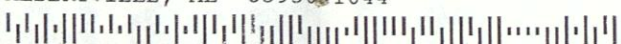

South Tishomingo County Museum and Jerry Martin Memorial Research Center Unveiling

On June 6, 2019 an unveiling ceremony was held to celebrate the South Tishomingo County Museum and Jerry Martin Memorial Research Center located in the former Belmont Town Hall.

President Stephanie Holder reported "that the South Tishomingo County Historical Society is raising \$10,000 to renovate the old city jail as a museum and research center. We searched for a long time for a good location for the facility and finally settled on the old jail. After much discussion, we decided to honor long-time resident Jerry Martin by naming the research center for him."

During the program Senator P. Wilemon shared humorous stories from Belmont's past and Jerry McAnally gave an overview of the life and contributions of Belmont resident Jerry Martin.

Local historian Jerry Martin was born in Belmont in 1936, the son of Bill and Eura Martin. He was known as "The Native Son" who spent hundreds of hours in research on the book he published, "A Place Called Belmont." It was never a "best seller" but it was "best loved" in Belmont and the surrounding area. Jerry died at the age of 42 in 1978 but was always dedicated totally to the growth and development of Belmont. He often would sacrifice personally to get a job accomplished to promote athletic and school oriented programs. He

2018 Unemployment Rate Breaks Historic Records

Economists consider an unemployment rate below 5% to be full employment.

The annual unemployment rate for Tishomingo County in 2018 was 4.6%, the lowest unemployment rate since such statistics have been kept.

The latest monthly (April 2019) unemployment rate for Tishomingo County is 4.2%.

The unemployment rate can change dramatically from month to month as businesses and industries add or layoff workers in response to economic conditions.

The highest unemployment rate for Tishomingo County was 25.3% in 1984. The lowest unemployment rate during the

TVA nuclear power plant construction was 13.0% and during the NASA construction period 6.3%. Source: Mississippi Department of Employment Security.

The unemployment rate is good news for those in the workforce but bad news for employers struggling to find qualified workers. One local employer is busing workers from a neighboring state.

Attracting workers from outside the region is difficult due to perceptions of life in Mississippi, the lack of modern af-

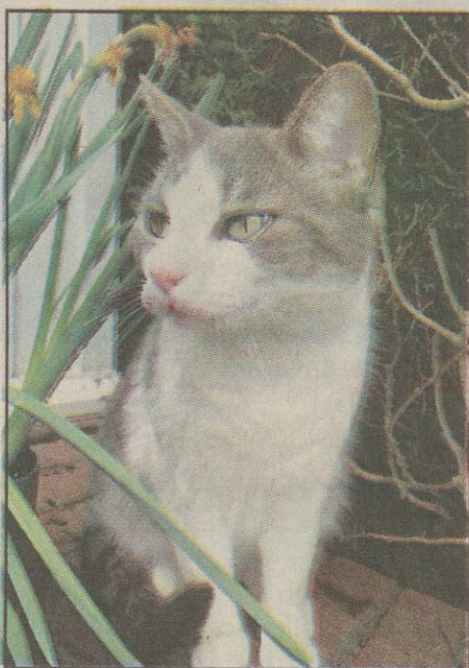

Franklin County Woman Arrested For Drugs

On June 8th Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies conducted a safety checkpoint at the intersection of County Road 71 and County Road 82 in the Golden area. While at the checkpoint, a vehicle approached which was occupied by three males and one female. Deputies could smell an odor of alcohol coming from the vehicle and spoke with the driver who gave the deputy's the consent to search the vehicle.

During the search deputies found some alleged drug paraphernalia in a purse that belonged to the female occupant, Stephanie McCarley. While taking McCarley into custody, deputies found a container which held two

bags of alleged methamphetamine. The deputies also discovered that McCarley was attempting to chew up a bag of the alleged methamphetamine so the deputies couldn't get confiscate it. McCarley was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Stephanie McCarley, 45-year-old, white female, of Vina, Alabama was officially charged with the felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), and the felony tampering with evidence. McCarley remains in the custody of the Tishomingo County Jail, awaiting bond to be set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court.

