Answers to Tourism Questions Are Provided

Meeting on Tourism Tax Set for September 12th

The most prominent question is how the tourism dollars directly affect the well-being of the county. Tourism across Mississippi is "low hanging fruit" for small businesses and a clean services-oriented industry, generating employment income, tax revenue and providing a catalyst for regional development. While surrounding counties have realized the favorable financial and cultural impact of a tourism tax, until now Tishomingo County has only supported the initiative by paying a tax on the side of their home county. On September 12th, Tishomingo County will have a chance to make a significant impact on the financial future of our county by voting FOR the tourism tax.

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors formed a Tourism Tax Committee to listen to citizens voicing pros and cons on this matter and to address all concerns and educate the public on the positive attributes that will happen with the implementation of the 2% tax on prepared food and drink. The following concerns have been addressed and responses are provided:

1. If we really want increased tourism, we need to have reasons for tourists to come to town and spend money. We need more dining options, concerts in the parks, etc. According to Mississippi Department of Tourism, U.S. TVA, U.S. Corp of Engineers, Mississippi Game, Fish and Parks, and the Create Foundation, we had approximately one million visitors to Tishomingo County in 2016. These visitors bought food from our restaurants, and fast food establishments in Tishomingo County. Visitors are already enjoying our beautiful parks and recreational facilities but we are not benefiting from the tourism tax collections like our neighboring counties.

2. Who serves on the tourism board? There is no "tourism board" as such. There is a Tourism Tax Committee and a Tishomingo County Tourism Council. In June 2017, the Board of Supervisors appointed Harold Lomenick to chair a Tourism Tax Committee comprised of members from all voting districts who would be responsible for meeting and speaking with citizens in their area to bring awareness to the tourism initiative and answer all questions and concerns regarding its benefits. Committee members were selected based on the advice of the supervisors and mayors for each district, respectively, and they are as follows: Delta Datsis, Neil Davis, Bill Gurley, Betsy Hardin, Jerry Don Keith, Toney Mobley, Mike

New Mural in Downtown Tishomingo

Tony Bullard has been downtown in Tishomingo working on wall murals of historic Tishomingo scenes and buildings. The project is through the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum, who received a grant for it, in recognition of Mississippi's bicentennial.

Featured so far are the iconic Swinging Bridge at Tishomingo State Park, built in the 30s by Civilian Conservation Corps troops; and one of the old buildings of the Tishomingo Agricultural High School, which was a boarding school that attracted hundreds of students from the region in the early part of the twentieth century. Other scenes planned for the rest of the side of the building include the annual Tishomingo Street Dance, a tradition for more than 60 years; Tishomingo Methodist Church and the old depot in Tishomingo.

Tony Bullard is a well-known painter and artist who has work displayed in a number

of prominent places, including a mural done for the Sesquicentennial of the Battle of Iuka hanging in Iuka's historic downtown. Though he paints many historic scenes of the area, this is one of the first times he has painted directly on the side of a building, mural style, he said. One of his first experiences was helping on the iconic Sinalco sign mural on the side of Corinth Coliseum.

The building where the mural is being done is at the corner of Main/Highway 25 and Trace is the home of The Igloo, a restaurant, snow cone shop, and hangout owned and operated by the Whitfield family.

Belmont and Tishomingo County High School students and their art instructors are assisting with the implementation of the design. Two Bicentennial projects will engage Tishomingo County School Students ages K-12 in productive, educational, and collaborate history and art projects to celebrate Mississippi's Bicentennial history. Students from Belmont High School and Tishomingo County High School selected the building in the center of the county and coordinated the design of the mural illustrating the history specific to the town of Tishomingo. The skills received by participating students will allow them to embark on other future mural projects in the county. Phase two of the program will engage both elementary, junior high and high school students and will begin in September to be completed by December.

These projects have been made possible through grants and collaboration from Visit Mississippi, Mississippi Humanities Council, Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society, Tishomingo County Tourism Council, the Tishomingo County School System, and Tishomingo County Educational Foundation.

