## New Year Begins with New Director and Extended Hours of Operation at Old Courthouse Museum

Jeff Hamrick will take the reigns as Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum in 2018. Effective January 1st the extended hours at the museum will be 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on the last Sunday of each month.

Jeff Hamrick is a retired medical management executive, he and his wife, Debbie (Gann) recently moved to Iuka following retirement. During this interval, Jeff volunteered at the Old Courthouse Museum and

fell in love with the rich history of the area. Jeff and Debbie owe their move to Iuka to the wishes of their daughter, Music Gaylor, and grandchildren Megann, Carson, and Creedon. Mr. Hamrick has a lifelong fascination with history. "Learning about history is so important so that we don't repeat the same mistakes of the past. We can be proud of some things and learn from others."

Despite the recent issues with funding, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors came through with an increase

to the allocations available to the courthouse. This increase has allowed the museum to remain open and facilitated the employment of the new executive director and a part time librarian.

Jeff will be filling the position of the Executive Director following the retirement of Cindy Nelson. Mr. Hamrick had this to say. "No one can replace Cindy, and I am not going to try and do that. I'm looking forward to her working with me during the upcoming months as I transition into the archives and museum management world. I also have some new and different ideas that I hope will expand our awareness in the community. Since the library and archives go hand and hand with the museum and its artifacts, we are excited that the excellent work of Cindy, ReNae Vaughn, Shelia Thorne and so many others will continue for the foreseeable future."

Volunteers have spent the last two months renovating several areas of the museum and library. The research area of the library has been expanded to better accommodate more researchers, lighting has been added to the display cases that hold the exhibits, and a room dedicated to Senator Cecil Sumners has been recreated. Also returning to the collection on display, is the old county doctor's room.

Fund raising is a key aspect of concern for the new director, in addition to renting the courtroom for reunions, meetings, weddings and the return of the local renaissance fair, discussion continues on ways to bring back the famous gospel singings to the courthouse. Mr. Hamrick has also expressed that one of his

## Break-in at Local Subway Restaurant

Subway Restaurant in Iuka was broken into early Wednesday morning on December 20<sup>th</sup> at 3:35 a.m. Security footage shows two individuals entered the building after they shattered the glass of the front door. They approached the cash register and found nothing to take; they then searched the restaurant before leaving empty handed. When opening the store around 6 a.m. one of Subway's employees discovered the break-in had taken place and called the police.

The manager of Subway, Beckie Wiley, stated that there is a possibility that the suspects involved in this situation are the

same individuals who broke into a subway in Walnut, Mississippi, earlier that same night. It was also reported that the subjects responsible for the break-in that occurred in Walnut had Tennessee licenses plates.

## Belmont Man Arrested Again For Drugs

On December 19th deputies of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's department arrested Billy "Chad" Sartain, 30, of Warren Drive, in Belmont. Sartain was officially charged with several misdemeanors and the felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine. Sartain's bond was

set by the Justice Court at \$3,000 which he was able to make; his case will be presented to the next available Grand Jury. Sartain was out on a previous felony bond for the same offense at the time of this arrest.

Sartain was apprehended during a traffic stop at the intersection of

Hwy. 25 and CR 23 for failing to stop at a stop sign. Deputies observed Sartain was in possession of some scales, which are commonly used to weigh narcotics on. A further search of the vehicle yielded some alleged methamphetamine and some pipes that are used in the smoking of methamphetamine.

The driver was arrested and transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Civilizations around the world have been celebrating the start of each new year for at least four millennia. Today, most New Year's festivities begin on December 31 (New Year's Eve), the last day of the Gregorian calendar, and continue into the early hours of January 1 (New Year's Day). Common traditions include attending parties, eating special New Year's foods, making resolutions for the new year and watching fireworks displays.

### EARLY NEW YEAR'S CELEBRATIONS

The earliest recorded festivities in honor of a new year's arrival date back some 4,000 years to ancient Babylon. For the Babylonians, the first new moon following the vernal equinox—the day in late March with an equal amount of sunlight and darkness—heralded the start of a new year. They marked the occasion with a massive religious festival called Akitu (derived from the Sumerian word for barley, which was cut in the spring) that involved a different ritual on each of its 11 days. In addition to the new year, Akitu celebrated the mythical victory of the Babylonian sky god Marduk over the evil sea goddess Tiamat and served an important political purpose: It was during this time that a new king was crowned or that the current ruler's divine mandate was symbolically renewed.

### Did You Know?

In order to realign the Roman calendar with the sun, Julius Caesar had to add 90 extra days to the year 46 B.C. when he introduced his new Julian calendar.

Throughout antiquity, civilizations around the world developed increasingly sophisticated calendars, typically pinning the first day of the year to an agricultural or astronomical event. In Egypt, for instance, the year began with the annual flooding of the Nile, which coincided with the rising of the star Sirius. The first day of the Chinese new year, meanwhile, occurred with the second new moon after the winter solstice.

