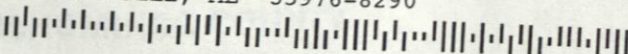

Water District Woes Lead Concerns at Presley Town Hall

Public Service Commissioner Brandon Presley hosted a "town hall" meeting last Thursday night at the Tishomingo County Courthouse, and was inundated with concerns over issues with a local water association.

About 40 concerned citizens lined out to hear Presley, who started with an update on getting people services they could get, like internet or cell phone service. Several people spoke of being just outside a service area and an established provider like AT&T or Frontier, but not being able to get service for any of several reasons.

Presley generally urged everyone with such concerns to provide him with their names and addresses, and even to collect information from neighbors who would also like to get the service.

"Numbers mean every-

thing," Presley explained.

When he and his staff could present numbers of residents who wanted to get a public utility, whether it is internet or water service, to a provider, it helps to show them exactly how many customers they could get if they extend service. This information can be provided to Presley's office at any time, he said.

"Having internet service is our 'electricity' of today," Presley explained. "Imagine where we would be if TVA hadn't have come in almost a hundred years ago and pushed for everyone to be provided with electricity. Our economy and our homes would be so far behind

Presley also urged those present to not fall for any of a number of scams that plague residents, especially older ones.

First Dog to Go to School in Tishomingo County

IMS seventh grader Connor Pannell has Type I diabetes, which means his sugar can fluctuate during the day. He has a new alert system to help him realize when his blood sugar levels are getting low or too high, and he will be carrying it with him all the time.

At his middle school last Friday, they had a special program so everyone could learn how the new system works, and that other students can't

mess with the new "system," which may prove to be a challenge...since Connor will be receiving his alerts from a very friendly-looking service dog named Bo, who will be by Connor's side each school day and at all school events.

At his middle school last Friday, they had a special program so everyone could learn how serious Connor's condition is, and understand the important impact Bo has in helping Connor manage his diabetes. For most, it will be

very challenging not to want to pet and play with Bo, since he seems very friendly. Bo will join Connor in his everyday routine including his school day, and at all school events.

School board officials, board of Alderman, and several others gathered Friday morning March 20 in the IMS auditorium along with the students to hear about how Bo, a big red retriever who was a

Spring "Renaissance" Celebration Planned for April 18

There is growing interest nationwide in "ole timey" activities good rural Southern folks member hearing their grandparents describe and Tishomingo County residents will have a chance to get some close-up experience with things like woodworking, pottery making, soap making, spinning and weaving and more, at a Renaissance Day planned April 18th.

The Tishomingo County Renaissance Day is being planned and hosted by the Tishomingo County Economic Development Foundation, Tishomingo County Tourism and the Tishomingo Historical Foundation. The festivities and activities will be located around the Old Tishomingo County

Courthouse Museum and Mineral Springs Park in Iuka from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Planners are creating a fun-filled and educational environment, steeped in history but having a forward-looking theme. Demonstrations and activities will include Blacksmithing, Soap Making, Campfire Cooking, Native American Interpretation, Rubbing Board Washing, Spinning & Wand weaving, Quilting, Crocheting, Knitting, Appliqueing, Pottery Making, Heritage Farm Tools Exhibits, Woodworking, Leatherworking, Museum Exhibits, and more. There will be lots of contests for all ages and prizes will be awarded.

"Renaissance is a French word meaning 're-birth' or 'new

beginning," explained Tishomingo Historical Foundation president Bill Gurley. "Each spring in our part of the country there is a renaissance of life from the doldrums of winter from blooming daffodils to planting of gardens."

The Renaissance, between the years 1400-1650, was a time of vibrancy of life and new creativity that sparked development of business, commerce, literature, sculpture, painting, music, mathematics and science. One of its major results was travel to the New World - America!

"We envision our Renaissance celebration evolving into a yearly event that will grow in scope and depth over the next few years," said Gurley.

County Students Will Not Have to Make Up "Snow" Days

In accordance with a state attorney general decision, the students at Tishomingo County schools will not have to make up the eight days they have missed due to inclement weather in the past couple months.

Superintendent Christie Holly reported this weekend that the county school district was allowed, along with others throughout the state, to waive the requirement to make up the eight days county students missed.

"Thankfully, Board

Policy and the job description for the Superintendent for Tishomingo County includes the authority to close school due to inclement weather. Therefore, we WILL NOT have to make up the 8 1/2 days missed due to the weather this year. The 2014-2015 school calendar is in effect and will be followed accordingly. That means, the Good Monday Holiday WILL be awarded and school will end for students on May 21st and will end for teachers and staff on May 22nd," said Holly's release.

Man Killed in Rock Crusher Road Accident

A Tishomingo man was killed in a one-vehicle accident last Thursday night on Rock Crusher Road.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, about 6:30 last Thursday, a 2001 Ford F150 pickup truck was traveling eastbound on County Road 957, about two miles east of Highway 25 when it left the road and went through a pasture fence. Cecil

Shane Arnold, 41, of Tishomingo, was thrown from the truck and he died from injuries sustained in the crash. The driver, Victoria Brown, was transported from the scene and treated at North Mississippi Medical Center, said Wilemon.

