Easter Services & Egg Hunts Planned

The Egg Hunt at the Tishomingo State Park has been re-scheduled for this Saturday at 11 a.m.

The Iuka Baptist Church re-scheduled their annual egg hunt for this Saturday in the Mineral Springs Park in Iuka starting at 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.

There will be an Easter Egg Hunt at the Iuka Church of God on Saturday at 2:00 p.m.

The 6th Annual Easter Egg Hunt at J.P. Coleman State Park will be this Saturday at 1:30 p.m. Park entry fees will be charged.

There will be an Easter Sunrise Service at Mt. Joy Baptist Church on April 21st at 6:30 a.m. with a fellowship breakfast after the services. The regular services begin with Sunday School at 10 a.m. and Morning Worship service at 11 a.m.

Eastport Baptist Church will have a Sunrise Service at 7 a.m. on Easter Sunday with breakfast to follow. The Sunday School will be at 10 a.m. and worship services start at 11 a.m. followed by the Easter Egg Hunt.

Mission Lighthouse Church at 18 CR 252 Iuka, will have a Good Friday Service on April 19th at 7 p.m. Everyone is invited to attend.

Investigation into Auto Theft and Burglary Leads to Arrest

Over the past three weeks the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office has responded to at least three different vehicle thefts in the county. Investigators for the sheriff's department uncovered several items that were allegedly taken from a home and business; and these thefts all occurred around the same area of the county. Sheriff's officials were able to recover all three vehicles and also able to officially charge one of the individuals involved in most of the crimes which were committed.

The vehicle thefts that were reported came from an individual at the Scruggs Boat Ramp, Captains Choice, and Tri-State Industrial Park which included Water-Way Incorporated. The

burglary of the business also occurred at Tri-State Industrial Park's Yellow Creek Coatings.

Investigators have charged Nathan Brown Mills, 25-year-old, white male of Alcorn County with several charges. Those include: Felony possession of stolen property (2 counts - 2007 Jeep Grand Cherokee, 1997 GMC 3500). Felony taking of motor vehicle - (1 count - 2017 Ford F350). Burglary of commercial building - (2 counts - water-way incorporated and yellow creek coatings).

Mills was apprehended as he led law enforcement on a chase from Hardin County, Tennessee through Tishomingo County and was arrested in Alcorn County. Areas where Mills

is alleged to have committed thefts at include Tishomingo County, and Alcorn County along with McNairy and Hardin County in the State of Tennessee. Investigators say other felony charges may be pending and additional arrests still could be made in these cases.

Mills is currently being held in the Alcorn County Jail with a "hold" placed on him by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Locals Killed in Plane Crash

A plane crash in Union County Saturday claimed the life of three people, a couple from Belmont - pilot, Tommy Nix and his wife Merline Nix and co-pilot Jarrod Holloway of Booneville.



Sources said the Rockwell Sabreliner 65 made its first flight in 1980.

The plane was associated with Classic Aviation out of Hamilton, Alabama.

The Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Rick Breitenfeldt stated that the plane was a 10 passenger Rockwell Sabreliner 65 which departed the University Oxford Airport at about 3 p.m. on Saturday. Union County Sheriff Jimmy Edwards said his office received a call shortly after 5 p.m. on Saturday informing them that the plane had disappeared from radar in the area. Edwards stated that the investigators found the wreckage at about 9:30 p.m. on Saturday between New Albany and Blue Springs just off of County Road 120 in a remote wooded area. There were reports of inclement weather and tornado warnings in the area on Saturday which may have contributed to the crash.

Reports indicate that the pilot radioed Memphis to inform them that he was dealing with electrical difficulties in the cabin. Soon after that all radio contact was lost. The FAA and

the National Transportation Safety Board are investigating the crash. Authorities in Memphis were able to give investigators an estimation of where the plane may have went down. A volunteer firefighter involved in the search detected the smell of fuel and found a debris field of about 100 yards.

Former lawyer, Richard "Dickie" Scruggs says he was a passenger on the twin-engine jet just hours before it crashed in northern Mississippi. Scruggs told the Clarion Ledger that he and his family flew aboard the plane Saturday from Colorado back to their home in Oxford, Mississippi. The plane left Oxford to fly to Alabama's Marion County-Rankin Fite Airport but never made it to their destination. Scruggs said Nix, and Holloway were professional pilots, he had been on at least 50 to 100 flights with Nix as pilot and about a dozen flights with Holloway as pilot. Nix taught Holloway how to fly. They were really exceptional in their professionalism, Scruggs stated.

He may be small but he doesn't know it, in his mind he is ten feet tall and bullet proof. He is very loved and adored by his mama and she doesn't know how she ever lived without him.

