the store carrying a firearm and brandishing it in the vicinity of civilians before ultimately pointing and firing his weapon in the direction of Chief Stringer, Officer Marlar and MDWFP Officer Voyles," stated the report. "Therefore, the use of deadly force to eliminate Means' deadly threats and/or serious injuries to law enforcement officers and civilians inside Walmart were justified and no criminal charges will be filed or recommended by MBI."

The report was presented by ADA Bowen to a Tishomingo

County Grand Jury last Thursday and they reviewed all the evidence and investigation reports. The grand jury concurred with MBI and District Attorney Trent Kelly that no further action was called for.

"They used a tremendous amount of restraint and good judgment," said ADA Bowen. "The officers were faced with an imminent danger to the public and they used every means to avoid loss of life. They did everything they could to not use deadly force, and their actions minimized the threat of further

injury to the public, Walmart employees and the other responding officers."

According to the crime lab report, blood levels of 200-600 ng/mL have been reported in methamphetamine abusers who exhibit violent and irrational behavior. High doses of meth can also elicit restlessness, confusion, hallucinations, circulatory collapse and convulsions. Means' level of meth was replease see

#### ays are Numbered Cicadas'

With scary red, beady eyes and high-pitched communal buzzing that can make it hard to hear outside, the 13-year cicadas are starting to wear out their welcome throughout Mississippi.

We don't have much longer to wait, say entomologists (bug experts). They only live about a month, so they should start gradually drawing down in numbers, having done what they came for - make enough noise to attract a lady cicada, and woo her into making some baby cicadas that we will hear from again in 13 more years.

Beginning in May, periodical cicadas started emerging from the ground across Mississippi

These red-eyed bugs are different from the cicadas that we see every summer.

"They're 13-year cicadas. There are three different broods of 13-year cicadas in the world, but Mississippi is the only state with all three,' said Blake Layton, entomologist with the Mississippi State University Extension Service.

The nymphs of periodical cicadas live underground, sucking on tree roots, for 13 years, until they emerge. They leave their shells behind as adults, and crawl into trees to find a mate. That's what all the buzzing or singing is about. Males trying to find their lady love.

Male periodical cicadas produce "songs" using a pair of tymbals found on the first abdominal segment. A lone male cicada makes a lot of racket or, if you prefer, music. A few hundred sound like a droning chorus. And a few thousand sound more like a NASCAR race, almost deafening!

"This is an amazing natural phenomenon, like the monarch butterfly," Layton said.

But a few days after that first story you hear about the amazing phenomenon of how bug larvae know, as a group, to emerge after 13 years, it gets pretty easy to get tired of their love songs.

These days, everywhere you go, you hear, "When are these things going to go away?"

Layton reports, "It should only last about a month, before they find their mates, lay eggs and die. Those eggs become nymphs who then crawl back down into the ground, to wait for another 13 years."

#### Not Locusts 1

Periodical cicadas are often referred to as "locusts" but that's a misnomer. Locusts are a type of grasshopper. Layton says cicadas likely got that name from early settlers who had never seen these insects before, and then saw them in "plague numbers."

With their red eyes and black and orange body - they look scary - but they're not poisonous or venomous. And even though they have "piercing, sucking mouth parts," they're not likely to bite. Layton has heard of people who were bitten by cicadas before, but he has yet to experience it.

Their mouths are designed to suck on tree roots, and eat plants. You might see some pencil-sized limbs break where the adults lay their eggs. But Layton says it won't cause long-term damage to mature trees. It can cause problems for younger trees.

Periodical cicadas have been around a long time, maybe even as far back as when the glaciers melted. And while birds love to snack on them, there is no predator that thrives in the great numbers, with an identical lifecycle to these cicadas. That is why they've survived so long.

crat Walter Zinn in the Tuesday runoff in the state's 1st District, encompassing all or part of 22 northern counties.

The 49-year-old Kelly is a district attorney for about onethird of the congressional district, and 34-year-old Zinn is an attorney and political consultant

Kelly will finish a two-year term started by Republican Rep. Alan Nunnelee, who died of brain cancer in February.

