### Husband Charged with 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Murder in the **Missing Person Case of** Susie Rena Lanier

THURSDAM,

In the wake of an exten- other human sive investigation a Tishomingo County man, Russell Leon Lanier, has been charged with the murder of his wife, Susie Rena Lanier, who was last seen on June the 6th 2017.

On December 26th 2018. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office officially charged Russell Leon Lanier with 1st Degree Murder. Susie was only 43 years old when she was reported missing on June 7, 2017 from her mobile home at 12 Whitfield Drive in Iuka, Mississippi.

Susie was reported missing by her husband, Russell Lanier and her step-father. A search was conducted immediately in the area with several volunteers and family members, but Susie was not found.

The first solid piece of evidence in the case came to light on August 31st 2017, when the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office received a call from a man who found what appeared to be a human skull on his property. Tishomingo County Deputies and Investigators arrived on the scene and collected the skull as evidence. Once dental records were obtained of Susie Lanier, the records were forwarded to the Coroner to be analyzed with the skull. Within a few days, the sheriff's office received word that the human skull found was positively identified as that of

### Notice from County Tax Assessor

It's that time of year again. January - March is the time of year when you are able to file for your Homestead exemption. When you come in to file there are a few things you will need.

- 1. Current Car Tag number
- 2. Copy of your Deed
- 3. Social Security number for you and your spouse if married.
- 4. Proof of Disability if filing for Disability Exemption.
- 5. Proof of age if filing for over 65 Year Exemption.
- 6. For Disabled Veteran Exemption- Proof of Disability and year awarded.
- 7. If you have lost a spouse during the 2018 year you will also need to come and refile your Homestead. Please bring a copy of their death certificate and the above listed things for you to file your Homestead exemption.

Please make sure to come within these 3 months because this is the only time you are allowed to file for these exemptions. Also, for those people who are over 65 years old please make sure that we have your correct mailing address and phone number. # **SCHOOL BUS SAFETY**

Our school bus fears usually focus on images of some horrible wreck. But children are most likely to get hurt during routine pickup and drop-off, when they're in the "danger zone", the area inside a 10-foot radius around the bus, in which small children often become invisible to both the driver and approaching motorists. It's here that kids crossing the street are hit by motorists who illegally pass a stopped bus, or youngsters darting in front of, next to, behind, or even under the bus are inadvertently struck by their own driver. The following tips will help ensure your child's safety.

STUDENT'S AND GUARDIANS

At the Bus Stop:

Always walk to the bus stop. Never run.

Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left facing traffic.

Always go to the bus stop about five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.

While at the bus stop, wait in a safe place away from the road. Do not run and play while waiting. Never speak to strangers at the bus stop and never get into the car with a stranger. Always go straight home and tell you

parents if a stranger tries to talk to you or pick you up. Wait for the bus to arrive, watch for red flashing lights and the stop sign to be extended, and cross only when all traffic has stopped. Look left, right, and left again before crossing.

On the Bus:

Go directly to a seat. Remain seated and facing forward for the entire ride.

Talk quietly (so the driver will not be distracted).

If you need to talk to the bus driver: wait for the bus to stop, raise your hand, and call the driver's name. Never throw things on the bus or out the windows. Never play with the emergency exits.

Keep the aisles clear at all times.

If there is an emergency, listen to the driver and follow instructions.

Exit the Bus:

When getting off the bus, make sure all cars are stopped in both directions.

Make sure you walk (not run) ten steps away from the door and in sight of the driver. Stay away from the bus wheels and watch out for moving cars!

Once you get off the bus, go straight home so an adult will know where you are.

Only get on and off the bus at your designated stop. If you need to get off the bus somewhere else, you will need to have a note from your parents that has been provided to the school.

If you leave something on the bus, never return to the bus to get it. The driver may not see you come back and they may begin moving the bus.

Also, if you drop something near the bus, do not go back to pick it up.

Always remain 10 steps away from the bus to be out of the "Danger Zone" and where the driver can see you. Always cross the street in front of the bus. Never go behind the bus.

