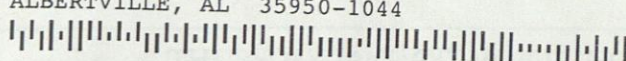

### Deadline to Qualify is March 1

Wednesday, January 2, 2019 is the first day to qualify to run for county offices. The Circuit Clerk's Office was busy starting at 8 a.m. with candidates waiting to file their qualifying papers. The first Primary Election is both the Democrat and Re-

publican Parties will be Tuesday, August 6, 2019. The Primary Runoff Election, if needed will be on Tuesday, August 27, 2019. Any independent candidates will appear on the November 5, 2019 General Election Ballot along with the Democratic

Nominee and the Republican Nominee for each office. The deadline to qualify for office will be March 1, 2019 at 5 p.m.

See list of candidates qualifying on Wednesday, January 2, 2019 in this weeks news.

2019 is an election year for Tishomingo County's local officials. The available elected positions include: the Tishomingo County Sheriff, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors (one person in each of the five districts), the Chancery Clerk, the Circuit Clerk, Coroner, Tax Assessor, Tax Collector, Justice Court Judge- North Half, Justice Court Judge- South Half, Constable- North Half, and Constable- South Half.

An outline of the base pay rate for each of the county positions per year is listed as follows: Board of Supervisors, County Attorney, and Justice Court Judges all receive \$40,400; the Tax Assessor and Collector is paid \$52,500; the Circuit and Chancery Clerk is paid \$90,000; the Constables and Coroner receives pay based upon fees which will be different every year; and the Sheriff is paid \$80,000.

## Mississippi Recycling Coalition Announces 2018-2019 Mississippi

Jackson, MS - The Mississippi Recycling Coalition (MRC) is pleased to announce the award of nine Mississippi School Recycling Grants for the 2018-2019 School Year to schools in Starkville, Canton, Oxford, Natchez, New Albany, Hattiesburg and Tishomingo.

These grants are offered to public and private schools teaching grade K-12 students in the State of Mississippi. The awards include a \$500 or \$1,000 cash award and a complimentary 1-year membership to the coalition for each school. A panel of MRC members evaluated each school grant applica-

tion received based on the reuse, recycling and composting components of the program; the amount of student leadership and student participation in the recycling program; the emphasis on educating students on the benefits of recycling; and the community involvement, participation, and outreach components of the program. Other components considered included the creativity, technical design, sustainability, and maximization of resources within the program.

MRC is pleased to announce school recycling grant awards this year to nine deserving schools in the state. The

schools receiving grant awards from MRC are as follows: Armstrong Middle School, Canton High, Henderson Ward Stewart Elementary School, Lafayette Middle School, Natchez Early College at Co-Lin, New Albany Elementary School, North Pontotoc Elementary School, Sacred Heart Catholic School, and Tishomingo Middle School.

Tishomingo Middle School is being awarded a grant to start a new recycling program. The school's GEM (gifted program) students and teachers will lead efforts on collecting and orga-

## Deputies Respond to a Shooting Near Iuka

A shooting last week at a home west of Iuka has left a family in disbelief and sorrow as the tragedy left two dead.

On January 2, 2019, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office received a call of a shooting at a resident located on CR 236 in the Turnpike/Harmony Community. When deputies arrived at the home of Troy and Carol Lambert, Mr. Lambert was in the yard and shot himself as the deputies arrived. Inside

the residence, the deputies found his 58-year-old wife, Carol, who had also been shot. According to the Coroner, both were pronounced dead at the scene.

According to Troy Lambert's sister, he called her and told her he had accidentally shot his wife and could not live without her and was going to shoot himself. The sister called the authorities alerting them to the shooting.

## Iuka Man Charged For Burglary

Recently an Iuka man was arrested on charges of burglary from a case which was reported back in October. On December 28<sup>th</sup> the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Investigators charged Bently Lee Moss for the burglary of a dwelling. The home in question is located on County Road 392 in the Tishomingo area.

On October 3<sup>rd</sup> the homeowner notified the Sheriff's Office of an obvious break-in. Approximately \$2,500 worth of items were reported stolen from the residence; at this time some of the missing items have been recovered.