The investigation continues by the Tishomingo County Sheriff Department regarding the cause of the accident.

rescue from the Alcorn County Animal Shelter, will be by Connor's side each day at school. Special guest Charles Dwyer from Senatobia, Missis-

issippi, with Retrieving Freedom, was on hand to show how Bo's special training will help Connor manage his condition. Retrieving Freedom, Inc. is

a non-profit corporation that trains service dogs for placement with veterans, children with autism, and adults and children with diabetes.

Dwyer, who has been a guest on CBS Morning Show with service dogs, he has trained, was there to explain what he does and why Bo will be at all school functions with Connor and explain to the kids why it is so important not to touch Bo and to respect Connor and Bo. As diabetes alert dogs, the dogs are trained to detect by smell. A dog's nose is a million times more sensitive than a human's. The whole time he is with Connor, Bo is on alert for the symptoms that signal a drop or elevated levels of blood sugar, which if left untreated, could cause disorientation, confusion, temporary mobility impairment and a whole host of other compromising symptoms. Bo has been trained to paw at Connor if he senses the sugar levels dropping, and, indeed, he has already alerted him several times when Connor was feeling fine.

Connor may not be able to tell when his levels change, but when Bo alerts him, he can check his own sugar levels, and self-medicate with either his insulin pump, or by taking glucose tablets.

Bo was already Connor's personal dog; the Pannell family adopted him from the Alcorn County Animal Shelter when he was 8 months old.

"He and Connor immediately had a bond that was unexplainable," said mom Ginger Pannell.

This is why Connor's parents decided to have Bo tested for the diabetic alert program. Potential service dogs are tested for things like solid bone structure, such as hips and elbows, for the support of weight bearing loads, trainability and strength. They have to love other dogs and people, and be the perfect combination of confidence, calmness and assertiveness to complete the complex tasks that are required to be an assistance dog. It takes about two years for a dog to be fully trained for the important job.

Diabetes alert dogs can only be trained for Type 1 diabetics. Bo is still in training and the next few months will be an important time for Connor and Bo to bond and learn each other, which is why the other students have been asked to leave Bo alone and let him concentrate on Connor.

"I am very thankful to have Bo and appreciate everyone welcoming him and for donating to Retrieving Freedom," said Connor. "It hasn't been too bad so far, but some kids still want to touch him," said Connor Tuesday night at the ball-field.

Trainer Charles Dwyer had another service dog with him to demonstrate to the students a few things a service dog can do for his owner. Charles dropped his keys, wallet and credit card, and the dog retrieved them. When Charles was describing how service dogs can help veterans, he became emotional and the dog, sensing his distress, jumped up on Charles to hug him and try

to cheer him up.

Charles explained that veterans who are having trouble reconnecting with society after serving in a war zone, or ones suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder, can benefit by having the dog to care for and they enjoy the constant companionship.

Dwyer, an answer to many questions students had. Principal Monica Moss said she was pleased that the community and students got a chance to hear about and his special abilities.

"If someone calls you to tell you that you won money you didn't earn, it is a scam! Do not send money to them, do not give them access to accounts, just hang up on them!" urged Presley. He described several instances where callers from Jamaica or other offshore locations had swindled people out of hundreds and even thousands of dollars. The Public Service Commission can not do much about getting that money back, once it is gone.

The biggest issue Presley faced from his Tishomingo County constituents last Thursday is the ongoing issue of the Tishomingo County Water District (TCWD), and the condition of the aging

and complex system that has been leaking. This, combined with recently increased rates due to increased cost of the water the District buys from the City of Iuka, has meant drastically increased water bills, even for just a one or two person household. District customers complained that the District contractors have been unable to find leaks, and that the cost of leakage is being passed on to consumers.

Presley recently attended a meeting with TCWD customers at Iuka City Hall and says he understands the problems, but regrets that he can not do anything about the problem because the structure of the TCWD is an odd one, designed

by the legislature many years ago. The PSC has no power over it, like it does rural water associations or municipal utilities, which are organized differently and under the supervision of the PSC. The five board members are appointed on a rolling basis by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, and the District can't change into a water association, or other potentially more efficient management mechanism unless all five TCWD board members vote to dissolve the water district.

Presley repeated several times, "Your board of supervisors is who you need to talk to about this."

And he also urged customers to attend board

meetings and let their voices be heard.

At least one member, First District Brandon Grissom, at the last PSC meeting with TCWD customers. No supervisors were there Thursday night.

TCWD Board member Richard Bowers said that the TCWD is working to have identified and fixed. He also said that the board has reviewed the problem to see if they could give relief to customers with high bills, but they are limited, with the cost of system repairs and the water supply not being able to change at this time. They will try again in six months.

