

Tornado Hits Burnsville, Extensive Damage, Community Pulls Together to Help Neighbors

An outpouring of love and volunteer service was demonstrated by the members of Burnsville community and surrounding areas in the wake of the February 23rd tornado which occurred around 5 p.m. on Saturday evening. The Burnsville Chamber of Commerce would like to thank everyone who came out and helped those affected by the storm. The donations, support, and labor provided to those in need was an incredible display of humanity. Many first responders, departments, law enforcement, power company workers, churches, as well as individuals' willing help, stepped up to turn this devastation into an opportunity to make a difference in the lives of those around them. Many of our local leaders demonstrated servant leadership by showing up and getting their hands dirty for their neighbors, friends, and relatives. In this worst situation brought to the best in our community. The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency reported that in Tishomingo County an F0-2 Tornado touched down and this was confirmed by the National Weather Service out of Memphis. The initial reports indicate that 11 homes were damaged by the storm, along with 38 roads and two bridges in Tishomingo County alone. This was a vortex type tornado which had a main cyclone and other smaller clones circulating around it, this is an unusual occurrence for our area. Some of the Burnsville homes affected by the storm

were that of Bill and Betsy Hardin; the home of Jason and Camilla Puckett who had their 6 children home during the storm and the Lee family home. The Puckett family is not from the area originally and they expressed how thankful they are for the community who came to their aid. A family pet of the Puckett's, a chicken named "cluck cluck," survived the storm. The children were very excited about finding their pet alive and well in the aftermath of the storm. The whole family is truly thankful to have made it through this unharmed and they believe that God spared them. The Puckett's reported that Burnsville fire and rescue responded to their home within two minutes after the storm hit, they thought this was truly remarkable. At the home of Bill and Betsy Hardin whose home was destroyed on highway 72, around 75 church members came out to assist the family. Thoughts by Ferrin Rainey Burress, president of the Burnsville Chamber of Commerce: I have always seen and driven by storm damage from tornadoes, but until it hits your friends' homes or your hometown it really doesn't sink in how devastating it is. When I got there last night, I jumped out of the truck because traffic was backed up. I took off walking to get to one of my friends to check on her first. I had to stop because they were having to cut down a tree that was about to fall over the Hwy. Those of us standing there quickly rushed to start grabbing the tree limbs and remove it off the road to get traffic moving again. Once we got it moved off Hwy 72, I rushed

to check on Jill. When I saw she was ok, I just stood there looking at all the destruction on both sides. My adrenaline was rushing so much and I was wanting to help in so many directions, but I didn't know what to do. One of the first things was to make sure everyone was ok and according to Mayor David Nixon everyone was safe and no injuries. I immediately started thinking what next, what needs to be done. Running a chainsaw seemed like the biggest thing to do, but unfortunately I am not capable of doing that. I asked if we needed more chainsaws here from other people, but we were fortunate enough to have MANY responding rescue squads assisting and cutting back these trees that had fallen. My next thought was ok, let's keep these volunteers and service crews hydrated and fed because it is going to be a long night and days to come. This is where I love social media. I put a post on our Burnsville Chamber of Commerce page asking for water and snack donations for our volunteers working so hard. Within an hour the love from our community started flooding in. We had water and snacks to take around all night to the crews and will have supplies to continue today and days. Something else I saw last night that warmed my heart was a church family who came together and literally moved a fellow brother and sister in Christ out of their home within a few hours. They had an assembly line of trailers lined up with an assembly line of people moving everything out to protect what personal contents were left. This was a true definition of what Christian love is all about and

I love our little town and I love how we come together to show our support and love in a time of need. I pray this is something we do not have to experience for a very long time, but I know it did open my eyes to the love and support we have around us. Thank you again to everyone that brought donations last night and thank you to everyone that helped in anyway!! Please continue to pray for these families affected. I know the ones that experienced the storms who were at home when it hit are very upset and said this was something they never want to experience again. New Regulations Coming into Affect to Secure Tishomingo County Courthouse

