Special Flag Presentation Held at Burnsville School Tuesday

North Eastern National Day of Prayer partnered with Mid-South Project Package in an effort to write more letters for service members, the results were remarkable. 1500 letters were collected from Tishomingo County Schools to be sent out to members of the military. Letters from Burnsville School caught the attention of the commander of the unit who received the letters and the actions that followed were truly touching.

The unit commander sent

the flag that had been flown in Afghanistan by that unit to Burnsville School, along with two other flags; one from Albania and one from Kosovo for the students.

The flags were presented at Burnsville School on Tuesday, November 7th during an assembly of the students. In attendance at the assembly were several special guest speakers including Diane Rodgers of North Eastern National Day of Prayer, Don Grant of the American

Legion post 15, Senator J.P. Wilemon, and the director of Mid-South Project Package, Ricky Pope.

Pope presented the flags and a letter from the Commander to Principal Lorie McCalmon, to be displayed for the students to enjoy. Another heartfelt moment during this presentation was when some of the letters that were received from the soldiers responding to the students were read aloud for everyone to hear. The assembly was con-

cluded with Burnsville School Choir singing, "Proud To Be An American."

The partnership with Tishomingo County will continue in terms of letter writing, the county schools will start collecting letters in October and April to send to troops. Since 2004 Mid-South Project Package has sent ninety thousand packages to troops, last week alone they sent out 700 boxes. Baymont Bathware to Reopen in Tishomingo County, Rehire Previous Employees and Add 20 Jobs

Jackson, Miss. (Nov. 8, 2017) - Baymont Bathware is reopening in Golden, Miss., in Tishomingo County, following a fire in May which destroyed the company's previous facility. Baymont is investing \$1.5 million and commits to reaching its pre-fire employment level and creating 20 new jobs due to business growth.

cation to reopening in Golden and adding even more jobs after facing adverse circumstances demonstrates the company's commitment to the community and its employees," Gov. Phil Bryant said.

Corinth Woman Arrested on Drug Charges

Amanda Hicks, 37-year-old, white female, of Gains Road Apartment Corinth, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine. Hicks remains in custody at the Tishomingo County Jail on a \$3,000 bond set by the Justice Court. Hicks also has a hold placed on her by the Pontotoc Police Department.

On October 28th Deputies from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office stopped a vehicle on Hwy. 72 in Burnsville after noticing a switched tag. While speaking with the driver, a different vehicle stopped behind the deputies. The deputies secured the consent needed to search both vehicles. During the search some alleged methamphetamine was found in one of the vehicles. Hicks claimed responsibility and was then arrested and transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.



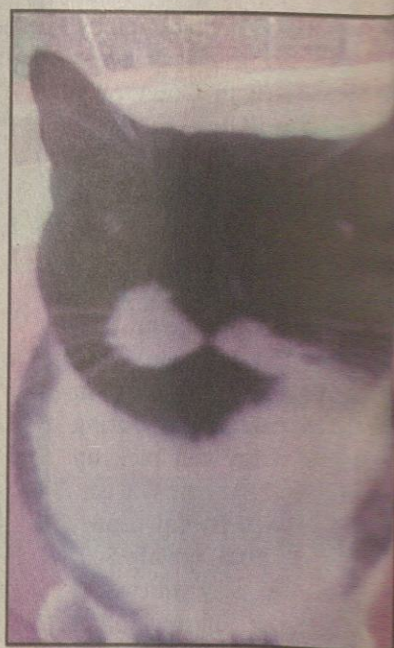

Miss Kitty is a 7yr old tuxedo cat from Red Bay, AL. She was dropped off at our home when she was a tiny kitten. We took her in and she has been an inspiration in our lives. Miss Kitty has traveled all over the south and east. As we travel she loves to give me instructions on my driving. She is very vocal and doesn't meow like most cats, she talks. Her favorite words are right now, I don't know, and mac moo; which we have yet to translate that one. Miss Kitty really does enjoy talking, as the staff of Iuka Animal Clinic knows well she has the gift of gab. She loves her family and her Puggle brother Shiloh. Cats as healthy as Miss Kitty require proper nutrition. We recommend purchasing high-quality, brand-name kitten or cat food. Your veterinarian

