

Traffic Stop Leads To Arrest of Two Burnsville Men

Nickey who was well respected and involved in many local endeavors died at North Mississippi Medical Center in Iuka. At press time more information was not available. Arrangements are incomplete and will be announced later by Cutshall Funeral Home in Iuka.

Nickey Cummings was a husband, father, grandfather, and community leader. He served as the Chief of Burnsville and served as a member of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. He was serving as the current President of the Board of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. He represented the second district and was elected to the position in 2002. He served on the Yellow Creek Port Board. This is a loss that will be greatly felt throughout Tishomingo County as Cummings affected so many lives through his leadership, service and friendship.

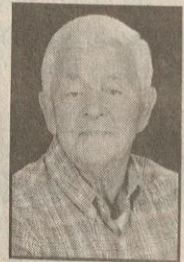

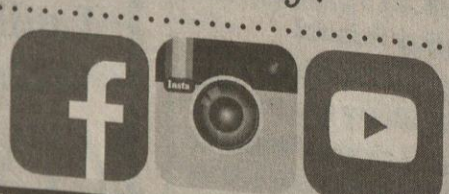

Colon Cancer Rates Higher in Tishomingo County

IUKA, Miss.—Information recently released by the National Cancer Institute indicates that colon cancer rates in Tishomingo County are higher than state and national averages.

"When we looked at this data, we quickly realized that people in Tishomingo County are diagnosed with colon cancer more frequently because they are not meeting screening recommendations," said Cindy McDaniel, BSN, RN, CGRN, who serves as a nurse navigator for colon cancer patients at North Mississippi Medical Center. "Screening is the easiest way to catch and treat early colon cancers, and we really want to make sure Tishomingo County residents are getting the screenings they need."

The incidence rate of colon cancer in Tishomingo County is 54.5 percent. Mississippi's incidence rate is 49.1 percent and nationwide is 39.8 percent. Lee County's incidence rate is 47.3 percent.

"This translates to many people in Tishomingo County who are getting colon cancer diagnoses that could have been prevented with early and regular screening," McDaniel said. "Colon cancer can be prevented through colonoscopy. Colon cancer starts as a small polyp, or growth, in the colon. A colonoscopy can remove those polyps before they become cancerous. The colon cancer

death rate in the United States could be cut in half if we all followed screening guidelines."

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States. This year, approximately 135,000 new cases of colorectal cancer will be diagnosed and 50,000 people will die from the disease, according to the American Cancer Society.

Who should be screened?

•All men and women age 50 or older.

•African-Americans age 45 and older. (African-Americans tend to be diagnosed with colon cancer at a younger age and experience decreased survival.)

Those with risk fac-

tors should talk to their doctor about beginning screening early, including those with personal or family history of:

Inflammatory bowel disease

Colorectal cancer polyps

Ovarian, endometrial or breast cancer.

The American College of Gastroenterology recommends colonoscopy as the preferred colon cancer prevention strategy.

