Tishomingo County School District Fires High School Teacher

On Friday October 20th the Tishomingo County School Board terminated the employment of a teacher from Tishomingo County High School. Superintendent, Christie Holly and School Principal, Pete Howell carried out the termination process.

The school district has not confirmed any details at this time as to the reason the teacher was fired or the identity of the individual. This statement was released by Superintendent Holly on Tuesday Morning, "The

Tishomingo County School District recently terminated the employment of a teacher at Tishomingo County High School. Our investigation is still ongoing. It would be inappropriate at this time to comment further on the matter."

It is unknown at this time if law enforcement will be involved in the case or if any legal action will be taken. It was reported by Holly that because this is a personnel matter no other information could be officially released at this time.

Indian Mounds Looted

Three Mississippi residents recently sentenced in Federal court on Oxford for looting an Indian mound.

They are among eight people convicted of removing artifacts from on federal property along Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway in northeastern Mississippi.

Two Burnsville women pleaded guilty to one felony count of violating an archaeological resource. Dale Arnold, who's 59, was sentenced to 15 months in prison and ordered to pay more than \$10,000 in restitution. Melinda Jean Arnold, who's 42, was sentenced to 15 months in prison and ordered to pay nearly \$29,000 in restitution. Robert Alan Aguirre, a 29-year-old Corinth resident, pleaded guilty

to two counts of violating archaeological resources. He was sentenced to two years of probation and \$3,000 in restitution.

Sentenced earlier in September were:

Thirty-four year old Matthew Glen Arnold, of Booneville, pleaded guilty to six counts of violating an archaeological resource in March and was sentenced to 20 months in prison.

Tyler Wilemon, a 22-year-old Booneville resident, pleaded guilty to one count in May and was sentenced to five years in prison.

Sandra Arnold, of Iuka, pleaded guilty to two counts in April and was sentenced to about a year in prison and one year of probation. The 62-year-old was also ordered to pay nearly \$19,000 in restitution.

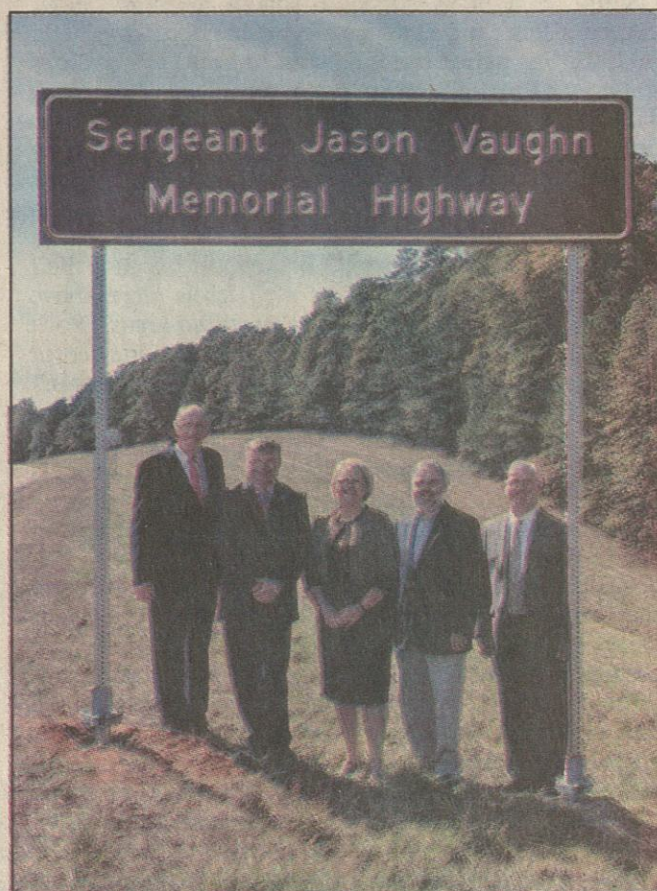
Highway Dedicated to the Memory of Sergeant Jason Vaughn

A dedication ceremony was held Friday, October 20, 2017 at 11 a.m. at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse Museum, naming a segment of Mississippi Highway 25 in Tishomingo County that is within the municipal limits of the City of Iuka as Sergeant Jason Vaughn Memorial Highway. The Legislature of the State of Mississippi passed House Bill 1088 in the 2017 session designating the "Sergeant Jason Vaughn Memorial Highway."

