# Large Turnout in General Election

Reeves takes Governor's Race, Daugherty Remains Sheriff Josh McNatt to be only New Face in Courthouse as Circuit Clerk replacing retiring Donna Dill

There was a large turnout in Tishomingo County for the General Election on Tuesday, November 5th; the Circuit Clerk's office reported that 55.65% of voters turned out to cast their ballots in this election. At the time of press 38 affidavit ballots still remain uncounted. All of the incumbent candidates who ran for reelection won their offices. A further breakdown of how Tishomingo County voted in the local election will be featured on page 8 of this week's news, the results are unofficial. The majority of the state voted

Republican in this election. The Circuit Clerk race was extremely close between Josh McNatt and Rebecca Oaks with McNatt receiving 35% and Oaks getting 34% of votes. Mc-Natt was successful in winning the Circuit Clerk position. In the race for Sheriff, John Dennis Daugherty won with 51% of the vote over his opponent Mike Kemp. The office of Tax Assessor was won by David Wayne Crum by 66%; Jena Pardue Mc-Natt will continue serving as Tax Collector and the position of County Prosecuting Attorney will remain in the hands of Nathaniel Clark. Donny Joe Sparks will also continue serving in Tishomingo County as Justice Court Judge after he received 57% of the vote in his race. In the South Half Constable race Donald Ray Thomas will remain in office after receiving 51% of the vote. In terms of the Board of Supervisors the First District is held by Brandon Grissom, Nicky McRae will continue serving in the Second District

position as Fourth District Su-

On the state level Tate Reeves will assume the office of Governor after taking 52% of the vote; and Delbert Hosemann won the office of Lieutenant Governor with 60% of the vote across the state. In the other state races relevant to Tishomingo County the office of State Treasure went to David McRae, Transportation Commissioner of the Northern District was won by John Caldwell, and Daniel Sparks won the race for State Senate by 72%. The Secretary of State for Mississippi will be Michael Watson, the race of Insurance Commissioner was taken by Mike Chaney, Lynn Fitch won the office of Attorney General and Andy Gipson will assume the office of Agriculture Commissioner.

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



## Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 38)

I have been writing from the Book of Ecclesiastes for some time, and I will continue until we finish this great book. Ecclesiastes has twelve chapters, and we are looking now at Ecclesiastes 7:15-17: "All things have I seen in the days of my vanity: there is a just man that perisheth in his righteousness, and there is a wicked man that prolongeth his life in his wickedness. not righteous over much; neither make thyself over wise: why shouldest thou destroy thyself? Be not over much wicked, neither be thou foolish: why shouldest thou die before thy time?" Our verses are interesting, in that they show that the thoughts of men are not necessarily the same as the thoughts of God. Solomon, whom I be-

one's life, and Solomon

seems to have forgotten

this, and he is not the only one who has made this terrible mistake and committed this terrible

First, Solomon noticed that the lives of men are not necessarily long or short, based on how they live. He has seen just men who have perished in their righteousness. Our word "perisheth" is a word that means: to wander away; i.e. to lose oneself; it is also translated: to have no way to flee. So, Solomon had seen righteous men who were caught in a trap, as we sometimes

Then he had seen wicked means that we do not men who had lived long lives and seemingly had very little trouble. So, we may conclude that there are still cases like these in our day, thus we should not look at men and judge them in our minds by the way things are going for them, for we may very well miss the mark concerning their righteousness or their wickedness! We need to let God be the Judge, Which He is anyway.

Now Soloman cautions men not to be too righteous, for they may destroy themselves. The dea is not that we can do too much good, rather it is that we can be too scrupulous about things. Solomon also warns about Evangelist, Rainsville, AL

We all should realize that no one person can "know it all", although some think they do! Solomon says similar things about wickedness and foolishness, yet he is not saying that men can be somewhat wicked, or somewhat foolish, rather he is saying that those who follow wickedness as a lifestyle, or foolishness, may shorten their lives and die "before their time". This lets us know that we can have something to do with the length of our lives by our lifestyles!







