68 Given Notice as School System Works Budget Issues

School administrators gave notice to 68 non-certified employees throughout Tishomingo County School District last Wednesday that their contracts may not be renewed for the next school year. It was the first major action the District has taken to address the budget issues the administration has been dealing with since the beginning of the year.

Though the local social media network showed lots of people who were shocked at the layoffs, the school district administration has actually been meeting all semester with staff at all schools in the county, warning that some actions might have to be taken to get the school system back on budget.

"It's a matter of, if we keep going the way we are, with the funding we have, we will be jumping up against that legal reserve amount, so we are choosing to make all the hard choices now, up front," explained Superintendent Christie Holly.

By June, the District projects the reserve fund balance will be \$4.3 million, and state law requires that districts have 7 percent of district maintenance in reserve, which would be about \$1.5 million. 77 percent of the

district's spending is on instruction so that is a spending area the district has been forced to address.

The Legislature, by refusing to fund the Mississippi Adequate Education Program, has shorted Tishomingo County schools \$9 million since 2010 in MAEP funding, reminded Holly.

Other area districts have been making cuts to the budget since the 2008 economic downturn resulted in cuts in government funding in many areas, especially schools. Because Tishomingo County's system had ultra-conservative financial management and a nearly \$10 million reserve fund, TCSD has not had to make the cuts other area schools have... until now.

The assistants are on a twelve-month contract, and this is the time of year for re-hiring, explained Superintendent Holly last Thursday. Certified teachers are due to be notified if they will or will not be rehired by April 15th. Principals were all rehired in March.

There may be cuts made to the teaching staff, as well, Holly said.

"It's terrible to have to make these choices, we know families depend on these jobs, but we had to make the move," said Holly.

"If you ask an administrator if they want to give up an assistant or a teacher, they automatically say 'neither.' But in the end they need, and are required to have a teacher in every classroom."

With fringe benefits like insurance, an assistant costs the district, on average about \$20,000 annually, and a first year teacher costs about \$46,000, said Holly.

Assistants will be paid through July, Holly said. Some may be rehired, depending on federal program funds that are anticipated, she said. All the employees who received notice were also given a letter of interest to give to principals if they were interested in any of the positions that would be rehired, said Holly.

Special education assistants (SPED) will be hired back according to the needs of the students' individualized education plans in order to be in compliance with IDEA regulations, said Holly.

Teaching assistants are not required in any classrooms, clarified Holly. Kindergarten assistants are required for some accreditation requirements regarding numbers of students in classes.

Building Programs Not the Reason for School System Current Operating Budget Deficit

Due to some incorrect information that has been spread around recently, many people are inaccurately blaming recent school district building programs for the current shortfalls in the county schools' operating budget, but the problem is just more basic than that says a former superintendent.

"There's more money going out than coming in - in the operations and maintenance fund," said former superintendent Malcolm Kuykendall in a recent series of interviews. The building fund is separate from that and payments made on debt incurred from building projects are not what is hurting the district now, he said in response to critics who have been blaming Kuykendall for budget woes the district is now experiencing.

Administration Finance Director Beth White clarified that in simple terms, there are two separate funds used in the district - one for day to day operations and maintenance and one for building, repair and buses.

The operations and maintenance budget pays teacher salaries, and administrative salaries, building operation and maintenance cost, transportation and food service. What doesn't get spent on day-to-day expenses goes into a reserve.

In years past, the reserve has been nearly \$10 million, and the district, especially Kuykendall, was criticized for "sitting on" such a huge sum of reserve funds.

Another separate fund is kept for buildings, maintenance and repair of buildings, and purchases of buses. This building fund is fed by 3 mills of the 7 mills the school district gets from county taxes.

"The 3 mills had been on the

books for many years - before my years as superintendent," explained Kuykendall. The three mills are allowed by state law and supply districts with a building fund. It goes into a fund separate from the operating budget and is only used for building projects or buses. If the district lets the 3 mills go back to the county, the county will use the funds instead - or they could reduce taxes.

