Big Weekend Planned in Downtown Iuka Renaissance Day, Jaybird Market, and Concert in the Courthouse

Be sure to mark your calendars to attend the Fifth Annual Renaissance Day at the Old Courthouse Museum in Iuka on Saturday, April 27. The fun will begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 5 p.m.

Once again the grounds of the Old Courthouse Museum will come alive with fun, food, and fellowship. Bring your lawn chair, plan to spend the day, and learn about a time when life moved at a slower pace. Old time games will be enjoyed by all ages. Corn hole, washer pitching, and egg races will bring old and young together. The courthouse lawn will be covered with presenters demonstrating such as flint knapping, blacksmithing, spinning,

weaving, and even a moonshine still will be on site. Sadly, many of the aforementioned skills are practically nonexistent today, so being able to observe and talk with these presenters is a rare treat. Camp fire cooking, always a favorite, will also be presented by Boy Scout Troop 26; while pony rides, face painting, a petting zoo, and a children's train ride provide great enjoyment for children of all ages.

Tommy Dean, the baseball legend and Iuka native, will be signing baseballs for a minimal fee. Patrons of the museum are also welcome to bring their own baseballs for Mr. Dean to sign. We are also excited to announce that our local car club will be having a car show showcasing

a variety of beautifully restored antique automobiles for the public's viewing enjoyment.

Music will be yet another facet for attendees to enjoy. Multiple groups will be on the grounds to perform for your entertainment. Patrons of Renaissance Day will enjoy the musical stylings of the Dayron Sharp Band, the Bobby Dennis Band, Frank and Eddie Thomas, and the North Mississippi Dulcimer Association.

The excitement will kick-off this Friday night with a celebrity concert by Travis Wammack! Mr. Wammack will play and sing both old and new tunes. His famous ballads and songs will be performed in the Courthouse room where many hours of



music was enjoyed until 1971, when the last singing convention was held. Also performing will be Jim Whitehead, a Corinth native. Concert tickets are currently on sale at the Museum for \$10.00 per ticket. This event

is being hosted by L.O. Bishop. Mr. Bishop is a great friend and benefactor of the Museum, and the staff and Board of the Tishomingo Historical & Genealogical Society appreciate all of Mr. Bishop's generous contributions.

Church of our Savior to be Open to the Public During Renaissance Day

As part of the festivities surrounding the fifth annual Renaissance Day and the Jaybird Market this Saturday, April 28, the historic Church of Our Savior will be open to visitors with lectures about its history being offered at 9:30, 10:30, 11:30, 1:30 and 2:30.

The "little church" is one of the oldest places of worship in Tishomingo County. The building represents the early presence of the Episcopal Church in Northeast Mississippi. A congregation was originally formed in 1866. The Episcopal bishop, William Mercer Green, made a visit to Iuka that year and, because there was no Episcopal sanctuary, delivered his sermon in the Methodist Church. He returned to Iuka in 1868 and proposed that a church building be erected. To this end, he donated \$250 as a nucleus for a building fund. Subsequently, Col. R.W. Price, a Methodist, donated the land for the structure, and James B. Cook, a Memphis architect provided the building plans. The building was formally consecrated by Bishop Green on September 28, 1873.

The structure exemplifies the once popular Carpenter Gothic style of religious architecture in



Mississippi. Displayed above the entrance to the church are two symbols common in Episcopal churches: a Celtic cross and a sign of the Trinity.

In June, 1985, the building was purchased from the Diocese of Mississippi by Iuka Heritage, Inc., an organization of local citizens dedicated to preserving the historic structure. It was completely renovated in 1991 and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Although the building was occupied by Episcopal congregations for approximately 125 years, because of the support of people of many faith traditions, it has become a truly community church and remains an important part of the history of Iuka.

Donations made on Saturday will be shared by Iuka Heritage, Inc., and the Tishomingo County Historical and Genealogical Society.

