Dickens Christmas Will Be a Blast from the Past December 11th

Step back in time and enjoy the holidays the old-fashioned way with A Dickens Christmas Celebration Friday December 11th, in historic Downtown Iuka.

From 3 to 8 p.m. merchants will be open for Christmas shoppers, and there will be music, food, caroling, and lots of celebrating of Christmas downtown! At 6:30, the Old Courthouse Museum will host a Christmas singing for everyone.

The honor choir from Iuka Elementary will be on hand to entertain with Christmas songs, and other groups, as well.

It's not mandatory, but people are encouraged to dress in Victorian period clothing if they like - and lots of folks in Iuka do enjoy this, judging from participation in last year's event and several Battle of Iuka events.

Last year it was a wonderful atmosphere and downtown stores were filled up with shoppers during the Dickens event. Organizers are building on that

this year; there will be food and hot cocoa available from several local organizations, and several of Iuka's boutiques will have tables, too, with Christmas gifts to buy.

At 5 p.m. New Salem Baptist will begin the evening appropriately by telling the story of Christmas with a live Nativity, and reading of the story from the Book of Luke.

New this year, at 5:30 p.m., historic Iuka United Methodist Church will open its doors for visitors to enjoy Christmas music from their state of the art Allen organ, played by Jane Rhea. There will be two 30 minute programs, so everyone can enjoy this treasure.

Darryl Nunley and his Clydesdales and carriages will be giving rides around the downtown area and there are rumors that St. Nicholas, in Victorian attire, will be visiting and available for pictures with youngsters and the young at heart! To add

to the picture-perfection of the evening, there will be luminaries lining the streets down to the Old Courthouse Museum.

The lights will guide visitors to the historic Old Courthouse for a program that starts at 6:30 featuring old-fashioned Christmas carol singing, including some acapella music and the IUMC handbells. Even if you aren't singing, come see the Festival of Trees donated, decorated and on display from local merchants.

IDEA (Iuka Development and Economic Association) and the Old Courthouse Museum are hosting all of these events and the Pilot Club is decorating the Old Courthouse.

