

General Election in Three Weeks; Voters Still Confused About Ballot

There's a general election in three weeks, and voter turnout is up in the air, and could be the critical element in several elections for the county and

in the state primaries, all the republican incumbents in state offices like the governor, lieutenant governor, treasurer, will be on the ballot, and statewide Democrats, aside from Attorney General Jim Hood, haven't presented much choice to voters. Add to that the strong potential for incumbents to win, there's not much drive out there for voters to go out to vote in statewide races.

House Races a Contest

Directly impacting Tishomingo County are races for both U.S. Representatives that work in the people of Tishomingo County, in Districts 1 and 21. In District 1, incumbent Republican "Bubba" Carpenter is facing a strong challenge from Democratic former educator Berman Wigginton, who is reaching out to school teachers and supporters who have been less than happy with the Republican majority in the House of Representatives over education funding.

In District 21, incumbent Democrat Donnie Bell is wooing Tishomingo County voters for the first time, since redistricting moved him the southern part of the county. He also faces a Democratic challenge in Aaron Stawamba County's tax collector, who is telling voters to vote for what local voters

want, and not be beholden to the ruling Republican party. Education funding issues could be key in many House and Senate districts statewide.

For the first time, Senate District 5 Democrat J.P. Wilemon will represent the entire county, again, due to redistricting. He is unopposed.

District Attorney Race Close

There's a contest in the District 1 DA race, which includes voters in seven Northeast Mississippi Counties. Since the incumbent, Trent Kelly was elected to the US House, Republican John Weddle has been the District Attorney, and he is running against Democrat Arch Bullard. The DA and his assistants determine much about court cases, indictments, and other felony issues in the district.

Initiative 42 and 42A

There's a ballot initiative, which is the way that Mississippi voters can determine if there will be a change to the state constitution, and if there should be a change, what it should be. There's a lot in the media about the current initiative, which involves funding for education by the Legislature, but if you ask most people, they have no idea what it's about. Except for teachers and school personnel, who are more in the loop about education funding, and lack thereof, which affects them and their workplaces more directly, people have not been listening to media reports. Will they skip that question? It's a whole page of writing on the absentee ballot - not exactly friendly to the disinterested voter.

The ballot will be confusing on the initiative, since there's not just an initiative, but two initiatives, and they have nearly the same name. Even if you are interested in school funding, it's going to be tough to understand.

In the cases of Initiative 42 and Initiative 42A, the first question will ask them to choose between "either measure" or "neither measure" becoming law. Then, voters will confront the actual initiative questions, which they can vote for or against, regardless of their answer to the first question. If a majority chooses "either measure," then the measure from the second question with the most votes will become law, so long as that measure also receives at least 40 percent of the total number of ballots cast in the election. If a majority chooses "neither measure," then neither amendment becomes law. In other words, initiative voting is long, unwieldy and difficult. It was designed to be so.

Local Races

Locally, there's still a sheriff, some supervisors, some judges and constables to be elected. Plus the county has its own initiative - to make it illegal (again) to buy liquor in the county, or keep liquor sales legal. The county voter turnout could be key in both political races and the liquor vote, which only won by less than 100 votes two years ago.

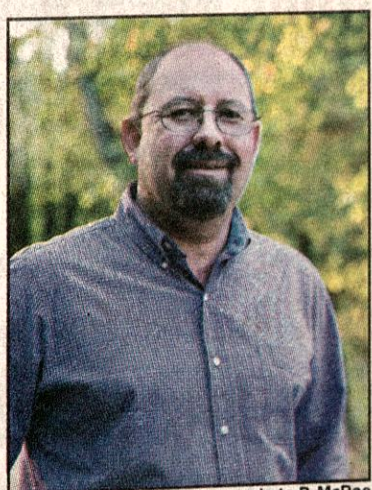

Legalization of Alcohol Does Not Cause Misuse

Selling alcohol in Tishomingo County does not cause or predict the use or misuse of alcohol. I am a retired mental health professional and a licensed therapist. I hold a graduate degree in clinical social work, and under graduate degrees in psychology and drug and alcohol rehabilitation counseling. I have 23 years experience working in hospital psychiatric units, drug and alcohol treatment centers, private practice, forensic consultant and evaluator for the departments of parole and probation. With my experience treating hundreds of people with and without substance abuse problems can say, it does not matter where alcohol is sold. If a person has a problem abusing alcohol they will

