County Schools Open with Emphasis on Student Safety and **School Attendance**

The Tishomingo County School District is back in session for the 2018-2019 school year. Teachers returned on Wednesday, August 1st, at an opening professional development assembly at John B. Moore Auditorium at Belmont School. The featured speaker was Mr. Jeffrey Franks, a retired FBI agent, with specialties in school safety and active shooter response. "We are excited to have our faculty and staff back to begin a new school. We have several new teachers and staff members, with many of them being products of our school system. It's always encouraging to see our former students go into education and then return to us as employees. We are very blessed to have high quality employees, both current and new, in our district," said Superintendent Christie Holly. Each school has conducted Open House sessions or registrations to get schedules and other important information to parents. Students are in session beginning Monday, August 6th.

One of the exciting initiatives the district is implementing this year is providing an iPad for each 7th and 8th grader in the district. The district implemented iPads for students in 9th through 12th grades in January of the 2017-2018 school year. "We are excited about the move toward more technology for our teachers and students as we strive to prepare them for college and career opportunities after their K-12 experience ends. We are blessed to have a Board that supports our vision of excellence and to have such knowledgeable and dedicated staff

in our technology department. Likewise, we want to thank our communities for their continual support of our initiatives and of our schools," stated Holly. Parent meetings for 7th, 8th, and 9th grade students are being held at each applicable school to discuss this implementation.

As another school year begins, Mrs. Holly wanted to bring attention to the importance of school attendance to our parents and community. "School attendance is vital to student achievement. Research shows that students who miss school regularly are more likely to become involved in at-risk behaviors, such as crime, drug use, and failure to receive a high school diploma. It is especially detrimental to young students because they miss essential skills in reading and math. Likewise, the funding formula for our schools is directly tied to the attendance of our students. Our district actually lost money last year due to students' lack of attendance. Parents need to be aware of these negative consequences and make sure students come to school," Holly explained. "We ask that parents try their best to make doctor and dentist appointments after school, but we understand that is not always possible. However, we do ask that parents return students to school after those appointments so students won't miss as much work, and likewise, the school gets to count them as being present that day. It's a win-win situation when that happens."


Jessica Nichols Jensen begins Medical Residency

Multimodal Grants Awarded for Northern Transportation Distric

Tupelo, Miss.-Commissioner Mike Tagert has announced grant awards for multimodal projects in Mississippi's Northern Transportation District.

The Mississippi Trans-Commission portation (MTC) recently approved the Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) to award grants to regional and municipal airports, ports and public transit systems throughout north Mississippi.

"MDOT's responsibilities include maintaining and improving the state's highways and interstates, but also focuses on providing a safe intermodal transportation network for airports, ports and waterways, railroads and public transit," Tagert said. "Each of these modes of transportation play a vital role in transporting people, goods and services that promote economic growth and development throughout Mississippi."

Funding for these multimodal grants comes from the Multimodal Transportation Improvement Fund. Money from this fund is allocated specifically to support multimodal grants each year. Grant applications, which include project details and funds requested, are reviewed and approved by a multimodal committee specific to each separate mode of transportation.

This week for our Pet of the Week, Iuka Animal Clinic would like to remember our dear fur friend Cinnamon Rollings. Her owners, Randy and Mary Ellen Rollings have shared her story. Cinnamon was born on April 1st 2007. We brought her home 8 weeks later. She was a soft little fur ball and looked like a little wolf pup. We always referred to her as our "bunny soft girl". Our little girl had a rough start. When we brought her home, we found out she hadn't been dewormed, she also had not been getting enough food and was treated like a stuffed animal by very small children who did not know how to properly treat a little puppy. Once that was taken care of, she started to grow and became more active. A month before we brought Cinnamon home, we brought home another rescue. Her "brother" was named Kenworth (Kenny for short) and from then on, they were inseparable. We tried many times to give Cinnamon toys and stuffed animals but she showed no interest in them and always left them on the floor. The next thing we knew, her brother had them. While Kenny had all the toys Cinnamon was totally content with being the "mother" to all in our home. She kept the cats out of trouble and always had to know where everyone



was at. For nearly 11 years, our little baby girl made many friends and stole the hearts of everyone she met. Her beautiful smile and happy tail would make you feel better and forget all your problems just by looking at her. Unfortunately, in December, her brother was diagnosed with cancer in his jaw and he passed away in March. Cinnamon was lost and even though another little girl adopted us before we lost Kenny, she did nothing to help our Cinna-girl feel better. 



I walked down to the Merrill Lynch equity trading floor. At the time, it was the biggest in the world. Traders were wailing and walking around like zombies. I thought to myself, "This is the epicenter of the greatest economic system the world has ever seen, and it is utter chaos. Never believe the experts have cornered knowledge. Trust your common sense, your own knowledge and your own intuition.'

So many stories. I should write a book. Maybe I will. In the meantime, my 28 years of weekly columns is the equivalent of over a dozen lengthy books. I will probably never reread them all.

I grew up playing golf and switched to tennis when children came. Tennis takes less time. Now as the body fails, I am trying to relearn golf.

When I was young, I just hit the golf ball the way I felt like. I was too

stubborn and impatient to listen to pros and do what they said. As a result, I struggled with the game, like most of us. It would have been so much easier if I had just gotten the fundamentals down from the start.

The same is true of life. When I was young, I was stubborn, selfish and impatient. I never stopped to learn the fundamentals. As a result, I have struggled with life.

What are the fundamentals? That's so easy to answer. It's all laid out in the Bible. Everything you will ever need to know about humanity and your role in it. If only I had the maturity as a youth to realize it then. As the Rod Stewart song goes, "I wish that I knew what I know now, when I was younger."

LIFE IS SUCH a mystery. We are all so alike, yet so unique at the same time. Think of snow. It's a blanket of sameness from a distance, yet every single snowflake is one of a kind. This may blow the minds of some people, but God is coming to live with the redeemed on the new earth and in the city New Jerusalem. People who are saved go to "heaven" now, which is in the stellar heavens, with the heavenly Jerusalem as their home, but that heavenly Jerusalem is going to come down to the new earth in the future, so that the house (tabernacle) of God will be with men on the new earth. We will see later that the New Jerusalem is the home of the church (the bride of Christ), while the new earth will be the home of redeemed Israel of the Old Testament period. Our verse

The New Heavens and The New Earth us, which is more interesting than the statement that we will dwell with Him. Our verse also says that God will be our God and we will be His people. There is the idea of ownership here on the part of God and the idea of relationship here on the part of the saved. Eternity is going to be far more interesting and wonderful than any of the saved can presently imagine. Revelation 21:4 says,

"And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away.' Tears are a definite part of earth life! As many of you know, my wife went to heaven on July 27th, and I can truly say that it left a "hole in my heart", but that sorrow will all be gone when I am with the Lord in eternity. Many of you have had tears of sorrow, but for the saved all of those will be wiped away by

(part III) the hands of a loving Heav enly Father! Think about how a Father or Mother ha often wiped away the tears of a sad child, yet this will be fa beyond that! Death will have ceased to be for the believe when we are in eternity with God; sorrow, crying and pain will all be gone. I have never had a great deal of pain, by my dear wife, Bobbie, su fered pain for many years She is without pain now, bu so will the rest of believen be when God comes to line with us on the new earth in the New Jerusalem! Godi a God of love, and He want to do this for every person on earth, but some people seen to be bent on doing their own thing. May I say that nonof the blessings here pertain to those who never received Christ. The good news is the the door is still open and you can still come to Him.