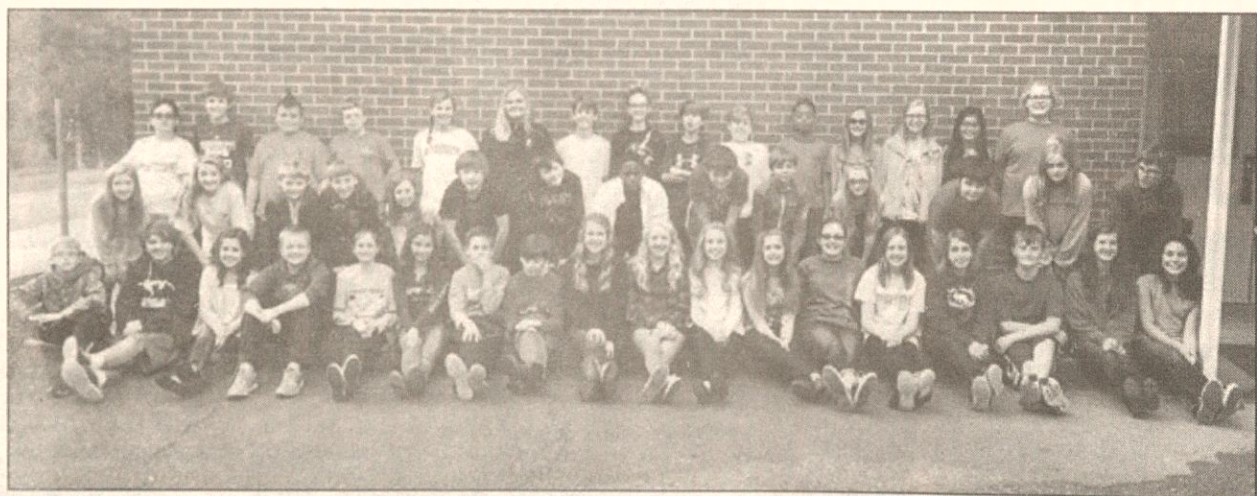
TCHS Choir Students Perform at NEMCC

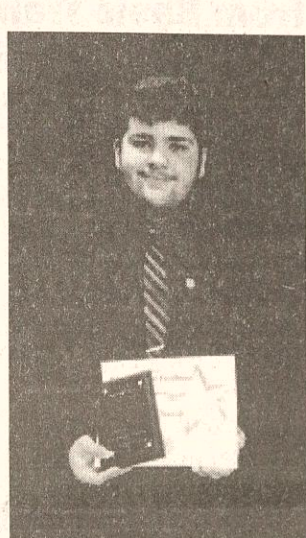

Ole Miss Athletics Receives \$25 Million, Its Largest Gift Ever

Funds will support the Forward Together campaign and future scholarships

OXFORD, Miss. — The entire population of Centerville, Dr. Gerald "Doc" Hollingsworth's hometown, could fit in just one section of Vaught-Hemingway Stadium/Hollingsworth Field.

When he left for the University of Mississippi in 1949, the average U.S. household income was about \$3,200 a year. His father, who had a second-grade education, was a laborer with the Mississippi Department of Transportation and also farmed and worked various jobs to make ends meet. Meanwhile, his devoted mother, whom Hollingsworth describes as "a great lady, the sweetest woman I've ever known," encouraged and supported the family in their home.

"We were poor but everyone else was, too," said Hollingsworth, now of Niceville, Florida, who recently contributed the equivalent of \$25 million to Ole Miss athletics. Of the donation, \$10 million is a cash gift to be used through the Forward Together campaign; the remainder is in the form of a charitable remainder trust that will establish the Gerald M. Hollingsworth, M.D., Athletic Scholarship Endowment.

A portion of Hollingsworth's donation, which is the single largest gift not only to the campaign but to Ole Miss athletics as a whole, will be used to support the north end zone expansion of Vaught-Hemingway Stadium, where the playing field already bears his name.

In 1998, at a crucial phase in plans to attract private funds for a \$13 million football stadium expansion, the Fort Walton Beach, Florida-based surgeon and entrepreneur stepped forward with a gift of \$3 million, which brought his contributions to more than \$5 million at the time and gave him naming rights to the gridiron.

"Transformational is the only adequate word I can summon when I think about Dr. Hollingsworth and the impact he has had on our entire university," said Ross Bjork, Ole Miss athletics director. "'Doc' continues to give to academic and athletic programs of the university, and his impact will be felt for eternity."

"Everyone who experiences Ole Miss as an alumnus, fan, coach,

faculty, staff, student and student-athlete will see the difference his contributions have made to our beloved athletics program and university."

Hollingsworth is most proud that his gift will be used to provide scholarships for student-athletes who may not otherwise be able to afford UM tuition.

"I hope it will motivate and stimulate other people to donate to the university because I think it's a great school and the money will be put to good use to provide scholarship aid to students who would not be able to attend the university otherwise, as well as provide for needs they might have," he said. "I'm just hoping that young people will have the great experience and the great benefit I derived from going to Ole Miss."

In a way, Hollingsworth is encouraging others to attend the university, just as he was encouraged by his family doctor and role model, Dr. Earl Fyke. "He took me under his wing and convinced me I could go to Ole Miss with his help and could get a good education there and have a great experience, and he was certainly right."

Hollingsworth received a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from UM in 1953 and then attended two years of medical school at the university before completing his medical degree at Harvard University.

