Special Election Set For November 7th

A county wide special election will be held on Tuesday, November 7th, to elect an individual to serve as the County Prosecuting Attorney for Tishomingo County. The Prosecuting Attorney position will be the only item on the ballot during this November election.

The candidates who are running for this elected position are Carly J. Carman, Independent Candidate, and Nathaniel

Clark, Independent Candidate. Of course there will also be the option of a write-in candidate on the ballot.

Local Man Arrested in Texas

On October 31st the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office received confirmation that a local "Wanted" suspect was arrested in the State of Texas.

Roy Steven Roberts, 61-year-old, white male, who previously lived in Golden, Mississippi, was indicted by a Tishomingo County Grand Jury in September of this year for one count of fondling and one count of sexual battery.

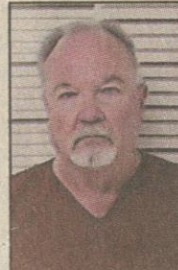
The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office began their investigation into the case around

May 2017 after the victim(s) informed local law enforcement agencies of the allegations. Sheriff's investigators as well as Child Protective Services (CPS) began working together and were able to find enough evidence to bring the case before a Grand Jury. Prior to the Grand Jury's inquire, Roberts and his wife moved from Golden to somewhere in Texas.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office contacted the United States Marshals Service as soon as the indictment was

published and requested assistance in locating Roberts. Roberts was apprehended during a traffic stop in the Athens, Texas area and was transported to the local jail.

Tishomingo County Officials have made plans to bring Roberts back to Mississippi once the extradition is made official.

I am married to my high school sweetheart, Shane Carman, and we have three active children: Alec, Curt, and Myli Cate. Shane is the Transportation Services Supervisor for the Tennessee Valley Authority.

He is also a recent retiree from the Tennessee Air National Guard in Memphis, Tennessee. Prior to joining the Air National Guard, Shane was enlisted in the United States Air Force. During our 22 years of marriage and his 23 years of military service, Shane was deployed several times. Our family is deeply patriotic and thankful for the sacrifices made by those who have served and are still serving in our nation's military.

I am an honor graduate of Tishomingo County High School and a *magna cum laude* graduate of the University of North Alabama with a Bachelor of Science in Psychology and Sociology. While at UNA, I was inducted into several honor societies and also earned the Sociology Award for obtaining the highest grade point average among my graduating class in Sociology. Leela is a 4-year old Llewelyn Setter. She loves to bird hunt and chase butterflies. She is always full of energy and ready to play. Llewelyn Setters are a very intelligent breed, but also mischievous, this makes Leela an excellent escape artist. She will open doors and enter and exit as she pleases. She keeps things very lively and exciting around the house!

Fall months can bring chilly days and colder nights. If your pet primarily lives outside, make sure it has a warm place to go at night. During storms, it is also suggested that you bring your pet inside to prevent it from getting wet and possibly getting frostbite or hypothermia. Small pets should also be watched closely during the cold months and kept as warm as possible. No matter the

season, always be sure that your pet has access to water. It is important that the water is clean to avoid any bacteria from entering your pet's system. Also remember that in autumn, nighttime temperatures often drop below freezing. If your pet spends a lot of time outside, check for ice formation in their water and remove any floating chunks that could lead to choking. Humans are not the only ones who can get the curse of fall allergies. Your pet can be just as susceptible to allergens as you. If you see your pet itching more than usual, you might want to check with the veterinarian to identify any possible allergies. Keep leaves raked and

Street Dedicated in Honor of TCHS Coach Jerry Long

(Editor's Note: The following story was compiled by Daily Corinthian Sports Editor Kent Mohundro. It is being printed with permission.)

Jerry Long just recently turned 60 but has already produced a Hall Of Fame career. And he's not done yet. "My wife Angela tells me every year when the season starts that she'll be a single wife for a while," Long quippingly said during a recent interview. "I feel I have been very blessed with not only my coaching career but with a loving family too."