Traffic Stop Leads To Drug Arrest

On June 5th Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies conducted a traffic stop on Pleasant Hill Road and Hwy. 72 in the Iuka area for reckless driving. Anthony Hamm was arrested for possession which was enhanced due to Hamm also being in possession of a firearm.

The deputies observed a vehicle which appeared to be chasing another vehicle down Hwy. 72 and proceeded with the traffic stop.

As the deputies were speaking to the driver, Anthony Hamm, the deputy observed that he seemed extremely nervous. The deputy also observed an alleged "meth pipe" in plain view in the console

of the truck.

At this time, Hamm was placed under arrest and a search of the vehicle turned up a large amount of alleged methamphetamine. A firearm was also located in close proximity to the alleged illegal narcotic. The driver was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Anthony Hamm, 45-year-old, white, male of Cherokee, Alabama was officially charged with the felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) - enhanced w/firearm. Hamm's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$7,500.

Jerry was named to the NEMJC Hall of Fame

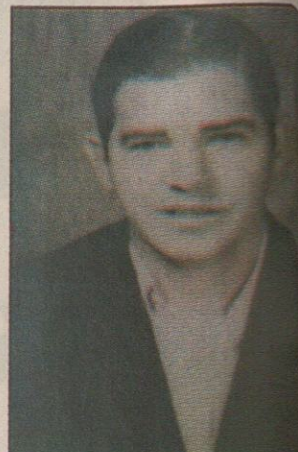
and started the first Jaycee Chapter in Belmont. He was instrumental in saving the old Belmont Depot. It was taken down board

North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka Offers New Heart Testing

North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka recently expanded its nuclear medicine services to include studies of the heart.

Nuclear medicine is a sub-department of Radiology. The procedures demonstrate anatomy and/or function of body organs - in particular, the heart. The images are developed based on the detection of energy emitted from a radioactive substance given to the patient. Radiation to the patient is generally similar to that resulting from standard X-ray.

This new service, under the leadership of Tiffany Elrod, was recently accredited by the American College of Radiology in Planar and Heart Imaging.

"This advance in technology signifies the professionalism and quality offered in this area," said Karen Barnes, Radiology director. "We are one of the few facilities in this region who are ACR accredited in Heart Imaging."

ACR accreditation

means that:

A facility has voluntarily gone through a review to ensure that it meets nationally-accepted standards of care.

The personnel are well-qualified, through education and certification.

The equipment is appropriate and the facility meets or exceeds quality and safety guidelines.

The information provided by nuclear medicine examinations is unique and is not available by using other imaging methods. For many heart diseases nuclear medicine studies offers the most useful information needed to make a diagnosis, and may even eliminate the need for exploratory surgery in some cases.

The trained staff at NMMC-Iuka includes a certified nuclear medicine technologist, a registered respiratory therapist and a physician.

Physicians use cardiac nuclear medicine studies to help diagnose cardiac disease. The symptoms include unexplained chest pain or chest pain brought

on by exercise (angina).

Cardiac nuclear medicine imaging is also performed:

to visualize blood flow patterns to the heart walls, called a myocardial perfusion scan

to evaluate the presence and extent of suspected or known coronary artery disease

to determine the extent of injury to the heart following a heart attack, or myocardial infarction

to evaluate the results of bypass surgery or other revascularization procedures designed to restore blood supply to the heart in conjunction with an electrocardiogram (ECG), to evaluate heart-wall movement and overall heart function with a technique called cardiac gating.

A cardiologist reads all studies and sends results to the referring provider, who will inform the patient of the findings.

"We want to be our community's choice for imaging services," Barnes said. "We offer this and other advanced scans so you and your family can have the tests you need without having to travel far from home."

