Grand Ole Opry Star of Burnsville Pete Pyle Honored at the Old Courthouse Museum in Iuka

The Old Courthouse Museum in Iuka has a display of memorabilia of Pete Pyle's musical career for visitors to view. The display is just one of many items on display at the museum. The museum is located at 203 East Quitman Street in Iuka and is open Tuesday- Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Everyone is invited to come out and see the rich

and wonderful history related to Tishomingo County.

Pete Pyle was the son of James E. Pyle and Sudie Ann Whitaker Pyle. Born on a farm in Burnsville, Pete went on to be the first Grand Ole Opry member solo artist from the state of Mississippi. He was inducted into the Opry in November of 1940. Pete was a major label re-

cording artist, singer, songwriter and musician.

One of the photos on display is Pete's original group from Burnsville with Floyd and Alvin Marlar. They traveled and performed live shows and did radio programs in Mississippi and

Small Fire Reported Near Iuka Elementary School

Pete Pyle

Alabama. Pete, as a solo artist, was known for radio programs with WJOI in Florence, Alabama, WLPB in Birmingham, Alabama, WMSD in Sheffield, Alabama, and WMPS, WHBQ and WMC in Memphis, Tennessee. At that time, Pete became a recording artist with RCA on the Bluebird label. One of his first hits was "Little Blue Eyed Blond Goodbye". Pete soon moved



to Nashville, Tennessee and was on WSIX and WLAC and had 2 to 3 shows per day. His records were in high demand and his radio programs were a great success. Jack Stapp, manager of the Opry at the time, asked Pete to join. He had his own WSM morning radio program. He also traveled with Uncle Dave Macon on the Opry road show during the week, and was featured on the Opry as a country love song artist. At that time, the Opry was mostly considered hillbilly and bluegrass music.

While performing as a solo artist Pete was approached by Bill Monroe, who asked him to travel and play with his musical group. This began Pete's dual music career as Bill's lead guitarist and singer, while also maintaining his solo spot on the Opry. In addition, Pete continued to record his own solo records with RCA as well as recording with the Bluegrass Boys.

At the height of his career he was drafted into the army. During the war Pete's records were playing on radio and juke boxes all over the United States. Little Roy Wiggins, also a member of the Opry, said "Pete's records was selling so well, that they ran out of material to make his records." The real reason they couldn't fill the demand for Pete's records was because the material used to make records was needed for the war effort. RCA had a big record deal for Pete to record 20 consecutive records, but Pete had to decline due to his commitment to the army.

After returning from the army Pete joined Pee Wee King and the Golden West Cowboys. He was featured as the lead singer in the trio. Pete said he valued his time with Pee Wee King, but wanted to complete his original plans of forming his own band. So, Pete formed his band, the Mississippi Valley Boys, and continued his career with the Grand Ole Opry and traveling with his band. Pete's success grew, but eventually his health began to decline. He traveled many years with his friends like Ernest Tubbs, Minnie Pearl, Grandpa Jones, and Little Jimmy Dickens. He helped Bill Monroe open up his Bean Blossom Jamboree in Indiana.

Eventually, Pete's health halted his traveling. A lot of people thought he died. During this time Pete continued writing songs and spending time with his family which had grown to 10 children. In the late 70's Pete began going back to the Grand Ole Opry more often and doing shows with old

friends. It was also in the late 1970's that historians began to research and write books about the early days of country music and the men and women who paved the way for the Grand Ole Opry we have today. Pete has been included in many books, documentaries, and information located at The Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville, TN and the Smithsonian institution in Washington, DC.

Pete had a natural talent for song writing. His songwriting abilities helped countless country music artists advance their careers. Over the years, between shows at the Opry, he became well known for selling his songs for 5 or 10 dollars at Tootsie's bar. No one can accurately assess just how many songs Pete wrote because, in many instances, he was never given recognition for his songs. Some of these songs became big hits, and he never received credit for writing them. Despite this fact, he never regretted helping his friends. He said his mother taught him, "A friend is worth more than a dollar".

In 1995, Pete passed away. His legacy lives on in the many songs that he wrote over the years, including "Highway of Sorrow", "True Life Blues" and other musical numbers recorded by Bill Monroe, as well as "Lovin' Lies" recorded by Little Jimmy Dickens, Porter Wagner, George Jones, Willie Nelson, Don Gibson and many others over the years. Pete's songs were from the heart, either from personal experience or from a story someone told him. Some of the songs written by Pete are still being played all over the world. Over the years, he recorded with Columbia Records, Decca Records, on the Bullet label and with RCA on the Bluebird label.

