Local Bank Suing 11 Local Governments to Recover from Accounting Mistake

Local bank is suing eleven governments to recover \$300,000 in taxes they paid due to an error by their accountant.

According to court filings Tishomingo County Circuit Court, First American National Bank headquartered in Iuka, has filed eleven complaints against cities and counties where they have branch locations stating they are seeking a refund of taxes they say they overpaid, due to an accounting mistake by their own accountants. The amount they are owed is \$300,000 according to

First American's attorney Richard Bowen (who is also a board member of First American National Bank.)

The court filing explained that the bank's accountant (Nail McKinney P.A.) figures the taxes owed to the government entities each year, and, according to these suits, for the tax years 2013, 2014, and 2015, the accountant failed to properly deduct certain exemptions allowed to the banks, specifically, the value of low interest loans and the value of the banks' deposits. This assessment is for what is commonly called a tax on intangibles, and is in addition to *ad valorem* (property), franchise, and other taxes assessed to and paid by banking institutions.

The bank filed eleven separate lawsuits against seven municipalities and four counties. In Tishomingo County, this includes Tishomingo, Golden, Belmont, Iuka and Burnsville, and Tishomingo County. City boards and boards of supervisors in Lee, Prentiss and Itawamba counties were all presented with Complaint for Refund of Overpayment of Taxes this week, or will be shortly, said Bowen. The reason they filed suit, instead of

negotiating with the now defendants in the case was to "protect a three-year window" on recovering overpaid funds from as far back as 2013, 2014, and 2015.

Government boards are understandably surprised that the bank is asking them to use taxpayer dollars to repay the bank for their own accountant's mistakes.

Reportedly representatives with the bank met with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors and gave them a "heads up" on the situation. Tishomingo County has the largest amount to pay back - about \$70,000 for three years, said Bowen. County Board Attorney Philip Whitehead said he agrees that they are legally entitled to that exemption, but it will be a hard case to prove to taxpayers that taxpayer money should go to reimburse the bank for their mistake.

Though the filing was dated by a court clerk stamp December 29th, 2016, according to Tishomingo Mayor James Tennyson, it came completely out

House Destroyed by Fire Early Wednesday Morning

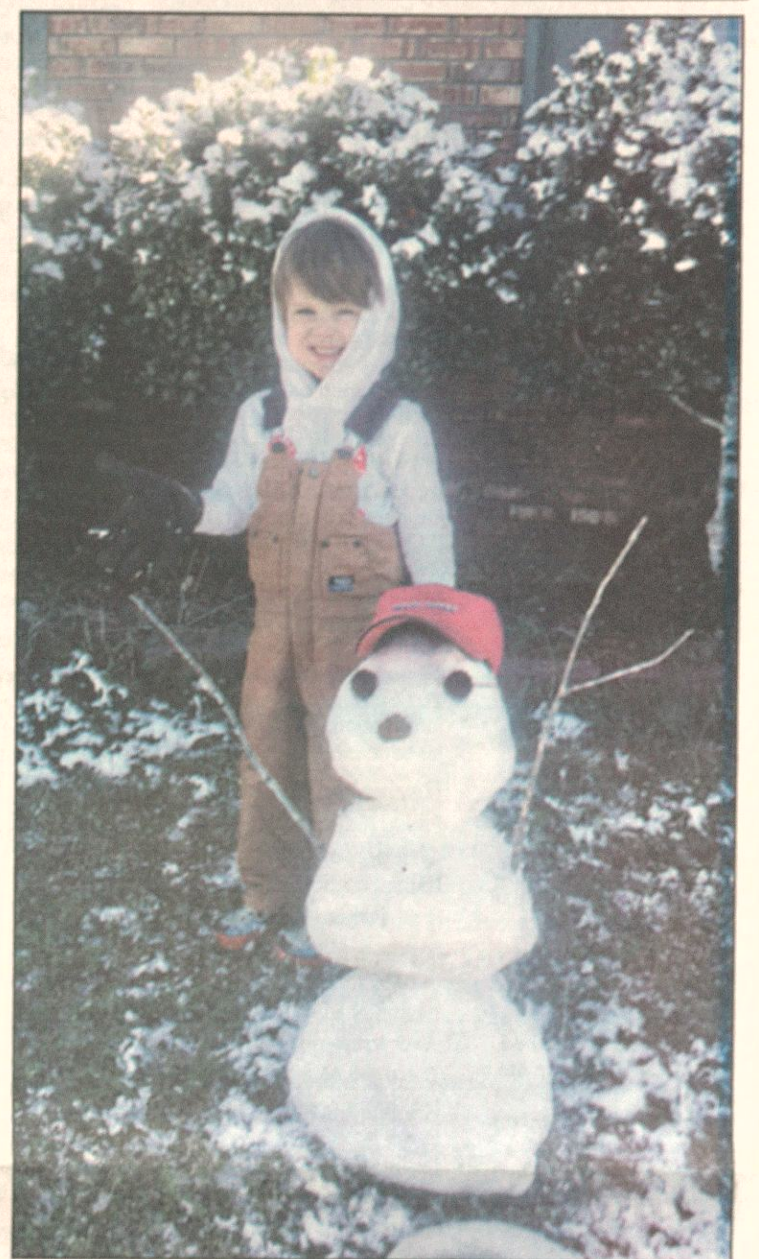
A house at 57 County Road 12 in the Midway area was destroyed by fire in the early hours of Wednesday morning.