Long was born in Corinth in 1957 to J.C. and Elaine Long but moved to Stephenson, Alabama shortly before he even had time to form memories of the Crossroads City. "My daddy worked for TVA and we moved to Stephenson shortly after I was born," Long said. "We stayed over there about nine years before we moved back to this area. I graduated from Iuka High School in 1975 and played every sport that was offered."

"We won a state championship in baseball during my sophomore year," Long reminisced. "That was back in the days of A and B conference's. We were in Double-B."

"The thing that made us so good, and the reason other schools have enjoyed the kind of success we did, was because we all grew up playing together from the time

we were in little league."

Long spent most of his high school varsity days at shortstop. He actually started at second base as an eighth-grader on the varsity team.

After high school Long signed with and played for the legendary Boo Ferris at Delta State.

"I played for him (Ferris) for a year and a half but I began to get homesick," said Long. "So I transferred back to play my last two years at UNA under head coach Mike Holloway."

During his time with the Lions, Long was a conference Player Of The Week and led the team in home runs, which also was among the conference leaders. During his senior year in Florence, Long remembered that another pretty good local product- Bart Cregeen- showed up as a freshman and was right behind him in the home run department.

"Yeah, Cregeen was a really good player and had some power," Long stated.

Upon his graduation from UNA Long was granted the honor of being a graduate assistant for a year before accepting his first high school head coaching job.

"That one year as a GA really helped me with my knowledge of the game and the way to prepare high school players for the next level."

The next chapter in his life and coaching career started in 1981 and is still going strong. He

became an assistant baseball and football coach for the Iuka Chieftain's and held that position for three years before landing the head coaching gig in baseball in 1985.

The rest, as they say, is still history in the making.

Long recently won his 1,215th game on the diamond- which includes his softball wins - when his Tishomingo County Lady Braves swept New Hope in the first round of the 4A state playoffs.

Coach Jerry Long has won three state titles in baseball, one as a coach and two as a player. But that's only part of the story. His teams have played for several more state titles and finished in the runners-up position. That consistent way of winning and high-level success is due in large part to the pleasure Long has had of coaching.

"I've had some really good ones," he said. "I got spoiled with some of those early teams when guys like Richy Harrelson and Shane Holiday were playing."

But Harrelson and Holiday are just the beginning when listing players on the Iuka teams that still hold the national record for a 4-year span. With Iuka, Burnsville and Tishomingo all combining in 1991 to form Tishomingo County High School, the combination of the Chieftains' and Braves' teams from 1989-1992 won 156 games in four years. Their 41 wins in 1989 was finally surpassed a few years ago.

This past season, Long- while also employed and coaching fast-pitch softball at TC- took over as head coach at Cherokee, Alabama and led them to a division title and their first playoff berth in 20 years. For this reason he was named the Florence Times-Daily Coach Of The Year. Former Daily Corinthian sports editor Greg Dewalt is still the sports editor in Florence.

Times have changed and Long - a member of the NEMCABB, North-

east Community College, and Crossroads Diamond Club Halls Of Fame- has adapted well. His players still respect him and generally produce winning records and a high level of play. Because if they don't he'll still crawl on their little red wagons.

"The first 20-25 years after I began as head coach were the glory years," said Long. "Coaches like Larry Harmon at Tupelo, Roger Farris at Oxford, Rex Berryman at Moor-

eville and Jerry Boatman at West Lauderdale were

big influences on me. And of course Boo Ferris was another that I pattern my coaching style after."

"My wife has been my rock thru this whole thing and my proudest accomplishment is raising a God-fearing son who is a good Christian man," he said.

