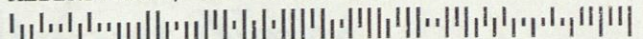

Neighborhood "Spoofing" Telephone Scam

The Public Service Commission is in the course of an investigation with the FCC, looking for a telephone scam called "spoofing" which is affecting residents across the state.

It seems that scammers have acquired old phone numbers of residential residents and businesses whose phones have been disconnected; the telemarketers are using the numbers to make their calls. The caller ID will register as the previous owner of the phone so that the name and number calling might seem local

and familiar.

The Public Service Commission advises everyone not to give the callers any personal information at all but to get as much information as possible from the callers. They ask that you then file a complaint by calling 800-637-7722, please include the name and number that showed up during the call and what they were selling. This information will help to further the investigation and hopefully put an end to this problem.

School Board Holds Special Meeting to Clarify Transfer Policy

The Tishomingo County School Board called a special meeting with the focus of revising and clarifying the districts transfer policy.

Other topics covered in this special meeting were the approval of personnel, and other items important to the start of new school year.

In district student transfers:

K-8

The assignment of students to a school attendance zone shall be made on the basis of residency of students. Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District shall use the electronic School Zone database for determining In-District School Zones. In-district transfers to a school other than the designated attendance zone will only be considered upon parent

or guardian request made to the school board based upon one of the following:

A student requires a course of study not offered at the school, such as special education, etc.

A student has an emotional or medical condition, which would be adversely affected by a move to another building and the condition is verified by a psychologist's or physician's statement, respectively.

A change of environment for the student has been recommended by the court, police, juvenile court, Department of Human Services, or school administration.

In-district transfers will only be considered by the School Board and can only be granted when deemed necessary by the Board of Education (based

upon one of the above circumstances).

If a student has been attending a school in a zone other than the zone in which he/she resides, the student will be allowed to continue to attend the same school.

The student's siblings who live in the same household will be allowed to attend the same school.

If a student changes residences, the student may continue attending the original school.

At any time, a student may transfer to the zone in which he/she resides, but said student must remain at that school for the remainder of his/her education.

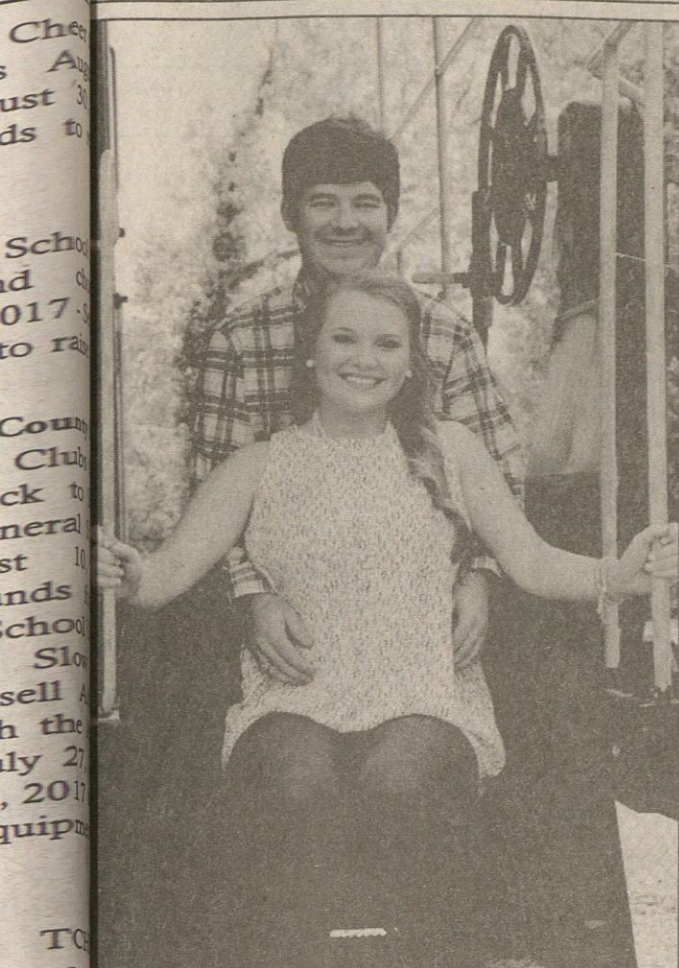

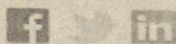

Tom Walkers and Truck Wagons from the Past

Jerrell McNutt of Grovetown, Georgia (a native of Dennis) is sharing a collection of some of his stories about growing up in Tishomingo County with our readers.