drive a great distance to get it. A person who does not have a problem with alcohol use can live next door to a package store, it will not matter. The problem does not lie with the substance but with the person's lack of coping skills dealing with stressors in life. People with good coping skills do not use substances to self medicate, they deal with life using church, family, and friends in the community as a support mechanism. Alcohol abuse is a symptom of a deeper mental health problem and it is not a moral problem that can be cured by chanting biblical verses at them: it does not matter where alcohol is sold. The Coalition for a dry county two years ago preached that if alcohol were sold in Tishomingo County most citizens would become alcoholics and DUI deaths would be staggering; that did

not happen. The Coalition now states the reason they are against alcohol sales and possession is for moral and biblical reasons; however, they are running ads in the Vidette about alcohol-related deaths. It is pretty clear the Coalition is trying to pass a law that is making the residents of this county conform to the religious practices of their beliefs. In the USA the First Amendment promises freedom of religion and from religious practices being forced on its citizens. If the Coalition simply wanted the sales of alcohol stopped that is one thing but to try and get a law passed where people are arrested for possession of alcohol is forcing their religious rituals on citizens, who don't share their convictions.

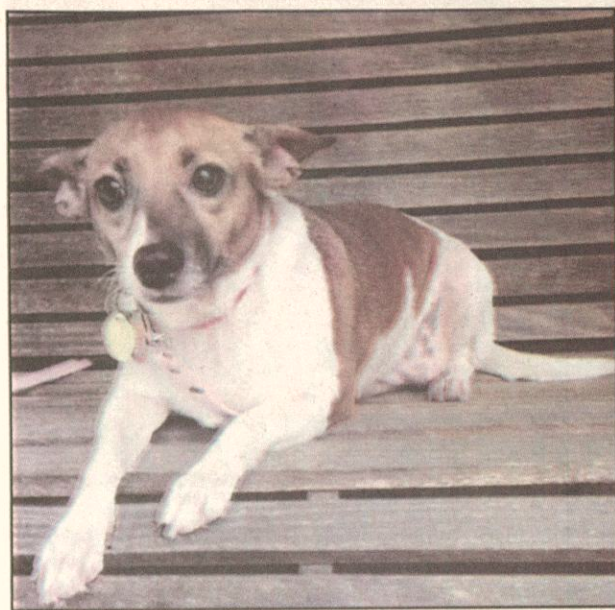

We need to pass 42 for our children

On Nov. 3 we will vote on Initiative 42, a proposed amendment to the state constitution to bring it into line with roughly 45 other states and to provide that every child has a fundamental right to an adequate and efficient education. This amendment is necessary due to the Legislature's failure, for 16 of the past 18 years, to follow its own law to fund our schools adequately. Between 2009 and the current fiscal year, Lafayette County schools have been underfunded by \$9 million and Oxford schools have been underfunded by \$11.9 million. That amounts to a lot of teachers, textbooks and lab equipment. Most school districts in the state are unable to fund the difference in the legislature's

yearly shortfall and what the respective schools need. Oxford and Lafayette County are fortunate, so far, to be able to make up this difference — but in doing so your local taxes increase sharply. Meanwhile, the state will continue to take 83 percent of the sales tax you spend here in Oxford and Lafayette County. Many of you know what I said repeatedly when I once proudly represented Oxford in City Hall — that a community's success has three primary drivers: the quality of health care, the quality of public safety, and the quality of public education. Likewise, Mississippi on the whole will not succeed unless its communities achieve stability in these three areas. Some have said that colleges will suffer if K-12 schools are adequately funded, a reasoning that reduces

education to a dog-eat-dog world and degrades all. Funding does not guarantee success but lack of funding virtually guarantees failure. We owe it to the almost 500,000 children who go to public school every day across our state — percent of the state's children — to pass Initiative 42 and give them the resources they need to succeed. The ballot has been put to be confusing, many of those who oppose the initiative and have the authority to create the ballot. So, if you want to Mississippi, Lafayette County and Oxford a better chance at success, be sure to vote 1) FOR the constitutional amendment, and 2) FOR Initiative 42 — NOT 42A. Richard H.

After the program, refreshments were served by hostess "Regent Wright and Nelda Wilemon, and a time of fellowship was enjoyed.

