Be Mindful this Holiday Season of Scams and Thieves

Message from the Tishomingo County Sheriff John D. Daugherty

Tishomingo County Sheriff, John Daugherty, would like to remind everyone to help each other this holiday season. If you know your neighbor or family member is going out of town, help keep an eye on their home, even if it's just for a few hours. The Tishomingo Sheriff's Office has had several reports of homes that have been burglarized, but arrests are being made and we need your help. "We will be organizing extra patrols both day and night, so help us by watching out for each other. If something doesn't look right in your community, contact us and if it's an emergency contact 911."

Another recent concern to be aware of is that a person (or persons) has been going through several mailboxes in the county and ripping apart people's personal mail. The culprit/s are presumably looking for money, personal information or goods. The way to avoid this issue is to be aware of the arrival time of your mail and packages and collect them as soon as possible.

Tampering with the U.S. mail is a federal offense and any cases brought to justice will not be handled on a local level of law enforcement. If you experience any problems with your mail, please call your local post office to report the situation and contact the Sheriff's Department.

"Criminals love this time of year so be on alert. Also, the phone scams are picking back up in our area due to the upcoming Holiday season. One of the newest scams is asking you if "Can you hear me..." The scammers WANT you to say "Yes" and when you do you are opening yourself to a lot of different problems. If you get a call like this, just hang up. Continue to report the scammers to the Mississippi Public Service Commission, or to our district commissioner, Mr. Brandon Presley, or follow this link and file a complainant straight on their website: Online Complaint Form - MS Public Service Commission"

Missing 14-Year Old Boy in Midway Community

The Tishomingo Sheriffs Office is asking the public's help in locating a 14-year-old boy, that goes by the name of Jacob Monroe of 618 CR 992 Iuka.

Jacob's mother informed the Sheriff's Office, that her son was born with a condition called "Fetal Alcohol Syndrome" and it has caused his mind to not fully develop. The mother also reported her son went missing Tuesday night at around 10pm. Jacob is believed to have left on his own but did not have any shoes. A search of the immediate area along with other family members and residences turned up nothing.

Jacob is described as 5'4"

approximately 100 lbs, white male that is 14 years old. He has braces with pink bands on them. Jacob was last seen wearing a yellow T-shirt and blue jeans. Jacob and his family live in the Midway Community around what is locally known as Rock Crusher Road.

Currently a search team is in the area made up of first responders which includes medical personnel as well as law enforcement. K9 is coming to assist in the search as well. Due to the immediate cold temperatures, the search team is attempting to quickly locate Jacob, knowing he isn't properly dressed for the conditions.

TVA Visits Mississippi Silicon in Burnsville

Burnsville, Mississippi, November 7, 2017. Tennessee Valley Authority CEO Bill Johnson, TVA Board Chair Richard Howorth, and other TVA management visited Mississippi Silicon.

Mississippi Silicon has been in operation for two years. The company located its \$220 million facility in Burnsville due partly to the competitive cost of electric power from Tennessee Valley Authority.

The Burnsville plant employs 140 and produces over 30,000 tons of silicon per year.

Silicon is used in a wide variety of products such as aluminum alloys used in auto parts; silicone chemicals used in hundreds of products; and polysilicon for computer chips and solar panels. Raw materials include gravel, wood chips, and coal which are heated to 3,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

Six tons of raw materials yield one ton of silicon. 360,000 tons of silicon are used each year in the USA.

TVA CEO Bill Johnson reported that "TVA works hard to compete for industry and will continue to provide competitive electric power to Mississippi Silicon. TVA power rates are expected to remain stable for the next ten years."

Mississippi to Celebrate 200th Birthday this Weekend

ON DECEMBER 10, Mississippi will celebrate its bicentennial. It's been 200 years since the founding of our state.

This Saturday, December 9, will be the big day, coinciding with the opening of the new Museum of Mississippi History and the adjacent Mississippi Civil Rights Museum.

Plans are for President Donald Trump to attend and speak. Gov. Phil Bryant will speak, as will former governors Haley Barbour and William Winter. Former NAACP chair Myrlie Evers will also speak.

Tickets to enter the museums Saturday are sold out, but tickets are not needed to attend the opening day program at Entergy Plaza, the grassy courtyard in front of the new museums. Free parking will be available at the Mississippi State Fairgrounds, and seating will begin at 10 a.m. on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be live entertainment throughout the day by Mississippi entertainers.

