sented of the Survive the Drive program. Students learned about distracted driving, driving under the influence and seatbelt safety.

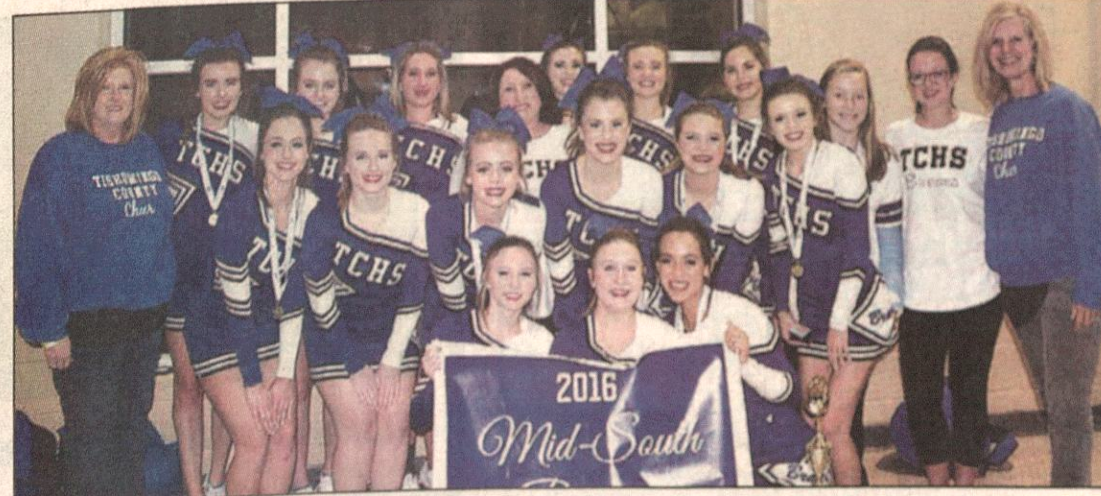
Students and faculty also got to listen to officers from the Juvenile Detention Center, the Bureau of Narcotics, Families First and child protective services.

Here's the Dirt

The Dirt: Water is the Most Important Garden Nutrient

Fortunately, Northeast Mississippi is blessed with 50+ inches of average rainfall each year, or about 1 inch per week, roughly the amount experts say is ideal for gardens/landscapes. Unfortunately, rainfall comes in spurts and our gardens/landscapes seem to be unimpressed by the average, they start looking stressed after a couple of weeks without rain. Dry periods, of course, happen every year, especially in the spring/fall, and allow farmers to plant/harvest crops which is a good thing but causes problems for gardeners. The question is what, if anything, can we reasonably do to keep things green and happy, or at least alive other than turn on the sprinklers.

The easiest way to make up for a lack of rain is to turn on the hose (i.e. irrigate), but that can be expensive. I watered my small garden this summer when the rain skipped us and my water bill tripled! So how much water is 1 inch? Well, about 2/3 of a gallon per square foot. This means that if you have an acre lot with an average size house a 1 inch drink for your yard/garden/landscape will take about 20,000 to 25,000 gallons of water! In my book, that means your fighting a losing battle if you don't have a well, pond, or stream to draw water from, your plants are not going to get enough water; but there are a few things you can do that will help depending on the amount of time and effort you are willing to in-

vest. Before you say "forget about it the plants usually survive... let nature take its course"; consider that it has been scientifically proven that as little as 30 minutes a week spent in a healthy garden/landscape helps reduce depression, blood pressure, and anxiety in most people. Of course if you love formal gardens with everything balanced and lined up like soldiers in formation, the opposite could be true when things look a little rough and stressed. OK, so what does this have to do with a lack of water? Well, if you can't water everything but you have a favorite spot or two you can at least water them well and keep them lush and green, then minimize the damage to everything else.

Grass is the biggest water hog in your yard because it has shallow roots and there is probably more of it than anything else. In addition, short grass that starts to go dormant to survive creates perfect habitat for weed seed blowing around and being brought in by birds, people, and rodents that immediately sprout when it does finally rain. Grass that is allowed to grow to 4-5 inches responds by making deeper roots and the beauty of the lawn is not materially affected by being cut higher because what people notice is how even the grass is and



not how high. The net result of letting grass grow higher is that the grass roots get more sub-soil moisture, evaporation is reduced and the added blade length provides more surface area to trap dew. When it does finally rain, the taller grass shades the ground and helps keep weeds from growing. After the grass starts growing again, remember to cut only a third of the grass at a time until you get back to the grass height you nor-

mally maintain.