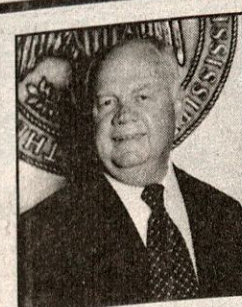

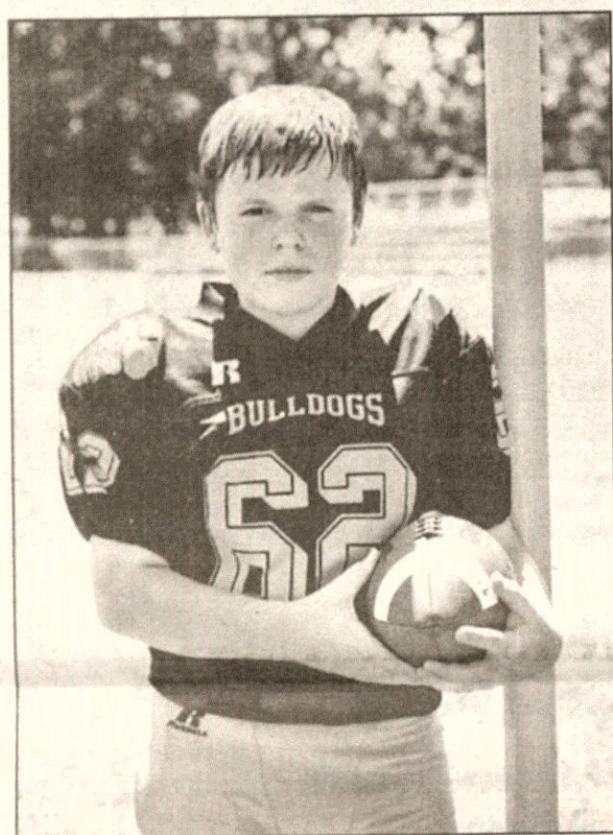

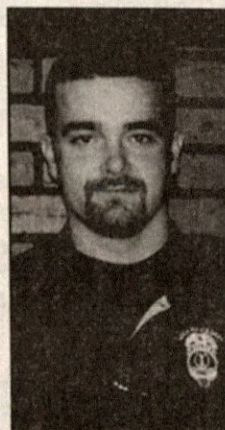

CONSERVATION CORNER

The American Alligator

The American alligator, (*Alligator mississippiensis*), is the largest reptile found in Mississippi and with alligator season in full swing, let's take a moment to review this magnificent reptile.
The alligator belongs to the crocodile family and is one of the last surviving members of the dinosaur era. Alligators are found throughout Mississippi's many rivers, creeks, swamps and lakes, but are most common in Central and South Mississippi.
The alligator can be identified by its large rough back and long, broad snout. Adult alligators are generally black in color and range from 6 to 12 feet in length. The only noticeable difference between adult males and females is size. Adult females will only grow to 6 or 7 feet. Immature alligators may be distinguished by their size and yellowish markings.
The alligator is a reptile; therefore it is a cold-blooded animal. The body temperature of the alligator is directly influenced by the outside temperature which surrounds it. During the winter, alligators will seek dens where they will become inactive for a time. The dens are dug

under banks and they usually have underwater entrances.
The alligator thrives in warm weather situations. During warm weather, alligators can often be seen basking in the sun. But alligators cannot tolerate long, direct exposure to the sun during extremely high temperatures. When temperatures become extreme, alligators will seek shaded areas or will remain submerged for extended periods. During these periods of hot weather, alligators are mostly active at night when feeding and during the early morning and late afternoon periods.
The bulk of a mature alligator's diet consists of mammals, turtles, birds, snakes and rough fish. Young alligators will feed on crawfish, small birds and small fish. Hatchling alligators feed on small insects and small vertebrates such as minnows and frogs.
Adult alligators reach maturity at the age of 6 to 7 years. The nesting season begins around late spring or early summer. During this time, the female will use grass and other vegetation to build a nest mound which may be over 2 feet in height and 6 feet across. Once the

nest is completed, the female will lay 35 to 40 eggs on top of the nest and then cover the eggs.
The nest becomes a self-incubator because the decomposing nest material produces heat. During the incubation period, which lasts about 65 days, the female will stay around the nest to protect the eggs from predators such as skunks and raccoons. When the eggs are ready to hatch, the female will aid in the process by pushing the nest material aside, and will sometimes crack the eggs open with her mouth. Once the eggs have hatched, the female will take the 7-inch hatchlings into her mouth and carry them to water.

