Iuka Heritage Festival 2016 This Weekend

Friday and Saturday, Mineral Springs and Jaybird Parks in Iuka will be the site of the 29th annual Iuka Heritage Day celebration.

This year promises to be bigger and better than ever, say organizers. The weekend's festivities will begin at 3 p.m. on Friday afternoon with some of the vendors opening for business. Then, at 6:30 pm, the entertainment will begin with the annual Community Service. Come down, eat, bring your lawn chairs and listen to the sounds of Unity 4, Ignite, Joint Aires and The Masters. Don't forget to bring the kids. There will be a movie for them beginning at dusk.

Bring your lawn chairs for an evening of fun!

Saturday morning begins bright and early with more vendors arriving and setting up. The annual Heritage Day Car Show will start at 8 am in downtown Iuka at Jay Bird Park and the Tri-State Flywheelers Tractor Club will be set up on Fulton St. beside the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse for their annual Tractor Show.

The Festival will begin bright and early with opening ceremony at 9 am in Mineral Springs Park. The Ritzpah Railroad will be there to transport from park to park and around the area. Parents will enjoy the vendors for them and the Kiddy Train, and games for the children.

Some of the offerings vendors will have displayed for sale this year include distressed furniture, etched glassware, yard art and homemade baked goods, unique jewelry and much, much more. For the first time there will be additional Vendors in the Youth Center! So, while you are browsing don't miss out on them.

There will be food and entertainment all day long. Entertainment will include lots of local talent, Ms. Kay Bain, Dwight Wadkins Band, and Sugarcreek.

The Old Courthouse Museum will be open for Heritage Day this Saturday, announced administrators this week.

There's no admission, but donations are strongly encouraged and needed; in fact, the museum has been closed, except by appointment, since June 1st, since there is not enough funding to pay person-

nel to be there and keep it open to the public.

Regularly one of the most-visited tourist attractions in Tishomingo County, it operated on a shoestring budget and volunteer workers for many years, but this year, the ad-

Iuka Sign Renovation a Combined Community Effort

A piece of Iuka history has been restored thanks to the combined efforts of several groups and individuals.

An arrow-shaped neon sign inviting people to "spend your vacation here!" in "Iuka-On-Pickwick Lake" used to hang in Iuka, but it had long-since disappeared from sight. Like so much in this small town, it was probably removed to make room for "progress." It spent some time in the city's storage warehouse, and when former alderman Jerry Long found it in storage, he found it a home with local historian Dr. Ben Kitchens, and it hung in his barn.

During a meeting of the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society, Dr. Kitchens offered to give it to fellow board member Harold Lomenick if he would have it restored. If there's anyone in Iuka who will take on a project

and get it done, it's Harold Lomenick.

With projects as big as the Indian Creek watershed, three years of organizing the Battle of Iuka commemoration events, purchase and installation of three Battle of Iuka historical markers, as well years of efforts to preserve Iuka's battlefield, Harold Lomenick, whose day job is selling State Farm Insurance, has given back much to the town that raised him. He isn't afraid to provide leadership to get things done, and so often, that is the critical element missing in efforts to preserve Iuka's history; no one wants to be "in charge."

Lomenick contacted locally-famous artist Tony Bullard, who repainted it to its original colors. The neon had been removed, and they hope to replace it at a later date.

Iuka city leaders and others agreed with Harold that it



should hang near the Old Courthouse Museum on Quitman, where it would be appreciated by the hundreds of people who annually visit the historic building, as well as Mineral Springs Park. To get it hung, Harold corralled local experts in their field.



Any old pole would not do, so Harold, with a long memory of local history, recalled that some old sign poles used to be at the site on Quitman, at "Ezy" Murrah's Gulf Station. Hilton

"Popcorn" Moore had bought them, and used one at his car

Alleged Arsonist, Dog Killer Sentenced for Burglary

A few defendants received sentences Tuesday in Tishomingo County Circuit Court, among them an Iuka man who was thought to have burned his elderly parents' home with 12 dogs inside in June 2015.

Timothy Sims, 29, received a sentence of 25 years for three different charges relating the events in June 2015 that resulted in the burning of a house on Briarwood Circle in Iuka. He pled guilty to felony charges of burglary of a dwelling, attempted theft of a motor vehicle, and a misdemeanor charge of aggravated cruelty to dogs. Though it was as severe as any sentencing

handed down Tuesday, according to defense lawyer John R. White, twenty years of it were suspended, and Sims must be on probation for five years after serving just five years in prison.

At the time, authorities suspected that he burned his elderly parents' home around 11 p.m. on June 15th of 2015 after a day of erratic and violent behavior observed by neighbors. It was reported that several dogs were in the house at the time, and that Sims had beat another dog to death that day.

