Tornado Sweeps Thru Tishomingo



Dollar General which is located just north of Tishomingo on Hwy. 25 was destroyed Tuesday evening by a tornado swept thru the town. Many farms and homes east of town were heavily damaged.



Daniels home and auto shop was hit hard during the March 24th tornado, Jeff is the 4th District School Board member for Tishomingo County.

A "large and destructive" tornado ripped thru Tishomingo around 5:30 Tuesday evening causing extensive damage to the east of town toward the Alabama State Line. The Dollar General store north of town was destroyed, however police chief Kemp reported only minor injuries. Reports indicate those who were at the store

when the storm hit went to a nearby storm shelter for safety.

The National Weather Service in Memphis confirmed the tornado moved through shortly after 5:30 p.m. local time. Many residents were without power until Wednesday; several structures were damaged and some completely destroyed.

City of Iuka Adopts Emergency Order for Safety of Residents

The following proclamation was passed by the Iuka Mayor and Board of Aldermen during a meeting Tuesday evening, March 24. Residents are asked to read the order and please follow the guidelines which were set by the aldermen. It is vital that people please abide by the CDC and MS Department of Health guidelines associated with the Coronavirus pandemic.

EMERGENCY ORDER LIMITING THE SCOPE OF BUSINESS PRACTICES AND GENERAL ACTIVITIES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF IUKA

Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, find as follows:

WHEREAS, the President of the United States of America, on March 13, 2020, declared a national emergency due to the recent outbreak of infections and deaths associated with the "Coronavirus Disease" (COVID-19).

WHEREAS, pursuant to Mississippi Code 21-19-3, the City of Iuka has the authority to promulgate and enforce regulations designed to limit the spread of contagious or infectious diseases.

Supplies from MEMA Arrive in Tishomingo County

The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) is distributing vital personal protection supplies to agencies across the state, including those in Tishomingo County. Items such as medical masks and other important supplies are being provided through MEMA from the State of Mississippi.

The supplies are going to first responders and health care facilities in the area at this time. MEMA will also be delivering to healthcare providers, assisted living facilities, nursing homes and hospitals in the coming days according to Payton Berkite, representative of MEMA

for Tishomingo County. She is currently making the deliveries in our area.

MEMA plans to shift their focus to areas with active cases along with facilities which are asking for assistance in all counties of Mississippi. After the initial distribution of supplies the inventory will be assessed and further plans will be made.

MEMA reports that currently the nearest testing sites for COVID-19 are Med Plus Urgent Care in Fulton, their phone number is 662-269-8000; and Med Plus Urgent Care of Tupelo, their phone number is 662-841-0002.

Tishomingo County School District Distance Learning Initiative

Due to community spread of the COVID-19 virus and the executive order from Mississippi Governor Tate Reeves, the TCSD will remain closed through April 17th. Our district wants to provide opportunities for students to continue their learning while they are home and away from school. The district is creating learning "packets" that students and parents can access online at home or by picking up a packet at school. These packets are designed to give ALL students the opportunity to keep needed skills fresh while also providing some new learning for students to try. Grading is frozen at this time in the district.

Packets will be available to students and parents on Thursday, March 26th.

If a student needs a paper/pencil packet, it can be picked up at his/her school on the 26th. Packets will be available for

pick up from 9:00-11:00 a.m. and from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Staff will be present to hand out packets in a "drive-through" method. Car passengers will not be allowed to exit their vehicles in order to prevent the possible spread of COVID-19. High school Career/Technical students will pick up their packets at their high school. If students/parents need assistance getting their packet, contact the school. The district's "grab and go" meals will still be in service at Belmont, Burnsville, IES, and Tishomingo from 9:00-11:00 a.m.

If students plan to access the packet online, they will first visit the district website: www.tcsk12.com. Then they will click on "Learning Packets" to access the grade, and for high school, the course packet. Students will record their work on paper at home, and they should complete work for their

grade and/or each class they are currently taking.