In 2010, the district was able to participate in a low-interest (1.05 percent) loan program under the ARRA (American Recovery & Reinvestment Act). With \$3 million of that loan amount, combined with \$1,600,000 borrowed on a traditional note (4.03 percent) the school built the following that are now being paid off by interest and principal from the 3 mill fund:

- Burnsville: auditorium, air condition PE gym, re-roof band hall
- Tishomingo: auditorium refurbishment, kitchen repair for combi-oven, tile replacement in cafeteria, air condition PE gym
- Belmont: auditorium, two classrooms, kitchen repair for combi-oven
- TCCTC: truck, door replacement
- Iuka Elementary: two new classrooms w/restrooms, kitchen repair for combi-oven
- Iuka Middle: windows, kitchen repair for combi-oven
- TCHS: multipurpose athletic building, refurbish track/pole vault

In addition to employing many people by the local contractors who did the work at all the campuses in the district,

each campus received much-needed repairs and additions, explained Kuykendall.

Repayments started on those loans in 2010, and were all made from the 3 mill fund, not the operating budget. In 2010 the first payment was made and the district had an \$8 million reserve; in 2011, another payment was made and the reserve was about \$9 million, and in 2012, Kuykendall's last year, the reserve had grown to \$9,963,895.

"This shows that the ARRA era construction had no effect on the operating budget or the reserve money of the District," explained Kuykendall.

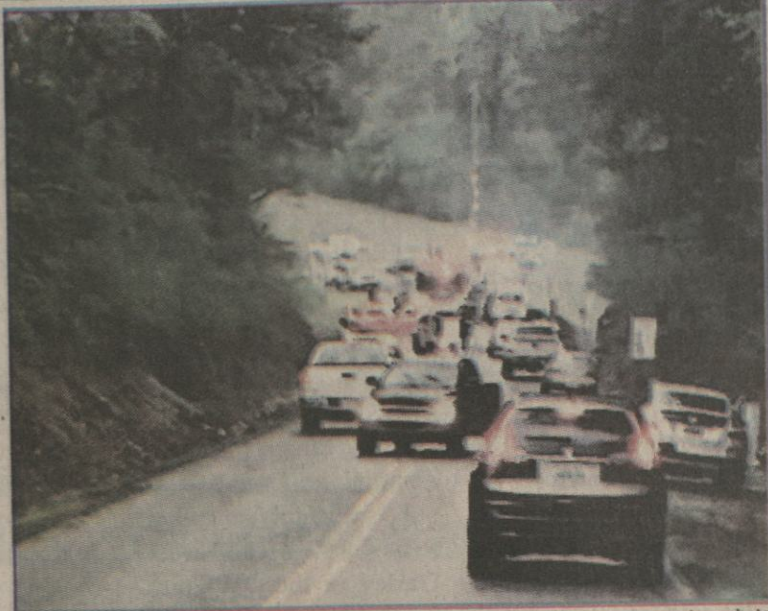
In some instances, the district has used reserve funds for buildings. The district was able to complete and pay for the Iuka Middle School multipurpose auditorium/gym, and the new gym at Belmont which were completed in February 2008.

"Those were paid for the day they were completed," said Kuykendall.

During the two years that Benny McClung was superintendent, some of the nearly \$10 million in reserve was spent on buildings, reported financial director Beth White.

\$355,895 of the reserve was spent on buildings including field houses at Tishomingo and Burnsville, and additions totaling \$230,983 at the central office.

Also, raises were given across the board to teachers and coaches supplements were increased to make them more competitive with area schools. That turned out to be bad timing, because then the legislature authorized raises for teachers, as well, and the district had to fund the fringe benefits that go along with the mandated raises.

Community Shocked by Deaths of Two Former Students in Birmingham Accident

The Iuka community was shocked to hear of the deaths of two of its former students - a brother and sister - who were killed in a crash on their way home from high school soccer practice near Birmingham.

The Jefferson County, Alabama, Coroner's Office identified the victims as Peyton Christopher Spain, 17, and Erin Ashley Spain, 15. Both were students at Hueytown High School and were on the school's competitive soccer teams.

"They were very, very sweet, popular kids," said principal Gayle Gober. "It's a tragic time for us. The students understandably are very upset."

The crash happened about 5:30 p.m. Monday near the Rock Creek Road bridge. Authorities said Peyton was driving, and Erin was in the passenger's seat. They were traveling northbound on Rock Creek Road in a Nissan Altima when the car left the roadway. The roads were wet, but authorities aren't yet sure if weather was a factor.

The car came back onto the road and crossed over into the southbound lane of the two-lane road. It was sideways in the road when it was struck by an oncoming Nissan Pathfinder.