The Tishomingo County Courthouse will soon be a safer, more secure public building for those working there as well as those visiting, ordered by the five judges of the First Circuit Court District and the Chancery Judges of the District. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff, John Daugherty, the judges recently signed an order addressing courthouse security for the protection of public employees who work at the court-

house, the attorneys, parties, witnesses and the general public during course of court business and sessions in the courtrooms and trials. The lobbies, hallways, witness rooms and chambers of the courthouse will be designated as entrances into and part of the courtroom and therefore, part of each courtroom. In compliance, the Sheriff's Department has hired a new Sheriff's Deputy, Chuck Dean, to be located at the entrance door of the

building during court sessions. The electronic screening device which has been at the door to the courtroom in the past, will be moved to the main front door of the courthouse and during any court sessions, no weapons of any kind, including firearms, handguns, pistols, rifles, shotguns, stun guns, knives and any other item that could be used as a weapon or pose a danger, will be prohibited from being brought into courthouse during the course of court business and sessions, except when in the possession of a sworn law enforcement officer. Backpacks, bags, briefcases, attaché cases and luggage of any kind will be prohibited from being brought into any courtroom, except in the possession of a sworn law enforcement officer, a public employee at the courthouse, attorneys and members of the staff, and members of the press. Sheriff Daugherty also added that the back door of the courthouse, located in

the basement, will be locked at all times. A buzzer will be installed at the back door and only handicap individuals will be permitted to enter this door. Those individuals will be let into the building by security if they have business at the facility. Dean, the newly employed Sheriff's Deputy, will be in the courthouse daily, but will only monitor those coming into the facility by the electronic scans when court is in session. This change at the courthouse will be gradual as new equipment is installed and should be completely in effect in the next month.

Tishomingo County Ranks Top Three In Economic Improvement Over The Past Ten Years

Each year in January the Mississippi Department of Revenue ranks each county based on unemployment rate and per capita income compared to the other 81 counties.

The improvement in employment and per capita income for Tishomingo County over the past ten years exceeds the economic improvement of all other counties in Mississippi except two.

Tishomingo County has created over 2,300 manufacturing jobs and over \$380,000,000 in private investment over the past ten years. Most of the new jobs have been created by smaller manufacturers that initially created 50 jobs or less but have grown over time.

Such small projects do not garner much media attention so Tishomingo County is rarely in the news. Most of the new and expanded projects, in addition, are located out of sight of major highways so even many citizens may not be aware of what is just over the hill or beyond the tree line.

However, the county has won a LOT of new and expanded small manufacturers, some of which now employ hundreds of new workers making everything from giant rocket parts, to recreational motor homes, to industrial grade silicon.

Southern Business & Development, the recognized authority on economic development in the southern USA, has rated Tishomingo County # 1 in the south for new manufacturing jobs per capita.

Tishomingo County has also won National Economic Development Awards in 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2018 and the county is repeatedly rated among the TOP THREE counties in the USA in cost efficient government by SmartAsset, a New York City financial services company.

Traffic Stop in Burnsville Leads to Drug Arrest

On February 20, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies conducted a traffic stop in Burnsville; Anthony Neal Modlin and Rhonda Gaye Peters were arrested for possession. The vehicle had left a residence that was under surveillance for drug activity. The deputies were able to stop the vehicle on Hwy. 72 and as they approached the vehicle, a strong odor of marijuana was coming from the vehicle. Deputies were able to speak with the driver and passenger and learned that the passenger had a warrant for

their arrest. A search was then conducted on the vehicle and some alleged methamphetamine was found behind the driver in the back-seat area. Both the driver and passenger were then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Anthony Neal Modlin, 54-year-old, white male, of 575 HWY 45 Corinth, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine). Modlin's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$3,500.00.

47-year-old, white female, of 15 CR 742 Walnut, Mississippi was also officially charged with the felony possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine). Peters' bond was also set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$3,500.00.

MDOC Warrant Leads to Additional Charges for Iuka Man

On February 20, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies spotted Brandon Michael Carter in a vehicle; he was known to be absconded from the Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC). A search of the

vehicle yielded some alleged methamphetamine which was found in a cigarette pack. Deputies then transported the individual to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Brandon Michael Carter, 37-year-old, white male, of 16A CR 483 Iuka, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine). Carter's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$10,000. Carter also has a hold placed on him by the Mississippi Department of Corrections for the outstanding warrant.

Notice from County Tax Assessor

It's that time of year again. January – March is the time of year when you are able to file for a Homestead exemption. When you come in to file there are a few things you will need.

