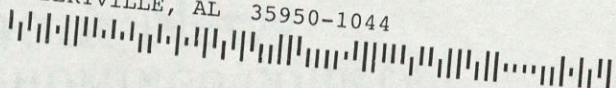

Annual Renaissance Days at the Old Courthouse Museum in Iuka is Adding a Second Day to the Fun

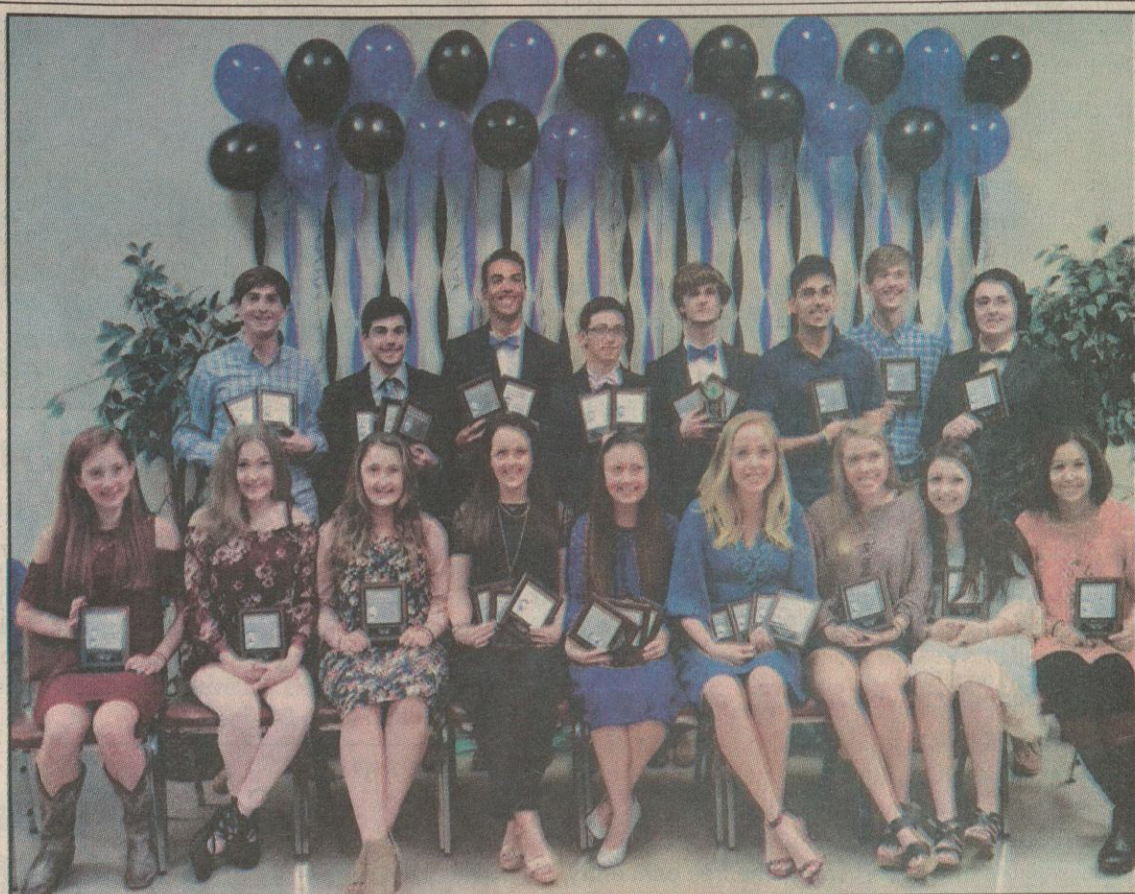

TCHS Soccer Banquet

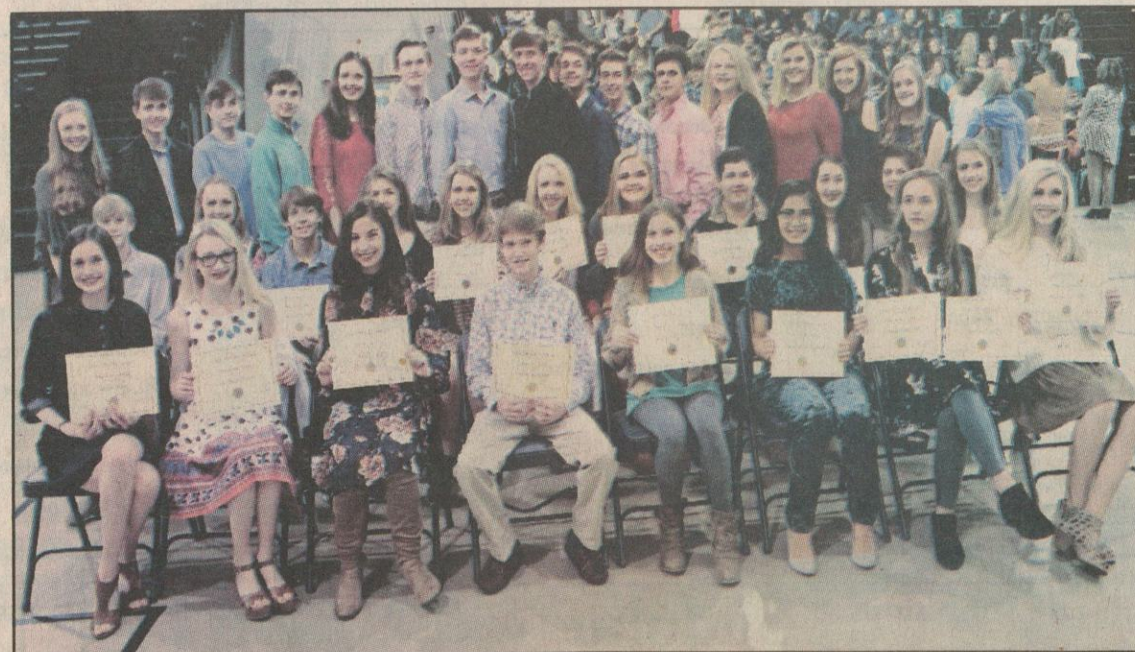

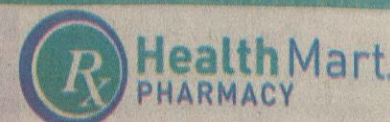

Pet of the Week

Congratulations to Happy Harris! This adorable little fellow is our Pet Of The Week at Iuka Animal Clinic. His owners are Freddy & Carolyn Harris. This is what they have to say about him- Happy is a 13 year old Pomeranian. His owners raised him from a very young puppy. He loves to go riding and his owners take him almost everywhere. When the wheels roll, Happy is on the go. He lives the good life sleeping in "his" king sized bed with his head on the pillow. Happy loves getting his special treats and cuddling. He is loved very much and is a big part of our family.



Spring is just around the corner and nicer weather makes us all, even our pets, want to be more active. Older pets can have issues with activity if they have arthritis. The most common arthritis in dogs and cats is osteoarthritis (OA), named because the problem is caused by the bones (osteo). With pet osteoarthritis, bones are damaged because cartilage has deteriorated. Cartilage is there to act as a cushion preventing bone from hitting bone as the joint moves. If the cartilage dries, roughens, or chips, bare bones are exposed. The exposed bone flattens and loses resilience so the joint no longer moves smoothly; it jerks and creaks. In response, the body sends white blood cells to the joint, but instead of repairing dam-

age, the white blood release enzymes and radicals that make things worse. The synovial fluid bathing the joint loses viscosity because it is damaged by the white blood cells' enzymes. As the synovial fluid thins, it's no longer able to resist compression or provide lubrication. Eventually, the capsule that surrounds the joint inflames. The pet then has painful arthritis.

Fortunately there are different medications that can give significant relief to your pet. If you have noticed your pet becoming less active, call our office for an appointment. Dr. Perkins help keep your pet more comfortable.