Potted plants, regrettably, require water every day or so during the growing season and there is little that will help to reduce the amount of water required. However there are a few things you can try. First don't use a hose, use a watering can to minimize run off, mulch to reduce evaporation, and finally provide shade during the hottest part of the day for the same reason if possible. Of course if it's close to the end of the growing season you may want to just call it a year and throw away the annuals, prune the perennials, and give them just

enough water to keep them alive. Longer term you could get rain barrels and store enough water to just keep flower beds and potted plants alive.

Now let's talk about trees and shrubs. Dry spells seldom kill trees and shrubs, they just look stressed after a while. The biggest problem with trees and shrubs is that their fallen leaves make a perfect hiding place for bacteria and viruses that affect plants. There isn't, as far as I know, an easy fix for this problem other than picking them up and either mulching or burning them.

The bottom line is that

in Northeast Mississippi lack of water is usually an annoying irritant rather than a big problem. Look for ways to work with the cycles of nature rather than fight them. The amount of water available, the beauty of all kinds will bring both joy and health benefits...Happy Gardening! The wreaths will remain on the graves through the Holidays, (January 23).

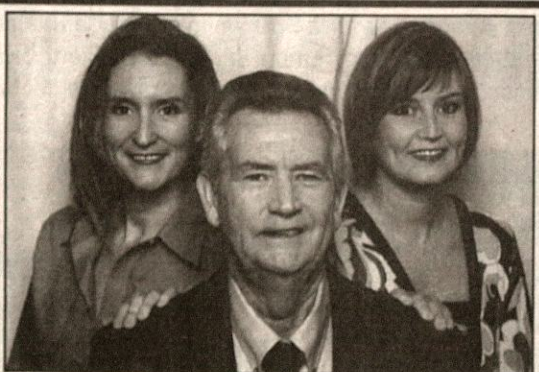

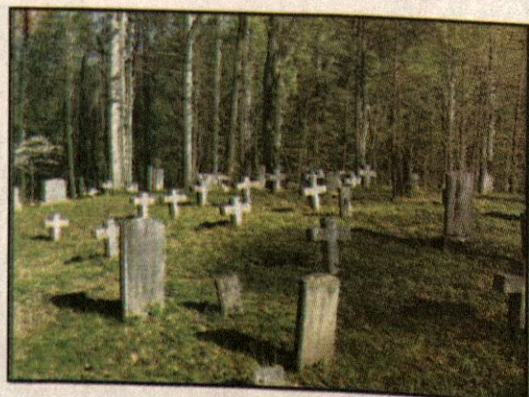

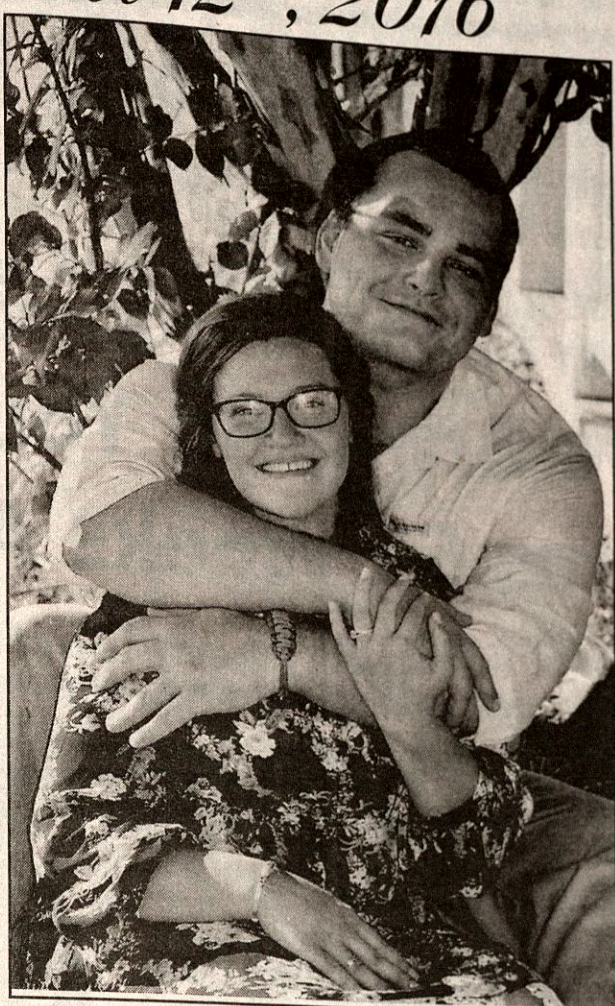

United Daughters Of The Confederacy, John Marshall Stone #394 Met

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone #394 met on October 18th, at 4 p.m. at the Iuka Public Library.