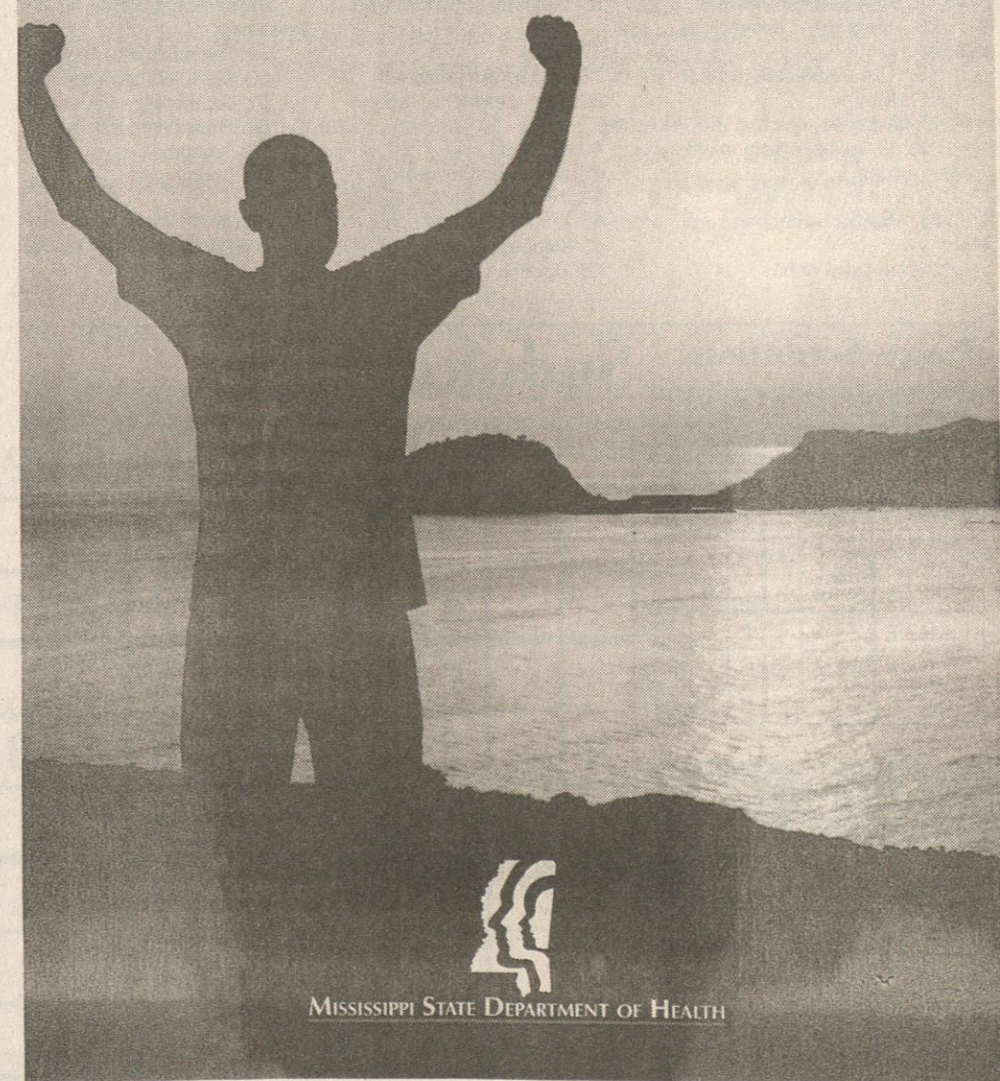

According to Nelson Johnson, stolen were 2 3x5 ft. gates, 200 ft. of fence top rails and 2 fence posts dug up from the ground. History of Hubbard Cemetery

