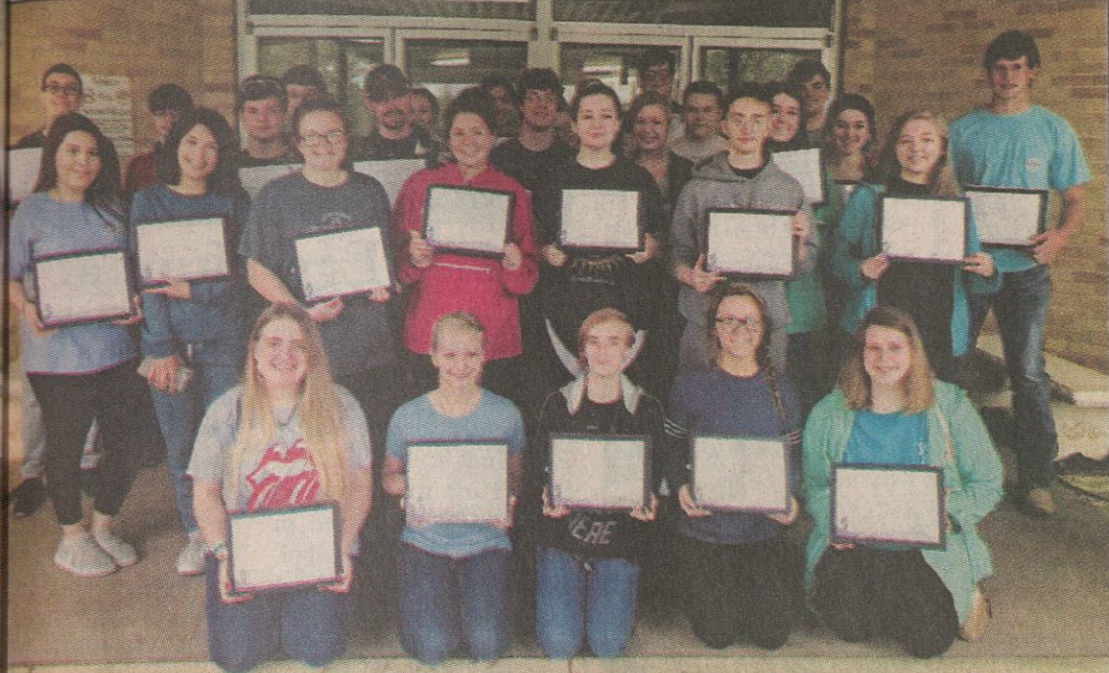

Michelle Byrom Dead at Age 62

Just five years after being set free from the Mississippi death row, Michelle Byrom has died at age 62 in Madison, Tennessee. According to a report submitted by Mississippi Today in the Daily Corinthian, she died on January 25 at home. Byrom was found guilty in 2000 and sentenced to death in the killing of her husband, Edward "Eddie" Byrom Sr., and for recruiting her son in the plot. Eddie was fatally shot on June 4, 1999 at the couple's home in Iuka. The state Supreme Court threw out her conviction in 2014, a rare order for a prisoner awaiting execution. She served 14 years on death row.

Escaped Inmate Apprehended in Alabama

On April 5th an inmate from the Tishomingo County Jail, Stephen Edward Hancock, escaped during a work detail. He was a part of the road crew which was cleaning up trash along County Road 958. Corrections officers noticed Hancock running in the direction of the woods; they secured the other inmates on the work detail and notified the Sheriff's office of the escape. Later that evening Hancock was apprehended in Colbert County, Alabama by the Colbert County Sheriff's Department around 7 p.m. Hancock signed his extradition and has been brought back to the Tishomingo County Jail. Hancock will face additional charges for his escape. The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the Mississippi Highway Patrol, the Mississippi Department of Transportation, and the Mississippi Department of Corrections for providing assistance to the agency in the search for Hancock. Also, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the community of Carter's Branch with their help and support. Sheriff Daugherty would also like to thank Colbert County Sheriff, Frank Williamson, and the rest of the Colbert County Sheriff's Office for apprehending Hancock.