When my daughter Hayley was in college she came home one day with what she thought was an impossible task. Her history teacher told each student to find a World War II veteran and interview them and write a report. Hayley didn't think she knew anyone who was in World War II! But much to her surprise she had several great-uncles and her own grandfather, Pawpaw Johnny McVay. She took her tape recorder and went to interview Pawpaw. He, as most veterans, was very relunctant to talk about his service, but a loving grandchild is hard to resist. This is the report she did on her grandfather and it shows there were many different jobs during the war and it took everyone working together to defeat the enemy.

The Galapagos Islands during World War II An Interview with Johnny McVay By Hayley McVay Franks

The Galapagos Islands, a group of barren volcanic "rocks" located west of Ecuador on the equator, played a major role in the United States' victory over Japan in World War II.

Following the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941, the Pacific Ocean and its many islands became the fighting grounds between the United States and Japan (Sulzberger 587). The Galapagos Islands, located 600 miles west of the midland of Ecuador, were situated at the perfect spot to be the last stopover for supplying and refueling ships and aircrafts that were entering the Pacific Ocean battles. It was during this time that the United States forces established an air base on Seymour Island in the Galapagos Island group and the rocky landscape became vital to the war ef-

In 1942, in the small town of Iuka, Mississippi, 20-year-old Johnny McVay was working in a sawmill and helping his father farm when he got

his call to the Army. He had heard about the war in Europe, but he soon discovered that he would be going to the Pacific for his tour of duty.

The young soldier's journey began in September of 1942 at Camp Shelby in Mississippi. He stayed there for a week then went on to Camp Wallace in Galveston, Texas for eight weeks. His next stop was at Camp Patrick in Virginia where he spent thirty days before getting on a boat at Norfolk that would take him to Panama. It took six days to get there and the boat was torpedoed during the trip.

Paw Paw McVay (as he is known by his family), was in Panama almost two years, guarding the Panama Canal from invasion. He considered Panama "the worst place I've ever been". He said it was nasty and overcrowded and he never had anything to do with any of the people there. Marijuana grew wild in Panama and he especially remembered that they had no toilets in the town, everyone used a large pot and when finished they would pour it out into the street. He said that once he and a friend left the base and went into Panama for a visit. While there they watched a woman empty her pot from a balcony onto a man's head down below.

He described Panama as a jungle with many snakes and wild animals and told of seeing a black panther one evening during a blackout. He added that the soldiers didn't get to go to town much, so to pass the time, they would go the Navy base and play bingo or shoot craps. He also survived two hurricanes while in Panama.

While stationed in Panama he was in the Anti Aircraft Division but was later put in the Air Force and sent to the Galapagos Islands where he stayed almost four years.

The Galapagos Islands had been of no strategic importance in World War I, but with the attack on Pearl Harbor, Ecuador quickly gave the United States the right to build a

base on South Seymour Island. In 1942 the island became what American soldiers called "the rock", a home to an airstrip, water distillation plant, repair and refueling station, and constant guard over the Pacific entrance to the Panama Canal.

During his years on the Galapagos Islands, Paw Paw McVay said he made many friends and enjoyed it much more than his stay in Panama. He referred to the islands as "the rock", because there were no trees, only rocks. Also, there was no drinking water and a barge would bring the soldiers drinking water. He added that they took baths in the salt water and from where he was staying; he could see an island where the "Gooks" lived.

The "Gooks" were the natives form one of the populated islands of Galapagos. These natives would come to Seymour Island by barge and help the servicemen unload the Navy ships which had to anchor off the island.

During his stay on Seymour Island, Paw Paw never saw any combat but drove a truck pulling 90 mm, and air craft guns. He said that during the daytime he would load 1,000 pound B24 bombs on bombers and also drove vehicles pulling trailers loading and unloading ships and aircrafts. Seymour Island was just seven miles long and had only two runways for the planes to land on.