will be able to assess your cat or kitten and determine the best diet. Factors such as age, activity level and health make a difference in what and how much a cat should eat. Cats require taurine, an essential amino acid, for heart and eye health. The food you choose should be balanced for the life stage of your cat or kitten. Properly balanced foods will contain taurine. You will need to provide fresh, clean water at all times, and wash and refill your cat's water bowls daily. Treats are good but should be no more than 5-10% of the diet. Make sure you keep track that your cat is eating daily to maintain their health. If you notice a change in your cats ap-



petite this could your cat is sick. Take cat to your veterinarian if signs of anorexia, rhea, vomiting or let continue for more two days.

Cast Members Have Ties to Pocahontas

A local author, who discovered this story while researching the early settlers of old Tishomingo County.

Corinth Theatre Arts is presenting the children's play "Pocahontas: The Legend" at the Coliseum November 12, 13, and 14. MCayden, Bella, Saydee, and Trinity Marlar are cast members. They are the children of Alvin and Courtney Marlar, of Burns-ville.

When their grandmother saw that they were in this particular play, she said, "Do you know that you may actually be portraying your own ancestors?" No, they had never heard that.

The Marlar children are part of the Osborn family. Today there are over 1'000 descendants of this family living in Alcorn, Tishomingo, and Prentiss counties. The trail follows this family back 400 years and 14 generations to the Virginia Colony. It begins with our maternal great grandmother, Annie Osborn. Born in Short, Mississippi in 1904. Annie lived in a community of Osborn's. In 1880, William Riley Osborn was the first of this family to settle in Tishomingo County. Born in Laurens S.C., he was a farmer. William was a charter member of the New Salem Church in Iuka, Ms. That's where he chose to be buried in 1900.

In 1619, a 32 year old

soldier named Thomas Osborn, sailed from London to the Virginia Colony. He was hired to serve in the military, which protected a large tract of college land (10,000 acres) at Henrico. In 1618 a royal charter was obtained to build a proposed school to educate the Indians in Christianity, and to provide the planter's children with advanced tuition. Plans for the first college in America were canceled in 1622. In March of that year, Indians attacked and killed many settlers. Lieutenant Thomas Osborn led a successful retaliatory attack on the Indians. After that he became Captain Thomas Osborn, of the college militia. For his service, he received 500 acres of land, located on the south side of the James River, a few miles southwest of the pres-

ent city of Richmond. In 1625, he moved there and built the Coxendale Plantation. It became a center for shipping and grading tobacco. Thomas lived his entire life at Coxendale, as did the next 5 generations of his namesake. Thomas Osborn V born 1690, was the first Osborn to leave Coxendale. He married Anne Worsham. Anne's family has a connection to the Powatan Indians. After Thomas and Anne married in 1714, they moved to Charlotte, Virginia and bought 400 acres of land from Thomas Jefferson's father, Peter. They later sold most of the land and opened a tavern. They are buried at the Charlotte Court House in Union Cemetery.

We descended from Thomas and Anne's son, Daniel Osborn. He was born 1730 in Henrico.