In our spare time on the farm my brothers and I built and played with tom walkers and truck wagons. There were three major steps to this activity. First we had to design these toys. Second the building process took time and effort. Third, the fun of playing with them was most enjoyable.

A "Tom Walker" is built out of wood strips about five feet long. About 20 inches from the lower

end a foot rest is nailed to the strip. Each one of us needed two walkers. To keep the foot of the walker from slipping and sliding we drove a nail in it. We let the nail stick out about one inch and after cutting off the head it was sharpened with a file. We took giant steps with these walkers. Racing with neighbor boys was a lot of fun.

Riding downhill on our "Truck Wagons" was one of our favorite things to do. The modern name for our "Truck Wagons" is "Go Carts."



We made our own truck wagons. After locating a nice round tree about 10 or 12 inches in diameter we would cut it down with a two handled cross cut saw. Then we cut two inch wide wheels from the trunk of the log. A one inch hole was bored in the center of the wheel. The axels were usually made out of hickory wood. A large plank about 5 feet long connected the axles. The front axle was fastened with one bolt in the center of the plank so that it could pivot. We guided the truck wagon by placing our feet on the front axle.

Our favorite place to ride our truck wagons was on a long steep hill in the pasture. This hill was on a farm next to ours. This hill was steep and covered with trees. Our path way was narrow with many sharp curves. We had to be very careful riding down this hill.

Farming is hard work but "Tom Walkers" and "Truck Wagons" helped us have something fun to do.