The Legislature provided \$90 million for the museums. Another \$19 million was raised through private donations and endowments. The two museums share a lobby, auditorium, classrooms, collection storage, and exhibit workshop for a facility that covers a total of 200,000 square feet.

The Museum of Mississippi History covers the past 15,000 years. Eight galleries featuring interactive exhibits cover every aspect of the state's history through more than 1,600 artifacts. The eight galleries at the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum focus on the years 1945-1976.

I got a sneak preview of the museums and they are terrific - modern, easy to walk through, easy to engage. Lots of big photos, big type and artifacts. I liken it to walking through a very graphic history book with lots of photos. This will make a great tourist attraction.

In 1817, the population of Mississippi was around 50,000. It was a dense forest full of wildlife and scattered tribes of

native Americans. During Mississippi's early decades the population doubled every 10 years with farmers from the Carolinas and Georgia. They brought slaves with them.

It was tough back then. Yellow fever and malaria were rampant. Sanitation was marginal. Medicine was crude. Ten percent of women died in childbirth. Most adults lost their teeth.

The timber of the vast virgin forests was easy pickings. A huge forestry industry was born, providing wood for the great cities of New York, Chicago and other booming metropolises. Huge swaths of acreage were clear cut. Re-forestation was not practiced.

The Delta was a vast swamp of bottomland hardwoods. Valuable timber was cut and sold as a prerequisite to cotton farming. In those days, Delta rivers and streams were crystal clear. There were no agricultural run-offs. Bears and cougars abounded.

EVEN HUNDREDS of years ago, many Mississippians lived as they did in the Bible days. Subsistence farming dominated. I have known many people who grew up in such an environment. Rather than speak of the hardships, most of these people talked with great enthusiasm of the joys of growing up on a farm near a small town.

The Delta was different. Plantation cotton farming was a big deal. The world craved cotton as it craves software today. The Delta was the silicon valley of the antebellum era. Mississippi planters became an incredibly rich aristocracy until the Civil War.

That aristocracy was gone with the wind after our great war. Mississippi suffered a huge blow from which it really has never recovered. We returned to a state dominated by subsistence farming. Jim Crow laws reintroduced white domination after a brief period of black political freedom.

After WWII, Mississippi embarked on a great wave of industrialization. Mississippi was the Mexi-

co and China of the waxes. The non-uniform state boomed. Slavery and then mechanization reshaped the cotton industry.

The Civil Rights movement transformed Mississippi once and for all, throwing off the shackles of apartheid. The state was crossed and then no going back.

During the founding of our country, loyalty was to your not the nation. That's what Robert E. Lee fought the Confederacy even being offered leadership of the U.S. forces. He did not bring himself to leave his native Virginia.

Today, we are Americans, even in Mississippi, which is probably the most trading provincial state in the nation. Mississippians are more attached to state politics than to state politics.

I was born in Comb, Miss., 59 years ago. I have personally lived a quarter of our state's history. Twenty-nine years. My 32 great-great-grandparents were Mississippians. I feel an intimate connection and loyalty to this state. My ancestors were here from the beginning.

Strangely, my Mississippi roots are as deep as mine, with Jackie Knight getting a land grant from General Jackson after winning the Battle of Louisiana in 1815. My children have 10 ancestors who were in Mississippi at the time of statehood.

Being a Mississippian is a big part of my personal self conception.

Mississippi is in the middle of the fastest growing region of the world. It has everything: vast forests, land, abundant rainfall, mild climate.

As Faulkner said, the past isn't dead, it's not even past. So true in Mississippi. We love our traditions and our traditions let's not cling to the point that we embrace a most promising future.

Happy bicentennial Mississippi!

Two County Residents Arrested on Burglary Charges

On November 21st the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office arrested Steven Gray, 40, of Glen and Jammie Moore, 46, of Burnsville, for burglary of a dwelling. The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office has taken several reports over the past few weeks involving numerous home burglaries around the northern part of the county. In this incident, both Gray and Moore are accused of burglarizing a residence around the area of CR 388. When investigators searched the residence of Gray, several of the items were found that were taking from the home

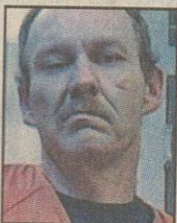
on CR 388.

Steven Gray, 40-year-old, white male, of 49 CR 944 Glen, was officially charged with the burglary of a dwelling. Gray's bond was set by the Justice Court at \$30,000. Gray is currently out on bond.