Answers to Tourism Questions

The Tishomingo County Tourism Council (TCTC) was organized with the advice and consent of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF) in 1993 and its purpose is to attract tourists and retirees to Tishomingo County. 3. Businesses are more likely to locate in a better-promoted area and this money would go toward promoting our local assets like our charming downtowns. Nearly all of the Tourism Tax dollars collected in the county will stay in the county, benefiting all communities within the county. There will be a small percentage of the tax dollars going to state to manage the overall activity. In terms of attracting customers for businesses, especially small business owners in downtown stores, the importance of parks, recreation and open space amenities to tourists cannot be overstated. Small business decision-makers are influenced particularly by quality of life, ranking the element of park recreation, and open space as being most important.

4. I have no problem paying the tourism tax, but if we really want to promote our county and make it more appealing to tourists, we need to work on a solution for the litter & trash lining our highways & county roads. It is becoming a major eyesore. This is a major concern for our county. Most of the litter comes from careless and uncaring residents. We need to start teaching litter prevention and control in all levels of our school system. We also need individual landowners, volunteer civic organizations and perhaps churches to adopt sections of streets and roads to clean them up and keep them clean. A recent cleanup effort by Brandon Grissom, District 1 Supervisor, drew only eight volunteers.

5. What would really be attractive is to clean up and decorate around the ONLY red light in Tishomingo County! The City of Iuka has plans to improve this area around the August time frame. For additional information, please contact the City of Iuka.

6. We do not want that tax or any other tax; don't want to pay it somewhere else so sure don't want to pay it at home, too many taxes now. This is a vote for a tourism tax of two percent. This tax is only for users of restaurants and fast food facilities. This is not a tax on property, gas, groceries or anything else. When you go out of our county in any direction and buy prepared food you pay a tourism tax. In two or three locations, the tax is more than two percent. A meal cost of \$100.00 will cost \$2.00 in tourism tax. Who can't afford \$2.00? After all, we are doing so already in other counties. The vast majority of this tax will be paid by visitors to our county and people within the county who can afford to eat out regularly. In fact, this tax has the potential to potentially reduce our ad valorem tax burden by attracting the tourism service businesses and their employees who will pay ad valorem taxes as the tourist industry matures.

7. Why should restaurants and fast food facilities be forced to collect taxes and keep up with paying it back to the county? The tourism tax is no more burdensome than what they are already collecting for the state. It is simply an increase that goes to the state and is returned to the county by the state minus a very small administrative fee. Most restaurant owners are strongly for the tax since they know that if advertising and marketing is increased it will increase their business, especially if they already cater to travelers.

8. What amenities and opportunities will be improved? Amenities and opportunities are endless and will be based on the recommendations of local citizens. Once the tourism tax is passed the Tourism Tax Committee will be replaced by a Standing Tourism Board reporting to the county Board of Supervisors. A representative will be appointed in each town/city to be the representative for that voting district and in turn will seek the advice of citizens on how they wish to spend their portion of the tax revenue. Here are a few suggestions received so far: *Enhance amenities offered at city and state parks, museums and historic sites including: splash pads, walking tracks, park benches, park lighting and handicap and improved playground equipment. *Increase events that promote our heritage and culture such as Mac McAnally Music, Tishomingo Blues Festival, Dick Merrill 10-K

Certified Run, Slug Burger Festival, Rib Cook Off, Greens & Beans Festival, etc. *Broaden the annual Trash-To-Treasures event to entice more visitors to stay, play and eat in our county. *Offer adequate public meeting places for clubs and organizations. These improvements will have an economic gain on our community directly contributing to a stronger economy, higher property values, and increased personal wealth. All the while enticing our children, grandchildren, and greats to live and work in their home county

9. Tourism tax should be for tourists, not homebodies. How do you tell if a customer is a resident or a visitor without asking to see identification? The important thing to remember is that the tax is mostly for those within the county who choose to eat out and for out-of-county visitors who have no choice but to eat out, thus allowing folks from out of town to contribute to our well-being.