Long's son is Blake, the sports information director at Northeast Community College. Blake and his wife, Leslie, have an 18-month-old son John-

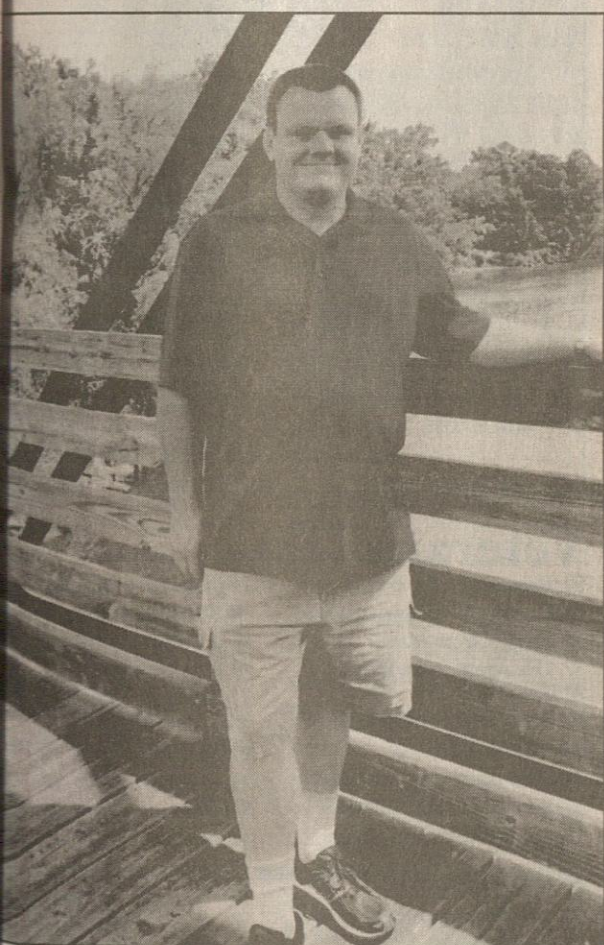
son and are expecting a daughter in December.

Long was recently honored prior to the Lady Brave's home finale against Itawamba by having the street that runs between the football and baseball/softball fields named in his honor.

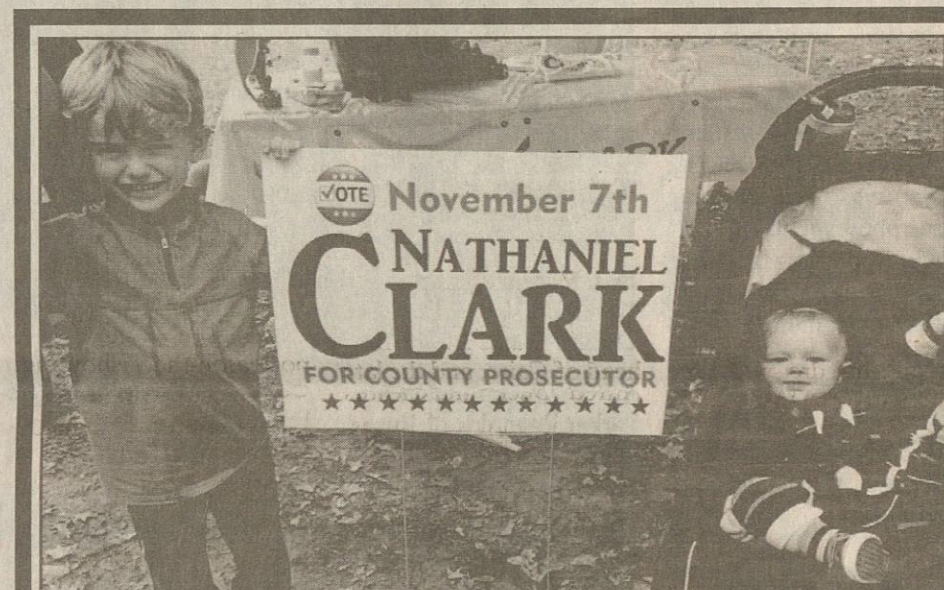
That stretch of road will forever be known as 'Jerry Long Way'.