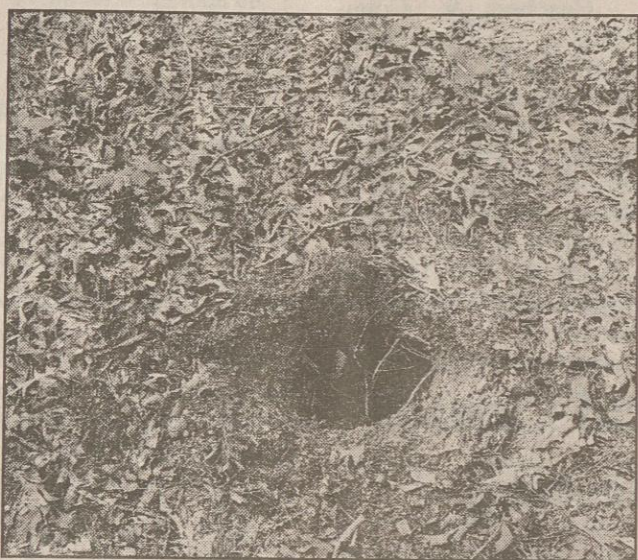

Green Finley Hubbard donated the land for the cemetery somewhere in the 1850's. He is buried there as are several Hubbards. He also donated the land for Hubbard Salem Baptist Church. His grandson Jack Hubbard Sr., who for most of his life, except for time in the military, lived in Indiana visited a few years ago and told us he wished the cemetery could be cleaned up and an entrance way be built with the name above it. So we volunteered to work on the project. Jack Hubbard gave the first 100.00 dollars to get this started. Hubert Hubbard's (also a relative of Finley Hubbard) children, Wheeler, Glenda and Steve of California, have been a financial help on the project also. Others have donated money and their time. The Davis family, James Bonds, Danny Hollon, Melvin Davis,



Robert Lard, and others have joined us on several clean up days.

Graves at the cemetery include: Martha Indiana Bonds, died 1899; Able Walker Bugg died 1939; A. L. Introduction - Our family of seven boys and three girls were born and raised in Tishomingo County. I am Jerrell the youngest child and only surviving member of our family. I will be writing an article about each one of us.

William Paul McNutt was the oldest boy and he was born in 1906 at Iuka, Mississippi. He died in 1995. One summer he enrolled in a two week music school. He had finished the 11th grade in High school. A traveling music teacher taught this class at Dennis, Miss. The almost grown daughter of the teacher assisted this new class. Paul was a handsome young man with black wavy hair. He played the Piano, Violin and had an excellent singing voice. A romance quickly developed between Paul and this pretty young lady. The music teacher was very unhappy. He took Paul outside the building and said, "If you do not stay away from my daughter I will beat the HELL out of you. I do not want her to be around country trash like you." About 45 years later while I was serving as A Chaplain at Baptist Hospital in Pensacola, Florida I visited a patient who had several members of his family present. As I left the room a well-dressed elderly lady stopped me and said, "Did you ever know a Paul McNutt in Mississippi? My father was a music teacher." I knew immediately that this was the LADY. So I said, "He was my oldest brother. He graduated with honors at Tishomingo High School. Then in 1930 he earned a degree in Chemistry from Miss State University. He

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE, PURCHASE, POSSESSION, DISTRIBUTION, SALE OR OFFERING FOR SALE OF SYNTHETIC CANNABINOIDS AND OTHER SYNTHETIC PRODUCTS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi have determined that certain substances are being sold within the municipal boundaries of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, that, when ingested, produce intoxicating effects similar to THCA, marijuana, Methcathinone, opioids and/or prescription pain relieving medication; and

WHEREAS, not all of the substances described below are yet categorized as illegal controlled substances under Mississippi or the laws of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the substances described below are often used as an alternative to marijuana, opioids and other controlled substances and are dangerous to the health, safety and welfare of individuals who ingest such substances and dangerous as well to the general welfare of their families and the citizens of this City; and