New City Ordinance Prohibits the Sale and Possession of Certain Synthetic Products

A new city ordinance is going into effect which will prohibit the sale of and possession of certain synthetic products inside the city limits, which have been deemed dangerous for human consumption. The products in question are those that mirror the effects of illegal drugs; the ordinance describes the prohibited items as being synthetic cannabinoids and other synthetic products. The use of some of these products has already negatively affected citizens of Tishomingo County, including individuals under the age of 18. The board of aldermen made this decision with the citizens of Iuka's best interest at heart. New K9 Unit Assists in Drug Arrest

On April 4, 2019, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies were conducting a safety checkpoint on Jefferson Street in Burnsville. A vehicle approached the checkpoint and deputies soon learned that the driver of the vehicle, Marshall Forshey, had a suspended driver's license. Deputies placed the Forshey under arrest and had the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office new K9, "Myra" and her handler, Deputy Thomas Mynatt came to the scene. A search was conducted by "Myra" and she alerted officers to

the presence of narcotics inside the vehicle. A follow up search was then conducted by the deputies where they found some alleged methamphetamine hidden inside a trash bag. Forshey was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Marshall Forshey, 46-year-old, white male of Rienzi, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine). Forshey's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$10,000 cash or \$2,000 professional bond.

Traffic Stop Leads to Arrest for Iuka Man

A vehicle was stopped on Hwy. 72 east on April 3rd because of its connections with a burglary in Colbert County, Alabama. During the traffic stop deputies discovered several stolen items in the car.

One of the occupants, James Klette, was placed under arrest because of an ongoing investigation conducted by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office related to the sale of illegal narcotics. At the time of the traffic stop Klette had a warrant out for his arrest.

Law Enforcement officials from the Colbert County Sheriff's Office arrived on the scene and

spoke with all the occupants of the vehicle about the burglary which occurred in their jurisdiction. Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies then transported James Klette to the Tishomingo County Jail.

James Klette, 22-year-old, white male of Iuka, Mississippi was officially served with a capias warrant from the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office, where Klette was indicted for the sell of methamphetamine (less than 2 grams). A \$10,000 bond was set by the Grand Jury for that charge. Klette remains in the custody of the Tishomingo County Jail at this time.

