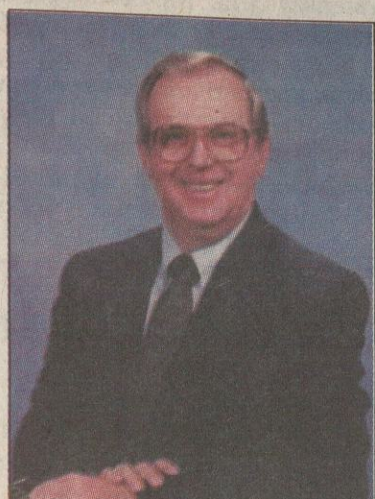
Services Held for Retired County Official Gerald C. Parsons

He is survived by his wife, Earlene Ruby Cain Parsons of Iuka; his sister, Velma Montgomery of Iuka; and his four children: Sharon Shea and husband Mikey of Iuka, Glenda Newcomb and husband Chester of Iuka, Melissa Henderson and husband Eddie of Burnsville, and Danny Parsons and wife Dora of Iuka. He is also survived by 11 grandchildren: Stephanie DeVaney and husband Carl, Heather Lamb, Brook Wallace and husband Wyatt, Kimberly Briggs and husband Jordan, Sara Shea, Preston Henderson and wife Jessica, Brooke Cannon, Tanner Parsons, Emilee Henderson, Briar Arnold and wife Sky, and Covy Parsons, as well as 10 great-grandchildren.

A Crash Course in Workforce Skills is Helping Drive Job Growth in Tishomingo County.

In the northeastern-most part of Mississippi, rural Tishomingo County is proving to be at the corner of opportunity and industry.

In October, Orbital ATK announced it will invest nearly \$10.5 million in an expansion of its 320,000-sq.-ft. (29,728-sq.-m.) Iuka facility. The aerospace and defense company will manufacture large composite aerospace structures for launch vehicles and a large national aerospace and defense program. The expansion will create an additional 50 jobs.

"Our decision to place this additional work in Mississippi emphasizes Orbital ATK's commitment to not only our employees and customers, but reaffirms our commitment to the State of Mississippi," said Steve Earl, vice president and general manager of Orbital ATK's Aerospace Structures Division. "We're proud to be able to provide state-of-the-art manufacturing capability in a state with a

dedicated and skilled workforce."

The news follows a \$5-million investment in Ohio the company announced in September, and the June completion of another major expansion in Gilbert, Arizona. The company operates 62 sites nationwide.

In 2016, BMSI Inc., invested \$6 million in a new manufacturing facility in Burnsville where it created 100 jobs. The company located in an existing 20,000-sq.-ft. (1,858-sq.-m.) space at Yellow Creek Port South and plans to expand it by another 10,000 sq. ft. (930 sq. m.). The facility will manufacture specialty products for the U.S. Department of Defense, as well as produce commercial restaurant equipment.

"The State of Mississippi, as well as the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and Yellow Port, have made this

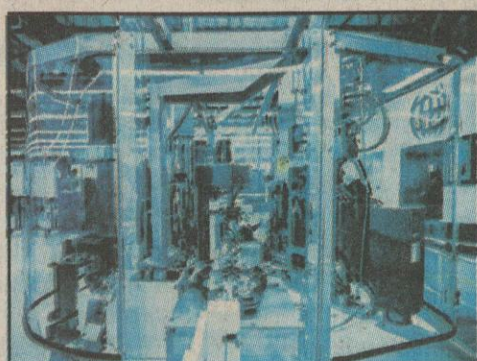

the obvious choice of locations to build a new facility. We look forward to being a part of the growth and success of the Tishomingo County area," BMSI President Robby Stephens said at the time of the company's announcement.

In 2015, Mississippi Silicon built the first silicon metal production facility in the nation

in the last 40 years. The \$200-million, 174,000-sq.-ft. (16,165-sq.-m.) facility in Burnsville, Mississippi, is a joint venture between the Rima Group and CleanTech LLC. According to Mississippi Silicon, the Tishomingo County site was chosen for its proximity to the Gulf of Mexico and "ideal strategic location for taking advantage of the expanding customer base, regional supply chain and stable, competitively priced electricity."