Wags – Iuka's Famous Ice Cream Eating Dog

If you grew up in Iuka in the 1950's you will no doubt remember Wags. He was the "baby" of Sibil and Strutt Edmondson who owned Edmondson's Dry Cleaning on Eastport Street in Iuka. These photos were found in the belongings of Joyce Robinson Cummings and Dudgar Patrick Cummings. The photos are marked 1957 and show Wags' daily excursions to Rushing's Drug Store on Front Street to get a cup of ice cream. As a child I can remember Wags coming to the door of Hiatt's Grocery, next to Rushing's, to get some ice cream also. Everyone in town knew to stop their car and let Wags pass as he made his daily rounds throughout town.

In later years I remember the Edmondson's having a large bird in a cage at the entrance to their cleaners.

Ms. Mattie Beard, who we honored several weeks ago, also worked at the Edmondson Cleaners.

Ms. Mattie (Martha Lovina) Robinson Beard was a sister to Sibil Edmondson's mother, Bessie Lou Robinson Sparks, and also a sister to Mable Clara Robinson Cummings, mother of Joyce Robinson Cummings.

Today the old house is gone and the lot is a parking area. Next to the cleaner can be seen the old library which later became the office of Frank Crossett.



Wags made his way down Eastport Street and crossed onto Main Street. This area is now occupied by the Iuka Baptist Church Fellowship Hall. Another historic photo, as it shows buildings that are no longer standing. At the far end of this street was John Hubbard's Furniture, next you can see the sign for Choate's Cafe, a popular eating place in Iuka and next to it is Vale and Baddour (the original Fred's). As a small child I remember the building on the corner as being the office of Dr. and Mrs. Mary Ward. Later it was the office of Hiawasse Land Company. The garbage can reads, "Bill Deaton for Texaco." Mr. Deaton's Texaco was near the Spring Park across from the old courthouse.

The door at Rushing Drugs on Front Street was for Wags by Mrs. Quay Rushing. The drug store sold ice cream, and snacks. A comic book rack was seen and also a 45 record by Elvis in a rack on wall.



Kermit Rushing, Jr., gave Wags his small container of ice cream and he was on his way back to the cleaners.

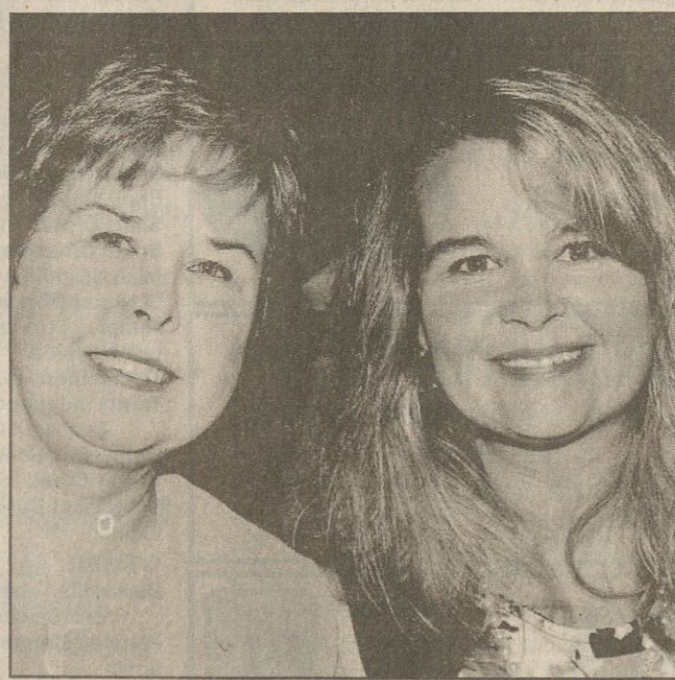

The Judgment of the One World Church (part III)