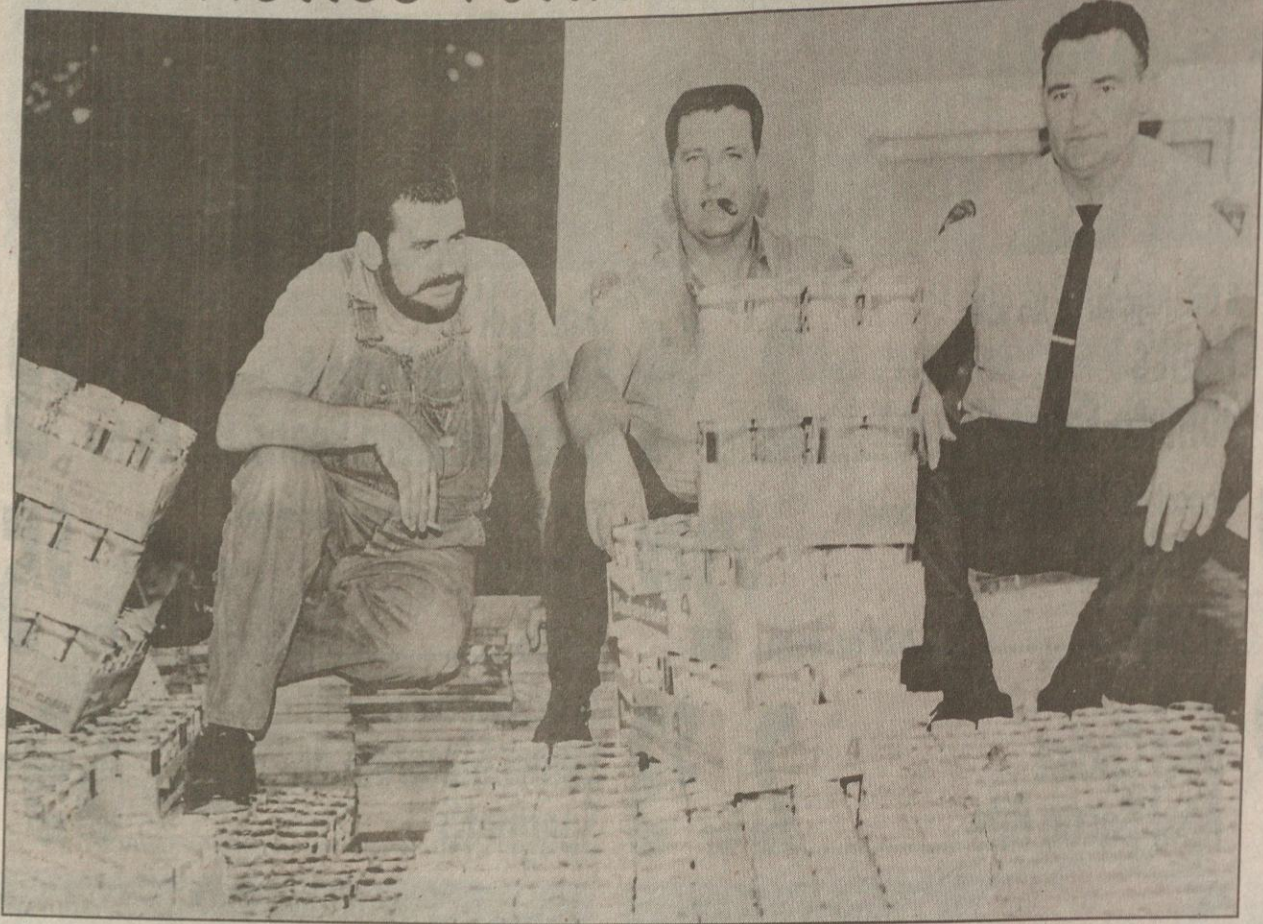

In the back end of the truck bed, to the casual observer, were stacks of lumber. A Sweet Revival Meeting

Revival meetings were usually held during the warm summer months. There were several churches in and around Dennis and Belmont, Mississippi. OUR FARM WAS ONE MILE East of Dennis. It was only three miles from

Belmont. A one week meeting was in progress at the Old Union Baptist Church. This church was several miles from our farm. We had to cross the high one lane Bear Creek Bridge and go through the Valley community to reach

the church. In our mule drawn wagon it took us almost an hour to make this trip. Some of our neighbors said, "You McNutts spend so much time going to revival meetings your crops will fail." We never lost a crop. We quit work-

ing in the field at about 3 P.M. each afternoon. This gave us enough time to eat "Supper" and get ready to load up the wagon and go to church.

One evening we had to stop our wagon near the Bear Creek Bridge. A vehicle was crossing the bridge from the opposite direction. While we were waiting we smelled something very sweet. From experience we knew that there was a honey tree nearby. We did not have time to locate the honey tree but we sure could remember the sweet smell.

The next day my brothers and I loaded the wagon with a crosscut saw and the other things needed for collecting honey. We found the large hollow tree that was loaded with sweet honey. We collected several containers of honey and also brought home a swarm of honey bees. This was indeed "A Sweet Revival Meeting."

MS Legislative Report

Week of January 1, 2018

On January 2, 2018, the 132nd Mississippi State Legislature began the third session in its four-year term.

Four new members joined the House of Representatives this past year as a result of special elections. Stacey Wilkes, R-Picayune; Missy McGee, R-Hattiesburg; Cheikh Taylor, D-Starkville and Kevin Ford, R-Vicksburg joined the roster of representatives for the 2018 Legislative Session.

Though it is early in the session, there were a couple of bills passed through committees and introduced on the House floor. All of the bills discussed dealt with the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, a topic which will likely be heavily discussed this session.

One measure introduced was House Bill 354, which aims to set aside any state revenue growth of more than two percent for the repair and reconstruction of state, county and municipal roads and bridges. This measure passed by a vote of 118-2. Another was House Bill 357, legislation that would authorize the issuance of \$50 million in bonds to cities and counties for bridge improvements. This passed by a vote of 116-4. Finally, House Bill 359 would prohibit the con-

struction of any new road that have not already required right-of-way. Supporters of the bill say it will help the state maintain the roads it already has before starting new projects. Those opposed say this could slow economic development. The bill passed by a vote of 71-42. All three were held on a motion to reconsider, which means they will be brought again in the future.

Gaming Chairman: Casey Eure (District 18, Saucier)

Interstate Cooperation Chairman: Tracy Arnold (District 3, Booneville)

Ports Harbors and Airports Chairman: Jeff Guice (District 11, Ocean Springs)

State Libraries: Gary Haney (District 118, Gulfport)

One measure introduced was House Bill 354, which aims to set aside any state revenue growth of more than two percent for the repair and reconstruction of state, county and municipal roads and bridges. This measure passed by a vote of 118-2. Another was House Bill 357, legislation that would authorize the issuance of \$50 million in bonds to cities and counties for bridge improvements. This passed by a vote of 116-4.

Finally, House Bill 359 would prohibit the con-

struction of any new road that have not already required right-of-way. Supporters of the bill say it will help the state maintain the roads it already has before starting new projects. Those opposed say this could hinder economic development. The bill passed by a vote of 71-42. All three bills were held on a motion to reconsider, which means they will be brought up again in the future.