All work should be kept at home at this time. Teachers will be available for assistance if needed. Information will be sent to students about how to access teacher videos or how to access teachers through other methods. The district doesn't want this work to be a burden. Instead, use this time to complete the work at a comfortable pace.

The district also has a link on its website for parents and students to use for additional learning resources and opportunities. Click the button "NEW: Educational Resources for Parents and Students" and then click the appropriate grade span or other available links. If families have any questions, they should contact their child's school or the district office.

School District's Grab and Go Meal Schedule is Changing

The Tishomingo County School District will change its "grab and go" breakfast/lunch pick up times to Monday and Wednesday ONLY beginning March 30th. These meals will contain breakfast and lunch meals for the week divided be-

tween the days. The district's "grab and go" meal times are also changing. Times beginning Monday, March 30th, will be 10:00-12:00 noon. Pick up locations will remain the same and are as listed: Belmont Elementary, Burnsville Elementary, Iuka Elementary, Tishomingo Middle.

Per federal regulations, all children 18 and younger are eligible for free meals, and children must be present in the vehicle to receive meals. If families have questions, they may contact the district office or school.

Circuit Clerks Office Operations Related to Coronavirus

In keeping with orders issued from the Mississippi Supreme Court and consistent with the Constitution of this State, the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office will remain open. However, due to the national and state emergencies caused by Coronavirus (COVID 19), certain steps must be taken to protect the health and safety of the citizens.

To help combat the spread of this virus in our community if you are required to conduct business with the Circuit Court please consider alternate methods such as; e-mail, phone, fax, or US Mail rather than you appearing

in person if possible. A majority of business can be handled using these alternate measures, for example. Filing with the Court can be sent by e-mail, fax or US Mail. Payments for fees or fines/restitution can be accepted over the phone with a credit card or mailed to the office. Voter registration forms can be requested by phone then mailed or e-mailed back to us when completed.

Starting 3/23 the Clerk's office Passports services will be temporarily suspended until further notice. Tishomingo County Circuit Court proceedings are scheduled to take place as usual and we will continue to maintain

normal hours at this time. The Circuit Clerk's office will continue to provide necessary business with as many possible steps to prevent you from having to come to the office. Mississippi Silicon Announces Partnership with Tishomingo County Career and Technical Center

Burnsville, MS (March 17, 2020) Mississippi Silicon LLC (MS), in conjunction with U.S. Bancorp Community Development Corporation (USBCDC) and Rural Development Partners, is pleased to announce the approval of financial support for the Tishomingo County Career and Technical Center (TCCTC) totaling approximately \$122,000. We need to do our part in encouraging the next generation to learn life skills. We are proud to support the TCCTC in helping to train a skilled frontline workforce. USBCDC saw this same need in Burnsville when they invested in us in 2013 and have continued bringing jobs, economic impact, and sustainable development to the community since then. The leadership team at Mississippi Silicon is excited to watch this partnership grow," said Eddie Boardwine, Chief Operations Officer, Mississippi Silicon.

USBCDC, the tax credit and community investment subsidiary of U.S. Bank, is a New Markets Tax Credit investor in Mississippi Silicon's metal production facility in Tishomingo County. This contribution supports additional job training in the local community.

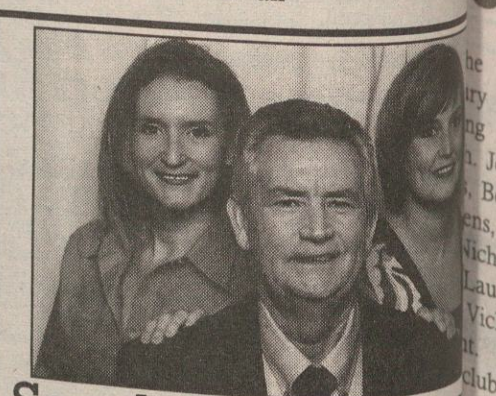
President of the TCCTC board of supervisors, Michael Busby, also offered his thanks to the parties involved and stated "a high school diploma or GED is just the beginning point nowadays for the jobs that exist in today's global economy. It is ironic that some of the best-paying jobs don't require a college degree but do require on-the-job training or technical training at a community college."