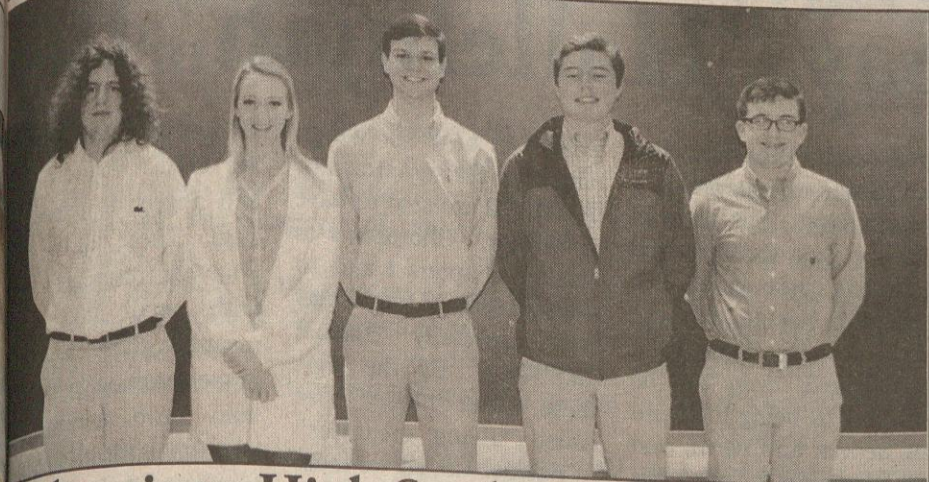

When It Is Time To Say "Hallelujah" II

I love the word "alleluia" (Greek form of hallelujah), for it shows that there is a time coming when the saints of God will not have to take a "back seat" to the world, as it has portrayed the final stage of its wicked government and religion. Revelation 19:3-6 says, "And again they said, Alleluia, and her smoke rose up for ever and ever. And the four and twenty elders and the four beasts fell down and worshipped God that sat on the throne, saying, Amen; Alleluia. And a voice came out of the throne, saying, Praise our God, all ye His servants, and ye that fear Him, both small and great. And I heard as it were the voice of a great multitude, and as

the voice of many waters, and as the voice of mighty thunders, saying, Alleluia: for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth." Three of the four "alleluias" in the entire Bible are in this passage, with the other one being in verse one of this chapter. The words "praise the Lord" are found in many places in the Bible and mean basically the same thing as the word "alleluia", but only in Revelation 19:1-6 does the word "alleluia" appear

("hallelujah" is the English form of this word).

The second "alleluia" is shouted by heaven's host, because the redeemed, along with angels, want to give a second praise to the Lord for judging the great whore, namely false religion and wicked government. It will be amazing when the saved are all with the Lord and He has poured out His judgment on the two major wicked systems of the world. No, we will not

rejoice that those involved in these two systems were never saved, but we will rejoice that their wicked rule has come to an end. We will rejoice that the Lord God has finally been recognized, even by the wicked, as being the Lord of heaven and earth, and that lordship includes His judgment for all sins that have not been forgiven. In this heavenly crowd, we see the twenty-four elders, whom I believe represent the saved of all ages (the 12 tribes of Israel and the 12 apostles of the Lamb being symbolically represented by the twenty-four elders). The four "beasts" are actually four angels called seraphims in Isaiah 6:2, for Revelation 4:8 shows the

beasts to have six wings, and only the seraphims of Isaiah 6:2 are said to have six wings. Cherubims in Ezekiel chapters 1 and 10 are said to have four wings (see especially Ezekiel 10:20-22). By the way, these "four beasts" are called "living creatures" in Ezekiel 1:5, so we must not assume that they are "beasts" as we use that word for animals. Notice that both the twenty-four elders and the four beasts fall down and worship God on His throne. They all say "amen", and they all say alleluia, for both men and angels worship the one true God for Who He is, and for what He has done!

Then a voice comes from the throne (Rev.

19:5) calling on all who are God's servants, men and angels, to praise God. These are the ones who fear (reverence) Him, both small and great, meaning those who have higher positions and those who have lower positions on earth, and also in heaven. 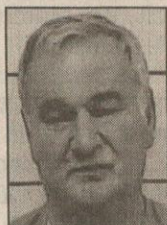

Multiple Felony Arrests Made in Tishomingo County

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office has been out in force recently to bring in more individuals who have committed crimes. These are some of the most recent arrests.

On March 1, 2018, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office, along with the Belmont Police Department acted on a tip about some narcotic activity going on at 8 Monroe Street in Tishomingo. Deputies went to the residence and were given permission to search the residence by the homeowner. During the search, a large amount of alleged methamphetamine was located throughout the residence. David Nunley, 65-year-old, white male of 8 Monroe Street Tishomingo, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of 2 or more precursors w/intent to manufacture methamphetamine, and the felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine. Nunley was also charged by Belmont Police Department with receiving stolen property. Nunley's bond was set at \$10,000 by the Justice Court.

Sandra Grubbs, 57-year-old, white female of 8 Monroe Street Tishomingo, Mississippi was also officially charged

with the felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine, the felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine w/intent to sell, and felony tampering of evidence. Grubbs' bond was set at \$15,000 by the Justice Court.

Sheriff Daugherty would like to thank the Belmont Police Department for assisting the sheriff's office in these arrests.

