Old Courthouse Museum Announces Auditions for Upcoming Play

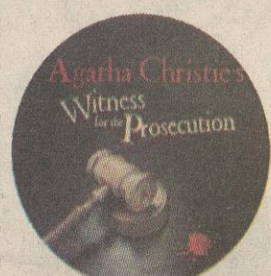

Mississippi Lottery Proving to be Profitable for the State

Mississippi's Lottery kicked off on November 25th with scratch off lottery tickets; Power Ball and Mega Millions ticket sales will begin on January 30th in Mississippi.

The largest payout so far in the state has been \$15,000 and several \$2,000 and \$3,000 winners have been awarded. Lottery winners may remain anonymous if they choose. Retailers keep 6% of the lottery ticket sales.

The first month total sales for the STATE exceeded \$40 million, the first day \$2.5 million in ticket sales brought the state \$570,000. Tishomingo County currently has 8 retailers selling tickets. The total sales for the first four weeks of operation for Tishomingo County is broken down here: Week #1-11/25-11/30: \$70,500; Week #2 -12/01-12/7:



\$54,600; Week #3 -12/14: \$29,700; Week -12/15-12/21: \$53,700. For the next draw up to \$80 million a from lottery proceeds help fund state roads, bridges or go to match general infrastructure. Any revenue above \$1 million would go to education, the education enhancement fund. After decades of debate, lawmakers in a special summer session year approved a state lottery. It's expected to the state about 40 million the first year, then \$80 million to \$100 million thereafter.

UDC Holds Christmas Social

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone Chapter 394 met on December 17th, 11 am at the "Lil Smokies" in Iuka for their December meeting/Christmas Social. Those present were Vicky Durham, Gail Smith and Sharon Hairrell.

We completed the UDC rolls and the minutes, Treasurer and the Registrar report given and approved.

Vicky Durham presented the program. It was December Historian program, "Secession And the First US Constitution." We are one can talk about the War Between the States, important to review the American Revolutionary War, which resulted in the creation of the first states that seceded from Great Britain. At that time, the Stamp Act imposed by Great Britain on the early colonists resulted in a senseless, overwhelming tax that were not used for the benefit of the colonists.

Ten years later after the war of reconciliation with Great Britain expired, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and others encouraged colonists' independence. The United States Declaration of Independence was the first formal step taken by representatives of all thirteen colonies, now the United States, toward secession. Adopted by Second Congress in 1776, the Declaration of Independence cited the states' grievances against King George III and the rights of the colonies, including their right to be independent.

The Second Continental Congress also appointed George Washington to raise an army and to command an

American Army. Thus, he led the War for American Independence against the British Empire. George Washington was considered by the Patriots to be a hero, the one who led a glorious revolution that promised liberty and justice for those who lived in the colonies. The American Revolutionary War was, indeed, the fight for American independence, and it resulted in a secession of the of the thirteen states from Great Britain.

The right of secession was assumed in the draft of the Constitution. However, representatives of three states—Virginia, New York, and Rhode Island—insisted that the right of secession be specifically written into governmental agreement before they would ratify it, sign the Constitution, and join the Union. They thought it was imperative to preserve the right to separate from the Union if that Union should ever become detrimental to their best interests. Secession was a legal right according to the first US Constitution.

If one still had any doubt that the United States was founded on the firm belief that secession was considered to be an unalienable right, they could take a look at the words of Congressman Abraham Lincoln in his 1848 speech on the Mexican War in the US House of Representatives. Many historians agree that a state's right of secession could not find a stronger supporter than Lincoln himself. Northerners perceived as arrogant and unwilling to consider the needs of the agricultural South.

On December 20, 1860, South Carolina initiated its legal right to secede from the Union, followed soon by

other states. On February 18, 1861, Jefferson Davis was inaugurated as President of the Confederate States of America. Virginia chose to secede the Union when Lincoln unlawfully called for arms to quell the secession.

To some who feared that secession of southern states would endanger the future existence of the northern states, even talk of Southern independence was treasonous. Yet, there were those who recognized that the Constitution granted each state the right to leave the Union.

After the War ended, Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederate States of America was indicted for treason and imprisoned for two years, at Fortress Monroe, a Federal Army site in Hampton, Virginia. He spent 2 years in irons, without heat and a bright light shining 24 hours a day, while constant under surveillance. He waited for his trial for treason.

In 1867, a \$100,000 bond was arranged by a prominent pro-abolitionists Horace Greely, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Gerrit Smith among others. Jefferson was at last free to join his family in Canada. December 25, 1868 President Johnson granted blanket amnesty to all Southerners and offered to pardon Davis. However in Davis's estimation, to accept a pardon would be to admit that he was guilty of a crime that he did not commit.

