2018 Tishomingo County Fair Opens

The 2018 Tishomingo County Fair is in Town

Tuesday, October 2nd through Saturday, October 6th. Gates open at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and at 11 a.m. on Saturday. The cost of entry to the fair on Tuesday through Thursday is \$3 for adults and \$2 for children 12 and under. On Friday and Saturday the cost of entry is \$6 for adults and \$4 for children 12 and under. Each night beginning at 5 p.m. the fair will offer an armband option which allows you to ride the rides as much as you like for \$15. On Saturday there will be a carnival matinee from 2-5 p.m. where all of the rides will be \$1.

On Monday, October 1st everyone will have the opportunity to enter exhibits and livestock, excluding baked goods and fresh produce which are to be entered on Tuesday, October 2nd from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. The art and photography contest entries are to be checked-in on Monday; this is also the time to set up any commercial booths to be displayed during the fair. All exhibit and contest entry participants must be from Tishomingo County unless otherwise stated.

The excitement begins on Tuesday, October 2, 2018. Come out and experience the sights, sounds, and flavors offered at the county fair. From 5-8 p.m. each night there will be wagon rides, courtesy of Holt Hill Farms. On Tuesday from 6-7 p.m. live music will be provided by The Oakland Band. Bring

the kids out from 7-9 p.m. for a movie night with "Charlotte's Web" as the feature presentation.

On Wednesday, October 3rd there will be a "Senior Citizen Day" from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. with health screenings, bingo and entertainment featuring Ricky Ryan and the County Line Dancers. 5 p.m. kicks off the armband night and at 7 p.m. don't miss "Just Plain County."

Come out Thursday, October 4th at 6 p.m. to enjoy the youth Pet Show followed by gospel music performed by the Lovelace family, Unity 4, and New Ground from Scottsboro AL, beginning at 7 p.m.

Friday, October 5th brings more fun to the fair with the "Battle of the Beards" at 6 p.m. and the J-Bar-B-Rodeo in the outside arena starting at 8 p.m.

Saturday, October 6th is the final day of the fair and there is a full schedule of events planned. At 9 a.m. attend the Poultry Chain Auction. 12 p.m. kicks off the registration for the pageants; the Tiny Tot Show begins at 2 p.m. and the Tishomingo County King and Queen of the Fair contest will take place at 5 p.m. At 6 p.m. the Cow Patty Contest will take place with the proceeds benefiting the Tishomingo County Junior Auxiliary. Also be sure to come out for another awesome night of J-Bar-B-Rodeo in the outside arena at 8 p.m.

Bring out the family and see what all the Tishomingo County Fair has to offer our community; it promises to be a great time of entertainment for all.

Recent Arrests Made in Tishomingo County

Iuka Man Charged With

On September 16th, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office conducted a traffic stop on Rodney Lindley, 37-year-old, white male of 5B Ridge Drive Iuka. The vehicle in question was not displaying a tag, and the traffic stop progressed to two arrests were made, one of which was Rodney Lindley, who was charged with the possession of methamphetamine.

When the deputies approached the vehicle they noticed several open containers of alcohol; officers learned at both the driver and passenger had been drinking. It was also determined that one of the passengers had some outstanding felony warrants from Alabama and was immediately arrested along with the driver and the other passenger.

Once the deputies arrived at the jail, a search of Lindley turned up some alleged methamphetamine as well as some drug paraphernalia, all of which were hidden on Lindley's person.

Rodney Lindley, 37-year-old, white male of 5B Ridge Drive Iuka, Mississippi was officially charged with the possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine). Lindley remains in custody at the Tishomingo County Jail.

Warrant Served For Drugs on

On September 19th, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office conducted a traffic stop on Vickie Mask, 56-year-old, white female of 1000 North Pearl Street Iuka. Mississippi was arrested for the felony possession of dangerous drugs for the State of Indiana. Indiana authorities refused to extradite Vanslyke, so she was released from custody.

When it was realized that the driver of the vehicle, Vickie Mask had outstanding warrants for her arrest.

rest. Mask recently had an arrest warrant issued due to an on-going investigation into drug activity with which she was allegedly involved in.

At the time of her arrest, Rachel Vanslyke, also of Iuka, was also arrested due to an outstanding arrest warrant from the State of Indiana. Both Mask and Vanslyke were transported to the Tishomingo County Jail. Investigators with the county say that this particular investigation is still developing and further arrest warrants will more than likely be issued.