10. Why should I vote to put money in someone else's pocket? If you're that interested in promoting Tishomingo County you would put more money in the Tishomingo State Park along with other eyesores. There are other places in Tishomingo County other than Iuka or J.P. Coleman Park. Please note in the previous paragraphs that all our Tourism Tax Committee members are volunteers - no one is getting paid. This is Tishomingo Countians helping Tishomingo County. We have had so many missed opportunities... i.e. Nuclear Plant, Rocket Plant, Rocket Booster Plant Don't you think it's time for Tishomingo Countians to take care of their own destiny with a clean tourism services industry? With approximately one million visitors last year, just think of what we can do this year with lessons learned by other counties, management best practices and careful planning. There are many great ideas but severely limited funds; this will help us put a consolidated vision for our county into action.

11. We need reasons for tourist to come to pay a tax. We have nothing to offer. This is just going to cost the ones that live here more money. Once again, twenty cents on \$10.00 to have a splash pad, lighted walking tracks, clean city streets, and other amenities that each community might have planned or plan in the future is not too much to ask the citizens of the county? Don't you think? Each community is unique with different ideas on how to attract tourists. When you combine the ideas of each community it can't help but attract more tourists to our county. The tourism industry is clean and profitable and the only lasting imprint the tourist leaves is his/her money. Would the approximate million visitors who came to Tishomingo County last year agree with the comment that we have nothing to offer? Nothing could be farther from the truth! For years we have enjoyed the benefits of having two state parks. Tishomingo State Park has been recognized more than once for being in the top ten state parks with walking trails. It has a very nice canoe

float down Bear Creek, disc golf, swimming pool, picnic areas, and one of the few swinging bridges left in America. Where else can you walk across a swinging bridge, walk the trails that our Native American Ancestors traversed for years and watch canoes travel along the creek. J.P. Coleman State Park offers camping, swimming pool, hotel and cabins, a marina and gas pumps. Once on the river you can see one of the few waterfalls in Tishomingo County, located approximately one mile north of the park. We have rodeos, a county fair, many town festivals and events, car shows, and fishing tournaments. These are only a few of the things we offer. Look around, there are a lot of opportunities for tourists if they know about them, that's the reason for approximately one million visitors last year.

12. So we are going to pay a 2% tax to bring more things for the big timers out of Memphis and other cities to enjoy but what about the people of Tishomingo that can't afford to eat at a new resort on the water or play at a new golf course or put a new boat in a new dock. Every time they go to eat lunch they will be paying for already financially able people to have more things to enjoy. The two percent helps pay for amenities to the local area such as newer and better playground in our parks, adding splash pads, reconditioning the tennis courts and basketball goals, and providing improved walking tracks, as well as addressing the needs of the handicap and senior citizens. Our local folks are our primary concern and it is okay if the Memphis folks want to take advantage of these opportunities that in turn helps provide more income for Tishomingo County.

13. I say no if it means someone has to be paid from each town to allocate the funds - seems like that would eat up all the taxes collected. As previously mentioned, all the board members are volunteers and that means they aren't paid!

14. The best tourism advertisement is 100% free - that's social media and word of mouth. Yes, social media is a very good way to get the message out that we need more amenities here in Tishomingo County for our local children to play on, work at, and help improve their lives overall. Through social media we can let everyone know what is going on here in our county and encourage other visitors. We ask for your help to ask folks to vote FOR tourism dollars on September 12th.

15. Can the leadership of Tishomingo County provide a cost-benefit analysis or any other analysis supporting its claim that this tax will actually result in a net benefit for the county? Based on the Mississippi Department of Finance 2016 Economic Impact Report from Visit Mississippi, \$306,000 would have been distributed based on our population throughout the six major communities in Tishomingo County. We expect the number to be larger since all of the tourism reporting agencies say that due to the low price of gasoline and

people being able to afford to drive more, we will have more visitors in 2017. As stated earlier, the amount of monies distributed in each part of the county will be based on population, less any expenses such as advertising, office space, meetings, and other required functions. This will be done on a monthly basis as the tourism checks come into the county. Please also see the answer to number 20.