Bently Lee Moss, 37-year-old, white male of Adams Street Iuka, Mississippi was officially charged with the burglary of a dwelling. Moss's bond was set by the Justice Court at \$25,000. Moss also has outstanding misdemeanor warrants for his arrest in Tishomingo County.

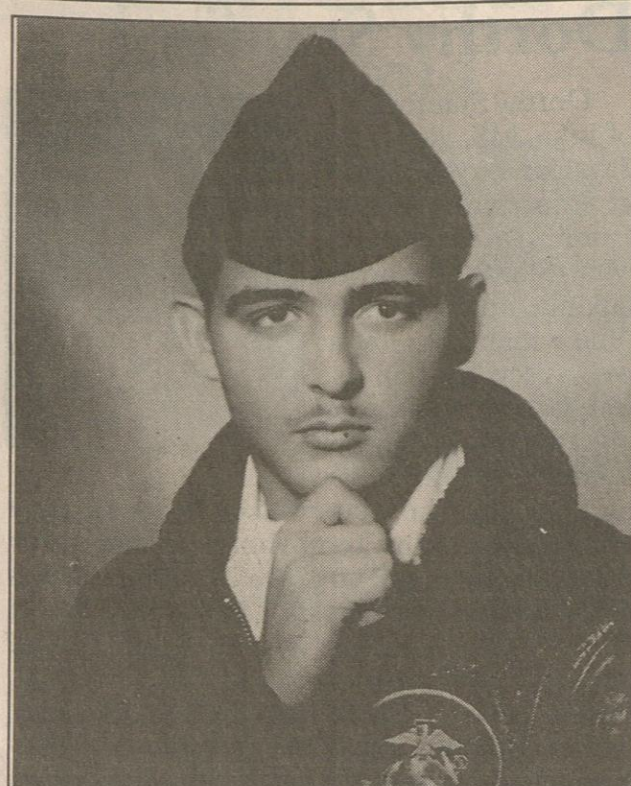

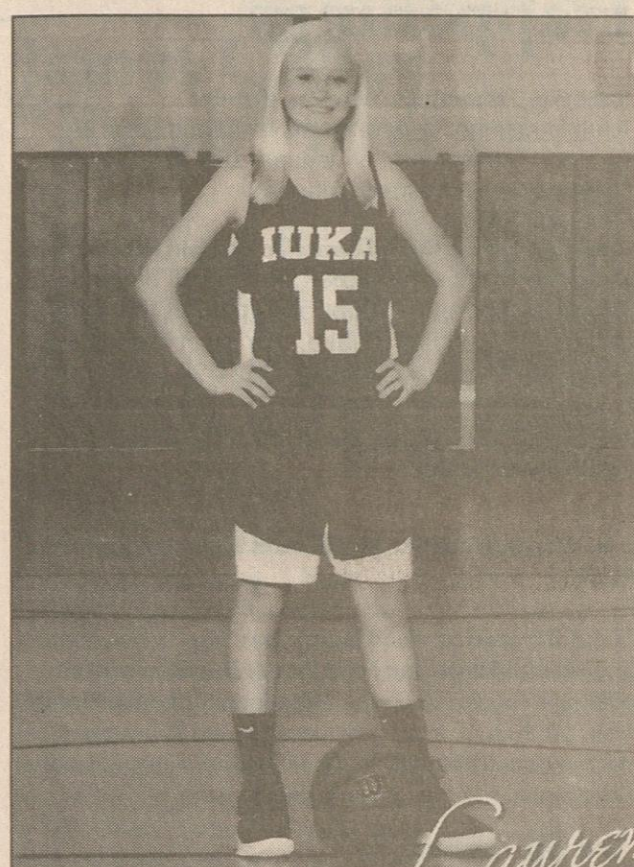

## Letter to the Editor

### Problems are Contagious

I often try to escape from real life to one that I like much better. I dream of making a life that is very inspiring. Since February of 2018, I have been the guest of almost every therapy group in the area. During this time, I had four hip surgeries by Dr. R. Frazier, Corinth. I had it on good faith that he was one of the best orthopedic doctors in this area. I still believe this, even though he made me an appointment for the day after Christmas. He also scheduled about a dozen people for the same time and of course we all showed up on time.