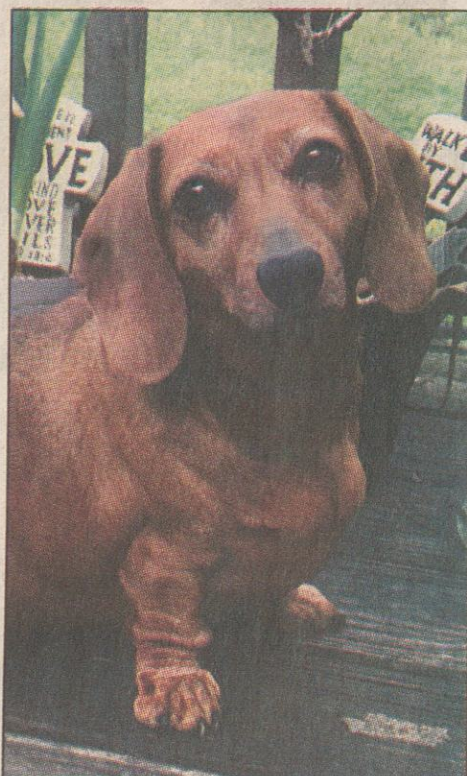

There are many myths



out there about dogs and cats. To set the record straight and give the facts, listed are 5 common myths. 1. Myth: A warm nose means a dog is sick. Fact: A warm, dry nose can be caused by many things, from air circulation to being in the sun. Touching a dog's nose is not an accurate way to gauge wellness. 2. Myth: A wagging tail means a happy dog. Fact: A wagging tail usually means a dog is happy but it can also mean that the dog is agitated, tense, frightened or aggressive. To understand a dog's mood, you must observe the whole dog. 3. Myth: Dogs and cats see only in shades of grey. Fact: Cats and dogs have limited color vision, but they do see in colors. 4. Myth: Cats always land on their feet. Fact: This myth is downright dangerous. The height of a cat's fall plays a role in how likely it is to right itself and absorb the shock of the landing without injury. But cats are not immune to injury or falls, and they certainly don't have nine lives. 5. Myth: Pets that are spayed/neutered are prone to gaining weight. Fact: Like people, pets gain weight from eating too much and not exercising enough. Its best to keep your pet on a healthy diet and exercise plan. now housed in a county-
owned building on Paul
Edmondson Drive in
Iuka, serving the entirety
of Tishomingo County.
"Throughout the years
we've had people from
just about every church in
the county," says South,
"... lawyers, school teach-
ers, truck drivers, furniture
salesmen, and about 85%
of our helpers are retired."
Depending on the season,
you'll discover anywhere
from 50-75 folks on-hand,
ready to pack banana
boxes on the third Friday
of every month. And it's
a happy group, South says
with a smile. "I accuse
'em of doing a whole lot
of visiting." Though they
might do some "visiting"
with friends, they're all
there for a single, serious,
purpose: to fill those boxes
for people in need. And,
like much of the state of
Mississippi, the need is

there.

According to estimates
compiled by the Census
Bureau, for Tishomingo
County, with a population
of 19,215, approximately
3,581 (18.6%) people live
in poverty. Additionally,
as reported by Mississippi
Kids Count in 2018 (2016
estimate), about 23.5% of
households are, at some
time during a month, food
insecure. Food insecurity
refers to USDA's mea-
sure of lack of access, at
times, to enough food for
an active, healthy life for
all household members
and limited or uncertain
availability of nutrition-
ally adequate foods. Food-
insecure households are
not necessarily food in-
secure all the time. Food
insecurity may reflect a
household's need to make
trade-offs between impor-
tant basic needs, such as
housing or medical bills,
and purchase nutritionally
adequate foods. I doubt,
though, that the food de-
pot folks need any num-
bers to tell them who's
hungry in Tishomingo
County. Largely rural, like
so many Mississippi coun-
ties, people know people
that know people, and
word gets around as to
who could use some help.
South elaborates, "There
was a lady told me, 'if they
put their name on a piece
of paper that tells you that
they're saying they need
help.' It's this building,
this ministry, this group
of people's place to help
them." Food Depot of
Tishomingo County Presi-
dent, Maxey South. Mak-
ing this effort even more
remarkable is the fact that
all funds to purchase the
food come entirely from
donations received from
churches, individual con-
tributions, and various
fundraisers held through-
out the year. Fundraising
events include three pan-
cake breakfasts a year and
a 5K run in the fall, which
continues to grow and pro-
vide with each successive
year.

During the holiday
season, area citizens re-

ally come through, with
checks ranging from a few
dollars to thousands. And
with around six hundred
families to serve, any and
all donations are welcome.
The Food Depot of Tish-
omingo County is another
shining example of how
people in Northeast Mis-

issippi look out for their
own. So, next time you've
had a great breakfast,
lunch, or dinner, remem-
ber those that might not
have been as fortunate
as yourself, and consider
volunteering or donating
to help your neighbor. In-