Along with the many triumphs Pete achieved over the years, recently his name was placed on a historical land marker in Nashville, Tennessee. He has been approved for a personal historical land marker to be placed in his home town of Burnsville, Mississippi, as part of the Mississippi Country Music Highway. Currently, the state is waiting for a committee to be appointed and for funding to be allocated before the marker can be erected. In addition, Pete was inducted into the Mississippi Musicians Hall of Fame in Jackson, Mississippi in 2017 and his heirs received an award for his achievements.

Local Man Arrested for Breaking and Entering and Possession of Stolen Property

On March 2nd Christopher Nunnelee was arrested by the Iuka Police Department for possession of stolen property and breaking and entering in more than one location.

According to Chief of Police Randy Stringer, Mr. Nunnelee was spotted at residences both on Bonds Drive and Pleasant Hill Rd. after break-ins had occurred. Reports were made to the Iuka P.D. after a homeowner noticed

their vehicle had been vandalized. It was later discovered that several of the stolen items from the different locations were found at the residence where Nunnelee had been staying.

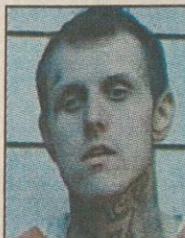

Drug Investigation Leads To Arrest

On March 3rd deputies with the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office arrested Christopher Clance, due to an investigation. Clance is accused of delivering illegal narcotics to another person at a business in Iuka. When Clance arrived at the business, deputies immediately arrested him and during a search, deputies found a bag of alleged methamphetamine. Clance was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

24-year-old, white male, of #4 Farmington Arms Apartment Farmington, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of controlled substance with intent to sell (methamphetamine). Clance's bond was set by Justice Court at \$5,000.

It's that time of year again. January - March is the time of year when you are able to file for Homestead exemption. When you come in there are a few things you will need.

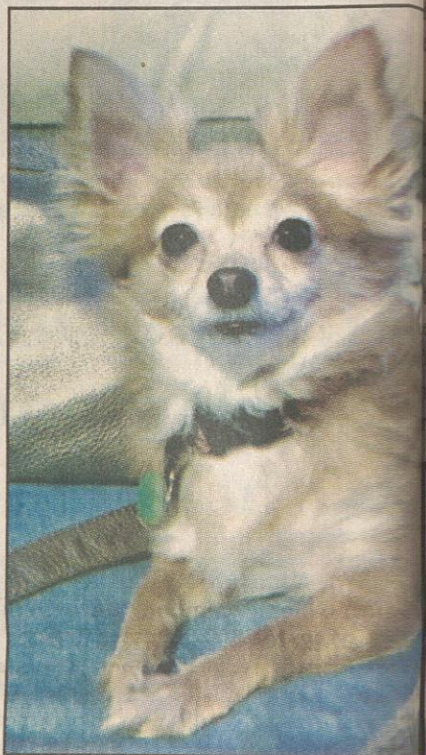
1. Current Car Tag number
2. Copy of your Deed
3. Social Security number for you and your spouse if married.
4. Proof of Disability if filing for Disability Exemption.
5. Proof of age if filing for over 65 Exemption.
6. For Disabled Veteran Exemption Proof of Disability and year awarded.
7. If you have lost a spouse during 2018 year you will also need to bring a copy of their death certificate and the above listed things for you to file your Homestead exemption.

Please make sure to come within these 3 months because this is the only time you are allowed to file for these exemptions. Also, for those people who are over 65 years old please make sure that we have your correct mailing address and phone number. Please contact our office at 662-423-7059 if you have any other questions. Thank you.

Tishomingo Inmates receive Certificates of Completion Addiction Recovery

Families First for Mississippi Field (FFFM) Educator Tony Corrie presents part of four days every week in a correctional facility. He likes being there because he is an addiction Education and recovery (AER) educator. He teaches classes in the Tishomingo County Jail, the Lee County Jail and the Alcorn County Correctional Center.

Two of his students are excited that they have just received their Certificates of Completion for a ten-hour course in addiction recovery. Sarah Thompson and Shayna Ballard are currently residents in the Tishomingo County Jail. They entered the classes voluntarily and are hopeful about their future with the progress they have made.