WHEREAS, it has determined that the effects of these substances are a health concern to the citizens of Tishomingo, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Tishomingo, Mississippi, have determined the need to establish an ordinance preventing the use, possession, purchase, distribution, sale or attempt to use, possess, purchase, distribute or sale or publicly display for sale any one or more of the following chemicals or substances within the municipal boundaries of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi; and therefore adopt the following ordinance and penalties; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 21-13-1 et. seq. of Mississippi Code Annotated of 1972 as may be amended from time to time, this Ordinance Prohibiting The Use, Purchase, Possession, Distribution, Sale Or Offering For Sale Of Synthetic Cannabinoids Or Other Synthetic Products is for the immediate and temporary preservation of the public peace, health and safety and welfare and for other good causes described herein, pursuant to Section 21-13-11, this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its unanimous adoption, prior to being recorded and published, as being in the best interests of the public to become immediately effective.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, that the following be added and made a part of the Tishomingo, Mississippi Code of Ordinances, To-Wit:

1. No person shall use, possess, purchase, distribute, sale or attempt to use, possess, purchase, distribute or sell or publicly display for sale any one or more of the following chemicals within the city limits of Tishomingo, Mississippi.

- Salviadinorum or salvinorum A: all parts of the plant presently classified botanically as salvia divinorum, whether growing or not, the seeds thereof an extract from any part of such plant, and every compound, manufacture salts derivative, mixture or preparation of such plant, its seeds or extracts;
- (6aR, 10aR)-9-(hydroxymethyl)-6,6dimethyl-3-(2-methyloctan-2-yl)-6a7, 10. 10a-tetrahydrobenzo [c] chromen-1-ol. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: HU-210;
- 1 -Penty-1-3-(1 -naphthoyl) indole. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: JWH-018/ spice;
- 1- Butyl-3- (1-naphthoyl) indole. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: JWH-073;
- 1 -(3-[trifluoromethylphenyl] piperazine. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: TFMIP;
- 4-methoxymethcathinone and Ethylcathinone;
- Mitragyna speciosa korth, Mitragyna speciosa leaf extract, Mitragyna speciosa extract, and M. speciosa alkaloids, including ajmalicine, mitraphylline, rhynchophylline and mitragynine pseudoindoxyl, raubasine, pausinyastalia johimbe and corynantheidine, 7-acetoxymitragynine, Corynoxen, Corinnoxin, 3-Dehydromitragynin, (-)-Epicatechin, 3-Isocorynantheidin, 3-Isopaynanthein, Isomitraphyllin, Isospeciofolin, Isospecioxonine, Mitraciliatin, Mitrafolin, Mitragynalin, Mitraphyllin, Mitraspecin, Mitraversin, Paynanthein, Speciociliatin, Speciofolin, Speciogynin, Specionoxen, Speciogynin, Speciofolin, Stipulatin. Some trade or other names, including, but not limited to: Kratom, kratom, kakum, ketum, ithang, thom, biak-biak, kratum, mambog, Super K, Life Force K, K-Chill, K-shot;
- Or any similar structural analogs.

2. If any of the aforementioned substances shall be found in the possession of any person, unless specifically excluded herein, the substances shall be confiscated and destroyed by law enforcement officials.

3. It shall not be an offense under Section 1 above of this Ordinance if a person shall be acting at the direction of an authorized agent of Tishomingo, Mississippi, to enforce or ensure compliance with this law prohibiting the use, possession, purchase, distribution or sale the aforementioned substance.

4. This Ordinance shall not apply to any person who shall commit any act described in this Ordinance pursuant to the lawful direction or prescription of duly-licensed physician or dentist authorized to direct or prescribe such act. This Ordinance shall not apply to the inhalation of anesthesia for a medical or dental purpose which inhalation of anesthesia shall be administered by or under the supervision of a duly licensed physician or dentist.

5. Any person found to be guilty of violating this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed One Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$ 1,000.00) or imprisonment not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

6. That should any sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, and shall not affect the validity of the Code of Ordinance as a whole.

7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately. The Clerk shall cause the ordinance to be published in a local newspaper with a general circulation.