Students are also provided with education and training around the necessary soft skills to be

successful in any occupation. The need for better communication, teamwork, time management, problem-solving and professional growth training is evident within all industries. This allows students to be better prepared for the demands of the workplace and ultimately become positive, self-confident and dedicated employees.

Tishomingo County Career and Technical Center Director, John-Grady Taylor spoke further on the impact of this contribution, saying "Career and Technical Education (CTE) is often overlooked and downplayed in the education arena. Even with an

increased emphasis on workforce training, such programs are prohibited by industry standards. This TCCTC to bridge the gap by purchasing the equipment and training to train our students relevant work conditions that will become the workforce of the future for Tishomingo County. We are looking forward to this partnership with our partner Tishomingo County Career and Technical Center as a wellspring of opportunity for our advancement force."

In the old days, Church pastors frowned on their church members staying home to watch television preachers Rex Humbard, Jerry Falwell or Robert Schuller. The sick and the very elderly were typically pardoned but that was as far as grace was extended. The vast majority of churches across the land did not televise their services or broadcast church on the radio. Traditionally churches have preferred keeping their flock coming to the "house of God."

Essentially most churches haven't changed their philosophy. Congregations have always enjoyed «gathering» to sing, hear sermons, eat meals together and importantly -shake hands.

Media ministry in the old days was usually reserved for the large and affluent churches that could afford to buy television time or at least radio air time. Television broadcasting has always been expensive and so very few churches have been able to televise their services. A few more churches through the years have been able to afford radio time.

I remember one of my old-time preacher friends shaming his congregation one Sunday. He said, «One reason you people should not sit home and watch church on your television is because you can't shake hands with your television.»

The church has always placed a lot of emphasis on «togetherness, shaking hands, hugging and embracing others.» Now, no one wants to shake hands and embrace each other. Because of Covid-19 people are trying to stay six feet apart. Furthermore, almost every minister and congregation in the country has the ability to broadcast his or her service via the Internet or Facebook. Media ministry now is available to almost everyone. Ministers now want people to tune in on Facebook or whatever media they are using. Ministers still prefer that people attend church, but if they are the «ones» being watched then its fine.

Its ironic how things change. What used to be kind of taboo for some churches is widely embraced now. One of the reasons is because its so available. Its also affordable. People have computers and cell phones. People are on Facebook or have some other Internet accessibility. Radio airtime is more affordable in many areas. Things and times change. Plus, we've never been hit by anything like this pandemic where people are being told to stay home and that church is off limits. Whoever thought that church attendance might be ordered by the governor to be off limits?

Many houses of worship began building their websites years ago so that members could do their giving online. This is a good thing especially if people are already in the habit of donating this way. Churches who do not gather typically never recoup their giving. Some faithful members will catch up on charitable giving but most will not. Churches along with everyone will suffer during this pandemic.

Houses of faith will survive during this virus crisis but life will change for most congregations. Many will be excited to get back to the church pew and shaking hands when they can. Or, they may conclude they don't need to shake hands anymore.

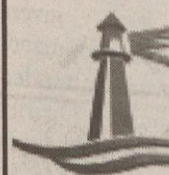

Last week I heard of the passing of a lady who was a dear friend to many in Tishomingo County. Miss Nellie Horton, who served as County Home Economist for Tishomingo County for some 30 years passed away after living her retirement years in the Carrington House Assisted Living.

Miss Nellie was a leading citizen of Tishomingo County. Although she was not born here, she came here with the State Extension Service and be-

came a vital member of the community. She was very active in building up the Homemakers Clubs throughout the county; led the 4-H for many years; saw that the Tishomingo County Fair was a success each year; and participated in many club and organizations around town.

The Tishomingo County News featured her articles each week, "Chatting with Your Home Economist" and we often kidded her for having her photo in the paper more than anyone else, even the mayor! She was a busy lady and gave freely of her time.

