If you prefer not to have your dog landscaping the yard with holes, you may want to try this. Digging occurs for many reasons but once digging starts, it can quickly become a habit. nor against the wind. A 3x6 foot area, 6 feet deep is sufficient to loosen the soil and mix in a little sand. Let your dog dig in the preparation of the pit. he joins in to help him with praise. The pit is ready, it gets your dog digging. ## Northeast Football Sets Open Tryout Date following Successful Signing Day

BOONEVILLE, Miss. - The Northeast Mississippi Community College football program just completed a sensational National Signing Day (NSD) by reloading its roster with more than 30 new players.

However, the Tigers are giving local athletes one last chance to show off their skills and potentially earn a spot on the team for the upcoming 2019 campaign.

Northeast has scheduled a tryout date for 1 p.m. on Friday, February 22. This session will take place on the practice field, which is directly behind the visitors bleachers of Tiger Stadium.

Registration will begin approximately one hour before the event starts on the practice field. There is absolutely no cost to enroll in Northeast's only open tryout this offseason.

All entrants must bring an up-to-date physical and sign a release of liability form, which is

available to download at nemccathletics.com. The tryout should last between one-to-two hours.

Each participant is expected to bring their own equipment, which includes but is not limited to athletic apparel, tennis shoes and cleats. Footballs sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) will be provided for use by Northeast.

Players should expect a combine-style format. All athletes will be tested at their respective positions through various exercises with the Northeast coaching staff overseeing each of these activities.

Among the possible tests for those attending the Tigers' tryout are one-on-one workouts, seven-on-seven drills plus measurements such as the 40-yard dash. Members from Northeast's most recent squad are slated to help with these auditions as well.

This tryout is only for

prospective student-athletes that are graduating high school seniors and have not signed a National Letter of Intent (NLI) with another institution of higher learning.

Northeast has an established reputation of producing elite athletes on the gridiron. That includes Sam Williams, who was selected as the 2018 NJCAA Defensive Player of the Year before inking with the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss).

The Tigers also have four players that are currently on National Football League (NFL) rosters, including Mario Addison at Carolina, Lavon Hooks in Pittsburgh, Daniel Ross at Dallas and Tennessee's Brynden Trawick.