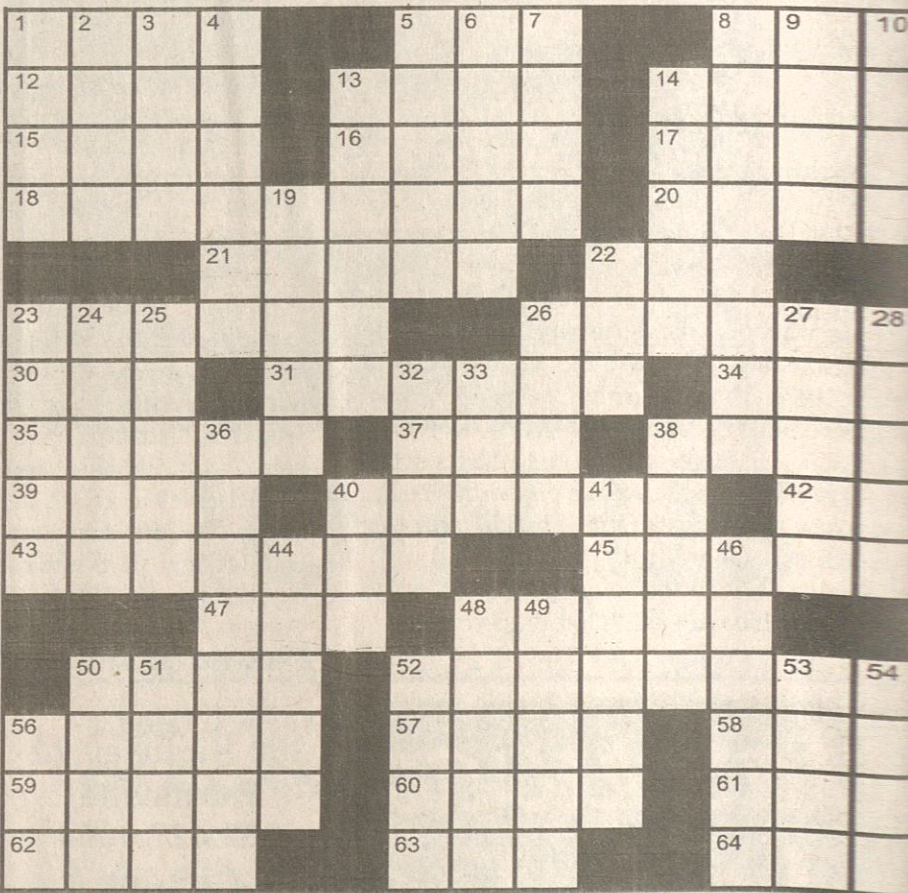

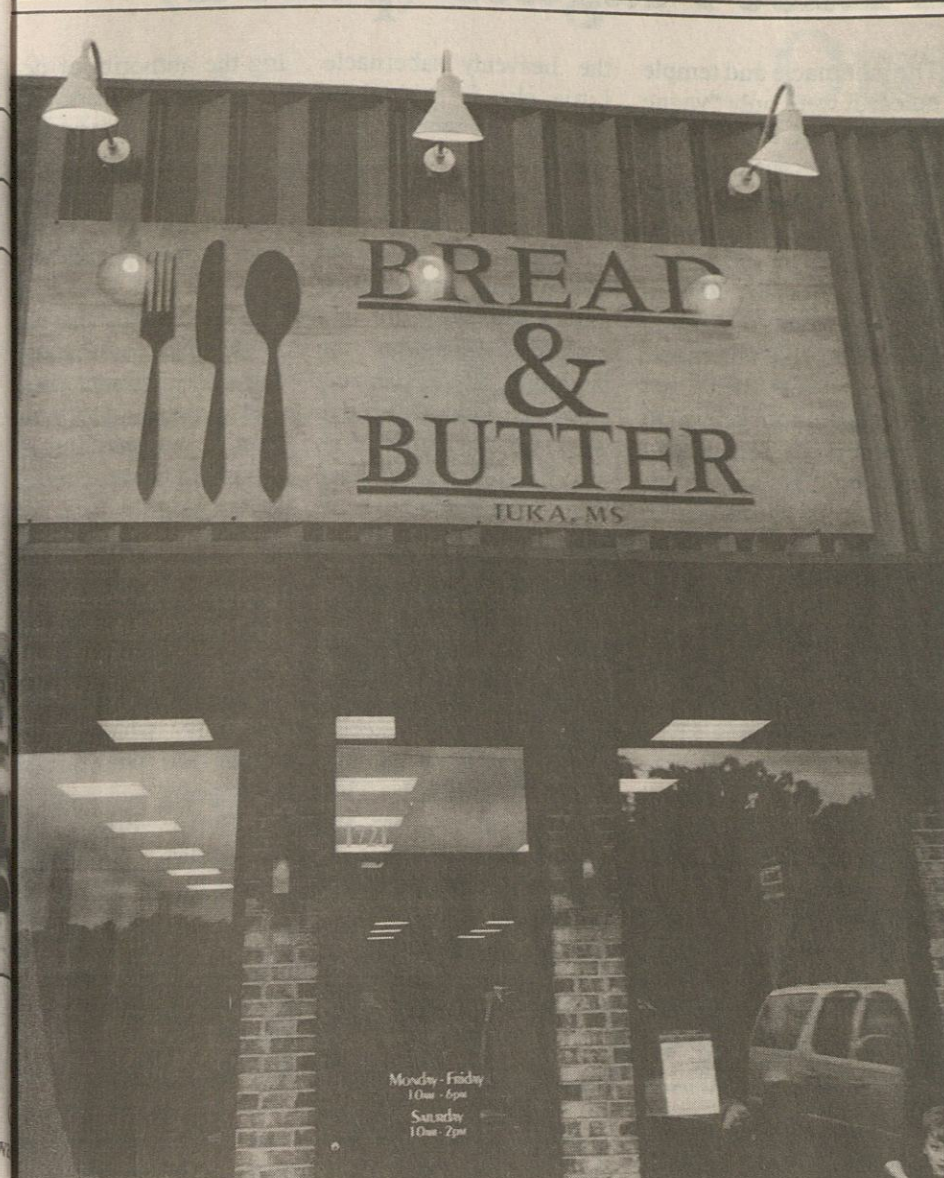

Seven Angels with the Seven Last Plagues (part 2)

