## Explosive House Fire in Iuka Kills One to Hospital

On Wednesday, November 6th the home of Pearl Ham was destroyed by a fire on Quitman Street in Iuka. Ms. Ham attempted to extinguish the fire but the fire was too large. She was killed by the fire. The fire was caused by a heater in the room. The fire was very large and caused the house to become engulfed in flames.

The report of the fire was made at 4:51 p.m.; firefighters stayed at the residence till 6:47 p.m. ensuring that the blaze was extinguished. The house was built many years ago. Iuka Mayor John Henry Alford and his wife, Brain Grissom Fire Chief arrived on the scene directly behind the fire truck, he reported that several witnesses were outside the house with Ms. Ham who had exited the home on her own, though she was severely injured. Ms. Ham was taken to Iuka hospital and then flown to the Med in Memphis

to be treated for the burns she sustained during the fire. Malcolm and Peyton Brown were on the scene along with Ian Thomas, they had assisted Ms. Ham in finding her way to the door of her home. Ms. Ham's niece, Marlene Clark witnesses the fire from a nearby gas station and immediately came to check on her aunt who lived alone at the time of the fire. Grissom remained on the scene with the family to secure the house until

7:30 p.m. Grissom would like to issue a word of caution to the citizens of Tishomingo County; he stated that if you suspect any problems with your heater have it inspected by a professional to insure that it is working properly and safely. This winter is shaping up to be a cold one and fires are more prevalent when heaters are in use.

## Beware of Vaping Among Teenagers

Vaping has become something of an epidemic among the high school students of Tishomingo County. Law enforcement believes that certain local businesses may be providing access to vapes and juice to underage youth in the area.

Iuka Chief of Police Randy Stringer would like to remind parents to be aware of their children's behavior; early intervention could help prevent long-term use of vaping and nicotine products.

The danger is that many of the products are unregulated, most of the time you have no way of knowing what is in the juice you are using.

Nicotine is harmful to developing minds and bodies, and the unknown components in the products make it impossible to determine if the e-liquids are safe to use. It is also possible to purchase products that are advertised as synthetic versions of THC which are imported from other countries with no ingredient labels and these items



are causing significant negative health effects on users such as seizures and other significant symptoms. Vaping has not been around long enough to determine any long-term health risks it may cause to the body.

In terms of the federal law, it is illegal to sell e-cigarettes, or vaping supplies to anyone under the age of 18 in Mississippi. Iuka is among the cities in Mississippi where there is a complete ban on vaping inside businesses and public buildings. There is discussion about raising the legal age to purchase e-cigarettes from 18 to 21 on a national level to help combat the number of young people using nicotine throughout the country.

The name of the facility is the Iuka Sports Academy. The project is being lead by Mario Barnes and will be located on the 20,000 sq. ft. building on the commercial property at 2099 Paul Edmondson Drive in Iuka. We've already had over 100 pre-registration forms completed online, but we need more help. We are submitting a funding package and the more community support we show for the project, the more likely it is to be approved." Barnes explained. There are several other key personal things to raise awareness and money for this project to happen. This project is privately funded,

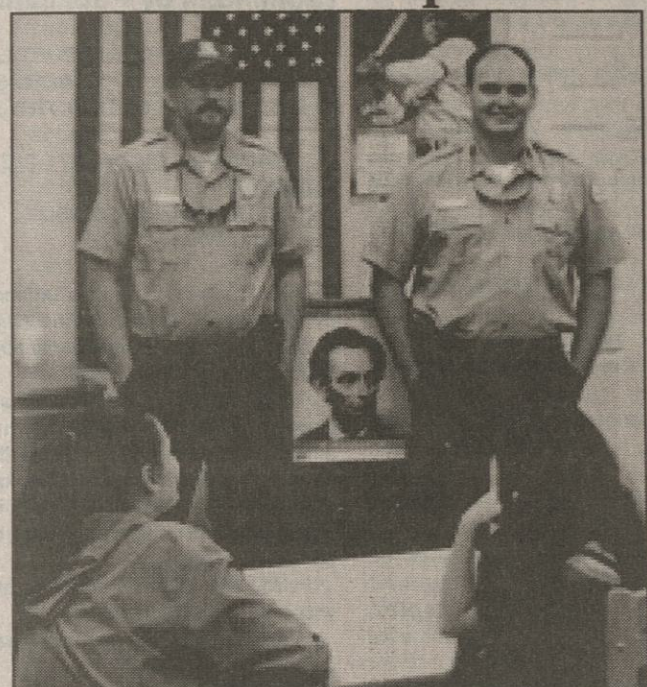

## UDC Met at Library

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone Chapter 394 met October 21, 11 am at the Iuka Public Library. We had four present, Vicky Durham, Gail Smith, Jean Works, and Sharon Hairrell. We did the pledges to the U.S. Flag, State Flag, and Confederate Flag and completed the UDC rituals and the meeting was declared by President Sharon Hairrell. The minutes were read from last month's meeting and treasurer report was given by Vicky Durham Treasurer and approved. Vicky has all dues collected except for one.

Co-Registrars Gail Smith and Jean Works gave their report. They have one application that needs to be retyped on updated form and one that is ready to be typed and sent in for approval. We voted to order some supplies from UDC.

Jean Works presented the October Program from the UDC magazine titled States Rights. According to the US Constitution of 1790, by Corinne M. Hoch, Historian General. In the movie Gettysburg there was one scene of a young man in grimy, tattered clothing, cannons booming all around, the private was asked why he was fighting. Without hesitation he screamed "States Rights! I am fighting for my State's Rights."

