Missing Belmont Teen Found Safe in Iowa

A 15-year-old girl from Belmont, who was reported missing by family members last Tuesday, was found safe in Polk County, Iowa on Sunday, March 1st. The Mississippi Bureau of Investigation had issued an endangered/missing child alert in this case on February 25th. Two officers from the Belmont Police Department made the nearly 700 mile trip to pick up the missing girl.

accompanied by a 21-year-old male, Jared Michael Wright of Lawton, Oklahoma who was apparently alarmed by the heavy police presence and drove to the nearby school lot.

The Belmont Police Department contacted the Polk County Sheriff's Office in Iowa on Sunday afternoon just before 4 p.m. with a possible location of the missing teen. Reports indicate that the girl made contact with her mother from a Wal-Mart in Grimes Iowa, the building was evacuated and the search began in the area. Law enforcement was able to locate the girl around 5:30 p.m. at the Johnston High School parking lot, about a mile from the initial search location. She was found unharmed and

Wright was arrested and is being charged in Iowa for harboring a runaway. Belmont Chief of Police Donald Thomas is pursuing additional felony charges against Wright for kidnapping and enticement of a minor. A warrant for his arrest in the city of Belmont has been issued, and the process of extradition has started. Wright apparently picked the teen up from her home in Belmont after the two met online.

The Circuit Clerk's office will be open Saturday March 7th for Absentee Voting.

The March 10th Primary Elections will include Democrat and Republican Primary's for President, US Senator, and US Congressman. A sample ballot for each party will be published in this issue of the paper. When voting you will be required to tell the Election official which party you wish to vote.

You may come to the Circuit Clerk's office to vote by absentee in person Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. If you will be out of town due to spring break make plans to vote absentee. The Circuit Clerk's office will be open on Saturday, March 7th,

from 8 a.m. to 12 noon for absentee voting. Saturday March 7th will be the last day to vote an absentee ballot in person at the Clerk's office for the March 10th Primary.

No absentee ballots may be hand delivered to anyone. All mailed absentee ballots must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, March 9th to be eligible to be counted for the March 10th 2020 Primary Election.

Please exercise your right to vote and go to the polls on March 10th. Don't forget you are required to show a photo ID when voting in Mississippi. If you have questions about absentee voting or the election process please call the Clerk's office at (662) 423-7026.