Daniel served as a private in the South Carolina Continental line during the Revolutionary War. After the war, he received a land grant, and moved to Laurens S.C. 100 years before Thomas and Anne married. George Worsham, came to Virginia as an indentured servant. In this colony, Tobacco was the most profitable crop. It required labor to operate the plantations. If a person agreed to work 3 years on a plantation, they received passage to Virginia and 50 acres of land. George was not a rich man. A few years after his arrival, George married an Indian princess. Her father was Wahunsenacawh, a Powatan chief of over 30 districts with 150 villages. After the marriage, George became a large land owner. The chief had 26 children who were half-siblings. One of the sisters was Pocahontas. George's wife took the English name, Susannah or Susan. Like Pocahontas, (Rebecca) she became a Christian and wore English clothes. George Worsham married his wife in 1619, during a time of good relations between the settlers and the Indians. This peace started in 1614, when John Rolfe married Pocahontas. By having children in the settlement, the chief had a connection to the colony. Trade was good and many Indian children were taught English. John Rolfe and Pocahontas lived in an area called the Ber-

muda 100. Established in 1613, just 6 years after the first Virginia settlement of Jamestown in 1607. It lay where the James and the Appomattox rivers converged. George and Susannah also lived here. Indians had occupied this area for 10,000 years. The Powatan chief gave Pocahontas a large tract of land called the Varina Plantation. John Rolfe may have grown the first marketable tobacco here, where he lived with his wife from 1614-1619. Their son, Thomas Rolfe was born here in 1615. Several generations of the Worsham family also owned land in the Bermuda 100. Some Worsham's descended from George, others came from England and settled here. Some married into the Epps family. George and Susannah only saw three years of good relations between the colonist and the Indians. Her sister, Pocahontas, died the year of their marriage in 1619. Her father, the Powatan chief, died a year later. A new chief took charge. He had no tolerance for the persecution of his people. As the colony grew, the treatment of the Indians grew worse. The hunger for land to grow tobacco was taking the Indian's hunting land. In 1622, Chief Opechancanough tried to rid the newly taken land of the

English. He was also the Powatan chief's younger brother that captured John Smith. The Englishman that Pocahontas is known to have saved. The Indians came to the settlers as they worked, they pretended to be friends bearing gifts. 30 plantations from Jamestown to Henrico were attacked. 347 of the 1,250 settlers were killed in the Massacre of 1622. Only 41 settlers were left in the Bermuda 100, where George and Susannah Worsham lived. Plantations and crops were burned. Many were never rebuilt. The remaining settlers fled to the forts. The Jamestown area never fully recovered as the capital of the colony. Government moved to Williamsburg where it could be more easily defended. War continued with the Indians for years. They burned each other's crops. They attacked villages. The Indians were eventually reduced to just a few thousand and driven from their land. Very little is written about the Indian Princess. The Worsham's had two children born in 1622 and 1624. Most of their lives were lived in times of turmoil between the settlers and the Indians.

Through the Osborn and Worsham families, you can trace the footsteps of our ancestors from Virginia to Mississippi.

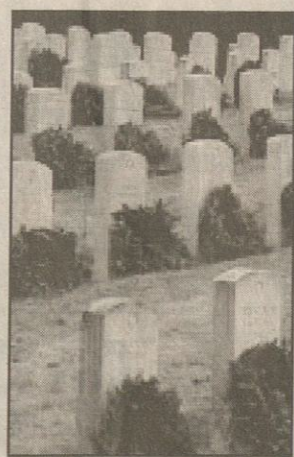

Finch, Elbert Robinson, and John Henry "Sleepy" McAuley. Claude Curtis, who owned a restaurant in Iuka, gave every young man he knew going into World War II a silver dollar. Many of those silver dollars are still kept by the families of the men.

L. O. also noted that Wags had two separate charge accounts in Iuka - one at both local drug stores. Downtown Iuka had two drug stores, Rushings' and Curtis'. On Thursdays, only one drug store would remain open, so each week Wags would

visit the drug store that was open that day and get his ice cream. The owners of the stores knew that Edmondson's Cleaners was not open Thursday, so they open the ice cream Wags so he could have his treat before he turned back home.