Easter is right around the corner. This holiday filled with baby chicks and bunnies, spring colors, hunting eggs, and playing outside is always fun. But amidst all the pastel-colored fun going on, be sure to have your pet's safety and happiness in mind. Chocolate, bunny-shaped or not, is very dangerous to pets. Don't leave Easter treats and baskets on the floor where your pets can find them. Dogs especially have a nose for sniffing out chocolate, and eating too much will be toxic to them. Other candies aren't pet-safe either: sugar and xylitol, a common artificial sweetener, aren't good for pets. Keep your candy dishes and baskets put away or covered when you're not in the room with your pet. Easter eggs stuffed with candy can be tempting for dogs, and the plastic eggs themselves can get caught in your dog's mouth or throat. Keep your pets in a

separate room while your egg hunt is going on, and keep a count of the eggs, so you can be sure to collect them all. It is best to use paper grass, instead of the plastic kind which can cause major digestive problems if swallowed. It can be a good idea to give your pet their very own Easter gift, skip the confetti and grass, your pet won't know the difference and present your pet with a new dog or cat treat or a new toy. Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department is taking back Unwanted prescription drugs April, 27, 2019 at the Sheriff's Department located at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS.

On Saturday, April 27, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 17th opportunity in nine years to prevent drug abuse and theft by returning their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last fall Americans turned in nearly 460 tons (more than 900,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at more than 5,800 sites operated by the DEA and almost 4,800 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 16 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in almost 11 million pounds—nearly 5,500 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue.

Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

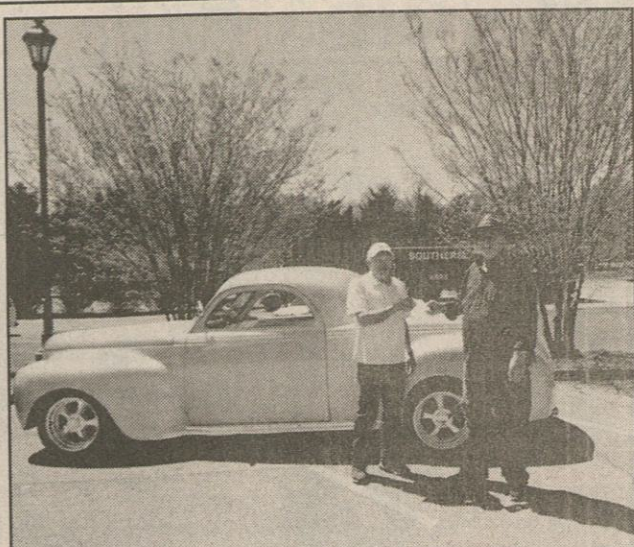

One night our mother placed the ironing board on the back porch. "OLD ROCK" sniffed it and ran into the woods. We never saw him again.