16. We are now having to have our State of Mississippi horse shows over in Prentiss county so the city misses out on all the people that were eating here and buying fuel and also going into Walmart to get ice and such! Sometimes we had 30 trucks and trailers over at the fairgrounds coming from everywhere, some as far as Monroe County! You are correct. This is exactly why we are creating this initiative. Let's make these possible in our county by voting FOR for the tourism tax initiative. We have to start somewhere.

17. Government doesn't have a clue how to invest other people's money. The \$1,250,000.00 MILLION Obama Empty Transient Slips at J. P. Coleman State Park proves what we'll get when we pay more taxes for "economic development" in Tishomingo County. As of right now, we have no control over either state park. One of the things that will take place with the passage of this tourism tax is that a board will be established that has the authority to work with the state park service. They can insist on certain things like how the maintenance money and future improvements will be made.

18. There's more important things that need funding other than tourism. This is a highly leveraged investment producing a net positive benefit to every citizen of the county. It is potentially a large revenue income, not an outlay, that somewhat offsets our dwindling ad valorem tax base. We had approximately one million tourists who visited our county in 2016. Out of that many folks we collected only \$22,000 in taxes for tourism....what a loss! We have to take a positive initiative to improve our county. Some of these tourists will want to remain here and become permanent citizens. We have to improve the quality of life which will entice people to visit, build and live here. This will improve our tax base and keep our personal taxes from increasing. According to the Create Foundation, we have lost 497 people out of Tishomingo County since 2010. We have to figure out a way to attract these people back and create an interest in others. Remember this is Tishomingo County people helping Tishomingo County. It is not through government grants or loans, it's about our people investing \$2.00 for every \$100.00 they choose to spend on eating out. Quoting former Governor Ross Barnett, "if it came between choosing a bale of cotton and a tourist, he would choose a tourist, because they are a lot easier to pick." Please vote FOR tourism dollars on September 12th.

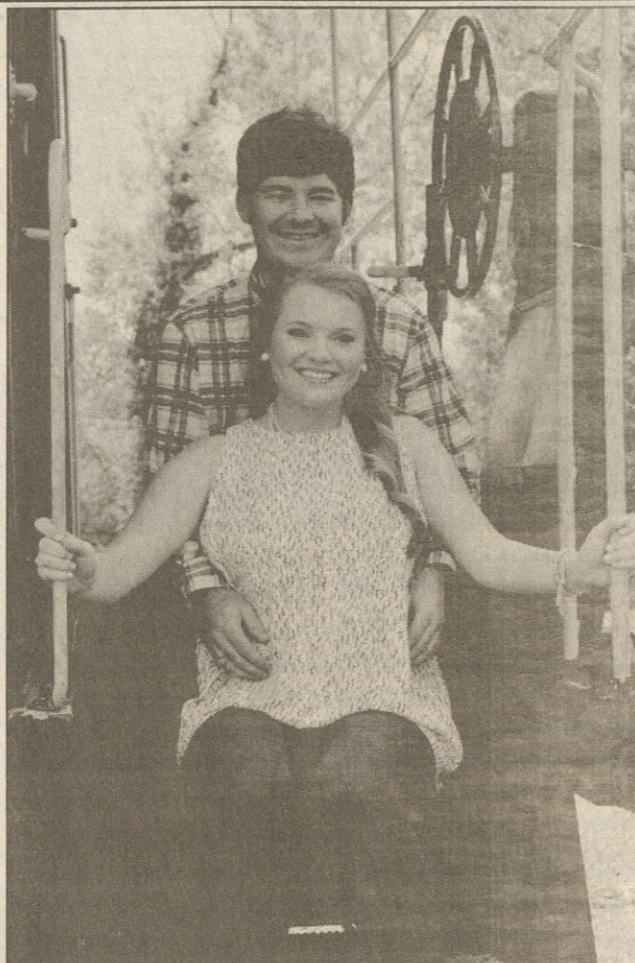
Offices and the Bookstore will remain open until 5 p.m. Thursday, August 10 and 4 p.m. August 11.

