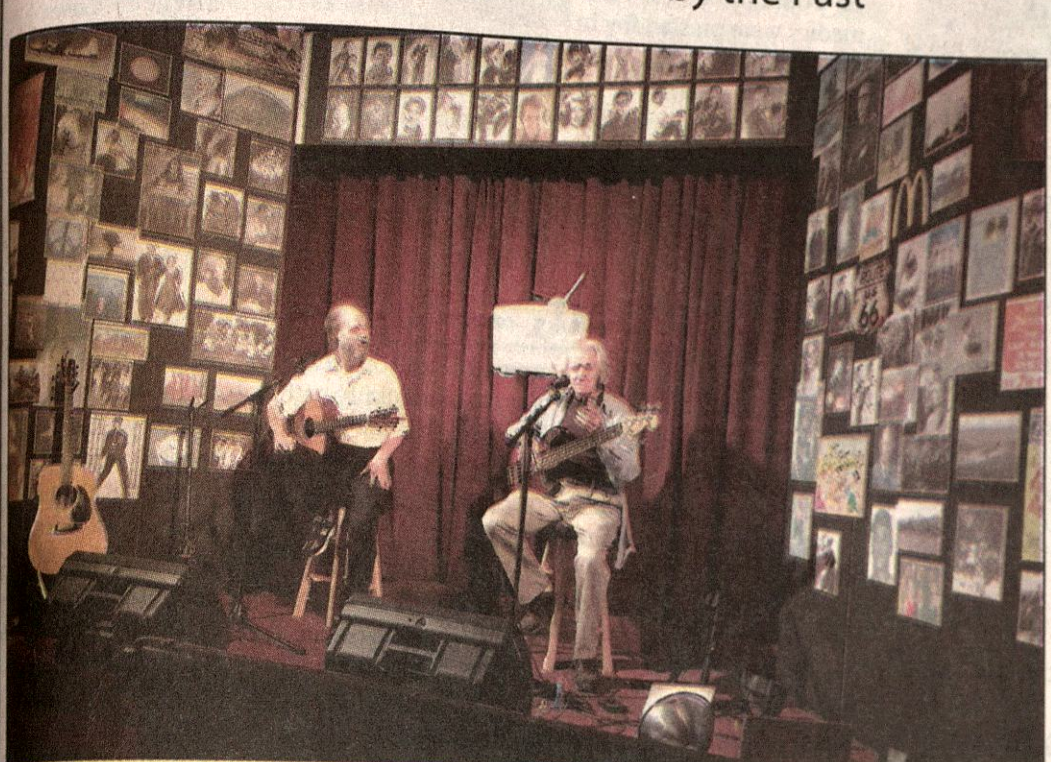

Crowds Loving Thomas Brothers' Latest Show, "The Boomer Years"

Baby Boomer or Older? We have something to place atop your bucket list. Gen-Xers, Millennials, Centennials? It's a cheat-sheet to history. Born Yesterday? This show is filled with eye candy, humor and "a broad spectrum of musical styles" designed to entertain and inform.

Last Saturday evening, Eddie and Frank Thomas gave the second in their planned six-show run called "The Boomer Years."

As evening fell, the doorway to the little church in downtown Iuka, Mississippi, became a time portal that ushered attendees to an inspiring, heartwarming era known as the post WWII Baby Boom. Images, like shadows cast upon the stage wall, became a patchwork quilt that spanned the years 1946 to 1964. Eddie and Frank greeted those who arrived early, at the door. Folks took their seats, and the images on stage quickly pulled the curious into its world of thoughts and memories.

Eddie and Frank took to the stage. The lights set for the show. Like a zen moment, a guitar chimed the hour, the crowd relaxed and the show opened with a jazzy rendition of the hit song, "Route 66." The next hour and 15 minutes marched through the baby boom years, 1946 to 1964, with news headlines from each year and a cavalcade of songs by the likes of the Mills Brothers, Teresa Brewer, Patti Page, Bing Crosby, Les Paul and Mary Ford, Rosemary Clooney, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Bill Haley and His Comets, Elvis Presley, The Platters, Doris Day, Pat Boone, Dean Martin, Sam Cooke, The Big Bopper, the Everly Brothers, Bobby Darin, Ernie K-Doe, Del Shannon, Brenda Lee, the Rooftop Singers, the Beatles, Roy Orbison, Bob Dylan, Roger Miller, and The New Christy Minstrels. The evening came to a triumphant close as everyone sang along to the closing song. They all knew it. You know it too.