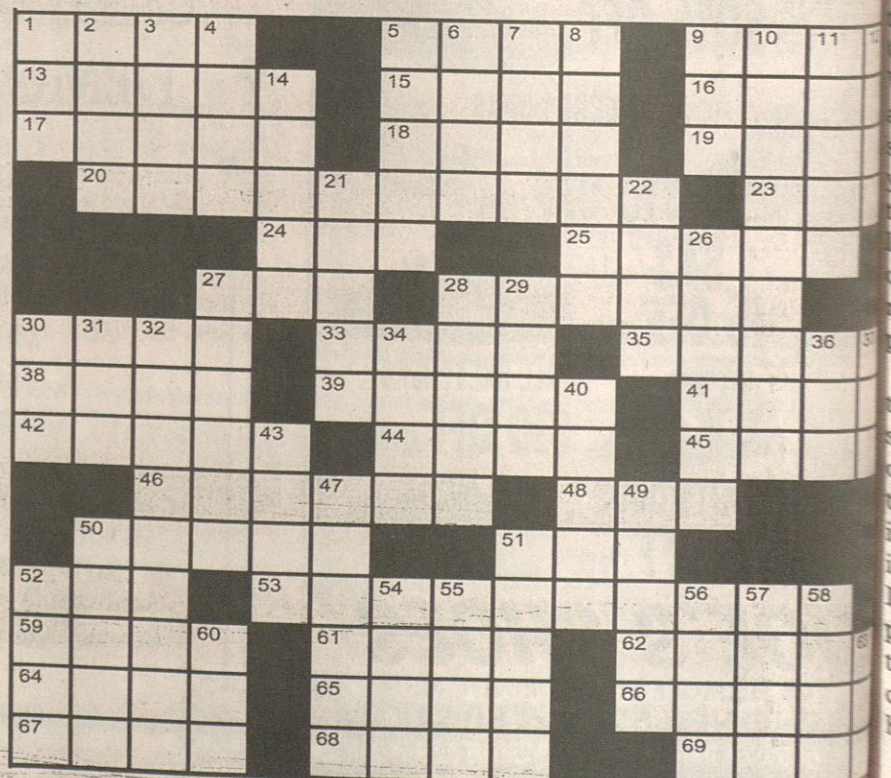

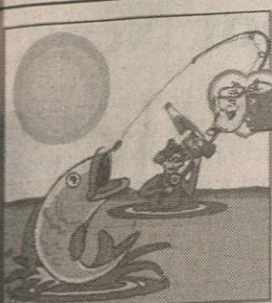

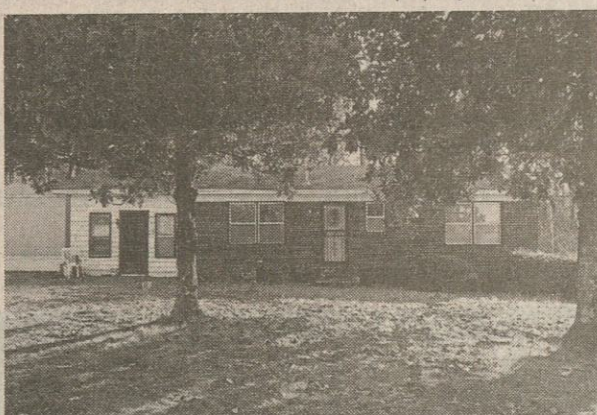

Simple Strategies for a Larger Tomato Harvest

Nothing is more frustrating than investing time, money and energy in planting and growing tomatoes only to watch them succumb to disease. We can't change the weather conditions that support disease problems, but we can tweak our growing strategies to reduce this risk.

Select and grow the most disease-resistant varieties suited to your growing region. Consult your local University Extension Office for a list of recommended tomatoes and always check the plant tags before purchasing plants.

Plant tomatoes in a sunny location, that receives at least eight or more hours of sunlight, with rich well-drained soil. Your plants will be healthier and better able to fend off insects and tolerate disease.

No room - no problem. Grow your tomatoes in containers filled with a quality potting mix and drainage holes. Many of the newer containers, like Gardener's Victory Self-Watering Patio Planter are designed to increase success with less effort on your part. Look for containers with built-in trellises, large reservoirs and other features that promote healthy growth and productivity.

Properly space plants to increase airflow and sunlight reaching all parts of the plant. This reduces the risk of disease and increases a plant's ability to produce more fruit. Leaving space between plants also helps reduce the spread of disease from diseased plants to nearby healthy plants.

Further reduce the risk of disease by lifting the plants off the ground. Supporting plants with strong tomato cages improves air flow and light penetration while keeping the plants and fruit off the ground and away from soil-borne insects and diseases.

Avoid flimsy tomato towers that tend to topple and bulky cages that consume too much storage space. Consider investing in one of the stronger supports like the Gardener's Vertex Lifetime Tomato Cage that stores flat and is strong, but flexible to encourage stouter growth. Another benefit is that it opens, so you can easily place them around larger plants; just in case you waited too long to set the cages in place.

Use soaker hoses or irrigation systems like the Waterwell Irrigation System that target water to the soil around the plant. Placing water just where it is needed - on the soil - conserves moisture while keeping the foliage dry. Overhead irrigation uses more water and increases the risk and spread of many common tomato diseases.

Boost your tomato plants' productivity by as much as 20% with red mulch. The USDA and Clemson University developed a red mulch that reflects far-red wavelengths upward into the plants stimulating growth and development. For more help growing tomatoes successfully and boosting your tomato harvest visit gardeners.com.

Rotate plantings from one garden, or area within a garden, to another.



Moving related plants to different locations each year reduces the build up of insects and diseases, reducing the risk of future problems. Consider rotating your tomato plantings into containers if space is limited. Start with fresh soil, a clean container and disease-resistant plants.

With these few changes and a bit of cooperation from the weather, your new challenge may be finding ways to use and share your bumper harvest. Your surplus tomatoes and vegetables are always welcome at food pantries and meal programs in your community.

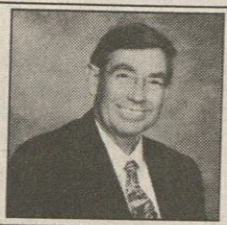

for it stared him in the face in every pursuit he undertook. I wonder why more men and women cannot get the lesson from Solomon and save themselves much energy and weariness in seeking to follow every whim that promises to bring them fulfillment!

Solomon was distraught because his wisdom, and that of others, would not be remembered any more than the foolishness of the fool when all were dead! The future has a way of causing men to forget the past and even the good accomplishments that many have made in the past. I tire pretty soon of some younger people who seem to think that all of the thinking of sages through the ages adds nothing to the present pursuit of knowledge or wisdom. I applaud the knowledge that makes life

better on earth, but I detest the pride that some have displayed in their knowledge of modern inventions and learning. There is still something to be learned from wise men like Solomon concerning the real purpose of life, and it is more than learning to use phones and computers! Solomon, even with all of his wisdom and riches, came to hate life, chiefly because the work on earth was a grief to him. His spirit was empty and his body became tired of the "same old, same old" things. He hated his labors, though perhaps done mostly by servants, because his gain might go to a fool, who would waste it all!