Vickie Mask, 56-year-old, white female of 1000 North Pearl Street Iuka, Mississippi was arrested for the felony possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine). Mask's bond was set by the Justice Court at \$3,500.

Rachel Vanslyke, 32-year-old, white female also of 1000 North Pearl Street Iuka, Mississippi was arrested for the felony possession of dangerous drugs for the State of Indiana. Indiana authorities refused to extradite Vanslyke, so she was released from custody.

Dennis Man Charged for Not Registering as a Sex Offender

On September 20th, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office officially charged Terry Jerry White with failure to register as a sex offender. Investigators say that White was charged due to changing his physical address and not notifying authorities as required under state law.

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Sheriff John Daugherty warns others that may have criminal records like White, who reside in Tishomingo County to keep their physical locations known to officials.

Checking the validity of the residential information provided by registered sex offenders is always an ongoing process in Tishomingo County.

Terry Jerry White, 53-years of age, of 17 CR 74 Dennis, Mississippi was officially charged with sex offender - failure to register. White's bond was set by the Justice Court at \$5,000.00.

Corinth Man Arrested for Attempting to Steal a Vehicle

On September 21st, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office received a 911 transfer call pertaining to an individual loading up a vehicle, which was parked on the property, onto a trailer around HWY 365. The owners of the stolen vehicle followed the alleged suspect, Christopher Taylor Nunnelee, until he pulled into a driveway of another residence.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies arrived on the scene and met with the caller and the owner of the vehicle. They learned that the alleged suspect, Nunnelee was trying to place the vehicle on the trailer when he was caught by the owner of the property. The alleged Suspect was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Christopher Taylor Nunnelee, 47-year-old, white male of 903 Franklin Street Corinth, Mississippi was officially charged with the theft of a motor vehicle. Nunnelee's bond was set at \$10,000 the by Justice Court.

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Insight to Eyesight

Presbyopia

Presbyopia is a vision condition in which the crystalline lens inside the eye changes shape. It makes focusing on near tasks difficult. Presbyopia is typically first noticed in the early 40's but the changes begin at a much earlier phase of life. Every human will suffer from presbyopia as it is a natural stage of life. Early signs of the condition include blurred vision at normal reading distance and difficulty with near tasks. Presbyopia is diagnosed and measured during a comprehensive eye examination. Treatments include multifocal eyeglasses, contact lenses, and even intraocular lenses.

Though McGaughy's shop is now in Corinth, she continues a presence in Iuka through a collaboration with Hairport on Littleground Drive as a pickup location.

"One of the things I'm hoping to do in my talk is show how easy it is to bring flowers from the garden and use them inside to decorate as well as outside," McGaughy said.

"There are so many ways people can use their zinnias, hydrangeas, grasses, shrubs and vines to make beautiful arrangements."

An important key, McGaughy said, is to think ahead when planting in the garden about how you'll be able to use those plantings later.

"For example, zebra grass and elaeagnus vine are things I use often," she said. "Elaeagnus is such a hardy vine that when it's cut you don't have to put it in water right away. It's great to use for something like wrapping a banister for a wedding and helps to keep the customer's costs down."

McGaughy and her staff of designers love to use found objects as containers, which brings a unique flair to their pieces.

"I just hate to waste anything," McGaughy said. "I repurpose so much stuff and have been known to harvest sticks, scavenge wood and dumpster dive for interesting pieces. We've used old suitcases, boots, purses, anything you can imagine to use as containers. Those old items have a lot more character than some of the modern things we might use."

McGaughy calls the move to Corinth a blessing, in that the business has expanded and is thriving, while she also continues to serve her customers in Iuka.

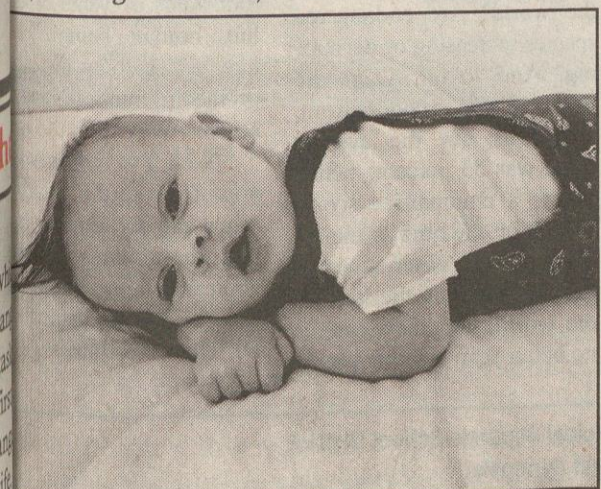

Once in a while we did some fishing in Bear Creek but for the most part we fished in the McNutt Branch.

