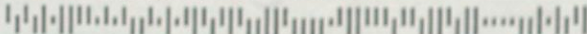

Who is Willy Bearden? Well, folks around these parts he is the brother of Debbie Walker, and principal of Iuka Elementary school. For folks everywhere else, Willy is a Memphis-based filmmaker, photographer, actor and producer.

Willy directed the 2010 feature film, One Came Home. His documentary films include: Visualizing the Blues, The Story of Cotton, A

History of Memphis Garage Bands, Overton Park, Elmwood Cemetery, Horn Island Journal, Project 366, The Perea Project, 100 Years of Juvenile Court, and The View From Adams Avenue.

He is the author of three books: Cotton, From Southern Fields to the Memphis Market; Overton Park; and Memphis Blues, Birthplace of a Music Tradition.

His museum projects include The Blues Hall of Fame, The Tunica RiverPark, The Elvis Presley Birthplace Museum, Gateway to the Blues Museum, The Cotton Museum at the Memphis Cotton Exchange, and the Memphis Wonders Series.



Bearden is also a 30 year veteran of the live event production business and has produced the Blues Music Awards since 1998, the inau-

Drug Roundup in Tishomingo County

Over the past few weeks the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office has made several arrests throughout the county for the sale of drugs, or conspiracy to sell, narcotics. These arrests stem from months of investigation by law enforcement into the drug activity that occurs in Tishomingo County. The individuals arrested were as follows: Joseph Crosby, Allison Engle, Christopher Goforth, Mark Carpenter, Troy Voyles, Rebecca Barnes, Jada McRae, Krista Musgrave, Alex, Nicholas McGuff, Shana Mcney, Diava Carpenter, and Rene Sartain.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the police departments of Golden, Belmont, Burnsville and Tishomingo, as well as the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, in the combined effort to catch these suspects. Sheriff John Daugherty states that "By working together, it makes combating

crime a lot easier. Curbing the sale of drugs also helps to reduce the amount of burglaries, thefts, robberies, and other crimes in our county." Sheriff Daugherty would also like to thank the citizens that called in and gave tips pertaining to certain drug areas. Without help from the public it would be more difficult to combat the sale of narcotics in our community.

The Sheriff's Office is currently working with the department's Chaplain to try to help the individuals that have been arrested for the first time for the possession of felony drugs. If the individuals are struggling with drug addiction, the Chaplain is seeking to help them get into rehab facilities.

Sheriff Daugherty expressed his thoughts in saying "most of these people involved in drugs are not 'bad people', but rather had made some 'bad choices' in life and have to pay the consequences because of those choices.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Officials Make Arrests on Tractor Theft

On February 11th 2018, a report was filed with the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office pertaining to the theft of a tractor on the southern end of the county, near the Prentiss County line. Mark Anthony Michael and Dustin Tyler King were arrested and charged.

Investigators with both the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office and the Prentiss County Sheriff's Office began communicating about this matter, due to Prentiss County experiencing similar issues. The owner of the tractor brought forth photographs from a surveillance camera that showed the alleged suspects on the property taking the equipment.

Prentiss County Investigators were able to locate one of the individuals in the surveillance footage and he was brought to the Tishomingo Sheriff's Office and charged. A couple of weeks later another individual turned himself in after an arrest warrant was issued. The equipment was recovered by both Tishomingo and Prentiss County Investigators some 200 miles south of Iuka.

The Tishomingo County Investigators still have an active warrant for another individual that they believe to be involved in this crime. Sheriff John Daugherty would like to thank Prentiss County Sheriff Randy Tolar, and his deputies and investigators in assisting his agency in making the arrests and recovering the stolen equipment. Sheriff Daugherty stated that this is still an ongoing investigation and more arrests are pending.

Pet of the Week

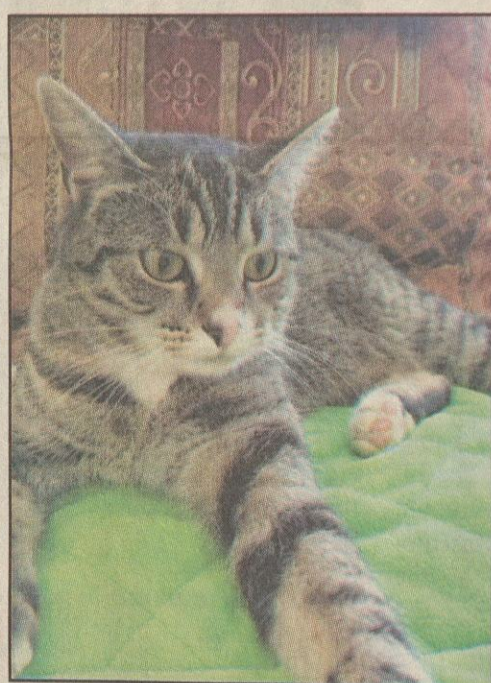

The Wedding Day of Jesus and the Church

Romans 7:4 says, "Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ; that ye should be married to another, even to Him Who is raised from the dead, that ye should bring forth fruit unto God." This verse speaks of our spiritual union with Christ through the Holy Spirit's presence in us, thus we are "married to Christ" in order to bring forth fruit for God. This is the earthly aspect of our marriage to Christ, but Paul states it another way in II Corinthians 11:2: "For I am jealous over you with godly jealousy: for I have espoused you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin unto Christ." Now we see the same writer, Paul, saying that we are virgins who are espoused to Christ. The espousal peri-