We completed the U.D.C. rituals and the singing of "Dixie" and the meeting was declared open by President Sharon Hand. Members present were Mary Ledbetter, Jackie Durham, Eunell Handy and Sharon Hair. President Sharon Hand read the minutes from the September meeting and they were approved. Eunell Handy gave the treasure report and it was approved and stated that she was in the process of collecting dues. Registrar Eunell Handy reported that she has six applications that she was working on and several were almost ready to be met in. Chaplin Mary Ledbetter had nothing new to report.

New business was discussed by email from Pat Parson concerning U.D.C. President's Challenge. The challenge was issued to each chapter. They went to know why each one it's name. If it was after someone they would take a picture and a brief history. This will be placed in the W Memorial room in our chapter files. This will ensure that our chapter history will be carried on to the future generations.

Our Program was presented by Sharon Hair. The topic "Uncommon Soldiers: Women's Role in the Civil War". Whether they were on the Union or the Confederate side, the women living during the Civil War were fiercely loyal and what they could to aid their cause. The situations of the women in the North and South were different. The women in the North didn't have the war taking place right in their backyard. "For Southern women, things were much harder as much of the war took place near their homes".

Southern women had to take care of grandpar-ents, the kids, the plantations, the animals left and food on the tables. Women had to plow the fields, chop wood, and take care of livestock that was left in addition to their regular duties.

Besides being left to take care of things when the men left to fight, some never saw their hus-

bands, fathers, brothers, and uncles again even after the war ended. Those men fortunate enough to return home were often crippled or sick. The women in the South had emotional problems and extreme stress in dealing with the loss or illness of their loved ones.

Southern women worked in hospitals, sometimes writing letters to the soldier's families. Southern women would form groups to sew and make uniforms for the soldiers. Some women were wounded trying to aid wounded soldiers on the battlefield. Many Southern women were spies and many others would disguise themselves as men and fight.

Sharon also reviewed the U.D.C. magazine with the group. One article was about the unusual hero of the civil war, "the horses, mules and donkeys". More than 1,500,000 horses and mules were killed during the Civil War. In the early days of the conflict, more horses than men were killed. Just at the July 1863 Battle of Gettysburg alone, the number of horses killed was about 1,500-881 horses and mules for the Union, and 619 for the Confederacy.

One famous horse was Traveller, General Robert E. Lee's beloved horse. Traveller (British spelling) was a horse of great stamina and was usually a good horse for an officer because he was difficult to frighten.

After the war Traveller accompanied Lee to Washington College in Lexington, Virginia. In 1870, during Lee's funeral procession, Traveller was led behind the caisson bearing the General's casket, his saddle and bridle draped in black crepe. Not long after Lee's death, in 1871 Traveller stepped on a nail and developed tetanus and was shot to relieve his suffering.

Traveller was buried behind the main buildings of the college, but was unearthed by persons unknown and his bones were bleached for exhibition in Rochester, New York, (1875-1876). In 1907 Richmond journalist, Joseph Bryan paid to have the bones mounted and returned to the college, named Washington and Lee University. The skeleton was vandalized

there by student's who carved their initials in it for good luck, so his skeleton was removed to the basement. In 1971, Traveller's remains were buried in a wooden box encased in concrete next to Lee Chapel on the campus of Washington and Lee, a few feet away from Lee's family crypt, where his master's body rests.

Traveller remains known to Washington and Lee students, and is the namesake of the University's Safe Ride Program. Students are known to say "Call Traveller and you will get Home Safe".



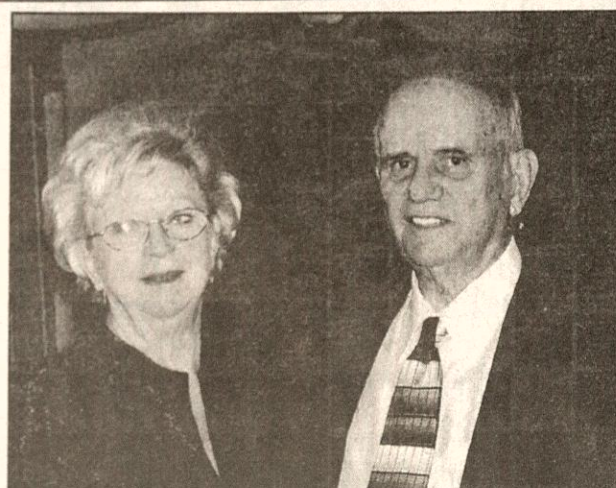
The Helpful Samaritan Food Pantry Can Drive has Started