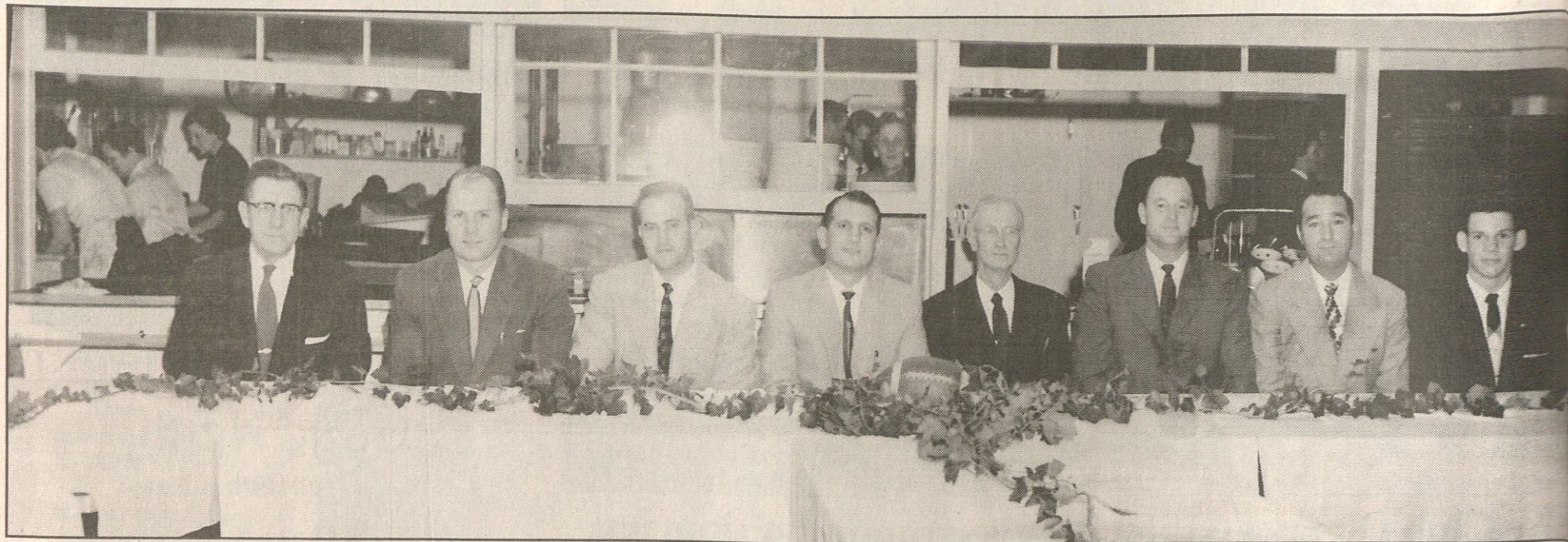

## CONSERVATION CORNER

### The Water Cycle

With all of the rain we have been receiving, you probably don't want to hear more about water. However, I thought this would be an appropriate time to discuss the water cycle and how it works.

Water covers three-fourths of the earth's surface. There are many forms of water—ice, snow, rain, hail, dew, fog and steam. The majority of this life source is sea water. It is from our oceans that most of our precipitation comes, although cleaned of its salt and minerals. So, how does this happen? Water moves from land to clouds to land and back to the ocean in an on-going cycle. This cycle is known as the water cycle, or the hydrologic cycle. Lets take a closer look at it.

Every year about 95,000 cubic miles of water evaporates from the oceans and land. This water evaporates into the atmosphere, leaving impurities behind. This evaporated moisture moves across the earth in

the form of water vapor. A small portion of this water vapor is visible to us as fog, mist or lowlying clouds. The water vapor then condenses, filling the clouds and then releasing back to the earth in one of the various forms of water depending on region, climate, season and topography.

When water falls to the ground, some of it soaks into the soil and the rest runs off. The water that is absorbed by the ground sustains plant and animal life in the soil. The rest finds its way into underground reservoirs where almost all of this water re-enters the water cycle, which then starts over.

Humans can do little to alter this cycle, however we can manage and conserve water as it becomes available. Water management begins with soil management. Because our water supply comes as precipitation falling on the land, the fate of its fallen form depends on the condition of the soil it reaches.

A rainstorm on bare soil loosens soil particles

and causes runoff, carrying the particles away. This is known as soil erosion. This repeated action ruins land for many uses and is the source of sediment that fills streams, pollutes water and shortens the useful life of dams and reservoirs.

In areas where much of the land is paved or covered, runoff occurs up to ten times faster than on unpaved lands. The water that falls here rapidly flows down storm drains and sewer systems carrying debris and other pollutants to nearby streams.

A human needs only a little over a gallon of water a day in order to fill his or her basic needs. Currently, however, we use close to 1,600 gallons each day to supply our needs and comforts which include cooling purposes, lawn maintenance and beautification, recreational endeavors and industrial supply.

The demand for water continues to rise as the population increases. This is precisely why quality management of precipitation is so vitally important.

Now that I am an adult, I have a wider range of knowledge and experiences, plus access to more historical information than ever before. In those days, information was necessarily restricted to network news programs, monthly magazines, and newspapers, and for the most part all you knew was what you were told. These days, any person can simply decide to learn about something, and using the internet, anyone can immerse themselves in any subject and investigate the whole truth. I began watching some of the videos online of Dr. King's speeches and interviews over the years, because I wanted to hear for myself what he believed and what he actually was encouraging people to do (and not do).

With February designated as Black History Month, I encourage everyone in the community to

investigate this important part of our shared history. I invite each of you to go to your local library, where you can use free public computers to gather information and draw your own conclusions. I especially urge those who, like myself, were children during those tumultuous years, because as an adult you now have the ability to fact-check your memories and opinions against the reality of the historical record. You may gain a new understanding of our society not only during that time, but also as it has been influenced even into today's current events.