1. Current Car Tag number
2. Copy of your Deed
3. Social Security number for you and your spouse if married.
4. Proof of Disability if filing for Disability Exemption.
5. Proof of age if filing for over 65 Year Exemption.
6. For Disabled Veteran Exemption- Proof of Disability and year awarded
7. If you have lost a spouse during the 2018 year you will also need to come and refile your Homestead. Please bring a copy of their death certificate and the above listed things for you to file your Homestead exemption.

Please make sure to come within these 3 months because this is the only time you are allowed to file for these exemptions. Also, for those people who are over 65 years old please make sure that we have your correct mailing address and phone number. Please contact our office at 662-423-7059 if you have any other questions. Thank you.

67 Mississippi Students Honored in Promote the Vote Awards Ceremony

Jackson, Miss.—Sixty-seven of the thousands of K-12 students who participated in 2018 Promote the Vote activities were recognized at the Mississippi Capitol today for high achievement in the arts and writing.

Promote the Vote is Secretary of State Delbert Hosemann's comprehensive K-12 voter education program. This year's program, which included a mock election and art and essay contests, asked students to contemplate how they may "Make a Difference in Mississippi" by voting and otherwise getting involved in their communities.

The art contest asked students to depict "Colors of My Community" by pretending they were an artist commissioned to draw a mural on a building in their hometown representing the place and people. The essay contest, called "We Have Business to Do!," called on entrants to choose one local industry and write an essay on how a business in that

industry can provide community support by connecting with or supporting their school by using the Secretary of State's Y'all Business website, www.yallbusiness.sos.ms.gov.

Seven artists across the State judged art entries, and nine journalists and professors judged essays.

"These students are our State's future leaders. Through Promote the Vote, we're able to support the people on the ground—our educators—in their mission to teach these students about how critically important it is for them to vote and get involved in their communities," Secretary Hosemann said.

For the first time in PTV's decades-long history, Mississippi Public Broadcasting's (MPB) Education arm partnered with the Secretary of State's Office to encourage school, teacher, and student participation. MPB hosted a mock election precinct contest, and recognized schools and classrooms with festive elec-

tion décor for their mock election. Two schools won prizes: Pearl Upper Elementary and Carthage Christian Academy.

"I applaud the Secretary of State's office for organizing this effort with schools emphasizing the importance of voting," MPB Executive Director Ronnie Agnew said. "Reaching our children while they are still children will yield results in the future. Through this program, I hope that all of the participating partners have gotten the message across to our kids that voting is a right that we simply must exercise."

Promote the Vote essay and art contest winners received \$100 (First Place), \$75 (Second Place), and \$50 (Third Place) provided by sponsor banks across the State, and free entry to the Mississippi Museum of History and Mississippi Civil Rights Museum. Teachers also received \$50 per winning entry to spend in their classrooms. Additionally, winning art en-

tries will be on display in Jackson State University's Downtown Gallery, 101 W. Capitol Street, from March 6-May 31.

Free to participating schools, Promote the Vote began in 1996. This year, more than 320 schools and about 70,000 students participated in Promote the Vote activities. The 2019 Promote the Vote program will kick off in August with a mock election for Governor and art and essay contests.



Biggest Liar in Tishomingo County

I love to go back and read in Dr. Ben Kitchen's book about the famous, or infamous, Harry Rhine, esquire. "Biggest liar in Tishomingo County", or so the book says.

Dr. Kitchens noted that Harry had migrated to Iuka from Booneville, but that he had spent some of his younger years with an Allen family in Tupelo. The Allen's may have been the family of Private John Allen, the Confederate soldier that served a lengthy spell in Congress as our representative. He had strong ties to Cumberland University where Harry was in school. The Booneville home of George E. Allen, I suspect, is where Harry Rhine finished his growing. George E. is one of Booneville's favorite sons; he left town some money and they built a library and named it for him (or is it after him).

Dr. Kitchens recounts Harry's telling of the famous football game between Cumberland and Georgia Tech. He says he was in school there at the time and it sounds like he was on the team. Tech won 222 to 0, still a record to this day. George E., in his senior year, goes into more detail about the game and how he played the team together. Tech was coached by the famous John Heisman, who later went in the trophy business and also the famous sportswriter Grantland Rice, who covered the game in Atlanta. Rice commented that the best play of the day was when George took a hand and only lost 6 yards. If Harry Rhine was in the game, which was the 1916 season, he would have been 33 years old, a bit mature for a college player, but not beyond range for claiming it.