Both state and local dignitaries were on hand for the dedication which honored Sgt. Vaughn of Iuka who was killed in Old Baqubah, Iraq on May 10, 2007 while serving in the Army's 5th Battalion, 20th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division out of Fort Lewis, Washington. Sgt. Vaughn was killed when an improvised explosive device detonated near the Stryker vehicle he was driving. He was 29 years old on his second tour of duty. He is the son of RaNae Vaughn and Walter Vaughn and has one sister, Karisha Dylin and husband Dan and a brother, Logan Vaughn.

The program began with words from Iuka Mayor, John Castleberry, followed by presentation of colors by the Mississippi Department of Transportation Law Enforcement Honor Guard. Jason's first cousin, Audrey Smith, sang the National Anthem followed by "God Bless America" sung by a trio of his cousins, Audrey Smith, Claudia Smith, and Ashley Smith Kovach. Jason's uncle, Rev. Marcus Smith, gave the invocation. Bill Gurley, President, Tishomingo County Historical and Genealogical Society, read Jason's bio from the program and read a poem "Don't Weep for Me."

A reception table of refreshments for those attending was prepared by Kathy Gurley and Shelia Thorne.

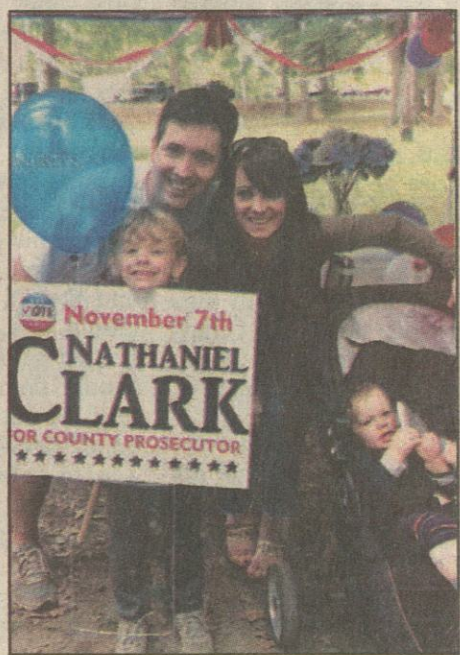

I work closely with law enforcement and appreciate the effort and sacrifice they make in order to do to their jobs well.

I also have a busy private practice in Iuka. Most of this work is in the Chancery Court - child custody, real estate matters and wills and estates. Since opening my practice I have served as a court-appointed Guardian Ad Litem, an advocate appointed to perform investigations into child abuse and neglect situations, as well as parental rights terminations and adoptions. I consider this practice area to be the most important work I do. More and

more of my child custody work takes me into the Tishomingo County Youth Court. Many citizens are unaware that the County Prosecutor also serves as the Youth Court Prosecutor. I have a good working relationship with the Tishomingo County Child Protection Services and our youth offender services. I believe, especially after appearing in other youth courts in the area, that the Tishomingo County Youth Court system is the best in North Mississippi, maybe the state. I believe my knowledge and passion for children will help our Youth Court become even better.

I am lucky enough to be married to the former Nikki Darwin. She is an English teacher who began her career at Belmont High School and now teaches at TCHS. She is the former cheer coach at Belmont and is the dance team coach for the Braves. We have two beautiful children - Alex, 5, and Andy, 1. I grew up on Snowdown Road in Iuka the proud son of Richard and Cheryl Clark. I am a lifelong member of Iuka Methodist Church.

I love Tishomingo County. I grew up here, graduating from Tishomingo County High School in 1997. I am an Eagle Scout and have sat on several Eagle Boards. I am a mem-



ber and past president of the Iuka Rotary Club. I coach little league baseball and reinstituted the Tishomingo County Youth Football program that had been inactive for several years. I have performed as the public address announcer for TCHS basketball and baseball and have performed as master of ceremonies at many local school talent shows and beauty pageants. Tishomingo County School District Receives "B" Ranking

The Mississippi Department of Education released the 2017 district and school accountability results after approval from the State Board of Education. Mississippi's accountability system assigns districts and schools a letter grade (A, B, C, D, or F) based upon points attained in several areas of academic performance.

For the 2017 school year, the Tishomingo County School District earned a letter grade of a "B" for its performance. Belmont, Burnsville, and Tishomingo County High School received "B" ratings. Iuka Middle School and Tishomingo Elementary School received a "C" while Iuka Elementary School received a "D".