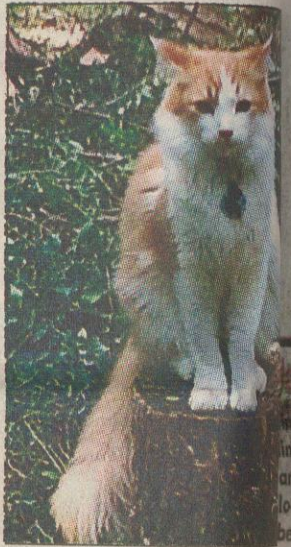

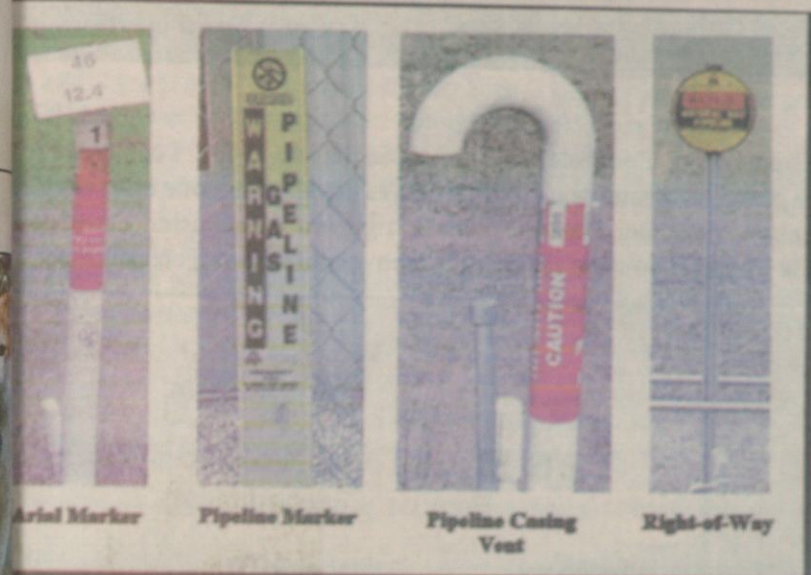
Coalition Meeting

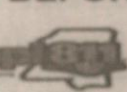
How to Identify Pipeline Locations & Cómo Usted Vive Cerca De Un Ducto

Pipelines are buried underground. Markers like the ones shown above are used to indicate their approximate location along the route. The markers can tell you where a pipeline intersects a highway or railroad. The marker also tells the material transported in the pipeline, the name of the pipeline company, and a telephone number where the company can be reached in the event of an emergency.

UDC Met at Iuka Library

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone Chapter 394 met February 17th, 11 a.m. at the Iuka Public Library. There were three present, Jean Works, Vicky Durham and Sharon Hairrell. Our UDC sister Gail Smith had surgery February 17th, she is in our thoughts and prayers. We complete the Salutes to the United States, State and Confederate flag and the UDC rituals. Sharon Hairrell read the minutes, there was no old business. Vicky Durham gave the treasure report and all was approved, Co-Registrar reported that she was ready to send in one application and we have one that they were still working on. All reports were approved. There was no new business except we did send out four cards and we went over E-Mails that had been received.

Sharon Hairrell presented the program from the UDC magazine by Corinne Hoch, Historian General, «Lincoln's Inauguration». Abraham Lincoln's name did not appear on the ballots of all Southern states on November 6, 1860; yet he won the presidential election. He won with less than half of the popular vote. People of the cotton states had cast their votes for the only three candidates on their ballots, Stephen Douglas, John Breckinridge, and John Bell.

Senator Jefferson Davis was overcome with apprehension at the prospect of the future for the United States with the new Republican Party in control. Davis watched as a disturbed spectator while the possibility of secession gathered momentum. He led a campaign to hold the Union together. As he watched South Carolina's Senators resign, he remained and joined a Senate Committee of thirteen seeking compromise. Kentucky's Senator John Crittenden proposed a return to the principles of the Missouri Compromise, but with Lincoln privately advising its rejection, it was doomed for failure.

Withdrawal from the Union became the only solution for many of the Southern states, yet it was a complex step to consider. There were political and personal ties between the South and the North.

Senator Davis was ill again as a result of a winter of turmoil and heartache. He was saddened when he heard of Mississippi's withdrawal from the Union, Mississippi was the second state to leave, which precipitated the actions of the other five cotton states (Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, and later Texas).

Davis feared that peaceable separation might not be possible because of the extreme feelings of disunion on both sides. On February 21, 1861, while still sick, Davis appeared before the Senate for the last time. He looked out into the packed galleries and full chambers. The gentleman of unimpeachable honor stated with no elaboration the Rights of Secession. As the leading representative of the Southern defense, Davis shared that he must leave, and that he wished for continued, peaceful relations. His forthright speech was met with profound silence, interrupted by respectful applause.

Jefferson Davis and his wife, Variana, left Washington headed for their home in Mississippi where they hoped that he would recover before beginning his assignment as Major General in charge of the state volunteers. Unknown to Davis, delegates from six seceded states met in Montgomery, Alabama, to establish the Confederacy as a new nation. On February 9, they adopted a new Constitution, much like the US Constitution, and they selected Mississippi's respected Jefferson Davis, former soldier, congressman, senator, and Secretary of War, as the Confederate President and Alexander Stephens of Georgia as Vice President.

Jefferson Davis was inaugurated as first and only President of the Confederate States of America on February 18, 1861. The intent of the new government was not war. In his speech he reassured everyone that the new nation wanted to be left alone peaceably.