Tony explained that other residents sometimes do not have time to complete the course program while in residence because they are sometimes only there for a very short period of time. Many of these will continue classes at one of the FFFM centers after release, understanding that the completion certificate not only provides proof of commitment to recovery to judges, district attorneys or probation officers, but can also aid in securing employment and a better future.

These classes are also taught by the AER team at Northeast MS Community College, Itawamba Community College, the

Baptist Association Office and at the Family Resource Center in Fulton. Some of these students in these locations are part of a diversion program through the court system. This program is collaborative system between the judicial and associated agencies to reduce the number of incarcerations. The aim is to replace confinement with a constructive recovery program to introduce and keep recovery strategies in place and keep people working to support their families and homes.

Tony Corrie may be in "jail" but he is there because he cares. He works with a whole team that cares. Dr. Collin Billingsley heads the AER and Kim Benefield is the assistant director. They support a team of educators with plans to take the program statewide. Currently, the addiction education portion includes education to the youth with team members teaching in schools and in youth organization groups.

As a field educator, Tony provides life improvement education in several different areas. He also teaches life skills: parenting, conflict resolution, fatherhood and workforce development. Families First for Mississippi is committed to addressing needs in the state. Addiction education is one of those needs.

PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE FOR INITIAL HEARING

Tishomingo County is considering applying to the Mississippi Development Authority for a Small Cities Community Development Block Grant of up to \$600,000 for a Public Facility/ Water Improvements project. The State of Mississippi has been allocated approximately \$24 million that will be made available to cities, towns, and counties on a competitive basis to undertake eligible community development activities. These funds must be used to benefit low-and moderate-income persons.

The activities for which these funds may be used are in the areas of public facilities and economic development. More specific details regarding eligible activities, program requirements, and the rating system will be provided at a public hearing which will be held at the Tishomingo County Board room at 1008 Battleground Drive, Iuka, Mississippi on March 25, 2019 at 4:00 P.M. The purpose of this hearing will be to obtain citizen input into the development of the application.

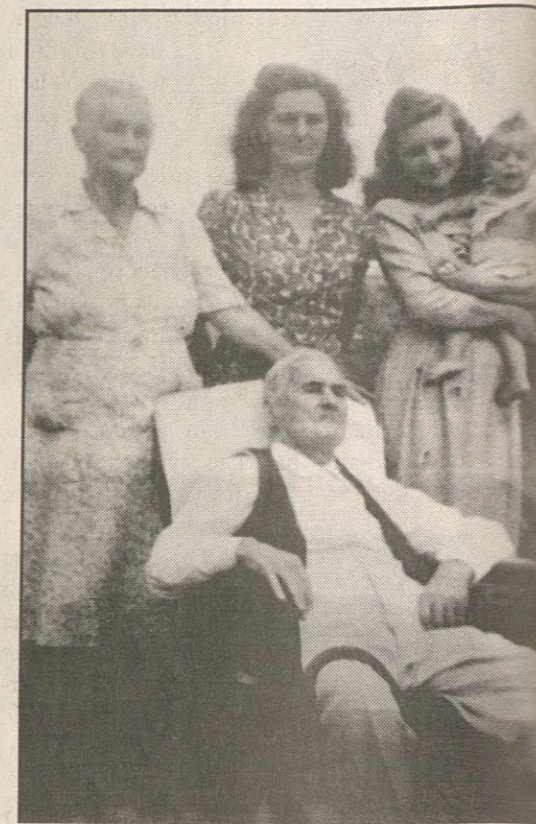


The Shackelford Family of Paden, MS

A True Story About Tommy Cadle and his Aunt Francis

My home was Paden, a small town in Tishomingo County. Booneville seemed to me, a city with many exciting things to do. Dexter, Tommy's Dad would drive me to my classes at Northeast. The Cadle family had a big new shiny car that that I loved, and Dexter had a heart even bigger than his car.

During this time, I met some very nice young people from Booneville to see socially. To my surprise, they were allowed to go all the way to Corinth on a date! In Paden, my friends and I were only allowed to go to Tishomingo to on Saturday nights - three whole miles away!

One weekend, I was invited by some of my new friends to go to Corinth to a party. They had set me up with a blind date.

Master Tommy was quite inquisitive about my plans as he watched me preparing for my exciting night in Corinth and began to question me about the date. My recollection of the evening goes something like this:

Tommy "Just what is a date, Aunt Francis?"