Superintendent Christie Holly said the district has areas of high performance but also has areas of concern. "We began identifying target areas for each school back in the summer. The district has formed a professional development plan to assist teachers in certain areas as well as implemented benchmark testing throughout the year to give data to students and teachers that can indicate where we are academically."

Holly also said the relatively new accountability model is much different

from the ones used in the past. "This model is all about student growth. In the past, the models focused on getting students proficient in each grade. Now, proficiency does not carry as much weight. Instead, teachers must insure each student meets his/her growth target each year as well as increase proficiency. Schools can have a high proficiency score and not be an A or B school anymore. Now, if you do not meet growth, your overall score drops dramatically. In looking at district and school results in our state, I have seen schools with less than 20% proficiency in reading and math rated as "B" schools because their growth levels were above 80% in those areas. So it is a change in mind-set for our teachers and schools."

The district has required schools to set growth goals for students and is working on areas that need improvement in proficiency as well. According to Holly "We have a great board, excellent school district, dedicated teachers, and bright students. Having a "B" rating is a testament to the hard work of our administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community. I feel that we provide safe, nurturing environments

at each campus and work very hard to provide each student with opportunities to succeed. We want to make sure our letter grades in this model reflect the good things we do each day. So we must take a daily approach to improve and be better than the day before."

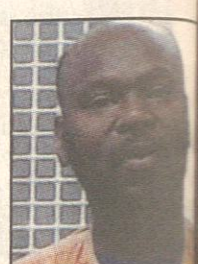
Arrest Made in Recent Courthouse Threat Case

On October 24, 2017, Correctional Officers from the Tishomingo County Jail, transported Bernard Sylvester Hird, Jr. from Clayton County Georgia Jail, to the Tishomingo County Jail in Iuka. Bernard Sylvester Hird, Jr. 47-year-old, black male, of 10007 Neuchatel Crescent Drive Jonesboro, Georgia was served with an arrest warrant for cyberstalking/email threats against the Tishomingo County Courthouse. remains in custody at the Tishomingo County Jail awaiting bond to be set.

Hird was wanted in connection to terroristic threats that were made by Hird against employees at the office of Justice Court in the Tishomingo County Courthouse. This threat was made right after the tragic event in Las Vegas on October 1, 2017,

where dozens were killed and dozen others injured by a shooter. Hird had previously had a citation issued to him while he was employed by Tyson Foods and was cited by the Mississippi Department of Transportation for failure to stop at the scales office. When Hird missed his court date, justice court officials stated that Hird called and made references to doing the same thing to the courthouse as what had just happened in Nevada. Investigators were able to locate Hird as being in the area of Atlanta and began working with the US Marshals Office and local officials in Georgia to have Hird arrested and brought back to Tishomingo County.

Hird was picked up on a traffic stop outside the Atlanta area on Sunday October 22, and offi-

cially waived his citation on October 23 in the Magistrate of Clayton County State of Georgia. Daugherty would thank the US Marshall, the Mississippi Department of Transportation, the Mississippi Highway Patrol and the Iuka Department in their stance in not only helping with providing security to the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

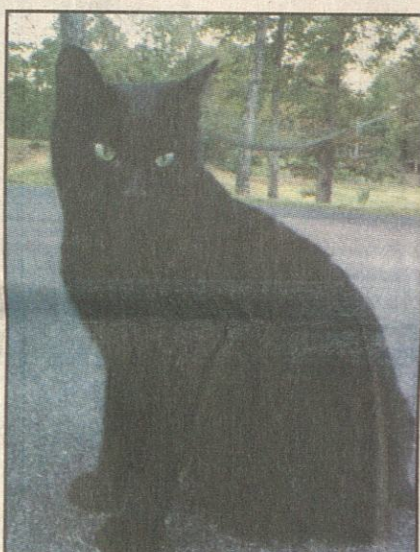
Pet of the Week

Halloween can be the spookiest night of the year, but keeping your pets safe doesn't have to be tricky. Take these simple precautions to keep your pet happy and healthy throughout

this fun holiday.