# **Friday Michelle Byrom Hearing Postponed**

Former death row inmate Michelle Byrom was scheduled for a hearing in Tishomingo County Circuit Court Friday, but it has been rescheduled at the request of the judge.

According to the District Attorney's office, Byrom was supposed to have a hearing at 10 a.m. Friday. Judge Paul Funderburk requested the change in schedule, and a date was not known at press time.

Byrom's death sentence for her conviction in a murderfor-hire scheme resulting in the 1999 death of her husband Edward Byrom, Sr. was overturned

last year by the Mississippi Supreme Court, after 14 years on death row. A new trial with a new judge was ordered and Byrom has been housed at the Tishomingo County Jail since late last year. A trial date of September 2015 had previously been announced by the District Attorney's office.

Since the 2000 conviction was essentially overturned, the prosecution/defense Byrom process is starting from square one. Often, when a hearing is

ported to be 720 ng/mL. Means also had elevated levels of amphetamine, according to the report. Overdose of amphetamine can produce restlessness, hyperthermia, convulsions, hallucinations, respiratory and or cardiac failure.

Surveillance video and the MBI report of the February 15th event at the Walmart on Battleground Drive depict a highly agitated Howard Brent Means, Jr. interacting with police officers who were trying to convince him to put down his weapon and/or exit the building. For what seemed endless moments, Chief Stringer tried to talk down an increasingly aggressive Means who kept shouting, "You killed my family!" while raising his shotgun in a threatening manner first toward Chief Stringer, Officer Marlar and Officer Anita Mitchell in the front of the store, and later toward Stringer, Marlar and Voyles when they had him penned in near the lay-away desk in the rear of the store.

scheduled prior to a trial, it is for the judge to hear motions or a plea arrangement.

Byrom has already served 14 years - much longer than two others connected with the alleged conspiracy that resulted in her husband's death. Her son, Edward Byrom, Jr., and another testified against Michelle Byrom as part of a plea bargain and they both served short sentences.

Scholarship Award Correction

The report detailed the events starting about 6 p.m. February 15th when Means started the evening by erratically driving around the pumps at the BP, and then the Shell service station at the Quitman and Battleground intersection in Iuka. When Officers Anita Mitchell and Marlar called in Chief Randy Stringer, Means evaded attempts to block him in, and he hit Stringer's truck and sped off south to Walmart. The ensuing pursuit led them past Mississippi Wildlife officer Michael Voyles, through the Walmart parking lot and back onto Battleground Drive, back down to the BP and then

back to Walmart. After arriving at Walmart, Means exited his vehicle, carrying a shotgun, near the front entrance and entered the store at 6:10 p.m., according to surveillance tape. Chief Stringer made his way toward the service desk, and began a dialogue with Means who was near the cash registers, where he appeared to load his firearm. Stringer instructed all civilian customers and employees to go to the back of the store and then continued to try to talk Means into surrendering peacefully. Means would respond with, "You killed my family!" This dialogue continued for several minutes, all the while Means was raising his gun in a threatening manner toward Chief Stringer, and Officers Marlar and Mitchell while screaming, "You killed my family!"

According to the report, Stringer determined that the threat was escalating, and when Means raised his weapon again toward the officers, Stringer fired a round in the direction of Means, and that discharge caused an exchange of gunfire between Stringer, Marlar, Voyles, and Means. In that exchange, Means fired his shotgun in the direction of Stringer, causing injury with what appeared to be the wadding inside the shotgun shell to the inside thigh area of Stringer. The buckshot projectiles were recovered from the children's clothes behind the area where Chief Stringer was standing.

After the initial exchange of gunfire, Means headed toward the back of the store, where civilians had been sent, causing a heightened sense of danger and fear for the safety of not only law enforcement, but also the civilians

Near the jewelry counter officers again confronted Means, asking him to lower his weapon, but he responded again with his claim of "You killed my family!" Voyles reported that he recalls Means saying they had shot him, and Voyles asked him if he needed an ambulance.

By 6:23 p.m., Means established a position in the back hallway between the lay-a-way desk and the restrooms, and officers feared for civilians they thought were in that area. Officer Marlar determined there were civilians near where Means had taken a position, and Stringer and Voyles positioned themselves at the end of the aisle where they could keep visual contact with Means.