Erin was pronounced dead

on the scene at 5:32 p.m. Peyton was taken to UAB Hospital where he was pronounced dead at 5:05 a.m. Both attended First Baptist Church of Pleasant Grove where they were active in the youth group.

Gober said Erin was in the 9th grade and Peyton in the 10th grade. They both played competitive soccer for the high school and were on their way home from afternoon practice when they were killed.

School officials and counselors met separately this morning with the teammates of Erin and Peyton. "Everyone seemed to love them," Gober said. "We were glad they were a part of our student body and they will be missed."

"It's just a tragic day for us," she said. "Helping our students cope with it is our primary focus today."

Renaissance Day April 18th Will Showcase Local Talents & Skills

Saturday, April 18th the fun in Iuka will be of the ole-timey variety, with demonstrations and contests of the kind country folks enjoyed years ago.

Renaissance Day, on the grounds of the Old Courthouse Museum in Iuka, will be a showcase of skills, arts, and handcrafts that reflect the strong heritage of the people who made Tishomingo County what it is today.

Renaissance means "rebirth" but it also is used - as in "renaissance man" - to describe a person who can do just about anything - from running a store to making their own soap, clothing and textiles, and keeping a farm going to sustain a family.

"In years past, folks in Tishomingo County were self sufficient," explains Renaissance organizer Bill Gurley, of the Old Courthouse Museum. "Whatever they needed, they made or purchased from local sources. From mattresses to soap; wood to burn to heat their homes, and corn to feed families and livestock, people 'did it all' to a greater extent to what we do now and we want to help teach a new generation about these skills."

Around the Courthouse during the Renaissance Day, there will be demonstrations of lots of crafts and skills. The Tombigbee Pioneers will be demonstrating with historical exhibits. Local dul-

cimer groups will provide the background music. Local Boy Scouts will be demonstrating campfire cooking and there may be some samples of campfire-cooked cornbread and stew. Belmont farmers who raise milk goats will be showing them off, and there will likely be a chance to try your hand at this tricky milking process! There will also be demonstrations of old farm equipment, spinning yard from wool and other fibers, weaving, quilting and more!

For the younger set, there will be sack races, egg-on-the-spoon races, and other fun old-fashioned contests.

The event is being

organized by the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse Museum with representatives from many of the county's organizations, including 4-H, Rotary, the Needle Chasers

Quilt Guild, homemaker volunteer groups, and more. For additional details and information, feel free to call the Old Courthouse Museum.

If you won't be available to vote in person May 21st, you may come to the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office in the Courthouse in Iuka to vote by absentee Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The clerk's office will also be open on Saturdays, May 2nd and May 9th, from 8 a.m. until 12 noon for absentee voting. All voters who vote by absentee in the clerk's office will be required to show a photo ID. Also, all voters who go to the voting precincts on election day will be required to show a photo ID.

"We encourage those who need to vote by mail to call our office as soon as possible so they will have ample time to go through the absentee process," said Circuit Clerk Donna Dill.

When an absentee ballot is requested, an application for an absentee ballot will first be mailed to the voter. This application shall be completed by the absentee voter and mailed back to the Circuit Clerk's Office. When the application is received, the ballot will be mailed to the voter. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered to anyone.

Any registered voter is eligible to vote by absentee in the clerk's office, but only five groups are allowed to vote absentee by mail. These five groups are: (1) A registered voter who is 65 years of age or older; (2) A registered voter who is temporarily residing outside the county; (3) A registered voter who is temporarily or permanently physically disabled; and or; (4) A registered voter who is the parent, spouse or dependent of a temporarily or permanently physically disabled person who is hospitalized outside the county or more than 50 miles away from

his/her residence and will be with that person on Election Day. (5) All registered voters who are members of the Armed Services, their spouses, dependents, and overseas citizens who fall under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA).

All absentee applications and ballot envelopes must be notarized except for a registered voter who is physically disabled, either permanently or temporarily. The disabled voter's application and ballot envelope must be witnessed and signed by a person 18 years of age or older.

All absentee ballots

requested by mail must be sent by mail to the voter and they must be returned by mail to the clerk's office.

No absentee ballots may be hand delivered.

Friday, April 10, will be the last day a person may register to vote and be eligible to vote in the May 12 Special Election.