It is always interesting when we see words like "the seven last plagues", for they signify that a series of events is about to be finished. I am sure that those in the tribulation will be glad when all of the plagues are done, but this does not actually mean that we are at the end of the Book of Revelation, but that we are at the end of the plague judgments of the tribulation. The rest of Revelation, beginning with chapter 17, give additional information about the judgment of the one-world church and one-world government. It also gives the attitude of those in heaven toward the judgments that God has poured out on the earth; the marriage of the bride to Christ; the battle of Armageddon; the millennial reign of Christ

on earth; the battle of Gog and Magog; the doom of Satan; the judgment of the wicked dead and the eternal state of believers and unbelievers. So, Revelation is not finished when these seven plagues are finished, but the plague judgments are finished.

Revelation 15:5-8 says, "And after that I looked, and behold, the temple of the tabernacle of the testimony in heaven was opened: And the seven angels came out of the temple, having the seven plagues, clothed in pure and white linen, and

having their breasts girded with golden girdles. And one of the four beasts gave unto the seven angels seven golden vials full of the wrath of God, Who liveth for ever and ever. And the temple was filled with smoke from the glory of God, and from His power; and no man was able to enter into the temple, till the seven plagues of the seven angels were fulfilled." There is no doubt that we do not know too much about what is in heaven, for here we see that there is a "temple of the tabernacle" in heaven.

The tabernacle and temple on earth were only "vague shadows" of the "temple of the tabernacle" in heaven. Actually, we have very little information in the Bible about the "tabernacle" in heaven. Revelation 21:3 speaks of a future time when "the tabernacle of God is with men", but this expression refers to the entire city called New Jerusalem. Hebrews 6:19-20 speaks of Christ having entered within the veil in the heavenly tabernacle. Hebrews 8:2 says of Jesus, "A minister of the true tabernacle, which the Lord pitched, and not man." Hebrews 9:11-12 speaks of Christ having entered into the "perfect tabernacle" by His blood and having obtained eternal redemption for us. Hebrews chapter 10 has some information about

the heavenly tabernacle. Little else is said about this heavenly tabernacle in Scripture.

The idea in Revelation 15:5-8 is that the seven angels with the seven last plagues are coming out of the heavenly tabernacle, which has the law of God as the rule by which God will judge wicked men. Those of us who have been saved have been "redeemed from the curse of the law" by Christ (Galatians 3:13), but the unsaved will face God as lawbreakers! The seven angels come out of the temple in heaven with full authority to execute God's judgment on the wicked in the earth. They are clothed in pure and white linen, showing the untainted nature of God's judgments; they have golden girdles, indicat-

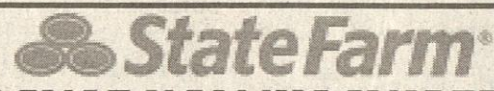

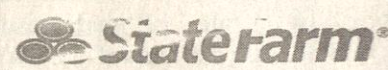

Carolyn Ruth Gober was born on April 9, 1951 near Ruleville in Sunflower County, Mississippi. She was the daughter of the late William Noonan Gober and Raney Lee Belle Curtis Gober McAnally. Her paternal grandparents were James Harvey "Harve" Gober Sr., and Mary Emmaline "Amy" Floyd Gober of Tishomingo County, Mississippi; her maternal grandparents were Johnston Albert Curtis and Josie Smith Curtis of Hardin County, Tennessee. She was reared in the Lincoln Park neighborhood of Chicago, Illinois, where she attended Arnold Grammar School and Louisa May Alcott Grammar School. In 1965 she moved with her mother and step-father Harmon O. "Mac" McAnally, to Counce, Tennessee. She was a 1969 graduate of Pickwick Southside School where she was awarded a full math scholarship to Memphis State University, but she married instead. The marriage ended in divorce and she legally retained the use of her maiden name.