Most of the time he spent on the island was pleasant and a good experience. There was always plenty of beer to drink, but it was hot and there was no ice to cool it. He remembers only once getting low on food ration. He said the supply ship was several days late and there was nothing but soup to eat. When the ship did arrive, all the bananas on board were spoiled. The "gooks" took the spoiled bananas and made whiskey with them. Several of the natives died from the bad whiskey.

Another inconvience on the island was the lack of fresh water to do laun-

dry. He said they would tie their clothes to a rope and hang them over a cliff into the salt water and let the rocks clean the clothes.

"There was no one on Seymour Island but the Army and the animals", Paw Paw said. The animals included the huge iguanas and turtles for which the island is famous. Called the Tortoise Islands, they are home to numerous species found only in the archipelago. At home on the islands are six species of giant tortoise and other reptiles, including large lizards, and birds, including flamingos and penguins. There are many sea lions and Paw Paw stated that he and a friend had a pet sea lion named Oscar on the island.

Pay for the young soldiers was basically good. When Paw Paw McVay first entered the service he received \$30 a month. When he went into the Air Force He received \$600 and received 15% over seas pay. As a Corporal he was getting \$94 a month when he was discharged.

Young Johnny McVay received his first furlough to come home in January of 1945. During his 30day pass he got married and then returned to the island to spend another year and a half. He was discharged form the Air Force in 1947. Mention of the Galapagos Islands is not found in many World War II history books. Because there was no fighting or bombing on these

islands, they did not have great stories or movies written about them. But their importance should not go without notice. The victories in the South Pacific were aided by the hard work of the men stationed on Seymore Island.

The battle with Japan continued until August 6th, 1945, when an atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan. A second bomb hit Nagasaki three days later.

On the 15th of August, Emperor Hirohito broadcast to his people - the first time he had ever talked

to them to say the fighting was ended. Thus August 15th, 1945 will always be known Victory Japan.



Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and Nov. 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938. Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans-living or dead-but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.

When Is Veterans
Day?

Veterans Day occurs on November 11 every year in the United States in honor of the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918 that signaled the end of World War I, known as Armistice Day.

In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed by Congress, which moved the celebration of

Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. The law went into effect in 1971, but in 1975 President Gerald Ford returned Veterans Day to November 11, due to the important historical significance of the date.

Veterans Day commemorates veterans of all wars.

Great Britain, France, Australia and Canada also commemorate the veterans of World War I and World War II on or near November 11th: Canada has Remembrance Day, while Britain has Remembrance Sunday (the second Sunday of November).

In Europe, Great Britain and the Commonwealth countries it is common to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every November 11.

Every Veteran's Day and Memorial Day, Arlington National Cemetery holds an annual memorial service. The cemetery is home to the graves of over 400,000 people, most of whom served in the military.

rorders came. by The unit was not told their destination unmuch later in the trip when they were informed that they were headed to North Africa. As the convoy neared its destination, on September 2, 1943, German planes attacked the convoy. The ship rocked violently as the nurses hunkered down awaiting the end of the battle. It was later learned that a German plane had been shot down and one of our destroyers had suffered much damage but was able to reach the Port of Oman. It was later learned that the convoy had been tracked by German submarines.

The port of debarkation was Bizerte, North Africa, in the Tunisian section. Following fifteen days at sea, the Unit was finally able to walk on dry ground. It was quite apparent that they had arrived in a war zone. While the Germans had, for the most part, been driven out of Tunisia, many German snipers remained.

hospital The traveled forty miles over narrow, rough and dusty roads to the location in which camp would be set. Enlisted men erected the nurses' tents with four women per tent. Cots were padded with out of season clothing and the group got ready for a time of very primitive living. Tunisia, being a very windy place, meant that there was most often sand in whatever food was served. Unfortunately, the sand was mixed with camel dung, which made the latrine the most visited place in camp.