I have experienced most therapy units in this area. In 2014, I spent 58 days in Tishomingo Living Center. In 2017, I was in a swing bed at the Iuka Hospital for 22 days. And during the year of 2018, I spent a week in the Corinth Hospital, was back in a swing bed at Iuka Hospital for 22 days and most recently, I spent more than two months, from September to December at Tishomingo Manor. My favorite over-shadows most. Did you ever spend months in a therapy unit that was beyond words? The full page ad in a recent T.C. newspaper showed the professional staff there. They were amazing, as was the therapy department, which operates separately. Not one person working as a hands-on therapist is older than 45.

#### Offerings included:

The Administrator, Tina Stevens, visits every patient once or twice a week. The professional staff is comprised of daily housekeeping, daily maintenance, transportation to and from medical appointments, which are located in Corinth, Iuka, Tupelo, Memphis and some Alabama locations. Medicine is dispensed by an RN or a doctor. Your doctor can visit you here too.

The rooms are large and the equipment used by staff

is modern. Showers are given every other day, including full personal grooming. Patients enjoy healthy meals, snacks and drinks. Waking up to a hot breakfast, complete with bacon, eggs, and hot biscuits was something I had not experienced since Mother made them when I was a child. Manicures and hair styling by appointment are offered- at no charge to therapy patients.

Emotional support too. Bingo, music, special speakers and group activities are available for patient participation. Some play cards, others just watch the action. I read several books and most likely the staff had a party when I left. I blame a lot of that on my medicines.

I had never been inside Tishomingo Manor until I was taken there in an ambulance when I had used up my days in the Iuka Hospital's Swing Bed Program. 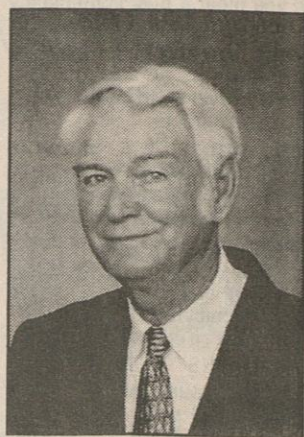

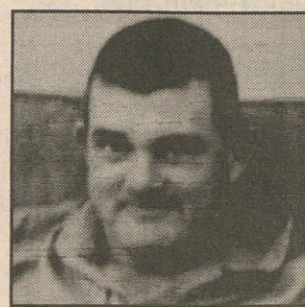

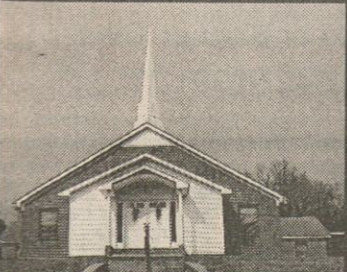

### SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Our school bus fears usually  
focus on images of some hor-  
rible wreck. But children are  
most likely to get hurt during  
routine pickup and drop-off,  
when they're in the "danger  
zone", the area inside a 10-foot  
radius around the bus, in which  
small children often become  
invisible to both the driver and  
approaching motorists. It's here  
that kids crossing the street are  
hit by motorists who illegally  
pass a stopped bus, or young-  
sters darting in front of, next  
to, behind, or even under the  
bus are inadvertently struck by  
their own driver. The following  
tips will help ensure your child's  
safety.

#### STUDENT'S AND GUARDIANS

##### At the Bus Stop:

Always walk to the bus stop.  
Never run.

Walk on the sidewalk. If there  
is no sidewalk, walk on the left  
facing traffic.

Always go to the bus stop about  
five minutes before the bus is  
scheduled to arrive.

While at the bus stop, wait in a  
safe place away from the road.  
Do not run and play while wait-  
ing.

Never speak to strangers at the  
bus stop and never get into the  
car with a stranger. Always go  
straight home and tell you par-  
ents if a stranger tries to talk to  
you or pick you up.

Wait for the bus to arrive, watch  
for red flashing lights and the  
stop sign to be extended, and  
cross only when all traffic has  
stopped. Look left, right, and  
left again before crossing.

##### On the Bus:

Go directly to a seat. Remain  
seated and facing forward for  
the entire ride.