Anthony Tensley, 35, of Iuka pled guilty to possessing a weapon as a convicted felon and

received a sentence of 10 years with Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC), all suspended, and will just have five years supervised probation.

Justin Johnson, 34, of Booneville, pled guilty to burglary of a vehicle, and a charge of burglary of a dwelling was retired. He was sentenced to seven years with MDOC, two years suspended, and five to serve.

Timothy Paul White, 29, of Iuka pled guilty to one count of burglary of a dwelling, and one count of possessing a weapon as a convicted felon. He was sentenced to 25 years, with 20 suspended and five to serve, plus five years supervised probation.

lot. Moore still had the other pole, badly in need of repair, and agreed to give it to Lomenick for the restored sign.

To fix the pole, William Davis, was enlisted. A talented welder and metal works designer, William and his son did a great job repairing the pole and creating the sign arms from which the restored Iuka sign would hang. Davis attached the sign, and it was ready to be installed.

The crew from the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association (TCEPA) used an auger

to dig a hole, and local concrete master, the late Tim Bivins, worked up the perfect mounting for the pole and Davis brought the pole on set up day. The TCEPA power guys and Iuka city workers, helped raise and mount the pole; no easy task, working around the numerous power and communication wires overhead.

Any costs for the project were handled by the Iuka Rotary Club, so, really, dozens of people had a hand in replacing this piece of history.

"There's a lot involved in doing any type

of worthwhile project," explains Harold. "All of us want to preserve and protect our heritage, be it a sign, a house, a building or land. You can sit around and watch or you can get involved."

"There are three types of people in all communities," he said. "Those that watch things happen, those that wonder what happened and those that make things happen. Which one are you?"

"Years ago, our community was admired for their leadership," said Lomenick. "Business leaders, church leaders, education leadership and neighbors helped folks get ahead in life. We seemed to have let that go....Can we get that inspiration back in our communities? I don't

know, but I hope a new generation will step up to appreciate the treasure of living in a historic town with a vivid past."

Lomenick invites everyone to go by and look at the sign located near the Old Courthouse Museum on the corner of Front and Quitman. It still needs the neon replaced, but they need more funding for that to happen. He invites interested parties to step up and help get it replaced.

If you have a desire to restore or rehabilitate a historic location, or a piece of history, let folks at the Tourism Office, the Old Courthouse Museum or Lomenick know. Ideas, as well as plans for how YOU will help make it happen are welcome!

ministrative board made the hard decision to make it appointment-only - not very convenient for folks driving through town and wanting to visit.

Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society, which was founded in 1996, is celebrating their 20th anniversary and they operate out of the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse Museum.

Though it's been mostly closed, volunteers have used the downtime to bring more items out of archival storage and develop new exhibits for patrons to enjoy. These improvements were made possible by a Summer Educational Workforce Grant from Tri-State Educational Foundation which provides skills and work opportunities for young people.

The handicap accessibility improvements which are clearly visible on the outside were done with a \$20K grant with a matching grant of the same amount by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors for a total of \$40k.

The work also included a preliminary design of a two-story elevator for the

facility. Additional funds are being sought through a second grant program to assist with a detailed electrical survey of the facility, restoration work on eaves and soffits, and to replace all HVAC air handler units to ground level from the attic space over the courtroom where they are extremely difficult to maintain.

Mississippi Department of Archives and History Preservation Office provided technical direction for the recent improvements to our historic landmark. Local contractors included Roger Wingo Contracting, Mike Nelson Contractors, Inc., Dean & McRae Engineering, Inc., and others.

Plans are to reopen the Museum to the public with regularly scheduled hours in mid-September once a new budget has been established by the County Board of Supervisors for the upcoming fiscal year. 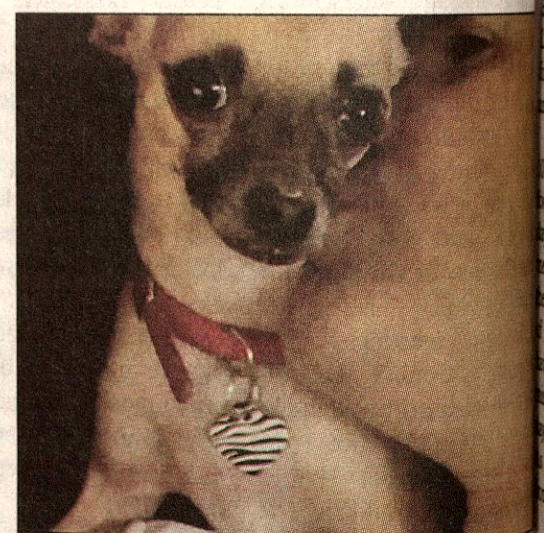

Her favorite thing is to cuddle, watch movies, and go for walks with her Mom. Her favorite word is 'treats' and she loves her furry cousins George Bailey Woods and Nola Woods."