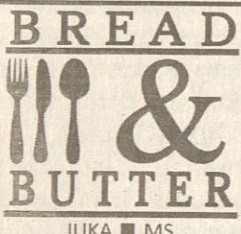

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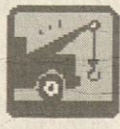

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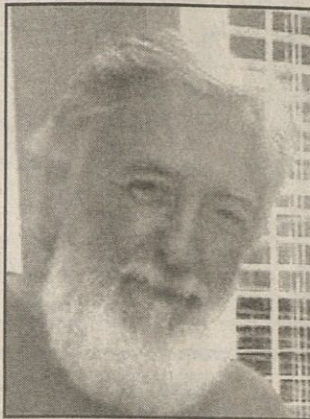
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Fatal Accident Claims the Life of Iuka Man

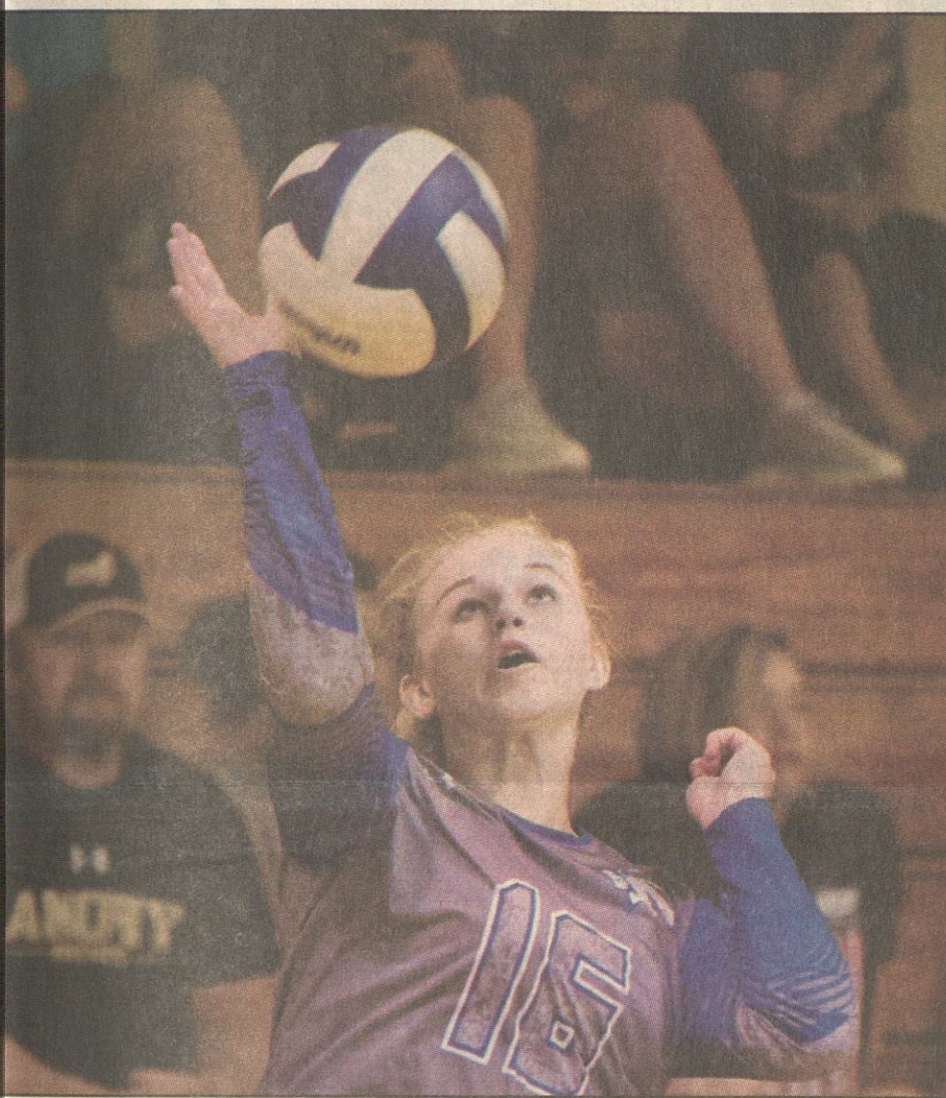