### JANUARY 1 BECOMES NEW YEAR'S DAY

The early Roman calendar consisted of 10 months and 304 days, with each new year beginning at the vernal equinox; according to tradition, it was created by Romulus, the founder of Rome, in the eighth century B.C. A later king, Numa Pompilius, is credited with adding the months of Januarius and Februarius. Over the centuries, the calendar fell out of sync with the sun, and in 46 B.C. the emperor Julius Caesar decided to solve the problem by consulting with the most prominent astronomers and mathematicians of his time. He introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the more modern Gregorian calendar that most countries around the world use today.

As part of his reform, Caesar instituted January 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honor the month's namesake: Janus, the Roman god of beginnings, whose two faces allowed him to look back

into the past and forward into the future. Romans celebrated by offering sacrifices to Janus, exchanging gifts with one another, decorating their homes with laurel branches and attending raucous parties. In medieval Europe, Christian leaders temporarily replaced January 1 as the first of the year with days carrying more religious significance, such as December 25 (the anniversary of Jesus' birth) and March 25 (the Feast of the Annunciation); Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January 1 as New Year's Day in 1582.

### NEW YEAR'S TRADITIONS

In many countries, New Year's celebrations begin on the evening of December 31—New Year's Eve—and continue into the early hours of January 1. Revelers often enjoy meals and snacks thought to bestow good luck for the coming year. In Spain and several other Spanish-speaking countries, people bolt down a dozen grapes—symbolizing their hopes for the months ahead—right before midnight. In many parts of the world, traditional New Year's dishes feature legumes, which are thought to resemble coins and herald future financial success; examples include lentils in Italy and black-eyed peas in the southern United States. Because pigs represent progress and prosperity in some cultures, pork appears on the New Year's Eve table in Cuba, Austria, Hungary, Portugal and other countries. Ring-shaped cakes and pastries, a sign that the year has come full circle, round out the feast in the Netherlands, Mexi-

co, Greece and elsewhere. In Sweden and Norway, meanwhile, rice pudding with an almond hidden inside is served on New Year's Eve; it is said that whoever finds the nut can expect 12 months of good fortune.

Other customs that are common worldwide include watching fireworks and singing songs to welcome the new year, including the ever-popular "Auld Lang Syne" in many English-speaking countries. The practice of making resolutions for the new year is thought to have first caught on among the ancient Babylonians, who made promises in order to earn the favor of the gods and start the year off on the right foot. (They would reportedly vow to pay off debts and return borrowed farm equipment.)

In the United States, the most iconic New Year's tradition is the dropping of a giant ball in New York City's Times Square at the stroke of midnight. Millions of people around the world watch the event, which has taken place almost every year since 1907. Over time, the ball itself has ballooned from a 700-pound iron-and-wood orb to a brightly patterned sphere 12 feet in diameter and weighing in at nearly 12,000 pounds. Various towns and cities across America have developed their own versions of the Times Square ritual, organizing public drops of items ranging from pickles (Dillsburg, Pennsylvania) to possums (Tallapoosa, Georgia) at midnight on New Year's Eve.

Revelation 18:3 will get us back into the picture of what I am saying, "For all nations have drunk of the wine of the wrath of her fornication, and the kings of the earth have committed fornication with her, and the merchants of the earth are waxed rich through the abundance of her delicacies."