Harry Rhine's ability to fabricate could well come from his association with the Allen family; Private John had it and so did George E. His book, "Presidents Who Have Known Me" is mindful of Harry Rhine.



I have heard speakers say, and have read writers' words, that tell us that everything that is on earth in the present has also been here in the past. Some of these writers and speakers have even said that jet planes have been used in societies perhaps thousands of years ago. Some of these people have based their suppositions on the verse above; others of them have been psychics or consultants with fallen angels and

demons, gathering their information from these sources. I do not happen to believe that Solomon is speaking about the former existence of everything that we have on earth or in the heavens today, for the context does not show that. It seems clear to me that Solomon is speaking about humanity and the actions of humans, along with the cycles of nature shown on the earth and in the heavens. When Solomon says that the thing that has been done is also going to be done again, he seems to be speaking of human actions; human emptiness and human dependence upon natural means to solve life's problems. I am saying this partly

because of the way Solomon ends the Book of Ecclesiastes, which we will see farther down the road in these articles.

When our writer says that what has been done is also that which will be done, he seems to be saying only that humanity does not seem to learn many lessons from generations past, thus each new generation seems to make basically the same mistakes as those who lived before us. To say it in a more modern choice of words: "History repeats itself". Someone has said that what we learn from history is that we do not learn anything from history, for we keep repeating the same mistakes of older

generations. Yes, we do have many good inventions that were not around hundreds of years ago, or even decades ago, but the way we respond to life's problems and seek to handle things on our own power and by his own wisdom is much as it has always been with men. In Ecclesiastes 1:10, Solomon goes on to say: "In there any thing whereof it may be said, See, this is new? It hath been already of old time, which was before us." So we see that the repetition of the actions, thoughts and sins of men have remained basically the same through the ages. Yes, there are new devices by which men may do wrong, but the basis of all wrong action is the lust of the flesh; the lust of the eyes and the pride of life, as is clearly stated in I John 2:16. Ecclesiastes 1:11 says, "There is no remembrance of

former things; neither shall there be any remembrance of things that are to come with those that shall come after." Our writer is not saying that history is never helpful, or that we cannot find any records of past actions of men, for we have a wealth of history. What he is saying is that man travels on the same old roads of loneliness, self-pity, sin and rejection of the ways of God, just like his ancestors have done for hundreds and hundreds of years. It would seem that somewhere humanity would learn that men cannot outsmart God; get away from his judgments against sins or improve on His way to live life. It does not seem to dawn on most people that only God has the solution to man's boredom and problems.

Wyatt Emmerich Report

The Trump organization withdrew from a project to build a luxury hotel complex in Cleveland, Miss., but the local partner, Chawla Hotels, is full steam ahead on the 18-acre \$20 million venture.

The Trump organization dropped out of the project because of politics, company president Donald Trump Jr. said in a five-person conference call. The media is all over them, so they are scaling back new projects and plans.

"Our father has the most important and powerful job in the world. We live in a climate where everything will be used against us, whether by the fake news or by Democrats who are only interested in presidential harassment and wasting everyone's time, barraging us with nonsense letters. We already have the greatest properties in the world and if we have to slow down our growth for the time being, we are happy to do it," Trump said.

Suresh Chawla had organized the call to ensure the best possible spin on the Trump withdrawal. For 15 minutes Donald Jr. praised the Chawlas, the project and Mississippi, and trashed the liberal mainstream media. There was some irony that he was talking to three people in the media chosen by Suresh to help him tell his story.

While on the call, my staff was yacking outside my office door. I had fun telling them to be quiet. "Could y'all keep it down? I'm trying to have a conversation with Donald Trump," I told them, which was technically correct.

Trump praised the Chawlas for not litigating and looked forward to a return to the Delta, maybe at the 2020 Delta Council meeting. "You guys know me. I'm a duck hunting, deer hunting, fishing kind of guy. I could probably quite easily move down to the Delta and have a pretty good time. You never have to twist my arm to eat that kind of food either. That is my style."

The Cleveland hotel was to be the first in the Scion group of luxury hotels throughout the country. Three other existing Chawla hotels were going to be converted to a new Trump mid-market hotel brand.