I explained as best I could that boys and girls go on dates together. That is the way to find a husband or wife and fall in love.

Tommy "Did my Mom and dad go on dates with other people first?"

Francis "Yes, they did. They were very popular and had lots of dates with others first. Your Mom was beautiful and your Dad was handsome. When they met and began to date each other, they fell in love"

Tommy "How many dates does it take to fall in love?"

Francis "I don't know. I haven't found out yet as I've never had many dates. By the way, Tommy, I'll be meeting a blind date tonight."

Tommy "A blind date? Why didn't you get one that could see?"

Francis "Well, see, my friends planned this date for me. I will be his blind date when I get to Corinth."

Tommy "You will go blind too? You need to get some new friends!"

Francis "Well, a blind date only means you have never seen each other before."

Tommy "Where do you go on dates?"

Francis "A movie is a good place to go. You could fall there."

Tommy "Fall? That sounds dangerous! I know a little boy who went to a movie and he fell and broke his leg. Anyway, I

don't know why a blind man would go to a movie. He couldn't see it, but he could sure stumble on something and break his leg."

Francis "I have to go now. My friends are here."

Tommy "I'll be waiting up for you to find out about that blind date."

Sure enough, there he was at the door grinning from ear to ear when I returned from the big night out in Corinth with the blind date.

Tommy "Did you fall?"

Francis "No, but my date did."

Tommy "How did he fall? Did he stumble over something?"

Francis "He was trying to dance with me."

Tommy "Did he get hurt?"

Francis "No, he was too drunk to feel any pain."

Tommy "Drunk? Blind, drunk and falling down, too? What did you

do with him?"

Francis "The boys laid him on a table."

Tommy "Will you date him?"

Francis "Heavens, no. I don't like him. He won't remember me anyway. He was to drunk. He said they brought the wrong girl. He expected someone more beautiful."

Tommy "But Aunt Francis, you ARE beautiful! He was dumb being blind and drunk too."

Francis "Now Tommy, don't tell your Mom and Dad anything I have told you. They won't let me go anywhere else when I'm here. If you tell them, I will say that it's not true, now goodnight."

The next morning, I heard him telling him Mom and Dad everything, plus he added his own opinions about what should be done.

As I was walking into the kitchen, he looked up at me and said, "Hi, Aunt Francis. You are right!

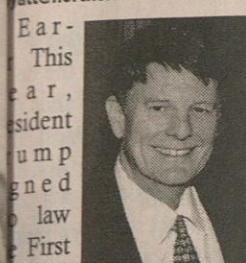

As a result, our prisons are gang factories. Once in prison, you have to join a gang for protection. When you get out, you are a gang member, forced into a life of crime. What an irony. Prisons are designed to decrease crime but they are doing the exact opposite.

Low pay for guards is a key problem. This makes it easy for the gangs to recruit the guards.

Private prison companies can cut costs by letting the gangs do the work of maintaining order. In return, the gangs get the contraband franchise - a money making machine. The gangs now have the ability to seamlessly operate both inside and outside the prison system.

Drive-by shootings for no purpose? Probably a gang initiation. Most murders are gangs fighting for drug turf. Just look at Mexico to see what happens if you let the gangs get the upper hand. We must nip this in the bud or the battle will be much harder down the road. It is a threat to our civilized society.

When Chicago gangland warfare spun out of control, our society was forced to abandon Prohibition. Similarly, we must begin the process of decriminalizing drugs. Profits from illegal drugs fuel the gangs. And just as bad moonshine killed thousands, street drugs are deadly, killing tens of thousands.

The War on Drugs was admirable in its intent but the cure has proven worse than the disease. This 50-year experiment has failed.

We must begin to see addiction for what it is: A disease and treat it accordingly. Just Google "drug reform in Portugal." There's the road map.

My cousin Brent Hardy is a defense attorney in a small city in Texas, Boerne. He lives and breathes this every day. This week he sent me the following email. His politics are as conservative as they come, but his indictment of our current criminal justice system is scathing:

Wyatt:
I read your column about criminal justice reform, and I felt compelled to observe it as among the most concise, persuasive arguments I have read in support of changing the status quo.

Sadly, we face the same problem in Texas. I have seen countless clients sentenced to years in prison because of addiction.