God is certainly not against commerce, nor is He against profit in the business world, but God is still, as always, against extortion. The word "extortion" is used 8 times in some form in the Bible. 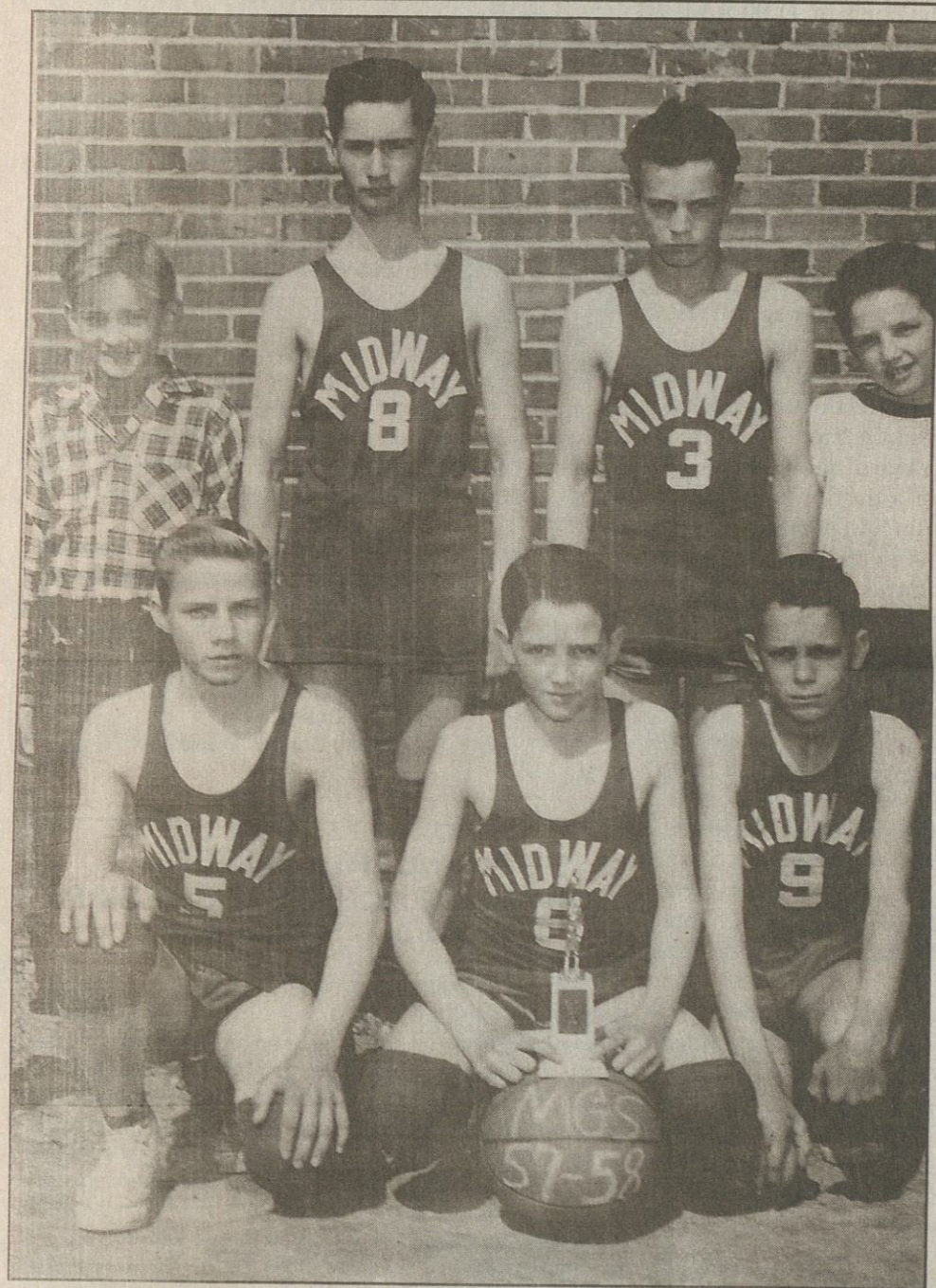


This is a photo of Luther Sterling Lomenick and Ruby Jewell (Brown) Lomenick taken just before their wedding on December 1, 1934.

Mississippi. Some of the many highlights of the day included a live wax museum, in which various students dressed up as famous people from MS. When students and

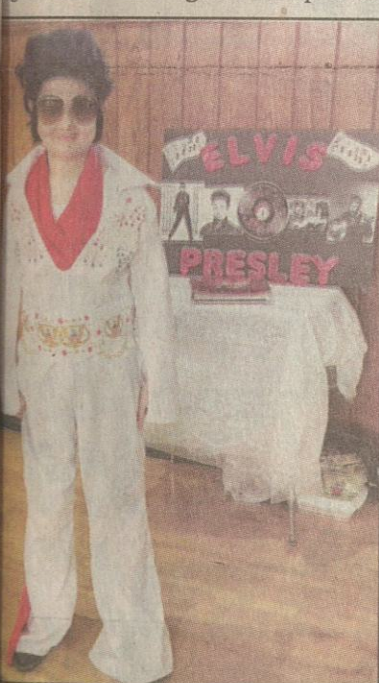
parents approached the famous Mississippian, they would "push a button", and the celebrity student would tell them all about his or her life.

### Brief History of Corinth's 1924 American LaFrance Fire Engine:

Ordered by the City of Corinth in 1923 for delivery to the city in 1924. Arrived in Corinth on rail car on the day before the city's worst fire in history.

Around 3 a.m. on December 28, 1924 - A fire started in a small cafe on Fillmore Street and it consumed several blocks of downtown Corinth. Estimated lost of \$1 million to \$2 million in property and 50 businesses.

The fire engine was delivered from the north and was froze to the rail car when it arrived in Corinth. Firefighters and city workers were unable to unload the fire engine and it was not used to fight the fire.

The fire engine would go on to help Corinth firefighters fight fires for more than three decades. It was retired in 1967. In 1968, it was

dedicated and restored under the guidance of Mayor John D. Mercier.

Unfortunately the fire engine would live out many years closed

up in the city barn before being moved to Fire Station No. 1 and then No. 4, where it sits today hidden from the world.

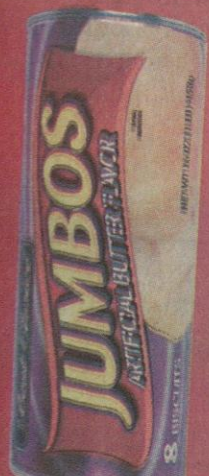