od in Jewish families was much stronger than our engagement period, for the espoused persons were legally married, in that it took a divorce to break the espousal. We see this in Matthew 1:18-19: "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost. Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example, was minded to put her away privily." So,

Mary was espoused to Joseph, who was called her husband; she was found to be with child and Joseph knew that it was not his, thus he thought to give her a private divorce. If he had exposed her, she would have been stoned for adultery against her husband, Joseph, yet their wedding feast had not yet taken place.

If we understand Israelite customs concerning marriage, we will better understand how the church can be the "wife" of Christ before the wedding and its feast have

taken place, for Mary was legally the wife of Joseph, and he was legally the husband of Mary, and even called so, before they were married by the ceremony and feast. So, we are now the espoused bride of Christ, but we are awaiting the wedding ceremony and feast. Revelation 19:7-8 will give us more information on our topic: "Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to Him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and His wife hath made herself ready. And to her was granted that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white: for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints." These verses clearly say that the "marriage of the Lamb has come", just as Joseph and Mary's marriage came some time after Mary was espoused to Joseph and he was called

her husband. So, we await the day of the beautiful wedding garments that we will wear during the marriage ceremony of Christ and the church. As is usually the case, there will be gladness and rejoicing at this wedding, but the main honor will go to the Bridegroom, not to the bride, as in customary in our weddings. Yet the bride is not dishonored, for she will be ready for the wedding, with all of her righteousness pictured by the wedding garment of fine linen, clean and white! As with all weddings, there will be guests at this wedding, according to Revelation 19:9: "And he saith unto me, Write, Blessed are they which are called to the marriage supper of the Lamb. And he saith unto me, These are the true sayings of God." Some Bible expositors think that the

marriage ceremony will take place in heaven at the wedding feast on earth which may be true. Whatever the case, the guests at the wedding cannot be the bride, for the bride is a guest at a wedding. The guests may be the believers of the Old Testament period, therefore the feast that the feast takes place on earth may be factually part of the millennium where the redeemed Old Testament Israel and tribulation saints will be present. Whoever they are, they are saved people who are attending the wedding supper of the Lamb and the church, and the supper (feast) always comes after the ceremony.

UNC Met at Iuka Library February 20th

The United Daughters of the Confederacy met, February 20th, 11am, at the Iuka Public Library, Iuka, Ms. There were only two members present, Vickie Durham and Sharon Hairrell.

We completed the DC rituals and the meeting was declared opened by President Sharon Hairrell. The minutes from the January meeting were read and approved and there were no other reports available. The old business was discussed which was the McGavock Cemetery (Confederate), in Frank-

lin, Tn. Our chapter sponsored two tombstones and didn't know the names of the two soldiers at that time but now we do. One was David Hamilton, Company H 31st, Itawamba Co. Ms. and John Vick, Company A 14th, Clarke Co. Ms. There were two from Tishomingo Co. but they had already being taken. We will try and find the names of these two soldiers. The new business discussed was the attendance and what we can do to get members to attend.

Sharon Hairrell presented the program on

"The lost Gold of the Confederate" In May 1861, Jefferson Davis, the reluctant President of the Confederate States of America moved the capital of CSA from Montgomery, Alabama to Richmond, Virginia to boost the morale of the Confederate troops and to weld Virginia to the Confederacy.

Davis was attending church services on Sunday April 2, 1865 when he learned that Lee's defensive line at Petersburg had been broken and the evacuated of Richmond was imminent. President Davis pleaded with Lee to form defense lines for just one more day so he and his cabinet could evacuate and take the Confederate treasury with them. There would be two trains, the first train would be the Confederate officials and the second would be "the special cargo", under the charge of Navy Captain William H. Parker. He gathered the only personnel he could to provide a military guard. The guard consisted mostly of young navy midshipmen from a training ship on the James River and some of them were only twelve years old.

President Davis was not on the first train. He and his staff left on horseback. The gold was to be taken to the old U.S. Mint at Charlotte, North Carolina but Captain Parker found U.S. cavalry in the area and he made alternate arrangements. The treasure was placed in all kinds of containers that once had been used for sugar, coffee, flour and etc. They zigzagged across the South Carolina-Georgia state line several times to evade capture. The responsibility of the treasure was passed on to John C. Breckenridge, who then placed Brig. General Basil Duke in charge. They then headed to Washington, Georgia in six wagons.