Snowy Surprise Sunday Morning in Tishomingo County

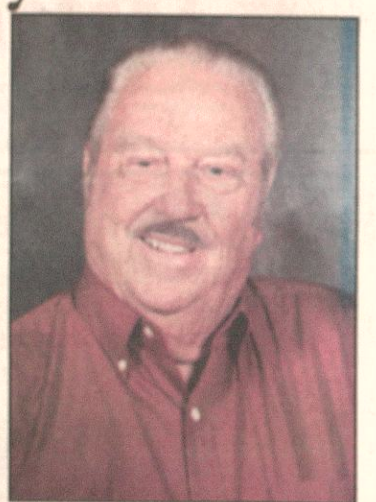

of nowhere. No one spoke to him or the town's legal counsel ahead of the papers being served March 6th. Court documents state the bank is asking for \$5,670 back from the Town "as a refund for taxes paid and collected through error, together with all costs of this proceeding."

With a limited annual budget for the town of less than 500 residents, paying back \$5,670 plus court costs is certainly not in the town of Tishomingo's budget.

Tennysen said they will be looking into the situation and asking the bank to prove its case before they repay. He said he thinks his town will be rethinking their relationship with First American.

He verified that Tishomingo uses First American for the Town's bank time.

Belmont and Tishomingo City Attorney Moore said he received papers for those towns the bank made money to the tune of \$17,000 in Belmont and \$3,000 in Golden.

"We just got it. We are taking a look at it. We'll figure out a plan," said Moore.

Iuka had not received their press release, but the house verified that it has a suit coming.

A call and visit to First American's Tommy Chamberlain received no response.

