Iuka Methodist Church Ceiling Collapses

On Sunday morning around 11 a.m. the ceiling of the Iuka Methodist Church came crashing down just before everyone was to arrive for services. Luckily no one was injured during the incident though two individuals were present at the church when the ceiling fell. At the time there will be no Sunday school services but an 11 a.m. worship service will be held this Sunday morning in the gymnasium of the church, everyone is asked to please enter the gym through the side entrance.

The church has begun the process of evaluating the damage and contacting the insurance company to move forward



with repairs. It has not been determined at this time why the ceiling fell. According to eyewitness reports the two individuals heard strange noises coming from the ceiling of the church, they moved out of the sanctuary and continued to listen for the sounds before the ceiling collapsed. The damage inside the church is quite extensive making the sanctuary almost un-

recognizable.

Normally the organ player arrives early to practice the morning music but fortunately on this particular Sunday she was not scheduled to play. A powerful image was captured by one of the church members of the sanctuary; in the middle of the destruction the Bible resting on the pulpit remained unmoved. Members of the church expressed their thankfulness that the Lord was watching over them.

ity. The Tishomingo Police are working hard to keep our town safe, Chief Mike Kemp.



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

Joint Arrest Leads to Drug Arrest

On October 13th Patrol officers for the Iuka Police Department conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle on Hwy. 25 due to the driver of the vehicle, Daniel Scott Darling having an outstanding arrest warrant issued by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office.

During the traffic stop, the Iuka Police Department was assisted by deputies from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office. During the arrest Darling was found to be in possession of a large amount of alleged methamphetamine in his pocket.

A Search Warrant was then issued on Darling's residence located on County Road 192, just outside the city limits of Iuka. There, deputies and investigators found several items used to package and weigh narcotics.

Daniel Scott Darling, 31-year-old, white male, of Iuka, Mississippi was officially charged by Iuka Police for the felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) w/intent to sell. Darling's bond was set by the City of Iuka at \$15,000. Also, Darling had a misdemeanor justice court warrant bond in the amount of \$815.

Darling is currently

out on felony bond in the State of Alabama and Tishomingo County. This is another example of local law enforcement agencies working together to help protect the citizens of Tishomingo County and surrounding areas.

Lottery Tickets to Go on Sale November 25!

JACKSON, MISS. — The Mississippi Lottery Corporation (MLC) announced today that lottery scratch-off tickets will go on sale November 25.

"The earlier start date reflects our rapid progress," said MLC President Tom Shaheen.

In anticipation, the MLC has started mailing acceptance letters to the first approved lottery retailers. Letters will continue to be mailed as more retailers are approved. Approvals are based on retailers meeting the requirements in the Alyce G. Clarke Lottery Law and providing all the requisite information in the retailer package. They must also successfully pass required background, financial, tax

and credit checks.

"We are beyond excited about working with such a great group of retailers," said Shaheen. "The acceptance letter includes next step information addressing retailer training and store preparation for lottery terminals and equipment. Retailers will also receive a lottery certificate, which is required to be visibly posted in their location."

"The pillar of the lottery is having successful retailers on board," he continued. "We are working with retailers to ensure they are well-prepared for launch."

For those potential retailers who have not signed up and are interested, please visit www.mslotteryhome.com and click on "Retailer Resources." There is no limit to the number of retailers the MLC may accept.

Approved retailers are posted on www.mslotteryhome.com and will be updated periodically as more retailers are approved. The MLC's goal is to have as many retailers as possible selling statewide. The MLC will continue to accept retailer applications.

Charlotte's Attic

Sunday morning I got a call from my dear friend telling me of the collapse of the ceiling in the Iuka Methodist Church. I grew up in the church and my heart was heavy. I drove to town to see what I thought would be a complete collapse but was so relieved to see the beautiful stained glass windows and the outside structure of the building intact. Jane, who usually plays the organ, was thankfully off this Sunday. She always arrives at the church around 9:00 to practice and most assuredly would have been hurt. I also received a call from Billy McKissick who had got to the church before 9:00 and watched the ceiling come down. He said minutes before the collapse no one was coming from the sanctuary as someone was walking in the attic. The early arrivals thankfully felt something was wrong and stayed out of the old sanctuary. In 2001 the structure was condemned and services were held in the basement some time before the "all clear" was given. That was 18 years ago.

The historic church is a monument to the people who settled Iuka many years ago. It has witnessed many wedding, funerals, baptisms, and even the offering of the Civil War. Thank goodness the brick walls stood the collapse and the church can be returned to its glory.