WHEREAS, the Ordinance prohibiting the use, purchase, possession, distribution, sale or offering for sale of synthetic cannabinoids or other synthetic products was read, discussed and voted upon in a public meeting, and whereas a motion was duly made by Alderwoman Barbara Oaks, seconded by Alderman Anthony Stone, and after a thorough discussion of the merits of the motion, the Mayor called for a vote they were recorded with the following results, to-wit:

Whereupon, the forgoing Ordinance Prohibiting the Use, Purchase, Possession, Distribution, Sale or Offering for Sale of Synthetic Cannabinoids or Other Synthetic Products passed by a unanimous vote of all of the governing body, was declared Adopted and shall become effective immediately on this, the 20th day of May, 2019.

Presley: PSC Charges 5 Telemarketers for No-Call Violations Totalling More Than 2.2 Million in Fines

Jackson, Mississippi (June 7, 2019) – Today, Commissioner Brandon Presley announced that the Mississippi Public Service Commission has charged multiple telemarketers with violations of the Mississippi No-Call law.

The PSC's investigation found that these 5 companies made 442 illegal calls to Mississippians. Should these entities be found to have violated the No-Call law, they are subject to a \$5,000 per call fine; totaling \$2,210,000. Notices of alleged violations have been recently filed against the following companies:

Advanced Marketing Science
Vehicle Protection Specialists
Ascendant Marketing Group

"Our staff will continue to do everything they can to actively seek out companies and individuals who continue to violate our No-Call law. We remain vigilant and will ultimately bring those who violate it to justice. These illegal calls against the people of our state will stop," said Commissioner Presley.