Begin by keeping the candy bowl out of reach of your pets. Several popular Halloween treats are toxic to pets. Chocolate in all forms—especially dark or baking chocolate—can be very dangerous for cats and dogs, and sugar-free candies containing the artificial sweetener xylitol can cause serious problems in pets. If your pet accidentally gets into the treats, contact your veterinarian. Decorations can cause certain hazards as well. A carved jack-o'-lantern certainly is festive, but pets can easily knock over a lit pumpkin and start a fire. Curious kittens are especially at risk of getting burned by candle flame. Using battery operated lights for your jack-o'-lantern is a safer alternative. And while most humans love costumes, to some pets wearing a costume may cause undue stress. It is recommended that you do not put your dog or



cat in a costume unless you know he or she loves it. If you do dress up your pet for Halloween, make sure the costume does not limit his or her movement, sight or ability to breathe, bark or meow. Be sure to have your pet try on the costume before the big night. If he or she seems distressed or shows abnormal behavior, consider letting your pet wear his or her "birthday suit" or don a festive bandana instead. Halloween brings a flurry of activity with visitors arriving at the door, and too many strangers can often be scary and stressful for pets. All but the most social dogs and cats should be kept in a separate room away from the front door during peak trick-or-treating hours. While opening the door for guests, be sure that your dog or cat doesn't dart outside. And always make sure your pet is wearing proper identification—if for any reason he or she does escape, a collar with ID tags and/or a microchip can be a lifesaver for a lost pet.

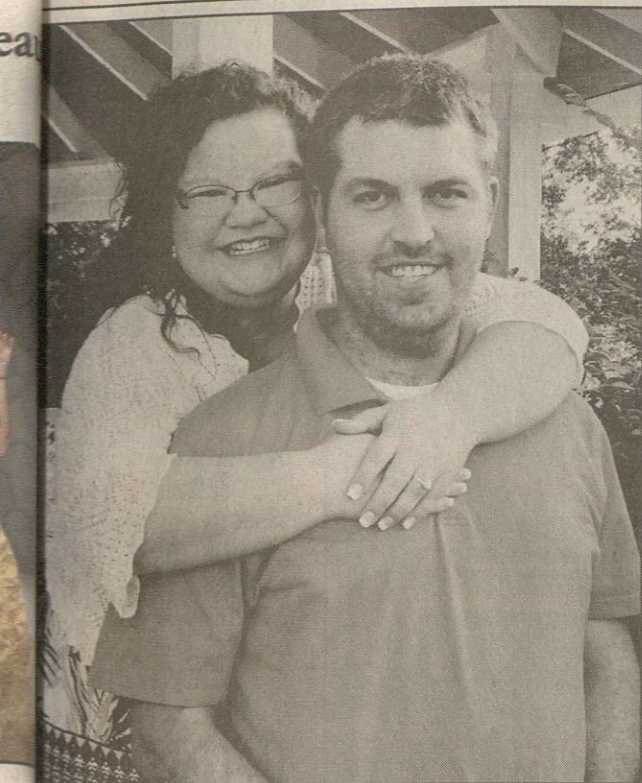

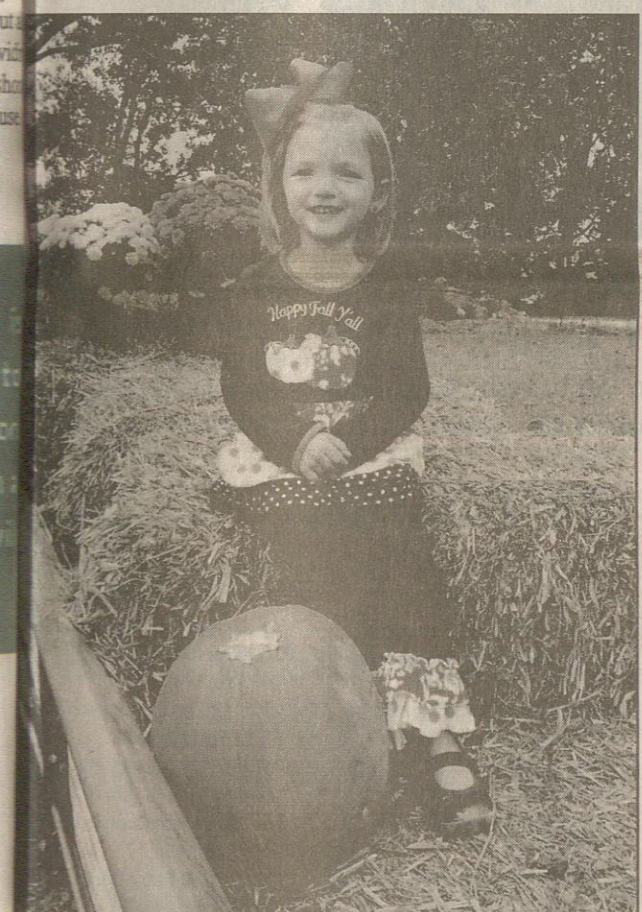
The bride-elect is the granddaughter of Herbert and Peggy Booker and Horace and Rita Brown, all of Iuka, MS.