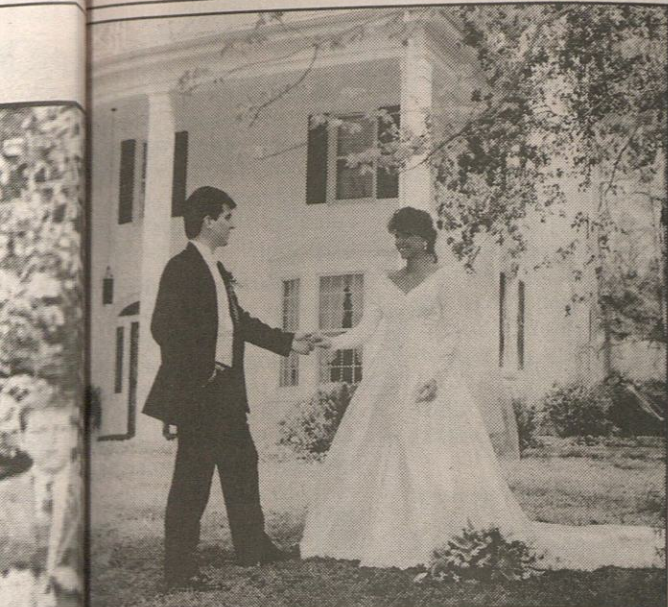

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 9)

We are in hot pursuit to learn the secret of Solomon concerning the real purpose of life, but so far we have learned only that he had found life empty, even with all the money, fame, pleasures, houses and fine foods that he could find. So, we must look further into the Book of Ecclesiastes to see what conclusion Solomon will finally draw concerning the real purpose of life on earth. In Ecclesiastes 2:12-15 we read: "And I turned myself to behold wisdom, and madness, and folly: for what can the man do that cometh after the king? Even that which hath been already done. Then I said that wisdom excelleth folly, as far as light excelleth darkness. The wise man's eyes are in his head; but the fool walketh in darkness: and I myself perceived also that one event happeneth to them all. Then said I in my heart, As it happeneth to the fool, so it happeneth even to me; and why was I then more wise? Then I said in my heart, that this also is vanity." Solomon was wise in that he stopped to consider the purpose of life and why men do what they do in an effort to enjoy life on earth. Most people do not seem to do much heart searching to come to a reasonable understanding of why they do what they do. Solomon desired to examine wisdom, madness (foolishness) and folly (silliness), which would be a good pursuit for all of us. Solomon learned that men keep following the same things that others have followed before them. Oh the devil's little dramas may have different stages and decorations, with different costumes for their actors, but the outcome of the last act is the same, emptiness! The man who would follow Solomon would likely make the same mistakes that he had made, and we learn from his son Rehoboam that such was the case.

Now the conclusion, at least one of the early conclusions, of Solomon was that wisdom is so far ahead of foolishness that it is like trying to compare light to darkness. He found that the wise man sees with the eyes in his head and determines the best pathway to travel, while the fool goes on in his darkness, as if he had no eyes, especially spiritually. One event happens to both the wise and the foolish, as Solomon came to see, that is, they both finally die! His reasoning was that he had fared no better than the fool, since the same old enemy, death, was on both their trails and they could not escape him. His question was: why was I wiser than the fool, if both of us come to the same end? The good answer to this question will come later in the Book of Ecclesiastes. Life was "vanity", or empty, as Solomon saw it by his exhaustive pursuit of wisdom and folly to learn what was the best thing to do in earthly life. Solomon is not the first, nor the last, to follow the same reasoning that he has been doing according to our verses, yet he will come out with the right conclusion, while most people never get that far! There is more to life than what is here and now, if not, then the sinner is faring better than the saved! Many people criticize the "pie in the sky" teaching, as they would call it, yet there must be some "pie" somewhere, for most people never have the joy of eating much "pie" while on earth. About the time most people have gained enough of material possessions and wisdom to know how to live better, it is time to die. So, we must conclude by saying that God has promised more than "pie in the sky", for He has promised new heavens and a new earth where everything is right for the saved (Isaiah 65:17; II Peter 3:13; Rev. 21:1-2).