Dear Sir:

Whereas it appears from the 1930 U.S. Federal Census that the town of Iuka, Mississippi, has a population of 1,543 and serves a trade area having less than 2,500 people, and

Whereas the various public utilities rendering service in Iuka have submitted for approval by the Administrator Codes of Fair Competition covering such industries, and

Whereas, Iuka is not an industrial center and no employer within

its trade area employs more than two persons,

But whereas, the retail merchants, restaurant and lunchroom keepers, and butchers desire to aid in the National Recovery program,

Therefore, the retail merchants and other operations rendering service in Iuka, Mississippi, which employs or contemplates employing one or more persons do hereby submit the following proposed Code of Fair Competition for the conduct of their business and service;

(1) All restaurants, lunch rooms, and butcher shops shall render service a maximum of 84 hours per week until December 31, 1933;

(2) All other retail stores dealing in any class of merchandise or rendering service (the hours of which are not covered by a separate Code) shall be open for business a maximum of 62 hours per week;

(3) No employee not an owner or part owner in the operation and sharing in the proceeds thereof shall be employed for more than 10 hours in any one day nor longer than 60 hours in any one week (except pharmacists who are exempted from the terms of this Code);

(4) The scale of wages and salaries as of July 1, 1933, shall be increased by not less than 20 percent September 1, 1933;

(5) The provisions of Paragraphs 8, 9, and 10 of the President's Reemployment Agreement or blanket Code shall be strictly observed and the same is hereby made a part of this

proposed Code of Fair Competition.

During his tenure as a civilian, he attended John

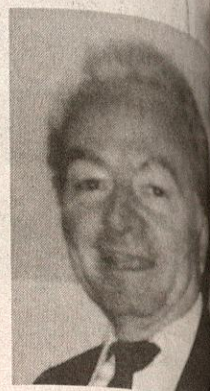

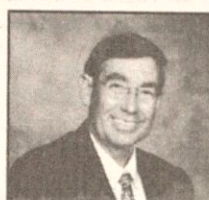

What Is Jesus Saying To The Churches?

(part XIX)

I love the fact that Jesus does not just say the things that churches and people like, for He also says things that neither some churches or individuals like. Revelation 2:14-15 is our example of the latter: "But I have a few things against thee, because thou hast there them that hold the doctrine of Balaam, who taught Balak to cast a stumbling block before the children of Israel, to eat things sacrificed unto idols, and to commit fornication. So, hast thou also them that hold the doctrine of the Nicolaitans, which thing I hate." For those who love to speak about the "sweetness of Jesus' words", I would say that they should look at Scripture more closely! It is not the desire of Christ to always be reprimanding people, but it is within His nature and right to do so when a reprimand is needed! I think we need to learn some lessons on this point in the following areas: our homes; our churches; our government; in our workplaces and in our schools. I get a little sick when people quote the only verse they know: "Judge not, that ye be not judged" (Matthew 7:1). That verse has absolutely nothing to do with our pointing out the distinction between right and wrong. It is really saying that we should have our own lives right, before we try to pick the speck out of a brother's eye (see Matthew 7:2-6). When it comes to discernment of what is right and wrong, the entire Bible teaches us that we must be able to do this! To be very blunt: we must know the difference between cow patties and hamburgers! I sometimes wonder how much further we in America can go with the stupidity that comes from lack of discernment!

Jesus rebuked the church at Pergamos for embracing the doctrine of Balaam. And what is that doctrine? It is the teaching that all religions are alright; it is the teaching that idolatry is every man's rightful choice; it is the teaching that fornication is every person's right and with any person or sex he may choose!

If you want the background of Balaam's doctrine, it can be found in Numbers chapter 25. There Israel fell for the idolatry of Moab through the counsel of Balaam to Balak, king of Moab.

There was both idolatry and fornication in the mix in this chapter! Much of the media is busy pushing the exact same things! Do you think Jesus hates it? Our text says He does! When the Bible makes good sense, why do many try to make it say something else? Could it be because they are unwilling to take what it actually says? (I have written 160 pages about Balaam; pray that I get it published.) Jude verse 11 mentions the error of Balaam; II Peter 2:15 mentions the "way of Balaam"; then Revelation 2:14 mentions the "doctrine of Balaam". I think there is a natural progression in these statements, for a error can become a way of life and a way of life can become a doctrine that is taught to others. This very thing had happened in the church at Pergamos, for they had embraced the doctrine (teaching) of Balaam, had embraced the doctrine of fornication were acceptable, so that idolatry and fornication were acceptable. (We call fornication or adultery an "affair" in our day, but God still uses the old words!

Initiative Measure #42 & Alternative Measure #42A Public Education Funding

Initiative Measure #42

BALLOT TITLE: Should the State be required to provide for the support of an adequate and efficient system of free public schools?