Listen and Learn

With such consistent development in the area, having a qualified workforce becomes all the more critical.

Northeast Mississippi Community College (NEMCC) has begun offering free, specialized job training at a manufacturing academy in Tishomingo County at its Iuka campus. The academy is the result of a partnership among NEMCC, Mississippi Silicon, Rural Development Partners,

Appalachian Regional Commission and the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Greg James, NEMCC Workforce Development manager, says the idea for the academy started about three years ago when industries shared their workforce wish list with the college.

In February the school issued a survey across 200 local businesses.

Employers wanted applicants to have more training in 23 skill areas, including specific manufacturing-related skills and general soft skills.

The free academy is broken down into two parts. One is a 45-hour Smart Start course on necessary skills such as applied math, graphic literacy and soft skills. The other is a 50-hour course teaching key manufacturing skills, including precision measurement, high-performance manufacturing and others.

"Our goal is to empower people to be able to get a job anywhere, not

just in manufacturing," said Remington Wilson, NEMCC Workforce instructor. "The skills you learn in this course are applicable to every job. Some of the topics we cover include health and safety procedures on the job, CPR, efficiency methods, precision measuring and interview skills, among others. Graduates of the program earn up to five certifications that employers look for when considering new hires."

Pet of the Week

Congratulations to Moe Kingen! This handsome young kitty is our Pet Of The Week at Iuka Animal Clinic. His owners are Bill and Lou Kingen. This is what they have to say about him. Moe is a 6 month old tuxedo cat. He is at the age where he loves going outside to explore a world filled with surprises and adventure. He has experienced all sorts of things, from the pain of a bee sting to the challenge of climbing trees. Every day brings a new adventure for him. Moe also loves to cat nap in his favorite spots around our home. He is a real joy to our lives and we adore him.

Spring is not far away but fleas and ticks are already out there causing infestations in pets. Fleas and ticks are external parasites that can cause extreme discomfort and serious illness in pets and even people. These parasites

are easily prevented from bothering your pet through the use of safe, easy to administer, effective products. Parasite prevention also may require treating your home and yard and keeping pets out of areas where fleas and/or ticks are likely to lurk. It is very important to check your pet often for these harmful parasites. Larger tick species can typically be seen or felt in the hair coat, especially once they are engorged after feeding. Deer ticks, on the other hand, are very tiny—about the size of the head of a pin in some stages—and can be harder to see. Repetitive scratching is a telltale sign that your pet



may have fleas. Adult fleas can be identified on the pet, but fleas in other stages of their life cycle (eggs, larvae, and pupae) can be harder to find. Adult fleas are tiny and can be hard to see, but flea combs can be used to remove fleas as well as flea dirt. Flea dirt is essentially flea feces, which is digested blood. To check your pet for fleas, run a flea comb through your pet's fur and dump any hair and debris onto a white paper towel. Dampen it slightly with water. Any small, dark specks that stain the towel red are a clear indication your pet has fleas. Finally, excessive grooming is also a sign of a potential flea problem. Infested cats will groom themselves repeatedly in an effort to remove fleas. Check with our veterinarian office for information on flea and tick prevention we offer for cats and dogs. 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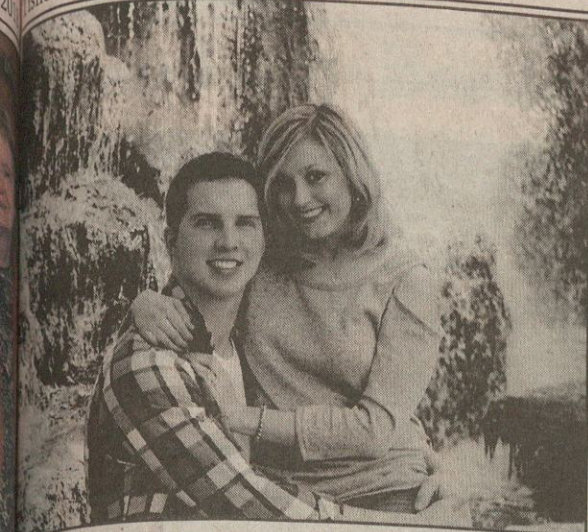

PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE FOR INITIAL HEARING

The Town of Burnsville is considering applying to the Mississippi Development Authority for a Small Cities Community Development Block Grant of up to \$600,000 for a Public Facility/Water Improvements project. The State of Mississippi has been allocated approximately \$22.8 million that will be made available to cities, towns, and counties on a competitive basis to undertake eligible community development activities. These funds must be used to benefit low- and moderate-income persons.