The Boomer Years continues its run for the next four Saturday nights. You might think you have to go to Branson to see a show like this. You don't. Just go to the Little Church, 111 E. Eastport Street in Iuka and sing along.

Will your life be complete if you don't experience "The Boomer Years?" Perhaps, but the trick is to give yourself a treat and visit The Little Church some Saturday night SOON! Sheriff's Report

No Charges in Monday Shooting

The sheriff department is waiting on word from the district attorney's office to see if any charges will be filed in a shooting incident Monday near Tishomingo State Park.

According to the sheriff's department, deputies responded to a report of a shooting about 4:19 p.m. Monday, October 24th. The 911 caller said that a gunshot victim was located at a residence at 101 County Road 87 (Highland Road), and the shooter was still at a residence on County Road 75. Paramedics were on standby in the area.

Deputies arrived at the two residences, and cleared the scenes, allowing the ambulance to come in. The victim,

who received a gun-shot wound to the upper leg in what was deemed a non-life-threatening injury, refused care by paramedics, and was transported to the hospital by a family member.

The alleged shooter was located at the residence on County Road 75. Though the incident is still under investigation, the entire thing was determined to be a family disturbance. The district attorney's office will review the case to see if any charges will be filed on any of the involved parties.

Absentee Voting Now Open for General Election

The Circuit Clerk's Office will be open on Saturday, October 29th (8 a.m. to 12 noon), and Saturday, November 5th (8 a.m. to 12 noon), for absentee voting in the November 8, 2016 General Election.

We encourage those who need to vote by mail to call our office immediately as time is running short to do absentee voting

by mail. When an absentee ballot is requested, an application for an absentee ballot will first be mailed to the voter. This application shall be completed by the absentee voter and mailed back to the Circuit Clerk's Office. When the application is received, the ballot will be mailed to the voter. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered to

anyone. It usually takes approximately a week to complete the mail process with the person in the county.

NOTE: All voters must go to the voting place on Election Day and voters who come in to the circuit clerk's office to vote by absentee ballot are required to show a completed form of Photo

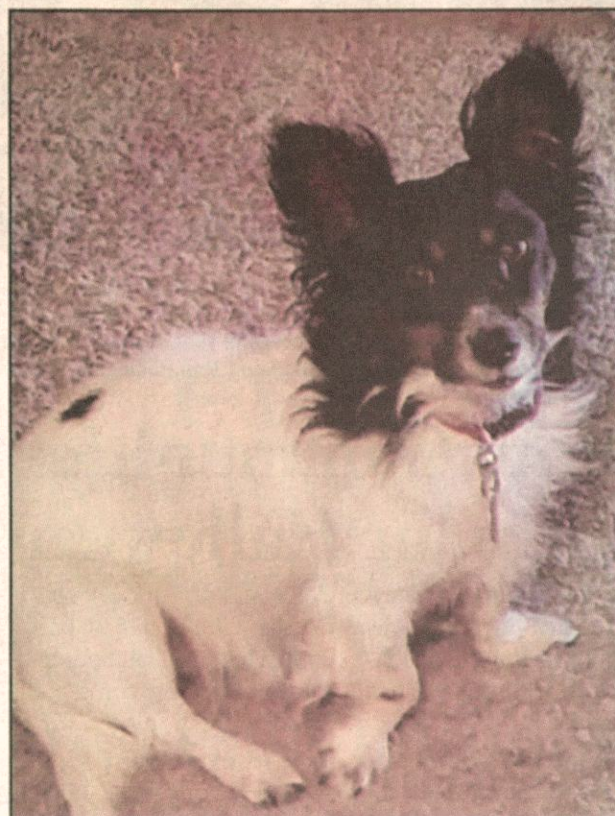

Here are some more pet health myths that are just plain wrong!

Urine Marking Is Cats Staking Their Territory. Cats can use urine to mark their claim but urinating outside the litter box can signal a serious health problem. Urine marking can be the result of a urinary tract infection, bladder stones, or even diabetes or renal failure. They can also be suffering from anxiety or stress. If they are having frequent 'accidents', making numerous trips to the litter box, howling or meowing while urinating, or have blood in their urine, make an appointment with us immediately.