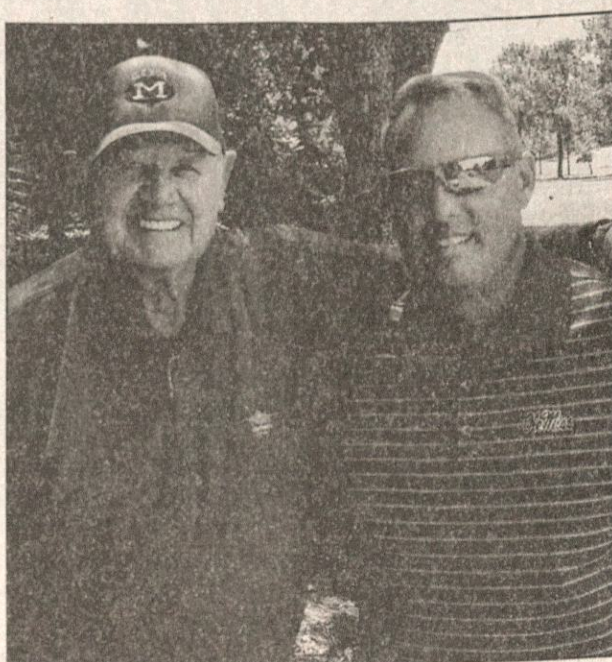
Hollingsworth said he vividly remembers the day he graduated from Ole Miss: "My family, my mother and father, came to see me graduate from chemical engineering. I was the first member of the family that ever finished college, so I know it made them proud."

But Hollingsworth cherishes a particular day of his college career over all the others.

"My very favorite memory was watching Coach Johnny Vaught's Rebels whip Maryland in the football game in 1953 and then celebrating with my classmates after that victory," Hollingsworth said.

"We stormed the field. There've been just a lot of great memories and most have been associated with football games."

In fact, most of the people whom Hollingsworth counts among his best friends are Ole Miss football legends: Johnny Vaught, Johnny Cain,

Wobble Davidson, Eddie Crawford, Warner Alford, Robert Khayat, Charlie Conerly and Archie Manning, to name a few.

"They're just some great names I've grown to admire over the years, and I'm fortunate enough to have known all those people and be friends with them," Hollingsworth said, adding to his list Bjork, Hugh Freeze and basketball standout Keith Carter, senior associate athletics director for development and executive director of the Ole Miss Athletics Foundation.

"They always treated me like a member of the Ole Miss family and I'll certainly always be grateful for that."

Carter said becoming acquainted with Hollingsworth has been a pleasure.

"Doc is one of the most genuine, humble and caring individuals I know," he said. "He has a real desire to see our student-athletes succeed and his spirit of giving unconditionally toward that goal is one we should all strive for."

After graduating from Harvard Medical School, Hollingsworth completed his surgical residency at Duval Hospital in Jacksonville, Florida. From 1957 to 1959, he was a U.S. Navy flight surgeon and then started his private medical practice in 1959 in Fort Walton Beach.

He was the team doctor for Choctawhatchee and Fort Walton Beach high schools for almost 35 years and helped found the All-Sports Association of Northwest Florida, which honored him with its Community Service

Award for helping youngsters in athletics.

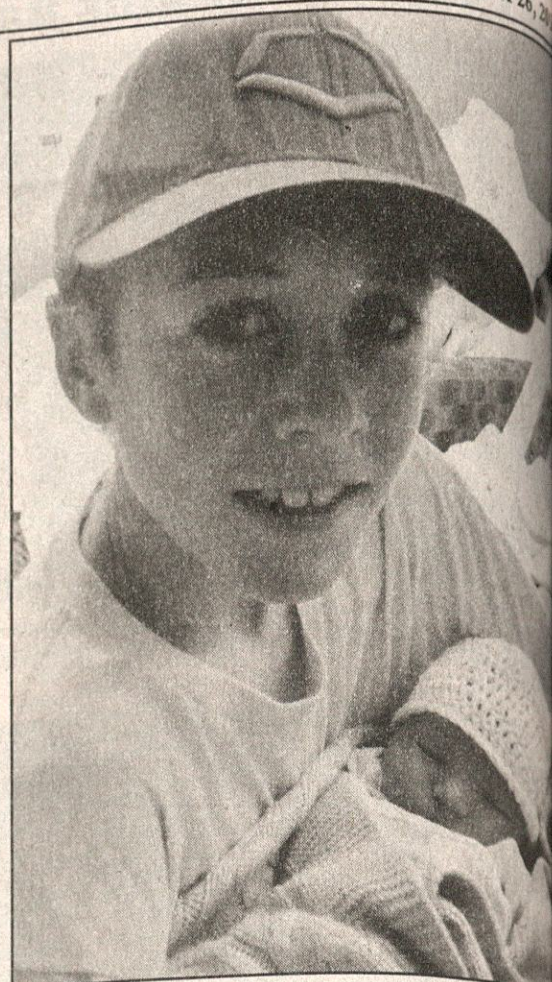
The Ole Miss chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame honored the physician with the Amateur Football Award for contributions to the collegiate athletic world.