Helmets served as a means of head protection as well as a bath basin and a place to wash undergarments. Much later in their stay, the army set up a covered 2 ½ ton truck with a generator so that a hot shower was available once per week. The heat in Tunisia was dry and sweltering until the rains came in November when the ground became a muddy mess. It also was incredibly cold.

The women in Africa were treated like slaves. While the men rode donkeys or camels, the women followed several paces behind usually carrying a large basket on their head with heavy things in both hands. The children looked so incredibly sad. They begged for anything that could be sold in order to keep the family alive.

Following the arrival in North Africa, large tents with wooden floors were erected. The operating room was a Quonset hut with cement floors. The first patients were French and Arabs. Not speaking either language, Cleta stated that it was terribly difficult to explain to the patient what she would be doing prior to putting them to sleep. When the patients woke, they were sent to the ward. It was not unusual for a patient whose treatment meant setting a broken bone, would be found the next morning with the cast completely cut away. One of her most memorable cases was that of a young German boy, likely no more than 14, who looked at her with complete hatred. And while, Cleta never leaned his fate, it is likely that he was sent to a P.O.W camp.

German planes based in Italy performed bombing raids near daily. Antiaircraft guns were fired around the hospital making fragments rain down all the time. Tents had so many holes in them that

the nurses began sleeping in their helmets.

As Christmas proached, the medical staff began to think of home. A Christmas tree was top on their Christmas wish list. Some navy guys brought the nurses a tree from Italy. The tree was decorated with "snow," created from a box of Ivory Flakes (sent by her sister) mixed with water. They blew up the fingers of rubber surgical gloves, dyed them with Methylate, Mercurochrome and Gentian Violet.

In February of 1944, the 64th General Hospital Unit began transferring patients to other hospital units in anticipation of transferring to Italy, and by late February, they set sail on the Algonquin, headed for Naples, Italy, landing on March 2, 1944. We set up camp near the town of Madaloni, about forty miles from Naples. We were very close to the front lines where the troops were stalled at Monte Cassino.

Operating room nurses were housed in one house with other nurses being housed in larger homes. Cleta's brother, Paul, was stationed in Anzio, Italy, and visited Cleta. Since Paul was an enlisted man, the chief nurse would not allow him into the home of officers. Father Farrell, the chaplain for the unit, arranged for Paul and Cleta to enjoy a seven course meal at an Italian home nearby. Cleta stated that he had lost a tremendous amount of wait and that Paul's eyes looked so tired as well as red and irritated. Paul's unit was dug in because of the near constant shelling and bombing at Anzio. As a parting gift, Cleta gave Paul a pair of aviator glasses to protect his eyes.

In Madaloni, the 64th General Hospital was set up in a school and prepared to be ready to for incoming wounded. Fighting was fierce on all sides and the Unit was quickly overrun with casualties. The wounded were triaged just behind the front lines before being transported to the Unit. So many patients were brought in at once, the wounded were seen and prioritized as to who needed to be operated on first.

Doctors, nurses, anesthetists and enlisted men worked together as a team with no time to pull rank. With only three anesthetists, it was not unusual for them to work 24 hours straight. The surgery work there far exceeded debriding and dressing wounds. Many surgeries involved in saving lives meant amputating limbs. Many wounds required abdominal surgery, the removal of shrapnel, repairing an organ or even removing a portion of the intestine. Chest wounds were quite common. Dr. Haik, an eye surgeon, performed a corneal transplant when the eye of one surgeon had to be removed from one soldier with no damage to the cornea, and the other patient had a damaged cornea. The cornea from one soldiers eye was then transplanted to the eye of the soldier who had a damaged cornea.

The 64th General Hospital was a 1000 bed unit yet at times there was upwards of 1500 patients. Along with American soldiers, both French and British injured were treat-

Eventually, the Ger-

mans were pushed farther north and the beds of the Unit were nearly empty. Because of the lull in the action, Cleta saw the ENT doctor. Having suffered a deviated septum while playing high school basketball, The ENT doctor offered to perform surgery. Cleta entered the OR and was placed in a semi-sitting position and draped with sterile sheets. She soon began to have peculiar feelings but couldn't do because of the anesthesia. During nurses training she had witnessed a similar reaction in a patient and knew that she could die. She was finally able to calm herself enough to alert the surgeon that she was having difficulty. Surgery continued but was extremely painful.