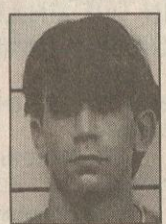

During the stop, the driver stated to the deputy that he had no driver's license, to which he was immediately placed under arrest. A passenger was asked about the prescription pills but did not claim ownership. Tishomingo County deputies arrested both the driver and passenger and transported them to the Tishomingo County Jail. 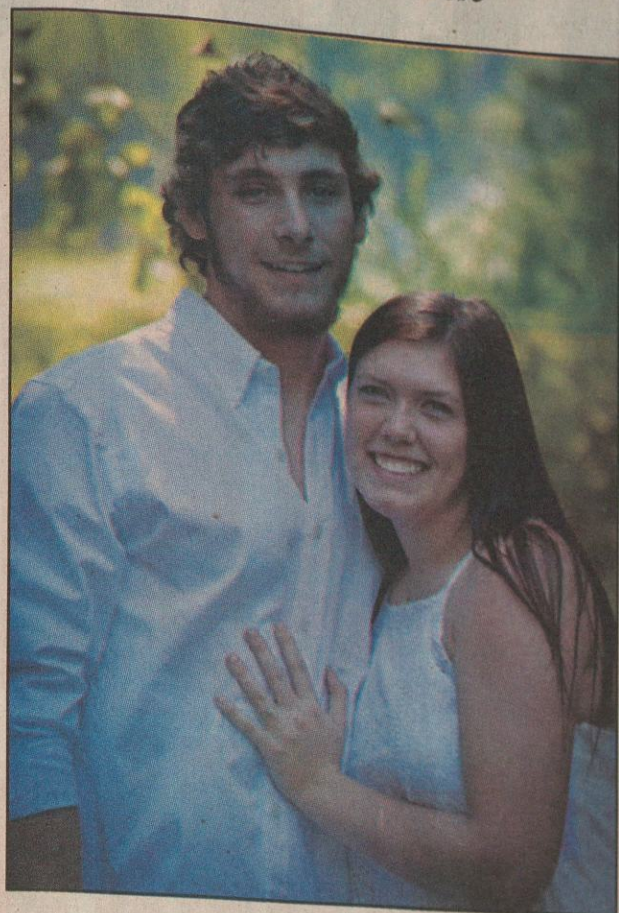

Dr. Virgil Belue Receives Inaugural Education Heroes Award in Jackson

Former Clinton, MS Public School District Superintendent honored during Governor's Awards Luncheon at Jackson

Mississippi Association of Partners in Education presented the first Education Heroes Award to Dr. Virgil Belue during the 16th annual Governor's Awards Luncheon on Tuesday, Feb. 27 at Jackson Hilton.

The luncheon was part of activities planned for the Mississippi Education Partnership Conference, which MAPE presented in partnership with Program for Research and Evaluation for Public Schools (PREPS), Inc.

"Dr. Belue devoted most of his life to improving and promoting public education in Mississippi," said Maggie Stevenson, MAPE president. Throughout his career, he also recognized the importance of working with communities to strengthen public education, which is integral to MAPE's mission. We are honored to present the first Education Heroes Award to Dr. Belue, whose career in public education remains an inspiring example of leadership, courage and commitment."

Dr. Belue served as the first superintendent of the Clinton Public School District from 1970 to 1992. Under his leadership, the district grew from two schools to seven schools and a vocational center while emerging as one of Mississippi's top school districts. In 2016 and 2017, Clinton schools and Dr. Belue made national headlines when the "Huffington Post" and "The Atlantic" published articles about the innovative approaches he took to create a community school system ("How the Mississippi School District Made Integration Work" and "Restoring the Promise of Public Education").

While serving as superintendent, Dr. Belue was an active member of several professional organizations and served as president of the Mississippi Association of School Superintendents. In 2013, Dr. Belue was honored by the Mississippi Legislature for his years of public service and his retirement from the Board of Trustees of the Public Employees' Retirement System of Mississippi, for which he served as trustee for 18 years.

Before his work in education, he served in the Air Force, taught elementary school in Tishomingo County School District, taught English and social studies in the Pontotoc County School District, and taught social studies in the Tupelo Public School District, where he also worked as a counselor and director of instruction. In addition, Dr. Belue taught undergraduate and graduate classes for Mississippi State University and Mississippi College.

In 1986 Dr. Belue received the "Outstanding Citizen" award from the Clinton Chamber of Commerce for his leadership of the school system and his service to local and state professional organi-

zations.

Dr. Belue currently serves in several organizations, including the Mississippi Retired Personnel Employees' Association, Retired Education Personnel of Mississippi, Clinton Association of Retired Educators and Clinton Chamber of Commerce. He is an active member of First Baptist Church in Clinton, where he has served as deacon.