WHEREAS, it has determined that the effects of these substances are a health concern to the citizens of Iuka, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of Iuka, Mississippi, have determined the need to establish an ordinance preventing the use, possession, purchase, distribution, sale or attempt to use, possess, purchase, distribute or sale or publicly display for sale any one or more of the following chemicals or substances within the municipal boundaries of the City of Iuka, Mississippi; and therefore adopt the following ordinance and penalties; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 21-13-1 et. seq. of Mississippi Code Annotated of 1972 as may be amended from time to time, this Ordinance Prohibiting The Use, Purchase, Possession, Distribution, Sale Or Offering For Sale Of Synthetic Cannabinoids Or Other Synthetic Products is for the immediate and temporary preservation of the public peace, health and safety and welfare and for other good causes described herein, pursuant to Section 21-13-11, this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its unanimous adoption, prior to being recorded and published, as being in the best interests of the public to become immediately effective.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, that the following be added and made a part of the Iuka, Mississippi Code of Ordinances, To-Wit:

1. No person shall use, possess, purchase, distribute, sale or attempt to use, possess, purchase, distribute or sell or publicly display for sale any one or more of the following chemicals within the city limits of City of Iuka, Mississippi.

*Salviadinorum or salvinorum A: all parts of the plant presently classified botanically as salvia divinorum, whether growing or not, the seeds thereof an extract from any part of such plant, and every compound, manufacture salts derivative, mixture or preparation of such plant, its seeds or extracts;

* (6aR, 10aR)-9-(hydroxymethyl)-6, 6dimethyl-1,3-(2-methyloctan-2-yl)-8a7, 10. 10a-tetrahydrobenzo [c] chromen-1-ol. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: HU-210;

*1 -Penty-1,3-(1-naphthoyl) indole. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: JWH-018/ spice;

*1- Butyl-3- (1-naphthoyl) indole. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: JWH-073;

*1 -(3-[trifluoromethylphenyl] piperazine. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: TFMIP;

*4-methoxymethcathinone and Ethylcathinone;
 Mitragyna speciosa korth, Mitragyna speciosa leaf extract, Mitragyna speciosa extract, and M. speciosa alkaloids, including ajmalicine, mitraphylline, rhynchophylline and mitragynine pseudoindoxyl, raubasine, pausinyntalia johimbe and corynantheidine, 7-acetoxymitragynine, Corynoxin, Corinnoxin, 3-Dehydromitragynin, (-)-Epicatechin, 3-Isocorynantheidin, 3-Isopaynanthein, Isomitracyllin, Isospeciofolin, Isospecionoxein, Mitraciliatin, Mitrafolin, Mitragynalin, Mitraphyllin, Mitraspecin, Mitraversin, Paynanthein, Speciofolin, Speciofolin, Speciofolin, Specionoxein, Speciofolin, Speciofolin, Stipulatin. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: Kratom, krathom, kakuum, ketum, ithang, thom, biak-biak, kratum, mambog, Super K, Life Force K, K-Chill, K-shot; *Or any similar structural analogs.

2. If any of the aforementioned substances shall be found in the possession of any person, unless specifically excluded herein, the substances shall be confiscated and destroyed by law enforcement officials.

3. It shall not be an offense under Section 1 above of this Ordinance if a person shall be acting at the direction of an authorized agent of Iuka, Mississippi, to enforce or ensure compliance with this law prohibiting the use, possession, purchase, distribution or sale the aforementioned substance.

4. This Ordinance shall not apply to any person who shall commit any act described in this Ordinance pursuant to the lawful direction or prescription of duly-licensed physician or dentist authorized to direct or prescribe such act. This Ordinance shall not apply to the inhalation of anesthesia for a medical or dental purpose which inhalation of anesthesia shall be administered by or under the supervision of a duly licensed physician or dentist.

5. Any person found to be guilty of violating this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed One Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$ 1,000.00) or imprisonment not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

6. That should any sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, and shall not affect the validity of the Code of Ordinance as a whole.

7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately. The Clerk shall cause the ordinance to be published in a local newspaper with a general circulation.