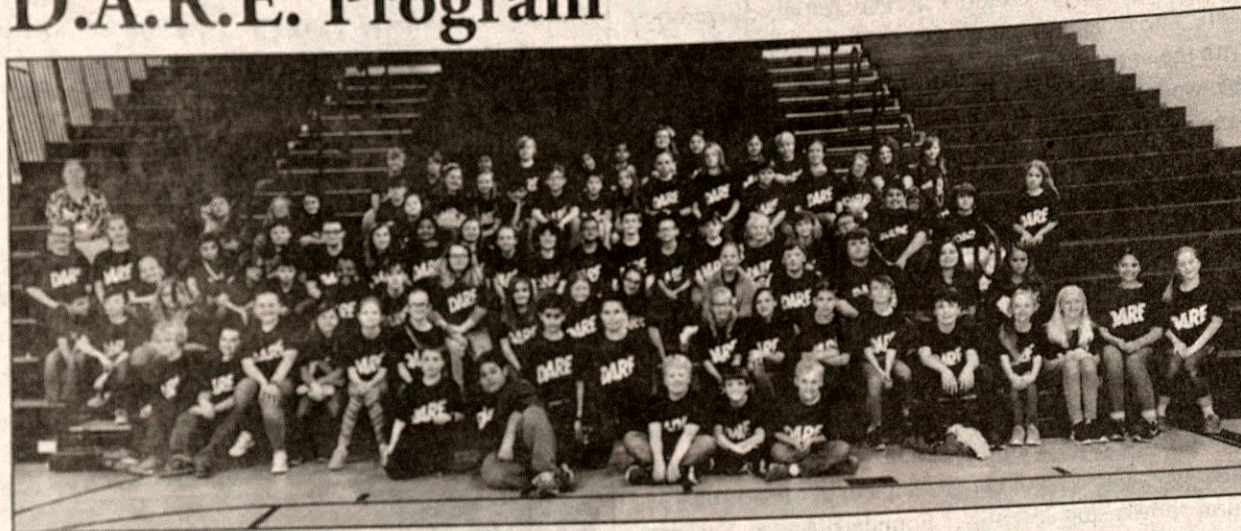

Conservation Corner

Zinke Confirmed as Interior Secretary, 68-31

Wildlife Mississippi, along with the Boone and Crockett Club, praises President Donald Trump's appointment, and the recent confirmation by the U.S. Senate, of U.S. Representative Ryan Zinke to become Secretary of the Department of the Interior. Zinke, a former Navy SEAL, will be in charge of managing 254 million acres of federal lands as the Secretary of the Interior. An avid hunter and angler, Zinke has a true love and devotion to our public lands and describes himself "as someone who grew up in a logging and rail town and hiking in Glacier National Park."

"Ryan Zinke has already demonstrated the leadership required as America's top conservation steward, and the

president has done likewise in embracing it," said Ben B. Hollingsworth Jr., president of the Boone and Crockett Club. "The congressman has seen that frustrations with federal land management are the driver of many controversies and has rejected surrendering those federal lands as a supposed solution. Zinke and Donald Trump know that ever since Theodore Roosevelt made federal lands and conservation a national priority, hunters and other sportsmen-conservationists have worked to ensure America's wildlife heritage."

Zinke said he would uphold Theodore Roosevelt's belief that public lands are "for the benefit and enjoyment of the people." He continued by assuring the public that he will "work tirelessly to en-

sure our public lands are managed and preserved in a way that benefits everyone for generations to come."

Zinke has built a strong track record by supporting responsible energy development and public land issues, especially the proper management of our nation's federal lands. Federal lands are the foundation of the most successful conservation system in the world which was established by Theodore Roosevelt. Federal lands are hugely valuable and yet are being inadequately cared for due to reduced funding, routine litigation and over-complicated regulations. These problems are not simple, but they can be fixed—and must be fixed—by a commitment to good public policy, including the legacy of American conservation.

Left unattended, the present controversies over proposals to dispose of federal lands are likely to smother any political opportunity to fix problems with federal land management. The controversies are well-funded by ideological partisans on both sides. As these players define the issue, they discourage all but the most polarized proposals from coming forward. But, as several sporting conservation organizations and a few others (including Secretary Zinke) have said, federal land issues are more about management problems than who "owns" them. Multiple use should be more effectively achieved; federal lands should not be a burden to rural counties, whether in the West or the South.

MDWFP Concerned About Illegal Wild Hog Trapping Methods

JACKSON - Wild hogs can be found in all 82 of Mississippi's counties and the damage they cause to the ecosystem, agriculture, and native wildlife are a serious concern. The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) encourages control of wild hogs at every legal opportunity and for everyone to become familiar with regulations regarding hunting and trapping wild hogs. According to MDWFP Nuisance Wildlife Biologist, Anthony Ballard, "Late winter and early spring is a period when available food resources can be depleted, which makes trapping wild hogs with bait even more effective. Therefore, we encourage landowners to take advantage of this time of year to trap wild hogs, focusing on trapping entire sounders (multiple family groups) at one time." Ballard advises, "Trapping wild hogs is not like setting traps for rats and mice. There is an art and science to effective wild hog trapping. Improper trapping techniques can actually impede population reduction success."

