

One of the more interesting, yet for Mississippi more sobering of these commercials, is the one where the "nerdy" son sits across from his parents to give them the good news that he has landed a manufacturing job with worldwide manufacturing giant GE. The proud father, clad in work jeans, steeltoed boots and an open flannel shirt over a T-shirt triumphantly presents his son with his "grandpappy's" big, well-used sledge-hammer. Setting it with a thud in front of his newly hired manufacturing son, dad fights back tears as he presents him with this implement of heavy industrial labor saying, Your grandpappy would want you to have this." When the son attempts to clarify for the father the nature of his new job by explaining that he would be "writing the computer code" that ran the machines, the fathers disappointment is palpable. 'You can't even pick it up, can you son?" he said. What does that commercial have to do with the current state of human capital in

Mississippi? The reality is the hammers are idly rusting in the tool bends, the old rickety log trucks are parked never to run again, the sawmills and cotton gins are now run by computers and many of our highly trained engineers and scientists only show up in Mississippi for Christmas and the family reunion. Forbes Magazine recently ranked Mississippi 50th as a state in which to do business, citing the perception held by

most educated. In the future, the jobs for humans will be those that create, operate, and "write the code" for those machines. The reality is that an adequate education for the broadest segment of the population possible will be the determinant as to whether Mississippi sinks or

swims.

At the end of the day, Initiative 42 is in reality a rather measured approach to making certain that education simply gets a fixed share of revenue growth when it occurs until funding levels become sufficient to provide an adequate education to as many Mississippi children as possible

Much has been said about Initiative 42 usurping the traditional role of the legislature. The past 15 vears have simply proved that such good intentions are unsustainable as the law currently stands. Initiative 42 is clearly an extraordinary solution. All Mississippians deserve a chance to see if putting a Constitutional floor under education funding works. A vote otherwise is a vote for the status quo and far too often in the case of Mississippi that is 50th. Hello, my name is Judy Pounds Sparks. I was married to the late Wade Sparks, we have three children, Sarah, Kim and Brandon. I want to tell you how alcohol changed my families life forever! The date: December 30th, 1997. Kim and Brandon played basketball for Belmont High School, Wade and I were on our way back from the game at Jumpertown. We were talking and started around a curve and there was a car on our side of the road! Wade did everything he could to miss the car, but it hit us on Wade's side of the car and spun us around and hit us again. The air bag knocked me out. When I came to, I looked at Wade and he had his eyes closed and was making a terrible "gurgling" sound. I called his name, and he did not answer. I touched him and he was so cold! I started screaming for help. The people down the road had heard the wreck. When the ambulance got there, they asked me if I could get out and I said "yes, I am ok, just take care of Wade." They put me on the ground and got Wade out through the passenger side. I don't remember a lot until they put me in the ambulance, I kept hearing this strange noise and did not know what it was. I then realized it was someone snoring, the drunk was passed out. The smell of alcohol was very strong and then I realized they had put me in the ambulance with the DRUNK, that killed my husband! What Is Jesus Saying To The Churches? (part XXI)

Listening is almost a lost art in our day, especially if the "listener" has a cell phone on his person. Let me air a gripe against cell phone users: If I am talking to you, I would appreciate your undivided attention, and I do not think you can text someone else while you are talking to me and still pay close attention to what I am

one who has this disrespectful habit of trying to talk to two people at the same time. My real reason for this little lecture is to get our attention on something Jesus said seven times in Revelation chapters two and three. We could use the reference of Revelation 2:7A to see exactly what Jesus said seven times to seven churches: different He said, "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saying to you. No, I saith unto the church-

es." Jesus made this exact statement to all seven of the churches in the chapters before Listening with "spiritual ears", as well as physical ears, must have been very important to Jesus, since He made the exact same statement to the seven churches mentioned in Revelation chapters two and three.

Now that you have your ears and eyes open, let's look at Revelation 2:17: "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written, which

no man knoweth saving he that receiveth I have already mentioned that the ones who overcome are synonymous with those who are saved, according to I John 5:1-5. So, all of the saved will eat of the hidden manna, which the Lord Jesus will give to all those who belong to Him. The idea of it being "hidden" may mean that the food which Jesus will feed the saved in heaven is something hidden to the unsaved. Some have said that the manna may refer to Christ the bread of life for the believer, which is hidden to the unbeliever. The white stone that is given to the saved is probably similar to

the white stone that winning athletes were given in the Greek games, which admitted them to the wincelebration. ners' Perhaps more important is the fact that the white stone has a new name written in it, which nobody knows except the one who receives the white stone. My thinking is that the name will show the individual relationship that each believer will have eternally with Christ. We will not be one "mass of believers" in eternity, for each one will have his own personal identity with Christ and his own personal relationship. Even now, we each have a personal relationship with Christ as believ-