Itchy Ears Must Mean Ear Mites. More often, a dog scratches its ear because of a yeast or bacterial infection that requires appropriate medication to treat. These typically occur as a result of food or inhalant allergy, or from water getting in their ears. Over-the-counter ear mite medicine usually ends up making the ear canal more inflamed and painful. Call us if your dog is scratching ears frequently or shaking his head like his ears are bothering him.

Health Department Educates Mississippians on the Benefits of Smokefree Multi-Unit Housing

Approximately 58 million nonsmokers in the U.S. are still exposed to secondhand smoke, and some of this exposure occurs in homes.

"Exposure to secondhand smoke is much more than a nuisance," said Amy Winter, Director of the Office of Tobacco Control at the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH). "In Mississippi, exposure to secondhand smoke remains an alarming public health hazard."

The MSDH is currently leading Smokefree Air Mississippi, a public health initiative that educates Mississippians on the dangers of secondhand smoke and the benefits of smokefree air. In addition to this initiative, MSDH is working to educate Mississippians on the benefits of smokefree multi-unit housing.

Even if you are not a smoker or don't live with one, secondhand smoke can seep into multi-unit homes from many different places, including vents and cracks in walls or floors. When inhaling secondhand cigarette smoke, individuals are exposed to more than 7,000 chemicals. Hundreds of the chemicals found in secondhand smoke are hazardous, and 69 are known to cause cancer.

"Far too many Mississippians are exposed to secondhand smoke in

their homes every day," said Melissa Nash, director of the Tobacco-Free Coalition of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. "Tenants should not have to face exposure to the toxic chemicals found in secondhand cigarette smoke or have to choose between their health and their living arrangements."

Young children are especially vulnerable to secondhand smoke because their bodies are developing so quickly. Children also take in more secondhand smoke because they breathe more rapidly than adults and often cannot remove themselves from areas where secondhand smoke is present. Eliminating exposure to secondhand smoke is the simplest solution.

"Research shows that simply eliminating smoking in public, indoor spaces fully protects nonsmokers from exposure to secondhand smoke," said Nash. "Separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air, and ventilating buildings does not eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke."

PASTOR'S TIDBITS

Seven Angels With Seven Trumpets (part VIII)

It is interesting that some people go too far in seeking to interpret the Bible as a book of mostly all figurative language, but such is not the case. On the other hand, some people interpret the Bible so literally that they allow for nothing figurative. The actual fact is that most of the Bible is to be taken literally. When there are things that are to be taken figuratively, the Bible will have some kind of key "hanging near the doorway" of that verse or passage. We have that kind of thing in Revelation chapter 9, which shows "locusts" coming out of the bottomless pit that has been opened by a "star", or an angel. Revelation 9:7-10 says, "And the shapes of the locusts

were like unto horses prepared unto battle; and on their heads were as it were crowns like gold, and their faces were as the faces of men. And they had hair as the hair of women, and their teeth were as the teeth of lions. And they had breastplates, as it were breastplates of iron; and the sound of their wings was as the sound of chariots of many horses running to battle. And they had tails like unto scorpions, and there were scorpions in their tails: and their power was to hurt men five months."

There are "keys" hanging all over the doorway to these verses, with such words as: "like unto; as it were; as etc. All of these words tell us that there is a similarity between the locusts and the other things or persons mentioned. So, the locusts are not horses, women, lion's teeth, but they have characteristics like these. I am not about to guess what all is meant

by this allegorical language, but I do know that there are characteristics in these locusts that are like those of men, women and lions. We might see that some of the characteristics described in these locusts picture deception; beauty (as the hair of women) or strength and fierceness as lions. The breastplates are not iron, but are protective like iron; the wings of the locusts make a sound as that of horses running to battle, thus producing fear in those who hear their approach. Perhaps there is much more here, but there is also sometimes much speculation on matters like this, which cannot possibly be proven, so I will leave it to my readers to do their own speculation, if they wish to go beyond what we see in the verses. The locusts have the power of the sting of a scorpion in their tails, showing us that they will inflict pain on those people who do not have the

seal of God in their heads, even like the sting of a scorpion. This torment will last months, without bringing death to anyone. Should anyone think that this is judging too severe by the locust judgment is only a taste of judgment to come on the unsaved when they are before Jesus Christ at the great white throne judgment (Revelation 20:15). At that judgment unsaved will be cast into the lake of fire for ever with no possibility of release. The good news is that the unsaved can come to Christ, as they are living on earth and are sensitive to the Spirit of God's beckoning them to come!