The activities for which these funds may be used are in the areas of public facilities and economic development. More specific details regarding eligible activities, program requirements, and the rating system will be provided at a public hearing which will be held at the Burnsville Town Hall at 38 Gross Avenue, Burnsville, Mississippi on March 16, 2018 at 11:30 A.M. The purpose of this hearing will be to obtain citizen input into the development of the application. The location for this hearing is accessible to persons with disabilities. Iuka 20th Century Club Wins \$10,000 in 1950

In 1950 the Twentieth Century Club of 19 members in Iuka won \$10,000 in the Build A Better Community contest sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs aka the Kroger Company today. Announcement of the winners was made as a climax to the program at the Federation's National Convention held in Boston. Seven ladies from the Iuka Club went to Boston for the convention but the actual check presentation was made on "Iuka Day" July 6, 1950 in Mineral Spring Park. Joseph B. Hall, Kroger president made the award presentation both in Boston and Iuka.

The ladies won the award for cleaning up their town,

which included the cleaning up of a garbage dump behind the main stores on Front Street, clearing away of refuse heaps within sight of two of the town's churches, mosquito and fly

control, recreation for the youth, school improvements, a tidy city park, and a dial telephone system. They beautified the highway approaching Iuka by planting dogwood trees as a memorial to World War

II heroes from Tishomingo County. Many projects were completed by the club.

This mission to clean up our town took the ladies over a year and needless to say it was a big event for the small commu-

nity. Occasionally we run across photos that were taken and used by the press at that time of celebration. These two photos show the ladies who worked so hard to win this \$10,000 which was used to build the

Youth Community Center in Mineral Springs Park.

Thanks to Robert Grisham for bringing in the formal photo of the ladies in Boston. It belongs to the mineral coffee club and kept in a scrap book.

Asian Lady Beetle



In the summer these omnivorous Asian Lady Beetles are viewed as beneficial insects because they eat large numbers of aphids, but around Halloween the adult beetles start looking for a place to spend the winter and often invade homes by the thousands.

The warm weather of the past few days has caused overwintering Asian lady beetles to become active and begin emerging inside buildings. These lady beetles entered the building last fall, spent the winter in wall and attic voids, and are now attempting to go back outside. Unfortunately, many get lost and wind up making their way to the inside of the building, where they become a nuisance.

At this point, vacuuming or sweeping them up is about the best option available.

Insecticides are not especially helpful for this problem because it is really not safe or practical to apply insecticides throughout the living area where the lady beetles are occurring.

Additionally, any steps that can be taken to make the interior walls of the building more bug-tight can be very helpful in reducing numbers of lady beetles and other insects. The goal here is to seal cracks, crevices, and other entry points that allow insects to make their way into the living area from attic spaces and wall voids. This can be done at any time of the year.

Sealing the exterior of the building to prevent lady beetles and other insects from getting into the building in the fall is the most effective preventive treatment, but this should not be done just yet. Wait until all the lady beetles have left for the spring, and then get the building sealed before they begin coming back next fall—which usually happens around Halloween.

Legislative Report

Week of February 19, 2018

Friday, Feb. 23, marked the deadline for House appropriations and revenue bills to be introduced and passed. The House Appropriations Committee finished considering bills regarding budgets for state entities last week, but the Ways and Means Committee still needed to approve a few bills to meet the deadline.

Assistance to the Rankin-Hinds Pearl River Flood and Drainage Control District would be provided with the passage of House Bill 1631, which allocates bond money for a flood control project in that area.

House Bill 1651 would make way for more bond money to be provided for the improvement and revitalization of Mississippi's railroads. The bill also designates money for a grant that would be awarded to the North Mississippi Regional Railroad Authority.

Legislation proposing how much bond money would be given to state colleges, community colleges and state parks — among other things — was passed in the form of House Bill 1649.