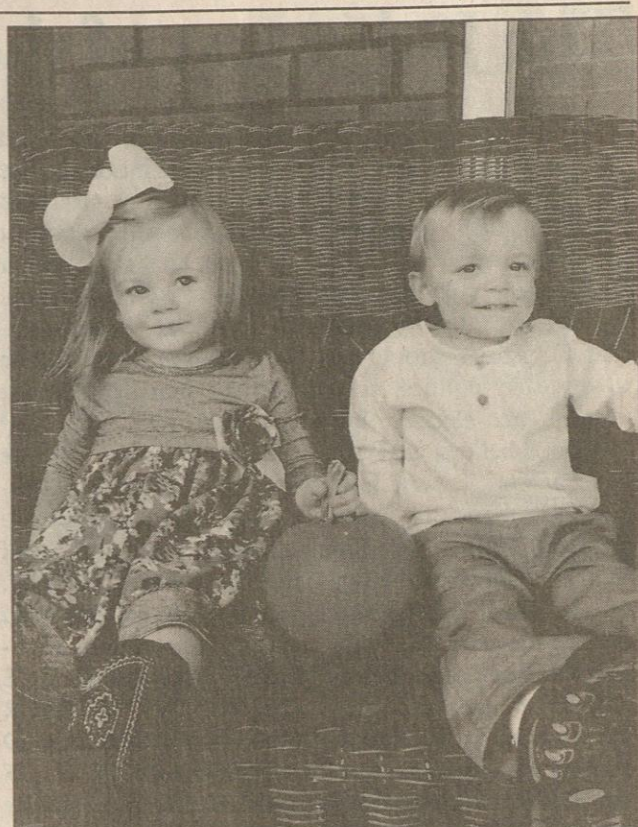

Shiloh to Host All Day Hike Comparing Shiloh and the Civil War to World War One

SHILOH, Tennessee – On Veterans Day, November 11, 2017, Shiloh will host an in-depth hike comparing the Civil War to World War One. Park volunteer, Dr. Jeff Gentsch, of the University of West Alabama, will lead the daylong hike on the battlefield.

To commemorate the 155th anniversary of the Battle of Shiloh and the Centennial of the entry of the United States into the First World War, Dr. Jeff Gentsch will guide a hike comparing and contrasting various strategic, operational, tactical, and geographic aspects of Shiloh and other Civil War battles with similar or disparate circumstances from the Great War. Special attention will be focused on American involvement in the conflict.

"The influence of the War Between the States on United States' military practices and command-

ers that went 'over there' was profound, and the similarities between what the armies went through in adapting to the exigencies of modern, total warfare are often striking," according to Dr. Gentsch.

This Veterans Day hike will meet at Tour Stop #6 (Rhea Field), at 9:00 am and last until 5:00 pm. The distance of the hike will be 12 miles and the terrain covered will range from easy to "very difficult." Participants should wear appropriate footwear and clothing, and bring water, and food and snacks. A break will be offered in the field for lunch. Insect repellent is also recommended.

Man has always turned to plants for help. Food, clothing, shelter, weapons, relief of life's hardships and even healing. Plants provide all of these and even more. Our ancestors did not need to be trained botanists to appreciate the remarkable diversity of the amazing plant world.

Herbal remedies have been a mainstay of folk medicine in many cultures all through history. In recent years the use of medicinal herbs has increased

greatly in more advanced nations. Consumers question the safety of synthetic drugs and prefer more natural solutions.

Knowledge of medicinal herbs and other healing plants make our use of them more familiar. Thus the more knowledge we have, the more we use these plants making them part of everyday life.

As residents of the South, we are pleased to have myriads of medicinal plants within our reach. We could begin in the garden with garlic – easily grown and used for antibiotic, digestive health, heart health and many other areas. Tomatoes – contain lycopene – a powerful antioxidant and anti-inflammatory, also vitamin C.

Cayenne Pepper – used to dull arthritis pain and increase circulation. Peppermint – has been used for thousands of years for digestive complaints, and the aroma calms tension

headaches.

Many southern flowerbeds contain hibiscus whose flowers make a refreshing tea for colds and sore throats. Echinacea – has long been known for its ability to fight infection to lessen the severity of the common cold.