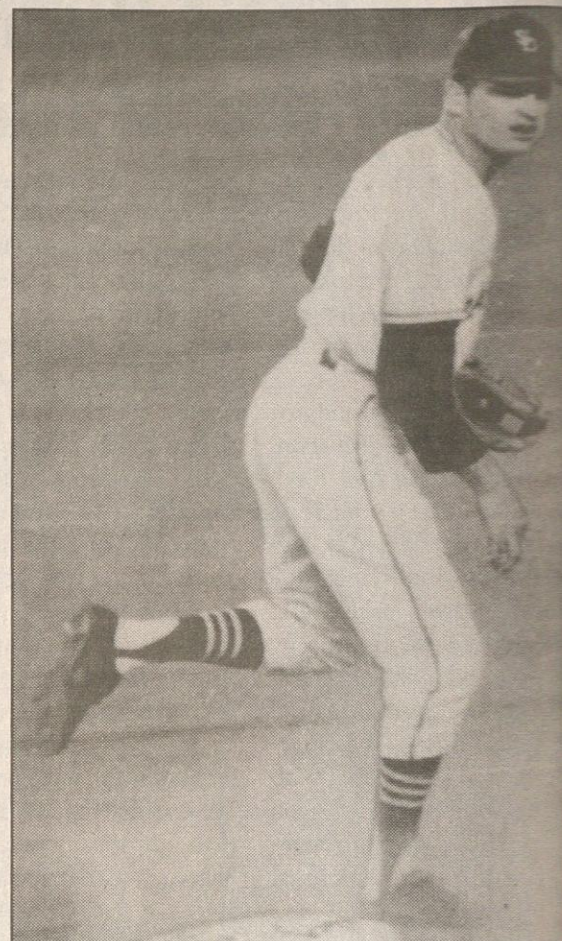
Tommy Dean to Sign Autographs at Renaissance Day 2019

The Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society is excited to announce that Iuka native and Los Angeles Dodgers shortstop Tommy Dean will be autographing baseballs on Saturday, April 27th as part of our upcoming Renaissance Days festivities.

Tommy Dean, born August of 1945, is a graduate of Iuka High School and former professional baseball player. His career spanned from 1964-71 and included 215 games played in Major League Baseball over four seasons, 1967 and 1969-71. Dean, an Iuka High School baseball star, was signed in 1964 by Los Angeles Dodgers general manager "Buz" Bavasi who was trying to transform the Dodgers into a team built around pitching, speed, and defense. According to Bavasi, "Tommy was as good a fielding shortstop as you ever wanted to

see", and "everybody was after him". Sports historian Dan Austin described Dean as "one of the most exciting young shortstops" in "the National League". Dean appeared in 12 games with the Dodgers during the 1967 season. After spending 1968 in the minors, Dean was acquired by Bavasi's new expansion team, the San Diego Padres. He was the Padres' most-used shortstop that year, starting in 81 of the club's 162 games. Dean spent three seasons with the Padres, playing his last game in 1971. Mr. Dean now lives in Iuka with his wife, Dianne. They have two children, Tommy and Ginger, and five grandchildren.

On April 27th a limited number of autographed baseballs will be available for purchase. Museum patrons are also welcome to bring their own baseballs for Mr. Dean to sign.

UDC Daughters of the Confederacy Met

The John Marshall Chapter 394 met April 15th, 11 am at the Iuka Public Library. Those present were Jean Works, Gail Smith, Vicki Durham and Sharon Hairrell. We completed the UDC rituals and meeting was declared open. The minutes were read by Sharon Hairrell and Treasurer report was given by Vicki Durham, both were approved. Old business was planning the memorial services for Eunell Handy and Confederate Memorial Day. New business was still about our memorial services and we welcomed two new members. We were very proud to welcome Jean Works and Gail Smith. We had a short program and gave them their certificates. We are very proud to have them in our chapter.

Sharon Hairrell then presented the program on Jefferson Davis last days in Richmond Va".

When the end came, on April 2, 1865, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was sitting in his customary pew at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Richmond, Virginia. A messenger interrupted the Sunday service to deliver a sealed telegram from General Robert E. Lee, then some 25 miles to the south defending Petersburg. "I advise that all preparation be made for leaving Richmond tonight," Lee reported tersely.