In 1974, after suffering a massive subarachnoid hemorrhage, she was disabled for seven years. Ms. Gober later attended the School of Cosmetology in Savannah, Tennessee and had her own beauty shop in Counce. She then worked at Mississippi Baptist Medical Center while she earned a certificate in microcomputer accounting from Draughan's Business College in Jackson, Mississippi. After working as an accountant and earning her cosmetology instructor's license, she was the director of Shirley Little School of Hair Design in Jackson, Mississippi until she became permanently disabled. 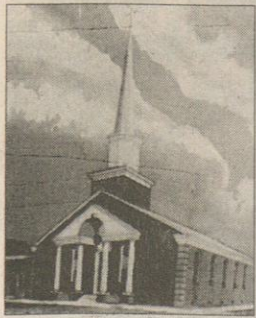

Conservation Corner

Allergic Reactions to Insect Stings
by James L. Cummins

Allergic reactions to insect stings are a common and often serious medical problem. Insects that sting are divided into two major subgroups: the group consisting of the yellow jacket, hornet and wasp; and the one made up of the more docile honeybee and bumblebee. The fire ant is a non-winged member of the first group and is responsible for an increasing number of allergic reactions.

According to Dr. William M. McKell, a resident of Ridgeland, "Reactions to stings are divided into two major categories, local and systemic. The usual and expected reaction is one of localized pain, swelling and redness at the site."

"The first step in management is to remove any retained stinger. Bees have a multi-barbed stinger which, along with the venom gland, remains attached to the victim. This needs to be scraped away from the skin with a sharp object such as a fingernail or a knife blade (do not grasp the stinger for this may inject additional venom). Essentially no treatment is required for this self-limited reaction other than possibly cold compresses and over the counter pain medication. Some advocate the application of moist tobacco or meat tenderizer (papain), and they may well be of benefit, however, I have never seen data supporting or refuting their use," continued McKell.

A large local reaction, such as swelling of the entire arm secondary to a sting on the hand, consists of more discomfort and prolonged swelling. These may well last a week. According to McKell, management here usually consists of over the counter pain medication and antihistamines; if the swelling is extensive and disabling, oral cortisone-type drugs may be of benefit. McKell states that it is unknown why such reactions occur, but in persons that develop them, they are more likely to have such reactions in the future.

"A severe and sometimes fatal systemic reaction is called anaphylaxis. It will usually begin within 20 to 30 minutes of the sting and consist of generalized hives and swelling, difficulty breathing and/or circulatory collapse and shock. This is a true medical emergency resulting in 40 to 150 deaths per year in the United States, requiring immediate professional attention," states McKell.

The fire ant will bite anything that invades his bed, hold on with his jaws and rotate his body, inflicting multiple stings, typically in a circular pattern. "These appear infected, but are not. I include this only to discourage the routine use of antibiotics for such a sting," concluded McKell.

Individuals who have had a systemic reaction should consider evaluation by an allergist. Adults who have experienced this have a 30 to 60 percent risk of having another systemic reaction if stung again.

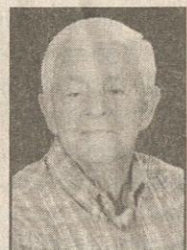

Remember School Bus Safety

message from the Tishomingo County School District

Our school bus fears usually focus on images of the horrible wreck. But children are most likely to get hurt during routine pickup and drop-off, when they're in the "danger zone", the area inside a 10-foot radius around the bus, in which small children often become invisible to both the driver and approaching motorists. Here that kids crossing the street are hit by motorists who illegally pass a stopped bus, or youngsters starting in front of, next to, behind, or even under the bus are inadvertently struck by their own driver. The following tips will help ensure your child's safety.



er may not see you come back and they may begin moving the bus.