> Observing surveil-

lance of what turned out to be the final moments of the standoff, Means was visibly frantic and agitated, repeatedly swinging around and pointing the gun toward where he could hear the officers talking to him. Stringer pointed out to Means more than once that there was an exit door right behind him, and all he had to do was walk out the door and leave the store. Means instead grew visibly more aggressive and instead of retreating to the door, came forward toward the officers brandishing his firearm. Stringer asked Voyles, armed with a rifle, if he could

place a shot on Means' hip area to put him on the floor, where Stringer and Marlar could then subdue him and remove his weapon without having to exert deadly force. Voyles shot Means in

the right thigh, causing him to fall to the ground, states the report. As Stringer and Marlar ran toward the falling gunman, Means grasped his firearm and pointed it at Chief Stringer. Voyles, Stringer and Marlar then fired their weapons, ing Means two more and Means fired a round in the directio the officers.





## **Florida Largemouth Bass Stocked into Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Lakes**

JACKSON - On May 22nd, the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) stocked Florida-strain largemouth bass fingerlings into two Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway (TTW) lakes. Aberdeen Lake received approximately 48,000, and 25,000 were stocked into Lock C near Fulton. "Florida-strain largemouth bass are typically more aggressive, grow faster, and potentially grow larger than the native bass found in the TTW," says MDWFP Fisheries Biologist Tyler Stubbs. According to Stubbs, the goal of the Florida-strain bass stockings is to help increase the number of trophy-sized bass in these two lakes.

The fish were reared at the MDWFP's Turcotte Fish Hatchery, Canton.





# **Great Truths In Small Packages**

#### I will finish this series with this article and be ready for something different in my next article. I have thoroughly enjoyed writing these 32 articles! Jude verse 25 says, "To the only wise God our Savior, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen." This short verse is packed with good things, for it speaks of the glory that we should give to God, but it also shows that God is our Savior. This is highly interesting, because II Peter 3:18 says, "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, To Him be glory both now and for ever. Amen." Jude calls God our Savior and Peter called Jesus our Savior, so which is it? The fact is that both the Father and the Son are called "Savior". Notice also that glory is to be given to Jesus in II Peter 3:18, but to "the only wise God" in Jude verse 25. There is no contradiction, for both the Father and the Son are God, as well as Savior. Titus 2:13 says, "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ." Acts 3:20-21 shows that the Father will send Jesus back to earth, so the glorious appearing of the great God is the appearing of Jesus! Here we see Jesus called "the great God", for He is a member of the Godhead. In Isaiah 43:11 we read: "I, even I, am the LORD; and beside Me. there is no Savior." When one fails to see that there is more than one person in the Godhead, he is overlooking a host of clear statements that teach otherwise.

Acts 5:3 says that Ananias had lied to the Holy Ghost, but verse 4 says he had lied to God. Which is it? It is that in lying to the Holy Ghost, Ananias had lied to God, for the Holy Ghost is God, a third member of the Trinity. I am not saying these things to pick a fight with those who believe differently, but I am seeking to show that the Bible clearly teaches the Trinity, yet never uses that word. John 8:17-18 shows two members of the Godhead, namely the Father and the Son: "It is also written in your law, that the testimony of two men is true. I am one that bear witness of Myself, and the Father that sent Me beareth witness of Me." The Old Testament shows that nobody is to be convicted of a crime on the strength of one man's testimony (Deuteronomy 19:15). When Jesus used this teaching, He was saying that the Israelites were willing to take the testimony of two men, so He was offering the testimony of two witnesses, namely Himself and the Father. I love it when the Bible makes things so clear, yet I hate the fact that some people have closed their eyes to clear truths. Jesus Himself shows that there is more than one person in the Godhead, since He is one Who bears witness of Himself and the Father is the second witness. So, Jude wraps up his letter in 25 verses that are packed with great truths, even the truth of the deity of Jesus Christ, the God Who is only wise, majestic and coming back to earth one day to exercise His dominion over man's corrupt government of the earth (Revelation 11:15; Daniel 2:44; Isaiah 42:4).