The North had a chance to prove the South wrong once again; however the United States could not risk having the southern cause vindicated in court, his case remained on the court dock-

et for February 15. 1869, however the district attorney entered a motion of noble prosequi indicating that they would no longer prosecute. The charge of treason against Jefferson Davis was set aside, without resolution. Davis was technically a free man, yet forever imprisoned by history.

It might be worth "honorable mention" that no one is getting away with any wrong thing before God. Of course, those who have been forgiven their sins will never answer for them,

but all sins that are not forgiven will come up before Jesus, the Judge of all men. Notice that our writer speaks of things that he has seen. He has, as a very wise man, applied his heart to the works of men that are done on earth. In that mental picture, he has seen one man rule over another to the hurt of the ruler. This might be worth our attention, for many seem to think that all who rule over others are sit-

ting in good positions, but such is not always the case, for sometimes such positions of rule actually hurt those who hold them. Judges all will one day face the "Big Judge". Yes, we must have judges and laws, for God has ordained them, but He has not ordained any injustice that judges or officers of the law allow. To bear rule over others carries an awesome responsibility, for those who misuse

such rule will one day regret such actions!

Our writer has also seen wicked people dead and buried, with no visible judgment against them for their sins. Such wicked people have been "in church", or in the holy places of the Old Testament times, but they have not allowed the things that have happened in these places to change their lives. Even the people in the places where the wicked have made their residences and have practiced their vices have often forgotten what the wicked have done, but God has not forgotten, if they have died without repenting of

their sins and receiving the Lord. Solomon, our writer, says that such things as this are "vanity", meaning that they are empty. This does not mean that God has forgotten, rather it indicates that wicked have lived a life of futility and the righteous may have even forgotten the deeds of the wicked, but God still has a record of them. Ecclesiastes 8:11 says, "Because sentence against an evil work is not executed speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men is fully set in them to do evil." I sometimes wonder why some court cases take so long, when it seems that justice

needs to be executed speedily, but our terms are not like God's system of judgment for even though it may wait for a time to bring judgment, no one is getting off without paying for his sins, unless he has been forgiven them! Men are prone to continue evil, so Solomon says if the sentence does not come rather close to the crime. Of course, this may be speaking of God's sentence which may come many years after the sin men commit, but it will come!

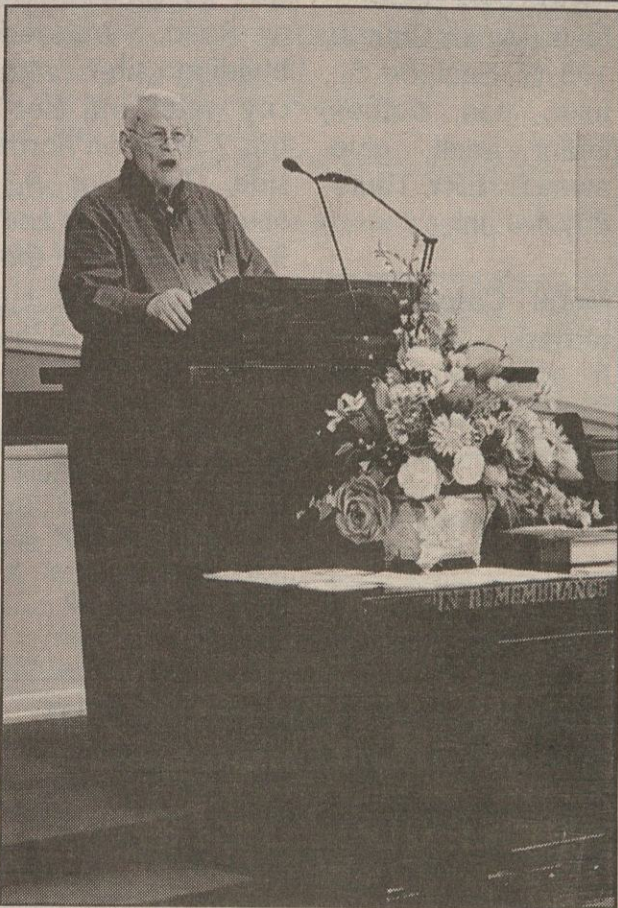

Hosemann Family Autism Foundation Awards 27 Scholarships to Mississippi Teachers

Jackson, Miss.— The Hosemann Family Autism Foundation recently awarded scholarships to 27 Mississippi teachers for a community college course equipping them with skills necessary to effectively instruct children with autism and other developmental disorders. This is the second time the Foundation has provided the scholarships to the introductory online Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) course at Holmes Community College.

ABA is a process involving the systematic application of interventions, such as positive reinforcement, based upon the principles of learning theory to improve socially significant behaviors among individuals diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and a range of other developmental disorders.