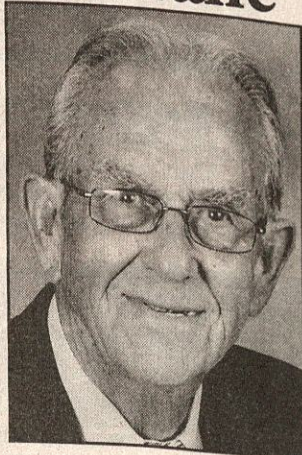

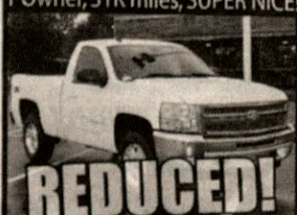

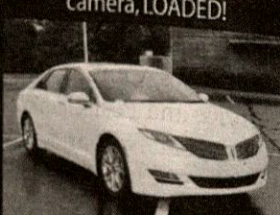

In the middle of pain and grief we don't really care about anything else. Who can focus on the environment, fossil fuels and worry about Social Security when we are bleeding grief and sorrow? I can't and I doubt that most people, if anyone can.

We stand at the grave and we analyze our lives knowing that soon or

maybe in the next five, ten or at best 30 or so years our lives will be over and our bodies will be six feet under the dirt. Our hope is that we will be in a much better place, removed from our bodies and cared for by a loving God. Thus, knowing that our lives are so short what are we to

do?

Keep living. Life is a gift. Don't fret the small stuff. It's all really small stuff. Try to love people and accept people where they are and not where you think they should be. Forgive people and move forward. Don't carry grudges. Make the most of every day. Don't be timid about living life and don't live your life based on what you think everybody else wants you to do. You may not believe in an afterlife. What if there is an afterlife, meeting God, eternity and all that stuff? Do you really want to chance not trying to be ready for something that will be so much longer than this world?

Finally, we should try to leave this world a better place. This brings us back to Presidential elections, taking care of our planet, jobs, border security, terrorism, equality and life around us. Little people are following us. Who we vote for and how we leave this world is so important. We only get a few years and there is some reason we are here. Make a contribution. Vote, keep our country safe, help us stay free and keep working to keep America - America. A place where people want to live and a country where we can die knowing that we were blessed to live briefly in such a great land.

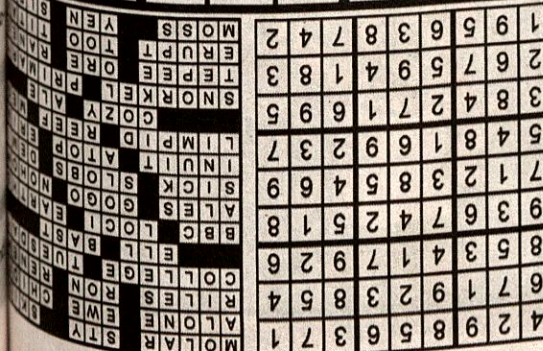
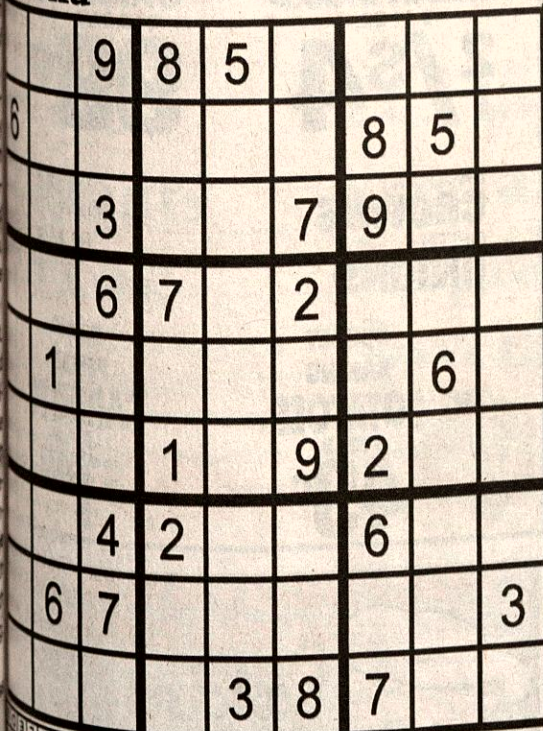