"He is one of our most outstanding and most generous graduates," said Don Frugé, chair of the Ole Miss Athletics Foundation. "The fact that he has given so much to this university, as well as to the young people of his own community, speaks volumes about his kind, loving and generous spirit."

Besides his medical practice, Hollingsworth owned a number of profitable luxury automobile dealerships in Fort Walton Beach and, over time, found great success in commercial real estate investing.

"I'm fortunate to have this money available and it just seemed like a need the university had," said Hollingsworth of his decision to give to the Forward Together campaign. "I've benefited tremendously from the university and from my relationships and friendships with the people there in the Athletic Department over the years, and I just wanted to show my appreciation and possibly stimulate others to dig deep and also give aid to the university."

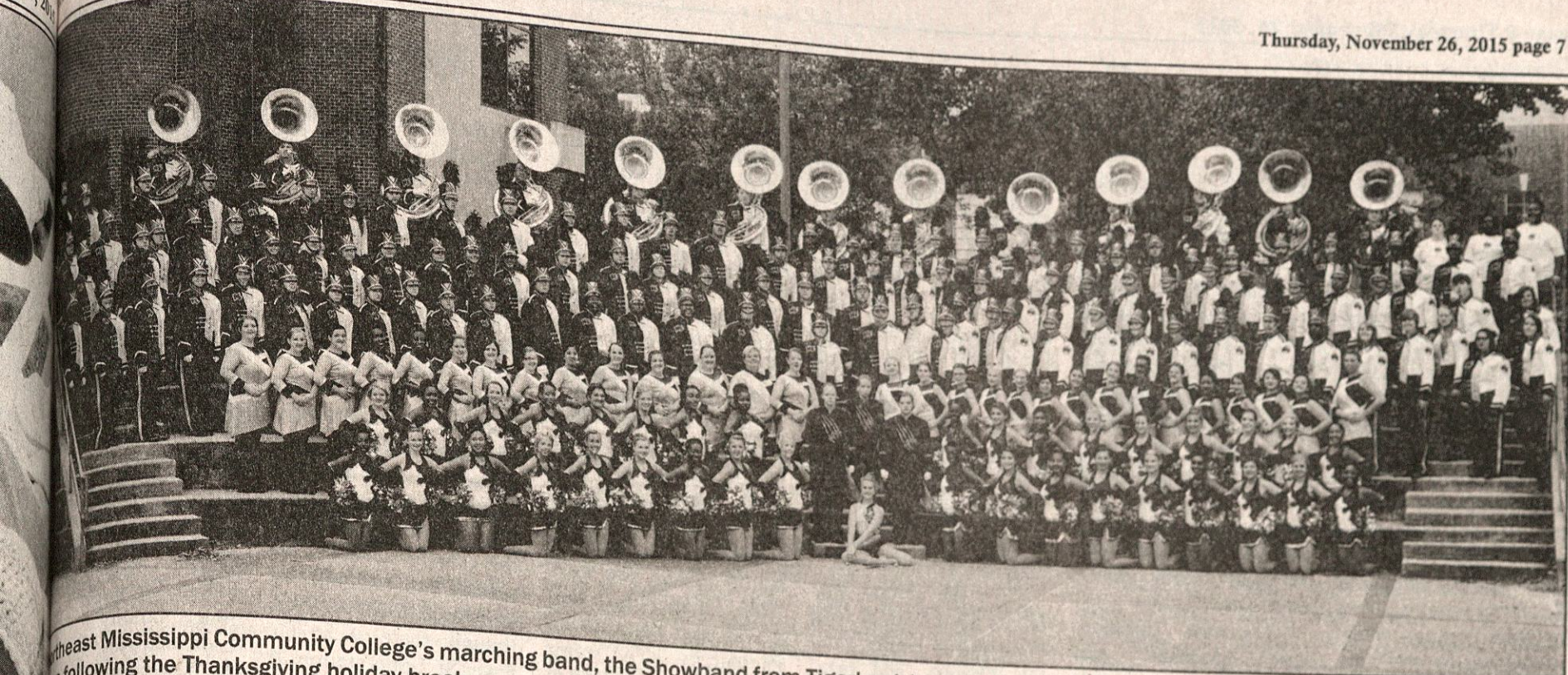

Southern Cornerstones

Dr. Miles A. Simmons

The Civil War proved to be long and, at \$2 million a day, very expensive. Three days after Fort Sumter, President Abraham Lincoln ordered the Northern states to field an army of 75,000 men. Congress immediately enacted a comprehensive excise tax bill in an effort to raise the revenue to meet the mounting expenses of the Federal Government. A large amount of the newly imposed taxes included stamp duties on proprietary medicine. When this bill was passed on July 1, 1862, the U.S. Government publicly advertised for bids for the large number of revenue stamps required. Within a few weeks of the printing of the regular revenue stamps, several manu-

facturers of proprietary medicines (who possessed a keen advertising sense) asked the government if they could obtain distinctive stamps with their own trademark or design on them. This request was approved and extended to all merchants by a regulation issued in January 1863. The idea proved to be extremely popular. The stamps provided companies with a successful advertising tool which generated sales.

The first "Simmons Liver Medicine" ever made for sale was made in liquid form and put in a 5-gallon keg which was carried through the country in a buggy and retailed in quantities to suit the purchaser by Dr. M. A. Simmons and his father. Dr. Simmons first came to