It was in Washington,

Georgia that the bulk of the treasure was captured along with Jefferson Davis and his staff. Some of the treasure had been used by Brig. General Duke and the men under him as payment for their services. The balance of the treasure was loaded in wagons and headed for Washington, D.C. However somewhere in Wilkes Co. Georgia, the wagon train was bushwhacked. The bushwhackers were stragglers from both North and South Armies. Residents of Wilkes Co. said the riders were so over loaded when they rode out that they later discarded or hid large quantities of the coins all over Wilkes County.

The belief that Confederate Gold buried in Wilkes County has persisted since the end of the war. No searches have ever found anything of value to prove this legend to be true. This rumor of buried treasure never less spawned a legend involving a family of local repute, the Mumfords. Mumford was a Confederate sympathizer from George and it is said that Jefferson Davis entrusted the entire Confederate treasury into his care and some say it was divided among his cabinet.

In conclusion, historical research has determined only \$70,000 of the gold belonging to the banks in Richmond is missing, but not lost. What remained of the Confederate treasure was disbursed as payroll to Confederate troops during its transport south. By the end of the war nothing remained in the coffers of the Confederate treasury except for its incalculable amount of debt.

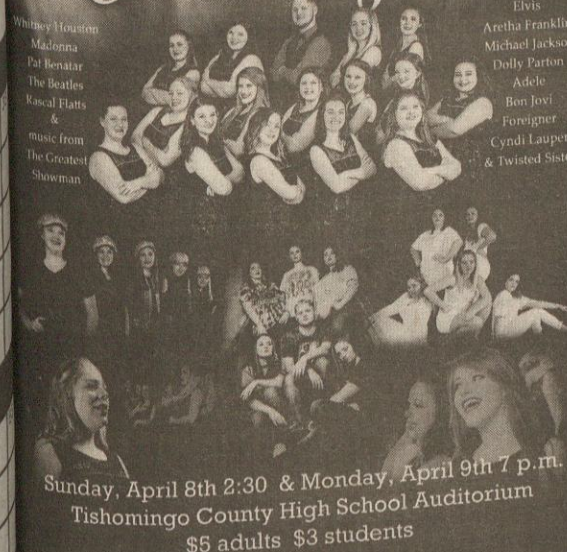

We completed the UDC rituals and the meeting was declared opened by President Sharon Hairrell. The minutes from the January meeting were read and approved and there were no other reports available. The old business was discussed which was the McGavock Cemetery (Confederate), in Frank-

lin, Tn. Our chapter sponsored two tombstones and didn't know the names of the two soldiers at that time but now we do. One was David Hamilton, Company H 31st, Itawamba Co. Ms. and John Vick, Company A 14th, Clarke Co. Ms. There were two from Tishomingo Co. but they had already been taken. We will try and find the names of these two soldiers. The new business discussed was the attendance and what we can do to get members to attend.

Sharon Hairrell presented the program on

"The lost Gold of the Confederate" In May 1861, Jefferson Davis, the reluctant President of the Confederate States of America moved the capital of CSA from Montgomery, Alabama to Richmond, Virginia to boost the morale of the Confederate troops and to weld Virginia to the Confederacy.

Davis was attending church services on Sunday April 2, 1865 when he learned that Lee's defensive line at Petersburg had been broken and the evacuated of Richmond was imminent. President Davis pleaded with Lee to form defense lines for just one more day so he and his cabinet could evacuate and take the Confederate treasury with them. There would be two trains, the first train would be the Confederate officials and the second would be "the special cargo", under the charge of Navy Captain William H. Parker. He gathered the only personnel he could to provide a military guard. The guard consisted mostly of young navy midshipmen from a training ship on the James River and some of them were only twelve years old.

President Davis was not on the first train. He and his staff left on horseback. The gold was to be taken to the old U.S. Mint at Charlotte, North Carolina but Captain Parker found U.S. cavalry in the area and he made alternate arrangements. The treasure was placed in all kinds of containers that once had been used for sugar, coffee, flour and etc's. They zigzagged across the South Carolina-Georgia state line several times to evade capture. The responsibility of the treasure was passed on to John C. Breckenridge, who then placed Brig. General Basil Duke in charge. They then headed to Washington, Georgia in six wagons.

It was in Washington,

Georgia that the bulk of the treasure was captured along with Jefferson Davis and his staff. Some of the treasure had been used by Brig. General Duke and the men under him as payment for their services. The balance of the treasure was loaded in wagons and headed for Washington, D.C. However somewhere in Wilkes Co. Georgia, the wagon train was bushwhacked. The bushwhackers were stragglers from both North and South Armies. Residents of Wilkes Co. said the riders were so over loaded when they rode out that they later discarded or hid large quantities of the coins all over Wilkes County.