Article X of the Constitution of 1790 granted the power to the people of each state to govern themselves. To understand why our founding fathers recognized the necessity for incorporating states' rights into our first constitution we must take a step back in time. When taxation became unbearable, the original thirteen colonies came together in the late 1700's to fight England for independence.

After the thirteen colonies won their independence the newly formed United States of America signed a peace treaty with England. This agreement

gave them well earned freedom, sovereignty, and the independence of each individual state. It was agreed from that point on each state was given state and each state would govern its self, because it knew best its own needs. People were inspired by Thomas Jefferson legacy work of the Declaration of Independence. Before he died he was also penned that self-government was a blessing and provided security. It is the right of man. It gives us reason and hope and allows us to share our opinions openly.

As the country grew, immigrants arrived in the north in over-whelming numbers. Housing and financial help was needed. The large cities relied on inexpensive labor fueled by those who had left their old countries seeking unknown opportunities.

The South did not have this problem. We remained secure in agricultural and provided a more self-sufficient, contained manner of living. We had

many different crops that were grown but cotton was the most desirable and could easily be traded for less Europeans imports. It needed protection to be able to trade fairly in the world market without being cumbered by taxes placed on their incoming and outgoing wares.

The South was facing the same problems with the North as the original thirteen colonies had faced with England. The southern planter wanted to enjoy what he had. To him, the doctrine was that "time is money". Time belonged to man, not to the bank; it was his heritage from God.

Fear that the central government would become too powerful, Jefferson Davis recognized that the struggle for power was a risk and the fate of all southerners would be disastrous. By 1861 the mutual interests were not well served, and peace did not continue undisturbed.

# Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 39)

For any new readers, I need to say that we are looking at the Book of Ecclesiastes, written by King Solomon, who was the wisest king of Israel before Jesus the King of Israel. Ecclesiastes 7:18-20 continues our story: "It is good that thou shouldest take hold of this; yea, also from this withdraw not thine hand; for he that feareth God shall come forth of them all. Wisdom strengtheneth the wise more than ten mighty men which are in the city. For there is not a just man upon earth, that doeth good, and sinneth not." I have loved the Book of Ecclesiastes for many years and have taught and preached through it several times. The wisdom that God

gave Solomon was extraordinary, yet he also failed to use it in his latter years. We hear him saying that he has a lesson that we should not allow to slip away from us, for those who fear God will come out ahead of those who do not. I am paraphrasing what Solomon said, but that is what he meant. Most people seem never to have learned this lesson, for most people live as if there were no God, or as if it does not pay to serve God. When Solomon spoke of the God fearing person coming

out ahead, he was not saying that that person will have more money, better health or a better position in life, rather he was saying that he will be honored by the Lord more than those who do not fear God, and likely he will be honored more by some people.

Now Solomon speaks of the superiority of wisdom over strength, and most people seemingly have never learned this lesson. We actually see that wisdom strengthens the wise, more than strong men who are in

a city, perhaps for its protection. Ecclesiastes 9:14-18 shows a "poor wise man" who delivered a city, and actually did more than weapons of war could have done, yet the poor man was not remembered for his wisdom, and today's wise men are likewise often forgotten or overlooked! My father had little education; he was born in 1916 and had to drop out of school in the depression to help feed his family, but my father had wisdom about many things. I remember trying to fix a tire on our large truck, when my dad showed me a method that was much easier than the way I was trying to do the job. Some people who are highly educated are not wise, and some people who

have little education are extremely wise! Now Solomon gives us one other verse in our passage that should never be overlooked, for he says that there is no man who is so just that he never sins. The only exception to this statement would be Jesus, for He never sinned, because He was born of a virgin and did not inherit the nature of Adam. The rest of us have sinned, and we still sometimes sin. Perhaps we may intend to keep from sinning, but the very fact of failing to do good is itself a sin (James 4:17). It would be great if we never sinned again, but that will not happen as long as we are on earth living in a body with a sinful nature as a part of our earthly humanity!

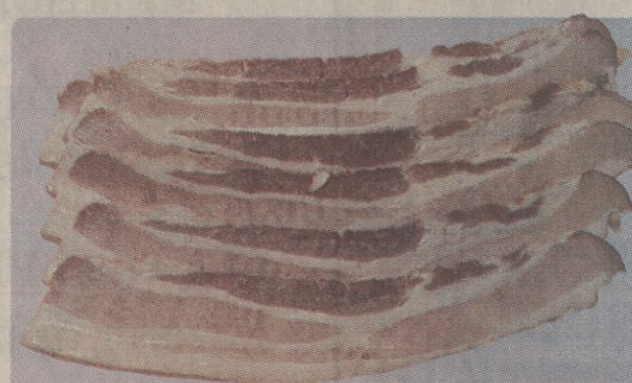

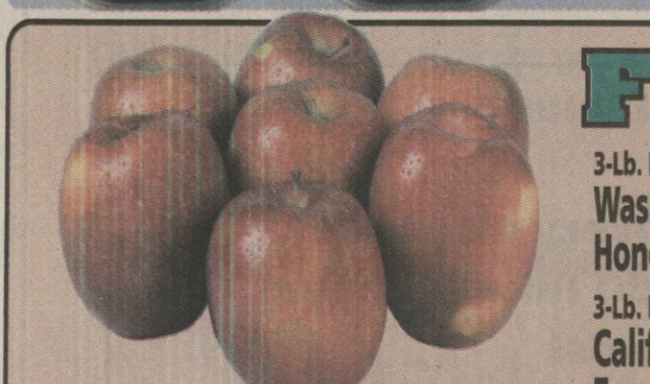
