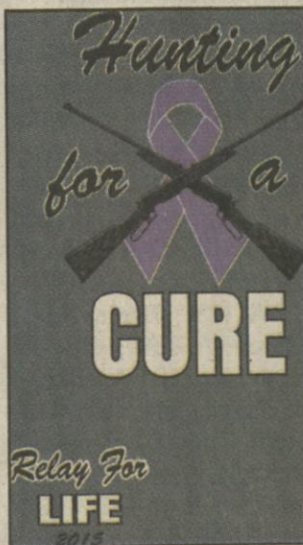

Southern Cornerstones

Transcribed by RaNae Vaughn from the Iuka Surname Society Newsletter, Fall 1980.

A. J. Counts, born June 22, 1833, died in New Salem Community August 3, 1888. He professed Christ and joined the Missionary Baptist Church in his youth.

A. W. Byram died March 16, 1889, of acute bronchitis. He was buried on a green hillside by Oak Farm Grange No. 530 of which he was a worthy member. Esq. T. B. Lindsey, W. M. of the Grange, performed the ceremony.

In May 1889, a strawberry festival was given for the purpose of finishing payment on the dome on the courthouse.

G. C. Dean met with a fatal accident on the Louisville, New Orleans and Texas Railroad in August 1889. He was caught under the coaches and had to

have both legs amputated. He died as a result. He was the son of Frank Dean of Tishomingo County.

Mary A. Smith, daughter of Benj. and Nancy Whitfield, was born November 1834 in Haywood County, Tenn. She professed religion in 1853 at HARRISES ARBOR, one mile north of Old Jacinto. She married Valentine Smith in 1856; died September 23, 1890.

Robert Rhear, born November 17, 1824, died October 30, 1890, at his home on Iuka and Tusculumbia Road near the state line in Colbert County, Ala. He was buried at Morris Hill Cemetery.

R. D. Goodman and Miss Columbia Foote were married at the home of the bride's mother on February 24, 1892; T. J. Davis, Esq.

Tom Gray and Miss Mae Barnett married

March 17, 1892, at the home of the bride.

Jesse Barnes and Miss Effie Long were quietly married near Red Sulphur Springs August 14, 1892.

Richard L. Brown of Texas and Miss Mattie Barnes of near Pickwick married August 15, 1892. They left shortly for their home in Texas.

Jack House and Frances Brown married at the bride's home near Short, Miss., August 28, 1892.

G. L. Wimbish has sold his Bear Creek farm to G. W. Patrick for \$1,000.—1892.

Mrs. C. L. Moss, born in Colbert County, Ala., March 26, 1836, was the daughter of Elder James A. Dorethitt, pioneer Baptist preacher of North Alabama. She joined Cane Creek Baptist Church, three miles south of Barton, Ala., in her 13th year. Came to

Iuka and lived with her sister, Mrs. Fielder, after her parents died. She married Capt. H. T. Moss May 20, 1861. She served Iuka Baptist Church for 26 years after joining in 1866. Mrs. Moss died September 17, 1892, and left her husband, four sons, and three daughters.

Mrs. Harriet S. Matthews, relict of the late A. T. Matthews and daughter of the late Samuel and Margaret Turner, was born at Athens, Ala., in 1828. She married young to the clerk in her father's store and soon moved to Eastport, Miss., where they lived until the completion of the railroad. She died December 27, 1892, at 65 years.

Mary Alice Pyle, infant and only child of J. A. E. and Alice Hyatt Pyle, born August 13, 1891, in Vernon, Texas, died January 10, 1893, in

Altus, Oklahoma (Greer Co.) She was reburied in Iuka, Mississippi, March 9, 1895. J. A. E. Pyle and family located in Iuka in 1893. On November 5, 1893, a 10-pound baby girl was born.

Died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary Bryant, in Clarksville, Texas, May 16, 1893, J. J. Cobb, age 76 years, of Tishomingo County.

Mrs. Mollie Davis, wife of George Davis, died September 2, 1893. She was an invalid.

In a fit of anger, 17-year-old Will Bray who lived four miles north of Burnsville, Miss., struck his sister, Sarah Ann Bray, 19 years of age, in left breast with his fist and she died instantly. Two years before, a member of this family accidentally shot and killed himself. A few weeks ago, another boy fell out of a tree and died

September 23, 1893. Dorman Glendon Hubbard, son of Mrs. E. A. Hubbard, married in October 1893. Thomas Marshall, at his home 12 miles from Iuka, February 1894, age 72.

Mrs. Amanda Wiley, wife of William Wiley, died suddenly in 1894, while sitting in yard talking with and daughter.

Dr. G. W. F. family of Haywood, Tenn., arrived in 1894 to make the for a while. Dr. F. a prominent physician of Humboldt Bay, made headquarters at the home of his in-law, J. A. Foote, opened a commission business at River, styled the River mission Company.

Great Truths In Small Packages (part XVIII)

Jude 1:4 says, "For there are certain men crept in unawares, who were before of old ordained to this condemnation, ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ." This verse gives us several clues as to how we can spot false teachers. First, it shows us that they seek to hide their true identity by creeping in unidentified into local fellowships and homes of believers. I always see red flags go up in my mind when someone tries to hide his identity, or the identity of the group of people with whom he is working. The devil is a master of deceit, and so are many of his followers! I hear people talk about the meetings they attend, in which they have contact with "masters" or "wise ones", or even with their departed loved ones. We should realize that such is nothing more or less than a contact with demons or fallen angels! The New Age philosophy has invaded the churches in our day, without even a recognition of it by many people. Why do so many people always want something new and more exciting, at least to them, than the eternal truths of the Word of God?

God said that the ungodly men who creep into congregations unawares were of old ordained to condemnation. Balaam is such a character, as is shown in Numbers chapters 22-25. He looks good to some people; he even delivers several messages from God, but he is a false prophet! Joshua 13:22 says that Israel killed him, because he was a soothsayer, meaning a fortune teller. We always need to pay close attention to the things and teachings that God has condemned in the Bible a long time ago.

There are two vitally important things that the false teachers in Jude's letter were perverting in their teachings. First, they were turning the grace of God into lasciviousness, which includes all kinds of filthiness, even sexual immorality.