Talk quietly (so the driver will  
not be distracted).

If you need to talk to the bus  
driver: wait for the bus to stop,

raise your hand, and call the  
driver's name.

Never throw things on the bus  
or out the windows. Never play  
with the emergency exits.

Keep the aisles clear at all  
times.

If there is an emergency, listen  
to the driver and follow instruc-  
tions.

##### Exit the Bus:

When getting off the bus, make  
sure all cars are stopped in both  
directions.

Make sure you walk (not run)  
ten steps away from the door  
and in sight of the driver. Stay  
away from the bus wheels and  
watch out for moving cars!  
Once you get off the bus, go  
straight home so an adult will  
know where you are.

Only get on and off the bus at  
your designated stop. If you  
need to get off the bus some-  
where else, you will need to  
have a note from your parents  
that has been provided to the  
school.

If you leave something on the  
bus, never return to the bus to  
get it. The driver may not see  
you come back and they may  
begin moving the bus.

Also, if you drop something  
near the bus, do not go back to  
pick it up.

Always remain 10 steps away  
from the bus to be out of the  
"Danger Zone" and where the  
driver can see you. Always  
cross the street in front of the  
bus. Never go behind the bus.

##### SHARING the ROAD with SCHOOL BUSES:

If you're driving behind a bus,  
allow a greater following dis-  
tance than if you were driving  
behind a car. It will give you  
more time to stop once the yel-  
low lights start flashing. It is il-  
legal in all 50 states to pass a  
school bus that is stopped to  
load or unload children.

Never pass a bus from behind  
if it is stopped to load or unload  
children. You must not pass  
from the left side, nor from the  
right side. You must stop be-

hind the bus.

If the yellow or red lights are  
flashing and the stop arm is ex-  
tended, TRAFFIC MUST STOP.  
If you meet a bus, immediately  
slow down and be prepared to  
stop. If the lights are flashing,  
be prepared to stop immedi-  
ately. Never try to beat the stop  
are coming out.

The area 10 feet around a  
school bus is the most dan-  
gerous for children; stop far  
enough back to allow them  
space to safely enter and exit  
the bus.

Be alert; children often can be  
unpredictable.

##### SCHOOL BUS DRIVER QUAL- IFICATIONS

A driver must have at least  
20/40 visual acuity in each eye.

A driver must have a Mississip-  
pi Department of Transportation  
Physical.

All drivers must consent to and  
pass a pre-employment drug  
screening and be placed in a  
pool for random drug screen-  
ing.

A bus driver must have the  
normal use of both arms, both  
hands, both legs, and both feet.

A bus driver must have suffi-  
cient physical strength to drive  
a school bus.

A bus driver should be emotion-  
ally stable.

A driver's hearing shall not be  
impaired to the extent that it  
would interfere with the safe  
operation of a school bus.

A bus driver must pass a pre-

employment agility test as  
required as part of the Mis-  
sippi Department of Educa-  
tion bus driver training.  
Have an acceptable driving  
record with no convictions  
deemed disqualifying under  
Mississippi Commercial Driver's  
License Law, Section 63-1-90,  
through 63-1-90, Missis-  
sippi Code as amended.

##### License and Certificate

A school bus driver shall  
have a valid Class B Comm-  
mercial Driver's License with a  
"S" endorsement.

Shall have a valid school  
bus driver's certificate issued  
by an instructor approved by the  
Mississippi Department of Edu-  
cation.

Shall attend 2 hours of  
training each semester.

Shall renew his/her license  
every 2 years.

Please help us ensure the  
safety of our students by being  
extra attentive and slowing  
down significantly when you  
pass a school bus on the road-  
way. A child's life is always de-  
pendent upon it.

**Great Response to CWD Public Meeting**

There was a great turnout last Thursday night at the White-tailed Deer Chronic Wasting Disease public meeting at the Tishomingo County Courthouse. MDWFP Private Lands Wildlife Biologist Don Chance gave an excellent presentation on how the disease affects and spreads in White-tailed Deer, MDWFP's response plan to help alleviate the spread of the disease, and the important role that hunters and conservationist serve in helping MDWFP with this issue. We would like to thank all the individuals from Tishomingo County and the surrounding areas that attended the meeting. We would also like to thank the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks, the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Tishomingo County Extension office for all their efforts to make this meeting possible.