Saturday, May 9, will be the last day to vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office for the May 21 Special Election.

All mailed absentee ballots must be received by 5 p.m. on Monday, May 11th, in order to be eligible to be counted for the May 12, 2015 Special Election.

For several years, ef-
fort has been made to find
the identities of the fallen
soldiers in the bloody
Battle of Iuka. *Historians Of Tishomingo MS*
continues on with this
research, and on April
04, 2015, they met at
Oak Grove Cemetery, in
Iuka, to place flowers at
the headstone of Fair-
fax Washington, 38th MS
Reg't. CSA. We would like
to share his story.....

Fairfax Washington

The bloody Battle of
Iuka, fought on Septem-
ber 19, 1862, took the
lives of over two hundred
soldiers from each side of
the conflict. One of these
soldiers was young Fair-
fax Washington, age 19,
Ordnance Sergeant, 38th
Mississippi, CSA. Fair-
fax had a leg amputated,
due to a wound, and later
died on October 02 in the
home of Rev. William
McKnight. Fairfax was
buried in the McKnight
family plot in Oak Grove
Cemetery in Iuka.

Louisa Bell, the sister
of Fairfax, left provisions
in her will, probated in
Harrison County, MS.,
in 1911, for a marker
for her brothers grave.

This marker would later
be removed for cleaning
before a bicentennial cel-
ebration and was not re-
turned for several years,
however, it has now been
returned to its proper
place.

Not only did Fairfax
lose his life for his country,
research shows him to
be the first cousin, three
times removed, of the
"Father of Our Coun-
try," George Washing-
ton. His parents were
Fairfax Washington, Sr.
and Sarah J. Richards
Washington who moved
to Harrison County, MS.
before 1850.

Throughout the
years, research has been
done to identify the sol-
diers who died in the
Battle of Iuka. The in-
ternet has proved to be
a useful tool for this
identification process.
A message was posted
about Fairfax Washing-
ton in *The Mississippi* in
the Civil War message

board. A few years later,
in 2012, a Civil War im-
age collector came forth
and shared a photograph
that he had identified
by this message board
post. The image had
a lock of hair encased
with it, and a note stat-
ing "A lock of hair from
my darling brother Fax.
Accidentally wounded
September 19th and died
October 02, at Iuka, MS.
Cut when he died at 3 1/2
PM."

Just before the 150th
anniversary of the Battle
of Iuka, serendipity al-
lowed Fairfax Washing-
ton's image to be seen.
The saga of Fairfax
Washington will con-
tinue to live on in Iuka's
history, his life story has
been pieced together
throughout the years.

Countless other life
stories remain hidden in
unknown graves, waiting
for historians to uncover
them.

Conservation Corner by James L. Cummins

Kudzu

Introduced from Japan into the United States in 1876, kudzu was originally promoted as a forage crop and an ornamental plant. Kudzu has been given several nicknames such as foot-a-night vine, mile-a-minute vine and the vine that ate the South are a few such nicknames.

Kudzu can be used by grazing animals because it is high in quality as forage and livestock greatly enjoy it. Enjoyed up until frost and even slightly after, kudzu hay typically has a 17 percent crude protein content and over 60 percent total digestible nutrient value. Though difficult to bale, the quality of the hay also decreases, however, as vine content increases over leaf content.

Kudzu has also been used as a form of erosion

control and also a soil enhancer. As a legume, it increases the nitrogen in the soil and its deep taproots transfer valuable minerals from the subsoil to the topsoil. While the vine does help to prevent soil erosion, the vine also destroys valuable forests by preventing trees from getting enough sunlight. This problem led Dr. James H. Miller of the U.S. Forest Service to research methods for killing kudzu. In his 18 years of research, Dr. Miller found that one herbicide actually advanced kudzu growth while many others had little to no effect. Therefore, at present, for successful long-term control of kudzu, the removal or destruction of the root crown and all rooting runners is the best chance for eradication. But note that if any

portion of a root crown remains after attempted removal, kudzu will grow back.

The Harvard Medical School has been studying kudzu as a possible treatment for alcoholism using an extracted compound, daidzin (produces an anti-drinking effect), from the plant. The mechanism for this treatment is not yet established but the outlook is good. Kudzu root compounds have also been shown to affect serotonin which is a key in treating depression. The root compounds have also proven valuable in fighting headaches.