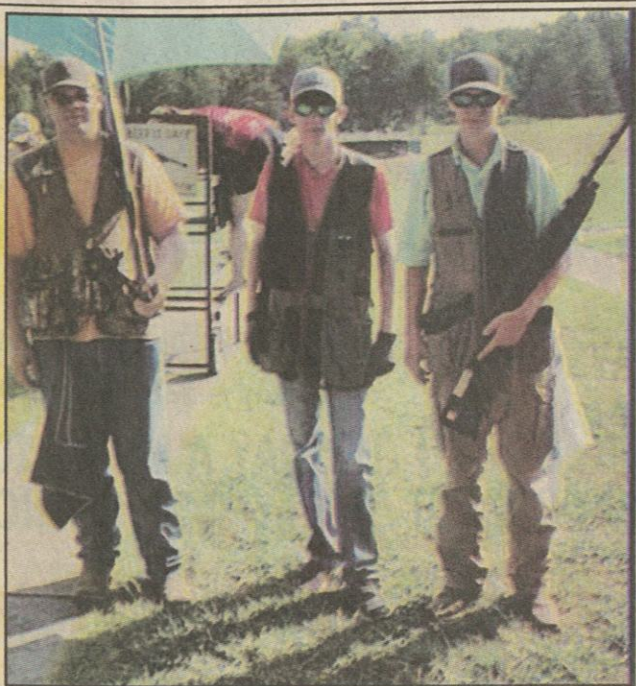


Local FFA Member Wins State Championship

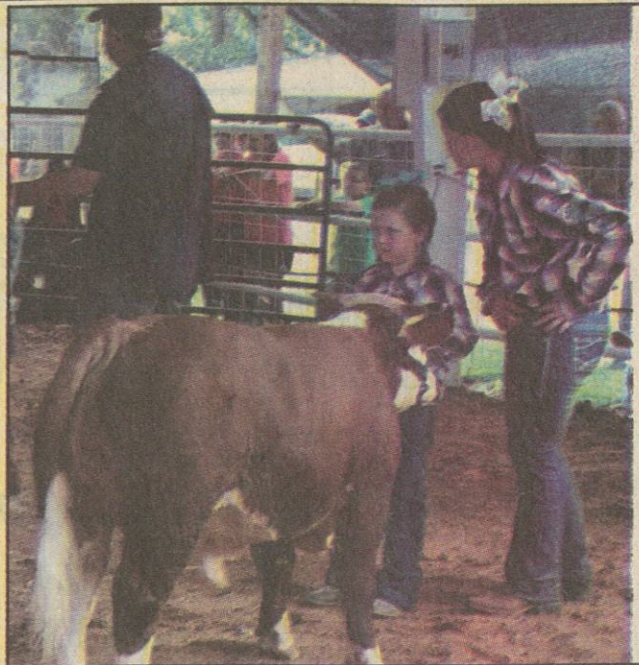

Also, in accordance with the Bylaws, nominations may be made for four directors. You may nominate, or be nominated, from the floor at the Annual Meeting provided five percent of the membership is physically present.