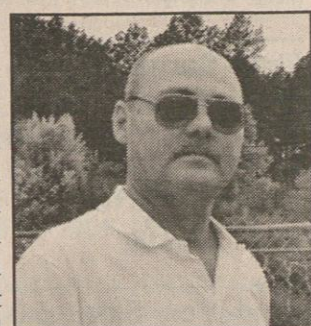

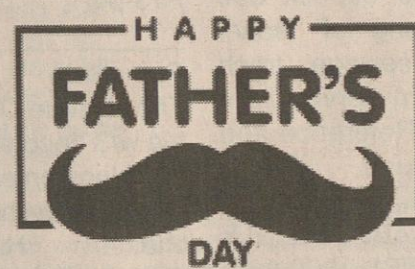
Amos Odell Rutledge

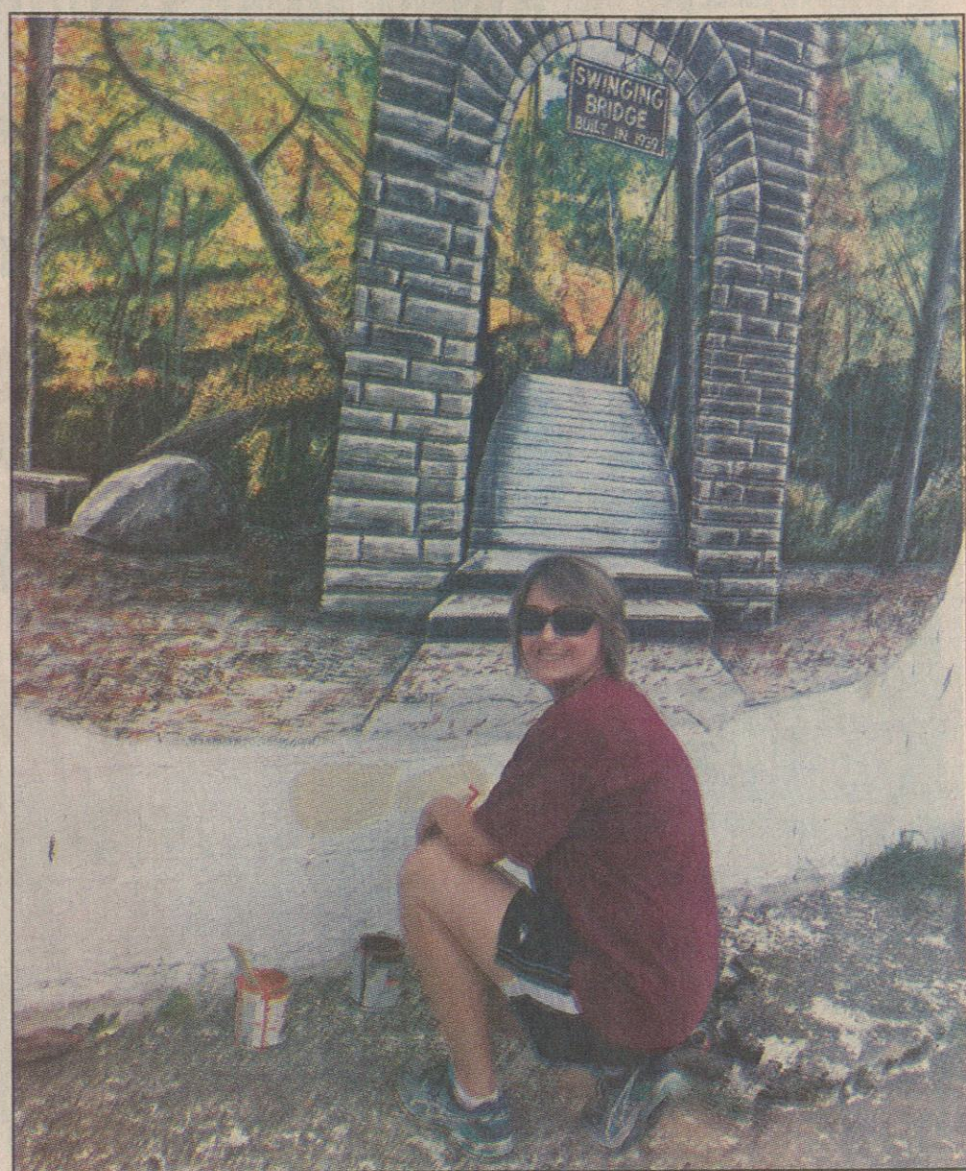

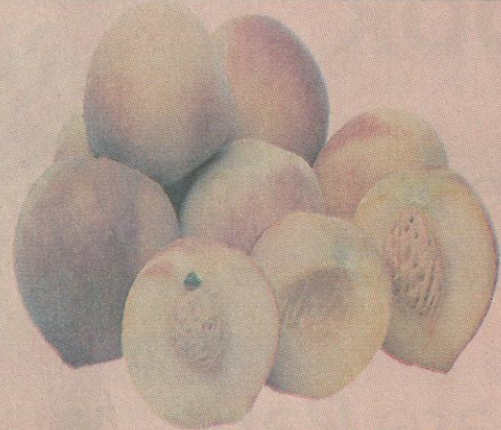

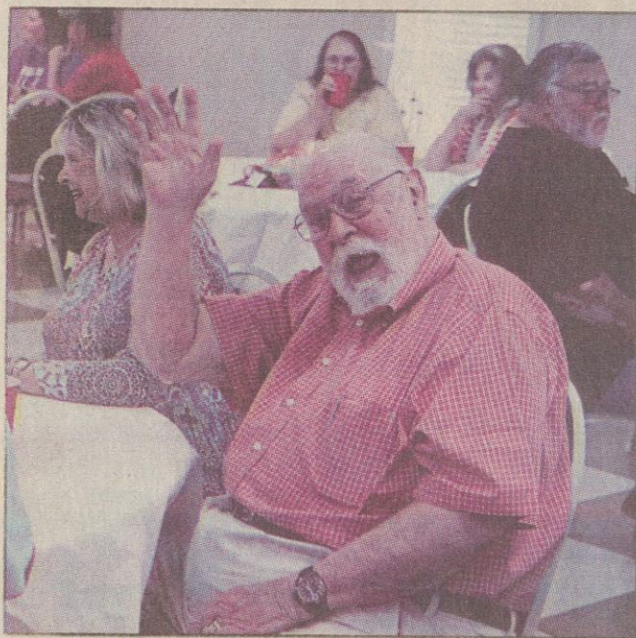