Miss Nellie, who was never married, which was a requirement of County Home Economist many years ago, was a fun person and "claimed to flirt with the men" every chance she got. She was

GLORIFIED CABBAGE

1 medium head cabbage

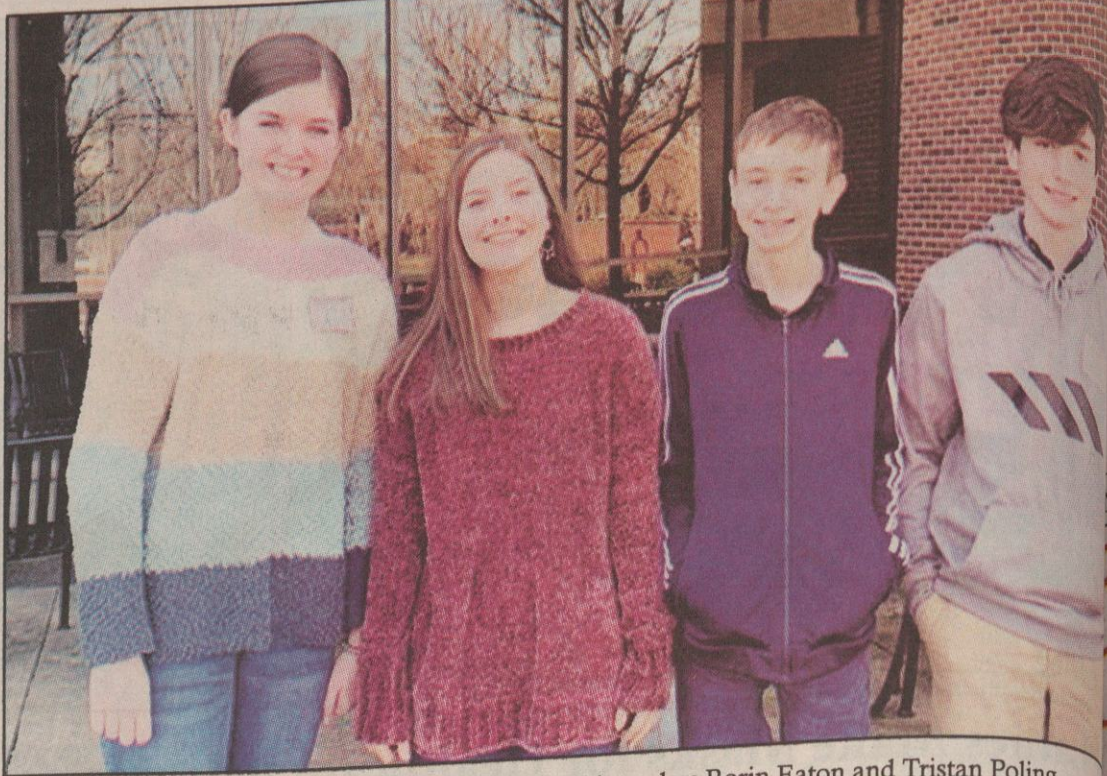
Don't forget the "grab-n-go" lunches available from 9-11 daily at Burnsville, IES, Tishomingo, and Belmont.

1. Eliminate all non-essential travel. If your employer has closed down or required you to work from home, please remain at home pursuant to that directive.

2. Avoid gatherings which number ten (10) persons or greater. We encourage you to avoid all public gatherings outside of your home for the next few weeks in order to contain the spread of the virus.

3. Practice social distancing. When you are required to go into the public practice social distancing and try to maintain a minimum of six (6) feet between you and the nearest person. We understand this might be difficult but right now this is critical in limiting and containing the spread of the virus.

4. Utilize hand sanitizer, practice hand washing and avoid unnecessary hand contact with items which are routinely touched by the general public such as door handles, gas pumps, public bathroom doors, etc. Use

gloves when pumping gas or immediately wash your hands after handling a public door handle or gas pump. Try to avoid touching your face, nose and eyes where germs easily can enter your body.

5. If you become sick contact your health care provider and remain at home until your appointment. Avoid at risk populations such as those of advanced age (anyone over 60) and those persons with compromised immune systems.