I wanted to share a story of the church that appeared in the 150th anniversary guide.

The Iuka Methodist Episcopal Church South was organized in Iuka in 1858. It was comprised of members who moved from Eastport, which was a river town before the Civil War, and the New Hope Church, located 2 1/2 miles south of Iuka.

Old New Hope was transferred almost entirely to Iuka. The church was formed in 1842, two years before the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. The church in Eastport was formed in 1848. From these two churches, Iuka received the pioneer Methodists who firmly planted the doctrine of the people called Methodists.

The earliest records of Iuka Methodist were destroyed during the Civil War, however, Mrs. S.E. Ashmore, wife of the Rev. Ashmore (pastor 1931-38), researched and recorded the church history as best she could: In 1845, while this town was yet unbuilt, Robert Williams and his wife and William Richardson lived throughout the country following the Indian paths and preached wherever a congregation could be gathered: in orchards, in houses, private homes or out under the open skies. With the help of another local pastor, Mr. Elias J. Tidwell, their preaching was "Hosanna of the Lord." Mrs. Robert Williams was powerful in her exposition of the doctrine of sanctification. Another of those early preachers who laid the foundation for Iuka and Methodism was William Winburn, who has long since been gathered to his father.

In 1857, with the completion of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, which linked the Atlantic Ocean to the Mississippi River, the town of Iuka was planned.

At that time all of this section of Mississippi was part of the Memphis Conference of the Meth-

odist Episcopal Church South, which was established in 1846 as a split off from the Tennessee Conference. It was served for "The dark days of the sixties wrought many changes to the young church," wrote Mrs. Ashmore. "Our church was an infant church in an infant town in a very young country. Survival was hard. When the Civil War broke out, the shifting sands of providence rocked the very foundations of this church. During the war years (1861-65) "our church nearly disorganized."

In 1861, George Brooks was the pastor, but he, like many of the men of the church, enlisted in the Confederate Army. These men left their homes, young brides, infant children, ailing parents and struggling businesses. As G.P. Hammerly stated, "... the town had only existed three or four years when the Civil War broke out, which closed nearly all kinds of businesses."

Because Iuka was the scene of a bloody conflict - and bordered several others - our church was one of several local structures to be used as a hospital. "... through its doors were carried the sick, wounded and dying of both the Southern and Northern armies," Mrs. Ashmore wrote. Local historian, Irene Barnes, wrote "... Nineteen-year-old Ordinance Sergeant Fairfax Washington, with Company F of the 38th Mississippi Calvary, was one of hundreds who lost their lives from the Battle of Iuka, September 19, 1862. Washington's Civil War record revealed he died two weeks after a leg amputation. Reverend William McKnight, an Iuka minister, took the young soldier into his home and after death provided a place for his burial on the McKnight family plot at Oak Grove Cemetery... The paternal chart of the family of President George Washington... identifies Fairfax Washington as a 1st cousin three times removed.

During the four years of the Civil War, our church was without a regular pastor. Army chaplains and "local" preachers often filled the pulpit, which helped to keep the church together.

William McKnight, while never an ordained minister, was the first "local" preacher at Iuka Methodist. He became known as the Rev. McKnight, having assumed ministerial duties during the Civil War. "He was a faithful and true servant of God; his labors were abundant. He was loved by many. His seat in the sanctuary was always occupied when he himself was not in the pulpit," wrote Mrs. Ashmore. She also referred to him as a "ministering angel" during these uncertain times. "In the homes of the sorrow ... the prayers he breathed as loved ones passed away are cherished memories." He died Jan. 31, 1883, at his home.

Dr. D.C. Kelly was another such preacher. He was a member of Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest's army and sometimes filled the pulpit while stationed in and around Iuka and Eastport.

By war's end many Iuka businesses, homes and lives had been destroyed. Although the town's foundation was rocked, Iuka Methodist Episcopal Church's foundation never cracked.

These are the Civil War stories of many of our founding fathers and

their families:

John Thaddeus Barnett - served in the 26th Mississippi Infantry. After the war he returned and married Aug. 1, 1867, in the Iuka Methodist Episcopal Church. It is remembered, "he carried the marks of the conflict in his arm all his life..."


George Price Hammerly - served in the 11th Mississippi Infantry and was involved in Streight's Raid, among many other engagements as 2nd Lieutenant Company D of the 4th Alabama Calvary. Married in 1859 ... "I left my wife and babe of six months to the tender mercies of the world ... suffice it to say, at the surrender, I came home and found my family barely living."