SHARING the ROAD with SCHOOL BUSES:

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

Never pass a bus from behind if it is stopped to load or unload children. You must not pass from the left side, nor from the right side. You must stop behind the bus.

If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, TRAFFIC MUST STOP.

If you meet a bus, immediately slow down and be prepared to stop. If the lights are flashing, be prepared to stop immediately. Never try to beat the stop are coming out.

The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus

Be alert; children often can be unpredictable.

SCHOOL BUS DRIVER QUALIFICATIONS

A driver must have at least 20/40 visual acuity in each eye.

A driver must have a Mississippi Department of Transportation Physical.

All drivers must consent to and pass a pre-employment drug screening and be placed in a pool for random drug screening.

A bus driver must have the normal use of both arms, both hands, both legs, and both feet.

A bus driver must have sufficient physical strength to drive a school bus.

A bus driver should be emotionally stable.

A driver's hearing shall not be impaired to the extent that it would interfere with the safe operation of a school bus.

A bus driver must pass a pre-employment agility test administered as part of the Mississippi Department of Education bus driver training.

Have an acceptable driving record with no convictions deemed disqualifying under the Mississippi Commercial Drivers License Law, Section 63-1-73 through 63-1-90, Mississippi Code as amended.

License and Certificate

A school bus driver shall have a valid Class B Commercial Driver's License with a "P" and "S" endorsement.

Shall have a valid school bus driver's certificate issued by an instructor approved by the Mississippi Department of Education

Shall attend 2 hours of safety training each semester.

Shall renew his/her license every 2 years.

Please help us ensure the safety of our students by being highly attentive and slowing down significantly when you see a school bus on the roadway. A child's life is always dependent upon it.



### White-tailed Deer Chronic Wasting Disease Public Meeting

The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) will host a public meeting at the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka on Thursday, January 3 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss the Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) sampling. # Scenes From The Last Chapter In The Bible (part XIV)

We are coming to a couple of verses in Revelation that have been debated and considered quite a bit, yet the explanation does not really seem too hard, when we consider them in connection with the rest of the Bible on the subject covered here. Revelation 22:18-19 says, "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, if any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book. And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things that are written in this book."

We must notice several things about our verses: John is speaking to those who have heard the words of the Book of Revelation, for it is called "the prophecy of this book", and not all books of the Bible are books of prophecy. The Book of Revelation was originally written to the seven churches in Asia, as Revelation chapters two and three clearly show, so the hearers would at least include those within the seven churches, yet others are no doubt



included. Those who would add to the words of John's prophecy would be assuming the place of an inspired writer, and that would make such additions have an adverse effect on what John had truly prophesied through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. In the day when John wrote this book many spurious writings were being circulated among the believers in the early churches. An agreement as to what books belonged in the New Testament was not confirmed



STARKVILLE, Miss.— From rare rocks and antique clocks to self-playing instruments and eye-opening insects, Mississippi State's museums and galleries have something for everyone.

Curious visitors and serious researchers can investigate the more than 20 museums and collections highlighting different disciplines in the sciences, arts and humanities. Many of these are free and open to the public year-round.

"Our galleries and collections bring 15,000 to 18,000 people to campus each year, including schoolaged children, researchers, university students and faculty, and families," said Amy Moe-Hoffman, chair of MSU's museums and galleries committee who also serves as an instructor in the university's Department of Geosciences. "We are very proud of our museums and galleries' contributions to education and outreach, and we are continually working to increase our impact and further support the mission of the university."

Located at Cullis Wade Depot is the Cullis and Gladys Wade Clock Museum, where more than 400 clocks and watches dating back to the 1700s are exhibited year-round. The collection belonged to MSU electrical engineering alumnus and renowned antique clock collector, the late Charles Cullis Wade of Newton, and his late wife, Gladys Valentine Wade of Laurel. While most are original productions, several clocks were customized by Cullis Wade with hand-painted glass designs, and a number of French clocks and several English and German pieces are featured.