I think it is absolutely necessary that we should abandon our position tonight...

Telegram from Robert E. Lee, in Petersburg, to Jefferson Davis, in Richmond, April 2, 1865.

Frank Lawley, correspondent for the London Times, reported, "During the long afternoon and throughout the feverish night, on horseback, in every description of cart, carriage, and vehicle, in every hurried train that left the city, on canal barges, skiffs, and boats, the exodus of officials and prominent citizens was intermittent."

Liquor poured into the canteens to deny the invader was instead scooped up by rowdies and hooligans in taverns and saloons. Desperate people had packed onto the departing rail cars. But many were

thrown open to the citizens, who had been too long denied. "The most revolting revelation," wrote Maj. Gen. George Pickett's wife, LaSalle, "was the amount of provisions, shoes and clothing which had been accumulated by the speculators who hovered like vultures over the scene of death and desolation. Taking advantage of their possession of money and lack of both patriotism and humanity, they had, by an early corner in the market and by successful blockade running, brought up all the available supplies with an eye to future gain, while our soldiers and women and children were absolutely in rags, barefoot and starving." The crowd's mood soon turned ugly.

The scene at the station was little better. The last trains out of the city sat huffing on the line. Troops endeavored to control the refugees jamming the platform, the insides and tops of the passenger cars, boxcars, freight cars, and even the locomotives. The treasury gold had been boxed and loaded, with 60 cadets from the naval academy drafted to guard it. Davis calmly awaited any last-minute reprieve from Lee at Petersburg. None came. Finally, at 11 pm, the president boarded last and the trains pulled out for Danville.

With government authority gone, Richmond quickly tumbled into anarchy. The last of the city garrison pulled out in the early hours. Throngs of maddened citizens, deserters, and criminals newly escaped from the state prison became mobs of drunken rioters and looters. Fires from government storehouses spread to the city, punctuated by explosions from ammunition magazines and ironclads scuttled at the riverfront, blowing out windows two miles away. By dawn a third of the city, including the entire business district, was on fire.

The government had fled by train the previous night with what remained of its gold and silver, headed southwest for Danville. Desperate people had packed onto the departing rail cars. But many were

turned away.

Lankford goes to great lengths to explain the breakdown in communications that led to General Richard Ewell's order to destroy buildings that contained tobacco. With the support of Secretary of War John C. Breckinridge, Ewell believed that a fire could be contained. Others, including Chief of Ordnance Josiah Gorgas and Richmond mayor Joseph Mayo, questioned whether the destruction of the buildings was even necessary. No one seems to have been concerned that the wind would render any thoughts of a contained fire otiose. Compared with the pictures of the devastation as seen in photographs taken of Richmond after the fire, Lankford reminds the reader that nine-tenths of the city's commercial district was consumed by the fire, including eight hundred buildings. In addition to the physical damage, Lankford catalogues other losses, including valuable state documents and other historical items. "Letters of George Washington and two-hundred-year-old colonial indentures fluttered in the breeze"

Its fall is the most dramatic event in the city's history, said Nelson Lankford, author of "Richmond Burning: The Last Days of the Confederate Capital." "In three days, you've got the Confederate government fleeing, the Southern army retreats, the city burns, slavery ends, and Abraham Lincoln himself walks through the smoking ruins," he said. "It doesn't get any more dramatic than that."

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department is taking back Unwanted prescription drugs April, 27, 2019 at the Sheriff's Department

On Saturday, April 27, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 17th opportunity in nine years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last fall Americans turned in nearly 460 tons (more than 900,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at more than 5,800 sites operated by the DEA and almost 4,800 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 16 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in almost 11 million pounds—nearly 5,500 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

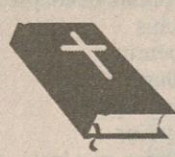

Tishomingo County Native Serves 40 Years as Mayor of Hodgkins, Illinois

Hodgkins mayor already a winner in April

Cummings unopposed as he seeks 11th four-year term

We recently received a letter from Rodney Cummings, the great nephew of Noel Barney Cummings, originally of Burnsville. He wanted to share with our readers a recent story that was published in the Des Plaines Valley News, a local paper based in Lemont, Illinois, in Cook County. Noel Barney Cummings born in 1927 in the Turnpike Mountain Road area is being featured for his many years of service (40) as the mayor (technically Village President) of Hodgkins, Illinois.