Also, if you drop something near the bus, do not go back to pick it up.

Always remain 10 steps away from the bus to be out of the "Danger Zone" and where the driver can see you. Always cross the street in front of the bus. Never go behind the bus.

License and Certificate

A school bus driver shall have a valid Class B Commercial Driver's License with a "P" and "S" endorsement.

Shall have a valid school bus driver's certifi-

cate issued by an instructor approved by the Mississippi Department of Education.

Shall attend 2 hours of safety training each semester.

Shall renew his/her license every 2 years.

Please help us ensure the safety of our students by being highly attentive and slowing down significantly when you see a school bus on the roadway. A child's life is always dependent upon it.

STUDENT'S AND GUARDIANS

At the Bus Stop:

Always walk to the bus stop. Never run.

Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left facing traf-

Always go to the bus stop about five minutes before the bus is scheduled arrive.

While at the bus stop, sit in a safe place away from the road. Do not run or play while waiting.

Never speak to strangers at the bus stop and never get into the car with a stranger. Always go home and tell your parents if a stranger tries to talk to you or pick you

Wait for the bus to arrive, watch for red flashing lights and the stop sign to be extended, and cross only when all traffic has stopped. Look left, right, and left again before cross-

the Bus:

Go directly to a seat. Remain seated and facing forward for the entire ride.

Talk quietly (so the driver will not be distract-

If you need to talk to the bus driver: wait for the bus to stop, raise your hand, and call the driver's name.

Never throw things out the bus or out the windows. Never play with the emergency exits.

Keep the aisles clear at all times.

If there is an emergency, listen to the driver and follow instructions.

the Bus:

When getting off the bus, make sure all cars are stopped in both directions. Make sure you walk (run) ten steps away from the door and in sight of the driver. Stay away from the bus wheels and reach out for moving cars! Once you get off the bus, go straight home so your adult will know where you are.

Only get on and off the bus at your designated stop. If you need to get off the bus somewhere else, you will need to have a pass from your parents that has been provided to the school.

If you leave something on the bus, never return to the bus to get it. The driv-

SHARING the ROAD with SCHOOL BUSES:

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

Never pass a bus from behind if it is stopped to load or unload children. You must not pass from the left side, nor from the right side. You must stop behind the bus.

If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, TRAFFIC MUST STOP.

If you meet a bus, immediately slow down and be prepared to stop. If the lights are flashing, be prepared to stop immediately. Never try to beat the stop arm coming out.

The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus.

Be alert; children often can be unpredictable.

SCHOOL BUS DRIVER QUALIFICATIONS

A driver must have at least 20/40 visual acuity in each eye.

A driver must have a Mississippi Department of Transportation Physical.

All drivers must consent to and pass a pre-employment drug screening and be placed in a pool for random drug screening.

A bus driver must have the normal use of both arms, both hands, both legs, and both feet.

A bus driver must have sufficient physical strength to drive a school bus.

A bus driver should be emotionally stable.

A driver's hearing shall not be impaired to the extent that it would interfere with the safe operation of a school bus.

A bus driver must pass a pre-employment agility test administered as part of the Mississippi Department of Education bus driver training.