**Scenes From The Last Chapter In The Bible (part XV)**

I will continue with my comments on Revelation 22:18-19: "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book: And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book." John was guarding against spurious writers who might seek to add something to what he had written, thus changing the meaning of his words. I do not think that he was saying that every person who would ever translate the Bible would be plagued if he did not use the exact wording that was used in the original writing, or the exact wording of our popular, beloved King James Version, for it has relied upon earlier translations for support, as is clearly stated by the King James translators. In the front of most King James Version Bibles we see the words: "Translated out of the original languages and compared and revised." If there were

to have been a plague on all of the translators before the King James translators, or after, then all such translators would have been filled with "the plagues mentioned in Revelation". Tyndale, Wycliffe, Martin Luther and many more would have suffered these plagues, for none of these translations have the exact same wording as our beloved King James Version. John is actually warning against those who would seek to change the meaning of what he had written by writing materials that would oppose the message of God in the Book of Revelation. The plagues that are in the Book of Revelation are too numerous to mention here, but there are many of them, thus those who would seek to dilute, destroy or change the word of God that John had written would suffer the judgment of God in the form of plagues that are named in the Book of Revelation. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John did not all use the same words to give the truth of God, yet they did not deny that truth. The King James translators said that they translated using a variety of words for the same Hebrew or Greek word. (See their notes "To the reader" in the front of

some King James Bibles.) These translators were not plagued for using different words that give the same truth, so the plagues would not be put on those who used different words, but on those who changed the meaning of what was written by the inspired writers. What preacher has not sometimes misquoted verses or passages, yet no plague came to such preachers, because they were not seeking to change the Word of God. Now we come to the matter of taking away from the words of the book of this prophecy, as Revelation 22:19 says. To take away would be to diminish the truths that are taught in the Book of Revelation, yet Deuteronomy 4:2 and 12:32 warn against adding to or taking from the law that Moses gave. The safe thing to say is that we should not add to or diminish from anything that is written within the books we call the Bible. I may need to say again that the Bible was not written as one volume, as we have it today, rather it was written as 66 different books, or letters, that were later put together, after careful study, by learned men. It was not until 367 AD that we had a list of the

twenty-seven New Testament books on which all the church agreed. The Old Testament was confirmed by the Jews much earlier than this, of course. The Jews' Bible has only twenty-two books in the Old Testament, yet they have all of the material as the thirty-nine books of the Christians' Old Testament. The Jewish Bible combines several books, such as the minor prophets, to make the number of books less, with the same material as our thirty-nine books. My only reason for giving this is to help us to recognize that the Bible we hold in our hands contains books of the New Testament that were agreed upon only in 367 AD and 397 AD, as to their inspiration. I am in full agreement that this list is correct, but there were many other books floating around in the days of the early church that vied for recognition as inspired writing, but they did not meet the tests of canonicity, meaning a rule by which to measure these books, thus they were not considered as inspired by the churches, at least after 367 AD. 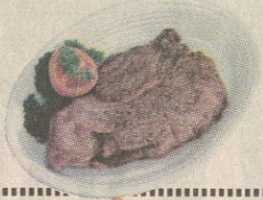

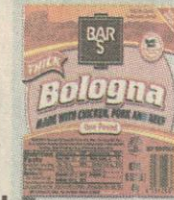

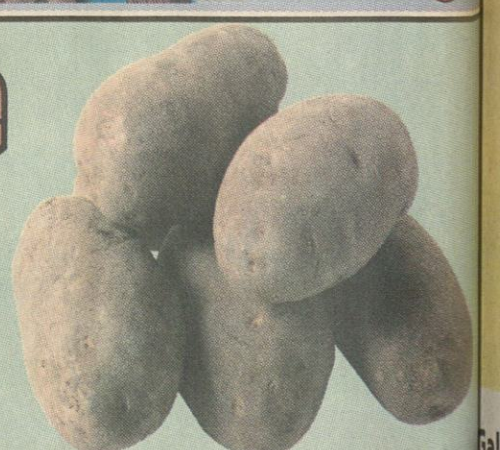