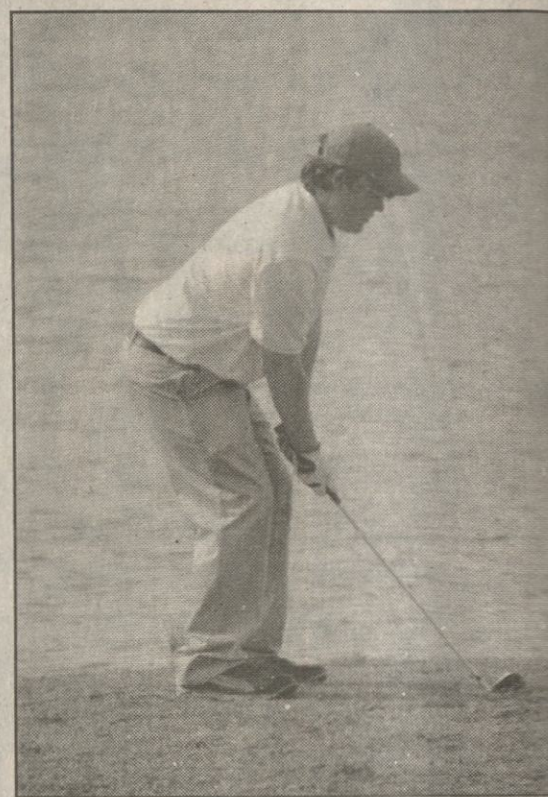

Kindergarten Registration for Tishomingo County School District

Tishomingo County School District will hold Kindergarten Registration on Friday, April 10, 2015, at the following schools: Belmont, Burnsville Elementary, and Tishomingo Elementary, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. for students who will be five (5) years old on or before September 1, 2015. The child must register at the school in which he/she is zoned to attend.

Parents/Guardians will need the following documents to register - certificate of birth, Immunization Compliance Form, Social Security card, and two (2) proofs of residency.

The Office of the State Auditor mandates two proofs of residency, and these documents must be on file before a child is officially enrolled in our district. The information required is to prove that each student physically resides full time, weekdays, and weekends, at the place of abode located within the limits of the school district. Please notice the requirements below and keep in mind that the proofs must be current. This means that a utility bill must be within 30 days of the date it is presented. Other documents must be the latest available. Example: Drivers license and automobile insurance must be current. All proofs must contain the child's physical address and date of proof. Listed below are items that will be accepted as proof:

- Apartment or Home Lease
- Automobile Registration/Tax
- Current Document from Government Agency proving residency in our district (Ex: DHS, Social Security)
- Driver's License or Firearms Permit (Only one can be accepted)
- Insurance: Auto or House
- Mortgage Documents or Property Tax

- Property Rental Agreement
- Social Security Document with current date
- Utility Bills: Electric Garbage Gas Internet/Phone (NOT wireless)