Antifreeze is one of the most potent toxins in the average household-just a few licks of the sweet fluid can be fatal! Even the 'pet safe' versions still pose a serious threat, although they are not as potent. Here are steps to protect your pet from antifreeze poisoning: keep antifreeze out of pets' reach and remember that dogs chew through plastic. Fix any leaks from cars immediately. Dilute any spilled antifreeze with large quantities of plain water. If you think your pet may have ingested antifreeze, take your pet to the veterinarian immediately. Symptoms of antifreeze poisoning include 'drunkenness' and progress to vomiting, diarrhea, and ultimately kidney failure within 12 - 24 hours so it is crucial to seek prompt veterinary care.

Master Gardeners Celebrate 25 Years of Program History in Mississippi

For 25 years, Master Gardener volunteers have beautified Mississippi community landscapes. To honor this milestone, the Mississippi State University Extension Service is hosting celebrations across the state. On August 25th, the MSU Extension office in Tishomingo County observed the quarter-century of service by local Master Gardeners with a silver jubilee, complete with refreshments. "Master Gardeners receive 40 hours of

training and then give 40 hours of volunteer service to their communities," said Lelia Kelly, Extension horticulture specialist and statewide Master Gardener coordinator. "They have an incredible impact on their communities, whether they are answering questions about gardening or contributing their time to local beautification projects." In 2015, Mississippi Master Gardener volunteers donated 64,000 hours of time for an estimated \$1.4 mil-

lion value. In 2015 alone, they contacted 1.3 million individuals. Locally, the Tishomingo County Master Gardeners stay active year-round. Zach Yow, MSU Extension agent in Tishomingo County stated we have around 25 active members in the Master Gardener program. This is a hardworking and dedicated group of individuals that strive to make our community stand out. They have various project areas in the community they work on that include

Jay Bird Park, Butterfly Garden at IES, Demonstration Plots at Extension office, and their annual Plant Sale in the spring. They also participate in events such as the county fair and Dickens Christmas to promote and recruit new members for the master gardener program. 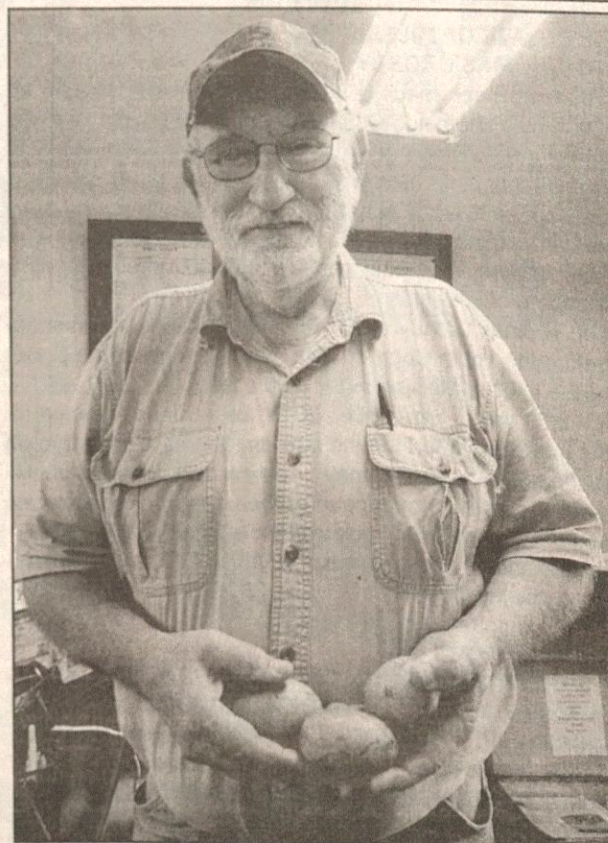
On Thursday, September 8th at 11 a.m., we will serve lunch to workers at Tishomingo Industries. The September club meeting will be held immediately after lunch.

Picking up Pawpaws!

Tom Strickland of the Rutledge Salem Community brought these pawpaws by the office recently. He got some pawpaw plants from his brother, this tree was a volunteer plant that sprouted from one he dropped outside.

According to the internet, pawpaw trees, the largest edible fruit trees native to North America, produce greenish-blackish fruit, usually three to six inches long. The flesh is pale to bright yellow and contains a network of glossy, dark brown seeds. A pawpaw's flavor is sunny, electric, and downright tropical: a riot of mango-banana-citrus that's incongruous with its temperate, deciduous forest origins.