In a joint statement Dinesh and Suresh Chawla said, "We are honored to have had the opportunity to work with the Trump Organization. Don, Eric and the entire Trump Hotels team are fantastic people, and their family helped launch our path to the American Dream 30 years ago. Our product is far superior today to when we started and that is because of the time and expertise that Trump Hotels dedicated to us. We understand their position completely and are grateful for their professionalism. We hope that when the time is right, we can work with Trump Hotels again."

The Chawlas will carry on without the Trumps, going back to their original name, the Lyric Hotel.

The project hopes to benefit from the Blues Trail that runs through the Delta and the new Cleveland Grammy Museum as well as events at Delta State University.

Three buildings in the 11-building complex are nearly complete and five more are currently under construction. There will be a three-acre greenspace that can host a 7,000-person concert.

They also plan to form the Chawla Hospitality Academy at Coahoma Community College near Clarksdale to train students for all aspects of the hotel industry.

Chawla Hotels owns 17 hotels in the Delta. It was founded by V.K. Chawla, who passed away in 2015. His two sons, Dinesh and Suresh, are carrying on their father's dream. The family is an amazing success story personifying the American Dream.

In 1960, V.K. Chawla left India where he had been living in an internment camp as a refugee for nine years after the execution of his father and two brothers in a religious war. He moved to Germany where he received a PhD in environmental sciences. In 1964, he moved to Canada where he worked for the government.

In 1977 he moved his family to Greenwood and eventually opened Jackie's Food Center and a fried chicken restaurant that he and his wife Chander ran from 1977 to 1992. In 1989 they opened their first hotel, the former Comfort Inn of Greenwood. The company would eventually own and operate 17 hotels in the Mississippi Delta, employing more than 300 people.

The Emmerichs and the Chawlas go way back. As Suresh says, "Your father gave my father his first job in Greenwood and your mother gave my mother her first job as well."

The Trump-Chawla connection began in 1988 when V.K. Chawla boldly called Trump on the phone seeking funding. To everyone's surprise Trump called back.

V.K. proceeded to tell Trump that he had this bold idea to build first-class hotel accommodations in one of the poorest regions of the country, the Mississippi Delta. V.K. admitted to Trump he had been turned down by every bank all over the South that he had applied with. He went into great detail about how he had emigrated to this county in 1977 and all he was trying to do to work his way up and be a successful entrepreneur like Trump. He asked Mr. Trump if Trump would loan him \$425,000 to build his first hotel.

Trump declined to invest, but said V.K.'s story of coming to America was wonderful and he should be proud of his success. Trump suggested seeking alternative financing. They talked for nearly 10 minutes.

The conversation inspired V.K. to seek a Small Business Administration loan. It was the start of a tremendous success story.

Fast forward to December 2016 when Suresh and Dinesh announced plans for a full-service hotel in Cleveland.

Trump was planning a campaign stop in Jackson and Gov. Phil Bryant, an ardent Trump supporter, urged Suresh to be there.

The governor introduced Suresh to Trump, listened to the Chawlas' latest project and encouraged him to "think grand." The Chawlas nearly doubled the scope of the plan - to \$15 million.

The Trump organization, which was being run by the president's sons, reached out to the Chawlas. After three months of negotiations, they formed a partnership to form a new luxury hotel chain, the first three of which would be existing Chawla hotels that would be converted to the new brand.

The story had come full circle.

Last week Suresh called me and urged me to join a conference call with Donald Jr., Suresh, Scott Coopwood with the Delta Business Journal, and Jack Weatherly with the Mississippi Business Journal. Suresh was seeking my help in getting the word out that the Trumps' withdrawal was political, not economic.

Donald Jr. went overboard praising the Chawlas and the Cleveland project. But his father is under constant scrutiny about every business dealing and their family ventures had to be secondary to the presidency.

Interestingly enough, the Chawlas are not the only Indian immigrant family that my family is close to. Doc Sethi fled India's religious strife in 1968 and started over in Greenwood. He and his wife Raksha became dear friends of my parents. The Chawlas and the Sethis have made Mississippi a better place. Their success is why the United States should expand legal immigration and welcome ambitious people from around the world who hope to make better lives for themselves and their families. This is especially true now that declining birth rates will cause U.S. population declines without outside immigration.

ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF BURNSVILLE, MISSISSIPPI DESIGNATING INDUSTRIAL USE AND DEVELOPMENT AREA WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF BURNSVILLE, MS

Whereas, the Board of Aldermen, at their regularly scheduled Board meeting passed by unanimous vote to draft and pass an ordinance designating specific areas with the Town Limits of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi to be designated and set-aside for Industrial Use and Industrial Development Areas for the specific purposes of regulating traffic, developing infrastructure necessary to continue growth in the local and regional economies and to provide specific areas in which industrial tenants are allowed to conduct their business activities without any interference from the ordinary business being conducted in the civilian environment and for the specific purpose of establishing an orderly and defined development of industrial activities within the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi. Be it Ordained that the Mayor and Board of Alderman for the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi does therefore ordain as follows:

Be it ordained that the term "industrial use" is defined as the use of land and available resources for the manufacturing, remanufacturing, building, mining, processing of raw materials into finished goods, processing of raw materials into products which will be resold, warehousing of finished products for shipment, re-shipment, import or export, warehousing or stockpiling of raw materials for use, shipment, processing or export, or other industrial endeavors with the primary end being the use of land for the production of a good, product or resource into a form for commercial sale, transport, retail sale, wholesale or export. It is ordained that all businesses which require the use of railroad spur, waterway port, transport truck and trailer for the delivery of raw material or transport of a finished good is deemed as engaging in an industrial use activity for the purposes of this ordinance. It is further ordained that all land uses and industrial activities which create the emission of dust, gas, smoke, noise, fumes, odors, vibrations or other objectionable influences are deemed to be engaged in an industrial use of land for the purposes of this ordinance. It is further ordained that industries which create or use large amounts of water in processing or discharge large amounts of water as by-products through the sewer system are deemed to be engaged in an industrial use per this ordinance. It is further ordained that the use of blast furnaces, steel works, rolling and finishing of ferrous metals, iron and steel foundries, primary smelting, refining of non-ferrous metals and similar activities are deemed to be engaged in an industrial use for the purposes of this ordinance. It is further ordained that the manufacture, processing and creation of concrete and concrete by products, cement and cement by products, asphalt and asphalt by products, mining of raw materials from the earth are deemed to be activities which are industrial in nature and create an industrial use for the purposes of this ordinance.

Be it further ordained that "industrial development" is defined as the use of land, buildings and available resources and the construction of suitable structures and infrastructure and transportation resources for the purposes of advancing the industrial use of land as defined in this ordinance.

Be it further ordained that all industries, business or individuals engaging in industrial use or industrial development as defined herein above shall be located in the area designated in this ordinance as the "industrial park" area of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi. The industrial park zoned area for the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi is that area located south of U.S. Highway 72 within the Town of Burnsville incorporation limits and east of County Road 219 until it intersects with Mississippi Highway 365 and east of Mississippi Highway 365 and being bounded on the East boundary by the statutory boundaries of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway within the incorporation limits of the Town of Burnsville as outlined in the attached Map which is deemed to be a part of this ordinance as if copied herein in full in words, figures, metes, bounds and calls and that land mass which is the existing Yellow Creek Port South which also lies within the incorporation limits for the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi. The Industrial Park zoned area is more specifically described in the legal description attached hereto as exhibit "a" and to be considered as if copied herein in words, figures, calls, metes and bounds.

Be it further ordained that any requested use or location of a facility which engages in an industrial use as defined herein and which deviates from the defined areas defined herein shall be considered by the Mayor and Board of Alderman on a case-by-case basis. It is further ordained that the party requesting a variance shall file a petition or letter request with the Clerk of the Town defining the specific activity in which the applicant intends to engage in; why the activity they intend to engage in does not meet the definition of an industrial use and why the Mayor and Board of Alderman should grant the variance and allow the location of their activity outside of the area defined as an "industrial use area" under the definitions included in this ordinance.

Be it further ordained that this ordinance will become binding thirty (30) days after the passage of this ordinance and the same shall be published in a paper of general circulation in Tishomingo County, Mississippi

Elizabeth Edmonds Avery Meriwether was born in Bolivar, Tennessee on January 19, 1824 to Nathan and Rebecca Jones Rivers Avery. Her father was a physician-farmer and her mother was the daughter of a Virginia planter. She was a happy union and they had three sons - Avery, in 1857.