Levi Williams - one of the founding members of Old New Hope Church. His son, John Washington Williams, served in the 4th Alabama Calvary. Another son, Major J.T. Williams was killed in the battle of Courtland.

Capt. C.J. Hyatt - served a little over a year in the 2nd Mississippi Regiment Company K under John Marshall Stone, which was known as the Iuka Rifles. Later he re-enlisted, serving as captain in the 11th Alabama Calvary and possibly the 4th Alabama Calvary, under General Nathan Bedford Forrest.

Samuel DeWoody - was an early founder coming from Eastport where he served as a trustee of the Methodist Church there. In April of 1862, the DeWoody Home was burned and Samuel fled with his family to Iuka. Five months later, following the September "Battle of Iuka," Confederate General Sterling Price withdrew his troops under the cover of darkness. When the Union Army advanced into Iuka the next morning, they were met by a group of citizens led by DeWoody who asked for protection of private property. During this event, DeWoody allegedly carried a bed sheet tied to a broom handle... Four months later, in January of 1863, DeWoody died. Three months later, one of his sons, James Coman DeWoody, died at the Battle of Day's Gap in Cullman, Ala.

Samuel Newland DeWoody - another son of Samuel, served in the 2nd Mississippi Infantry. In his war diary he wrote, "The Governor of this state is calling on the entire Militia and taking men from their homes and families to help repel the invaders from the North who dare to pollute this soil." Another entry, "Saturday evening we all had a shooting match. The Iuka Rifles came out successful - putting two more balls in the target than other company that shot the musket ... Sunday morning we all wanted to go to church, but a heavy shower of rain coming up at the time prevented us from doing so. Some of the boys are singing hymns and others reading their bibles. The balance are engaging themselves as best they can." Additional entry, "one of the most bloody battles that has ever been fought inside the UNS; and I have a slight presentiment (sic) that it may be possible that I may never live to see all of our most dear faces again while on earth; but I thank HEAVEN. I have fond hopes of meeting them all in eternity if should my lot to fall in defense of our fire-side and homes. Do not I pray, you be uneasy about me ... I know that some of us have to fall and am not willing to shirk from

the danger that attends the battlefield." Samuel fought in the 1st and 2nd Manassas, the Seven Day Battle and the Battle of Antietam before being captured at Gettysburg. He was imprisoned at Fort Delaware for more than two years.

James Headley Doan - this information was taken from his obituary ... "At the beginning of the war by means of his fine business qualifications, Mr. Doan had acquired a nice property, nearly all of which was lost in the war. He was a gallant soldier of the Confederacy; and there, as in everything else, he was conscientious and true in the discharge of his duty." An interesting local account: "From this house went the young husband and father to join the Confederacy in Roddy's command under Forrest. The story of his capture by the Union forces under Roscrans, his imprisonment in a tent in the backyard of the old McDonald home which at the time was Roscrans' headquarters and his escape are a vital part of the lore of Iuka." According to Lila McDonald's written history ... "A couple of the Doan boys managed to slip by guards and tap on the window of the room occupied by their mother and sisters to inquire if they were being properly treated. Assured the women were being shown every courtesy, the two disappeared ..." Another Doan, possibly John's father, is mentioned in a lighthearted account written by Ben McRae, our long serving church historian. Ben wrote the following account. "Everybody has crazy ancestors. Most of mine were on my dad's Mother's side, the Doans. In 1862, according to Mrs. Lila McDonald's written history, one of them, much too old to fight, met the advance element of the incoming Union Army, drew a line across the road with his cane and dared them to cross. To their credit, they treated him with respect and humored him for a few minutes before marching on ..."

William McKnight - was noted as being the person responsible for keeping this church together during the war years. He would preach and often "lead the singing (when no one else could or would)." It is said, he loved to sing and his favorite hymn was When I Can Read My Title Clear, to Mansions in the Sky.

Rev. R. A. Neblett - All that is known of this minister and his service is from the stone marker in Oak Grove Cemetery. CSA

During the Civil War our church stood as a place for healing as well as a sanctuary from the terrible conditions of war. Because of the "mercy and kindness" of the citizens of Iuka, a group of Illinois soldiers returned to their state and named a town "Iuka."

"Soon after the surrender, by 1866, the church was reorganized ... with two familiar stewards, A.T. Matthews and G.P. Hammerly, and William McKnight, local preacher, present." A regular station preacher was again in charge, who traveled what was then the Iuka Circuit. He remained until 1867. A Sunday school was reorganized with G.P. Hammerly serving as superintendent.