At the Iuka Public Library, some of the more significant information is displayed just inside the doors on a bulletin board titled "Black in America: 400 Years of Historical Perspective." Everyone is invited to come and see if there is something new for you to learn. I know I did!

## Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 2)

We are looking at the writing of King Solomon as it is presented in the book of Ecclesiastes of the Bible. Ecclesiastes 3:4 says, "What profit hath a man of all his labour which he taketh under the sun? One generation passeth away, and another generation cometh: but the earth abideth for ever." I mentioned in the first article of this series that the Book of Ecclesiastes deals with "vanity", which means: "emptiness", in the lives of human beings. I suppose that I would get close to a one hundred percent agreement on the point that at least some of life is empty for all of us. Oh, there would be a few people with their heads still in the clouds and stars in their eyes who would say, "Life is always good; I just have to be positive." As positive as we may be, there are still the problems of finances, disease, death, boredom and discouragement for most people, even if a small percentage do escape some of these. The one problem that touches all humanity, at least at present, is the problem of death. I am a child of God; I do not fear my eternal destiny, for my trust is in Christ, yet I cannot say that I could ever fear the means of my death. I cannot say that I would be happy to hear the doctor say, "You have cancer." I can say, however, that my hope is not primarily in this life, though I do enjoy much of it, but my real hope is in the next life. Solomon was not writing basically about the next life however, but he was writing about the troubles of this life, so we will take a look at them and see what can be done to at least lighten the load somewhat.

The question that Solomon asked in verse three of our first chapter of Ecclesiastes was one that draws a negative answer, at least from most, for it is often hard to see much profit, reason or rhyme in many things that happen in life. Men and

women labor to provide for their families, yet the joy gained from simply working for a salary is not usually big enough to outweigh the hardships on the workers during the process. Solomon goes on to say that generation after generation of humans arise to populate the earth, yet they are not here forever, but the earth seems to be here on a permanent basis. Those who are believers in Christ and have read Scripture at least a fair amount know that even the earth itself, in its present form, will not be here eternally. So, what does one gain by beating himself silly trying to "get ahead in life", if it is all empty living from the beginning? This is the question to which Solomon would like to have an answer. We will see toward the end of this book that there is an answer, but we will have to hold that for later.

Solomon goes from teaching that the earth abides forever to other parts of God's creation. He speaks of the sun arising and setting; the wind whirling about and the rivers running into the sea without overflowing it (Ecclesiastes 1:5-7). Then in 1:8 he says, "All things are full of labour; man cannot utter it: the eye is not satisfied with seeing, nor the ear with hearing." With whatever beauty our eyes may see, we are never at the place to say, "I have seen enough; I no longer need my eyes." The same would be true of our ears. Solomon will walk us through the chapters of his book and tell us how empty things are, if we see only the natural side of life; then he will draw the right conclusion. Stay with me and we will finally see that life is not all empty, yet there is a

"formula" that we must follow to make life something other than empty!

**Supply List:**  
• approximately 3 yards of 100% cotton or 4 1/2 yards of flannel fabric (if you want to use three different fabrics, get 1 yard each of cotton fabrics or 1 1/2 yards each of flannel fabrics)  
• 1 1/2 yards of flannel to be used as the batting (can be any color that coordinates with the other fabrics)  
• Thread (can use any color to match your fabric)  
• Scissors and/or rotary cutter and 24" x 36" cutting mat (can use 18" x 24" but the larger one works better)  
• Fabric marking pen  
• Straight Pins  
• 6" x 24" ruler  
• Bobbin

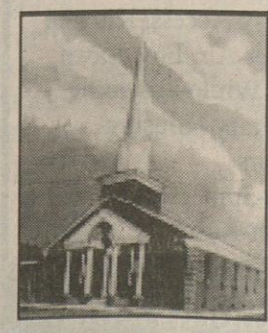

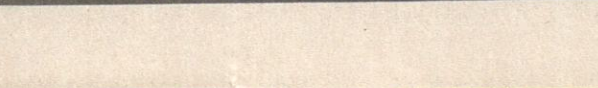