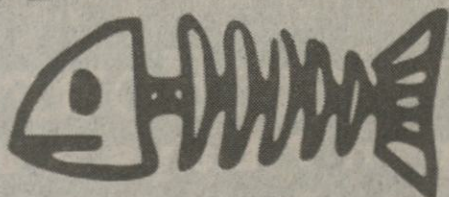

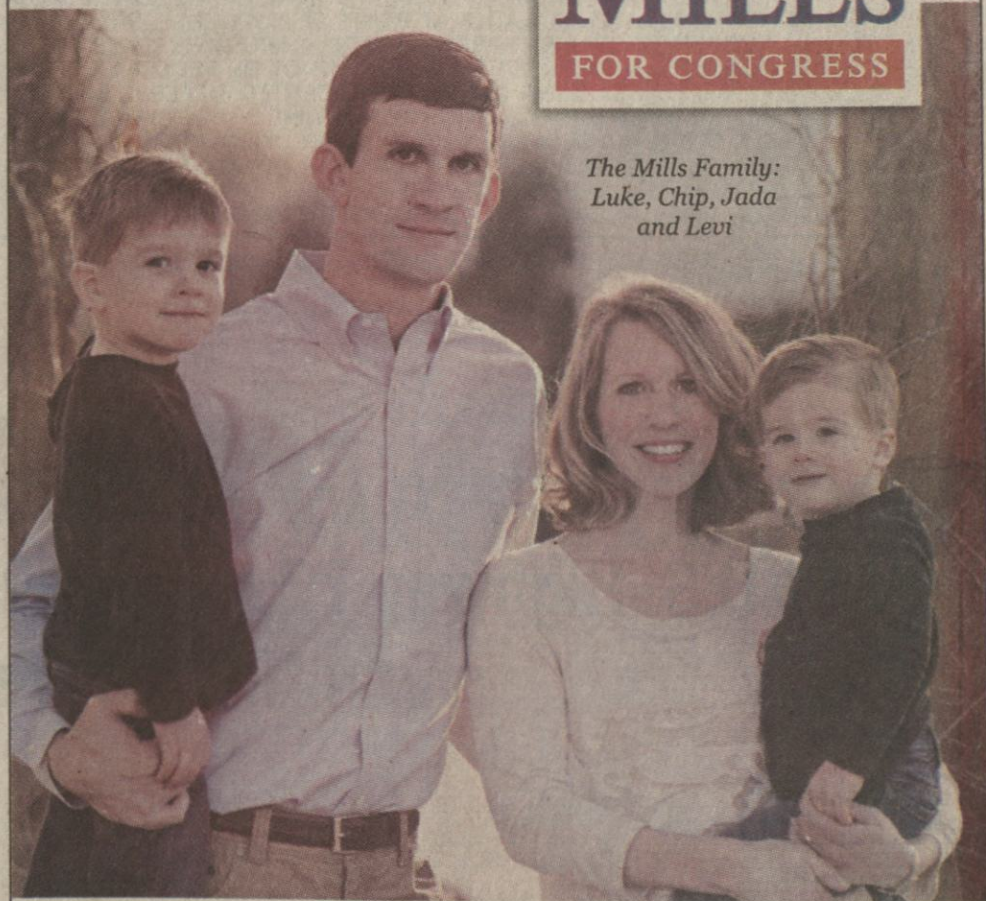

Great Truths In Small Packages (part XXII)

Jude verse 7 has to be mentioned again in order to tie it with the sins of Sodom mentioned in Ezekiel 16:48-52. Here is Jude 7: "Even as Sodom and Gomorrah, and the cities about them in like manner, giving themselves over to fornication, and going after strange flesh, are set forth for an example, suffering the vengeance of eternal fire." I mentioned in the last article that "strange flesh" means sexual union that God has not ordained. We have the same idea in I Kings 11:1: "But Solomon loved many strange women, together with the daughter of Pharaoh, women of the Moabites, Ammonites, Edomites, Zidonians, and Hittites."

Verse 2 tells us that God had forbidden Israel to marry women from these nations, as well as from other nations, not because of nationality, but because of religion. I Kings 11:4 says that when Solomon was old his wives turned away his heart after other gods. God has ordained that believers marry believers. I Corinthians chapter 7 indicates this, although a person already married to an unbeliever should not divorce her, if he becomes a believer and she does not. (See also II Corinthians 6:14-18 concerning 'wrong union between believers and unbelievers.)

Now we will look at Ezekiel 16:48-52: "As I live, saith the Lord God, Sodom thy sister hath not done, she nor her daughters, as thou (Jerusalem

and Judah, see context) hast done, thou and thy daughters. Behold this was the iniquity of thy sister Sodom, pride, fullness of bread, and abundance of idleness was in her and in her daughters, neither did she strengthen the hands of the poor and needy. And they were haughty, and committed abomination before Me: therefore I took them away as I saw good. Neither hath Samaria committed half of thy sins; but thou hast multiplied thine abominations more than they, and hast justified thy sisters in all thine abominations which thou hast done. Thou also, which hast judged thy sisters, bear thine own shame for thy sins that thou hast committed more abominable than they: they are more righteous than thou; yea, be thou confounded also, and bear thy shame, in that thou hast justified thy sisters." I cannot give every detail of all that is meant here, but the gist is that Sodom's "mother sin" was pride. Does that sound like anything we

are hearing today? Sodom had too much; they were too idle; they did not help their needy; they were haughty and they committed abomination, including homosexuality! It is often the case that one sin leads to another, so it was with Sodom. The shocker, however, is that Jerusalem and Judah had done worse than Sodom (please read the above verses again), thus, by their actions they were justifying Sodom and her daughters. Please do not miss what I am saying here: the sins of Sodom and the surrounding cities was terrible, but so were the sins of Jerusalem, perhaps because Jerusalem had an opportunity to hear the Word of God, while Sodom "had no Bible", for no Scripture had been written when Sodom was destroyed. Certainly, they were not innocent, but their judgment will not be as bad as Jerusalem's! (See Matthew 11:20-24 for Jesus' clear teaching on this!)

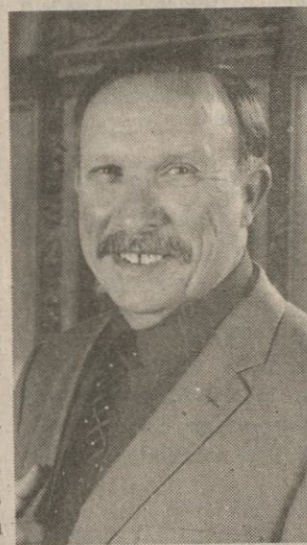

Telling the Stories

Robinson's 8th Graders Interview Area WWII Vets

Dwan Robinson's 8th graders, working with the Iuka Rotary, recently honored the county's remaining World War II veterans with a special luncheon. In addition, the students interviewed all the veterans, and provided us with the following histories.

James Edward Hudson, U.S. Army

James Edward Hudson, son of Florence Dexter and Milton E. Hudson, was born in Tishomingo County on June 21, 1919. His father was a farmer and a carpenter. He went to school at Helton, Central, and then Iuka High School. He entered the service at Fort Bliss, Texas, when he was 21. He was at Fort Bliss when he heard the news that Pearl Harbor had been bombed.