WHEREAS, the Ordinance prohibiting the use, purchase, possession, distribution, sale or offering for sale of synthetic cannabinoids or other synthetic products was red, discussed and voted upon in a public meeting, and whereas a motion was duly made by Alderman Nancy Stripling, seconded by Alderman James Gresham, and after a thorough discussion of the merits of the motion, the Mayor called for a vote they were recorded with the following results, to-wit:

Whereupon, the forgoing Ordinance Prohibiting the Use, Purchase, Possession, Distribution, Sale or Offering for Sale of Synthetic Cannabinoids or Other Synthetic Products passed by a unanimous vote of all of the governing body, was declared Adopted and shall become effective immediately on this, the 2nd day of April, 2019. This Ordinance shall replace and repeal an Ordinance dated August 3, 2010 as found in Ordinance Book Number 3 pages 37 through 39.

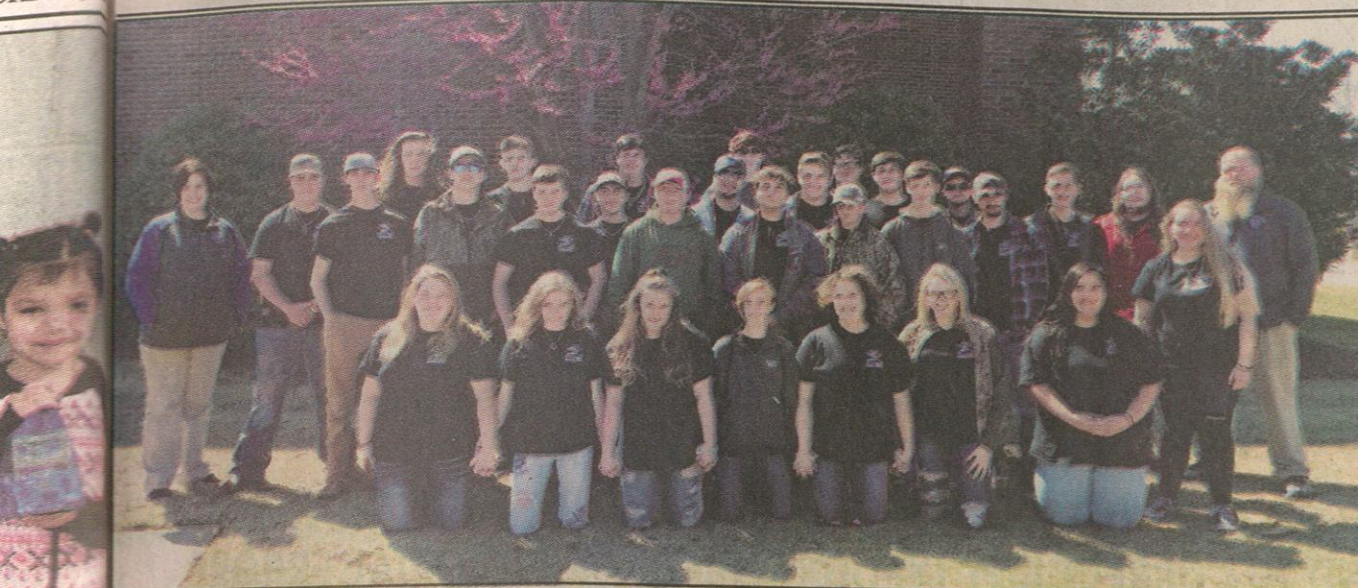

TCHS placed 11th overall in the State in their division. The program just wrapped up its 3rd year and TCHS has gone to the state competition every year so far. Congratulations Braves! The community is proud of all you have accomplished.

The state championship of the Archery in Mississippi Schools (AIMS) program was recently held at the Fordice Equine Center on the state fairgrounds in Jackson MS. AIMS is designed to introduce 4th-12th grade students to the sport of International-Style Target Archery during their Physical Education Class and as an extracurricular team

sport. Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) is the driving force behind AIMS. The program, which began in 2005 with 10 schools, is now in over 500 schools and in over 50 counties with more than 80,000 students participating each year. The growth of AIMS has followed the national trend of Archery being the fastest growing sport nationwide and statewide. The first state-

wide Archery Invitational was held in Mississippi in 2011 with 400 student archers competing; and that number has expanded to over 5,000 student archers competing annually in the AIMS State Championships. Mississippi students also rank at the highest levels in both National and International Archery competitions every year.