Types of traps, location of traps, materials used, pre-baiting, trap doors, trigger devices, and when to set the trap for capture are all important considerations. For specific information about wild hog trapping techniques go to www.mdwfp.com/wild_hogs and www.wildpinfo.msstate.edu/.

The MDWFP is particularly concerned about

recent reports of illegally constructed hog cage-type traps that protect non-target animals such as deer, turkeys, coons, and black bears. Regulations require all wild hog traps constructed with the least 50 percent escape to allow the escape of target animals, particularly black bears. Traps must be labeled with the owner's name and information. Additionally, traps must be checked at least every 36 hours and all non-target animals must be released. MDWFP Black Bear Program Leader, Richard Mel, warns landowners, "Black bears are to be found in any Mississippi and must be released to avoid being trapped in hog traps. Bears can die from the attempt to escape and injuries in the closed traps. Black bears are considered endangered species in Mississippi and to the death of a Black bear carries penalties of \$5,000, five days and loss of hunting, and fishing for one year, if caught. Proper openings in the roof allow black bears to climb out but prevent the escape of wild hogs."

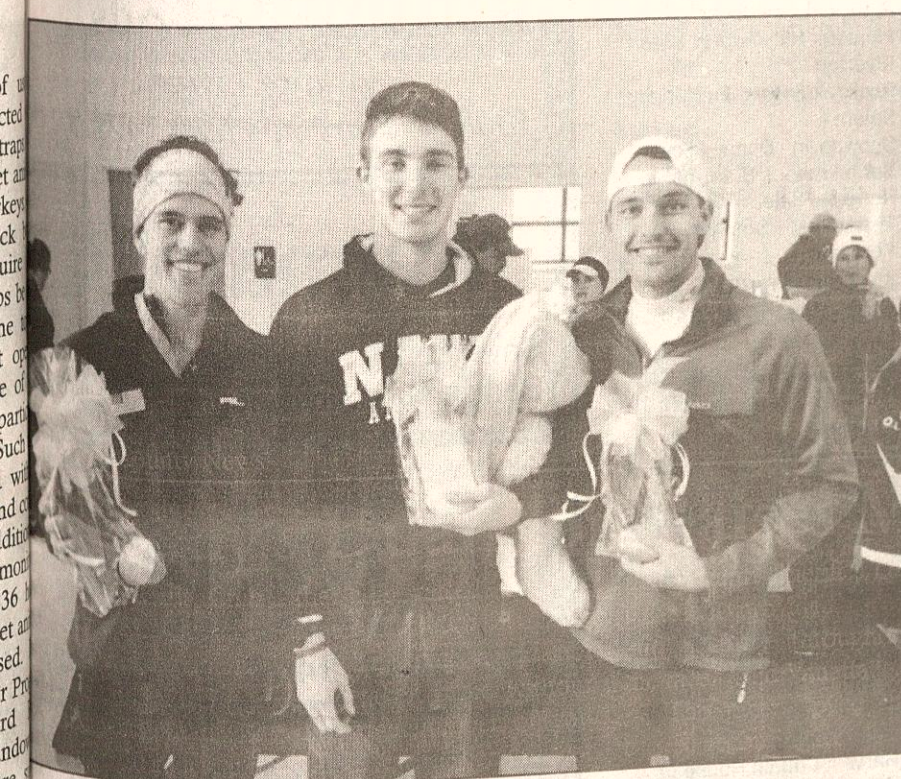

Kick Butts Day to Help Rid Mississippi of Pollution, Preventable Death

Walking along Mississippi's roadways may remind pedestrians of an ashtray. Cigarette butts scattered over the state's beautiful landscape are constant reminders of a sad statistic. More than 500,000 adults in Mississippi smoke cigarettes. Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States.

"I don't think people really know how bad cigarettes are for us and our environment," said Amy Winter, Director of the Office of Tobacco Control at the Mississippi State Department of Health. "Cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals and carcinogens that pollute the environment. They're poisonous to wildlife and can contaminate water sources."