J.E. was in the First Cavalry of the U.S. Army. This was a horse-drawn artillery unit. He trained as a machine gunner. They had to take apart the gun and put it together blindfolded in case something happened at night. He also received a citation in rifle competition. He served at Camp Shelby, MS and Fort Bragg.

Mr. Hudson went overseas on the U.S.S. George Washington from Los Angeles to Brisbane, Australia, and then to the Philippines, Lady Island, and Luzon. J.E.'s most memorable experience was the day the Japanese surrendered. He returned to Tishomingo County and married Mae Romine, with whom he had corresponded from Australia. They had four children. J. E.'s wife died last year. He still resides in Iuka.

Aubrey Lavon Brown, U.S. Navy

Aubrey Lavon Brown, son of Nancy Renfroe and Walter Brown, was born

in Carthage, MS, on September 1, 1925. He was married to Merle Wilemon, and they had one adopted son, Paul Kim. His family was into cotton and cattle farming. Aubrey attended school in Lena, MS, in Leake County. Aubrey was at home listening to the radio when he heard that Pearl Harbor had been bombed. He was drafted at 18 but given a choice of which branch of service he preferred. He chose the Navy and trained in Illinois on Lake Michigan. There, he learned Navy terminology.

Aubrey went overseas on a Destroyer Escort Vessel. He worked as a machinist on the ship and was later a commissioned officer. He was involved at Okinawa. Mr. Brown remembered the fog being so thick you could cut it with a knife. He was able to identify the first enemy aircraft in the Strait of Manila. The name of Aubrey's ship was The U.S.S. William Seiverling. When they got the news that the war was over, their ship went to the Philippines, then sailed to Long Beach, California. His most memorable experience of the war was being the acting chaplain as his crew gathered in the mess hall to give thanks to God that the war was over.

Reuben E. Grisham, Jr., U.S. Army

Reuben E. Grisham, Jr. was born in Tishomingo County on September 12, 1923, to Bessie and Eric Grisham. His father was a farmer, and he attended Central School and the Iuka High School. He was drafted at age 21 into the U.S. Army. He entered the service at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, and then Camp Wheeler, Georgia. He was trained in infantry and be-

came a part of the 104th Infantry. Reuben specialized in the bazooka and was a sharpshooter. Mr. Grisham went to Germany and remembers being seasick on the journey. He received the Good Conduct Medal and a Purple Heart Medal. He was stationed in Germany, France, and Belgium. Reuben returned to New York. His most memorable experience was the night his buddy was killed standing next to him.

Reuben came home to Tishomingo County where he became a businessman in Iuka. He was married to the former Olene Dexter and had two children, Steve and Belinda. Reuben ran a business in Iuka for many years. He is now retired and still lives in Tishomingo County.

William A. Herron, U.S. Navy

William A. Herron, son of Allie Nelson and James Walter Herron, was born in Memphis, Tennessee, on July 2, 1925. His father worked for the Memphis Transit System. Bill went to Treadwell School in Memphis. He volunteered for the Navy rather than be drafted.

He went to San Diego and was trained to paint aircraft. On October 25, 1944, he was involved in helping to escort General MacArthur to the Philippines. The Japanese dropped a bomb on their ship. Bill took bomb shrapnel in both legs. He got a life jacket and got in the water before the ship blew up. He spent a couple of hours in the water before another ship picked up the survivors. This is the experience that Bill remembers most. He received the Purple Heart for his injuries. The two ships he went on were the U.S.S. Midway

and the St. Lo. He came back to San Diego to recover from his wounds.

After the war, he married Doris Gean, and they had two sons. He worked in the Memphis Transit System, as his father had, until he retired. He and his wife now reside in Iuka.

Billy H. Gurley, Air Force

Billy H. Gurley was the son of Stella Naomi Crawford and Curtis D. Gurley. He was born October 11, 1927 in Dorsey, Mississippi. His father was a farmer and a blacksmith. He went to school in Fulton and in Iuka. Billy was drafted at age 18 into the Air Force, then the Army. He trained at Camp Plauche in New Orleans. He got radar training and was the first NCO to fire a BT missile. He was part of the 67th Landing Crafts Unit.

Billy was waiting on the dock of a ship ready to go overseas when bells and sirens began to ring out that the "War is Over!" After the war, Billy made two trips to Korea. He and his wife, the former Emily Jo Moore, and their two children spent 3 years in Italy and toured Austria. Billy retired after 22 and a half years as a Master Sergeant on January 1, 1968. After the death of his wife, he married Ruby Lovelace. After her death, he now resides at the Carington House in Iuka.

Howard R. Bridges, U.S. Army

Howard R. Bridges, son of Clara Broughton and Marshall Bridges, was born in Iuka, Mississippi, on November 8, 1923. His family farmed for a living. Howard attended school at Salem and Holcut, Mississippi. He has always lived in Tishomingo County, mainly in the Rutledge-Salem community. Howard was drafted

into the U.S. Army and was sent to Camp Shelby, Mississippi. He attended infantry training at Camp Wheeler, Georgia, and was assigned to the 36th Infantry Division. Howard was transported overseas by ship and served in Italy, France, and Germany. He remembers being deathly seasick on the trip. He was shot in the leg in Italy. Howard said, "The worst thing I experienced was when I had to throw up my hands, drop my gun, and give up." Howard's prisoner of war experience at Camp Stalag included eating grass soup and blood sausage and sleeping in a boxcar. Howard remembers being in a cave when he saw the American tanks leading the way to their camp.