In the late 1860s, during the first quarterly conference, the official board was completed with the election of N.D. Rieses, Levi Williams, George Stamps and J.L. Moore. By 1870 Iuka Methodist Episcopal Church had become a member of the newly formed North Mississippi Conference, and the church continued to grow during the South's challenging years of Reconstruction. The Rev. Hezekiah Brown, G.K. Brooks, John Barcroft, Phillip Tuggle, E.E. Hamilton, D.D. Campbell, Joseph Johnson, John H. Scruggs, R.L. Harper and John B. Stone, to name just a few, were early elders and preachers who inspired the young church family.

When then Bishop McTier was struggling to found a Southern Method-

ist university, our church had the temerity to ask that it be built in Iuka. The invitation was evidently interesting, as the bishop was sufficiently impressed to bring his committee for a visit. The university was eventually established; Southern Methodist University is located in Dallas, Texas.

In the early 1880s the church was remodeled. The tall spire was added to the belfry, the colonial porch was changed to a vestibule, and the old box pulpit and mourners' bench was replaced by a smaller stand and chancel rail.

The slave gallery had become a whispering gallery for those who enjoyed coming to church, but who had no thought of reverence. Repairing the gallery was too expensive, so it was thought best to remove it. One early member stated: "Today we, like many churches, are asking the question, 'is it better to have a gallery where sinners often misbehave, or a reverent congregation but no sinners to hear the message?'"

In 1897 the sanctuary was remodeled again. The ceiling was changed, the floor inclined, new seats replaced the handmade benches and the founders of the church were remembered with memorial art windows.

A choir loft behind the pulpit was added to the church in 1906. In the center was placed an art glass window picturing the Good Shepherd and presented in honor of G.P. Hammerly who served as Sunday School Superintendent after his return from the Civil War until his death in 1918. Flanking the Good Shepherd window in the choir loft are two large memorial windows, one in honor of Levi Williams, the other in honor of J.T. Barnett, two early founding fathers of our church.

(Only one window was cracked in Sunday morning's collapse and the pulpit Bible remained as "a solid rock" in its resting place although the ceiling fell all around it.)

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 35)

Pastor's Tidbits

I love the Book of Ecclesiastes, perhaps because it says so many things about everyday life and how we should handle the problems that confront us from day to day. Ecclesiastes 7:10 is a good example of what I am saying: "Say not thou, What is the cause that the for-

mer days were better than these? For thou dost not enquire wisely concerning this." (My sentence structure and spelling is that of the King James Bible and may not be the same as modern usage.) What we say to ourselves, as well as to others, has much to do with who we are and

what we will become. Our verse says that there are some things that we should not say. It says that we should not question as to why the days of the past were seemingly better than those of the present. I suppose that all of us have sometimes talked about "the good ole days", and I do not think that this is exactly wrong, or that it is what Solomon had in mind when he wrote the above verse. It seems that he is telling us not to complain about the present and spoil its joy by dwelling on the past. More than that, we are getting better than we deserve, at any rate! The word "better" is often used in ways that may not give the whole picture. For example, some things of our "yesterdays" were better than some things in our present time. It seems that neighbors were more prone to help one another in earlier days, but that does not mean that there

are none who will help us in our times, for that is not a fact. Our days are better in some way, in that we have more conveniences today and better houses and cars. Our days are worse, in that we seem to have less care for God, country and others than most people had in days gone by. After all, it is not the days themselves that make things good or bad; it is what we do with the days that does that!

When Solomon said that we do not inquire (enquire in KJV spelling) wisely concerning the "whys" of yesterdays, it seems he is saying that we need to learn to live in the present, which is actually all we have anyway, and stop bemoaning the fact that some things are not as good as they were before. More than that, we can make the present better than it is by learning to care for others more than

we do, and by submitting to God and His will for our lives. It sometimes seems that the hardships of earlier days drew people together, perhaps more out of the necessity for it, yet we can allow closer relationships between us and others today if we so desire. It could be that a part of the problem is our selfishness, for we all likely realize that we have been selfish many times when we could have considered the needs of others. Maybe a part of our problem in

the present is that we are too preoccupied with our own problems, or that we never see the needs of others. Could it be that we are too prone to ourselves in with others? Maybe young and old could find ways to interact more each other and better the time.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department is taking back unwanted prescription drugs October 26, 2019 at the Sheriff's Department located at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS.

On Saturday, October 26th, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 18th opportunity in nine years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last fall Americans turned in nearly 460 tons (more than 900,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at more than 5,800 sites operated by the DEA and almost 4,800 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 16 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in almost 11 million pounds—nearly 5,500 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.