Smoking a cigarette and disposing of it improperly wreaks havoc on public health and the environment. That's why Winter, coalition officials, and dedicated students throughout the state participate in the annual Kick Butts Day. During this na-

tional day of activism on March 15, thousands of youth around the world speak out and stand up to the tobacco industry. As part of this year's Kick Butts Day celebration, the Mississippi Tobacco-Free Coalition of Prentiss/Tishomingo counties will help kids learn about the harsh contaminants of butts after spending hours picking up after litterers.

"Every year our appearance alone makes a difference," said Gabby Simpson, Youth Advisory Board member of Generation Free, Mississippi's youth-led movement against big tobacco. "People see us picking up cigarette butts, and they learn facts about the effect on the environment and our mission. This is how we educate and eradicate."

Simpson is one of many young activists in the state taking part in a variety of tobacco prevention activities during the school year through the Mississippi State Department of Health's local tobacco-free coalitions. The youth teams get a chance

to work with elected leaders to develop policies that reduce youth tobacco use and exposure to second-hand smoke and educate their peers about the risks of tobacco use.

Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States, killing approximately 480,000 people every year. This is more than AIDS, alcohol, car accidents, illegal drugs, murders, and suicides combined. Each year, 3,300 Mississippi kids under the age of 18 become new, daily smokers. And 68,000 Mississippi kids now under 18 will ultimately die prematurely from smoking, according to the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids.

People have set dates for the coming of Christ for centuries, but most of these have come and gone and Christ has not come. It is ridiculous for anyone to set a date that God has never given to men, so speculation on that matter is foolish! Speculation on the image of the beast is really no more sensible, for we do not know what that image will be. It may be

a stone or wax man that looks like the antichrist, but that is also an empty speculation. At any rate, the false prophet will have men make this image, and he will give it life.

Someone might say that only God can give life, but it could be argued that God can give power to others to give life, just as He has given some people power to raise the dead in certain instances. The big thing here is not just what the image looks like, rather it is about the power of the image, for the image will be able to

speak and to cause all who will not worship the image to be killed! Peggy Smith Hunts Hooten Family to Return Glasses

Editor's note: this article that was printed last week contained several errors. We regret this and are printing it again.

Peggy Drewry Smith, of Corinth, better known to many as Hamburger Harold Smith's wife - who owned a little café on Fillmore St. till his passing in 2011 is sharing a very unusual story with our readers in an effort to locate the owners of a pair of glasses.

Peggy and her husband camped at Crowe's Neck in Tishomingo, for years in the summer. They had a special friend (Hack Hamilton) who lived a short distance from Crow's Neck. Each weekend the three would start out early to go look at all the carport sales they could find. It was one morning as Peggy was looking through (what we call junk) near the bottom of the pile, she came across a glasses case, she purchased for 50 cents. The case was almost worn to threads. She didn't think so much about the case at that time, so she tossed it in a drawer at her home. It was there for 28 years till a few weeks ago.

Going through some things she noticed the old glasses case, so unexpected. This time Peggy paid more attention to the case. What a surprise she found it to be. On top of the case was some writing, you certainly couldn't make out, but Peggy

was very anxious to see what it said. She got her magnifier and the writing wasn't plain, but she didn't stop till she could make it out. Now understand, Peggy understood she had bought the case with glasses in Tishomingo, in the year of 1989 - 28 years ago. The writing on top said Bry's Optical, Memphis, TN. Dr. Kleins in charge. In that old worn out case was an old brown paper that said who owned the glasses. The name was Mrs. Hooten - Tishomingo, nothing more for an address. There were two initials to the name but Peggy could only make out the first and it was a "W." Mrs. W. Hooten, her next appointment was September 2nd, 1939. It is yet to be known the age of Mrs. Hooten at the time of her appointment - September 2nd, 1939.

The phone number at the optical company was 2-531-Dept. 9709 - Memphis Tenn.

Peggy researched the name of Bry's in Memphis TN and the only Bry's she has come up with was a clothing store that sold out in 1929. Peggy asks if any "young generation" has any ties to a Mrs. Hooten to please contact Peggy through the Tishomingo county paper in Iuka, MS, 38852.