When the war was over, Howard married Catherine Frederick, and they had three sons. Mr. Bridges went to school on the GI Bill. He still resides in Iuka.

Clarence Henry Haynes, U.S. Army

Clarence Henry (Hank) Haynes, son of Laura and Donald Haynes, was born in Arkansas on September 29, 1923. His father worked for the telephone company. Hank went to school in Texas. He was in the CCC Camp in Colorado when he heard that the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor. He was drafted into the U.S. Army at 18. Hank trained in California and belonged to the First Cavalry. He went to Australia, then Japan on the Queen Mary. Hank received two Purple Hearts. He fought on the front lines, and one bullet hit his helmet and barely missed his spine.

After the war, Hank married Thelma. He has worked as a watch repairman, for General Motors, and for the telephone com-

pany. He now resides in Tishomingo County.

Talmadge W. Robertson, Marine Corps

Talmadge Webster Robertson was born in Tishomingo County on June 1925 to Beulah Long and Frank Robertson. His father ran a grocery store and a grist mill. Webster attended school at Central and Iuka High School. He was drafted before he finished high school when he was 18. He entered the Marine Corps. He trained at Camp Shelby, in Jackson, and Camp Elliott, in San Diego, California. At camp, Webster trained as a machine gun school and served in the Fourth Marine Regiment.

He went overseas with the President Polk and served in New Caledonia in the South Pacific, Guadalcanal, and Guam. A mortar shell exploded and Webster was hit with shrapnel. At Iuka, he was shot in the leg; the bullet moved and caused holes in his intestine. He was sent to Iuka and then to Camp to recuperate.

His most memorable experience was going into a cave once full of dead people. He thought Webster thought it was ironic that he was enough to serve his try but too young to or vote. After Webster recuperated, he came to Iuka. He married a woman named Dorothy Ann. He worked for a while at the Gulf Station. He went to Northeast and on to Mississippi State where he majored in education and served as a principal then later he went to

These distinguished veterans of the United States Armed Services included J. E. Hudson, Aubrey Brown, William Herberger, Webster Robertson, Thomas Cooper, Marlin G. Clark, Elwood Hall, Don Leonard, David Robinson, Leonard South, Paul Key, Raymond Miller, Iuka Rotarians Don Clark, Nathaniel Clark,

and Ben Earl Kitchens were assisted by veteran friends RaNae Vaughn, Jane Robinson and Dwan Robinson and many of Ms. Dwan's eighth grade history students in planning the event and interviewing the veterans. After an invocation by Richard Clark, a pledge of allegiance to the U.S. Flag was led by Don Grant. Joy Kitchens beautifully sang The Star Spangled Banner and WWII veteran Aubrey Brown played (on his guitar) and sang America the Beautiful for the crowd. Each veteran's dramatic and exciting story was told by the student that had interviewed them and

then Jane Robinson gave a brief history of those other veterans that had not been able to attend. When servicemen from Tishomingo County were inducted into the services during World War II, each man personally received a silver dollar handed to them by Mr. Claude Curtis, the famous 5-cent hamburger café owner in downtown Iuka. Clifford Franklin Page, U.S. Army

Clifford Franklin Page was born in Tishomingo County on January 17, 1904. He married Agnes Cox Page and they had three children: Millard, William, and James. He worked for a living, and he went to school at Rutledge-Salem. He had been out of school for some time when he was drafted into the U.S. Army. He was 18. He was sent to Camp Shelby in the Infantry Division. He was sent overseas in Florida and in Rome. He was shot in the leg and he was sent to the hospital. Mr. Cooper went overseas on the U.S.S. Wharton, which was a tanker that had been turned into a transport ship. He served in the Russell Islands near Guadalcanal and on Okinawa. He served in China. He was a part of the honor guard during the signing of the armistice in Peking, China. One of Mr. Cooper's most memorable experiences was when the atomic bomb was dropped.

Thomas returned from the war in 1946. He finished high school and went two years to Northeast. He moved north and went to Harvard Business School. He became the International Union Representative for the Boilermakers for the Great Lakes states. His offices were in Chicago. He was married to Lois Lindsey, and they had two children. He later married Joy Pruitt. He retired to Tishomingo County. He still resides in Iuka.

Marlin G. Clark, U.S. Navy

Marlin G. Clark, son of Lucille Gibson and Port Clark, was born in Grafton, Mississippi on January 12, 1924. His family did some logging and farming when he was young. He went to school in Hannonville, Mississippi. He later went to Clark College and William Cary College. He volunteered for the U.S. Navy and took marine training at Camp Perry, Virginia. His unit was the 112th U.S. Navy Seabees.