BALLOT SUMMARY: Initiative #42 would protect each child's fundamental right to educational opportunity through the 12th grade by amending Section 201 of the Mississippi Constitution to require that the State must provide and the legislature must fund an adequate and efficient system of free public schools. This initiative would also amend the chancery courts of this State to enforce this section with appropriate injunctive relief. **Section 201. Educational opportunity for public school children** "To protect each child's fundamental right to educational opportunity, the State shall provide for the establishment, maintenance and support of an adequate and efficient system of free public schools. The chancery courts of the State shall have the power to enforce this section with appropriate injunctive relief."

Fiscal Analysis

Prepared by the Mississippi Legislative Budget Office

Because this proposed amendment shifts funding decisions from the Legislature to the court system, it is impossible to provide a specific fiscal impact of Initiative 42. If the system, acting under the new authority granted by Initiative 42, required K-12 Education be funded at the amount called for by the statutory Mississippi Adequate Education Program, the Legislature would need to appropriate an additional \$201 million above the Fiscal Year 2016 budgeted amount. Fiscal Year 2016 revenues are not adequate to support this funding increase without the Legislature having to cut agency budgets or identify new sources of revenue (such as fees or tax increase) to comply with the court's dictate.

PRO Argument

Initiative 42 is the only choice on the ballot that protects the quality of our Mississippi public schools by providing a specific remedy if the Legislature continues to break its promise to provide adequate funding. In 1997 the Legislature promised that each public school district would receive at least enough money to fund an education program that was "adequate." Adequate was defined in terms of expenditures of average districts. But the Legislature has only provided adequate funding twice in 18 years. As a result, per pupil expenditures in Mississippi are as much as 30 % lower than those in surrounding states. We cannot compete with states for business unless we can provide our children with resources that match theirs. In our constitutional system, only the courts have the power to investigate the facts and hold the Legislature accountable. Initiative 42 will allow a district whose children are denied an "adequate and efficient" education to bring suit in chancery court against the State. It does not say which chancery court. Ultimately the nine elected members of the Mississippi Supreme Court will determine the issue. More than 120,000 supporters of public education, including supporters of public charter schools, signed petitions to put initiative 42 on the ballot. It enjoys support in all parts of the state.

No one signed a petition for Initiative 42A. It calls for an "effective" education but does not define that term. It is a legislative maneuver designed to keep Initiative 42 from getting the percentage of all those voting necessary to amend the constitution. Initiative 42 will be the first choice on the top of the constitutional amendment ballot. Initiative 42 is where our children deserve to be. Vote to put them there.

CON Argument

Most agree that stronger state support for public education is central to improving the quality of life of Mississippians. The Legislature is obviously of that mindset; witness the historic level of its appropriations to the K-12 system in FY15 - some \$106 million more than in FY14.

The disagreement lies in how that support can best be achieved. Proponents of Initiative 42 would seek to accomplish it through the courts; whereas, many state leaders favor Initiative 42A. A dangerous precedent of conducting the State's business through the judiciary. A cornerstone of democracy is the separation of powers between executive, legislative and judicial branches. Initiative 42 would cause what is properly the function of the legislature - the appropriation of funds - to be conducted by a court. That would diminish our checks-and-balances system of government.

- Despite 42's backers arguing that fully funding MAEP could be phased in over several years, there is no compulsion for the court to embrace that plan. The court could decide to fully fund MAEP immediately or exceed that level. Why? Because the Court, rather than the Legislature, would have the discretion to fiscally define an "adequate and efficient" education. Also, key legislators have already stated that if 42 passes, they would fully fund MAEP immediately. In that case, most other state agencies, such as colleges, universities, Transportation and Corrections, would be cut by 7.8% or more. K-12 is arguably a foundational plank in Mississippi's economic development plan. But for our state to be successful in growing our economy, we also need more college graduates with contemporary job skills, better roads, higher quality public health care, etc. Moreover, in addressing our challenges, it's important to do so in a responsible way, so as not to fall victim to the budgetary nightmares currently plaguing other states.

It we're truly "all in this together," then we must focus on the improvement of all public services. Initiative 42 won't accomplish that.

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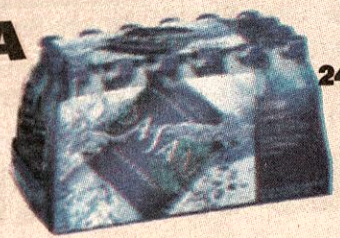

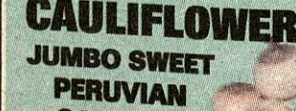