At age 73, and bumping age 74 pretty hard, I have seen many changes in the world of religion. It sounds nice to most of the world for religious people to be "tolerant" of all religions. Although our nation has given freedom of religion, and I am for that, yet all religions cannot be right, for many of them militate against each other. If Jesus is the only Savior, then there can be no other, and this is exactly what the Bible says in Acts 4:12: "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." The context of this verse is speaking about Jesus. It is not right to desire to wipe out all people who do not believe in Jesus, nor is it right to be unkind to those who are not of the persuasion that Jesus is the only Savior. Yet it must be real-

ized that the Bible is either right or wrong, and many of us are convinced that it is right, in fact, nobody has ever proved it to be wrong! There would be no need, nor would it be right, for God, or anyone, to judge the "great whore" of Revelation chapter 17, which many of us have called "the one-world church", if there is even a remote possibility that such a "church" could be right. We saw in Revelation 17:2 that "the inhabitants of the earth have been made drunk with the wine of her fornication". This alone lets us know that there is something illicit about this religious system. Fornication may sound fine to the fornicator, but it does not sound fine to the mother whose daughter is involved sexually with every male, or female, who comes along!

We are actually looking at a "spiritual fornication" in our chapter from Revelation, but "spiritual fornication", which is an illicit relationship with a false god or system, has actually come to include physical fornication in most cases. Take a look at Bible history, as well as the world's histories written by men, apart from Divine inspiration, and you will find that sexual impurity has plagued the human race from the earliest times. The real problem with the one-world church will be that she makes her illicit religion look like the real thing to unsuspecting, would-be followers! Revelation 17:3-4 says, "So he (an angel) carried me away in the spirit into the wilderness: and I saw a woman sit upon a scarlet coloured beast, full of names of blasphemy, having seven heads and ten horns. And the woman was arrayed in purple and scarlet colour, and decked

with gold and precious stones and pearls, having a golden cup in her hand full of abominations and filthiness of her fornication." This one-world church will be rich and wicked! We are getting ready for her appearance right now, although she will not actually appear until the true church is gone. All of the "health-wealth philosophy" is gearing up the religious world to accept a "rich church" that will promise the "moon and stars" to all who follow her. It takes only a random look at the New Testament (especially the New Testament) to see that many, if not most, Christians have not been financially wealthy. 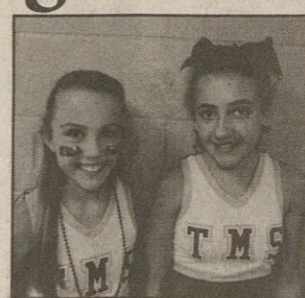
Collecting Can Tabs for St. Jude

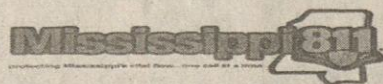

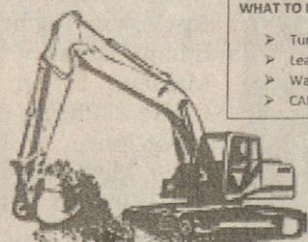

How To Identify Pipeline Locations

Since pipelines are buried underground, line markers like the ones shown above are used to indicate their approximate location along the route. The markers can be found where a pipeline intersects a street, highway or railroad. The marker displays the material transported in the lines, the name of the pipeline company, and a telephone number where the company can be reached in the event of an emergency.

They will send a representative to mark the exact location, route and depth of the pipeline at no charge.

Taking the time to Call Before You Dig protects your safety by preventing serious accidents and injuries. It also helps prevent disruption of services and possible delay of your project. What to do if you are digging and disturb a pipeline. Even if you cause what seems to be only minor damage to the pipeline, notify the pipeline company immediately. A gouge, scrape, dent or crease to the pipe or coating may cause a future break or leak. It is imperative that the pipeline owner inspect and repair any damage to the line.