Marlin went overseas to Hawaii, Okinawa, and the Mariana Islands. Marlin remembers the group of Navajo Code Talkers. He also remembered taking care of wounded Japanese soldiers in caves.

Mr. Clark came home from the war in 1945. He married Dorothy North and has seven children. He has had many jobs in his lifetime. He has worked in construction, taught high school, worked in the oil fields and the shipyard. He still resides in Tishomingo County.

Oliver Paul Nunley, U.S. Navy, World War II

Oliver Paul Nunley, son of Oliver Perry Nunley and Nora Bell Vaughn, was born in Town Creek, Alabama, on November 3, 1926. His father was a farmer and operated a minnow business. Oliver's mother was a homemaker. The family moved to Tishomingo County on January 1, 1927, and Oliver lived in the area until October 2, 1948. He attended Snowdown Community School and T.T.I. in Prairie, Mississippi. Oliver was drafted into the U.S. Navy on November 5, 1944. He entered the service on January 6, 1945, at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Trained at gunnery school in Great Lakes, IL, he received more advanced gunnery training, including winch training and handling ammunition at Treasury Island, California. Oliver was stationed on the SS Bernard Victory.

The ship was attacked by a Japanese submarine, but ably fought off the enemy. He served in the South Pacific near the island of Laite, Philippines. He was discharged on February 5, 1946, at the Millington, Tennessee naval base. Oliver was a member of the Armed Guard, a special unit of the U.S. Navy. When the Japanese submarine attacked the SS Bernard Victory on its voyage to the Philippines, Oliver remembers seeing two torpedoes barely missing the ship. During that time, he was also saddened to learn that his brother, James Preston Nunley, was only about 400 miles from Oliver when he went down with his ship, the USS Indianapolis. Among humorous experiences, Oliver remembered meeting the natives on Samar Island in the Philippines and watching a native man trying to learn how to play a guitar with bear strings on it. During World War II, there were 144,970 personnel serving on 6,236 ships. Of these, 710 were sunk or damaged, with 1,810 killed in action. Armed Guard P.O.W. totaled 27 with 14 survivors. These armed guardsmen were established during World War II to protect against the German and Japanese submarines and planes. On March 27, 2002, at the home port of the U.S. Navy at Pascagoula, Mississippi, each member of the Armed Guard from Mississippi was presented the "Congressional Certificate of Appreciation."

Clifford Whitson Rast, U.S. Army, World War II

Clifford Whitson Rast, son of Mary and Walter Rast, was born in Tishomingo County on April 14, 1925. His father farmed and ran a sawmill. He attended Providence School. Clifford was drafted at 18 into the U.S. Army and trained at Camp Shelby. Clifford remembers taking supplies on mules through the snow in Italy. His feet froze in the process. He was homesick and glad to get home. His was married to Emma Parsons Rast. They have 3 children, 4 grandchildren, 5 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-great grandchildren.

After the war, Mr. Rast owned the C and J Auto Repair in Iuka.

Mr. Rast passed away on Sunday, February 8, 2015, at the age of 89. He was buried at Providence Cemetery with military honors.

Elwood Gale Hall, U.S. Navy, World War II

Elwood Gale Hall, son of Letha and Claude Hall, was born in Red Bay, Alabama on August 13, 1922. His father farmed for a living when he was young. He went to school at Red Bay. He entered the service when he was 22 and became part of the Navy Seabees. He took marine training in Providence, Rhode Island and also in California. Elwood went

overseas to Japan. He also spent some time in Alaska building runways. Mr. Hall was very proud of his Seabee Unit. After his discharge, he was married to Edna and had two children. Among humorous experiences, Mr. Hall remembers training with broom handles for rifles. He now resides in Tishomingo County.

William Thurman Epps, U.S. Army

William Thurman Epps was born to Annie Malone and Eldridge Epps on July 12, 1926, in Golden, Mississippi. Mr. Epps' father was a farmer, and he went to school at Dennis. Thurman was drafted at age 18 into the U.S. Army. He trained at Camp Blandon, Florida. His training was shortened, and he was sent to Germany. He was part of the First Division, 26th Infantry, 2nd Battalion, Company E, Third Platoon. He fought in Switzerland and received a battle star. He stayed for the trials of some of Hitler's soldiers. Thurman received the rank of Staff Sergeant. Thurman remembers when a bullet went through his tent.

Mr. Epps came to Belmont after his discharge. He went to school on the GI Bill and majored in farming. He married Nita Nix in 1950. He retired from Blue Bell in 1982. His wife died in 1997. Thurman still lives in Tishomingo County.

Joseph Leonard South, U.S. Army, World War II

Joseph Leonard South, son of Amanda and Joe Henry South, was born in Paden, Mississippi, on February 17, 1920. Leonard's family farmed for a living when he was young. He went to school in Paden.

Leonard was drafted into the U.S. Army at age 23. He did his basic training at Ft. McClellan, Alabama. He did heavy weapons training. He belonged to the 28th Division. Leonard was transported overseas on the Queen Elizabeth. He served in France, Germany, and Belgium. Leonard is married to Annie Lee South, and he had one son. He is a retired mail carrier and still resides in Paden, Mississippi.