Mr. Cummings has many relatives and friends in Tishomingo County that will enjoy this tribute which was published on March 7, 2019. Thank you to the DesPlaines Valley News for sharing with our readers.

Mayor Noel B. Cummings enjoyed a hearty laugh in his office at the Hodgkins Village Hall when asked if he is surprised nobody challenged him in the upcoming election.

"Not really," he said. "I've got a good record and everybody is on our team."

That record stretches back 40 years as mayor, 44 if you add his one term as a trustee.

Cummings is running unopposed and on April 2 will win his 11th four-year term as mayor. According to Wikipedia, he is the longest-serving current mayor in Illinois.

Oh, and he celebrated his 91st birthday in October.

At an age where few are working, let alone running a thriving community, he can be found in his first-floor office, working as mayor.

"I enjoy it. I enjoy being where I can help people. The residents of the village of Hodgkins, I like to help everyone. And all of our businesses, too," he said last week.

Cummings had opponents his first three mayoral elections. Counting this year, he's 8-0 running unopposed.

Cummings leans on lessons learned growing up on a farm in Mississippi, "where nobody put locks on the doors and everybody trusted each other. What a great com-

munity it was. What a wonderful life I had living there."

It was there his father told him the best way to defeat an enemy was to make him your friend. "That's what I've tried to do," he said.

After winning his first mayoral election, he brought in the opposition and told them if they were serious about improving Hodgkins, they should serve on a planning committee.

"We were one of the poorest little towns in Illinois. People asked me why I wanted to be mayor. I told them it won't be that way when we get through with it," Cummings said with a smile.

It's changed dramatically under Cummings.

A former motor freight terminal that stretched from East Avenue to La Grange Road, on the south side of Joliet Road, is now home to the Quarry Shopping Center that boasts a Target, Kohl's, Walmart and Sam's Club.

There's a gun range in town, and a movie theater complex.

Don't forget the sprawling industrial park south of 67th Street, home to dozens of companies. You can see it from the Tri-State Tollway. And then there's the UPS facility.

"We have the largest package sorting plant in the world. The UPS plant. In the world. I like to brag about that every time I get the chance," he said.

It's all a testament to Cummings' vision that, at age 91, is clear as ever.

"We're not done yet," he says. "We still have some empty spaces."

He hopes to bring retail to a seven-acre site on Lenzi Avenue where an apartment complex had stood.

The village last year began acquiring houses that were in ill repair, Village Attorney John O'Connell said.

"We've started a beautification program downtown where we find an old house, something up for sale, or goes into foreclosure. We've purchased the property, will tear it down and sell it to developers for \$60,000 per parcel with the understanding they will build a new home," O'Connell said.

There are six new such houses in Hodgkins.

Cummings' right-hand man through the years has been O'Connell, a former state representative. When they met, Cummings took it as a good omen as O'Connell shared a first name with the mayor's older brother.

"He was the best brother you could have. I told my wife I wish I could find someone like him, and I found him," Cummings said.

Asked about Cummings' decision to serve four more years, O'Connell said, "well, he's healthy."

"His hearing isn't good and (that) drives me nuts. But I've got used to talking loudly. I'd rather have his hearing bad than his mind."

Cummings is sharp as a tack. His eyes are bright. His handshake is strong.

He'd love to see elected leaders in Washington, D.C., adopt his policy of working together. "A house divided against itself can't stand," he said, borrowing from Abe Lincoln.

"That's what's going to happen to our country if it keeps going this way.

How sad it is. Instead of trying to help each other, they try to knock each other.

"We're all in the same boat, Democrats on one side, Republicans on the other. And we're shooting at each other."

When you sink the boat, everybody goes down, not just one side," he warned.

For now, Cummings' focus – as it has been the past four decades – is on making Hodgkins the best it can be.