Mississippi in 1842. First located at Holly Springs, Mississippi, Dr. Simmons moved to Iuka, Mississippi, in 1858, where he lived for 20 years. In 1878, he moved to St. Louis, Missouri, and sold out the right to make M. A. Simmons Liver Medicine in 1879. I do not know how many people helped make the medicine while in Iuka. He had the mill where he made the medicine, also a drug store."

In the second year of the Civil War, at least three major battles (Shiloh, Corinth, and Iuka) were fought near Dr. Simmons' drug store. These battles involved thousands of soldiers on both sides. Without having to stretch your imagination, it is not hard to understand that the demand for Dr.

Simmons' medicine and other supplies would be extremely high.

According to records maintained by the National Bank Note Company, the company which printed the Simmons revenue stamps, the total issue was 356,683 stamps. Though this is certainly a large number of stamps, collectors have found Simmons' stamp to be quite scarce. Besides the fact that the stamp was in use more than 100 years ago, how it was used accounts for its scarcity. The stamp was glued over the end of the box which contained the small glass bottles of dr. M. A. Simmons' Liver Medicine. When the box was opened, the stamp was usually torn in half. Even those stamps which

were not torn were likely discarded along with the box.

After Dr. Simmons moved to St. Louis in 1878, he continued to use the stamps after having the die altered so that the words "Iuka, Miss." were replaced by the words "St. Louis, Mo." The St. Louis stamps, of which 115,250 were printed, were in use for a relatively short period of time due to the fact that the U.S. Government repealed the Civil War tax on March 3, 1883. Even though there were far fewer St. Louis stamps, it is the Iuka stamp which is most often sought after by collectors.

The above information was excerpted from an article written by For-



rest Lamar Cooper titled "Iuka's Early Advertising Magnate." It was found on page 81 in Mississippi. A copy can be obtained from the Tishomingo County Archives & History Museum. The old Tishomingo County Museum also has a bottle that contained Simmons' liver medicine on display.