During a lull in battles, the medical teams were able to view some of the countryside. The devastation was apparent everywhere. During this time Germans continued to bombard Naples.

In late March, Mount Vesuvius began erupting. And while dormant for many years, Vesuvius belched smoke and ash high into the air. At night, rivers of red molten lava flowed down the mountainside and made for such an incredible sight.

The people of the 64th General Hospital had many advantages while stationed in Italy. Because the war eradicated much of the commerce in the country, Cleta was able to find an Italian woman who did her laundry. She was also quite an accomplished seamstress and made her a beautiful olive drab gabardine coat. Because Americans did not have Italian currency, Cleta was able to pay her with cigarettes, gum and candy. And even though war was raging through Italy, Italians appeared to be a very happy people. They sang while working and even the children knew how to sing opera. She stated that the local theatre house was the focal point of the

On June 28, 1944, Rome fell to the 5th Army. However, since the Normandy invasion had been on June 6th, the fall of Rome to Allied Forces, was overshadowed by the events at Normandy. In mid-July, 1944, the 5th Army pushed the Germans north and we were able to evacuate most of our patients home or to other hospitals. Cleta was detached to an evacuation hospital where she stayed

for several weeks. On July 28, 1944, the 64th General Hospital was once again on the move. Pulling out about 4:00 p.m., roads were seen in terrible disrepair and most bridges had been blown up by either German or Allied forces. Roads were barely passable and bridges practically non-existent. The hulls of burned out German and Allied vehicles littered the roadside and active mine fields were marked in the area.

On July 28th, equipment was again loaded to begin the journey to Ardenza, a small seashore town located on the Ligurian Sea, about eight miles south of Pisa. The hospital was again set up and ready to begin receiving patients. Because the Unit was in close proximity to the front lines where fighting was fierce, ambulances brought the wounded in

faster than they could ac-

commodate.

During our busiest times, the anesthetists draped a large table with a sterile sheet, mixed sodium pentothal with large quantities of sterile water, then draw the anesthetic solution into 50cc syringes and lay them on the sterile table for use when the incoming overwhelmed us.

Allied forces again pushed the Germans north and the medical staff again breathed a sigh of relief. The orthopedic OR had several tables in use where dressings and casts were removed and treated. It was not uncommon for each anesthetist to put two to three patients to sleep at one time while these procedures were being done.

Several weeks later, when work had slowed, orders were received to evacuate. The Germans had made a fresh push and it became possible that the hospital would need to make a hasty retreat. Thankfully, the push was held back and the hospital was back in business.

Army food would never be confused with gourmet cooking, but the Mess Sargeant did his best to make meals appetizing. Fresh eggs were a real

The 5th Army took over a hotel in Stachia in northern Italy on Lake Gordo. The army personnel were allowed to enjoy a few days of relaxation, swimming, dancing and visiting other places of interest in the vicinity. Some traveled to the Swiss border and had pictures taken at the large marker with Suisse engraved in cement. On May 7, 1945, the

Germans surrendered. As the European War was winding down, the unit disbanded and Cleta was transferred to the 5th Evacuation Hospital where she was there for two to three months. The remaining casualties were cared for two to three more months. In early August, those in the 5th Evac Hospital were given the option of either going home for a one month vacation or going directly to the Pacific. Cleta chose the later.

The ship with those people who elected to head straight to the Pacific theatre left Italy in early August but stayed at sea in sight of the Strait of Gibraltar for several days.

On August 14, 1945, Japan surrendered and the 5th Evacuation Hospital changed course and headed back to the U.S.