Local Folks Help Out In Texas



Mike and Carolyn Gowen and daughter Bree just spent a week on a Relief Mission in Kountze, Texas to help victims of Hurricane Harvey. Bree, who lives in Memphis and attends Bellevue Baptist Church, initiated the trip and the parents basically went to support her. Bellevue sends teams from their church regularly to try to help Texas residents get back into their homes.

"I had no idea what was involved and how hard the work was. Because of the mold we had to wear long pants, long sleeves, work boots, two pair of gloves, mask, goggles, and a hat. And it was hot weather! Our team of 9 gutted and treated a house in two days. One day I stayed at the church where we slept to do 55 loads of laundry for people from all over

the country who came to help," stated Carolyn. There was a mobile laundry unit and shower unit at the church. Married couples and women were assigned Sunday school rooms and men slept in the church gym. There were relief teams from Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico, Hawaii, Vermont, Louisiana, and various parts of Texas.

The physical devastation from the storm was evident but you couldn't measure the psychological and emotional impact on the residents. "One house we worked on belonged to an 84 year-old veteran who had built his home 60 years ago and lost everything including his horse, milk goat, and chickens. He was living in a shed in back of his house and cooking outside while his

house dried out enough to try to rebuild. As we worked children getting off the school bus and others passing by asked for help; they had asked but no one came". Very sad situation that will linger indefinitely.

The most refreshing part was to see the volunteers come together to work and bless others with

never a word of criticism. It was an amazing experience and made me realize with Christ as the common denominator, Christian love can truly be demonstrated and witnessed by others. We went there to physically work but several residents experienced salvation; and that was the primary goal of the trip.

Bear Creek Development Authority Looking to Restore Economic Development

A group of citizens in Franklin, Colbert, Winston and Marion counties in Alabama and Tishomingo County in Mississippi is currently working to restore an important public entity back to its original intended purpose with the hopes that the change will make a positive economic impact on the area.

The Bear Creek Development Authority (BCDA) currently maintains four lakes and the surrounding woodlands in Franklin, Colbert, Winston, and Marion counties — lakes that were originally developed as a way to control flooding in that part of the area and develop the Bear Creek Watershed.

But BCDA chairwoman Tricia Montgomery said they are looking to restore the BCDA's economic development purpose instead of its current role of simply maintaining the area.

"Back when the Bear Creek Watershed Association, which was the precursor to BCDA, was formed in 1961, the purpose was for it to be an economic development organization," she said. "There were many families in the area who were displaced from their homes and land because it was within the area that was going to be developed and turned into lakes and other projects that were supposed to better the area. These families gave up their homes and land because they believed in these projects and what they could do for Northwest Alabama and those who lived here. And for a while, there was a lot of good that came from the development. The lakes are a great source of recreation and beauty in our area and there were several campsites that were developed along with beaches for swimming and areas for picnicking and hiking. But at some point, the development stopped and the focus of BCDA shifted from developing to maintaining, and that's something we'd like to change." Red Bay Archives Committee member Dor-

othy Harris, who was also the secretary to former Red Bay Mayor David Morrow, was there when the BCWA first formed in October 1961 and said it was comprised on many citizens from the five-county area of Franklin, Colbert, Marion, and Winston counties in Alabama and Tishomingo County in Mississippi. This statement is backed up by the Bear Creek Reservoirs Land Management Plan, which states there were literally hundreds of people involved in the BCWA through various work groups that included focuses on agriculture, business and industry, forestry, human resources and education, health, minerals, recreation, water supply and use, and public finance.

And while many projects were seen through to completion, Montgomery said they have so much un-tapped potential in the Bear Cree watershed area that could be a benefit in terms of economic development.