Jammie Moore, 46-year-old, white male, of 262 B CR 209 Burnsville, was officially charged with the burglary of

a dwelling as well. Moore's bond was set by the Justice Court also for \$30,000. Moore remains in custody at the Tishomingo County Jail.

Sheriff Daugherty states that this particular investigation has opened up into a larger investigation and he expects more arrests to be made in the next few weeks.

United Daughters Of the Confederacy Met at Iuka Library

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone #394 met on November 20th, 11 am at the Iuka Public Library. Those present were Vickie Durham, Eunell Handy, Sharon Hairrell.

We completed the D.C. Rituals, the pledges the Flags and singing of the "Dixie". The meeting was chaired open by President Sharon Hairrell and also read the minutes of the October meeting and the Treasurer Eunell Handy presented the treasure report. She stated that she had four members and was waiting on more and the report was approved. Registrar Eunell Handy stated that her application has been in and she was working on others.

Old business was discussed and our new business was sitting a date and for our December meeting/Christmas Soiree. We will meet December 12th at 11 am at "Lil Smokies" in Iuka. We also had a donation to McGavock Cemetery Project (Confederate), Franklin Tn. The project is to buy tombstones for those who have none and place damaged ones that broke or not readable. Sharon Hairrell presented the Program from the 2017 issue of the D.C. Magazine, "The Privation of Confederate Women and Their Families." Most Confederate women supported the war. Poor farmers' wives, who counted on their spouses to grow food and hunt for their meat, were not so eager for the war. The CSA draft was considered by farmers "a man's war and a poor man's fight. Wealthy men had substitutes to take and provide for their family. The poor farmer and family had to take over the duties of their husband, and fathers.

Many times they also had to provide for elderly family members. One wife stated: "We well-nigh beggars, I do not know where my next meal is to come from...shame, disgrace, begging...all at once. They were hard to bear. In 1863, farmer Nancy Langum wrote the governor. A group of poor women wrote to Greene as well as for something as we had not a mouthful of meat or bread in our house, what they do they put us in. Instead of giving us something to eat they sent home with nothing. I have 6 little children and my husband is in the army, at am, I do. We will take our husbands and them to come home help us. In 1865 Confederate soldiers wrote the gov-

error: It is not ourselves that we would complain, it is of our wives and little ones at home....Do something for them and there would be less desertion, and men will go into battle with heartier good will. It is impossible for us to bear up under our many troubles, the greatest is the suffering of our wives and little ones at home.

In 1863-1865 women in Columbus, driven by hunger, performed widespread looting. Patriotism is a pretty heavy load to carry sometimes. When President Davis asked citizens to fast, J.B. Jones, a War department clerk, wrote: Fasting in the midst of Famine. May God save these people". Carrying pistols, clubs, knives, bayonets and butcher knives, angry women took to the streets. "Bread and Blood" was their cry. Seventy-five women were arrested and soon pardoned because they had no food to feed them in prison.

Many women wrote of their trying times, homes were being burned, food and livestock stolen, and crops destroyed and burned. Many towns were burned. Women in the South were being arrested for anything they said, gestures made or movement toward a Union officer or private.

