OXFORD - The game of bingo was first played in Italy as early as 1530. France took up the game in the 18th century. The game was standardized in the United Stated during the 1920s, with a rule book published in 1933.

Fast forward to the 21st century, when retired educators Sylvia and Bob Ferguson, of Iuka, are using bingo to help people from 18 counties in a 50mile radius of their home earn college degrees. To date, the Fergusons have generously provided \$1.6 million for scholarships to assist students enrolled at the University of Missis-

The Fergusons point out that they didn't choose bingo; bingo chose them.

Iuka has two state-regulated bingo halls, and its northeast Mississippi location attracts regular players from a three-state area. With the facilities owned by parties in other cities,

Iuka residents watched as earnings left their community for years.

Some of them appealed to the Fergusons to buy one of the halls and invest the proceeds in the community, possibly through education. Always known for being innovative thinkers and dedicated educators, the Fergusons agreed.


"We thought about it and prayed about it, and we could definitely see a tremendous need for the profits to expand educational opportunities," said Bob Ferguson, who has led school districts in the role of superintendent from Long Beach to Iuka to Kansas City, Kansas.

With 572 current scholarships (2,648 since inception) and countless local educational initiatives funded, the Fergusons' Tri State Educational Foundationis making its mark not only in Iuka and at Ole Miss but also at many other higher education institutions.

To apply for a scholarship, an applicant has to be a resident in one of the seven Mississippi counties, five Alabama counties or six Tennessee counties covered by the foundation. Scholarship dollars follow recipients to whatever higher education institution they choose.

"We applaud the Fergusons and the Tri State Educational Foundation for identifying a creative source to ensure major investments are made in the lives of students, teachers, and their community," UM Chancellor Jeff Vitter said. "Sylvia and Bob are expanding their remarkable legacies as dedicated educators by now funding an exceptional number of educational opportunities. The University of Mississippi is deeply grateful for this important scholarship support."

The wall of the Fergusons' Riverhills bingo hall is lined with framed university and community college emblems noting

each school attended by one or more of the Fergusons' scholarship recipients. The larger frames reflect schools that receive major investments, and Ole Miss is prominent in that group.

"This is our way of telling our patrons how the profits are used," said Dana Degraw, who oversees the foundation's day-to-day operations as executive director. "They are usually very interested to walk around and see all the universities on display."

Bob Ferguson remembers the challenge of figuring out how to cover the costs of attending college.

"Don't forget whose shoulders you stood on," he said, referring to the philosophy he hopes scholarship recipients will share. "I personally had to have a lot of help to attend

college when I was young, so I am so happy to have this opportunity to give back."

The Fergusons' Tri State Educational Foundation also recently created the James Robert Haines Memorial Scholarship in the UM School of





Scholarships are the Fergusons' main focus but ar from the only way the couple and the Tri State Foundation board members strengthen the community.

The foundation has provided resources to bring professors to Iuka teachers could attain master's degrees through evening classes, support o help local educators arn National Teacher resources Certification, or students to travel to cience fairs and student rganization conferences, upport for local band amps, funds for comouters, funds for smart oards, and support for arious community activi-

"We never thought the oundation could have this najor impact," said Sylvia erguson, a veteran teach-"The first year (1999), he goal was to award 12 cholarships, and we're so leased that it has grown. and it's fascinating to earn what our scholarhip recipients are able to chieve after earning their ollege degrees."

Tri State Scholarships are paid directly to Ole Miss and other institutions, and the funds can be used for tuition, books, meal tickets, residence halls and fees. Students who commute to college may ask for part of their scholarships to be converted to gas vouchers or even childcare expenses.

Undergraduate dents in the scholarship program must successfully complete a minimum of 12 hours and maintain at least a 2.0 grade-point average with no failures. Students must submit their grades to the Tri State Educational Foundation twice a year. Individuals who wish to pursue graduate degrees in the field of education also are eligible to apply for the scholarships.

Among other initiatives supported by the foundation are vocational education, Boys & Girls Club, Crime Stoppers of Northeast MS, law enforcement training and docent training for volunteers at the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum.

The amount of money the foundation has to fund its scholarships and projects each year depends on the proceeds earned in the Riverhills bingo hall, which operates seven days a week. Bingo itself has embraced modern technology, as many enjoy the game on the array of computers offered at Riverhills, while others still enjoy the traditional paper






Noah Carpenter Competes at State 4-H Horse Show



I look at this photo often and it only seems like yesterday that the second grade class of IES was in the park playing. I was in Mrs. Leona Phillips' second grade class at Iuka Elementary School. This was before the new (old) school was built. She would let us help her with her things, making every child feel special. (It's funny how you remember the smallest things.)

It was 1960, there were probably 40 kids in her room and she didn't have a helper. We had Coke machines at the end of the hall, a refreshment area in



Who Are The 144,000 In Revelation Chapter 7? (part II)

It always amazes me that some churches and religious groups work so hard at "straining Scripture" to make it say what it really does not say. This has been done with Revelation chapter 7, as well as with many other parts of the Bible, particularly the Old Testament, to make Israel somebody else beside Israel. With all that God has done in both testaments to distinguish Israel from the rest of the world and from the church, it is a wonder that anyone would even try to replace Israel with any other group. So, the 144,000 in Revelation chapter 7 are all Jewish people, or Israelites. (I realize that the name "Jew" is not as old as the name " Israel ", but both have been used to designate the 12 tribes of Israel for many centuries, so I feel safe in doing the same here. The purpose of the 144,000 is to evangelize the earth during the tribulation, or at least that is indicated in Revelation chapter 7, though not necessarily clearly stated. It is interesting that there are saved people from every nation mentioned in connection with the 144,000 within this same chapter.

Revelation 7:5-8 gives the names of the 12 tribes that make up the 144,000, with 12,000 coming from each of the 12 tribes. I will not give all of the content of these verses here, since much is repetitious, but I do want to name the 12 tribes that are named within these verses. Those named are: Judah, Reuben, Gad, Asher, Naphtali, Manasseh, Simeon, Levi, Issachar, Zebulun, Joseph and Benjamin. Those who are not named here are: "Dan and Ephraim". Those named here who are not named in most other lists of the 12 tribes are: Levi and Joseph. Some say that Dan and Ephraim are omitted because of their connection with idolatry, but that may not hold water, for all 12 of the tribes embraced idolatry at some points in their history. Levi is not usually named in the lists of the 12 tribes because they had no land inheritance, since they served as priests and helpers of priests. It is interesting that Ezekiel 48:1 and 48:5 show portions of land for both Dan and Ephraim in the millennium, so their idolatry may keep them from being "evangelists" in the tribulation, but it will not keep them from land inheritance during the millennium. Ephraim and Manasseh are both mentioned in Ezekiel 48: 5, but Joseph is not mentioned, yet he is represented by these two sons: Ephraim and Manasseh. Since God has the right to divide up the "jobs" and "inheritances" of Israelites as He wishes, we see the distinction in the two lists from Ezekiel chapter 48 and Revelation chapter 7, with Ezekiel giving the tribes who inherit land in the millennium and Revelation giving the tribes who serve as evangelists during the tribulation. So, my conclusion is that the 144,000 are all Israelite evangelist whom God has honored to witness during the tribulation and to win to Christ a number that is beyond any ability to count, or at least too numerous to bother with counting. The 144,000 is a very important group, even more important than the churches, cults or religious groups who want to "steal their identity"!