AEST Plant Sale

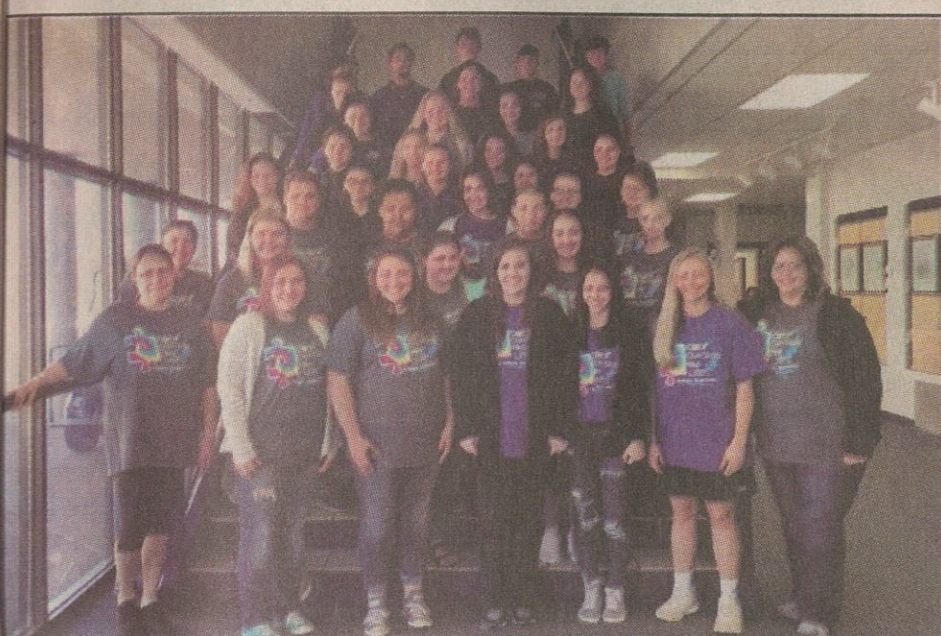

Diagnosing ASD can be difficult since there is no medical test, like a blood test, to diagnose the disorders. Doctors look at the child's behavior and development to make a diagnosis.

ASD can sometimes be detected at 18 months or younger. By age 2, a diagnosis by an experienced professional can be considered very reliable.



TCHS Students Support Autism Awareness Month

What is Autism Spectrum Disorder?

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a developmental disability that can cause significant social, communication and behavioral challenges. There is often nothing about how people with ASD look that sets them apart from other people, but people with ASD may communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from most other people. The learning, thinking, and problem-solving abilities of people with ASD can range from gifted to severely challenged. Some people with ASD need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less.

A diagnosis of ASD now includes several conditions that used to be diagnosed separately: autistic disorder, pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise specified (PDD-NOS), and Asperger

er syndrome. These conditions are now all called autism spectrum disorder.

Signs and Symptoms

People with ASD often have problems with social, emotional, and communication skills. They might repeat certain behaviors and might not want change in their daily activities. Many people with ASD also have different ways of learning, paying attention, or reacting to things. Signs of ASD begin during early childhood and typically last throughout a person's life.

Children or adults with ASD might:

- not point at objects to show interest (for example, not point at an airplane flying over)

- not look at objects when another person points at them

- have trouble relating to others or not have an interest in other people at all

- want to be alone
- have trouble understanding other people's feelings or talking about their own feelings

- prefer not to be held or cuddled, or might cuddle only when they want to

- appear to be unaware when people talk to them, but respond to other sounds

- be very interested in people, but not know how to talk, play, or relate to them

- repeat or echo words or phrases said to them, or repeat words or phrases in place of normal language

- have trouble expressing their needs using typical words or motions

- not play "pretend" games (for example, not pretend to "feed" a doll)

- repeat actions over and over again

- have trouble adapting when a routine changes

- have unusual reactions to the way things smell,