Also recommended for treating allergies and diarrhea, the Chinese consider kudzu to be a fundamental herb and use it to treat things such as tinnitus and vertigo. Research

in mice suggests that kudzu will one day be used to control some post-menopausal symptoms such as type 2 diabetes and hypertension.

The problem with kudzu is that it just grows TOO well. The climate of the Southeastern United States is ideal for kudzu, and these conditions—hot, humid summers, frequent rainfall, moderate temperatures and no natural predators—translates to growth totals of over 60 feet each year! This led to kudzu being named a pest weed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1953.



Great Truths In Small Packages

(part XXIV)

Jude verses 8-10 says, "Likewise also these filthy dreamers defile the flesh, despise dominion, and speak evil of dignities. Yet Michael the archangel, when contending with the devil he disputed about the body of Moses, durst not bring against him a railing accusation, but said, The Lord rebuke thee. But these speak evil of those things which they know not: but what they know naturally, as brute beasts, in those things they corrupt themselves." This little one chapter book is jam-packed with interesting information, some of which we may not fully understand this side of heaven! The Book of Jude is very similar to the second chapter of II Peter, so you may want to read that chapter. Jude mentions those who are filthy dreamers that defile the flesh, and this could characterize many in America in our day! I do not think that we have come to the place where we are in this nation by accident! No, there has been a diabolical scheme that Satan has been working on this country for several decades, basically ever since Hollywood "took over" the minds of so many in America! I am not against everything Hollywood produces, but I am against those things that excite sensual passions and lead people to seek fulfillment of their lusts in avenues that are outside the will of God and the teaching of the Bible! 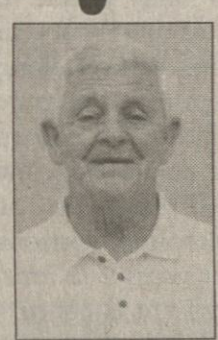

United Daughters of the Confederacy Met

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone #394 met March 17th at 4 p.m. at the Tishomingo Co. Archives and History Museum (old courthouse). We completed the UDC Rituals and singing of "Dixie" and President Sharon Hairrell opened the meeting. Those presented were Mary Ledbetter, Eunell Handy, Vicki Durham, Sharon Hairrell and visitor, Austin Hairrell. The minutes from the last meeting was read and approved. Treasure/Vice President Eunell Handy gave the treasure report and it was approved. Registrar Vickie Durham gave us an update on applications that she is working on and what she needed. Chaplin Mary Ledbetter had no report to be given. Old business was how to encourage new membership. We decided to have applications for UDC at the DAR workshop that was held March 21st at the Iuka Public Library.

New business was planning a program for "The National Confederate Day" April 26th. We will have our program April 25th at 11 a.m. to honor our Confederate Ancestors. We will place a wreath on the Confeder-

ate Monument. This will take place at the Tishomingo Archives and History Museum. The public is invited to attend.

Before our regular program, Sharon Hairrell shared an article that was in the Corinth Paper on "Jack Hinson, Sniper," who has refused to take sides until the Union soldiers killed two of his sons who were hunting for game. The Union (5th Iowa Calvary) then decapitate their heads and hung them on the gate post. Jack Hinson was responsible for killing at least 100 union soldiers and putting a mark on his rifle for each one.

Vickie Durham then gave her program on the "Nancy Hart Rifles". In general women during the war stay at home and took care of family and land. They also took care of their town.

Two of the LaGrange soldiers wives formed a group of all women and they called themselves "The Nancy Hart Rifles". Nearly all the women in LaGrange were mustered in. There was a physician who remained in town because of a physical disability, and he taught the women to load and fire the guns. The women

drilled twice a week.

They would march through the streets with guns on their shoulders and flying banners. They were never called to active duty.

When Fort Tyler fell, Union Col. Oscar LaGrange was marching to the town of LaGrange with the intent to burn the houses and destroying it. Capt. Mrs. Morgan Brown negotiated to spare the town and residents and in return the "Nancy Hart Rifles" would feed the Union and Confederate troops. The Union soldiers did spare their town but they destroyed warehouses, businesses and railroads, anything that would help the confederates in their war effort, without firing a shot the "Nancy Hart Rifles" saved LaGrange, its homes and residents.