The ABA course, the first of its kind in the nation, just completed its seventh iteration in Fall 2019. Most of those receiving a scholarship are special education teachers, representing 13 counties and 16 school districts across the State. The Foundation awarded scholarships for the first time in Spring 2019 to 15 Mississippi teachers, and those teachers are now using techniques learned from the course in their classrooms.

The Foundation, a nonprofit established by Delbert and Lynn Hosemann and their extended family, was formed with the goal of assisting children diagnosed with ASD and their families in accessing educational, therapeutic, medical, and behavioral health-related resources.

"Our Foundation created this scholarship program for our teachers to better equip them with the knowledge and skills to help teach our students with intellectual disabilities, like autism, and other behavior issues," stated Lynn Hosemann, President of the Foundation. "Additionally, we hope exposure to these ABA courses will drive increased interest in the field and produce more paraprofessionals, like registered behavior technicians (RBTs), and licensed professionals at every level who can provide services throughout the State."

"Holmes is privileged to partner with the Hosemann Family Autism Foundation to award scholarships to Mississippi teachers that completed the ABA course," stated Dr. Jim Haffey, President of Holmes Community College. "We plan to continue to offer the Applied Behavioral Analysis (PSY 2543) course in an 8 week online format twice a semester that allows more full-time teachers the opportunity to participate."

A registered behavior technician (RBT) must receive 40 hours of training, a requirement which is fulfilled by this course. Additionally, individuals must complete a competency assessment and pass a national examination. RBTs are taught the basics of ABA therapy and function under the supervision of a Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA).

Northwest Mississippi Community College, Pearl River Community College, William Carey University, and Mississippi College plan to offer similar ABA courses in Spring 2020.

The remaining 1,728 triangles are the Gift of imagination design with a series of intricate wedge cuts that are mirrored reflections of each other inspiring our imagination.

The 2,688 Waterford Crystal triangles are bolted to 672 LED modules which are attached to the aluminum frame of the Ball.

The Ball is illuminated by 32,256 LEDs (light emitting diodes). Each LED module contains 48 LEDs — 12 red, 12 blue, 12 green, and 12 white for a total of 8,064 of each color.

The Ball is capable of displaying a palette of more than 16 million vibrant colors and billions of patterns that creates a spectacular kaleidoscope effect atop One Times Square.

HISTORY OF THE NEW YEAR'S EVE BALL

Revelers began celebrating New Year's Eve in Times Square as early as 1904, but it was in 1907 that the New Year's Eve Ball made its maiden descent from the flagpole atop One Times Square. Seven versions of the Ball have been designed to signal the New Year.

The first New Year's Eve Ball, made of iron and wood and adorned with one hundred 25-watt light bulbs, was 5 feet in diameter and weighed 700 pounds. It was built by a young immigrant metalworker named Jacob Starr, and for most of the twentieth century the company he founded, sign maker Artkraft Strauss, was responsible for lowering the Ball.

As part of the 1907-1908 festivities, waiters in the famed "lobster palaces" and other deluxe eateries in hotels surrounding Times Square were supplied with battery-powered top hats emblazoned with the numbers "1908" fashioned of tiny light bulbs. At the stroke of midnight, they all "flipped their lids" and the year on their foreheads lit up in conjunction with the numbers "1908" on the parapet of the Times Tower lighting up to signal the arrival of the new year.

The Ball has been lowered every year since 1907, with the exceptions of 1942 and 1943, when the ceremony was suspended due to the wartime "dimout" of lights in New York City. Nevertheless, the crowds still gathered in Times Square in those years and greeted the New Year with a minute of silence followed by the ringing of chimes from sound trucks parked at the base of the tower—a harkening-back to the earlier celebrations at Trinity Church, where crowds would gather to "ring out the old, ring in the new."

In 1920, a 400 pound Ball made entirely of wrought iron replaced the original. In 1955, the iron Ball was replaced with an aluminum Ball weighing a mere 150 pounds. This aluminum Ball remained unchanged until the 1980s, when red light bulbs and the addition of a green stem converted the Ball into an apple for the "I Love New York" marketing campaign from 1981 until 1988. After seven years, the traditional glowing white Ball with white light bulbs and without the green stem returned to brightly light the sky above Times Square. In 1995, the Ball was upgraded with aluminum skin, rhinestones, strobes, and computer controls, but the aluminum Ball was lowered for the last time in 1998.

For Times Square 2000, the millennium celebration at the Crossroads of the World, the New Year's Eve Ball was completely redesigned by Waterford Crystal and Philips Lighting. The crystal Ball combined the latest in lighting technology with the most traditional of materials, reminding us of our past as we gazed into the future and the beginning of a new millennium. In 2007, for the 100th anniversary of the Times Square Ball Drop tradition, Waterford Crystal and Philips Lighting crafted a spectacular new LED crystal Ball. The incandescent and halogen bulbs of the past century were replaced by state-of-the-art Philips Luxeon LED lighting technology that dramatically increased the brightness and color capabilities of the Ball.