Each of these bond bills passed when presented on the House floor. The Senate has been busy working on similar legislation, and now the two groups will come together to begin deciding how much money will be put into each bill. This process typically lasts until the end of session when a final decision is reached.

Committees began to meet again this week, this time to discuss Senate bills. Over the next couple of weeks, Senate bills will make their way out of House committees and onto the House floor for discussion, while the Senate reviews bills that passed through the House.

One bill that has already made its way to the House floor from the Senate side is Senate Bill 2895, which would authorize the University of Mississippi Medical Center to remove and reinter remains found in the center's field property where the school was planning to expand.

The House also approved Senate Bill 2043, which would remove the prohibition that county veteran service officers may not hold additional elected or appointed positions, and Senate Bill 2644, which would allow an executive or deputy director of the State Veterans Affairs Board to be an active member of the Armed Forces.

On Friday, Fletcher Cox, Mississippi native and defensive tackle for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles, visited the House chamber to be honored with House Concurrent Resolution 69 for becoming a Super Bowl Champion.

Students who are members of Future Farmers of America came from all over the state to visit the Capitol this week. Legislators also received visitors from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, Girl Scouts, the Mississippi Academy of Physician Assistants and the Highway Patrol Cadet Class of 2018.

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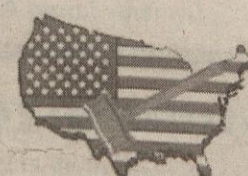
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When It Is Time To Say "Hallelujah"

I have been in many church meetings where people shouted "hallelujah", and I too have shouted that word, but the interesting fact is that this form of the word (hallelujah) never appears in all of the Bible. That, of course, could be misleading, for the word "alleluia" appears in Revelation chapter 19. This word is the Greek form of the word "hallelujah", but even at that, alleluia appears only four times in the Bible, and those four times are in Revelation 19:1,3,4 & 6. This does not mean the word is not important, for the word "alleluia" (or hallelujah) means: "praise ye JAH", or "praise ye JEHOVAH", for JAH is a shortened

form of the word JEHOVAH. Now we will see something about the time that the church will all be saying "Hallelujah", or "Alleluia". Revelation 19:1-2 says, "And after these things I heard a great voice of much people in heaven, saying, Alleluia; Salvation, and glory, and honour, and power, unto the Lord our God: For true and righteous are His judgments: for He hath judged the great whore, which did corrupt the earth with

her fornication, and hath avenged the blood of His servants at her hand."

Revelation 17:1, 15 & 16 call the "Mystery Babylon" the "great whore" and "the whore" three times. This indicates that the one-world church is a harlot church, but the word fornication is used of the actions of the one-world government in Revelation 18:3 and 18:9. Moreover, Revelation 18:23-24 show that the city Babylon has deceived all nations by her

sorceries (witchcraft) and that the blood of prophets and saints has been shed in her. America's Pastor Dies at 99

The world's best-known evangelist, the Rev. Billy Graham, died Wednesday, February 21. He was 99.

From the gangly 16-year-old baseball-loving teen who found Christ at a tent revival, Graham went on to become an international media darling, a preacher to a dozen presidents and the voice of solace in times of national heartbreak. He was America's pastor.

Graham died at his mountain home in Montreat, N.C., where he retired in 2005 after nearly six decades on the road calling people to Christ at 417 all-out preaching and musical events from Miami to Moscow. His final New York City crusade in 2005 was sponsored by 1,400 regional churches from 82 denominations. In recent years, he was

plagued by various ailments, including cancer and pneumonia.

He took his Bible to the ends of the Earth in preaching tours he called "crusades." Presidents called on Graham in their dark hours, and uncounted millions say he showed them the light.

William Franklin Graham was born Nov. 7, 1918, on a farm near Charlotte. As a boy, he helped out on the farm and took odd jobs to make spending money. He played first base on his high school baseball team and dreamed of becoming a major-league baseball player.

Raised as a Presbyterian, he was an unenthusiastic Christian until he was 17, when he experienced a religious conversion at a revival in Charlotte.

"No bells went off in-

side me," he wrote in his autobiography. "No signs flashed across the tabernacle ceiling. No physical palpitations made me tremble. . . I simply felt at peace."