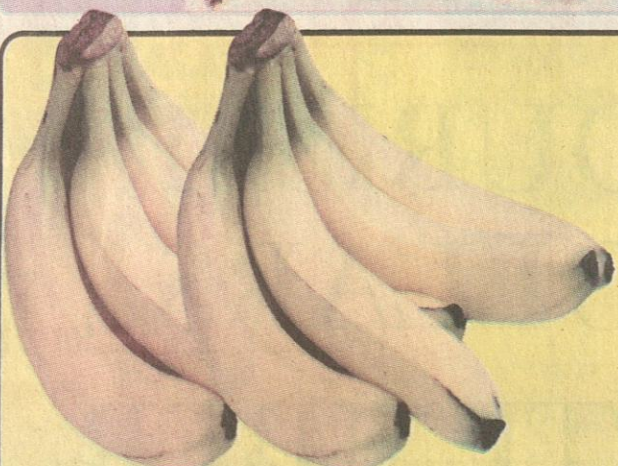

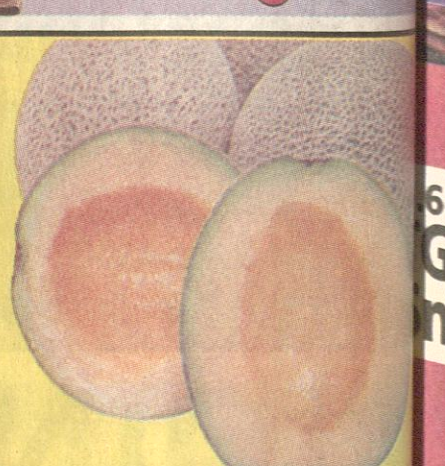

This article is for all the kindergarten boys and girls who will be entering the ladder of our educational system this year. Yes, I know they can't read but Mom, Dad, grandparents, and even great-grandparents can read and share what it was like to start to school in the "primer" one hundred years ago. For me, eighty-seven years ago. Long time!

I was the happiest kid alive. My sister, Jewel (Page) Edmondson had been going two years. They were going to let me go this year, 1929, the year of the beginning of the Great Depression. Everything was scarce and during this time our parents had to buy our books and supplies (pencils and tablets) crayons at Christmas.

I remember how proud I was. I had on a new dress (probably made from flour sacks) a pair of new high top shoes, and long stockings that went above the knees held up by a pair of garters. (Garters are made from one-half

inch elastic cut to fit my legs). The socks were either black or brown. No pretty fancy hair bows. My hair was white and was cut with bangs. I felt like a million as I skipped along with my sister. We always walked to school, rain, snow or shine. My dad would walk us if there was snow on the ground. It was about a mile.

Dad and Mom had just sold a few bales of cotton. That's why I had new shoes. My mom had just made my sister and me a book satchel. Inside the satchel was a paper-back Primer, probably "Dick and Jane", a big, thick, narrow, wide-lined tablet and a big pencil. All three new and smelled so good. These three pieces were all I'd have to use for the next four months. My dad would do the pencil sharpening and no sheets were to be torn out of the tablet. Digress: everything was so scarce. During this time there were very few people who had cars. If they could afford a car, they couldn't buy gas and

the old C Models sat in the car shed and the tires rotted off.

I carried my lunch in a half-gallon lard bucket. No pretty lunch boxes. In it I probably had a baked potato, a biscuit and sausage or bacon, and hopefully one of Mom's chocolate and sugar-fried pies. We also had plenty of peanuts and popcorn. Treats were made from these. We had plenty of sogghum molasses, too.

No fruit. That was for Santa Claus to bring. There was no paper napkins but Mom made pretty napkins from flour sacks. I felt rich and proud.

Three little girls sat on a bench, like a pew, without padding. I remember how tired my legs would get hanging down. They didn't reach the floor but I was at school.

My advice to you is this: It is not wealth, money or a famous name that is going to develop you into a happy, successful young man or lady. You must respect, obey and love your teachers and

parents. Love your classmates, and be proud of who you are. Be yourself. Don't try to be like someone else. Do your best in all the wonderful advantages education has to offer today. Enjoy every minute of it. Work hard. Play hard. And thank God for giving you your Dad, Mom, loving and caring teachers.

Be the best you can be and enjoy wherever you fall on the measuring ladder of success, A's or C's. If that letter is your best? I'd love to have you in my class. You are a success.