A week earlier, on February 11, Abraham Lincoln, the President-

elect of the United States of America, left his home town of Springfield, Illinois, bound for Washington. He was virtually unknown in politics, but he represented a new American Flag with 34 stars that included the newly added state of Kansas. He would not return to Springfield alive. He was a self-made man who could not have known that his political career would lead to his demise.

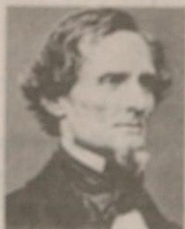
His first inauguration was March 4, 1861. There was a parade with colorful military and band units. All 34 states were represented by 34 pretty girls seated on a float pulled by white horses. In Lincoln's speech he issued an undisguised warning that he would do everything he could do to maintain the areas that belonged to the Federal government that was in Confederate territory.

The next four years was filled with more bloodshed than during the American Revolution. On March 4, 1865, just before

the surrender of the Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox, Virginia, on April 9, 1865, an estimated crowd of 30,000 people waited to hear Lincoln's Second Inaugural Speech. Lincoln spoke of the conflict: Both parties deprecated war, but one of them would make war rather than let the nation survive, and the other would accept war rather than let it perish. And the war came.

«Neither party,» he said «expected for the war the magnitude or the duration which it has already attained». He said that both sides read the same Bible and pray to the same God, but the prayers of both could not be answered. Lincoln ended his address.

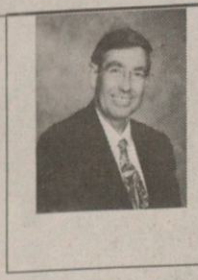

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 56)

I will return to Ecclesiastes 9:7-8, because I did not finish my comments on these verses: "Go thy way, eat thy bread with joy, and drink thy wine with a merry heart: for God now accepteth thy works." Let thy garments be always white; and let thy head lack no ointment." I was giving some comments on the words: "drink thy wine with a merry heart" in the last article, so I will return to those comments and add some. Without giving the verses again, I will allude to Proverbs 23:29-32, which concern wine drinking. The writer of Proverbs warns against tarrying at the wine

and the drinking of the wine when it is red. All kinds of arguments have been given concerning the admonition in these verses, but the idea certainly includes a warning against the ill effects of fermented drink. I mentioned that the Jews' wine did sometimes have some fermentation, but it is also true that freshly pressed grape juice was called wine in the Old Testament. The use of wine and strong

drink was forbidden for the priests when they went in to offer sacrifices (Leviticus 10:9), so there was an admonition for the priests to be of clear mind when they sacrificed to God. Wine was used for medicinal purposes by the Jews, as if pointed out in Proverbs 31:6-7, but the same chapter warns in verse 4 concerning kings and princes: "It is not for kings, O Lemuel, it is not for kings to drink wine; nor for

princes strong drink: Lest they drink, and forget the law, and pervert the judgment of any of the afflicted." I gave Romans 14:21 in the last article: "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor any thing whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak."

Our verse above indicates that it is better to leave off things that might offend others, such as eating meat that has been offered to any idol, which is in the context of our verse above, or drinking intoxicating drink. On the basis of this verse, I have refrained from the use of intoxicating beverages

for my entire life. This does not mean I have not sinned in other things, but abstinence keeps me from causing others to stumble concerning this particular thing. Wine was used as medicine in the New Testament, thus Paul told Timothy in I Timothy 5:23: "Drink no longer water, but use a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thine often infirmities." There was not a wide availability of medicines in those days, so wine was used for ailments, moreover, the water supply was often of poor quality. In our day we have other remedies that work quite

well and also to bypass criticism by abstaining from drink. One other thing, no one has ever come an alcoholic practicing abstinence from strong drink. I am certainly not condoning this, which is a condemned testimony. Our verse above also says, "eat, which is to be wrong if one enters into a practice of tony. 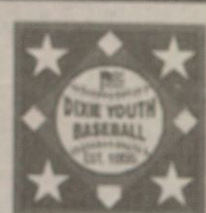