Also grown in our flowerbeds are lemon balm, thyme, calendula, and sage – the list goes on and on.

Many of these we see every day and some such as betony we are not quite as familiar with in addition, almost every kitchen has the amazing aloe on the window sill for burns or for soothing irritated skin.

Along the roadsides that we travel daily grown a profusion of plants that have a long history of medicinal and culinary value. The pioneers and the native Americans used most for either medicine or food. You may recognize elderberries, passion flowers,



goldenseal, milk thistle, witch hazel, and blackberries. All of us older kids know about blackberries as a sometimes painful to gather summertime treat, but did you know that they could almost be medicine on their own because of all the health enhancing properties that they contain. Check them out – you MIGHT BE PLEASANTLY SURPRISED.

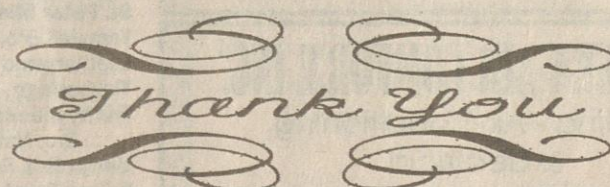

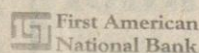

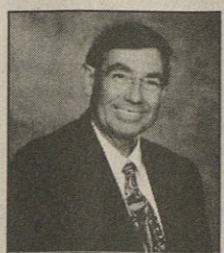
The Judgment of the One World Church (part IV)

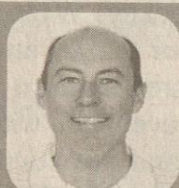
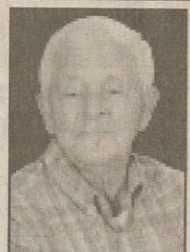