Grant Presidential Library and the Frank and Virginia Williams Collection of Lincolniana are housed in Mitchell Memorial Library. In November 2017, MSU Libraries celebrated the opening of the state-of-the-art museum chronicling Grant and Lincoln's lives through correspondence, photographs, paintings, engravings, statues and other artifacts and ephemera.

The library also is where patrons can explore the Charles H. Templeton Sr. Music Museum, a collection that was donated to MSU nearly 30 years ago by the late Starkville businessman. Highlighting the industry when ragtime dominated popular American music, the collection tells the story of the "business of music" through more than 22,000 pieces of sheet music, 200 self-playing musical instruments, 15,000 recordings and unique musical memorabilia from the 1880s-1930s.

The Cully A. Cobb Antique Tool Museum, maintained by the College of Forest Resources, is another must-see collection. The museum serves as a showplace for more than 350 antique tools, axes, saws, hammers, drills and chisels that can be viewed by appointment.

MSU's museums and galleries committee also hosts a number of fun, collaborative events each year to raise awareness of the resources available to the university and local communities. "Science Night at the Museum" draws all ages to the university's Lois Dowdle Cobb Museum of Archaeology and the Dunn-Seiler Museum. Participants can observe scientific demonstrations in a variety of disciplines, including anthropology, archaeology, art, astronomy, biology, chemistry, meteorology, physics and veterinary science.

"I love seeing people of all ages get excited about science while learning more about the importance of the collections on campus," Moe-Hoffman said.



# The Thomas Randolph Smith Family

### by Charlotte McVay

Once again I am sharing an old photo from my family archives. This is mv great-great-grandfather Thomas Randolph Smith and his wife Amy Louhaney Millsapps and their family. This photo was taken around 1900. Identified are, front row, from left: Annie L. Smith (Haines), Thomas R. (grandpa) Smith, little Lula Adams, and Amy Louhaney Millsapps (grandma) Smith. Second row. from left, Owen Smith, Charlie Smith, Bryan Adams, Julia Bayliss (King), Lucille Smith (Wadkins), Ross Smith Robinson, Orlena Smith (Robinson), and Loven Ross Robinson. Third row, from left, James T. Smith (known as Uncle Bud, Mary Ann Archer (Aunt Mollie) Smith, Walter Smith, and Blanche

Bayliss (Daugherty my grandmother). Fourth row, from left, Frank Bayliss, Maude Smith (Mars), Churchy Adams, Blanche Ice, Bessie Bayliss (Patterson), and Elizabeth E. Thomas Randolph Smith was born October 21, 1812, near Villa Rica County, Georgia, but when about two years of age his parents moved to Cass now Barthow County. Here his father, Hugh Smith was drowned in the Etowah River a few years later. At the age of 18 he decided to go to Eastport, Mississippi to work on the farm of Jeremiah Millsapps, who had married his oldest sister. He arrived there in December 1852 and married Amy Louhaney Millsapps, youngest sister of Jeremiah Millsapps.

Thomas Randolph Smith lived to be in his 90's and served in the Civil War in Company B, composed of men from Tishomingo County under Capt John Doan and put into the 4th Alabama Cavalry under Col Johnston. Before he died he wrote his biography and the details of his serving in the war and being taken a prisoner to Camp Case in Ohio. He was the son of Elizabeth Edwards Yarbrough, who married Hugh Smith about 1817 in Wiinsboro, SC. After his

father drowned, his mother came to Eastport where her daughter and son had moved and settled in Iuka. She later married Aurelius Eccles who also served in the Civil War.

(Taken from an old Vidette) Mrs. Eccles lived in a house on north Main Street known as the Hubbard House (today owned by Lila Ham). Legend has it that Mrs. Eccles was coming down the stairs when she put herself in front of a Federal soldier who attemped to enter her home. When she defied his power and it is said gave him a "good Rebel cussing," he struck her across the head with his gun and gave her a big scar which she always wore as proud as a boy with his first britches.