We had special names for our best fishing holes on the branch. I do not know all the reasons for selecting these names. Sometimes neighbor boys would go fishing with us. Other people were allowed to catfish in our special fishing holes. In the warm summertime we took time out to swim in the branch.

CATFISH HOLE. This fishing hole was located just below the bridge

that crossed the branch. This was the road that passed by our house on the way to Belmont, Miss. This was one of the best places to catch catfish. We used cane poles that were cut in the "Cane Break" in the Bear Creek bottom. Of course we could not afford rods and reels. We made our own sinkers by melting lead in the shop and pouring it into special molds.

WOLF HOLE. Evidently someone saw a wild wolf near this hole. This hole was in a secluded

area and not easy to find. **BLUFF HOLE.** The branch made a sharp turn to the left as it flowed almost straight into a high bluff. Eventually a deep hole developed in this area.

THE SLOUGH HOLE. At one time long ago the branch flowed through this slough. Then when a major flood developed, the bed of the branch moved to a different location. The slough was about fifty yards long. It was an excellent place to catch small perch. Today we call them Brim.

WHERE THE WATER RUNS OVER THE ROCKS. The branch ran over two or three layers of sandstone rock. It was like stair steps. This was an excellent place for fishing and swimming. The bottom of the pool was clean and sandy.

Global Improvement

I was tolerating my periodic teeth cleaning when June, in Dr. Mosal's office, uttered "uh oh." Not a good sign.

Sure enough, my bottom left molar's 30-year-old root canal had become reinfected. I recalled with dread the gingival flap surgery five years ago.

Wikipedia defines this as "a procedure in which the gums are separated from the teeth and folded back temporarily to allow a dentist to reach the root of the tooth and the bone." I recalled it as a painful bloody mess followed by days of aching pain.

A week later, minutes after some tooth poking, periodontist Dr. Reid Lester told me some amazing news. Turns out technology is advancing. Instead of slicing my gums open with a knife, he can now shoot a tiny laser beam around the tooth with an instrument three times thicker than a hair. The laser is tuned to vaporize all the bacteria (they're about 300 different species or so, delightful!) The gum tissue is unharmed by the laser.

Wow! Just five years have gone by. That's phenomenal progress.

I got online and watched a You Tube video of the procedure called LANAP, Laser Assisted New Attachment Procedure. Amazing. I was pumped.

The procedure lived up to its billing. Other than the shot (still an ouch!), there was zero pain. It was faster and less expensive. I played tennis the next day and attended my 60th birthday party the next night. It worked like a charm and spurs better bone and tissue regeneration.

Since 80 percent of Americans will require gum surgery at some point, this is great news. Lots of pain will be avoided.

Even if the procedure had failed, my options were still excellent, but more expensive. I could get an implant on top of which Dr. Lester could place a whole new artificial tooth that would be better than the real thing.

As exciting as my dental issues are, this column is to remind readers that we are

living in the midst of extraordinary human progress – the greatest progress in the history of humanity. And we're just getting started.

Fifty years ago, more than half the people over 65 had lost all their teeth. Today, only 15 percent. That's a huge improvement. No doubt with this new laser procedure tooth loss is going to drop dramatically in the coming decade.

Last month I wrote that global poverty (living on less than \$2 a day) had dropped from 40 percent of the world population to 10 percent in just 40 years. We should think about this every day we wake up and go to work. These are very good times. But people don't comprehend this.

Tripp Segars read the column and texted me. "Read your most recent column. If you haven't read Factfulness, you will find it interesting."

So I bought the book Factfulness: Ten Reasons We're Wrong About the World and Why Things Are Better Than You Think.

Turns out there is a huge disconnect between world progress and our perception of world progress. Most people think the world is in far worse shape than it is. Many think world progress is going backward, which could not be more wrong.

Bill Gates said Factfulness was "One of the most important books I've ever read an indispensable guide to thinking clearly about the world."

The book starts with a quiz of 13 questions about the state of the world: What percentage of people have access to electricity? What percent of women in the world have 10 years of education compared to men? What is the average life expectancy in the world? Are endangered species increasing or decreasing? And so on. There are three answers to choose from.