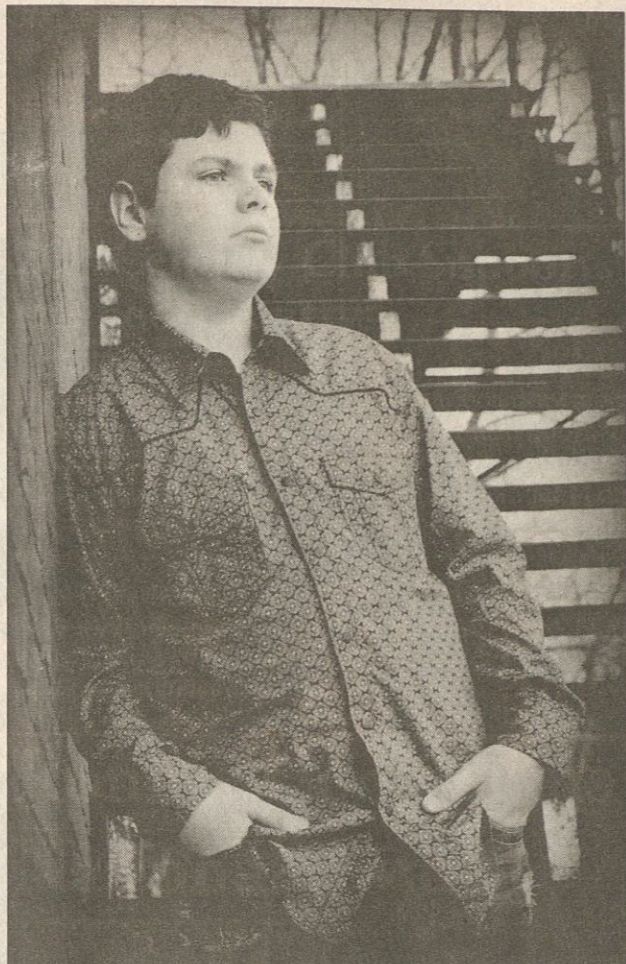
Arkansas women verbally stood up to the Yankees. U.S. General Sherman said, "Your women are the toughest I ever knew. The men would have given up long time ago, but for you". "Union soldiers prefer to fight Southern soldiers than being exposed to the wrath of the Arkansas women who experienced and survived guerrilla warfare, bushwhackers and troops of both sides.

Women in Maryland was arrested for waving Confederate flags, selling secession music, writing letters to Confederate soldiers and entertaining Confederate wounded soldiers.

Fannie Beer, a hospital nurse, was confronted by a Missouri soldier convulsed with grief, his wife was dying. She had written him about how she longed to see him once more but not to let her thoughts come between him and his duty to our country. I am calm and happy and if possible my spirit will be with you wherever you are. Dying in the next battle, he joined his wife in death.

The Southern Women supported their men and maintained their belief in God, doing what they must. Their written words and memories will endure forever.

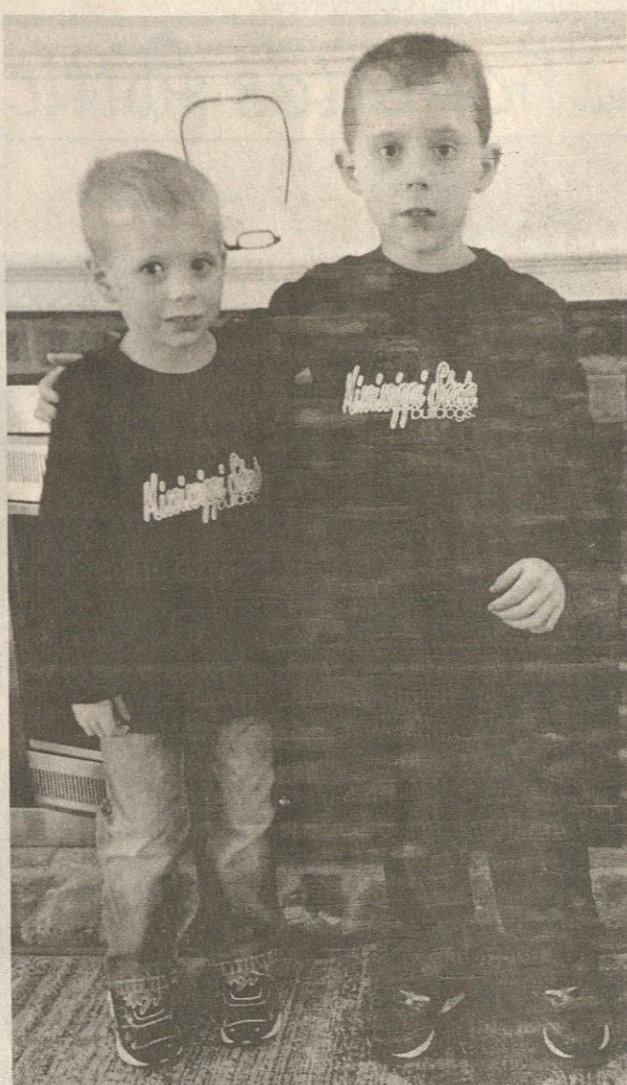

Tishomingo School Goes Beyond Goal for Food Drive

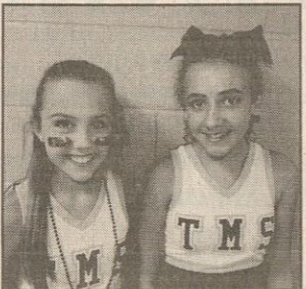