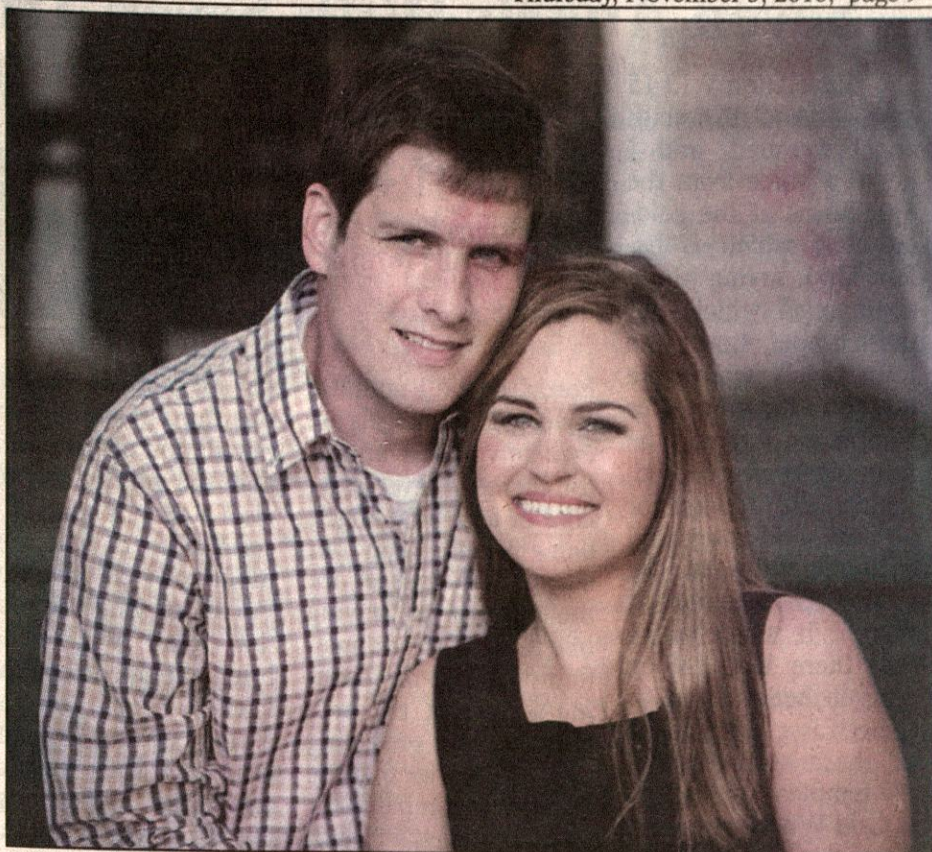
the new bird feeders and all the different types of birds they have attracted.

Seven Angels With Seven Trumpets (part IX)

Revelation 9:13-15 says, "And the sixth angel sounded, and I heard a voice from the four horns of the golden altar which is before God, saying to the sixth angel which had the trumpet, Loose the four angels which are bound in the great river Euphrates. And the four angels were loosed, which were prepared for an hour, and a day, and a month, and a year, for to slay the third part of men." It is interesting that there is a golden altar in heaven, just as there was a golden altar in the tabernacle and the temple. Evidently it is God Who is speaking from the horns of the golden altar, as He gives His command concerning the four angels

bound in the Euphrates River. These angels are evidently fallen angels, for there is never a record of any good angels being bound. The four angels are loosed for the purpose of slaying one third of the population of the earth, meaning a third of the men left after the preceding plagues. Notice that the angels were prepared for an hour; a day; a month and a year, meaning that God has prepared these wicked angels to

do the work of slaying one third of the present population of the earth, and the timing is precise: a certain hour of a certain day of a certain month of a certain year. For those who suppose that God will never bring judgment on the wicked people of the earth, I would say that God will do it by precise order and timing, but His timing is not the same as ours!

Revelation 9:16-19 says, "And the number

of the army of the horsemen were two hundred thousand thousand: and I heard the number of them. And thus I saw the horses in the vision, and them that sat on them, having breastplates of fire, and of jacinth, and brimstone: and the heads of the horses were as the heads of lions; and out of their mouths issued fire and smoke and brimstone. By these three was the third part of men killed, by the fire, and by the smoke, and by the brimstone, which issued out of their mouths. For their power was in their mouth, and in their tails: for their tails were like unto serpents, and had heads, and with them they do hurt." Now we have the means

by which the four angels shall slay one third of earth's population, for it will be with an army of men that numbers 200 million! So, men will be used to kill men, and military weaponry will evidently be used also. The figurative language of our verses above must represent something more than the things named, for there would have been no need for John to write the Book of Revelation and mention jet planes, bombs, missiles etc., since these things would have made no sense to anyone before modern times. The protective breastplates; the lions; the fire, smoke and brimstone all represent destructive weapons, as well as protection for the army and its

weapons. The men and tails that have power to inflict death represent the machinery of planes, etc., but that is a guess, I am willing to hear it.) We do know that God will allow military equipment to bring death, much the power of a poisonous serpent to death. Get beyond trying to figure out the symbolism and understand that God brings severe judgment on men through means. In the next article, we will learn about why these (and other human) judged.