It may surprise some that, when they first appear before the court, they are typically granted probation. But one of the conditions of probation is abstinence from drug use. With little (or sub-standard) assistance from the state, they invariably relapse. This is, after all, what addicts do.

So they are sent to prison as punishment for violating their probation. After sufficient expenditure of tax dollars and passage of time, they will ultimately be released.

No one, of course, should expect these «ex-cons» to be the same people getting released from prison as those who went in. In addition to everything learned and experienced while there, they are now emblazoned with a contemporary Scarlet Letter. They are now known as «convicted felons» so they are virtually unemployable and, in

many cases, they will be ineligible for public assistance. It should surprise no one that they return to the only friends, neighborhood, and drugs they have ever known.

They will, almost inevitably, be arrested again. But this time, their request for probation will fall on deaf ears (since they performed so poorly on their first attempt). So they will be sentenced to even more years in prison (to teach them a lesson), and they will someday be released, and return to their friends, and the giant wheel of «justice» will keep turning.

As a taxpayer, I am outraged by the waste of money. As a human and a Christian, I am overwhelmed with sadness for the loss of so many joyous experiences that have been squandered. Instead of remaining free to pursue life's wondrous opportunities, these people are doomed to live and die in poverty and loneliness.

As I see it, our current laws produce the very thing which is feared to result from drug addiction!

If it were the plot of the movie, I would discourage people from seeing it as «just too stupid to believe.»

Officials Concerned as Giant Salvinia Spreads

JACKSON - The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks' Fisheries Bureau (MDWFP) reports that Giant Salvinia, an aggressive, invasive nonnative plant, has now been found in Pickwick, Bay Springs, Columbus, and Aberdeen Lakes, Ross Barnett Reservoir and the Pascagoula River marsh. Most recently it was found at Lake Okhissa, a US Forest Service lake near Bude, MS.

"Since this plant has been found in several lakes at boat ramp sites, we believe that boaters are accidentally introducing it as it washes off their boat trailers," said Fisheries Biologist Dennis Riecke. "This is a very serious situation because once aquatic invasive species are released into our natural waters, they are very difficult and expensive to control."

Millions of dollars are being spent in Louisiana to spray and kill Giant Salvinia populations. If a water body becomes completely covered with it, boating and fishing becomes impossible.

"Anglers and boaters can help stop the spread of all aquatic plants by inspecting their boats and trailers for aquatic plants after each use," Riecke added.

It is illegal to release or cause to be released either intentionally or accidentally any aquatic species into the waters of the state.

Pursuit Leads Into Alabama

On March 6, Curtis Collins was arrested in Colbert County, AL after a pursuit which began in Tishomingo County. Deputies from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department attempted to stop a vehicle that was traveling west bound on Hwy. 72 for a switched tag. The vehicle refused to stop for the deputies and continued on eventually turning south onto Hwy. 25. As the vehicle was traveling south on Hwy. 25, deputies reported that the driver of the vehicle was swerving on the road ways, and crossing into the opposite lane. Deputies also report that the driver began throwing things from the vehicle as it continued down Hwy. 25.

The vehicle then turned onto County Road 957, heading east toward Alabama, where deputies were able to get in front of the vehicle. The suspect vehicle pulled alongside of the patrol vehicles; it appeared he may have been attempting to ram his vehicle into the deputies' patrol car.

As the deputies approached the Alabama state line on County Road 957, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office began making contact with the Colbert County Alabama Sheriff's Office informed them of the situation. The suspect's vehicle began having mechanical issues and pulled over. The driver of the ve-

hicle then jumped out and ran into the woods. Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies secured the vehicle and the other occupants. They then pursued the driver into the woods. A firearm was found where the driver exited the vehicle and was recovered by the officers. Deputies found the driver in the woods where he was seen by medical personnel as a precaution and was then detained by the Colbert County Sheriff's deputies and transported to their facility.

Curtis Collins, 28-year-old, white male, of Cherokee, Alabama was detained by Colbert County Sheriff's Office. Collins is currently out on a felony bond due to recent felony charges in Tishomingo County and is also a convicted felon. Collins has agreed to be extradited back to Tishomingo County, where he will face multiple felony charges. The other occupants of the vehicle were later released to their perspective homes.

This incident is still under investigation and updates will be made available once Collins has been processed by Tishomingo County authorities.