What Is Jesus Saying To The Churches? (part XXIV)

How important is repentance? Jesus thought it to be very important as a corrective that would prevent judgment! Revelation 2:21 says about the Jezebel who was teaching at Thyatira: "And I gave her space to repent of her fornication; and she repented not." We saw in Revelation 2:20 that Jezebel called herself a prophetess, which she evidently thought gave her some status that should be respected. I have been learning over the years that not everyone who says he is God's spokesman really is what he claims to be! In our day I meet people who claim all kinds of titles for themselves, supposing that they should be received just because of that title. What comes out of one's mouth and actions does more to substantiate whether or not he is God's spokesman than anything else. Jezebel, who is mentioned in Revelation 2:20-23, was a teacher of false doctrine that revolved around fornication and idolatry. It is not clear that the fornication was the physical act or the matter of spiritual fornication, in which an idol takes the place of Jesus our bridegroom. Whichever is the case, both are terrible sins. It was actually a fact that sexual sins were often involved in the idolatry of Bible times, as it still is today in demon worship etc.

The word "repent" carried the connotation of "an about face", meaning that one turns to God from his sin. Several years ago, a couple of Christian papers and a host of individual Christians got into a debate over the word "repent". I remember reading one who said, "Repentance is simply a change of mind", while another said, "Repentance is a change of actions". Maybe, if I remember correctly, another said, Repentance is a change of mind that always leads to a change of action." You are free to take your choice of these, as was the case in those days, but one is correct. God has never been interested in mind games, for He has always expected actions to change when one repented. Perhaps I Thesalonians 1:9 says it good enough: "For they themselves show of us what manner of entering in we had unto you, and how ye turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God." One cannot turn to God without turning from his idols, so I think you will get the picture. It amazes me that the Bible sheds so much light on the theologies of men. The classic statement in the Old Testament said something like Ezekiel 14:6: "Therefore say unto the house of Israel, Thus saith the Lord God; Repent, and turn yourselves from your idols; and turn away your faces from all your abominations."

Whatever twist theologians may put on the term "repent"; it seems clear that a turning away from sin was always a part of the "act" of repenting! Proverbs 28:13 says, "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy." Jesus gave space for Jezebel to repent, but she repented not, which means that she continued her sins and came face to face with the judgment of Christ, and so it is with any others who do not repent and turn to God from their sins!

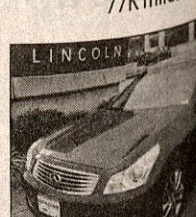

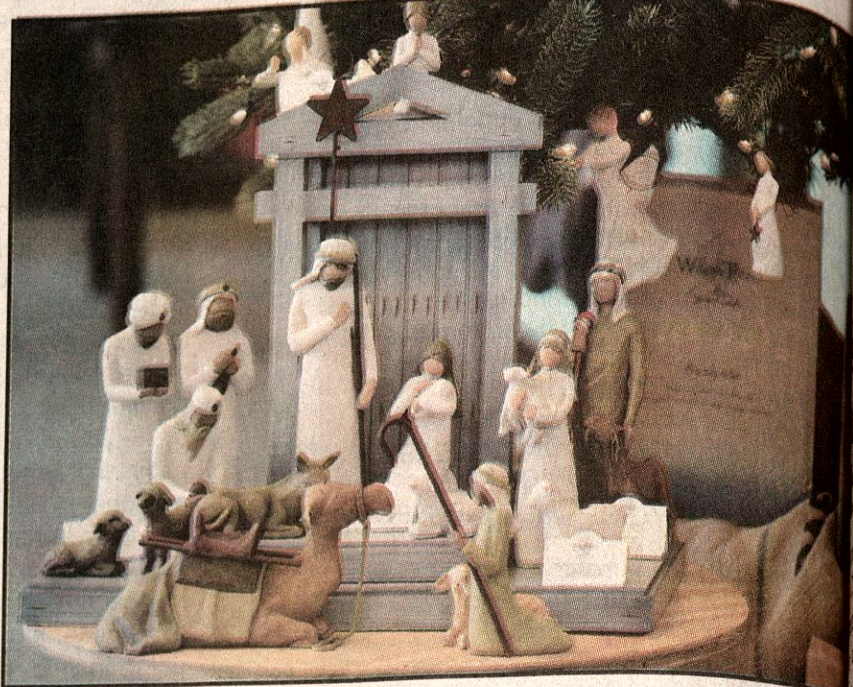