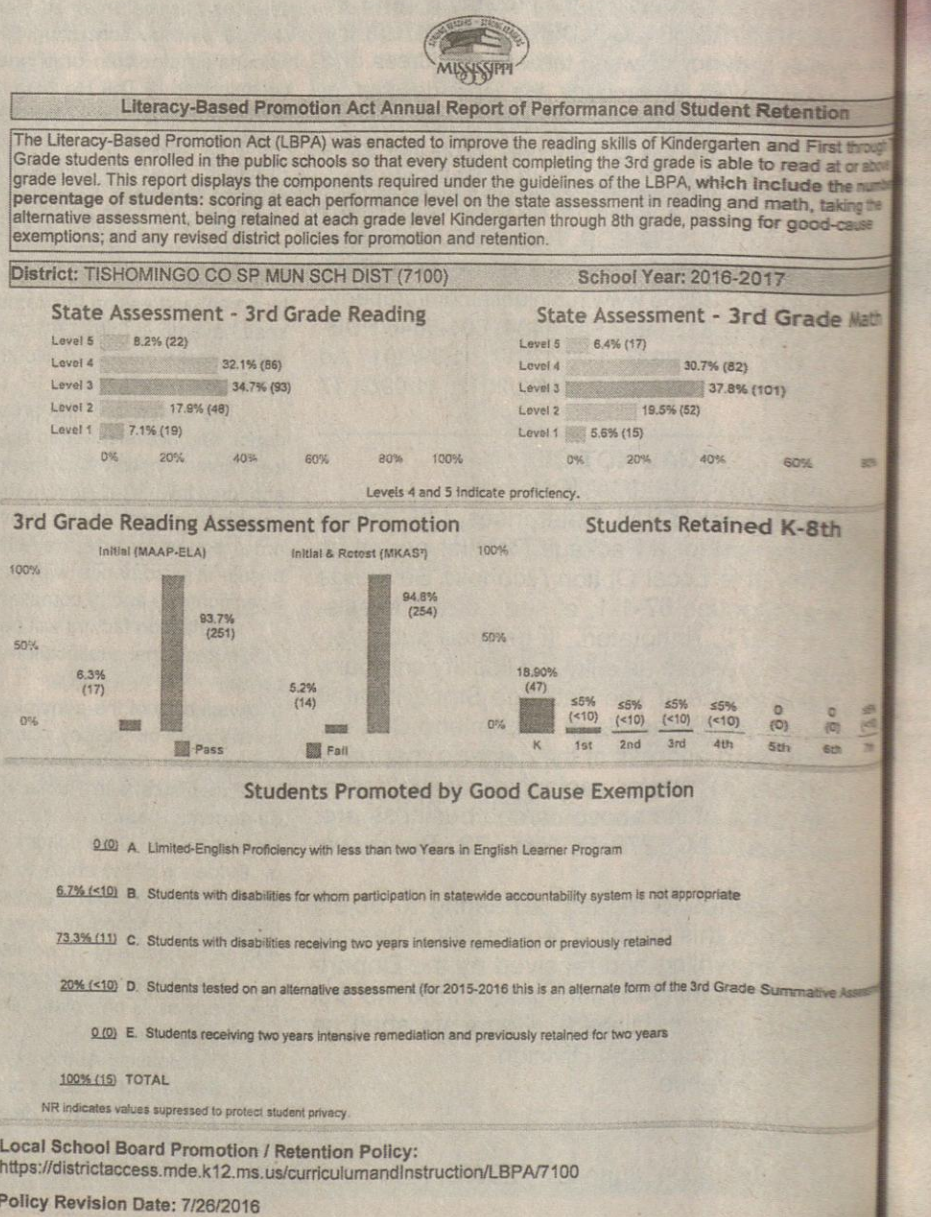

Teacher training focused on SAMR Model

and Culture of Learning through engaging activities that model meaningful technology integration. The trainings also focused on developing skills in Keynote, Numbers, and Creativity/Productivity with the iPad. Administrator training was geared toward best practices, school level support and enhancing productivity skills.

In an effort to ensure successful utilization, Mrs. Kristy Counce attended Apple Academy training

in Cupertino, CA in July and received the certification of Apple Learning Specialist that allows her to train with Malika, who will be working within our district for 20 days this year. The district will continue teacher training and support throughout this process.

What students/grades are included in the iPad Initiative?

All students in Grades 9-12 at Belmont High School and Tishomingo County High School.

Is there a fee to participate in the program?

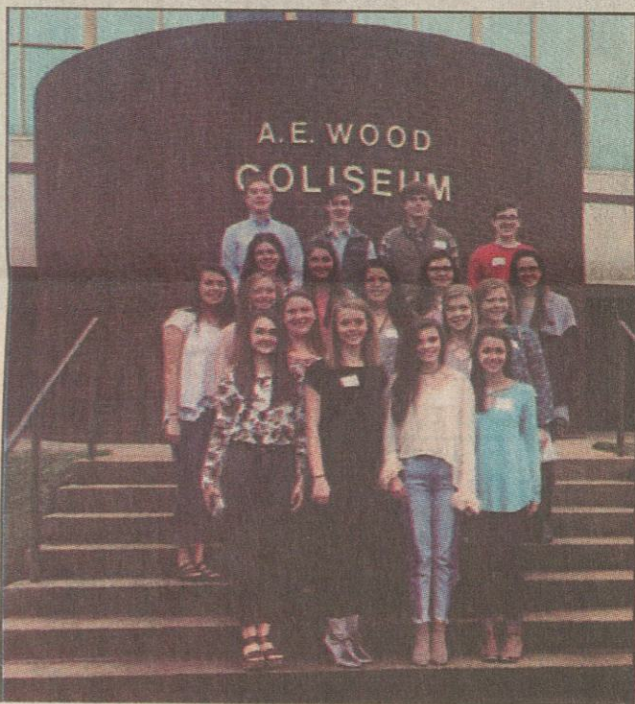