Donald Glen Landrum, Sr., U.S. Air Force

Donald Glen Landrum, Sr. was born on August 29, 1925, in Florence, Alabama to Mae James and Alvin Landrum. He was one of 7 children. His father worked for TVA. He went to school in Florence and then Shiloh, Tennessee. He volunteered for the Air Force at the age of 19. He entered the Air Force at Ft. Oglethorpe in Tennessee. He also trained at Camp Shelby and in North Carolina. He trained at the Charleston Gunnery School before going overseas. His unit was the 15th Air Force. Their job was to load bombs onto planes. He participated in bombing from Italy to Germany on a B-24. He went

by boat named Robin to Italy and landed in Naples. He received two Presidential citations. He sailed home in July of 1945 on the Argentina.

The thing that Don will never forget was standing on a hill when a bomb went off on the plane, killing ten soldiers.

Donald was married to the former Nell Long and they have two children. After the war, he worked for the Southern Railroad, firing the coal engine. When he left the railroad, he worked construction and then bought a service station. He worked on a towboat and then at the paper mill in Counce, Tennessee. He retired from the paper mill in 1987. He now resides in Iuka with his wife Nell.

William D. Robinson, U.S. Air Force

William David Robinson was born on June 2, 1923, to Berdie Dexter and Lawrence Eugene Robinson in Tishomingo County. His family farmed for a living. He went to school at Holcut and later Mississippi State.

David remembers being at the country store and hearing on the radio that Pearl Harbor had been bombed. He volunteered for the Air Force. He went to Biloxi Air Base for gunner training and stayed there.

After the war, he was married in Detroit, Michigan to Rachel Walker. They had two children. He worked for Lincoln Motors. He returned to Tishomingo County and went to school on the GI Bill. He got a degree in education and taught for two years. He later worked for TVA and retired in 1983. After retirement, he worked on his farm and raised cattle. He still resides in Tishomingo County.

Raymond O'Neal Miller, U.S. Navy

Raymond O. Miller, son of Gladys Mae Wheeler and Olie Miller, was born on October 1, 1928, in Jackson, Tennessee. His father was a farmer and a carpenter. He went to school at Lester's Chapel, Maple Grove, and Malesus.

Raymond remembers being in school when he heard that Pearl Harbor had been bombed. He volunteered for the U.S. Navy at age 17. He took basic training in San Diego and took classes for fire and damage control and learned to be a ship fitter.

He was a part of the 40 Millimeter Quads with anti-aircraft guns. Raymond went overseas. The ships that he transported on were the Higby and the USS Brush DD745. Raymond made three trips overseas in four years. He was in Japan, Philippines, Okinawa, Singapore, Guam, Taipan, Shanghai, Hong Kong, Taiwan, India, Manila Bay, Subic Bay, and other places.

One of Raymond's most memorable experiences was having appendicitis and being strapped in a basket and passed from his ship to a medical ship.

He was also involved in helping save lives when the ship took on water.

After the war, Raymond returned to Bemis, Tennessee. While driving a taxi, he met his future wife, Nancy Richards. They had four children. Raymond worked for the railroad and then 30 years at Conalco Aluminum. He retired from Conalco on April 1, 1991. He and his wife came to Pickwick to fish. They were also fortunate enough to go to many Navy Reunions together. After his wife died, he moved to Tishomingo County.

Raymond still resides in Tishomingo County where he stays busy. He exercises, dances, attends church and Bible study.

James N. Thornton, U.S. Navy, World War II

James N. Thornton was born in Iuka. He joined the U.S. Navy when he was 16. He was involved in the Pacific and the Atlantic. He worked on an aircraft carrier for Air Force planes.

Mr. Thornton remembers being given a silver dollar when he left Iuka. After the war, "Red" returned to Tishomingo County. He married and had two children. He retired from the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. He still resides in Iuka.

Lester Dexter, U.S. Navy, World War II

Lester Dexter was born in Tishomingo County. He joined the U.S. Navy. Mr. Dexter sustained an injury to his ear while lying on the deck of a ship and a gunshot passed over him. He has been deaf in one ear ever since.

After the war, Mr. Dexter returned to Tishomingo County. He resides in Iuka.

George William Cutshall, U.S. Navy

George William Cutshall, son of Otha and Lawrence Cutshall, was born in Iuka on May 23, 1924. His father farmed for a living. George went to school in Iuka. He volunteered for the U.S. Navy at age 18. He did some training at a Naval Base in Idaho and Great Lakes, Illinois; He was a corpsman.

George served in the South Pacific. He was hit in the leg. He remembers being treated on the ship. He received the Purple Heart Medal.

Mr. Cutshall returned to Tishomingo County, married Margaret (Peggy) Cassidy, and they had three sons. George William was the sheriff of Tishomingo County and later worked for many years at the Cutshall Funeral Home. He still resides in Iuka.