BUSQUE LOS MARCADORES DE DUCTOS

Para determinar si existen ductos en la zona donde se ha planeado una excavación, busque los marcadores de ductos en cruces de caminos y vías ferroviarias cercanas. No trate de adivinar la trayectoria o ubicación de los ductos a partir de la localización de los marcadores. Llame gratis a la compañía operadora de ductos al número telefónico que aparece en el marcador a lo menos 72 horas antes de excavar. Ellos enviarán un representante quien señalará la ubicación exacta, la trayectoria y profundidad del ducto sin cargo alguno. O llame a su sistema One Call (Una Llamada) de su área a los números que aparecen en esta página. Aun cuando usted cause lo que pareciera ser solo un daño menor al ducto, notifique inmediatamente a la compañía operadora de ductos. Cualquier incisión, raspadura, abolladura o pliegue que se ocasiona al ducto o al revestimiento puede provocar una futura rotura de fuga. Es imprescindible que el propietario de ductos inspeccione y repare cualquier daño a la misma. O llame a su Centro de Una Llamada (One-Call Center) en su área a los números que están en esta página.

IF YOU HIT THE PIPELINE

Take whatever steps necessary to protect the public in the event of a pipeline emergency. The following suggestions are offered as a guide:

Secure the area around the leak to a safe distance. This could include the evacuation of people from homes, businesses, schools, and other locations, as well as the erection of barricades to control access to the emergency site and similar precautions.

If the pipeline leak is burning, try to prevent the spread of fire but do not attempt to extinguish it. Burning petroleum products will not explode. If the fire is extinguished, gas or vapor will collect and could explode when reignited by secondary fires.

SI USTED ES UN OFICIAL DE SEGURIDAD PUBLICA

asegure el área alrededor de la fuga hasta una distancia segura. Esto podría incluir la evacuación de la gente de los hogares, los negocios, las escuelas, y otros lugares cercanos. También, establezca barreras para controlar el acceso a la zona de emergencia y otras precauciones similares.

Si la fuga del ducto no esta en llamas, tome las medidas necesarias para evitar la combustión. PIPELINE COMPANY'S RESPONSE

We will immediately dispatch personnel to the site to help handle the emergency and to provide information to public safety officials to aid in the response to the emergency. We will also take the necessary operating actions such as closing and opening valves and similar steps to minimize the impact of the leak. But, please, public safety personnel and others unfamiliar with the pipeline should not attempt to operate any of the valves on the pipeline. Improper operation of the pipeline valves could make the situation worse and cause other emergencies.

También enviaremos personal al sitio para ayudar a manejar la emergencia y proporcionar información a los oficiales de seguridad pública para ayudar en la respuesta a la emergencia. También tomaremos las acciones operativas necesarias como cerrar y abrir válvulas y pasos similares para minimizar el impacto de la fuga. Pero, por favor, el personal de seguridad pública y otros que no son familiares con la línea de ductos no intenten operar ninguna de las válvulas en la línea. La operación incorrecta de las válvulas de la línea de ductos podría hacer la situación peor y causar otras emergencias.

ACTION PLAN

Immediate action is required to prevent a pipeline emergency. If you are digging and disturb a pipeline, even if you cause what seems to be only minor damage to the pipeline, notify the pipeline company immediately. A gouge, scrape, dent or crease to the pipe or coating may cause a future break or leak. It is imperative that the pipeline owner inspect and repair any damage to the line.

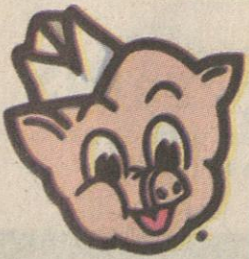

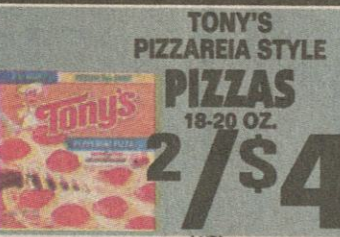