The beauty and energy efficiency of the Centennial Ball inspired the building owners of One Times Square to build the permanent Big Ball weighing nearly six tons and twelve feet in diameter. The 2,688 Waterford Crystal triangles are illuminated by 32,256 Philips Luxeon LEDs. This Big Times Square New Year's Eve Ball is now a year-round attraction sparkling above Times Square in full public view January through December.

January 3rd Husband Charged with First Degree Murder in the Missing Person Case of Susie Rena Lanier. Russell Leon Lanier was charged with the murder of his wife on December 26th 2017. Susie was reported missing on June 6th 2017. A human skull was found in an individual's yard on August 31st 2017 and it was later identified as Susie Rena Lanier.

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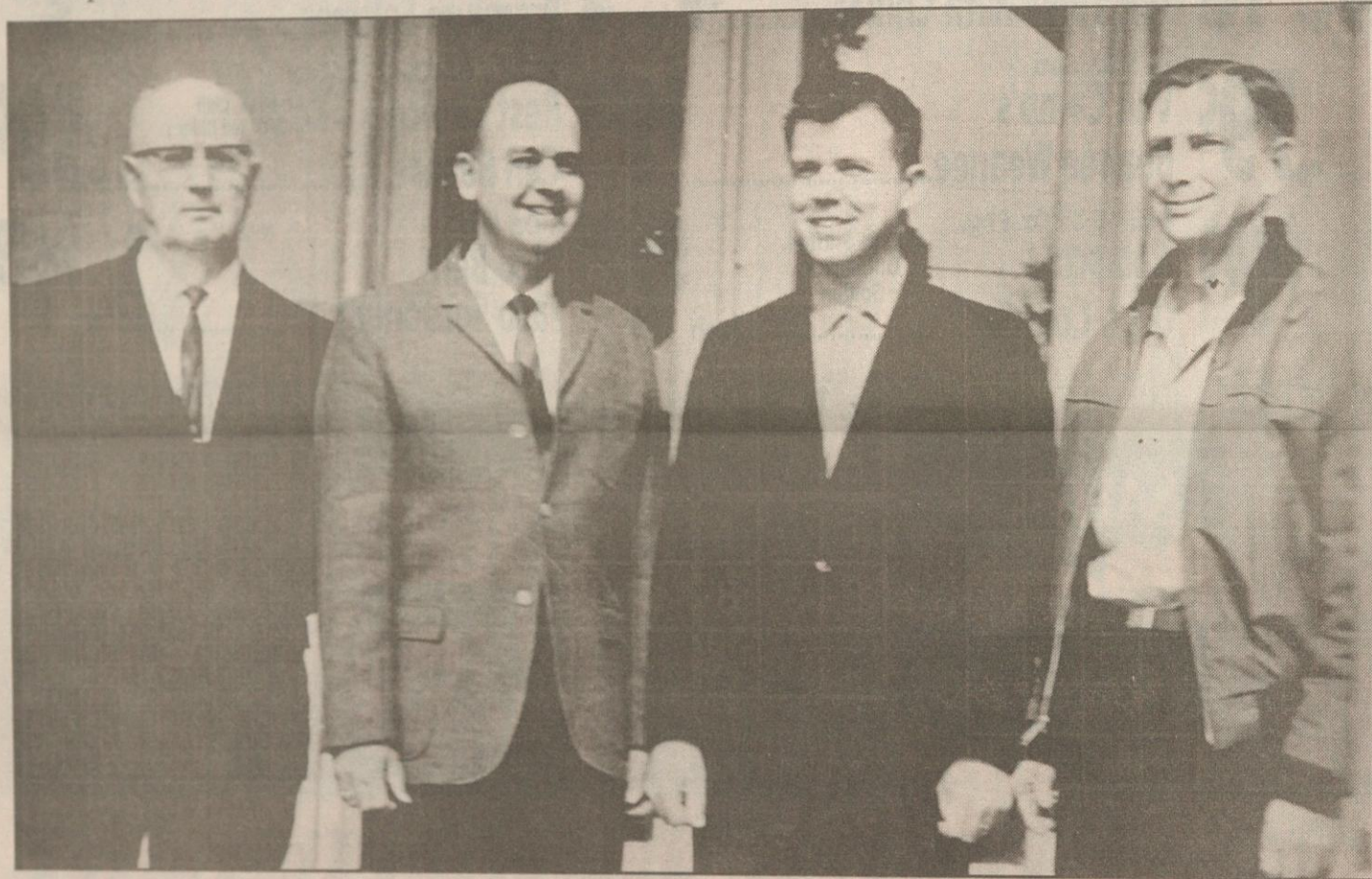