A 1950 graduate of Holcut High School in Tishomingo County, Dr. Belue earned an associate of arts degree from Northeast Mississippi Junior College and bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees in education from Mississippi State University. He also did graduate work in guidance and counseling at the University of Mississippi and Mississippi College.

How one Mississippi School District made Integration Work

Excerpt taken from The Hechinger Report by Jackie Mader

In the summer of 1970, when Virgil Belue arrived at the new Clinton Separate School District to be its first superintendent, there were only four weeks left until the start of the school year. He had no central office, no budget, and no bank account. The district's first school board meeting on August 3, 1970, had 19 agenda items, including determining the district's sick leave policy and finding furniture for the elementary school.

The new district's name was telling: It had split that year from the larger — and mostly black — Hinds County School District in the wake of a lawsuit that had forced the larger district to desegregate. At the time, the Supreme Court was in the process of deciding a series of cases that opened the door to forced busing as communities resisted integration.

Belue said Clinton residents wanted more control over local schools, and the borders of the new district were created along an attendance zone outlined in Hinds County's federally approved desegregation plan.

But Clinton Separate School District mostly served a majority-white section of town. In the wake of Clinton's seces-

sion, the proportion of students in the Hinds County district that were white declined from 45 percent to 32 percent. The percentage of black students rose from 55 percent to 68 percent.

Aware of the threat of lawsuits, and inspired by the one-room schoolhouse he attended as a child growing up in rural Mississippi, Belue decided to abandon traditional neighborhood schools and create a community school system, in which all children in each grade in the district would attend the same school and move through the district's schools together.

Over the next two years, Belue quietly met with local community groups and talked to leaders individually to sell his idea. By the end of his second year as superintendent, the school board had approved his plan, and the district began to distribute various grade levels through the district's four schools.

When Clinton launched in 1970, 85 percent of its students were white and only 15 percent were black, a fact that likely smoothed Belue's path. In larger school districts with higher percentages of black students, such as Little Rock and Charlotte, integration efforts faced massive, often violent, resistance.

Still, tensions occasionally erupted between white and black students. For the first few years, white students refused to elect black students to the homecoming court and to leadership positions, for example. So Belue started a new policy during the 1972-73 school year: students would have to elect one white student and one black student at large to student government, as well as to the homecoming court.

One night after this policy was announced, Belue's house was egged. A sign made out of butcher paper was left in his yard. In big letters, students had printed, "Dr. Belue, one white at large, one black at large, we egg thee at large."

"I never mentioned it," Belue said with a laugh. "I never called the police and never complained to anybody about it. I just went right on."

Belue's plan wasn't enough to insulate the

district from the legal fights rolling the rest of the country. In 1977, the federal government sued Clinton to force it to rejoin the Hinds County district, arguing that its secession had impeded broader integration efforts.

As part of a consent decree, instead of rejoining Hinds, Clinton absorbed a mostly African-American neighborhood, which increased its black student population dramatically. The school buildings in the newly added neighborhood became the district's sixth-grade and ninth-grade schools. (Clinton, like 59 other districts in Mississippi, is still under a federal desegregation order.)

Clinton didn't experience the catastrophic white and middle-class flight that sent other newly integrated districts spiraling downward academically, however. Instead, it thrived as its percentage of black students increased incrementally over the years, from 15 percent in 1970 to 54 percent today (white students now make up 38 percent of district enrollment). About half of the district's students qualify for free or

reduced-price lunch due to household income. And still, regardless of race, income or neighborhood, all students in the same grade attend the same school each year.

Belue said Clinton's unique plan avoided alienating parents with forced busing and kept middle-

class resources invested in schools across the district.

"You avoid having schools with wealthy parents supplementing support for one school on one side of town, and none of that going on on the other side of town," Belue said.

According to Virgil Belue, "This is a picture of my family home that my father built from old and new lumber in the 1930's. It had only three rooms. We had no electricity until I was in the 10th grade, and when I left home at age 19, we still had only lights and one electric radio. The house was located on the exact space where the Holcut Museum is now located. The house and the fifteen acres on which it was located was taken by the Corp of Engineers as part of the right-of-way for the Tombigbee Canal. Thereafter, a citizens group was successful in getting the property on which they built the museum."

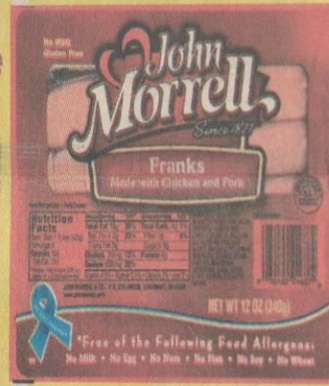