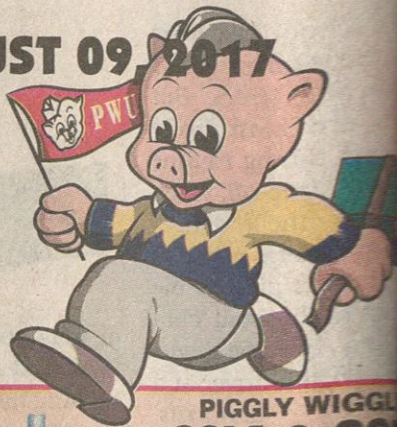

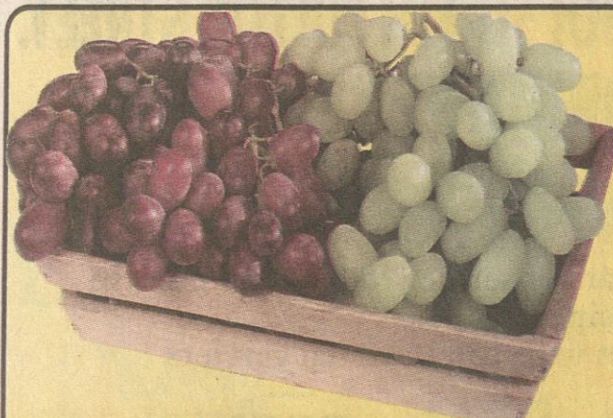

Conner Caldwell of Belmont and Austin Urvina of Booneville were both picked to be part of the prestigious program after their time at Northeast.

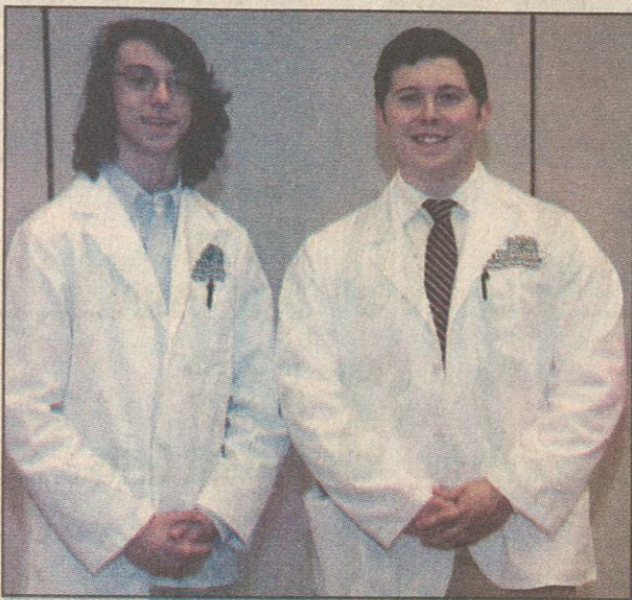
During his time at Northeast, Caldwell was named to the Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges and was a mainstay on the college's president and vice-president's lists.

Caldwell made the Spring 2017 President's List at Northeast for students who obtain a 4.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and was a member of the college's vice-president's list during the 2016 fall and spring semesters along with the 2015 fall semester. The college's vice-president's list encompasses students who obtained a 3.5-3.99 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

Caldwell is the son of Darrin and Susan Caldwell of Belmont.

During his time at Northeast, Urvina was a guiding force for the college's Iota Zeta chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society where he served a variety of roles including as the co-vice president for leadership.

Urvina is the son of Tom Urvina of Olympia, Wash., and Melissa Robertson of Corinth.

Mississippi's Rural Physicians Scholarship Program will celebrate a decade in 2017 after being created in 2007 to help identify college sophomores and juniors who demonstrate the commitment and academic achievement to become competent, well-trained rural primary care physicians in the Magnolia State.

Upon completion of all their medical school admissions requirements, Caldwell and Urvina can be admitted to the University of Mississippi's School of Medicine or the William Carey University

College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Mississippi's Rural Physicians Scholarship Program provides a means for rural Mississippi students to earn a seat in medical school, receive mentoring during their medical school application process, and to earn a \$120,000 medical school scholarship in return for four years of service while learning the art of healing from practicing rural physicians.

During medical school, Caldwell, Urvina and each Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship Program participant may receive \$30,000 per year based on available funding.

After completing their medical training, Caldwell and Urvina must enter a residency program in one of five primary care specialties — family medicine,

general internal medicine, medicine-pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology or pediatrics.

In return for a \$120,000 medical school scholarship, Caldwell and Urvina must provide four years of service in a clinic-based practice in an approved Mississippi community of 15,000 people or fewer that is located more than 20 miles from a medically serviced area.