Turns out the average score was 33 percent, which means a chimpanzee scores as well on the quiz as the average person. When it comes to understanding the state of the world, our knowledge is no better than a chimpanzee.

Did you know 80 percent of children have been vaccinated against disease? Did you know the average life expectancy in the world is 70? Did you know worldwide women only live one fewer year (nine) of education than men? Did you know the panda, rhino and tiger are less endangered today than 30 years ago? Did you know 80 percent of the world's population has access to electricity? Did you know deaths from natural disasters have been cut in half since 100 years ago? Did you know the majority of the world's population now lives in middle income countries? Did you know that in 100 years there will be the same number of young people in the world as there are today? Did you know that 85 percent of the world's population lives in developed countries with small families and low childhood death rates? Did you know only nine percent of the world's population live in low income countries? Even in the low income countries, the life expectancy is 50 years, most people have access to improved water, most children are vaccinated.

Every year in Davos, Switzerland, the richest, most powerful, smartest people in the world gather for a symposium on the state of the world. The average score on the test was 50 percent among Davos attendees.

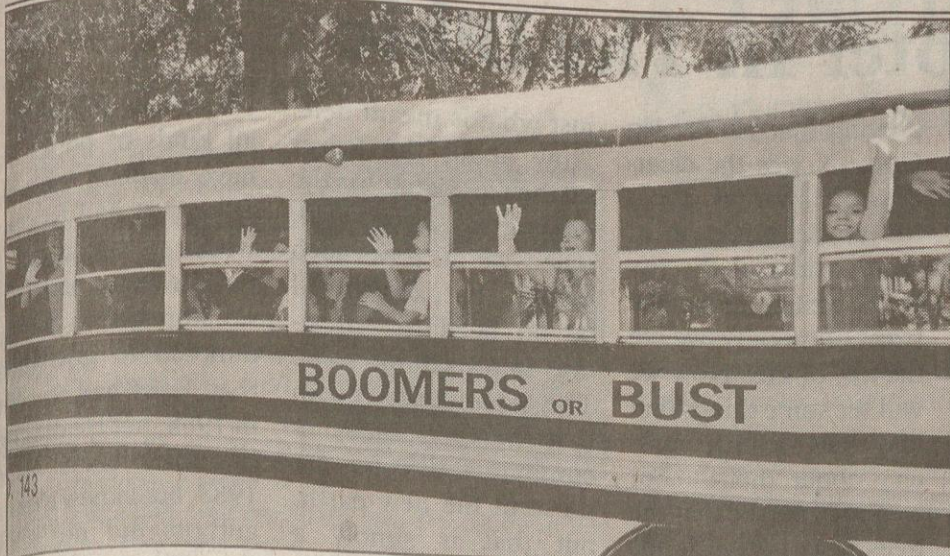
This disconnect is caused by the nature of news. Wrecks are news. Safe things are not. In today's world of instant communication we are subjected to an unending stream of huge disaster, terrorist attacks and horror stories.

Then there is the negativity instinct. Perhaps thousands of years of life, human beings have a negativity instinct ingrained in our collective consciousness. We expect the worst.

Well I've got news for you. The world is improving more rapidly than ever. In fact, the progress of the last 50 years is almost fantastic. And we are just getting started. That is factfulness.

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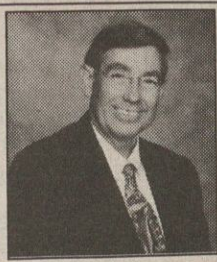
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Scenes From The Last Chapter In The Bible

We are coming to Revelation chapter 22, which is the last chapter in the Bible. I have heard the statement made: "I have read the last chapter and we win." I like that statement, for it is true, since the children of God have already won through Christ. Revelation 22:1-2 says, "And He showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb. In the midst of the street of it, and on either side of the river, was there the tree of life, which bare twelve manner of fruits, and yielded her fruit every month: and

the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations." Admittedly, there are some mysteries here for most of us, for everything in these two verses is not clearly explained or understood by perhaps any of us. We have seen the river of life in many references in the Bible, for example Psalm 46:4 says, "There is a river, the streams whereof shall make glad the city of God, the holy place

of the tabernacles of the most High." The river in Revelation 22:1 comes from the throne of God and of the Lamb, so God is the source of this river. Notice also that the throne is that of the Father and the Son, for the throne is called "the throne of God and of the Lamb". There are a number of places in Revelation chapters 21 and 22 that show the equality of the Son with the Father,