After graduation from high school, he sold Fuller brushes door to door, testing the persuasive skills that would serve him so well later in life, then attended Florida Bible Institute in St. Petersburg.

While there, he honed his pulpit techniques by rehearsing his sermons in a swamp before a congregation of bullfrogs. He was ordained as a Southern Baptist clergyman in 1938, then attended Wheaton College in Illinois, an evangelical institution, where he received a degree in anthropology.

At Wheaton, Graham met Ruth Bell, a fellow student and the daughter of Presbyterian missionaries in China. They were married from 1943 until her death in 2007.

Survivors include his son Franklin Graham, who took over his father's ministry in 2000; four other children, Gigi Tchividjian, Anne Graham Lotz, Ruth Graham and Ned Graham, all of whom went into some form of ministry; a sister; 19 grandchildren; and numerous great-grandchildren.

Billy Graham - Shaking His Hand

I never had the opportunity to shake hands with Billy Graham.

A few years back my wife and I were in the Asheville, North Carolina area and had a couple of free hours. We decided to drive to Montreat to see the area where Billy Graham lived. We roamed around the quaint little community for awhile. I asked numerous people "Where does Billy Graham live?" I was amazed at how many people either did not know or were just keeping the community secret from outsiders like us.

We had good friends in Asheville who had told about us about a road leading up a North Carolina mountain and that on the way we would pass George Beverly Shea's house. Shea sang right before Billy Graham preached for many, many years.

I finally found the post office in Montreat and went in and found someone to talk to about my search. He gave me the information I needed. He told me where to go to find the very quiet road that went a long winding way up a steep mountain. We found it and on the way up we saw a house that looked like the one my friend had described as George Beverly Shea's house. I pulled over and my wife said, "Where are you going?" I told her, "I'm going to knock on George Beverly Shea's door. I would give anything to shake hands with him."

I had heard that Franklin Graham had bought Shea a new Chevrolet Sub-

urban. I had also heard that the 95 year old Shea was pulled over for speeding in that new Suburban. I was told the police officer refused to give Shea a ticket saying, "My mother would never forgive me if I gave a speeding ticket to George Beverly Shea." Low and behold there was a shiny looking new Suburban sitting out behind the house. Only a dummy like me would knock on a famous person's door in hopes that he would actually come to the door. No one came to the door and I suspect that Shea and his wife didn't make a practice of opening their door to strangers. I don't know what I would have said, I probably would have stuttered and said, "Hello, I'm Glenn Mollette. I love hearing you sing," duh.

I gave up knocking on Shea's door and we proceeded up the winding mountain road. It was a very long way and I was about to give up when suddenly we came to a gate and I knew we were at the entrance to Graham's mountain home. A friend who actually visited in Graham's home said, "Yes, there is a gate but once you drive past that gate you come to a real gate and fence." We didn't drive through that gate but parked the car and walked around a bit. There was nothing to see but beautiful mountain trees and scenery. We were about ready to leave and I said to my wife, "I want to pause a moment and touch this gate for just a bit." The longer I stood there touching that gate, the more tears filled my

eyes. My thoughts were, "Oh God if I could just be one percent of the person that Billy Graham is then I would be hundred times more and better than I am today." I have to say it was a profound moment of my life. Finally I backed away from the gate, got in the car and we drove quietly down the mountain road.

What was it about Billy Graham? He was one single person who impacted the planet by everything that he said and did. Many years ago, there was another great preacher by the name of Dwight L. Moody. Moody was said to have shaken two continents for Jesus Christ. Moody is often remembered for saying, "The world has yet to see what God can do with a man fully consecrated to Him. By God's help, I aim to be that man. By God's grace I will be that man," he said. I believe history will attest that Moody became that man. Graham in every way, and even more, became that man Moody aspired to be as well. The Bible tells a story of a woman who had been sick for many years. She had heard that Jesus would be passing by. She did everything to get close to Jesus because she just wanted to touch him. When she did, she was healed and Jesus knew that power had gone out of him to heal the woman. Jesus said, "Your faith has made you well."