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 4)

Perhaps he had not heard the professors of higher learning, as they had thrown out their logic of how education would bring desired ends to the longings of those who earn degrees from their institutions. Please keep in mind that I am for education, and even obtained a little of it myself, but the history of the world, as well as current events, has shown us that education alone is not the answer to the fulfillment of mankind's desires. Nobody in Solomon's day, or since, has been able to gain more wisdom than that which God gave to Solomon, but wisdom coupled with education still does not provide all the answers to man's emptiness and how to fill it. The whole book of Ecclesiastes shows the emptiness (vanity) of living life without God, yet most people still have not

learned this important lesson!

Solomon wanted to learn why things work the way they do on earth, or under the heavens, so he set out to learn the answer. Man lives on earth with much travail and hardship, yet he does not seem to be able to "break the mold" that will fit the next generation into the same situations. When Solomon had seen all the work that God Himself had done on earth, or under the sun, he concluded that the whole of human life on earth is vanity and vexation of the human spirit. Our word "vanity" means: emptiness, and our word "vexation" means: a grasping after. So, Solomon is saying that life on earth is empty and can never give man what he is seeking to obtain. That sounds a bit dismal, to say the least, but life on earth has proven to be exactly what Solomon has said, unless one learns the real reason for life, which Ecclesiastes will show later.

Conservation Corner Turkey Hunting Safety

Warm weather is upon us and the early spring green-up is slowly adding color to the woods again. Turkeys have been gobbling and turkey hunters are into the 2019 season.

Once your calling has been fine-tuned, safety is the next concern, one hunting fatality in Mississippi is too many.

More accidents occur every year to turkey hunters than in any other kind of hunting. Many of these accidents could be prevented if hunters would obey the Ten Commandments of Firearm Handling - something which every person who has taken a hunter education course should know and practice. While we're on that subject, it's not a bad idea to enroll in a hunter education course, just for a refresher (take along a youngster or hunting buddy). You're never too old to learn about safety.

Because the hunter must blend in with the surroundings, turkey hunters

do not wear hunter orange. Most turkey hunting accidents occur when hunters are mistaken for a turkey. However, there are several things a hunter can do to prevent such a tragedy from happening:

(1) There are only two kinds of safe turkey hunting: calling the birds in, or standing and waiting. Never try stalking.

(2) Be sure you are completely camouflaged; however, when moving to and from a hunting site, always wear hunter orange.

(3) Pick your hunting spot with a good backrest. A tree or embankment wide enough to completely cover your outline from the rear will protect you from being shot from behind.

(4) If another hunter comes near, call out in a calm voice. Don't shout, whistle, stand or wave and especially don't give a turkey call. Keep your distance from other hunters.

(5) Use only hen decoys. Place the decoy so you are safe from shots by other hunters. Posi-

tion yourself either front or rear of the decoy. If the decoy is shot, the sides (the most angle) you will not be in the line of fire.

(6) Always use safe gun handling.

(7) Always use harvested turkey in the woods in a hunting, game bag.

When you are in the woods this spring, every effort not to leave trash on the ground or you see trash in the parking area, pick it up and throw it in the back of your truck.

Have a safe and successful turkey season.

NEMCC to Offer "Z Degree"

BOONEVILLE, Miss.— As the cost of higher education continues to climb, so too does the cost of textbooks.

At Northeast Mississippi Community College students have the option to combat that cost by pursuing a Zero-Textbook-Cost-Degree or "Z degree," which is an associate of arts in general studies for which all textbooks are free.

Through several faculty grants from the University of Mississippi, Northeast is able to offer this game-changing option as part of its on-going, campus-wide technology initiative, which is currently in its fourth year.

Classes in the "Z degree" use library databases, Open Educational Resources (OER), and faculty-developed content rather than the traditional published textbook purchased at the bookstore.

According to Vice President of instruction Dr. Michelle A. Baragona, Northeast is the first institution of higher learning in Mississippi to make the "Z degree" possible for its students.

"From the very beginning, President Ford's technology initiative was aimed at creating a twenty-first century learning environment that would offer our students more affordable options that would better prepare them to be successful at the university or in the workforce," Baragona said.

"The 'Z degree' is a big part of the initiative in that it essentially removes the obstacle of textbook cost from a student's path toward accessing the advantages of higher education. There are plenty of jobs available in our state, but the overwhelming majority of them require education past a high school diploma or equivalency."

Traditionally, students without the financial means to purchase textbooks prior to the first day of class were at a disadvantage. A feature of the "Z degree" is that Open Educational Resource (OER) materials are available to all students on the first day of class.