Following a visit with family in Louisiana, Cleta was sent to Fort Sam Houston, TX for separation from service. She stated that she thanked God that she was able to return to the States following a

truly horrible and grueling

By the end of her time in the service, Cleta had attained the rank of 1st

Post Script:

Following her release from the Army, Cleta Hood Gann resumed her nurse anesthetist duties at the old Hillman Hospital (currently, the University of Alabama, Birmingham). One evening as many of the medical staff relaxed and enjoyed an adult beverage, a handsome young man approached the table offering to buy her a drink. When Cleta let the man know that she already had a drink, the young man picked up her drink, drank it, then said, "well, now may I buy you a drink?"

And the rest, as they say, is history:

Cleta Hood Gann married Herman Cecil Gann on March 3, 1946, at Fort McClellan at the Anniston Army Depot. They had four daughters, Judy, Janet, Debbie and Pam.



# From the Diary of Leon Phillips

For the first few months he was in the service in WWII, my dad, Leon Phillips, kept a diary. I have selected several entries from that journal that offer a sense of what he experienced during his basic training and then during the first part of his deployment to Panama.

His second journal entry reads: "37 draftees left for Camp Shelby. We left Iuka after a hearty send off by the Iuka High School band at 7:30 am. Arrived at Camp Shelby 4:30 pm with quite a few drunk. We were turned over to the induction center and assigned tents. Were then marched to mess hall for our first meal which was far better than I expected. .... We stood around and watched crap games until 10:00 and tried out the army cots for the first time."

The next day, he wrote that he and Ben McRae went to the movie "Jungle Book." Later he recorded that "Everyone is wondering where they will be sent and what branch of service they will be in. There is not much talk about war, only about how to have as good time as possible."

Before basic training got seriously underway, Dad and several others from Tishomingo County were given a furlough, so they came home for a few days. At one point during that visit, Dad recorded that he drove out to Pickwick Lake. He wrote, "The lake is beautiful at this time of year. Everything seems so quiet and peaceful here that it is hard to realize there is a storm of hatred and strife across the ocean."

After returning to Camp Shelby for the re-sumption of basic training, the young soldiers were processed through the classification station to determine where they

would be asultisigned mately. Dad recorded that he was given a typing test. "I passed (lucky me) and was put in Class 1 and told that was ready service for at any time

now, Boy, am really glad. I was afraid they would try to make a mechanic out of me." Upon completion of basic training, Dad and hundreds of other soldiers were put on a troop train that went from south Mississippi to the west coast where they would be shipped out. The day before they set sail, he re-corded that "I wrote

Mother today. It was one of the hardest things that I have ever had to do, to tell her that I am leaving the states. If it was not for her worrying about me, I would not mind it half as much."

He was eventually stationed in Panama, arriving July 15, 1942, and settling into a routine that marked most of the remainder of his time there. The first Sunday in Panama, he wrote, "I went to church this a.m. A lot of the boys went to the beach this afternoon. I think it rained all the afternoon. I did not go because am afraid the water may hurt my ears. (Dad was dealing with an ear infection.) Wrote a letter home this afternoon. Would really like to hear from home." His journal entries for the first few months detail days of drills and work around the camp. On August 2 of that year, he noted a nice break in the routine: "Well this is my most enjoyable day here. We went over to Balboa to a boxing match today. Al Jolson was there.





I also saw 3 generals. It was the first time to see a general and of course I got a kick out of seeing Al Jolson. The boxing was good also. It was the first time we have been out of camp and it helped our feeling a

lot." September 4, 1942, he wrote, "Went to town tonight. I almost saw a murder. Some guy shot a girl and then shot himself on a side street in Panama City. Panama City is a lot like the French Quarter in New Orleans. It is a rough place, especially at night." This was the last journal entry he made. He would spend most of the duration of the war stationed in Panama. The four months Dad kept a diary reflects much of the same experience that millions of service members encountered during times of war. Separated from loved ones, they were often in harm's way, anxious but committed, serving their country, and looking forward to a time when they would be able to return to home and family.