Millions of people have had life changing experiences because of Billy Graham. Yet, Graham would be the first to declare that he was simply the messenger. He had a message of pointing people to Jesus Christ. In essence what made Graham so attractive was that he pointed people to the one

far greater than he. He preached a simple Bible message of God's love and about an old rugged cross where Jesus died for the sins of the world. He preached about a wonderful place called heaven. Because of Graham's simple message and beautiful Christ-filled life he became America's pastor who many of us grew up loving to hear.

I heard Graham preach several times in Cincinnati, Louisville and Atlanta. My oldest son and I heard him right after he had a fainting spell in Toronto. Word about his failing health was spreading. Graham came on to Atlanta to preach where about 8,000 of us were gathered in the Georgia Dome. He was 80 years old when he marched into that stadium and strongly stood on that platform and powerfully brought his inspiring message. What a day, what a day that was.

What a day it will be when Jesus we shall see. What a day it will also be whenever I get to meet Billy Graham. If anybody is in heaven it surely is Billy Graham. By God's grace and mercy, when I get to heaven I'm going to try again to find him and shake his hand. Of course I will try to find his famous singer George Beverly Shea and also shake hands with him.

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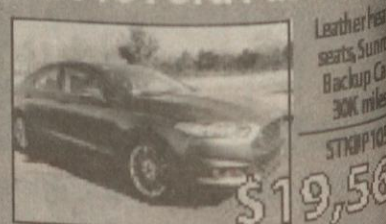

New Anti-Diarrhea Drug Trend a New Threat

A new trend has caught on across America. The over the counter drug Imodium AD has been being abused to create an opiate-like high. In some cases, heroin addicts have attempted to use the drugs to get through opiate withdrawals. In others, it is people looking for a legal high.

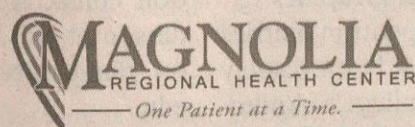

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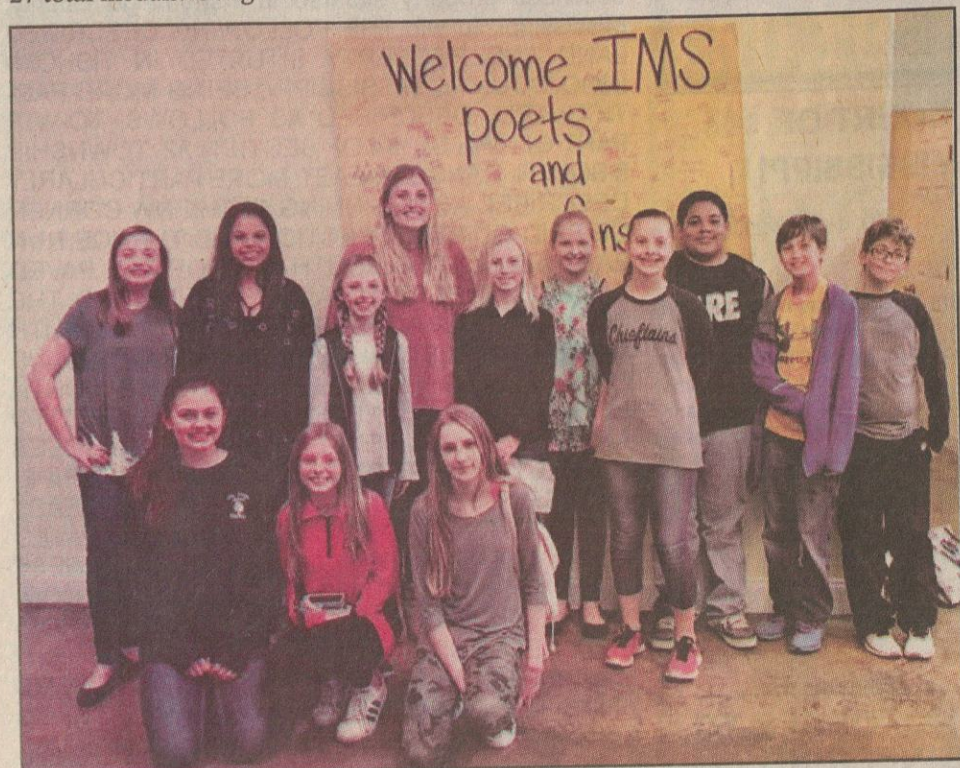