"We have increased the equability across campus by making digital course materials available on the first day of class," Baragona explained.

"Students no longer need to wait until payday or until financial aid is approved to purchase their textbooks. All digital course materials are available on day one."

With the iPad initiative, Northeast also implemented a digital textbook and OER initiative. Phased in over the past three and a half years, currently 92 percent of all textbooks are digital and 59 percent are OER (free).

"For students in programs other than the 'Z degree' we've reduced the average textbook per course cost from \$122 before iPad and OER to \$32 this semester," Baragona said.

"The average textbook cost per academic year at Northeast has dropped from \$1,220 to \$320."

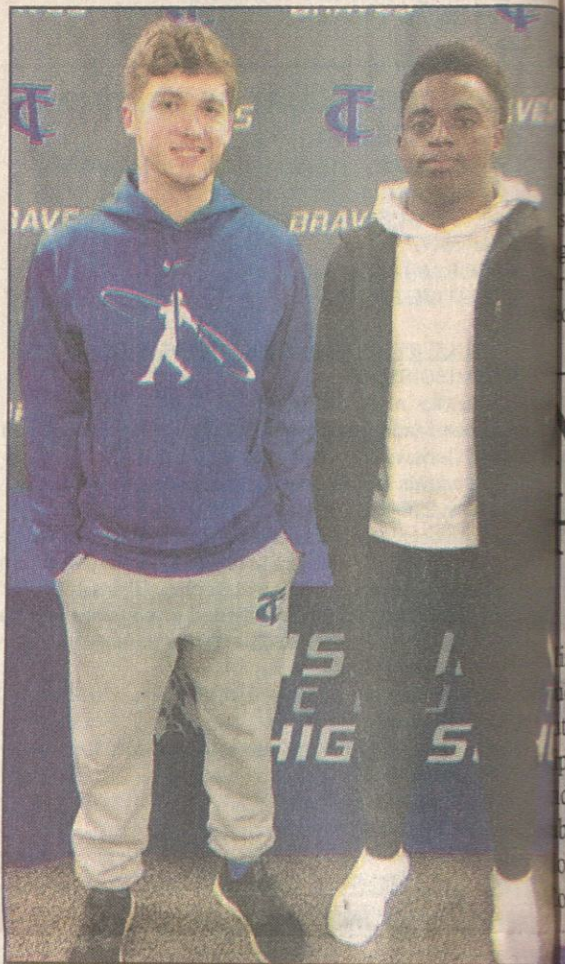
Northeast president Ricky G. Ford credits the faculty for not only accepting the challenge of implementing the technology

initiative, but embracing it.

"We couldn't be pleased with our progress with this initiative without success our students having," Ford said.

"Our faculty has a great deal of credit in leading the way, and we are just at the tip of the iceberg. We are planning our next steps which are to include mentored and virtual in the classroom."

"We are not going to replace the instructional aspect of learning. There will always be a need for that style of information presentation, and we believe we owe our students to be technologically savvy as they enter the workforce."

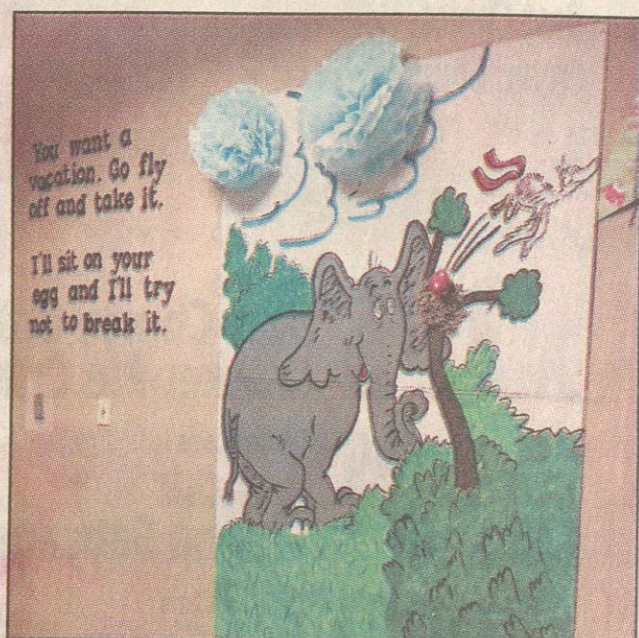