The belief that Confederate Gold buried in Wilkes County has persisted since the end of the war. No searches have ever found anything of value to prove this legend to be true. This rumor of buried treasure never less spawned a legend involving a family of local repute, the Mumfords. Mumford was a Confederate sympathizer from George and it is said that Jefferson Davis entrusted the entire Confederate treasury into his care and some say it was divided among his cabinet.

In conclusion, historical research has determined only \$70,000 of the gold belonging to the banks in Richmond is missing, but not lost. What remained of the Confederate treasure was disbursed as payroll to Confederate troops during its transport south. By the end of the war nothing remained in the coffers of the Confederate treasury except for its incalculable amount of debt.

TISHOMINGO — The hazardous waste collection day this year has been expanded to make drop-off more convenient for residents throughout the county.

Each county supervisor's district shop will be accepting items for disposal, and Delta Datsis of the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District.

"The Board of Supervisors, Sheriff's Department and Fire Department will all have people at each location to make sure it remains a safe process," she said. "We think this change will bring in a more waste for proper disposal and keep our soil and groundwater safer."

The Sheriff's Department will also be collecting old prescription medicines, vitamins or any other pills people want to get rid of at these locations.

The goal of the waste collection efforts is to prevent contaminants and chemicals from seeping into the soil and water, a goal of the Soil and Water Conservation District throughout the county.



Approved items to be collected include: paint, paint thinner, stain, turpentine, ammonia, batteries, photo chemicals, drain opener, herbicides, rodent poisons, detergents, glues, old appliances, electronic waste (computers, TVs, etc.), oil and oil filters, aerosols, antifreeze, brake fluid, gas additives, engine fluids, furniture polish, insecticides, moth balls, water sealer, fertilizers, oven cleaner, scrap metal, cleaners, chlorine bleach, pool chemicals, disinfectants, gasoline, barbecue lighter fluid, pesticides, silver polish, wood finish, lighter fluid, motor oil, photographic chemicals and tires.

Please note: CHEMICALS MUST BE LABELED.

NOT ACCEPTED for disposal are: Furniture, roofing shingles, household trash, radioactive materials, biological or infectious materials, explosives,

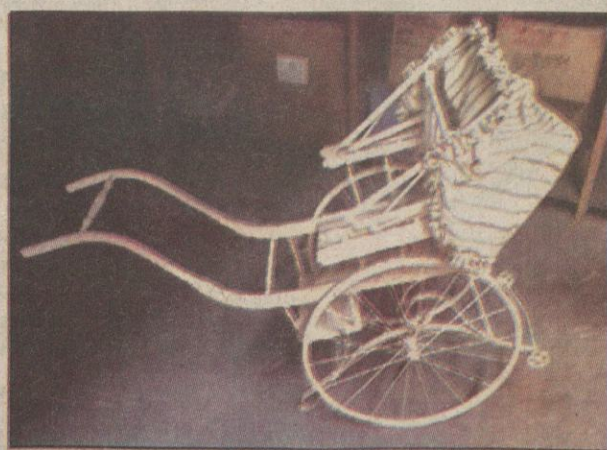

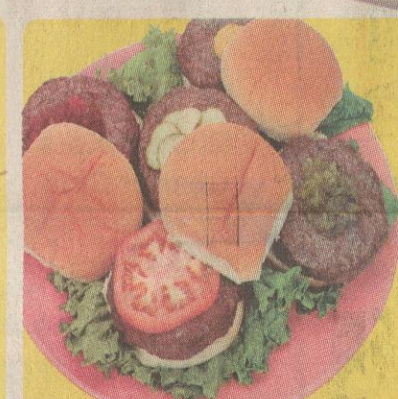

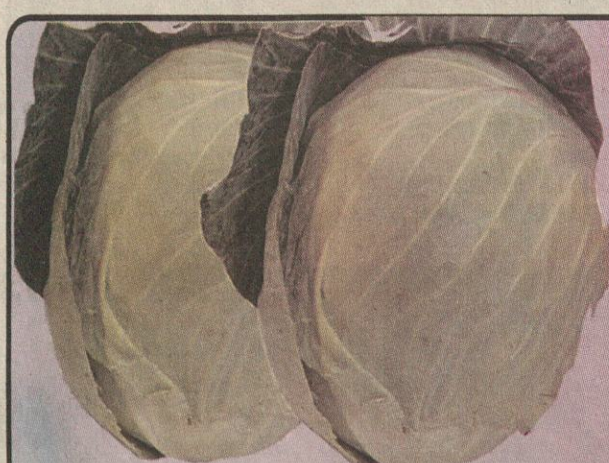