"There is a lot more that we could do with our lakes to bring in more people interested in using the lakes for fishing tournaments, boating events, or other recreation," she said. "We could have better housing development plans that allow for more people to live close to these amenities. We could develop retail plans that would allow for restaurants or businesses to be located in the watershed area that could bring in tourist dollars and provide more entertainment for those who are local."

BCDA will be having an upcoming strategic planning session on Oct. 28 to discuss some of the ideas for economic and recreational development moving forward. Members of BCDA would love to have input from citizens in the area and urge anyone who wants to submit any thoughts or ideas to do so at bcda@franklincountychamber.org. Montgomery said any input would be appreciated.

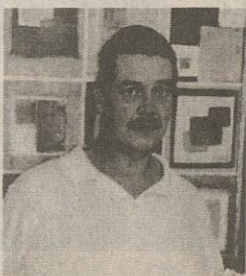

Take Back Old Drugs to Sheriff's Department

On Saturday, October 28, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 14th opportunity in 7 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last April Americans turned in 450 tons (900,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at almost 5,500 sites operated by the DEA and more than 4,200 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 13 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 8.1 million pounds—more than 4,050 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy Meeting

John Marshall Stone #394 met October 16th, 11 am at the Iuka Public Library. We completed the pledges to the United States, Confederate, and the Mississippi State flags. We then completed our UDC rituals and the singing of "Dixie." President Sharon declared the meeting open, she read the minutes from the September meeting and they were approved, Treasurer Eunell Handy gave the treasure report and it was approved and she stated that she still had some dues to collect.

Registrar Eunell Handy gave her report that she had one application ready to send in and working on others. There was no Chaplin report. Old business was getting other names added to our bank account and new business was maybe changing our meeting time. Eunell Handy will check to see if our present meeting time will be good for our new member or when will be a good time for her and present members.

Eunell Handy was in charge of the program for October, we didn't have the predetermined October program that was recommended but she gave a program from May Magazine. The Invasion of Alabama by the Union Army by Marjorie Ann Reeves, Virginia Clay Clopton Chapter 1107, Huntsville, Alabama. The cities of Florence, Tusculumbia and Muscle Shoals were attacked in April 1862 by Union General Ormsby Mitchel of the 3rd Ohio. He then led his men from Tennessee to North Alabama, where they made their base in Huntsville. September 11, 1862, The Huntsville Advocate resumed publication after the Union left Huntsville and they summed it up as follows. We were under military rule, having to get passes to go from place to place in town and to go outside of town. We were forced to say pledges and oaths under dire compulsion. We were ordered to stay off the streets and were often arrested and kept in prison for days and weeks for no reason. Houses were searched and property taken without compensation or receipted.

Even though the Yankees made their home in Huntsville for a time they

showed little appreciation to their hosts. General Mitchel made a point of arresting local citizens, bragging that it was just to show he could. He insisted that all the citizens of Alabama to be required to take the oath to the United States, which many refused because their relatives were fighting for the Confederacy. He allowed Colonel John Turchin's soldiers to destroy Athens and General Grenville Dodge completely dismantled Decatur.

Children carried the memory of the war all their lives; a young girl from Guntersville, Al. kept a diary about the attacks on the citizens and the destruction of the area. Emma Sansom, age 15, of Gadsden led General Nathan Bedford Forrest to a crossing on the river that led him to capture Colonel Abel D. Streight and the "Jackass Brigade." In 1870 Mattie Figures wrote that her older brother wanted to visit his family in Huntsville and his mother, Harriet Figures tried without success to get a pass to go meet him. Her brother Henry died in the Wilderness Campaign on May 5, 1864, without his family ever having the opportunity to see him.

By the end of the war, Alabama had been demolished. Families were refugees and were scattered with little food or jobs. Life continued to be a struggle long after the war. It would take many generations for recovery.