Cummings laughed when told he'll be 95 when this term ends in 2023. "I'll prop him up," O'Connell quipped.

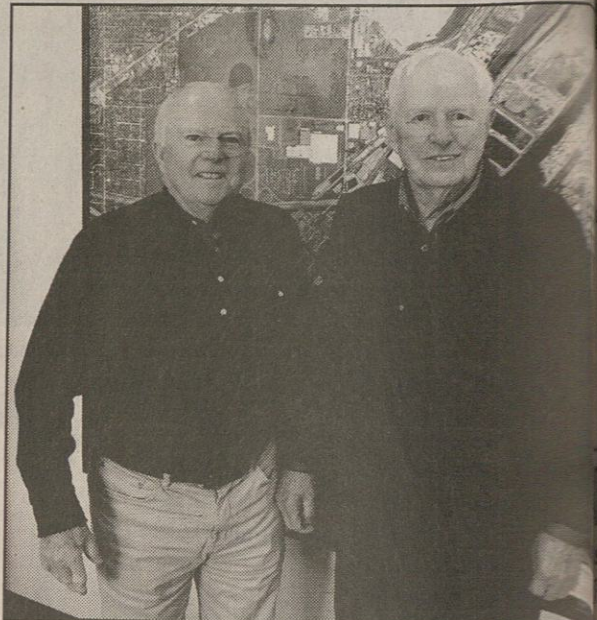

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 11)

Someone has well said, "What we learn from history is that we do not learn from history." That may sound like a nonsensical statement, but it really is not, for though we do learn some things from history, yet we fail to apply what we have learned to life, at least in many situations. This is true of our study of King Solomon and his book of Ecclesiastes, for though we learn many things that Solomon tried to find fulfillment in life and failed to find it, we often pursue the same trivial things! Ecclesiastes was written to give us insight into the present life, not necessarily about how to be saved for heaven or how to live for the next life. The interesting thing is that life is still "vain" or empty for most people who seek to follow the same paths that Solomon said were "empty pursuits". The next fellow usually seems to think that he will do better than the last one who failed, but he usually does not. In Ecclesiastes 2:19, Solomon said that he had been wise in his accumulation of wealth, yet he said even the gaining of material things was also empty,

because the son or relative who "gets it all" may waste it and live as a fool. How many times have we seen this in modern life?

Ecclesiastes 2:20-23 says, "Therefore I went about to cause my heart to despair of all the labour which I took under the sun. For there is a man whose labour is in wisdom, and in knowledge, and equity; yet to a man that hath not laboured therein shall he leave it for his portion. This also is vanity and a great evil. For what hath man of all his labour, and of the vexation of his heart, wherein he hath laboured under the sun? For all his days are sorrows, and his travail grief; yea, his heart taketh not rest in the night. This is also vanity." Please keep in mind that the Hebrew word "vanity" means: "emptiness". Here we see the wisest king before Jesus bemoaning the fact that life is empty for him. If life is not in what one can accumulate and leave to his children, then what is the purpose of life? I am glad you are perhaps thinking about this, for our book of Ecclesiastes will tell us toward the end of it just what is really impor-

tant in life. Most people in our world today seem to have very little idea about why we are here and what we should be doing; this accounts for the rise in the number of suicides every year.

Solomon honestly sought to find out the real purpose of life, but he discovered along the way that it was not in accumulating wealth; marrying a thousand wives and concubines and having any other natural thing one could desire. So why not follow the wisest king before Jesus to see what he will finally conclude about the purpose of life? Our verses above show Solomon in hot pursuit to learn why one would labor for nothing, for a wise and wealthy man may leave his gains to a foolish and wasteful child. Solo-

mon said this was an empty pursuit. A man might have sorrow in his labors on earth ("under the sun" means life on earth, which is what this whole book of Ecclesiastes shows), without much rest, and that, says Solomon, is an empty pursuit also. Many people want to make sure that their children have it much easier in life than they have had it, thus many of them never teach their children to earn their own way. Such thinking is what produces spoiled brats who think that they are "smarter" than their parents and elders, yet many of them have never learned how to make their own living.