proving that He is also God. Notice the clearness of this river, for it has no impurities in it. On the sides of the river, as well as along the street of this city, we see the tree of life. Now we will see some things that may have a little mystery about them. For example, we see that the trees bear twelve kinds of fruit and they have new fruit every month. Did you know that there will evidently be some marking of time (months) in the eternal state? Perhaps this relates more to the nations of saved people in the new earth, but nobody whom I have read has been dogmatic about

just what is meant here. How about the leaves of the tree being for the healing of the nations, when we all have been taught that there will be no need for "healing" in the eternal state. The idea may mean that the leaves provide continue well-being for those in the new earth, but that is simply a guess, for Scripture tells us no more than what we see here. It is interesting that men have written entire books of speculation on some future events, because no Scripture gives exact information about these things. For example, I have been in the preaching ministry for 57

years, and I have read all kinds of books that have made it look like Jesus just had to come within a certain age. I have several books in my library that have tempted to give proof that Jesus had to come in 1988, but He didn't. I had those books before 1988, but I knew that the authors did not know that He would come then. I didn't know that He wouldn't come. I knew that they didn't know that He would come in 1988. When we are guessing about things not spelled out in the Bible, we should be honest enough to say "I am guessing"!

The conference seeks to provide the best services and care for children with autism. An estimated 50,000 teens with autism become adults. About one-third of people with autism remain nonverbal, reports show.

There are many types of autism caused by different combinations of genetic and environmental influences.

The topic deeply interests leaders of the MC School of Education. MC offers programs that assist teachers, including a master's degree in special education.

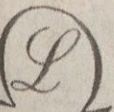

This competition is for AMATEUR photographers only. For the purpose of the competition, professionals are defined as those who sell their work, or who are employed as photographers or teachers of photography.

All photos must be the original work of the exhibitor. Copyrighted images are not permitted.

Photos may be taken with a digital or 35mm camera.

All photos must be 8"x10" in size.

All photos must be mounted on a 10"x12" piece of BLACK foam board which may be found at Wal-Mart and other places in the area.

Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of 2 total entries.

The categories are as follows:

People: Photo including one or more person(s).

Pets, Animals, and/or Wildlife: Shall include one or more animal(s)

Nature: May include bodies of water, horticulture, etc.

Action: Should show action such as football, baseball, soccer, running, skiing, dancing, auto-racing, etc.

Black & White: All photos must be black and white in this category.

Buildings/Landscapes: Includes buildings, landscapes, and skylscapes.

All Black & white photos must be entered in the Black & White category.

All material deemed inappropriate by fair management will be disqualified and not displayed.

Premiums-\$20 First place in each category

\$50 to one overall winner

Youth and adult divisions will be judged and awarded premiums separately.

Art Contest Returns to Fair

1. Artist must be a Tishomingo County resident 18 years of age or older as of October 1st, 2018

2. Limit two entries per artist. May be paintings or drawings in any media and should be no more than two (2) years old.

3. Only original work and original idea is acceptable. Copies of paintings or drawings will be disqualified. Artwork that contains nudity will not be accepted.

4. Any works that have been previously exhibited in the Tishomingo County Fair will be disqualified. Entries will be exhibited according to space available.

5. The judges reserve the right to refuse entries.

6. Specifications: All art must be suitable for hanging and measure no larger than 4 feet x 4 feet or artist must furnish own display. Space is limited. If you need more than 4 feet please get prior approval.

7. Reasonable care will be used at all times in handling entries, but entries will not be insured. The Tishomingo County Fair Board will not be responsible for any loss or damages whatsoever.

8. All entries are eligible and will be judged for awards. A qualified judge will make selections for cash awards before the opening of the fair. NO prize will be awarded in the absence of a quality entry.

9. Artwork must be turned in between 8:00 and 5:00 p.m. on Sept. 27 & 28, or between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on October 1.

10. NO ENTRY WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER AT 7 P.M. Exhibits are not to be removed until Monday, October 8th.

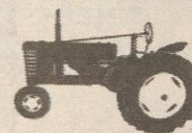

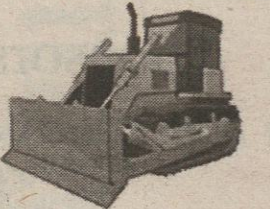

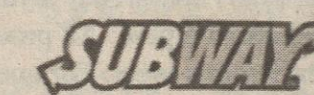