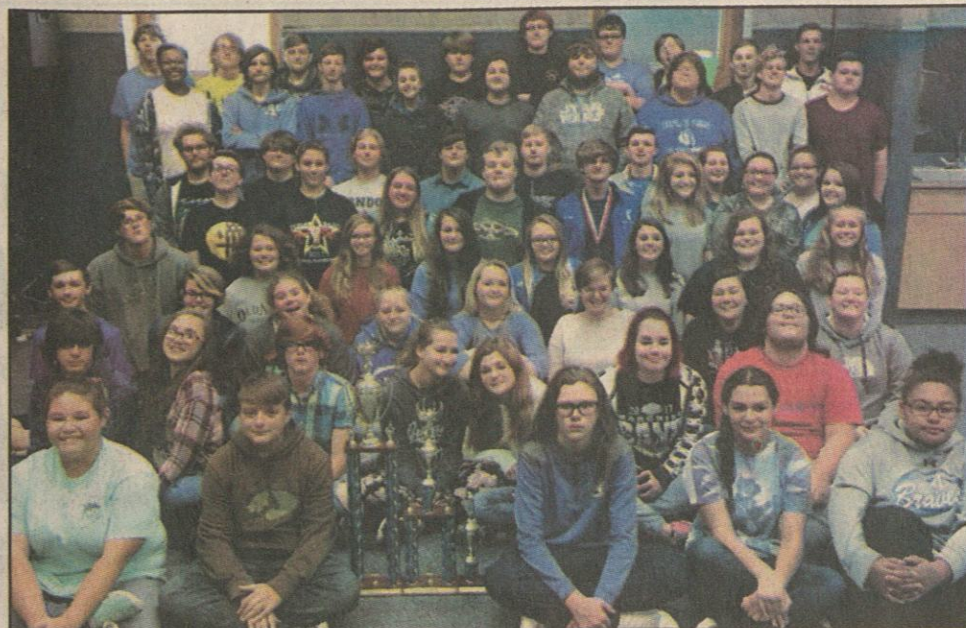
IMS celebrated Red Ribbon Week this week with dress up days and a school program on Thursday.

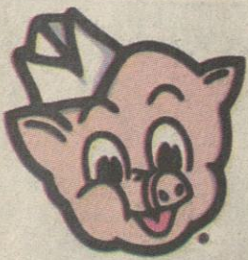

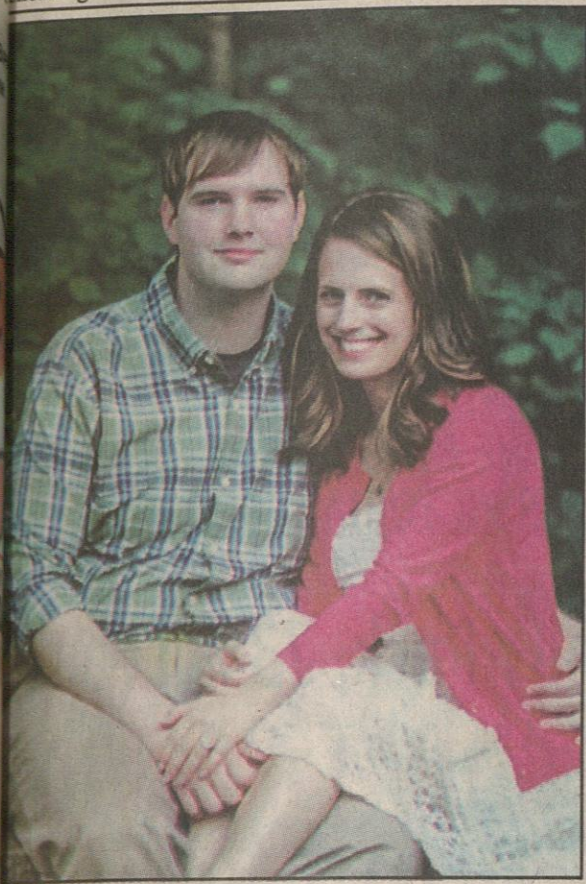

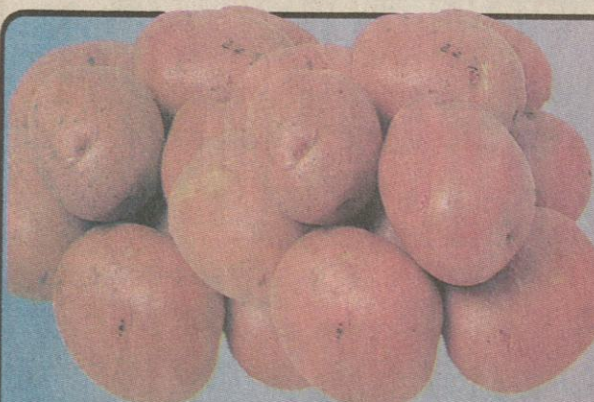