Elizabeth Avery Meriwether lived in Memphis when the Civil War began. She was married and had two small boys. Her husband, Minor, joined the Confederate Army and left her there. The Union Army moved into the city in 1862, and there was a picket's post set up close to her front gate. She writes in her autobiography about an incident that occurred in 1862. (She was also pregnant at this time.):

I saw two soldiers leading our cow out of the back lot and it worried me greatly. Milk was the chief article of food for my two little boys. What could I give them in place of milk? This question bothered me all day. Then towards night, when the children began to clamor for their supper, a bold plan occurred to me. I took my two little boys by the hand, Avery the elder, carrying a bucket in his hand, and we three marched down

to the picket post by the gate. Around a smoldering fire were a dozen or so soldiers.

"Good evening, soldiers," I said politely. "I have come to ask you to be kind enough to give me some milk for my children's supper. Our cow is a fine milker; she gives nearly a gallon at milking, night and morning. A quart will do for my little ones."

For a moment there was a dead silence; the men stared at me but spoke no word. I began to fear my boys would go to bed supperless. Then one of the soldiers broke out into a good natured laugh.

"Of course, the little Rebs shall have some milk for their supper," he said. "What do you say, boys?"

"Sure, let 'em have some," cried a chorus of voices.

"Gimme your bucket, Sonny," said the first speaker; little Avery stared at the big bearded soldier as he handed him the tin bucket. The soldier patted the child on the head. "I've got a little shaver at home," he said, "a boy just about this one's age...."

We waited at the gate and very soon the soldier came back with the tin bucket full of milk. "Thank you very much," I said gratefully. "May I have some every day?"

"Sure you may. Bring your bucket every morning and evening. I'll fill it for you."

From that time on, the soldiers kept Elizabeth's boys supplied with milk from her cow. That is until Union Gen. William Sherman* had her and her two boys thrown out of Memphis. Sherman had decreed that he would banish the wives of 10 Confederate officers if the Rebels didn't stop shooting at his gunboats on the Mississippi River.

They didn't stop, and Elizabeth Meriwether was on the list. Elizabeth was almost nine months pregnant and went to Sherman to plead to be allowed to stay until after she gave birth. As she wrote later, Sherman looked at me coldly and said, "I am not interested in rebel wives and rebel brats. If you don't leave Memphis in three days you will be locked up in the Irving Block (a prison) as long as the war lasts."

Elizabeth left Memphis with her two young children in the cold and snow, driving a wagon pulled by a mule. When

she went into labor, Elizabeth found someone to take her into their home, but she had to give birth by herself, stopping to get up and put more wood on the fire when it got low. Fortunately, both she and her third son, Lee, survived the ordeal.

When the indomitable Meriwether was banned from her home by Union soldiers because her husband was a Confederate officer, she spent two years bartering for food and shelter for herself and young sons.

After the war Minor Meriwether purchased a modest Memphis home for his family on the current site of the Peabody Hotel.

Elizabeth Meriwether nettled occupation forces to reinstate the title to her girlhood home, successfully arguing that her 1851 "abolitionist" stand invalidated its seizure. Thus recognized as a property owner and tax payer, she obtained a voter registration in 1872.

She published a small-circulation newspaper, *The Tablet*, during part of 1872. It featured her unorthodox views on women's suffrage, divorce law, and pay equity for women teachers. In 1876 she made one of the first public suffragist addresses in Memphis. Elizabeth and her sister-in-law, Lide Meriwether, championed a number of reform causes.

Elizabeth Meriwether's published writing includes two novels, *The Master of Red Leaf* (1872) and *Black and White* (1883), and a play; non-fiction works include *Facts and Falsehoods About the War on the South* (1904), published under the pseudonym George Edmonds, and *The Sowing of the Swords, or The Soul of the 'Sixties* (1910). An informal memoir, *Recollections of 92 Years*, was serialized in many Tennessee papers in 1916 and was published by her son Lee in 1958. Meriwether's writing idealized the Confederate cause of the "Old South."

Elizabeth Meriwether died in St. Louis on November 4, 1916; several months earlier, each of the major political parties had adopted campaign planks urging passage of a woman suffrage amendment.




